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## Kidnapping ordeal ends with safe return

Charlie and Paula Cabello, of Floydada, have experienced the nightmare of all parents and are grateful for the

happy ending.

The Cabello's 5 year old daughter, Christian, is home unharmed and safe with her family after being kidnapped

at an Allsups Convenience Store in Idalou. Christian is also grateful, and she gives a lot of the credit to her guardian angel.

Robert Rivera, 17, is being held in the Lubbock County Jail on a \$5,000 bond for the aggravated kidnapping of Christian, and a \$1,500 bond for the unauthorized use of a motor vehicle.

Rivera's cousin, Tommy Delgado Jr., is also being held in jail after being arrested for public intoxication. He faces additional charges.

The nightmare began at 1:30 a.m., Thursday, July 13, at the Allsups store in Idalou. Christian and her father were returning from playing Bingo in Lubbock. Christian was asleep in the front seat and strapped in with a seat belt. Her dad, Charlie, stopped for a bathroom break and decided not to awaken Christian.

"There was no one at the store--just me and the guy behind the counter," said Charlie. "I turned off the car but left the keys in the ignition. When I came out of the bathroom I saw the car backing up. I ran out and saw a man behind the wheel but I didn't see his face. He had already backed out far enough that I threw myself on the back of the car and started hollering, 'My little girl is in there--let me have her.' He just took off with Christian still sleeping. I slid off the back of the car (a four door Corsica)."

Charlie ran to the phone and called 911. Another man, whose name Charlie does not remember, came up to Charlie and said he had picked up

the man who was driving off (Rivera) and another man (Delgado) hitchhiking along the road. He had dropped both men at Allsups. He pointed out Delgado (who was still standing outside Allsups) to Charlie and then took off in his pickup to try and find Charlie's car and little girl.

"I held on to Delgado until the police got there," said Charlie. "He lied and told the police he didn't know Rivera--who later turned out to be his cousin. We don't know why Rivera took off without him--maybe because of me jumping on the car."

Charlie says the man in the pickup returned and said he had lost the car and that police had told him to go back to Allsups and they would continue the search.

Meanwhile Mom has been awakened from a sound sleep by her husband. She is told her daughter has been kidnapped from the Idalou Allsups and to come right away.

Paula hangs up and drives immediately to Floydada's Allsups. "I was sound asleep and never heard the word 'Idalou'," said Paula. "After I found out it wasn't at the Floydada Allsups, I started driving to Lubbock and stopped at every Allsups along the way. It was storming so bad that I passed 18 wheelers pulled over--but I never stopped. When I pulled into Idalou Allsups I was probably driving about 60 mph and hit the curb."

Christian woke up in her seat to a different man behind the wheel of her daddy's car. "I woke up because he was driving fast and bumping a lot,"

said Christian. "I asked for my daddy and he said, 'I'm your Uncle. I'm your daddy's best friend. I'm taking you to your daddy.'"

"Then he hit a big rock (or something big) and crashed. I hit my nose on the dashboard."

At this point the car was disabled and according to Christian the man "got out and left me in the dark car by myself."

The car had stopped on the road near the Montgomery's residence in Ransom Canyon.

Christian says she started screaming for her daddy. "It was real dark and scary. I saw a house but there were no lights on."

At this point Christian says, "I heard a voice. The voice said, 'Run Christian--Run For Help--Run.' And Christian did--straight to the Montgomery's door."

The Montgomery's were already awake. A noise at a window (as if someone was trying to get in) had awakened the family dogs who began barking. Mr. Montgomery got a gun and searched the house. About 15 minutes later the Montgomerys heard a knock on their door. They opened the door to find Christian on their doorstep. "I'm lost and I can't find my Daddy," Christian told them. "They asked me my name and I said 'Christian.' They asked me how old I was and I said '5'. They asked me if I wanted anything to eat."

According to Charlie, the Montgomerys called 911 at 2:39 a.m. to report the lost little girl.

"The call went to the Ransom Canyon dispatcher and they hadn't heard anything about the kidnapping yet," said Charlie. "About 5 minutes later they called the Montgomerys back and told them to lock all the doors, turn off the lights, and get in a back room until police got there."

On the way to the Montgomerys, police found Rivera running through the neighborhood in Ransom Canyon. He was later identified by a description from Christian and by his cousin, Tommy Delgado.

"The police said that Christian had his description down to a 'T,'" said Paula. "She drew them a picture and they said it looked just like him. She also told them the man was wearing a jersey with a number on it. She couldn't remember the number but she told them his sleeves were cut off--and they were. The police kept the picture that Christian drew for them."

It wasn't until approximately 3:15 a.m. that Christian's parents got word that she was O.K.

"You feel so helpless," said Paula. "All you do is pray. I wanted to be strong and think positive. I worried that she would start talking and he would get mad and throw her out or something."

"I want people to hear this story and learn from my mistake," said Charlie. "They should think twice before they do what I did."

In a confession to police, Delgado said he and Rivera had hitchhiked to Idalou in a white pickup after steal-

## Police release details of Floydada woman's murder and cover-up

Colorado Springs Police are awaiting the autopsy results for a Colorado Springs murder suspect who was found dead on July 8th in Nevada.

But police already believe that case is closed, said Sgt. Rod Walker, head of the Colorado Springs Police major crimes unit.

Ramon K. Garcia was being sought on first-degree murder charges in the death of his wife, Alison McLain, formerly of Floydada. McLain's decomposed body was found by campers off of Rampart Range Road in the western part of El Paso County on July 5th.

Three days later, Garcia's dead body was found under a bush near a set of railroad tracks in North Las Vegas, Nevada. Police believe he had been dead for about a week. The Clark County, Nevada coroner is awaiting the results of a toxicology test on Garcia's blood to determine the cause of death.

Police say they know how McLain died. They believe Garcia attacked her with a hammer, beating her to death in the second floor bedroom of their West Colorado Avenue home.

On Monday July 17th, Colorado Springs police released an arrest affidavit that details efforts by McLain's friends and family to locate her after

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she disappeared in mid-May and police findings about events surrounding her murder.

Questions about McLain's disappearance began almost immediately after police believe she was killed.

They started with McLain's mother, Doris McLain of Floydada, who last heard from her daughter on Mother's Day, May 14th.

In their phone conversation, McLain told her mother to keep a lookout for a package and a card she was sending with a check in it that was to be a repayment for a long-ago loan. The package arrived, but the card and the check never did, according to the affidavit.

Doris McLain tried to reach her daughter to ask about the card and left phone messages that were never returned. Ramon Garcia left a message on Doris McLain's phone May 18th, sounding "hesitant" when he told his mother-in-law that her daughter had left on an unexpected trip.

When Doris McLain called back and spoke to Garcia, he told her that her daughter had been depressed, that she had quit her job and accepted a new one, and that she had left on a two-week vacation with a friend whom Garcia didn't know.

He also told her that Alison had not taken her camera on the trip, which Doris McLain thought was odd because her daughter, an artist, always did.

After two weeks, Garcia called and told Doris McLain that he had heard from Alison and that she was fine. He also said that he had been out of town because his car had been impounded by Denver police. He guessed it was because he looked suspicious because of the "shovels and stuff in the car."

On June 6th, the day after he talked to McLain's mother, Garcia filed a missing person report with the police upon his mother-in-law's insistence.

By this time, however, Alison's sister, Marilyn Wood, had become suspicious. She hadn't heard from her sister in weeks. She called Cheap Tickets, where Alison worked and talked to her co-workers, one of whom said Alison had been extremely upset, saying money was missing from her checking account and Garcia wasn't paying his share of the bills.

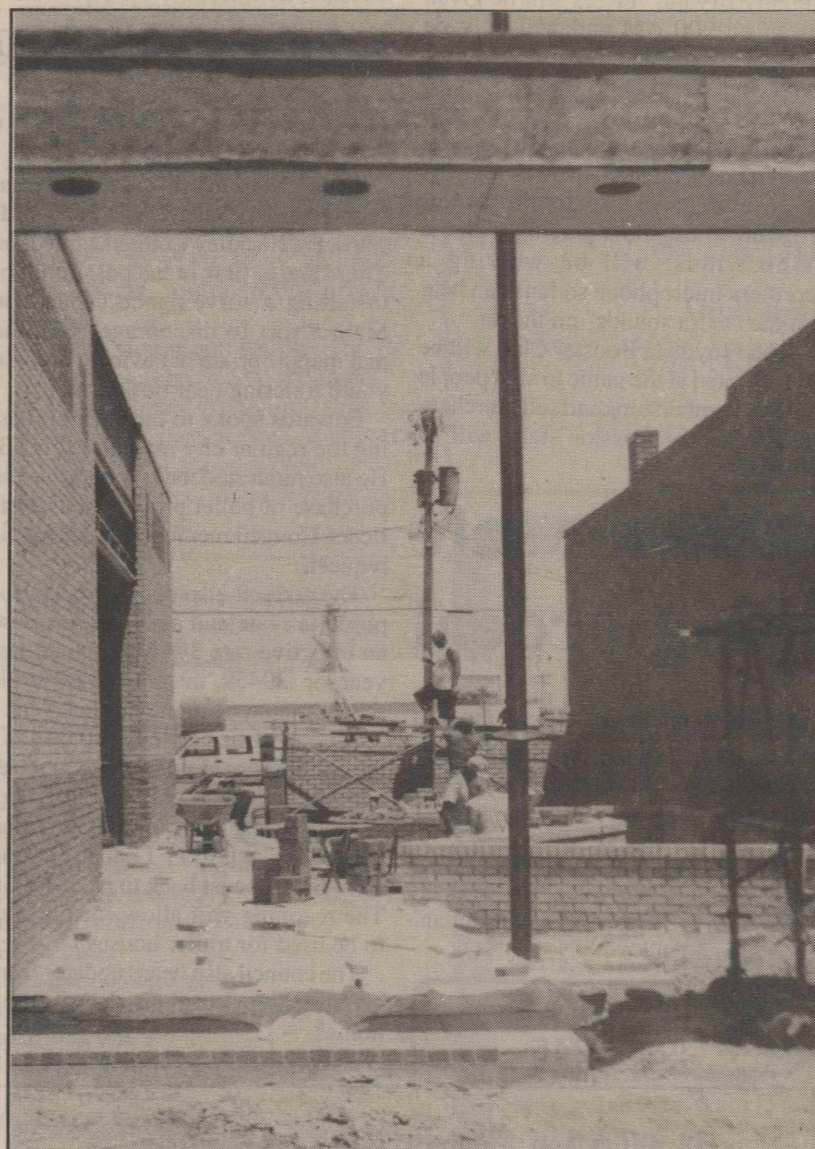
Workers said McLain hadn't resigned, nor was she fired.

In addition, they said she was well-liked at her job.

McLain's niece, Lesley Weems, also received a strange e-mail dated May 18th, written from McLain's account, saying she was leaving to go on a trip with a friend named Greg. But it wasn't "written in the same style as Alison would normally write. Alison usually addresses her as 'Niecey-Pooh,'" according to the affidavit.

Prompted by the concerns of family and friends, detectives began to

## Texans to get 3 day break from sales tax

Texans will get a break from state and local sales taxes on August 4, 5, and 6th--the state's second annual tax holiday.

The Texas Legislature exempted most clothing and footwear priced under \$100 from sales and use taxes. According to Carole Keeton Rylander, Texas Comptroller, this exemption could save shoppers "about \$8 on every \$100 they spend."

Clothing and footwear that are used primarily for athletic activities or for protective wear are not eligible for the exemption. Customers buying golf cleats and football pads, for instance, must pay sales taxes. However, the tax will be waived on athletic wear that is also used for participation in other nonathletic activities. For example, tennis shoes, baseball caps, and jogging suits are worn during everyday activities, too, and thus may be purchased tax-free during the holiday.

Also excluded from the sales tax holiday are accessories--such as jewelry and watches; items that are carried rather than worn--including handbags, briefcases, and wallets; and clothing results--such as formal wear and costume rentals; and repairs and alterations.

The exemption applies to each article of clothing or footwear that sells for less than \$100, regardless of how

## Taxation of personal property faces changes in Floyd County

As with other board meetings in the county, the taxation of personal property took up most of the time during Lockney's City Council meeting, July 13.

Alderman Bil Anderson, who is the city's representative on the tax appraisal board, gave a report to the council on personal property taxes.

"Texas law allows for the taxation of Tangible Personal Property," said Anderson. "Once the taxable value of the property falls below \$500 it is exempt."

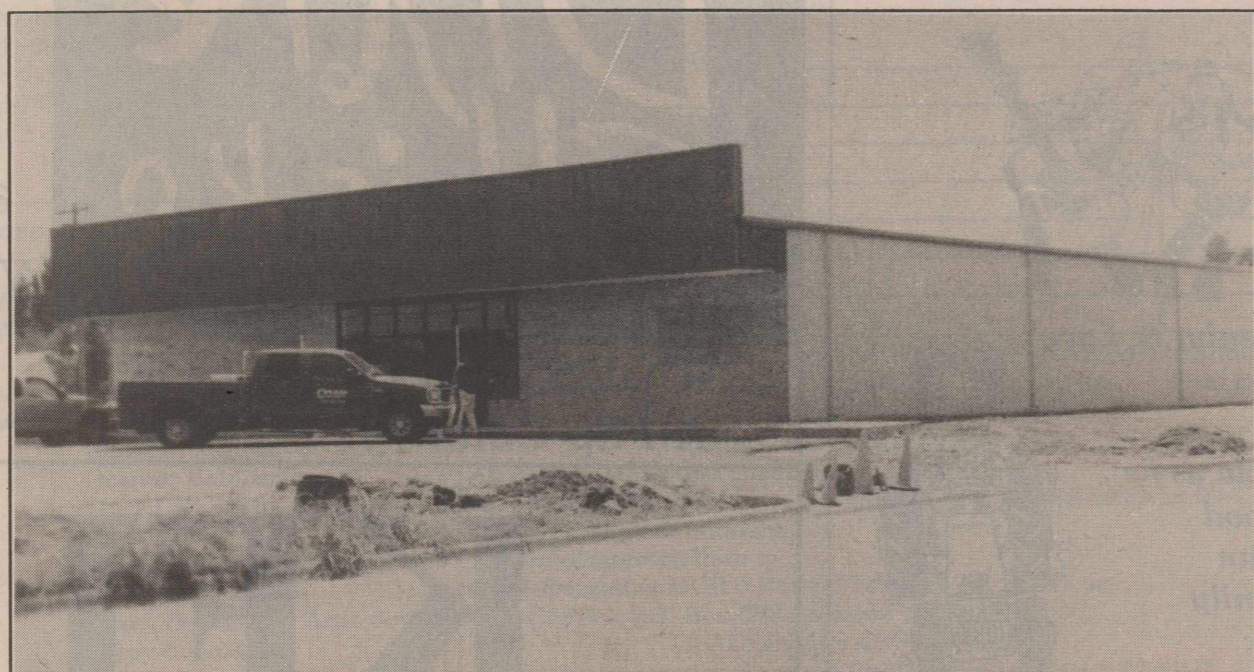
Anderson said, "The way I understand this is that the state has also allowed counties to exempt personal property (such as vehicles) after 7 years. The law does not specifically state that taxes should stop after 7

years. It is speculated that cars have dropped off after 7 years because in times past NADA blue book values were used to determine automobile values. Back then the main blue book did not go back farther than 7 years.

So, without an accepted method of valuation of automobiles older than 7 years it was assumed that their value was less than \$500."

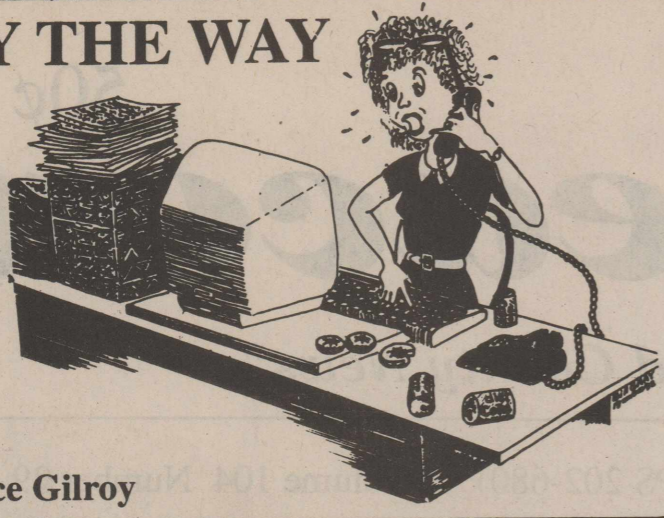
Anderson said he was told that when the City of Lockney (and the other taxing entities) voted last year to add motorcycles to the list of personal property taxed, the motorcycles were added, by the appraisal district, according to the existing law governing personal property taxation and not

"The guy who had his Bronco stolen told me they pulled a gun on him to steal his car," said Charlie. "Christian never saw a gun."

Police asked Christian what she wanted to see happen to the man who took her. She said, "I want Robert to be in jail for a million days."

As for the voice in the car, Christian and her mom both have a good idea who it was. "I lost a son, in 1996,

at birth," said Paula. "His name was Paul. I have always told my daughters that he is in Heaven and is their guardian angel."

When Christian was asked if she was scared of the voice, she said, "It wasn't scary. It was my guardian angel. It was Paul."

Prepare yourself, gentle reader, for another hit in the pocketbook. Mr. Clinton is still searching for his "legacy."

When there is even talk of peace, the taxpayer foots the bill.

You may remember the sequence. The current Israeli leader, Mr. Ehud Barak, got elected on a platform of peace with Israel's neighbors. Mr. Barak followed Mr. Netanyahu, who took the position, publicly, that "the world owes Israel," and who set out to collect that claimed debt, as had every Israeli Prime Minister before him. Successfully, we might add.

Soon after the election, reports began to appear in the Israeli press, then the American press, that Israel would need to be compensated, by Ameri-

cans, for giving back to the Palestinians a portion of the land they took from the Palestinians way back in 1968, I think it was.

The first reports we saw, in both the Israeli press and the American press, was on the order of another \$1 Billion or so (on top, of course, of the billions Israel already gets annually from the American treasury.). There was no outcry from the Congress, understandably, and certainly none from the Administration. So the price went up. The next rumors we saw floated in both places was for \$10 Billion. It will take that much, we are told, to compensate the Israelis for giving up territory they got for free (if we can consider a military operation funded by someone else (the US) as being free to the Israelis.) Now the stories going around in the national press is that the suggested \$10 Billion is only that portion the United States will "owe". Many more billions will be expected from other parts of the world.

All of this dovetails nicely with the political season in the U.S. Mr. Clinton is looking to his "legacy" and

he is aware of who determines that legacy. The cost to taxpayers is incidental. Too, many political candidates are looking for contributions and votes. This is not the season when most politicians say no to potential campaign givers, and AIPAC has a reputation of being a hard-nosed campaign giver.

\*\*\*\*\*

Poor George W. He goes before AIPAC (the American-Israeli Political Action Committee), along with Al Gore, and comes off second best. George pandered just like Gore, promising Israel's lobby in this country nearly everything it wanted, but, as he found out when it came time to tote up the applause, that wasn't enough. They liked Gore better. A lot better.

In fact, Gore will have the lion's share of the American Jewish community's support even if he never shows up at a meeting of AIPAC. And George W. will never get more than 15 percent of that vote, no matter what he does. His name, after all, is Bush, and his father earned the lasting en-

mity of most American Jews simply by pressuring Israel into the Madrid "summit", and by resisting, for awhile, a \$10 Billion guaranteed "loan" following the Gulf Storm operation.

While Bush was trying to pacify AIPAC, the American Jewish Congress was giving him fits nationwide. The New York based AJC condemned Bush for declaring what they called a "Jesus Day" in Texas. Bush issued the proclamation to coincide with the nationwide June 10 "March for Jesus Day." Press reports indicate that Mr. Phil Baum, executive director of the AJC, called Bush's action an "egregious example" of elected officials trying to accommodate the religious views of constituents. In short, they didn't like it, at all. And the fact that the blast from the American Jewish Congress was issued from New York, concerning an issue affecting Texas, should be instructive. The AJC is a sort of umbrella organization, through which many other organizations get the word. Bush may as well quit worrying about it.

## Camera may be used to discourage illegal activity in downtown Lockney

After listening to a departmental report from Police Chief Jerry Edward, the Lockney Council agreed, on Thursday, to look at the possibility of installing a surveillance camera on Main Street to discourage "obscene and inappropriate behavior" from the youth loitering near businesses.

Edwards spoke to the Council during the regular city meeting, July 13. He also requested the city approve the purchase of bullet proof vests for officers. Council members agreed to this request.

The council also considered a proposed tax rate and agreed to propose an effective rate 3% higher than last year, or .39459, in order to raise the same amount of money as last year.

After a public hearing at 10:00 a.m., the council voted unanimously to rezone an area from N.E. 3rd St. going north to Guest St.; from E. Guest and 3rd to S.E. 8th to E. Locust St.; and from East Locust back to N.E. 3rd St. The rezoning will allow for the area to be used for trailer houses.

The council also heard updates from citizens working on dilapidated homes.

Council members appeared receptive to the proposal but wanted to put more study into the costs.

### Recent Supreme Court Rulings Do Not Reflect the 'Firm Basis' on Which Our Nation Was Founded

Above the main entrance to the Supreme Court building are the words, "EQUAL JUSTICE UNDER LAW." Unfortunately, recent rulings by the Court seem to use creative interpretations of the Constitution and raise questions about what law they are following.

The recent Court ruling against voluntary prayer at high school football games is a good example. In the words of the dissent, the Court's opinion, "bristles with hostility to all things religious in public life." It is certainly a long way from the views of the Founding Fathers.

It is hard for me to understand how the clear words of the First Amendment, "Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof," can be interpreted to prohibit a voluntary student-led prayer before a football game.

In another disheartening ruling, the Court ruled that when the State of Nebraska passed a state law to prohibit partial-birth abortions, it violated the Constitution. Remember, the Supreme Court's job is not to figure what the law should be; its job is to decide if a law violates the words of the Constitution. I've read the Constitution many times, and I have not found any words that could possibly be interpreted to prohibit a state law against partial-birth abortion.

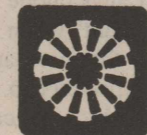
More than 200 years ago, President Thomas Jefferson asked whether the liberties of a nation can be thought secure "when we have removed their only firm basis, a conviction in the minds of the people that these liberties are the gift of God?" With its recent rulings, the Supreme Court has undermined that firm basis, as well as the clear meaning of some basic English words.

Then we started putting it in gallon jars and selling it.

"Then we moved into arts and crafts, and sold under the label of 'Family Recipes'. Mom and I would get a booth. I would put up my crafts and mom would put out the peanut brittle. We always sold out of the candy.

"Mom quit selling at the shows and I just picked it up. The candy always did better than anything else.

"I liked doing the shows—it gets into your blood. After while my granddaughter, August, was born and I didn't want to travel anymore."

In 1999 Georgia decided to set up a shop behind her father's house to start selling wholesale.

"I've always worried about selling wholesale because I'm a stickler for freshness. I don't know what would happen to it after it left my hands."

When Georgia decided to go wholesale she changed the label name to Lone Star Candy.

"Gift Baskets By Genie, in Lubbock, was one of my first and biggest customers," Georgia. "Pecan Ridge also bought my peanut brittle and chocolate."

Now Georgia has a distributor in Post who sells her candy to grocery stores from Dalhart to Ft. Stockton.

A local sales representative, Anne Carthel, also took Georgia's candy to the Dallas Market and picked up some more customers. A new sales representative has also been signed up in the Atlanta market.

"We sell mostly to specialty stores," said Georgia. "Christmas is our busiest season. We will probably be cooking some nights for 22 hours a day. There is a bed in my office because I get very little sleep."

It would be hard to leave the Lone Star Candy Shop without filling up a special "gift crate" of candy.

Georgia makes three different kinds of brittle—peanut, pecan, and cashew. You can purchase them plain or dipped in chocolate.

"I also do toffee (chocolate almond butter crunch), peanut clusters, cashew clusters and pecan pralines,"

said Georgia. "We also have sugar free pecan pralines and I'm working on other sugar free candy."

"We sell out of the store but usually we are filling orders. Sometimes we will have a lot of candy in here and sometimes there will be slim pickins."

At Christmas the store will fill special orders of fudge and pecan logs. Party trays are also available.

According to Georgia, the recipe has changed over the years. "We use less fat now," said Georgia. "I make 3 lbs. at a time and there is relatively no fat except for the nuts."

Georgia is helped in the store by Nikki Coronado and by her partner, G.A.

"I'm the gopher," said G.A. "I do everything but cook. I package the candy, go for supplies, ship the candy, and do shows."

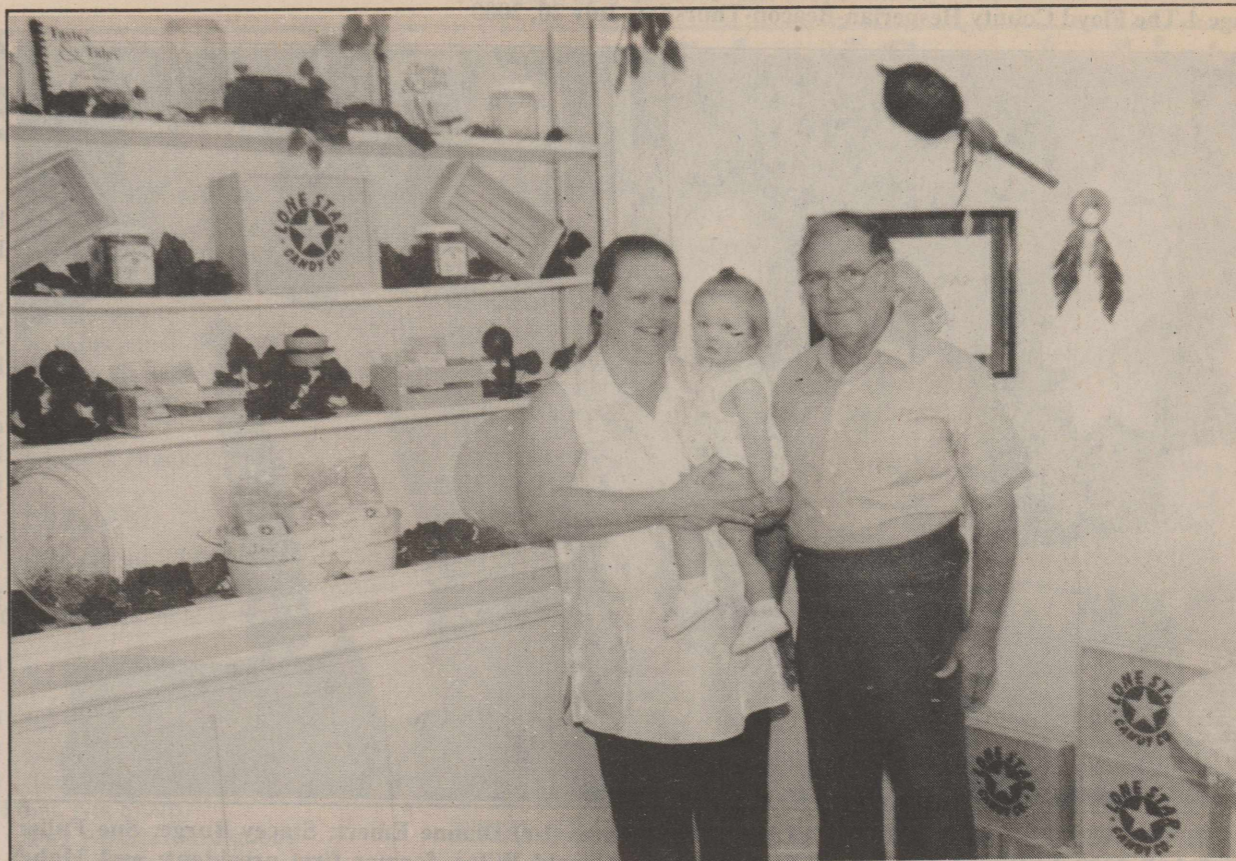
For shipping, the boxes of candy are placed inside a larger box which is lined with insulated bubble wrap.

A bag of praline candy goes for \$1.50 and the 1/2 lb. bag of chocolate pecan brittle will sell for \$5.00.

Gift crates come in small and large decorative crates and are filled with any type of candy the customer desires.

"The small crates go for \$12.00-\$15.00," said Georgia. "The bigger ones sell from \$25.00-\$35.00."

Georgia has two children: Marcus, a youth pastor in Andrews; and her daughter Jennifer, who is in school in Wolforth.

## Personal property taxation faces changes

under the conventional treatment of automobiles (exempt after 7 years). Motorcycle owners are protesting this proposal because motorcycles are now being taxed in Floyd County like recreational vehicles which, although they depreciate in value, never go off the tax roll.

The Appraisal Office has researched the issue and found that although it is legal to tax personal property—all personal property must be taxed the same way.

According to Tax Appraiser Shelia Faulkenberry, "In 2001 all personal property will be treated the same way."

"All entities will be asked to adopt a resolution on whether or not they want to tax personal property. That is the only question they will be asked."

"It is not fair now to say how many years the personal property will be taxed."

According to Faulkenberry Floyd County is just one of many counties in the state who have considered personal vehicles and "recreational vehicles" in a different category for taxation.

"It has been done this way in Floyd County since before I started working in this office, and I've been working here since I was 18 years old," said Faulkenberry.

"It has always been hard to determine the value of property, but now we have resources available to us that have not been available in the past. We now have different 'books' for cars, boats, motorcycles, and airplanes."

"Next year it will be different. Everything will be treated the same."

Councilman Anderson told the council that it was not true, as has been rumored, that Floyd County is 1 of only 2 counties in Texas with personal property tax.

"The information I've received said that Floyd County is one of 28 counties in this region with one or more entities that tax personal property. In this region there are 102 taxing entities, including: 30 cities, 15 counties, 37 school districts, and 20 special districts (hospital or water)."

According to Anderson, some cities, in this region, that tax personal property are: Claude, Quitaque, Silvertown, Dimmit, Nazareth, Paducah, Clarendon, Hedley, Crowell, Petersburg, Canadian, Follett, Higgins, Mason, Adrian, Vega, Bovina, Friona, Stratford, Texhoma, Happy, Kress, and Throckmorton."

In Lockney, the breakdown of taxable property for the city is: real estate: \$21,604,488, and personal property, \$11,558,680. Of that personal property, 20% or \$6,588,505 is vehicle/motorcycle value which generates \$24,975 in tax revenue for the city.

In the Lockney School District the taxable property for the district is

\$97,684,186. Of that amount, \$35,723,000 is taxable personal property. From this personal property amount, \$10,434,290 is taxable from motorcycles, boats, vehicles, R.V.'s, and airplanes, generating \$127,000 in tax revenue for LISD.

The taxable property for Floyd County amounts to \$201,690,321 generating \$719,533.06 in revenue, which is 70% of the county's revenue. Taxable personal property in the county amounts to \$85,524,422, generating \$308,371.32 which is 30% of the county's revenue.

"If we did not have the personal property tax," said County Judge Bill Hardin, "taxing entities would have to raise their effective tax rate on real estate to make up for loss from personal property."

Taxable property for FISD is \$156,425,605, which includes real estate property valued at \$108,744,553, and personal property at \$47,681,052. Using this year's tax rate the personal property would generate \$548,639.00 in revenue for FISD.

investigate. On June 20 and June 23, they interviewed Garcia, who repeated his story that McLain had quit her job and taken a two-week vacation with a friend in New Mexico.

He told them that he had dropped her off at a Manitou Springs restaurant with \$3,000 in her pocket, and that that was the last he had seen her.

After further questioning, Garcia told detectives that McLain wasn't making bill payments, and he denied taking money from her account.

He said he was unaware of the extent of the couple's financial troubles and didn't know the bank was about to foreclose on their home, according to the affidavit.

He said he believed she had left for another man but also thought she had disappeared because of health problems. McLain suffered from Hepatitis C, migraines and depression.

"Maybe she just wanted to do some things as the hepatitis was an ultimately fatal disease and maybe she felt herself slipping," he said, according to the affidavit.

Detectives also interviewed Lorene McPherson, McLain's stockbroker, who said that a couple of weeks before she disappeared he had noticed bruises on McLain's arms. According to the affidavit, she told McPherson that Garcia had held her down and choked her until she hit him.

On June 26, McLain's family members searched the house with Garcia's permission. They found the bedroom stripped bare of furniture, carpet, curtains and bedding.

Garcia told them he wanted to surprise his wife when she returned with new furnishings. They also found bills hidden under a blanket in McLain's car, and when they questioned Garcia about them, he became enraged, according to the affidavit.

The next day, June 27, police couldn't locate Garcia. And on June 28, Garcia called his mother and said that he had "just snapped" and had to get out of town, according to the affidavit.

On July 3, McLain's sister was clearing out the home on West Colorado Avenue to prepare it for the foreclosure. She found blood splatters on a catalog and bed frame. She also noticed cleaning streaks on the wall.

Later that day, police executed a search warrant on the home and found bloodstains under the flooring on the second floor. They also found blood on a bed frame and on a mattress that had its covering removed.

That same day, Angelina Barber of Colorado Springs received a strange collect call from someone claiming to be Alison McLain. When she accepted the call, the caller said he was a hitchhiker named "Bruce" who found Barber's number in an address book in a car being driven by Garcia.

The caller said he was on his way to Reno, and that he had met Garcia in Las Vegas. He said Garcia appeared to be strung out and without sleep. The caller said he had seen bills in Alison McLain's name strewn in the car, and believed the car was stolen.

On July 5th, campers found McLain's body wrapped in plastic. The tattoo that she invented and shared with Garcia could be seen on her right foot.

Ironically, three days later, police would use the same design to identify

her husband.

Alison's mother now believes she can almost pinpoint the time of her daughter's death.

"The last time I talked to her was May 14th. On May 15th she called a friend at 12:14 p.m. The friends were not at home, but their caller I.D. picked up her name and time of call. Alison was supposed to be at work at 2:00 p.m., but her husband called work and told them she was sick and would not be coming in."

"I believe she died between 12:14 p.m. and about 1:45 p.m. on May 15th."

Memorial services were held for Alison, July 13th, at the First United Methodist Church. Another memorial service was held at the First United Methodist Church, in Colorado Springs, on July 19th. A reception followed at the Business of Arts Center in Manitou, Colorado.

## LISD accepts resignation of Band Director Charley Cross

During their regular board meeting, July 13, the LISD Board of Trustees accepted resignations from Band Director Charley Cross, 4th grade teacher Melinda DeLeon and Elsie Clark.

In a letter to the board Cross said he was taking a position at Slaton Jr. High.

Superintendent Raymond Lusk said Mr. Cross told him he was sorry about the short notice. According to Lusk, Cross took the position for several reasons—"more money, no Friday nights, health reasons, and less expenditures on gas because of driving back and forth to Lockney."

Lusk said it would be very difficult to wait for applications to come in for band director because of the timing and school starting on August 14th.

He suggested to the board that Asst. Band Director Aaron Noland be promoted to head Band Director, and that he continue to look for an assistant for Mr. Noland.

The trustees agreed with Lusk and unanimously voted to promote Noland to Head Band Director.

DeLeon's position will not be filled at the Elementary School because of budget cuts and a drop in enrollment.

Elementary Principal Phil Cotham reported on staff changes and movement on campus. Fourth grade teacher Julie Dorman will move from the position of 4th grade teacher into the position of P.E. teacher.

Tracy Long will be moving from 3rd grade teaching to 4th grade.

Virginia Hernandez, who was an assistant in Kindergarten will move and become an assistant to 4th grade.

"We will have one less teacher in 3rd and one less teacher in 4th grade," said Cotham. "That will leave us 3

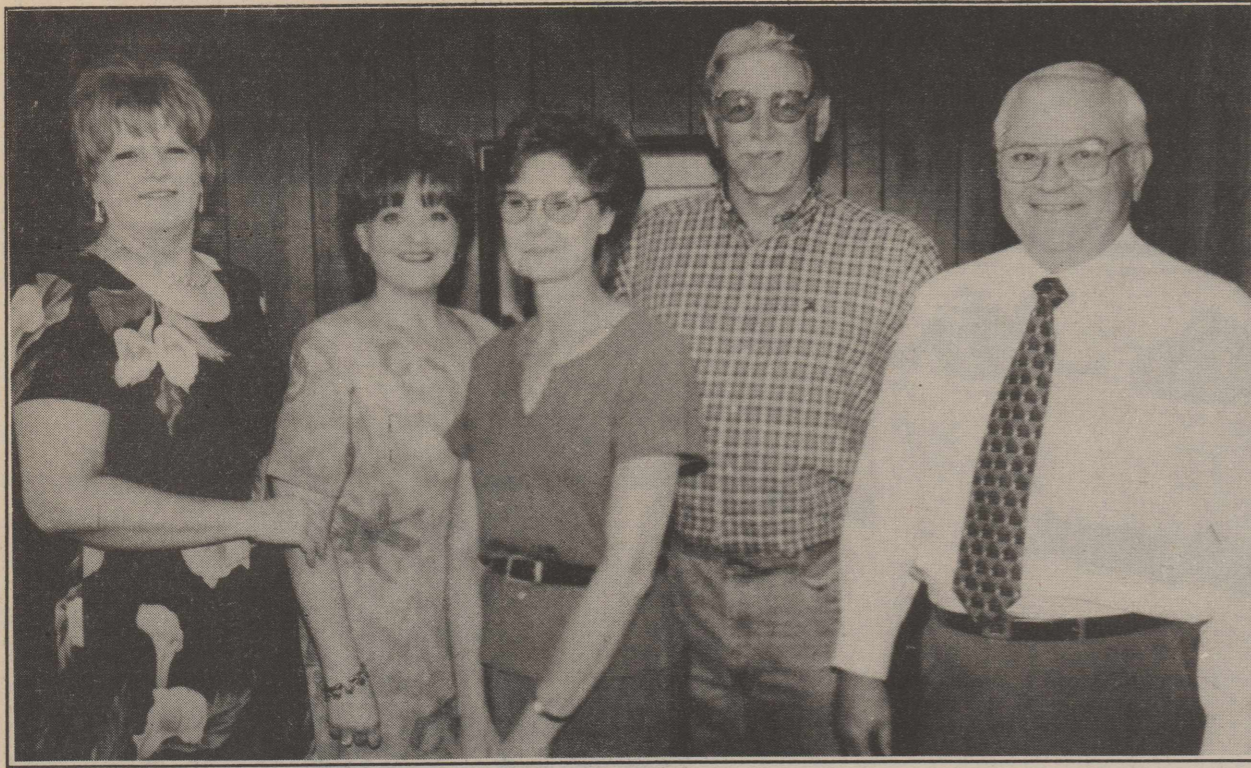

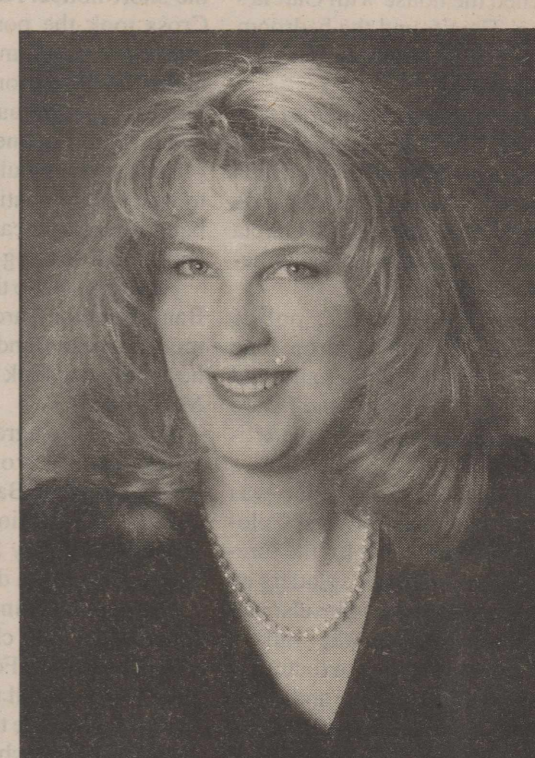

teachers in each grade."

Trustees voted unanimously to hire Jerod Neff as Jr. High/High School English teacher. Neff will teach three English classes for High School and 3 for Jr. High. A Wayland graduate, Neff student taught at Plainview High School.

Also on the agenda was an item to "consider resolution to place motorcycles in the same tax category with automobiles."

Lusk told the board that he had talked with Tax Appraiser Shelia Faulkenberry. Lusk said, "Shelia told me after she has researched the issue she has found out that all personal property has to be taxed the same. If automobiles are removed from the tax roll after 7 years then motorcycles, boats, etc., have to be removed also."

"Shelia is going to contact all the taxing entities to see what they want to do. To make the bookkeeping easier Shelia said she would like all the entities to agree on the amount of time they would like the property taxed."

Lusk presented some numbers to the trustees to consider. The breakdown of taxable property for LISD next year will be \$97,684,186. Of that amount, \$35,723,000 is taxable personal property. Of the taxable personal property, \$10,434,290 is taxable on motorcycles, boats, vehicles, R.V.'s, and airplanes.

After discussion the board recommended that LISD keep all personal property taxed for 7 years, like it had been done in the past for vehicles.

Trustees also agreed to proposing a tax rate of \$1.24482 per \$100 valuation, an increase of approximately 2 1/2 cents from last years rate of \$1.21884. A public meeting on the proposed tax rate will be held in August.

In other action, Trustees agreed that it was time to raise the football reserved seat prices for 2000-2001.

The new rate will be \$40.00 a year, which includes \$25.00 for the reserved seats and \$15.00 for gate fees.

**West Texas A&M names Martinez and McGuire to Dean's List**

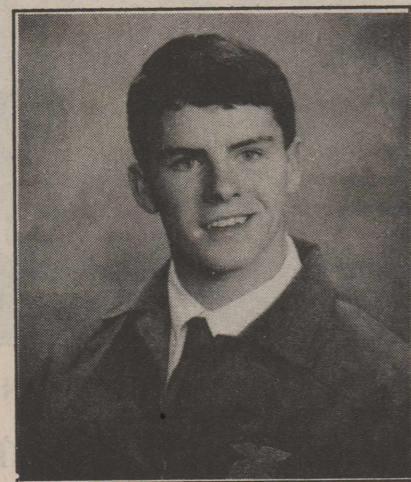
More than 1,100 West Texas A&M University students were named to the honor list for the 2000 Spring semester.

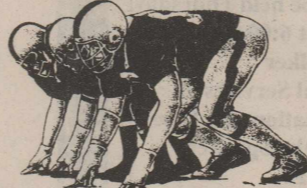

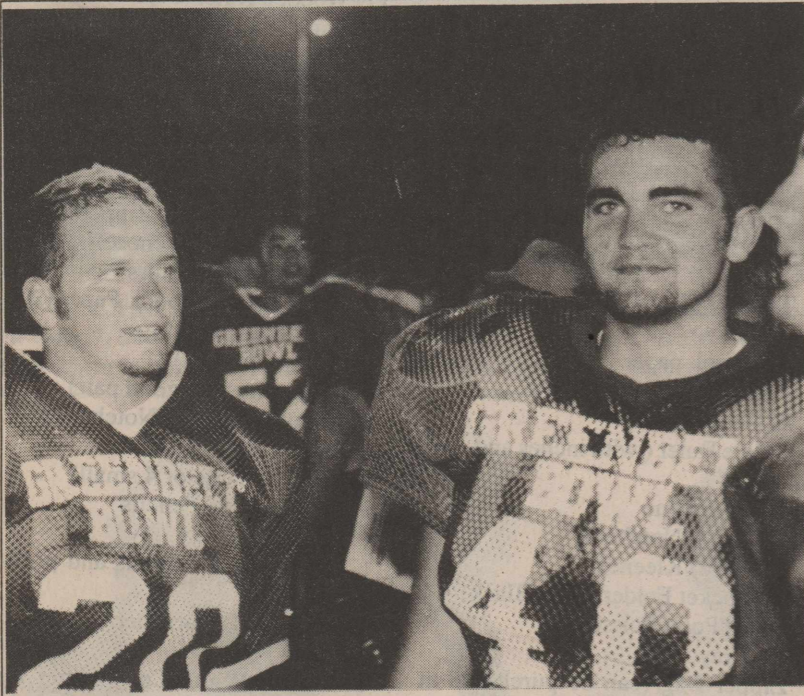

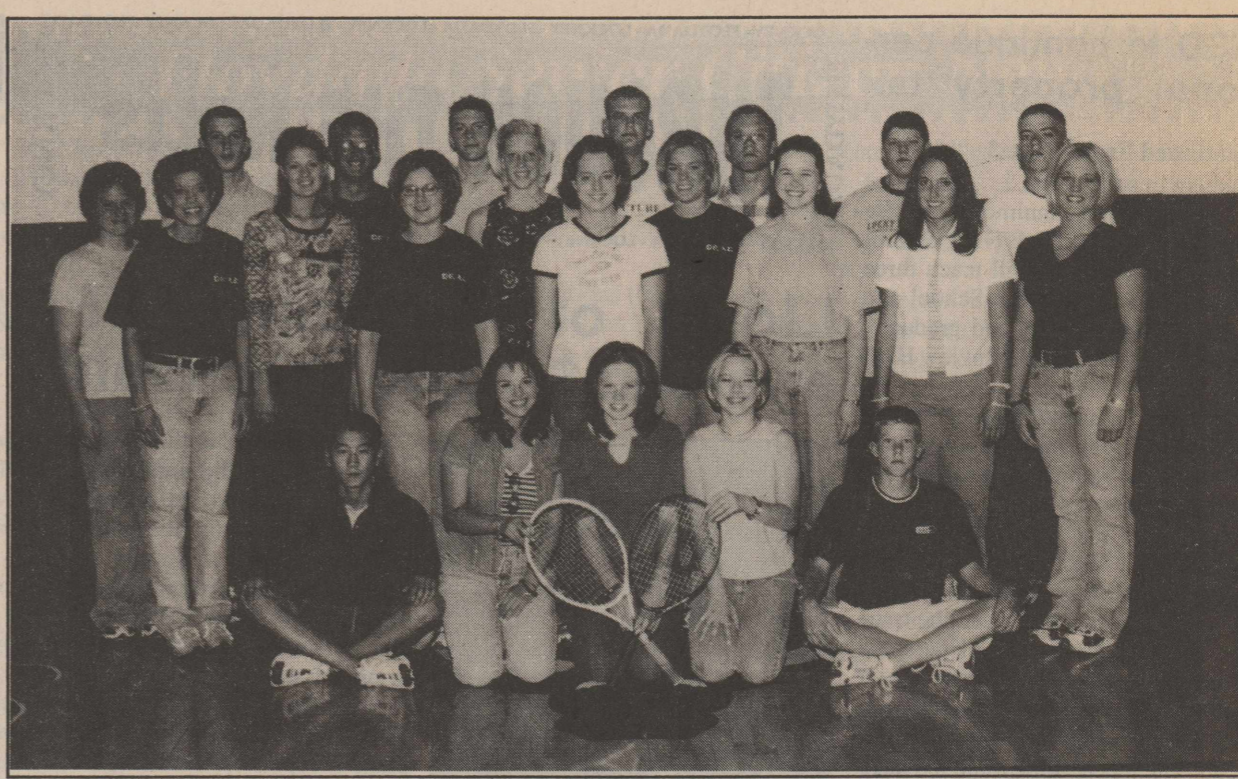

## PCG Board approves budget

Members of the Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., Board of Directors came together Wednesday, July 12 for the organization's first meeting of the 2000-2001 fiscal year.

Topping the agenda for the PCG Directors was approval of an operating budget for the organization's new fiscal year which began July 1.

The PCG Board unanimously approved an operating budget totaling \$526,841.48 to see the organization through the next budget cycle.

The Board also approved a relocation of the organization's offices to 4517 West Loop 289. The new location is just around the corner from PCG's current offices and will provide an improved level of functionality for the organization's activities.

In addition to the budget and office relocation the PCG Board also approved the support of legislative internship programs within the Agriculture Colleges at Texas Tech University and Texas A&M University.

The endowments, which will total \$125,000, will provide the foundation for support of one semester-long student internship from each university each year.

Legislative internship programs have long been considered a valuable source of support for agriculture since many the participants go to work in legislative staff positions after college.

In other business the PCG Board discussed the recent meeting between PCG officers and House Ag Committee Chairman Larry Combest and the status of important issues such as implementation of crop insurance reform legislation and the cottonseed assistance program.

The PCG Board also began discussing what type of change needed to be evaluated in preparation for the upcoming debate of the next Farm Bill.

The PCG Board agreed to support the efforts of the Council for Biotechnology Information based in Washington, DC. PCG Board members authorized the addition of PCG as a sponsor of the organization.

The Council for Biotechnology Information's goal is to raise awareness about the benefits of biotechnology inside the United States.

In other business the PCG Board elected members to the 2000-2001 Nominating Committee and heard reports on the status of boll weevil eradication activities from each of the five eradication zones within the High Plains region.

The PCG Board also authorized Ronnie Hopper to act as the PCG's representative at the upcoming Cotton Incorporated/Cotton Board caucus in Austin, July 19.

The caucus meeting coincides with a meeting of the Texas Cotton Producers association. TCP is comprised of the nine regional cotton producer organizations within Texas. PCG President Ronnie Hopper currently serves as Chairman of the Texas Cotton Producers.

One of PCG's important industry activities is the identification and promotion of cotton producers who are interested in filling leadership positions within the cotton industry. The Cotton Incorporated/Cotton Board caucus is the culmination of those activities.

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## Texas Farm Bureau criticizes EPA

The president of Texas' largest farm organization said today that the Environmental Protection Agency displayed "unbelievable arrogance" in finalizing sweeping new water rules regulating "total maximum daily load," of the nation's rivers, lakes and streams.

Donald Patman, a grain, cotton and cattle farmer from Waxahachie, said, "The rule, as finalized Tuesday, would be a crippling blow to Texas agriculture and it is in defiance of Congressional intent."

On June 30, Congress had passed a measure as part of the supplemental spending bill that would have prevented EPA from implementing the rule. Patman said the EPA's action was political gamesmanship, since President Clinton is due to sign the supplemental spending bill this week, which would have forbid the implementation of the rule.

"This rule is so stringent that agriculture and forestry in this state may not be able to comply. The bar is too high," Patman said. "Many in Congress, who understand agriculture, know this to be true, but EPA either does not understand, or does not care."

The controversy arises over so called non-point source pollution, where the agency is attempting to regulate pollution without a clearly defined source, such as sewage treatment plants or factories.

"This rule treats the farmers, ranchers and foresters of this nation just like a sewage plant, factory or other entity with a discharge pipe," Patman said. "We have come to expect nothing better from the EPA."

Patman said that great strides have been made in improving water quality with voluntary, incentive based programs.

American Farm Bureau President Bob Stallman, also a Texan, said Tuesday that the new rule is so unworkable that litigating it will likely result in further delays in improving water quality.

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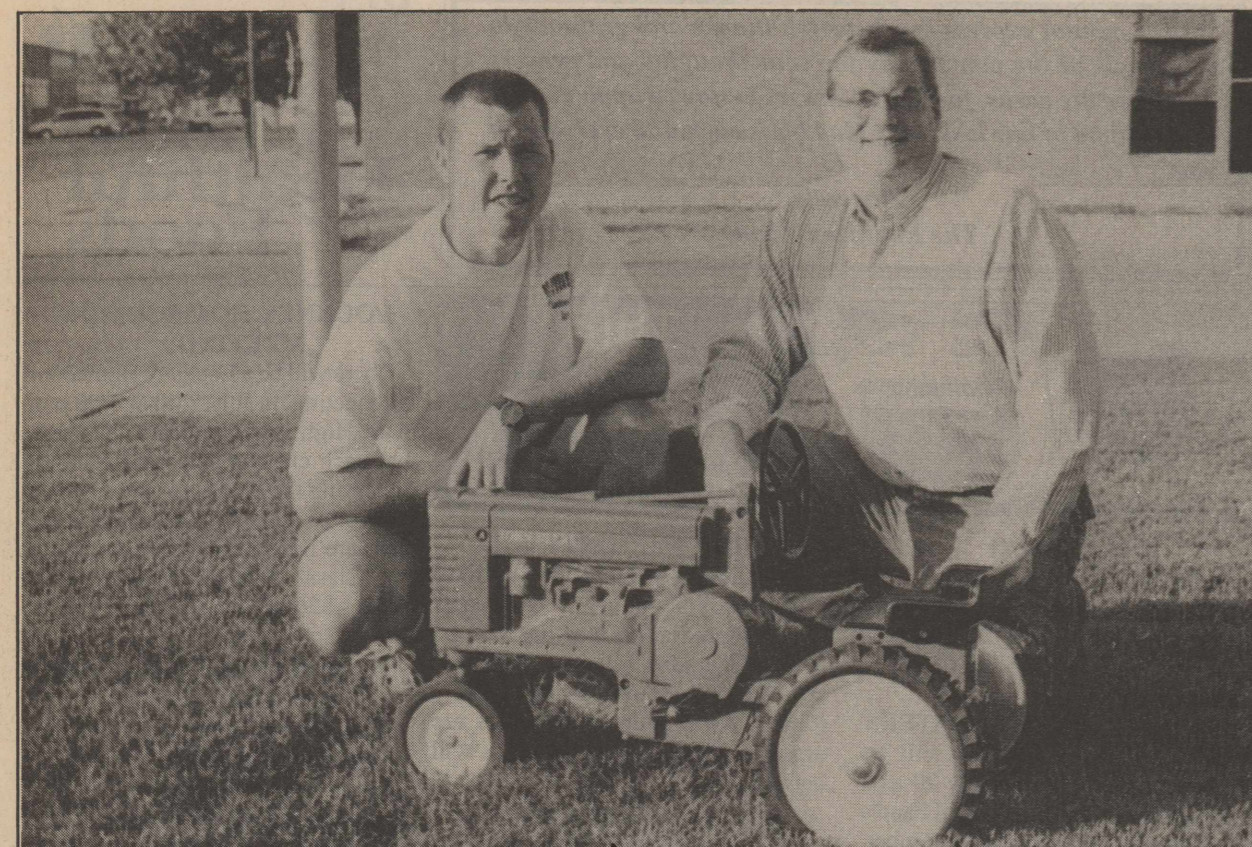

## Texas Agricultural Extension Service IPM Update

**GENERAL CONDITIONS**  
Higher temperatures and sunny days have provided much-needed heat units and area crops have responded quickly with rapid growth. With ample soil moisture available in most cases, all area crops are growing rapidly. Heat unit accumulation in June and through July 6th was below the four-year average. However, we were well above average in the last half of April (which may not apply) and in May. This brings us to a total accumulation which is about average or a little above, depending on when your crop was planted.

**COTTON BOLLWORMS**  
An egg-lay has occurred and bollworm numbers have increased in some areas of Crosby and Floyd counties. Eggs are pearly white to cream color and about half the size of a pinhead. These should not be confused with looper eggs, which are flatter and usually laid singly on the undersides of leaves. Eggs hatch in 3 to 4 days, turning light brown before hatching. Young worms usually feed for a day or two on tender leaves, leaf buds and small squares in the plant terminal before moving down the plant to attack larger squares and bolls. When small worms are in the upper third of the plant, they are most vulnerable to control by insecticides and beneficial insects and spiders. Full-grown larvae are about 1 1/2 inches long and vary in color from pale green, pink or brownish to black, with longitudinal stripes along the back.

Cotton fields should be scouted carefully every 3 to 5 days. In fields with fewer than five squares per row foot (approximately 67,000 per acre), bollworm populations often collapse and cease to be a problem. Eggs and newly hatched worms are usually found in the plant terminals and indicate possible outbreaks. Natural mor-

tality agents such as weather and predators frequently control these pests before any damage occurs. Once worms have grown to larger than 1/2 inch long, natural and insecticidal control are less effective. Insecticides applied to control 1/2 inch long worms are only moderately effective. Treatment may be justified when counts average 5,000 or more small worms per acre.

**BOLL WEEVIL MANAGEMENT**  
Fresh, green squares, at least 1/3rd grown or the size of a pencil eraser, should be pulled and used to determine the need for boll weevil treatment in most fields at this time. Remember to examine at least 100 squares from several areas of each field. If 10 to 20 percent of the squares examined are weevil damaged, treatment should be considered.

**PLANT BUGS**  
One scouting program field was treated for plant bugs last week. Plant bugs in this field were predominantly lygus bugs, but some fleahoppers were present. Small nymphs must be examined very closely, since fleahopper and lygus nymphs are very similar. The easiest was to differentiate the antenna and fleahoppers do not. This usually requires some magnification, so you may need to carry a hand lens.

If you can't tell the difference, I'll be glad to help you with this identification. Identification is very important since lygus can cause much more rapid square loss. Basically, I would trade one lygus for four fleahoppers.

**COTTON APHID**  
Cotton aphid colonies are building in many fields, but no treatable populations are present in program fields and none have been reported. These populations should be closely monitored and considered when applying any insecticides targeting other pests.

Hopefully, numbers will level off or decline with the increase in temperatures and decrease in humidity.

**SOUTHWESTERN CORN BORER**  
Flight of second generation southwestern corn borers is now starting, and fields should be scouted for eggs. Second generation eggs are usually laid after tasseling has occurred. About three-fourths of these eggs are laid on the upper surfaces of the middle seven leaves.

These leaves are: the ear leaf, two leaves above and four leaves below the ear leaf. Eggs are laid singly or in masses of two to three or more. Eggs overlap like fish scales or shingles. Freshly laid eggs are creamy white. One day later, three red bands appear across each egg. Eggs hatch in about 5 days. Small larvae feed behind leaf collars and ears and beneath the shucks of the primary ear. Older larvae bore into the stalk and continue feeding. Mature corn borer larvae reach 1 to 1 1/2 inches in length. They are dull white and have a regular pattern of raised black dots over the body.

As plant maturity is reached, larvae prepare for over wintering in the base of the stalk by girdling the plant from 1 to 6 inches above the ground. Wind can easily lodge girdled plants. Lodged plants are difficult to harvest and yields are reduced.

Treatments may be justified when 20 to 25% of the plants are infested with eggs or newly-hatched larvae. Check for egg masses to determine the potential infestation and the correct timing of insecticide applications. ## Floyd County Extension News

Floyd County residents who want to protect their lawns need to keep a close lookout now for white grub worms, cautions County Extension Agent, J.D. Ragland.

May or June beetles have been emerging from the soil and swarming in lawns in the evening. Females laid eggs which have hatched into white grubs. These grubs are beginning to feed on roots of home lawn grasses, the Extension agent said.

"Once grubs begin feeding, control measures should be taken," Ragland said.

Treatment time varies with the area of the state. Homeowners in the South Plains need to treat between mid-July and early August. Timing of chemical application is critical for adequate control.

White grubs in excessive numbers can heavily damage lawns, Ragland said. Check for white grubs by cutting a square foot section of sod with a shovel and examining the roots and

soil to a depth of four inches. Examine at least one square foot of sod for 1,000 square feet of lawn area. Alternately, examine 9 to 16 3-4 inch plugs of per 1,000 square feet of lawn and calculate the average number of grubs per square foot. Grubs are whitish to cream colored and curl into a "C" shape when disturbed.

Chemical treatment of tall fescue, buffalo grass, Tex-turf, and zoysia is needed if there are more than four grubs per square foot of sod. Bermuda grass can tolerate 7-10 grubs per square foot. Grub control chemicals include Merit, Diazinon, Dylox, Triumph, Sevin SL, and insect parasitic nematodes. These products should be used at recommended rates given on the chemical container label. The Environmental Protection Agency is removing Dursban from the home-use market, but existing supplies labeled for grub control can be used for this purpose.

The Extension agent said granular pesticides are easier to apply and to

wash into the soil than are liquid or spray formulations. "After using granules, drag the grass with a tow sack or water hose to knock them down to the soil. The insecticide should be watered in with one inch of water immediately after application, he said. Use a spot treatment if grubs are localized. Also be aware that heavy thatch reduces insecticide penetration Ragland said.

"Always read and follow the pesticide label and keep children and pets off the treated lawn until the grass is dry," the county agent stressed.

The key to controlling white grubs in home lawns is proper timing of chemical applications and getting the insecticide through the grass to the root zone where the grubs are feeding, Ragland emphasized.

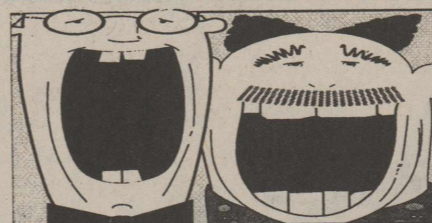
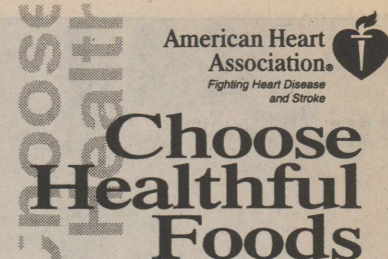



many items are sold on the same invoice to a customer. For example, if a customer purchases two shirts for \$80 each, then both items qualify for the exemption, even though the customer's total purchase price (\$160) exceeds \$99.99.

The exemption does not apply to the first \$99.99 of an article of clothing,

or footwear, that sells for more than \$99.99. For example, if a customer purchases a pair of pants that costs \$110, then sales tax is due on the entire \$110.
