of July, we submitted a list of questions to Mr. Clinesmith of Denton, who is standing as the Democratic

resentatives representing the 13th Congressional District (which is the Congressional District encompassing Floyd County.) We asked Mr.

The board later adopted a budge with expenditures set at $\$ 4,887,075$ The board took the most time dis

Studies under way at Baylor Col-
lege of Medicine and Texas Children's lege of Medicine and Texas Children's
Hospital have been designed to determine the proper doses of medication for children and eliminate some of the
current guesswork. current guesswork.

Dr. Susan Blaney, associate professor of pediatrics at Baylor. "That isn't necessarily a rational way of prescrib-

Eight medications, from antibiotics

The Houston site is one of 13 that serve as the Pediatric Pharmacology serve as the Unit Network.

The nationwide network gives in-

cians in a wide variety subspecialties.

FDA approval for new drugs and drugs already on the market that will
be given to children. be given to children.
"In the past, there been adequate information on drugs used in children. Not only is there a difference in prescribing medication
for children compared for children compared to adults, but
there may also be differences in newthere may also be differences in new-
borns, toddlers, and teenagers," Blaney said.

The way children's bodies metabo lize the drugs at different ages will be a key factor in the studies. Age and organ function are the usual indica-
tors in how a child will handle a drug, Blaney said.
Wou canh have a necessarily a factor. You can have a 7 year-old who weighs 40 pounds and a 7 -year-old who
weighs 65 pounds, but their organ weighs 65pounds, but one could be similar," she said.
Two primary types of studies will be conducted. In pharmacokinetic studies, blood samples are drawn at

We often see advertisements for sports drinks but what advantages do they offer in comparison to water? What should one look for in a sports drink? Is there a way to save money and make your own sports drink at home? Keep reading to tearn the answers to these and other questions about sports drinks. Water vs Sports Drinks: Water is a great source of fluid when exercising for less than 60 to 90 minutes. When activities last longer than 60 to 90 minutes, sports strinks may be a better choice because: (1) they provide fuel for muscles, and (2) the sodium and dlucose in the beverage can help the body absorb the fluid. What should one look for in a sports drink? Look for a sports drink that has: A. The right amount of carbohydrates (12 to 19 grams per 8 ounce serving). If a beverage is too high in carbohydrate, the fluid won't be absorbed quickly. B. The right type of carbohydrates. High amounts of fructose may cause an upset stomach. Look for beverages that contain more sucrose and glucose . and less fructose. C. No carbonation, caffeine, or alchol. For some people, carbonated beverages cause an upset stomach. Drinks with alcohol and caffeine can

program to operate within a maximum budget level of $\$ 96.93 /$ acre, the program to operate within a maximum budget leger
projected cost for a four-year eradication program. If approved, the projected cost for a four-year eradication program. If approved, the
program and assessment are expected to begin on a date determined by the Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation and the Texas Department of Agriculture based on biological and geographical considerations and the availability of resources. If the necessary financing is not arranged prior to program commencement, the program will not be initiated and no assessment will be collected.
The Northern High Plains Eradication Zone consists of all of Swisher and Hale counties; the part of Randall County that lies south and east of a line running along Highway 60 from the Deaf Smith County line east
to Interstate 27, then running north along Interstate 27 to the Potter County to Interstate 27, then running north along Interstate 27 to the Potter County
line; the part of Armstrong County that lies west and south of a line line; the part of Armstrong County that lies west and
running along FM 294 from the Carson County line to Hwy 287; then running due south to Mulberry Creek; then running east along Mulberry. Creek to the Donley County line; the part of Briscoe County that lies west of a line running along Hackberry Creek from its intersection with the Armstrong County line to its intersection with the Prairie Dog Town Fork of the Red River; continuing ss ath along Cherokee Creek from its intersection with the Prairie Dog Town Fork of the Red River to County Road 27; continuing south along County Road 27 to Hwy 256; continuing
west along Hwy 256 to the Caprock escarpment; and continuing south west along Hwy 256 to the Caprock escarpment; and continuing south

grower having cotton production in the year 2000 within the zone define above is eligible to vote, and, if he or she resides in the Northern High Plains Zone and has at least seven years experience as a cotton grower, can have his or her name placed on the ballot as a candidate in the board member election. A cotton grower is defined as a person who grows cotton and receives income from the sale of cotton. The term includes an individual who, as owner, landlord, tenant or sharecropper, is entitled to share in the cotton grown and available for marketing from the farm,
or share in the proceeds from the sale of the cotton from the farm.

Any person eligible to vote in the referendum or board member election that resides in the Northern High Plains Zone and meets the seven year experience requirement may place their name in nomination for elecio application to the Department at the address provided below. Nomination forms are provided by the Department and must be signed by the nominee and least ten other eligible voters. The nomination form must be received in Austin by September 4, 2000 and must provide the legal residence of the applicant. A nomination form may be obtained by contacting
Department office or any county agent located in the voting area.
