Crop outlook changed by long drought

By Shawn Wade

How far down can a crop go once it starts moving in the wrong direction? That's the question on everyone's mind as the month of August hosted an incredible turnaround for many High Plains cotton producers.

That question will start being answered, at least in part, by the Texas Agricultural Statistics Service (TASS) as that agency reviews and tabulates the results of crop surveys taken at the end of the August.

Almost everyone agrees that the September 1st crop estimate, which will be released September 12th, will reflect a change from a month ago. How much, however, is purely guesswork at this time.

Many in the industry were surprised by the August 1st estimate and the forecast of some 600,000 acres of Continued On Page 9

Bulldogs strike quick and defeat Whirlwinds 42 -

Tahoka's Jeff Elmore scored three touchdowns to lead the Bulldogs to a 42-7 opening night victory over Floydada at Wester Field last Friday. Elmore's first score was set up by a fumble on the Whirlwinds' first offensive play, when the loose ball was kicked down toward the Floydada end zone and recovered inside the 5 yard line. Most fans had barely gotten seated when the Tahoka senior carried the final few yards for the Bulldogs' initial touchdown of the 2000 football

Floydada coach Lee Hurt commented, "That early mistake cost us dearly...we are a young team and it's kind of hard to recover from something like that on the opening play." We made a lot of mistakes and mental errors, but were still really in the game until late in the third quarter. Then we really made some mistakes in the final period that they capitalized on while we were making adjustments and substitutions.~

The Whirlwinds will try to get back on a winning track when they host the winless Ralls Jackrabbits tomorrow night at Wester Field. Kickoff is set for 7:30 for the second non-district contest of the year. Even though Ralls lost its opener 31-0 to Lorenzo, according to Coach Hurt, the Whirlwinds have a lot of preparing to do. "They run a lot of offensive sets out of the shotgun (formation) and have some good skill people. We are going to have to work hard to prepare well for them."

Tahoka will hit the road tomorrow night as the Bulldogs tangle with Kress. The Kangaroos barely lost 13-0 to Whiteface in the opener for both clubs last week. Since this year's realignment, Tahoka is in a very tough District 4-2A, alony with perennial playoff power Post and other post-season contenders Idalou and New Deal.

Following Tahoka's score in the opening minute, the Floydada offense was unable to generate any kind of a drive and sophomore Tyler Helms was called upon to boot the first of five punts for the evening. Even though the Whirlwind offense sputtered for most of the first half, the defense managed to keep Floydada in the game as the Bulldogs led only 13-0 at intermis-

Elmore opened the fourth and final period with a 30-yard TD burst that virtually put the game out of reach. However, the 'Winds countered as Edward Porter broke into a clear on the ensuing kickoff for an impressive 79-yard return for Floydada's first score of 2000.

Sophomore Jacob Morales kicked the first extra point of his varsity career as the Whirlwinds closed the gap to 27-7, but another Floydada turnover led to another Bulldog score. Tahoka receiver Josh Thompson was on the receiving end of Ramon Rivera's 20yard aerial which closed out the scoring in the fourth period.

Bright spots in the game, in addition to Porter's electrifying touchdown scamper, included pass interceptions by juniors Brandon Marler and Scott Nixon.

"We were very disappointed in the outcome of the game," commented Coach Lee Hurt, "because we thought it was a game wo could win." The coach added. "But, we were not disappointed in the effort that our players gave. We just made far too many mistakes as a team to win the game. The team will work hard to correct those mistakes and we hope to be better this Friday when we play Ralls."

Bill's Notes: If the 'Winds are going to win one of their nondistrictgames to get a little momentum going, it should be this week against the Jackrabbits (who have not defeated Floydada in modern times if ever. As Coach Hurt has pointed out, this is a young outfit, with sophomores playing roles in key positions. Mistakes are going to be made by a young team. If they can work on some of the mistakes - and some bad mental errors in the early stages of the Tahoka opener, the young Whirlwinds will more than likely put it to the Rabbits...by about 11 points! 





Longhorns tame the Tigers 42-27

If you were a minute late to the game between the District 5-AA Lockney Longhorns and the District 3-AAA Slaton Tigers, you missed 13 points of scoring. The Tiger's Head Coach Greg Hernandez said before the game, "This one may come down to who has the ball last." It appeared that he might be right as the game began. Lockney fans seemed to be in shock as Edward Roberts of Slaton took the opening kickoff at Tiger Stadium eighty-five yards for the score.

The Longhorns came screaming back, however. After bringing the ensuing kickoff out to their thirty-nine yard line, Mo Collins scampered 61 yards for a score. Making the score seven to six with less than forty seconds having run off the game clock.

Slaton's second possession lasted only three plays. The Longhorns regained possession at the Tiger's 22 yard line. Four plays later Chase Graves scored on a fourteen yard run. The two point conversion, a pass to Tyler Bybee, was good and made the score 14 to 7 with 7:58 left in the first quarter.

Lockney forced the Tigers to punt on their next possession. Two plays later, Mo Collins ran 44 yards to cash in his second touchdown of the game with 5:30 left in the first quarter. Kelsey Hooten's point after was good, making the score 21 to 7.

It appeared that Lockney might force Slaton to punt again on their fourth possession. On a third down play, with fifteen yards to go, Pace Bixler hooked up with Bryan Singleton on a 34 yard pass play to give the Tigers new hope and a new set of downs. Six plays later Edward Roberts went in on a three yard run and brought the score to 21 - 14, Lockney with the lead.

It looked like the Longhorns would score again at the beginning of the second quarter when they marched the ball down to Slaton's seven yard line. A fumble ended the drive for Lock- final score, 42 - 27.

ney. After a good defensive series Lockney regained possession on downs at their own twenty-one yard line. The Longhorns ripped off two consecutive first down plays of fifteen and nineteen yards. After recovering their own fumble near midfield, the Longhorns scored again after two big runs by Mo Collins. That brought the score to 27 - 14 with 5:25 left in the

On Lockney's next offensive series, Mo Collins carried the first play 32 yards before fumbling the ball. Slaton took over on their forty eight. On third down Roberts ran fourteen yards to the Lockney thirty eight yard line. A holding penalty was assessed and moved the Tigers back to the Longhorn forty-two. Pace Bixler then threw a thirty-five yard pass to Tight End Taylor Davies. With 58 seconds left in the first half, Bixler took the ball in from the three yard line making the score 27 - 21.

Lockney Quarterback Chase Graves looked like he might score as he ran 36 yards to the Slaton 39 yard line. With no timeouts remaining, the Longhorns could not stop the clock to take advantage.

Mo Collins had a 25-yard run for a touchdown called back on a penalty with less than four minutes left in the third quarter. Two plays later, Chas Westbrook took a twenty-seven yard pass into the end zone. A two point conversion attempt was successful and made the score 35 - 21. In the fourth quarter, with just over

eight minutes left on the game clock, the stadium went dark. It took around twenty-five minutes to restore power to the stadium lights. It didn't take long for the lights to then go out for the Slaton Tigers. Mo Collins rumbled for 54 yards on the first play after the game delay. Then, on third down, Chase Graves threw a twentyone yard strike to Julian Guerrero making the score 42 - 21. The Tigers scored again late in the fourth quarter making the

Mo Collins ended the game with 329 yards of rushing. The Longhorn oftensive and defensive lines dominated the line of scrimmage allowing the Longhorns to generate 501 yards

The Longhorns will face off against Sundown at Mitchell Zimmerman Field Friday, September 8.



THE LITTLE WOMAN BENT IN for her. HALF-My family and I were living in Puebla, Mexico in the early 70's.

I was a Bible teacher in the Preacher's Institute nearby. Our boys, Dean and Tim, were enrolled in an English speaking missionary school.

This school only went through the 8th grade, so Patsy eventually became their teacher with American correspondence courses from the states.

The most devastating thing in our lives was when we had to leave the boys in the states to finish high school. They were five years apart in age, so we only had to leave one at a time.

However, each time it happened, it was like a death in the immediate family. Our hearts literally broke. We would weep as we would drive away heading back to Mexico without them.

Our print shop always kept the entire family working hard. We printed and distributed well over 500,000 pieces of literature each of the eleven years while in Mexico.

We had over 2,000 students studying the Bible by mail each month. This put a tremendous load on Patsy to grade and send back the next lesson each month. Dean and Tim made envelopes and put on the postage stamps

Many of the correspondence school students would write letters and ask for us to come to their village and start a church. I would try to look them up on one of my many preaching trips.

Mailing packages of literature and the many correspondence school booklets each day made the post office a very important part of our min-

It was here I would see almost daily a little old woman begging on the sidewalk in front of the post office. I have never in all my life seen such an unusual folding of the human body.

How she could eat, dress, and live is beyond my imagination. Her little frail body was completely bent in half at the waist. The bending forward sent the top part of her body back down to her feet like a paper clip bend.

Her face was at her feet only inches away. She could walk and turn her little head back up sideways to see where she was going and to beg.

I always tried to give her some money. Unlike many beggars, She truly was one in need of help.

MORAL OF THE STORY: "Count your many blessings because there are many in this world who can't.

Producers face losses to drought

Drought conditions that have plagued farmers and ranchers lion. throughout the year and continue across Texas have led to \$595 million in agricultural losses, economists with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service reported Wednesday.

Cotton, the No. 1 cash crop in Texas, has been hardest hit, with Extension economists estimating \$285 million in crop losses.

"As we look at the Southern Plains areas. from San Angelo, to Big Spring, Lamesa and on into the Snyder and Roscoe area, it's just simply burning up," said Dr. Carl Anderson, an Extension cotton marketing economist. "If it continues on for another 30 days, half of the dryland crop will be lost and you can add another 500,000 bales.'

Billy Warrick, an Extension agronomist based in San Angelo, "As you come south (of Interstate 20), that cotton would be lucky to make 150 pounds of lint per acre. An indication of lucky would be stretching it. A lot of cotton is six inches tall with one boll on top. That doesn't contribute much to yield to say the least. "

Anderson said much of the irrigated areas in West Texas have been hampered by both drought and insect prob-

"Yields are a little less because of insect pressure and the cost of insect control has been severe on many farmers," he said. "In many situations, farmers have been trying to save their crop from insects and drought has been taking away from it as well."

- Added irrigation costs: \$27 mil-

Meanwhile, drought has prevented much of the state's beef producers from building herds in anticipation of stronger prices. Dormant pastures continue to result in reduced body condition of livestock and are requiring supplemental feeding. Hauling water to livestock and herd reduction continued to expand especially in drier'

Dr. Ernie Davis, an Extension beef economist, said this could intensify considerably in the next few weeks if dry conditions continue.

Hay production since mid-year has come to a virtual standstill. Hay production lost to drought is projected at \$50 million. Rain is needed soon to replenish pastures and to achieve an additional cutting of hay prior to the first frost. If this does not occur, ranchers will be facing another costly feeding cycle through the fall and winter this year, according to Extension beef specialists.

Meanwhile, the Texas cotton crop was planted on 6.3 million acres this spring, with many expecting above average yields. Only the state's earliest cotton acres were able to escape the devastating summer drought. The lower Rio Grande Valley, the lower and upper coast region and the Central Texas Blacklands produced an average crop that totals close to 1 million bales

High temperatures of 100 degrees or more and a lack of rainfall have caused a substantial setback across 5 million acres of cotton planted in the Rolling Plains and Southern High Plains of West Texas. With less than 2 million acres irrigated, the 3 million acres of dryland cotton in the region have suffered significant losses, Extension economists report.

An estimated 1 million acres had already been lost by the beginning of August, according to the Texas Agricultural Statistics Service.

In the Rolling Plains, 1 million acres of cotton stretching south from the Red River to near Abilene are expected to be less than half the usual 300 pounds of lint per acre. Cotton losses in the Rolling Plains are expected to be at least 250,000 bales, valued at \$75 million.

The Southern High Plains region stretching from San Angelo to Big Spring, Lubbock into New Mexico also has been hit hard by high temperatures. A lack of sufficient rainfall last winter failed to build sub-soil moisture. Losses in the Southern High Plains are estimated at 700,000 bales, valued at \$210 million. These estifiber quality, such as a shorter staple length, due to moisture stress.

abandonment on the Texas High Plains. The main reason for their surprise was that the crop appeared to be in good shape and the area had experienced only isolated incidents of adverse, crop destroying weather.

Since that time, however, the TASS abandonment forecast is beginning to look a little less surprising and possibly even a little conservative.


Dryland acreage south of Lubbock has taken the greatest hit from a very dry July and August period. The dryland crop, which was for the most part planted on a series of rainfall events during the month of June, simply did not receive any moisture to carry it after the June rains were depleted.

Irrigated cotton has also taken it on the chin. In some areas, especially those where growers did not have the water necessary to keep the crop fully supplied during the past month, yield prospects may be less than anticipated.

How much change in yield will result from this situation, in addition to the probable yield impact of persisdisabilities for all meetings. We retent, although spotty, insect infesta-From an economic standpoint any

yield decrease in the irrigated crop will hurt since it does nothing to offset the significant costs associated with multiple treatments for beet armyworms, bollworms, boll weevils, and aphids. Many growers have faced some or all of these pests over the past-

New York prime rib is going the marketing and Web-based advertising. Organizers of the 46th annual Beef Cattle Short Course here hoped to help ranchers stay out of the digital divide and ahead of changes in livestock marketing systems.

"It's going to be very difficult to sell cattle that don't meet the demands of the consumer," said Dr. Larry Boleman, beef cattle specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and coordinator for the event. "It may come down to whether they can sell that calf at all, not will I take a lower price for it."

The three-day Beef Cattle Short Course drew about 1,200 producers and cattle experts from across the state to the Texas A&M University campus.

"Ranchers are now able to market the value of their calves," Boleman said. "The producer can actually be rewarded for raising the product consumers want. We're marketing way beyond our front gate. Now, we're beginning to think about selling that steak in New York City."

According to Dr. Ernie Davis, Extension economist and one of the
