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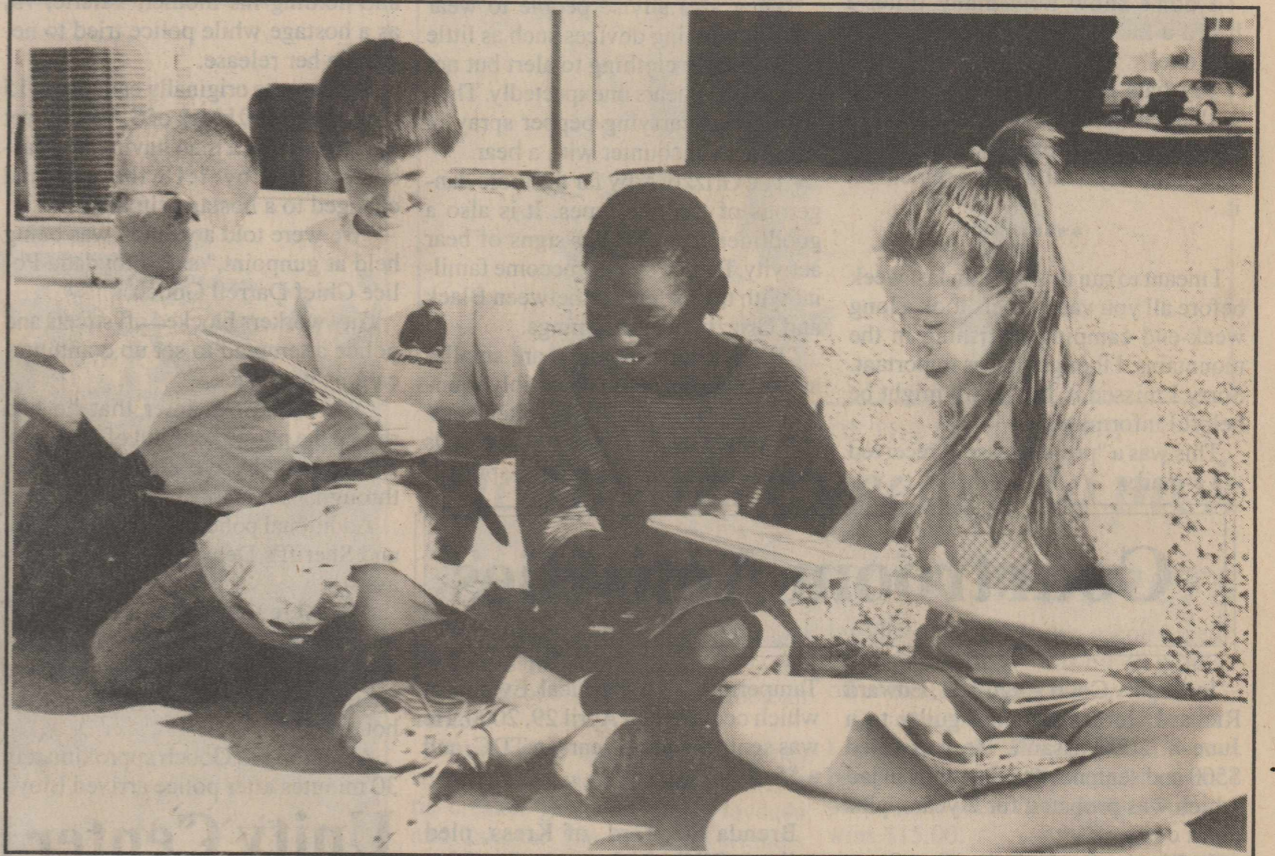

Youth move books through assembly line



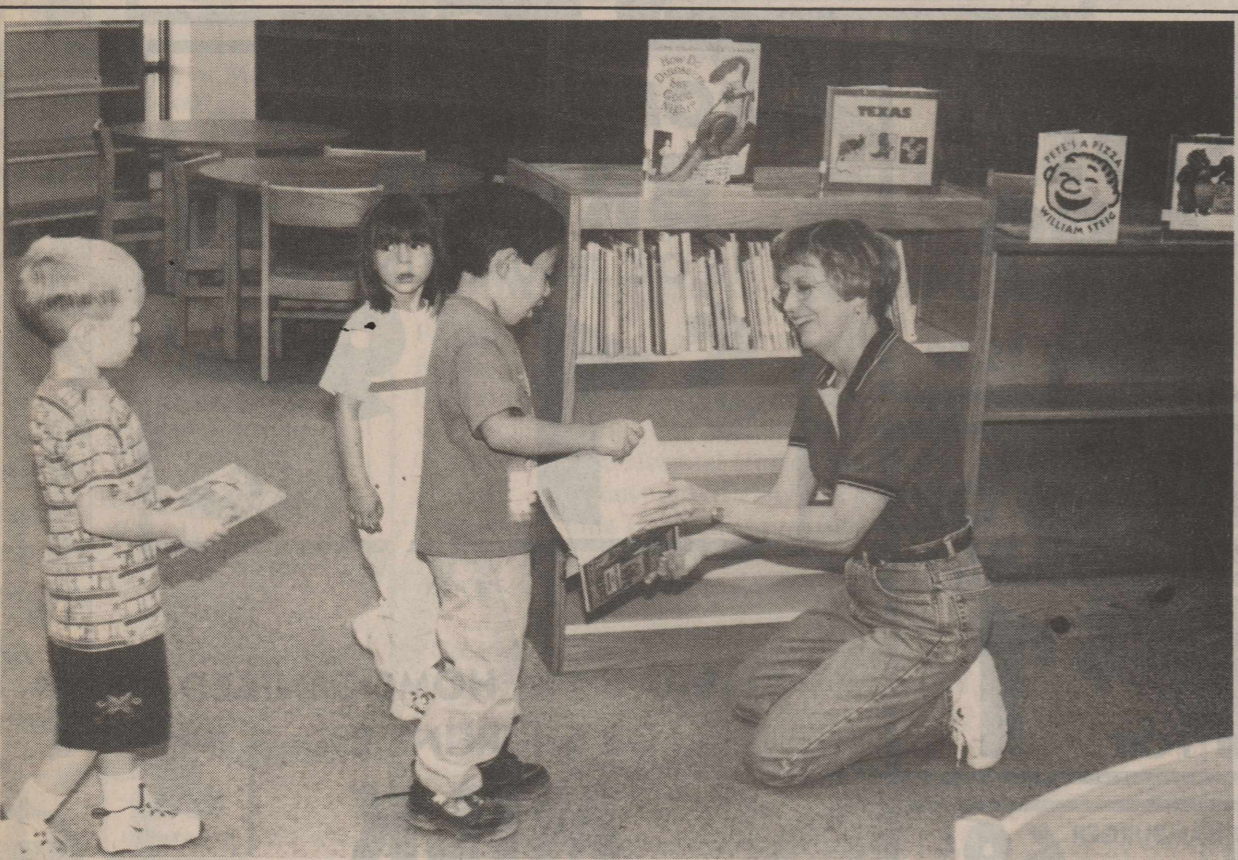

Over 500 Floydada elementary school children participated in a "hands on" project of moving books from the old Floyd County Library, in the courthouse, to the new library on Wall Street.

A human assembly line, consisting of 309 students from Duncan Elementary, and 261 students from Andrews, was formed, Friday, September 1, from inside the old library, down the steps, through the halls of the courthouse, out the door, through the back alley behind the Sheriff's Office, across Wall Street and into the hands of Head Librarian Sandra Crawford

inside the new library.

The length of space from the old to the new library was not long enough for a straight line of 570 students, so teachers had to "snake" the line near the new library building.

After finding their spot the youth sat on the ground and handed the books from one to the other all the way to Head Librarian Sandra Crawford.

As the books dwindled down the youngster at the end of the line was allowed to jump up and carry a book inside to Crawford, and then walk over to refreshments under the Court-

house Pavilion. In this way each child was allowed a trip into the library with a book in their hand.

Books have also been moved through the week by youth from the Parent Adolescent Center and trustees from the Wheeler Unit in Plainview.

The books in the youth section of the library were saved for the Floydada youngsters.

The Friends of the Floyd County Library will be hosting the dedication of the new library on Sunday, September 17, at 2:00 p.m. The public is invited.

Crop outlook changed by long drought

How far down can a crop go once it starts moving in the wrong direction? That's the question on everyone's mind as the month of August hosted an incredible turnaround for many High Plains cotton producers.

That question will start being answered, at least in part, by the Texas Agricultural Statistics Service (TASS) as that agency reviews and tabulates the results of crop surveys taken at the end of the August.

Almost everyone agrees that the September 1st crop estimate, which will be released September 12th, will reflect a change from a month ago. How much, however, is purely guesswork at this time.

Many in the industry were surprised by the August 1st estimate and the forecast of some 600,000 acres of

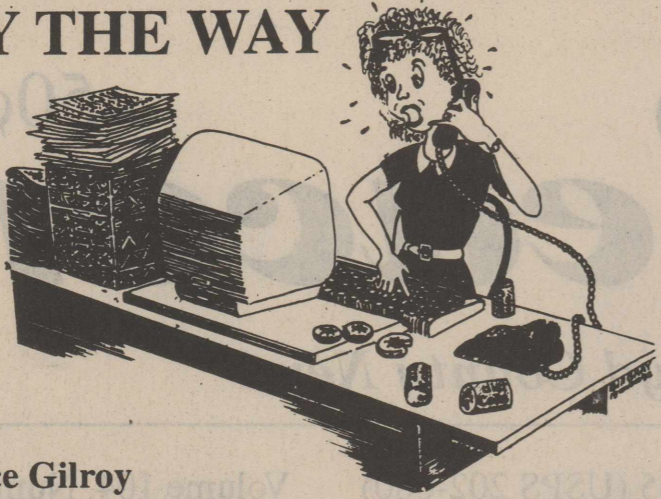
Class reunions and meetings are scheduled at homes, churches, and restaurants from 3:00 - 6:00 p.m. A schedule of meetings can be found in this edition.

It was fun to watch them stop to read the titles and even stop to take a peak inside.

I don't know how many times I heard a kid say, "Oh, I want to read this one!"

My hats off to whoever came up with the idea of including them in this way. They were part of making history and they will always remember it.

I meant to run this column last week before all you vacationers took a long week-end camping or fishing in the mountains. I thought it was important. Sorry I missed it, but it still might be helpful information.

This was a "press release" I received via e-mail.

"The Colorado State Department of Fish and Wildlife is advising hikers, hunters, and fishermen, to take extra precautions and be on the alert for both Grizzly and Black bears while in the Dillon, Breckenridge, and Keystone areas.

"They also advise people to wear noise producing devices such as little bells on their clothing to alert but not to startle the bears unexpectedly. They also advise carrying pepper spray in case of an encounter with a bear.

"The Grizzly is by far the more dangerous of the two types. It is also a good idea to watch for signs of bear activity. People should become familiar with the difference between Black and Grizzly bear droppings.

"Black bear droppings are smaller and contain berries and possibly squirrel fur, and may smell like rotten eggs.

"Grizzly bear droppings have bells in them and smell like pepper spray..."

Oh dear. Our Governor, now a candidate for the Presidency, has simply got to watch his grammar. Sometimes, in public comment, he garbles his speech, and sometimes, in private comments, he speaks too plainly.

The media is currently aghast over an unguarded comment by George W. Bush to his running mate Dick Cheney that got picked up by an open microphone and broadcast to a crowd gathered for a campaign rally. The Wash-

ington Post reports that Mr. Bush spied Adam Clymer, of the New York Times, in the crowd and muttered an aside to Cheney that went, "There's Adam Clymer- major league (bleep) from the New York Times."

To which Cheney responded, "Oh, yeah, he is, big time." I can't really determine whether Cheney was agreeing with the (bleep) comment, or merely acknowledging the presence of the NY Times reporter.

Bush later said he was sorry that his comments were heard by others. He did not say he was sorry he said what he said. Nor should he have, in our view. The NY Times is noted for its masthead brag that it prints "all the news that is fit to print." That news, or course, must fit the Times version of what is politically correct. Favorable comment, or favorable news stories about anybody or anything to the right of Fidel Castro, is unlikely to appear in the pages of the NY Times.

Still, the NY Times is something of a bellwether for a multitude of reporters for other journals. Any position taken by the Times is likely to show up in the reporting of any number of "journalists" for other papers, not to mention the t.v. networks. Mr. Clymer is author of several critical pieces about Mr. Bush. We can understand, and sympathize with, Mr. Bush's frustration in this instance. In fact, we won't even quarrel with his description.

The Governor may as well get used to it, however. When Mr. Gore selected Joseph Lieberman as his running mate, the die was cast for the NY Times and much of the media. A press that had been generally neutral, as far as Bush was concerned, became decidedly pro-Gore, almost overnight. The same people who had criticized Bush for (in answer to a question) giving Jesus Christ credit for turning his life around, had nothing but plaudits for Lieberman's frequent referrals to his own religion. In the world of presidential politics, a great deal depends on whose ox is gored.

On another subject: In Austin, Texas, the temperature hit 110 degrees on Monday, September 4, 2000. That was the highest temperature ever recorded in your state's capitol. In 1923, the year I was born, the temperature climbed to 109 at Camp Mabry, in Austin.

Floydada Police Report

A 52 year old man, Lloyd Vick, was arrested Friday, August 29th, after assaulting his father, Harley Vick, 80, and holding his mother, Valerie, 75, as a hostage while police tried to negotiate her release.

Police were originally called at 1:15 p.m., to the 600 block of S. Wall Street in reference to a man having been assaulted and by 1:18 the call had changed to a hostage situation.

"We were told a woman was being held at gunpoint," said Floydada Police Chief Darrell Gooch.

City workers blocked off streets and police attempted to set up communications with Vick.

"We found out later that he had ripped the phone lines out of the walls, and that's why we could never get through," said Gooch.

Additional police officers, and DPS, and Sheriff's Deputies were called to assist.

"We were told shots were fired off in the house," said Gooch. "Lloyd assaulted his father by kicking him and beating him. The father got out of the house."

According to Gooch approximately 30 minutes after police arrived Lloyd

walked out on his own and surrendered to police. Vick, who has a history of mental illness, was arrested and taken to Central Plains MHMR.

Harley Vick was treated by EMS at the scene and released. Valerie Vick was not injured.

A 30.06 rifle with scope, two shot-guns, 2 .22 calibre rifles, and a .22 calibre handgun were recovered from the home.

In other police activity:

August 9, police stopped a vehicle, operated by Eunice Johnson, 37. She was arrested for outstanding Floyd County warrants and for driving while license suspended.

August 13, police were called to the 300 block of W. Crockett in reference to a domestic disturbance. Julian Santiago, 25, of Floydada, was subsequently arrested and charged with domestic violence/assault.

August 21, police were called to the 400 block of S. White in reference to an aggravated robbery.

The 87 year old female victim told police that a man she knew as Ronnie Cantrell came to her home to borrow some money. When she refused he grabbed her purse and took out some

money. The victim attempted to stop him and was assaulted.

Police arrested the 23 year old Cantrell. He was charged with Aggravated Robbery.

August 22nd, police stopped a tractor semi-trailer operated by Donald Shubert, 42, of Quitman, and charged him with Driving While License Suspended.

August 29, police stopped a vehicle driven by Oscar Herrera, 28, of Floydada. He was arrested for outstanding fines owed to municipal court.

In District Court, September 5: Probation was revoked for Joe Mac Jarrett, 24, of Floydada. He had been on probation since Oct. 1994 for Burglary of a Vehicle. He was sentenced, Tuesday, to TDC for 3 years.

Juan Sanchez, 49, of Floydada, pled guilty to Delivery of a Marijuana, which occurred on Dec. 16, 1999 and

Tampering With Physical Evidence, which occurred on April 29, 2000. He was sentenced to 8 years in TDC, and a \$5,000 fine.

Brenda Stopford, of Kress, pled guilty to DWI which occurred on May 29, 2000. She was sentenced to 6 years in TDC which was probated for 6 years. She must pay a \$1,000 fine, have her driver's license suspended for 1 year, have a deep lung breath analysis on vehicle, participate in re-offenders program. She also spent 30 days in jail.

Entries must be postmarked by October 6, 2000.

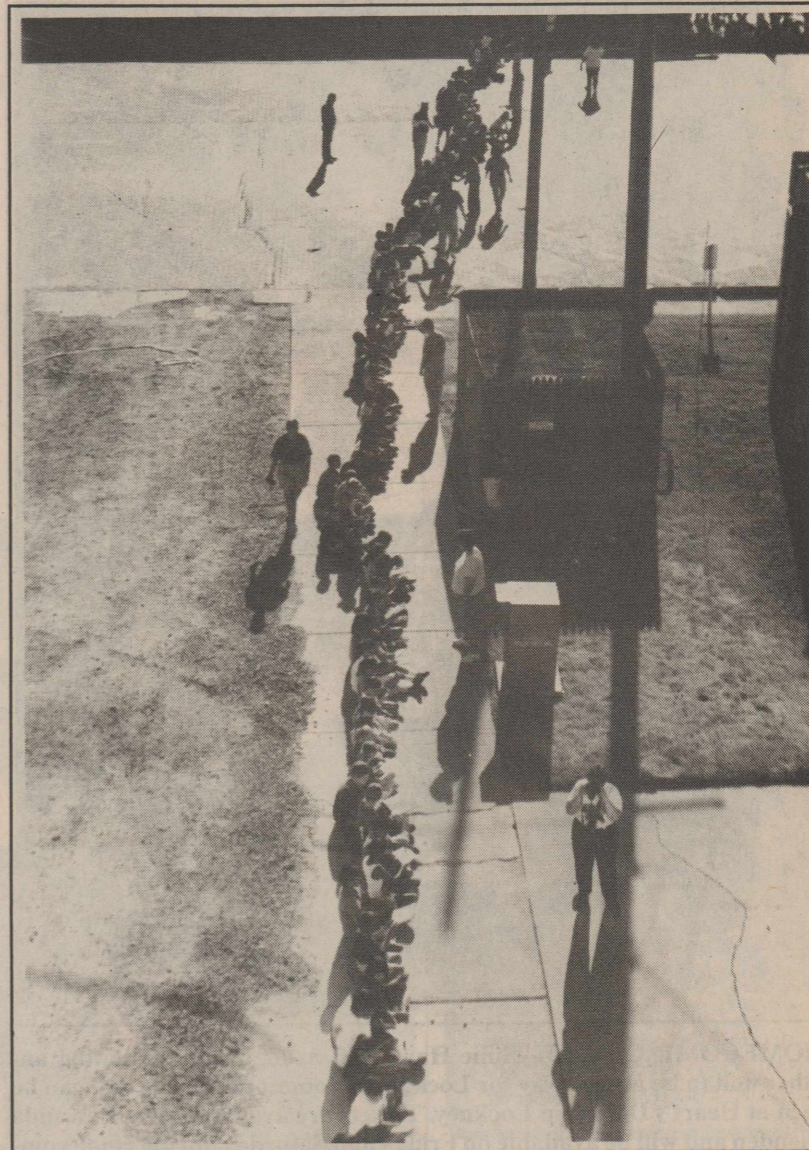

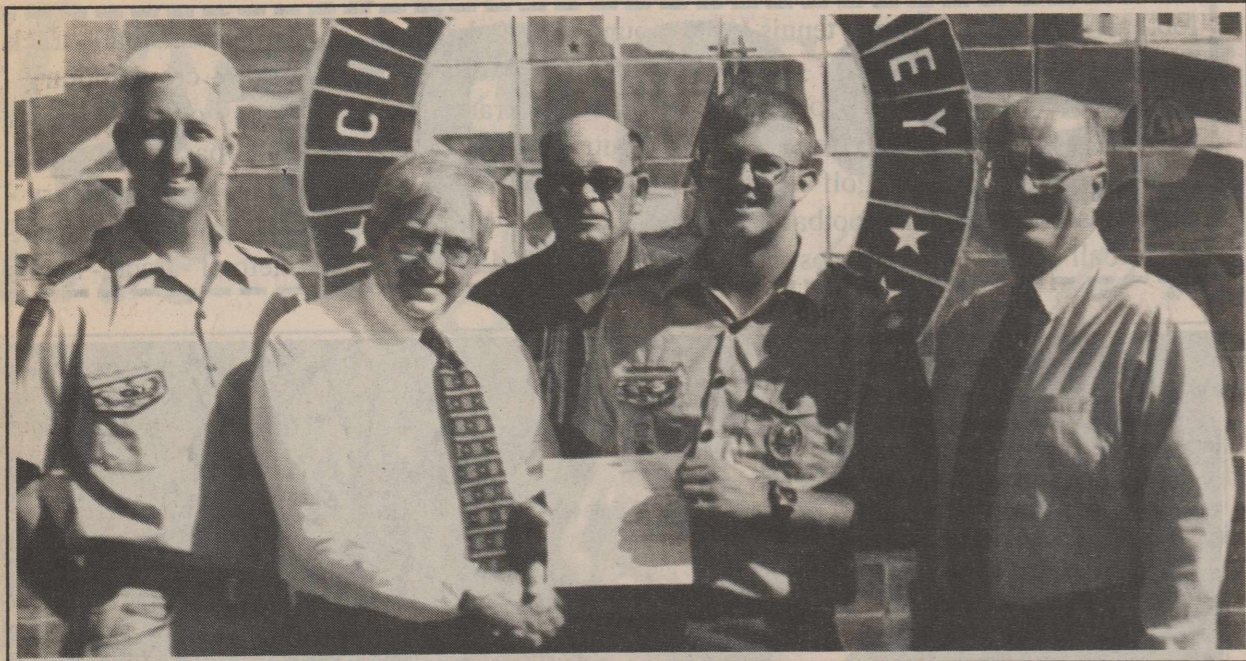

Bulldogs strike quick and defeat Whirlwinds 42 - 7

Tahoka's Jeff Elmore scored three touchdowns to lead the Bulldogs to a 42-7 opening night victory over Floydada at Wester Field last Friday. Elmore's first score was set up by a fumble on the Whirlwinds' first offensive play, when the loose ball was kicked down toward the Floydada end zone and recovered inside the 5 yard line. Most fans had barely gotten seated when the Tahoka senior carried the final few yards for the Bulldogs' initial touchdown of the 2000 football season.

Floydada coach Lee Hurt commented, "That early mistake cost us dearly...we are a young team and it's kind of hard to recover from something like that on the opening play." We made a lot of mistakes and mental errors, but were still really in the game until late in the third quarter. Then we really made some mistakes in the final period that they capitalized on while we were making adjustments and substitutions.

The Whirlwinds will try to get back on a winning track when they host the winless Ralls Jackrabbits tomorrow night at Wester Field. Kickoff is set for 7:30 for the second non-district contest of the year. Even though Ralls lost its opener 31-0 to Lorenzo, according to Coach Hurt, the Whirlwinds have a lot of preparing to do. "They run a lot of offensive sets out of the shotgun (formation) and have some good skill people. We are going to have to work hard to prepare well for them."

Tahoka will hit the road tomorrow night as the Bulldogs tangle with Kress. The Kangaroos barely lost 13-0 to Whiteface in the opener for both clubs last week. Since this year's realignment, Tahoka is in a very tough District 4-2A, along with perennial playoff power Post and other post-season contenders Idalou and New Deal.

Following Tahoka's score in the opening minute, the Floydada offense was unable to generate any kind of a drive and sophomore Tyler Helms was called upon to boot the first of five punts for the evening. Even though the Whirlwind offense sputtered for most of the first half, the defense managed to keep Floydada in the game as the

Bulldogs led only 13-0 at intermission.

Elmore opened the fourth and final period with a 30-yard TD burst that virtually put the game out of reach. However, the 'Winds countered as Edward Porter broke into a clear on the ensuing kickoff for an impressive 79-yard return for Floydada's first score of 2000.

Sophomore Jacob Morales kicked the first extra point of his varsity career as the Whirlwinds closed the gap to 27-7, but another Floydada turnover led to another Bulldog score. Tahoka receiver Josh Thompson was on the receiving end of Ramon Rivera's 20-yard aerial which closed out the scoring in the fourth period.

Bright spots in the game, in addition to Porter's electrifying touchdown scamper, included pass interceptions by juniors Brandon Marler and Scott Nixon.

"We were very disappointed in the outcome of the game," commented Coach Lee Hurt, "because we thought it was a game we could win." The coach added, "But, we were not disappointed in the effort that our players gave. We just made far too many mistakes as a team to win the game. The team will work hard to correct those mistakes and we hope to be better this Friday when we play Ralls."

Bill's Notes: If the 'Winds are going to win one of their non-district games to get a little momentum going, it should be this week against the Jackrabbits (who have not defeated Floydada in modern times - if ever. As Coach Hurt has pointed out, this is a young outfit, with sophomores playing roles in key positions. Mistakes are going to be made by a young team. If they can work on some of the mistakes - and some bad mental errors in the early stages of the Tahoka opener, the young Whirlwinds will more than likely put it to the Rabbits...by about 11 points! 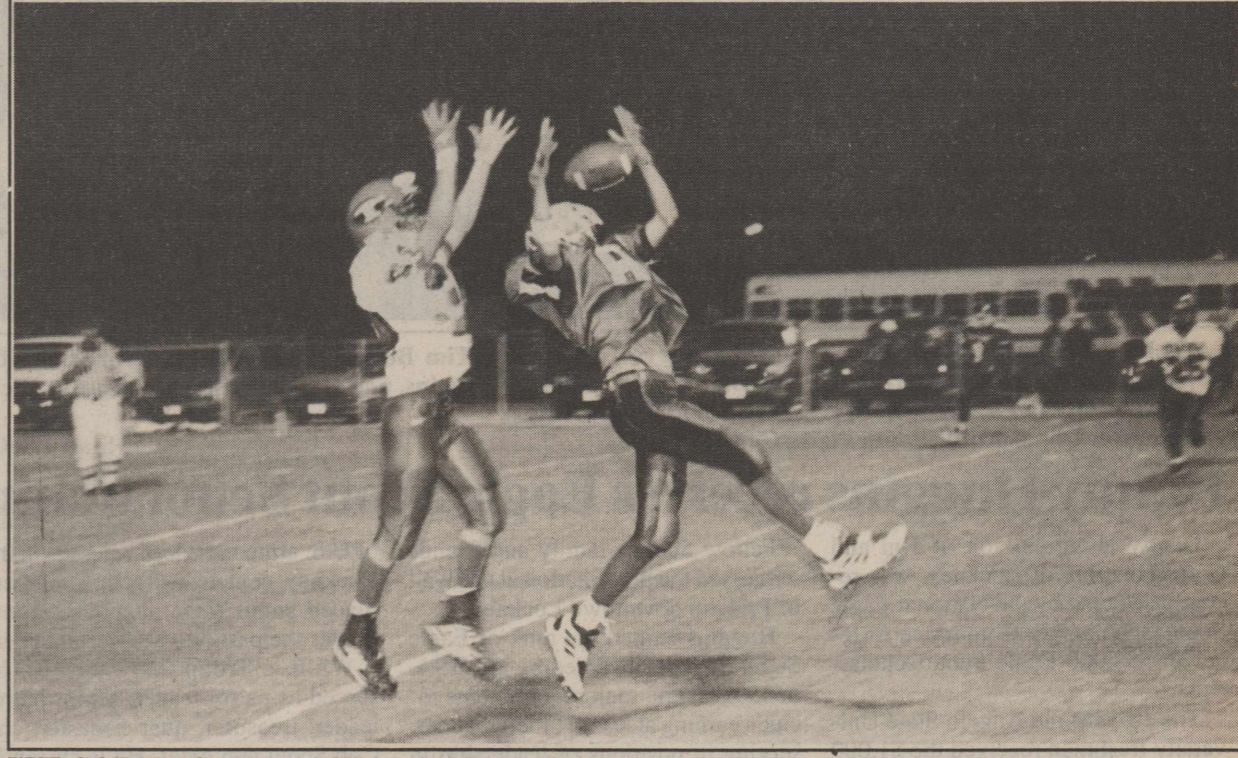

Lockney forced the Tigers to punt on their next possession. Two plays later, Mo Collins ran 44 yards to cash in his second touchdown of the game with 5:30 left in the first quarter. Kelsey Hooten's point after was good, making the score 21 to 7.

It appeared that Lockney might force Slaton to punt again on their fourth possession. On a third down play, with fifteen yards to go, Pace Bixler hooked up with Bryan Singleton on a 34 yard pass play to give the Tigers new hope and a new set of downs. Six plays later Edward Roberts went in on a three yard run and brought the score to 21 - 14, Lockney with the lead.

It looked like the Longhorns would score again at the beginning of the second quarter when they marched the ball down to Slaton's seven yard line. A fumble ended the drive for Lock-

ney. After a good defensive series Lockney regained possession on downs at their own twenty-one yard line. The Longhorns ripped off two consecutive first down plays of fifteen and nineteen yards. After recovering their own fumble near midfield, the Longhorns scored again after two big runs by Mo Collins. That brought the score to 27 - 14 with 5:25 left in the first half.

On Lockney's next offensive series, Mo Collins carried the first play 32 yards before fumbling the ball. Slaton took over on their forty eight. On third down Roberts ran fourteen yards to the Lockney thirty eight yard line. A holding penalty was assessed and moved the Tigers back to the Longhorn forty-two. Pace Bixler then threw a thirty-five yard pass to Tight End Taylor Davies. With 58 seconds left in the first half, Bixler took the ball in from the three yard line making the score 27 - 21.

Lockney Quarterback Chase Graves looked like he might score as he ran 36 yards to the Slaton 39 yard line. With no timeouts remaining, the Longhorns could not stop the clock to take advantage.

Mo Collins had a 25-yard run for a touchdown called back on a penalty with less than four minutes left in the third quarter. Two plays later, Chas Westbrook took a twenty-seven yard pass into the end zone. A two point conversion attempt was successful and made the score 35 - 21.

In the fourth quarter, with just over eight minutes left on the game clock, the stadium went dark. It took around twenty-five minutes to restore power to the stadium lights. It didn't take long for the lights to then go out for the Slaton Tigers. Mo Collins rumbled for 54 yards on the first play after the game delay. Then, on third down, Chase Graves threw a twentyone yard strike to Julian Guerrero making the score 42 - 21. The Tigers scored again late in the fourth quarter making the final score, 42 - 27.

Mo Collins ended the game with 329 yards of rushing. The Longhorn offensive and defensive lines dominated the line of scrimmage allowing the Longhorns to generate 501 yards of offense.

The Longhorns will face off against Sundown at Mitchell Zimmerman Field Friday, September 8.

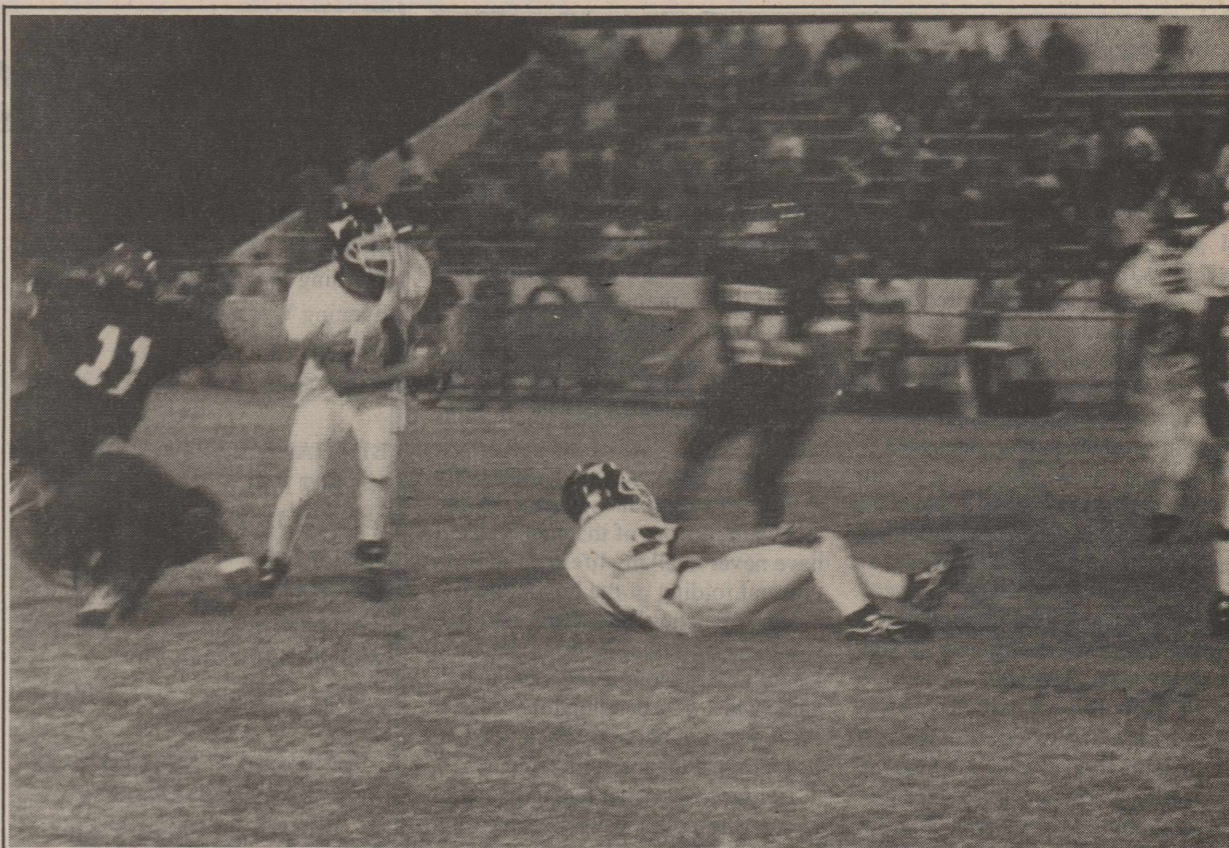

Elimination of the annual earnings test a victory for SS

The day after President Clinton signed a law eliminating the annual earnings test, letters were in the mail to 400,000 working beneficiaries who were due retroactive benefits as far back as January 1, 2000, the date the law became effective. They received their payments within three weeks—a total of \$1.4 billion!

And a few weeks after the law was signed, Social Security sent another nine million beneficiaries not now working a letter telling them they can now receive full Social Security benefits no matter how much they earn. Previously, Social Security benefits

for beneficiaries age 65-70 were reduced \$1 for every \$3 they earned over an annual limit (\$17,000 in 2000).

In addition to sending letters, Social Security conducted a full-scale public information campaign to spread the news throughout the country to make sure workers and their families are aware of the new law and its importance to older workers and their employers.

And the work goes on. Social Security is now alerting workers as they reach full retirement age that they can work and receive benefits without reduction because of their earnings amount.
