Water main break dumps a million gallons An 8 -inch water main break in the million gallons of water onto city streets last Wednesday. At approximately 6 a.m. on Wednesday, October 11, the City of
Floydada water department received Floydada water department received the 200 block of West Mississippi Street. The first water department employee who arrived at the scene determined this was a large leak and that additional personnel were needed.
According to City Manager Gary Brown, city employees worked throughout the morning to get clamps on the line as a temporary fix until a new cut-off valve could be installed. While installing the clamps the em-
ployees were occasionally in water pover their heads.
"After the new cut-off valve was in place the water was shut of and an 8foot section of pipe was cut out and replaced," said Brown. "The few resi-
dents who were without water were able to have water running through their faucets by approximately $8: 30$
According to Brown the city pumped approximately $1,200,000$ galon Tuesday. the city water tower was almost emptied from the water main break. "The dry conditions causes the soil to move and the pipes to break," said
Brown.

part of the FY2001 Defense Authoripart of the FY2001 Defense Authori-
zation Act, which passed the House by a vote of 382 to 3 1.
U.S. Rep. Mac Tho 13.S. Rep. Mac Thornberry (TXhelped write the legislation and
pushed for the funding to be included, pushed the the funding to be included,
said that it will help ease some problems currently facing local fire departments. "Firefighters put their lives on
the line to save others," Thornberry the ine to save others," Thornberry
said. "And many fire departments are doing this with a limited number of firefighters and a lack of modern equipment. Some fire departments are using out-of-date
need upgrading. need upgrading.
"Yesterday's passage is unprec
edented and marks the first time tha edented and marks the first time that
significant federal funding has been provided to local fire departments and emergency medical service personnel.
The funding would do a number of things for local fire dopartments. A grant program would be set up to help
fire departments attract and train quality volunteers. Additionally, it would to get extra equip fire departments them. "In short, it's a bill that will hopefully help make a tough job somewhat
easier, which is why I voted for why I'm glad it wy voted for it and According to Thornberry, the measure would provide for the following

*Training personnel in firefighting, emergency response, arson prevention
and detection, and handling hazardous materials.

* Creating rapid intervention teams and other emergencies.

In addition, grants of up to $\$ 750,000$ per firefighting organization would be awarded in each fiscal years. The

## Thornberry supports Ag funding bill

The House of Representatives yes-
terday gave final approval to the FY2001 Agriculture Appropriations Act. Among other things, the bill provides an additional $\$ 3.5$ billion in di-
saster assidtance to asriculture producsaster assistance to agriculture produc-
ers. The bill passed the House by vote of 340 to 75
U.S. Rep. Mac Thornberry (TX 13), who supported the bill, said that the approved funding would deal with a variety of things affecting the agri-
culture industry. "There are a number of steps that must be taken to improve the situation for our area's producers," Thornberry said. History of local boll weevil eradication

With the good news With the good news that over 75\%
of the voters in the NHP zone, representing nearly $61 \%$ of the acreage, want to rid themselves of the cotton boll weevil, maybe it's an appropri-
ate moment for philosophizing on how we got to this point and what it means from here on out. We got to this point after a small group successfully challenged the constitutionality of the Texas Bol District Judge's decision in 1996, upheld on appeal to the Texas Supreme court in 1997, led to a rewrite of the Texas Statutes relating to Boll Wee vil and Pink Bollworm eradication. ward boll weevil control and eradication has had to come from a grass roots, producer directed initititive. For the High Plains of Texas this happened first in late 1999 when the growers in the Western High Plains Zone decided
to separate from the larger Southern High Plains Zone.
Next, producers in what was to become the Permian Basin zone petitioned to break away. Then, cotton farmers across the five western mos determined to partition themselves into a new zone that became th Northwest Plains Zone.
Each of these changes saw its birth from concern of growers plagued by
the bolt weevil who realized they had the boll weevil worealized they ha to stand together to difeat he insect.
Boll weevil Eradication got under way in each of these new, producer initiated zones in the fall of 1999 . The impact of eradication can be clearly seen in lowered trap catches and re-
lief of area growers from high spray lief of and lint loss to the pest.


As boll weevil numbers built in Ariscoe, Floyd, Hale and Swishe counties during 1999, concerned cot lon producers called for each of the tives's from their customers to antent discussion meeting to seek a solution to the growing insect problem. These
