Family possessions lost in fire

A Floyd County family lost all of their possessions in a house fire, Tuesday night, 8 miles S.W. of Lockney.

The home of Bobby and Lawasia Gipson burned to the ground. Their son, Skylar, a Lockney 6th grader, is being given the credit for his quick thinking that saved him and his 9 year old sister, Kenzie.

Lockney Fire Department received

the report of the fire at approximately 5:00 p.m. The cause of the blaze is unknown at this time, but one possibility is a gas leak.

According to Bobby Gipson's father, Bob, Skylar and Kenzie were home alone at the time. "Skylar was in the bathroom and heard the gas furnace kick on and then an explosion," said Bob. "He stepped out into the hall

and saw his little sister sitting down with her fingers in her ear because she hates loud noises. He looked into the living room and it was already engulfed in flames. The living room was the only way out, so he took his sister into a bedroom, shut the door, broke out the window and crawled outside."

The only possessions left to the family are the clothes they were wear-

ing at the time of the fire.

At press time the sizes of the family members was not known, however the First Baptist Church in Lockney is serving as a drop off point for people wishing to donate items to the family.

According to Phillip Golden, pastor of Lockney's FBC, "Just call the church for information. We should know the clothes sizes soon."

Lockney High School publishing school newspaper

I suppose it's about time to begin thinking about who we are going to choose as our next President, George W. Bush, or Al Gore, or Ralph Nader, or Pat Buchanan, or whoever.

Personally, I hope the rest of our electorate can go to the polls with a lot more enthusiasm than we. We are perfectly comfortable recommending a vote for Mac Thornberry. He has not only served this District well, he has steadily risen in stature and influence in the House of Representatives. We

need to keep him there, and count our lucky stars.

We are also comfortable recommending that Senator Kay Bailey Hutcherson receive support from Hesperian readers. There have probably been times we did not agree with her vote, but they must have been few and far between. By and large she has done a good job.

The Presidential thing is another kettle of fish. Oh, we'll vote for Bush. The alternative is, for all practical

purposes, Al Gore.

Quite frankly, we have not been impressed with Bush's campaign strategy. We have not been pleased with his campaign's constant referral to "building a new party" or by the "compassionate conservative" bit.

There would not even be a party for him to pose as the leader of, had it not been for the tireless efforts of people like the late Albert Scheele, longtime Chairman of the Republican Party in Floyd County during a period when it

was not all that popular to be identified as such. It was the efforts of people like Scheele who made it possible for people like George W. Bush to achieve success in politics. We understand politics, and we understand campaign themes. We just don't think Albert would appreciate the implication that the party he devoted his life to would somehow need to be repackaged into a "compassionate" image. Albert was about as compassionate as they get in politics, and about the most

conservative.

Still, the choice facing voters will be between Bush and Gore, and, to our way of thinking, that choice is pretty clear. On all the issues where we differ with Bush, that is, things like affirmative action, or immigration, we differ even more with Al Gore. Gore is simply a Big Government liberal, despite all his protestations otherwise. He is a "command and control" liberal in the manner of his father, whom I knew in Washington many years ago. The elder Gore was known among Senate staffers, of whom I was one, as "Gore the bore", simply because of his tendency to lecture his fellow Senators at great length, waving his arms while droning on and on. Despite all his ranting about the "little man", he was known as one who was in the pocket of Armand Hammer, a friend of the Soviet Union, and one of the wealthiest men in America. He was also known as a liberal hypocrite, taking one position in the Senate and another back home in Tennessee. The younger Gore seems to have inherited something from his father in that regard.

No doubt, Gore is a good kisser. We saw that on t.v. And no doubt he is a good family man, politically speaking. He is not known to have paramours hither and yon, like Clinton. But, like Clinton, he is loose with the truth. We would never know when to trust his explicit statements. If he became President, for instance, we would have to accept, as gospel truth, any comment that came down the pike from the Oval Office. Like his claims on any variety of developments, from the

Internet to Love Canal. We really don't need to put up with that sort of stuff for the next four years in the Presidency of the United States.

Regarding our Mr. Bush: He has been a pretty good Governor. Not the best, but a good Governor. He has not been partisan enough to suit many in his party, but he has managed to gain support for his proposals from Democrats across the aisle in the Texas Legislature. That is no small feat. True, he has not suited Rep. Glenn Maxey (D-Austin) and other members of the Texas Gay and Lesbian Caucus, nor has he suited the National Education Association, or the AFL-CIO leadership, but he has suited most Texans. In this (the 13th Congressional District) only Rep. Mac Thornberry has met with more voter approval.

So we will vote for George W. Bush for President. We will not hold our nose while voting for him, nor will we hold our breath, expecting miracles. But we will vote for him. We will vote for him happy in the knowledge that the Presidency is an important position, and that the world is a dangerous place. We only wish he agreed with us on more issues. We hope time will convince him he should be more responsive to the wishes of Texans on issues like affirmative action and immigration. We do not ask others to agree with us on this, but that is our opinion.

We hope our readers will go vote for Bush or Gore or Buchanan or Nader, and everybody else stay home. Of those seeking to be President, we will vote for Bush.

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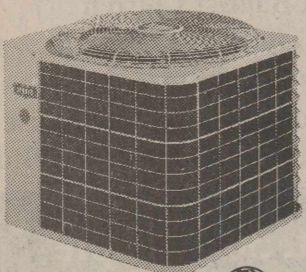
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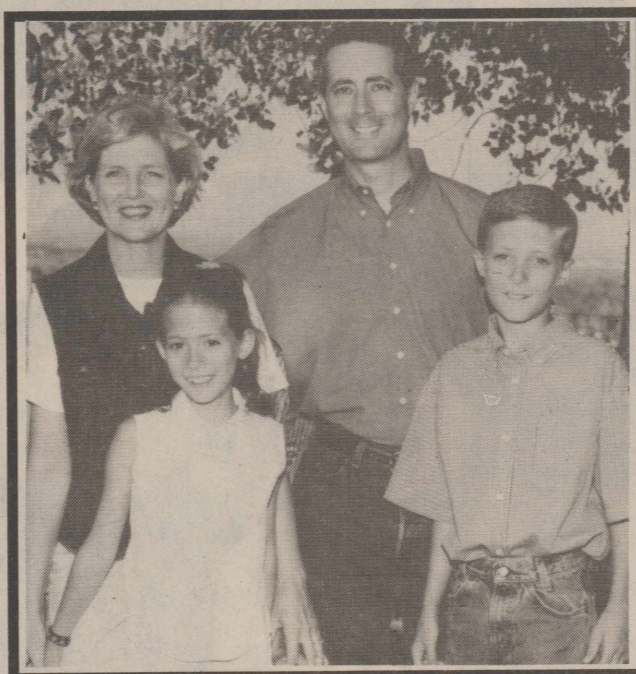


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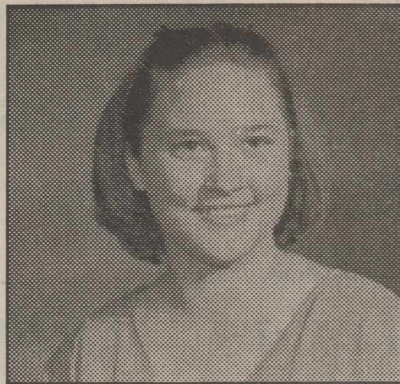
Local students named to Junior Bank Board

Twelve students from Floydada, Lockney, Silverton, and Olton have been named to the 2000-2001 City Bank Junior Board of Directors.

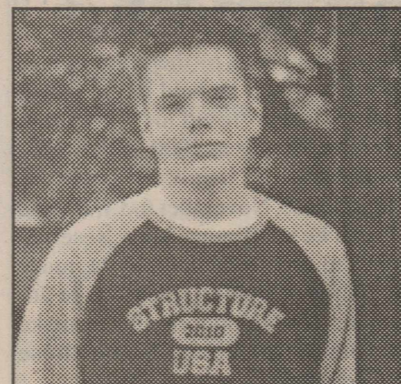

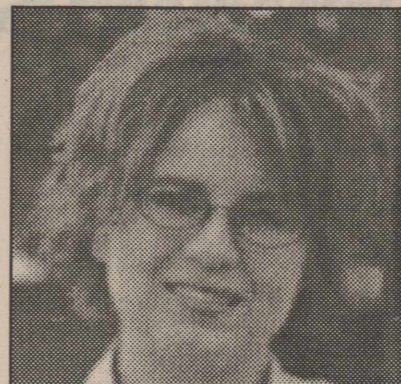

She has been named to Who's Who, and invited to National Forum on Law and Medicine.

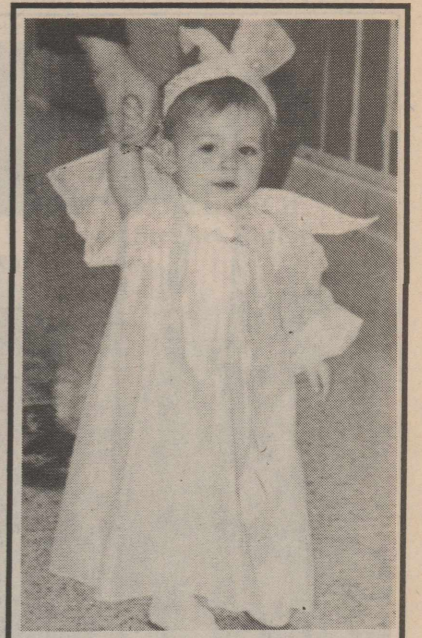
She has been part of the JV Basketball team, and varsity tennis.

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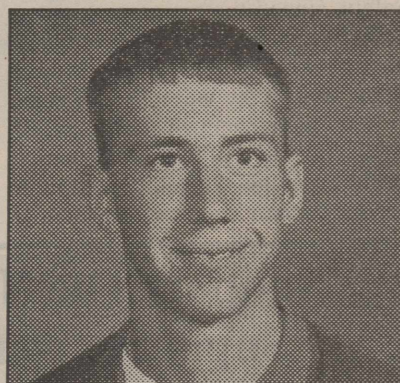

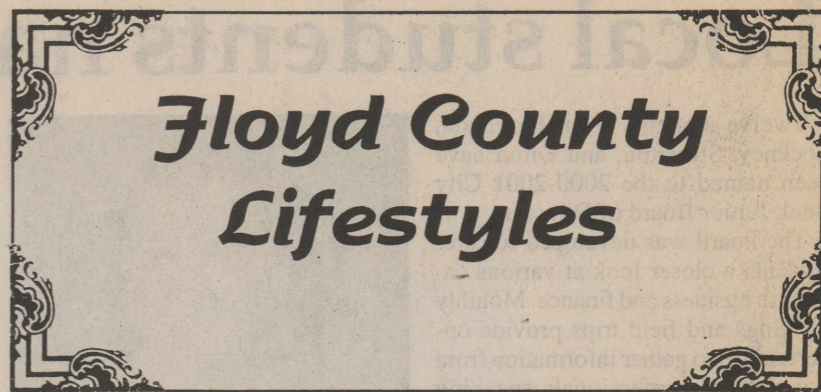
Library to unveil computer equipment

Texas and Kentucky share handgun agreement

Texas has signed a reciprocal agreement with Kentucky, allowing citizens with concealed handgun licenses issued by Kentucky to legally carry concealed handguns in Texas, and vice versa.

Col. Thomas A. Davis Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, signed the reciprocity agreement with the State of Kentucky through which its licenses can visit Texas with their concealed handguns.

"This agreement will allow licensed Texans to travel freely in Kentucky, while enjoying the same or similar privileges their licenses give them at

home," Davis said.

This reciprocity agreement--the seventh Texas has reached with another state--was made possible by 1997 changes to the state's concealed handgun law. Texas also has reciprocity agreements with Arkansas, Louisiana, Arizona, Florida, Tennessee and Oklahoma.

"Texans should remember that weapons laws vary from state to state, and before traveling, license holders should educate themselves about laws in other states that govern where and when they can legally carry their concealed handguns," Davis said.

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Lockney locks playoff berth with win 35-19

The Lockney Longhorns had the opportunity to secure a playoff spot Friday night. They were hoping to have a big win over a young Olton team with some good talent. They knew that a win would guarantee that they would finish no worse than third in the district.

Lockney won the opening coin toss and chose to defer to the second half. After the touchback, on the opening kickoff, Olton started at their 20-yard line. Jimmie Molina carried the ball for a four-yard gain before fumbling it. The Longhorns recovered on the Olton 24-yard line.

The Longhorns had a great opportunity to get the early lead. After overcoming a fourth down and two situation on a Mo Collins run, Lockney scored on a second and six at the Mustang seven-yard line. Kelsey Hooten's extra point kick was good. Lockney led 7-0 at the 9:21 mark of the first quarter.

Olton had much better field position on their next possession. A thirty-two-yard return by Sawyer Perry gave the Mustangs first and ten at their forty-two yard line. An illegal procedure penalty and two short gains later, Olton fumbled the ball again.

Lockney now had the ball on the Olton forty-one-yard line. Mo Collins broke for fifteen yards on first down bringing up another first and ten. Mo Collins and Chase Graves moved the ball on the ground for the next six plays. Then, on fourth down and four on the eight-yard line, Chase Graves found Tyler Bybee in the end zone for a touchdown. Hooten's kick was good again, making the score 14-0 with 4:14 left in the first quarter.

Though the Olton offense began to move the ball a little, they couldn't get out of their end of the field. Olton punted on a fourth and twenty-eight. Lockney took over on their twenty-seven-yard line following a 31-yard punt and a personal foul call against the Horns.

Ben Sherman ran for eleven yards to start the next Longhorn offensive series. Mo Collins had runs of 10, 7 and 18-yards. Then, on first and ten, at the Olton forty-two-yard line, Chase Graves streaked down the field for the score. Hooten was good again on the kick. Lockney led 21-0 at the 11:36 mark of the second quarter.

Though the Olton Mustangs were in big trouble, they didn't give up. They started their next possession on their nineteen-yard-line. Thirteen plays later, Sawyer Perry got loose on a twenty-yard run for a touchdown. An extra point kick by Daniel Alvarado brought the score to 21-7 with 5:46 remaining in the first half.

Mo Collins took command of the field on Lockney's next possession, which started at their 23-yard line. He carried the ball to the Olton 47-yard line on six carries. With around two minutes left in the half, Mo Collins, who had been unstoppable, was injured on a three-yard gain. He was taken from the field by ambulance. The three-yard gain was nullified by a holding call, leaving Lockney with first and twenty and without their leading rusher. They turned the ball over on the clock until halftime.

Olton had that thirty-three seconds to try to cover sixty-four yards. They got as close as the Lockney twenty-two-yard line before time expired.

Chad Terry and his staff helped refocus their team, which was obviously shaken by losing their teammate, during halftime. The team seemed ready to battle without Mo Collins. After a second kick off (the first was called back on an offside penalty) Lockney started their first drive of the second half on Olton's forty-six-yard line. Chase Graves covered the distance to the goal line on the three carries. He scored on a twenty-six-yard run. Kelsey Hooten's kick was blocked. The Longhorns led 27-7 with 10:42 left in the third quarter.

Lockney turned the ball over twice during the third quarter with an interception and a fumble. However, the Longhorn defense kept the Olton Mustangs out of the end zone until the fourth quarter. Early in the fourth quarter, on a possession that began in the third, Lockney had Olton fourth down and five on the Lockney forty-five-yard line. Sawyer Perry ran to the right for the first down and a touchdown as he broke a forty-five-yard run. Daniel Alvarado's kick was short. The Longhorns held on to a 27-13 lead with 11:12 left to play in the fourth quarter.

Lockney scored again on their next offensive series. Chase Graves, Kelsey Hooten and Chad Johnson all

contribute to the running game on a drive that covered seventy yards. On the eleventh play of the drive, Kelsey Hooten scored on a six-yard run. Chase Graves made the score 35-13 on a two point conversion with 3:20 left in the game.

Olton scored again on a nineteen-yard run by Sawyer Perry. However, it was too little, too late for the Mustangs. Lockney won the Game 35-19.

Mo Collins may miss the remainder of the season. He expected to miss at least six weeks with a hip injury. He finished the Olton game as the second leading rusher in the state, having gained over 1,600 yards on the season.

The Longhorns gear up to host Friona at Mitchell Zimmerman field. Lockney and Friona are currently tied for the district lead.

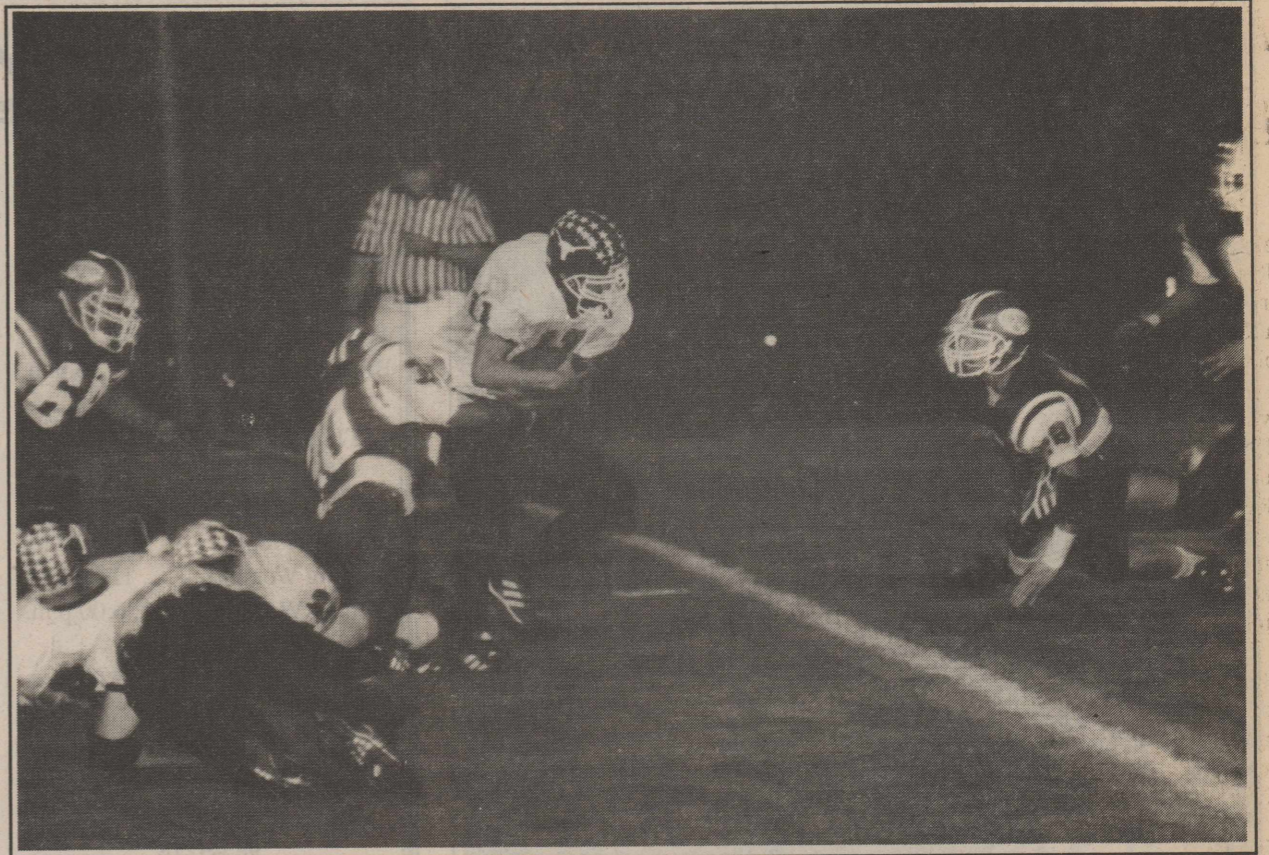

High Plains harvest activity bogs down

When things go bad, sometimes the only way to get through is with your eyes wide shut. The reason is that if you look around things might just be worse than you first suspected.

For High Plains cotton growers the culmination of one of the toughest growing seasons in recent memory is what could be the toughest harvest season since 1991.

After having dealt with significant insect pressure and drought conditions for much of the season, growers are now stuck in the middle of the wettest October since 1991. Growers suffered significant yield and quality losses that year as a result of excessive rainfall during the harvest season.

With the only thing on the harvest

season wish list being dry and open weather, growers now are almost afraid to look out the window or watch a weather report on television.

The Texas Agricultural Statistics Serviced dropped the High Plains production estimate for 2000 significantly to 2.78 million bales based on their October 1 field survey. With November 1 estimate right around the corner the outlook for the High Plains could be reduced further.

A forecast that includes 20-30 mile an hour winds and scattered rainfall the weekend before Halloween appears to have frightening potential to erode the quantity and quality of the crop. The upcoming 7-day forecast offers little hope for a significant change back to dry conditions. The forecast continues the recent trend and in-

cludes practically equal numbers of sunny days as it does days with 30-40 percent rainfall chances.

How the season eventually concludes is obviously far less certain now than it was just a couple of weeks ago. One thing that is certain, however, is that quality will decline overall.

As a result of weather during the past month the crop is now expected to continue its steady decline. The biggest single factor to gauge now is the extent to which quality will be affected, although yield losses are to be expected as the cotton endures more weathering.

The following table illustrates the steady drop in the Texas Ag Statistics Service estimates for the area since August.
