1/2 sales tax would be used for economic development

voted to bring a $1 / 2$ cent sales tax to voted to bring a $1 / 2$ cent sales tax to a
vote for Lockney citizens. The vote vote for Lockney citizens. The vote
for approval or rejection will be held in the May municipal elections. The sales tax, if approved, could only be used for economic development. The tax is collected on taxable
sales by merchants, remitted to the sales by merchants, remitted to the
Comptroller's office, rebated back to Complroiler's office, rebated back to
the cities, and then transferred to the the cities, and then transferred to the
development corporations formed to administer city economic develop-
ment programs. ment programs.
The development corporation is appointed by the City Council. Seven
members are appointed to a 2 year

Cities may use money raised by this sales tax for a wide variety of projects
including land, buildings including land, buildings, equipment,
facilities, and improveme facilities, and improvements related to projects, such as: Athletic facilities, entertainment fa-
cilities, cilities, public park purposes; facilities street cilities; Affordable housing, public safety facilities, demolition of existing struc-
tures; any other project that the board tures; any other project that the board determines will contribute to the pro-
motion or development of new or expanded business enterprise. If citizens are not pleased with the sales tax the same process used to call for an election can be used to rescind
the economic development tax.

How to avoid being a cramming victim
If you've ever found charges on
your phone bill for services you didn't
order or for services you never reorder or for services you never received, you may be the victim of
"cramming." Cramming is the addition of charges to your bill for unauthorized services.
Sometimes these char $\sim$ es $\sim$ o unnoticed because customers don't read their phone bills closely. And some-
times the charge is paid simply because customers don't understand what the charges are for and are fearful their credit rating will suffer or their phone will be disconnected if hey do not pay. Telephone customers in Texas have protections against cramming hanks
to Public Utility Commission (PUC) rules. The rules specify that before a charge for any product or service can
be added to your phone bill, the service provider must inform you about the product and its associated charges,
obtain your consent for the charges and provide a toll-free line for customers to call for information.
If you find any unfamiliar charges
on your bill or charges for a service on your bill or charges for a service
you did not order, you do not have to pay those charges, you do not have to nected for non-payment of disputed charges. You must, however, pay the

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## 2000 disaster program still in air

Details of the 2000 Disaster Assistance Package are still being develof Agriculture, although little new information has been received over the last week to ten days. USDA is developing the rules and regulations that will govern the assis-
tance program authorized as part of the FY2001 Agriculture Appropriations Bill.
Here is a run-down of what we know at this time.
The 2000 Disaster Assistance Pro-
gram was approved with three separate components: Quantity, Quality and "Severe Economic Loss".
Of these components only two,
quantity and quality, were evaluated quantity and quality, were evaluated by the Congressional Budget Office
and assigned an estimated cost. The third component had no explicit directions provided by Congress and did not receive a CBO "score". No CBO score could make it somewhat more difficult to provide grower benefits
through this proposed third compothrough
nent.
One really good bit of news for growers is that the law also says any benefits provide through the program
shall not be pro-rated Congress did not assign a set amount of money to fund the program and authorized the expenditure of whatever funds are necessary to implement the program.
This should mean producers will be able to immediately receive their ben-
One caveat is that it is still unclea whether or not a payment limitation
of $\$ 80,000$ per entity will be imposed as a part of the program. Such payment limitations have been included in past disaster programs.
