## Attorney says Tulia court decision not binding for LISD

Bob West, an attorney for LISD, says the recent court ruling in the Tulia drug testing case does not have to affect Lockney's drug testing policy and subsequent lawsuit.

"It may have some affect," said West, "but Judge Robinson's ruling against Tulia is not binding for U.S. District Judge Cummings."

Cummings will be the District Judge that hears the lawsuit brought against LISD by Larry Tannahill and the ACLU.

Tulia's policy, approved in 1997, called for junior high and high school students participating in extracurricular activities to submit to a random drug test.

Judge Robinson waited more than one year to issue a ruling on the case after it was heard in her courtroom.

LISD's drug policy calls for random drug testing for all students. Any stu-

dent refusing to take the test will not be able to participate in extracurricular activities.

"I believe the Tulia case is different than the Lockney case," said West.

"In the Tulia case Judge Robinson said there was no evidence of a drug problem in Tulia. The court looks at whether the policy meets some special need, and the judge felt there was no special need to have drug testing.

"There have been court rulings that said if there was a special need then drug testing did not violate the 4th amendment. I don't think the judge weighed the factor of the health, safety and welfare of all the students.

"In the 7th Circuit a judge has ruled that schools should not have to wait until the problem is of epidemic proportions before they take action."

## Veteran recalls attack of Japanese

In memory of Dec. 7th, 1940, and the bombing of Pearl Harbor, we will be publishing excerpts from "The Chow Dipper", written by the owner of this newspaper, Ken Towery. Towery is also the author of "The Lamplighter" column.

He was 19 years old when he was captured by the Japanese after the fall of Corregidor and Bataan. He spent 3 1/2 years in China in a Japanese prison camp.

A private in the army, Towery was stationed on the island of Corregidor in Manila Bay. His station was on Morrison Hill manning an anti-aircraft gun.

"Our own battery consisted of four guns, three-inch cannon capable of firing, at that time, up to some 27,000 feet, or about five miles high at extreme range," wrote Towery. "Each gun had a crew of five men on the platform, plus a number of ammunition handlers whose job it was to see that the platform had enough ammunition at all times during action."

"My own job was to take care of the vertical aiming of the gun. On the other side of our gun a private named Underwood handled the horizontal aiming. Between the two we were supposed to keep the gun on target, or

where the target would be when the shell exploded some five miles high. In the pecking order of privates, ours were prestigious positions....

"...across the island, in other exposed places, were a number of other batteries of the 60th Regiment. If all went well, each gun could fire a round every eight to ten seconds. Each battery could put up about twenty rounds a minute and for the regiment as a whole we could put up better than a hundred rounds each minute.

"Our position atop Morrison Hill occupied a space some 100 yards in diameter. There, for six months, some 120 men fought the first stage of their own little war. For some, it would be a lifetime. Within that circle there would be much living, and much dying."

### Chapter 2

### "Go To Your Guns and God Bless You"

News of Pearl Harbor was delivered to me by an excited hospital orderly in the early morning hours of December 8, Philippine time.

The navy had been hit hard, he said, and the Japanese were expected to hit the Philippines at any moment. The hospital, because of its location and exposure on Corregidor, would prob-

ably be a target, and all patients were being moved immediately to space in Malinta Tunnel. I should make ready for the move.

Our battery was on alert, standing by their guns on Morrison Hill. After some discussion, I was given the choice of going back to the battery or going to the tunnel. I chose to return to the battery.

I was in the hospital for two reasons. One, a persistent low-grade fever that would not go away, but primarily because of a condition known among the soldiers as "blue balls," brought on by a rupture of blood vessels in or around the scrotum, which in this instance was brought on by lifting crates of ammunition from an awkward stance.

In the center of our guns was an ammunition storage room, deep underground and accessible by a circular stairwell designed to prevent entry by bombs. We had received a new shipment of ammunition and I had been assigned the task of moving the cases, each weighing about seventy-five pounds, down the stairway and into the storage area, where they could be retrieved for restocking the gun pits. It was during this exercise that the accident occurred. I did not have

A reception for Hardin will be held Friday, December 8th, at City Bank Lockney from 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m.

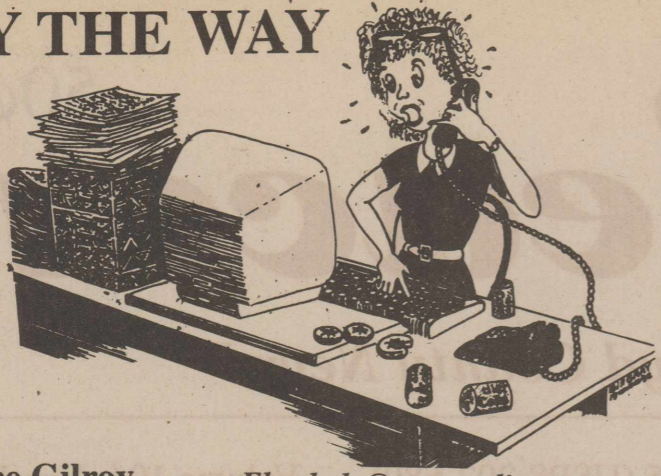

According to West these very rulings that contradict each other will eventually send a drug testing case to the U.S. Supreme Court.

"It may be Lockney's drug testing, or Tulia's drug testing or another school district's drug testing policy which will be used to get a ruling from the Supreme Court.

"The conflict in opinions among the circuit courts (Floyd County is part of

the 5th Circuit Court--as is Tulia), will give the U.S. Supreme Court a reason to look at the case. Courts will want a ruling.

"The Supreme Court is going to have to decide if the testing of extracurricular students is constitutional and if the schools have to prove there is a drug problem," said West.

# Corregidor Veteran recalls attack of Japanese

problem. Since our battery was on alert status, I took to the hospital my full field pack, including a gas mask which was hung by the bed. After two weeks there the swelling was subsiding, but the fever had persisted. It was the fever, I was told, that caused them to think I should go to the tunnel, rather than back to the battery. But the thought of resting comfortably and safely under 300 feet of rock while my comrades fought a war did not, somehow, seem the thing to do. So daylight found me once again on Morrison Hill.

A certain indefinable strangeness of mood ran through the battery as daylight came that morning. The true devastation of Pearl Harbor was not yet known to us. All that was known, in the ranks at least, was that a surprise attack had wreaked considerable damage to a few ships at anchor and that we could expect the Japanese to hit the Philippines in due course. We did not know that even then they were on their way, and that if fog had not rolled in over the island of Formosa during the night, they would have already been there.

A somberness born of apprehension enveloped the battery as it was as-

sembled by Beeman. He gave us the barest essentials, all he knew. Then Beeman ceased being Beeman, or the Beeman we had known.

With a quietness we had never known in him, he told us we were at war, that we must gird our loins and do our duty. He told us it would not be an easy war; that we would not have an easy time of it.

Then, as the men stood in stunned silence, he wiped tears from his eyes and said, "A lot of you are not going to make it through. I don't know who they will be, but some of us won't make it. I just want all of you to know I respect you as much or more than

anyone I've ever soldiered with. I love you all. Go to your guns, and God bless you."

He walked away into the jungle. Tears? Love? Strange, very strange. Much discussion followed the old man's comments as we went to battle stations. What brought on this unusual behavior? Had his courage left him? Had his nerves broken? Would he be up to it? Did he know something we didn't know and would not be told?

It remained for our gunnery sergeant, a man named Ingram, to put it in focus. A veteran of some fifteen years in the army, Ingram summed it up with "Don't worry about it. He's just been through all this before." Which may, or may not, have helped...

Even as we went to our guns, and as the emotional impact of Pearl Harbor began to sink in, Japanese heavy bombers were on their way to the Philippines from Formosa. Before the day was done, the U.S. Army Air Force in the Philippines would lay in ruins. And, completely unknown to us, an invasion fleet, also headed for the Philippines, had left Formosa the day before Pearl Harbor was attacked. It would arrive two days later.

War did not come to Corregidor at once. The Japanese bombers ranged across Luzon that first day, laying waste to Clark Field and its B-17 bombers all lined up neatly in rows, and the fighter base at Iba. But they avoided Corregidor, as they would do until they had completed their primary objective of destroying American air and sea power in the Philippines. The next day they were back, and the next day. They turned their attention to the area around Manila, the air fields, and the navy's facilities at Cavite, inside Manila Harbor.

We sat on our gun parapets, in fascination and awe, as events unfolded around us. The bombers came in waves, always staying outside range of our guns, as they pounded Cavite, small ships in the harbor, and the bases around Manila. It was an unreal experience to witness war from the top of an island 500 feet above sea level, as if we were sitting in a giant amphitheater safe and sound while bombers came in waves above and smoke and flames billowed up from below and all around. We, or some of us, flattered ourselves by thinking they were careful to avoid our guns because they knew how heavily fortified we were, and that perhaps that was a good

omen. It later became obvious to even the rank and file that they were merely taking first things first. Destroy our air and sea power and we would be left to shift for ourselves. Our time would come. Still, when we looked around, and looked at ourselves, we felt we were up to the task.

Not much news is given to the ranks under circumstances such as ours, or at least that was the case then. It was much later that the true nature of the defeat at Pearl Harbor was relayed to us with any clarity, and only then did it become apparent that no help was on the way or would ever be on the way. But still there was enough information floating around for us to know that the Japanese had devastated our air fields and the airplanes along with them, that the major ships of our Asiatic Fleet had left for southern waters, that heavy troop landings were being made on Luzon, and that all was not going well.

After those first few days, the bombers disappeared from our scene for some two weeks. We were told later that they were giving their attention to the invasion effort, paying the way for landing and advancing troops

in northern and western Luzon while the ill equipped and ill-trained Philippine Army rushed to meet them, aided by the 31st American Infantry Regiment and such other units as could be mustered. History, of course, records it as a losing effort, and within days the defending forces had fallen back, and had been driven back, into the Bataan Peninsula. Here, north of Mariveles Mountain, on a line running from Manila Bay in the east to the China Sea in the west, the stage was set for the Battle of Bataan.

## Driver killed in crash

# Fleeing vehicle drives off cliff



A drug investigation in Plainview led to a high speed chase which ended up in Floyd County when the fleeing man drove off the Caprock near Hwy. 97 and County Rd. 110 near the Cedar Hill community.

The man plunged off the cliff at approx. 4:00 a.m. Friday, Dec. 1 and died on impact. Police believe the man was not familiar with the surroundings and did not see the drop off until it was too late. Police had stopped the pursuit when the suspect hit a dirt road and followed his tracks to the edge of the cliff. Police found the car at the bottom after they hiked down the cliff. The dead man was identified as Raul Lucio Jr., 24, of Plainview. Plainview police praised the work of Floydada EMS and Fire Department in the professional manner they exhibited in bringing the body back up the cliff. According to one emergency worker the car plunged 150 feet straight down before hitting and then traveling farther. The rescue rope to bring up Lucio

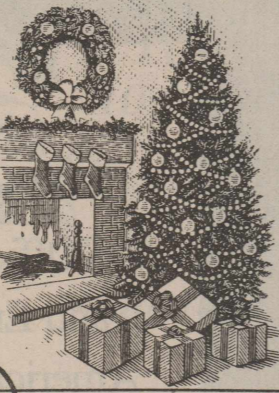

## Redding retires with 25 years of service

Postal employees opened the doors and graciously welcomed friends, well-wishers, as well as out-of-town guests including family members Wednesday, November 29, at the Floydada post office. They pushed through their routine tasks of mail sorting to honor John Redding with a retirement reception. A table of festive refreshments was served to all who attended. A very special tree lit with seasonal lights and ribbons was presented to the honoree with green bills tied to the money tree. John's spouse, Carolyn, was presented with half a ream of computer paper for a honey-do list. Special guests attending were former postal employees Doyle Turner and his wife Dorothy, Tommy Rice (former postmaster), Harold Wayne Bennett, and Freddy Morren.

John, who had served in the U.S. Navy for 4 years aboard the destroyer USS Perkins, began his career with the post office in 1980. He went to work as a substitute rural letter carrier on a route for Wayne Finley and John Speer. John had been a carpet layer for some 23 years before being employed with the U. S. Postal Service. As a substitute, he continued to coordinate his installing carpet with the mail delivery.

After 6 years of substitute work, he went to full-time rural letter carrier by accepting a rural route based out of the Crosbyton Post Office. He worked under the supervision of Donal Parker, postmaster. His route was approxi-

mately 90 miles going in all directions of Crosbyton, including a part of the Blanco Canyon. He expressed his gratitude for a job that allowed him to enjoy on a daily basis the picturesque beauty of the Blanco Canyon, "one of the most beautiful places in the world" for which he has an acute appreciation.

In 1992 John returned to his local post office at Floydada. He took Route 2, Floydada and Route 1, McAdoo. His route included the area south and east of Floydada, including a diversion through the McAdoo post office every day for more pickup and sorting of mail where Lovey Nance is postmaster.

His route meandered through the Lakeview community, the Wake and Blanco communities of the East Plains which joins the Blanco Canyon. Six days a week, he drove to within 15 miles of Spur, 12 miles of Dickens, and 8 miles of Dougherty before returning to his homebase.

John has served under 4 postmasters at Floydada. He began his hitch under the supervision of Ed Webster. "I owe that man a lot," Redding said. "He came through for me more than once. After being self-employed for so long, I needed a person like him for support and encouragement." Later he worked with Gary Reckling, Tommy Rice and presently Kelly Bland.

John said he had seen many changes in the postal system, but in spite of all of them, "it still boils down to the fun-

damental idea of delivering the mail everyday so that rural people, elderly people, grandmas and grandpas, or businesses can depend on the mail service. "He tried to keep an extra watchful eye for people who lived alone or had health problems.

John not only made friends with all of his postal patrons but he made friends with the patrons' pets. "It broke the monotony for me, and it made their day," he would say about some dog who lay in wait for him so they could race to the highway.

John served his last day on Friday, December 1, ending a 25 year career. A gathering of friends and patrons were at the McAdoo Post Office when he arrived to share some of Lovey's festivities and friendship. Later on his route when he arrived at the Wake Gin Lena Givens and friends from that community shared some popcorn balls with him.

He stated that he had worked for some of the best people in the world. He said some lasting friendships had been made over the years.

His plans include catching up on some things that have had to be postponed until now including some work on the farm, some improvements around the house and some rental property.

He plans to spend more time on hobbies such as hunting, fishing, hunting Indian artifacts, and some travel. But he made it very clear that all of his plans would come second to spending time with his grandbaby.

## Council begins a new era

On October 25, 2000, Ms. Mary Guevara-Capello, J.D. was selected, from a field of close to 100 applicants from throughout the country, as the new Chief Executive Officer (CEO) of the Texas Migrant Council (TMC). TMC also receives state funds for the operation of such programs as Child Care Management Services, Workforce Centers, Quality Improvement Activities, Goodwill Industries, Employer Collaboration Services, and Welfare to Work programs in the Laredo, Austin, Pharr, and Victoria areas.

With over 1500 employees and operations in four (4) different states, TMC has developed as one of the largest Hispanic organizations in the

country.

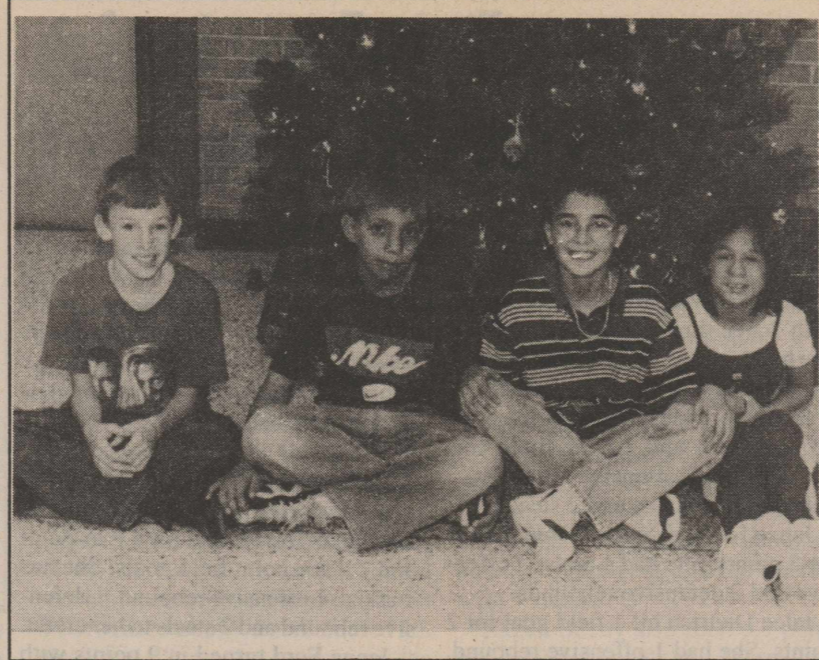

## High Plains approves eradication

The last piece of the puzzle is finally in place for boll weevil eradication on the South Plains. Cotton growers in Cochran, Hockley, Terry, Lubbock, and portions of Crosby, Dickens Garza and Lynn counties recently voted 2,996 to 732 in favor of establishing the Southern High Plains-Caprock eradication zone.

The Texas Department of Agriculture announced the results of the grower mail-in referendum Nov. 27. The four-to-one ballot approval creates a 1.2 million-acre active control zone in these eight counties - the largest of eight active eradication zones in Texas.

Boll weevil eradication efforts in these zones are operated and governed by cooperative efforts between producers and the Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation. Growers in the Southern High Plains-Caprock zone also voted to pay \$12 per acre for irrigated land and \$6 per acre for dryland fields to fund their five-year eradication program at a total cost of \$105 million. If all goes well, control efforts will begin next fall.

"The last piece of the boll weevil eradication puzzle is finally in place on the High Plains. In order to get good control of this destructive pest, we now need 100 percent grower participation-cooperation," said Steve Verett, executive vice president of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., headquartered in Lubbock. "That participation is important because the High Plains is one big, contiguous production region. Boll weevils don't recognize county lines - they simply spread wherever Mother Nature allows."

Several mild winters in a row, an abundance of overwintering habitat and the weevils' quick adaptation to the Plains climate helped push weevil numbers across the region to unprecedented levels during the past eight years. Boll weevils damage cotton by feeding and laying eggs for successive generations in the plant's immature "squares" and bolls—the fruit which bears high-value cotton lint.

Drought in 1996 and 1998 didn't slow the weevil's progress. Their rapid spread in the past five years leads Texas A&M entomologists to conclude that weevils have developed enough cold-hardiness to successfully overwinter just about as far north as cotton can be grown in Texas.

Recent weevil overwintering studies conducted by these scientists indicate as much as 65 percent of overwintering weevils successfully survived recent winters on the Plains. Once these weevils emerge from overwintering sites, they seek nearby cotton fields. Spraying to control weevils can cost growers as much as \$60 per acre or more during the growing season.

"Eradication is a good, long-term investment for the entire region. By assessing themselves a control 'tax,' growers are trading the uncertainty of high annual control costs for a lower, known control cost for the next few years," said Jim Leser, Extension cot-

ton entomologist at Texas A&M's Lubbock Research and Extension Center. "The effort pays off. We see that when we look at the dramatic decline in weevil numbers in zones where eradication has been under way for one or two years."

"The first year of diapause eradication spraying cuts weevil numbers dramatically. Subsequent spraying in following years then pushes weevil populations down to near zero. That helps put more lint and more dollars back into producers' pockets."

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service estimates boll weevils cost the state somewhere between \$25 million to \$50 million annually in lost production before eradication programs were initiated. A 1997 economic impact study of weevil damage on the South Plains projected regional losses of \$500 million from lost production, processing and jobs if weevils were left unchecked.

Eradication programs in regional zones are first approved by producers, and are funded by a combination of farmer assessments and state and federal monies.

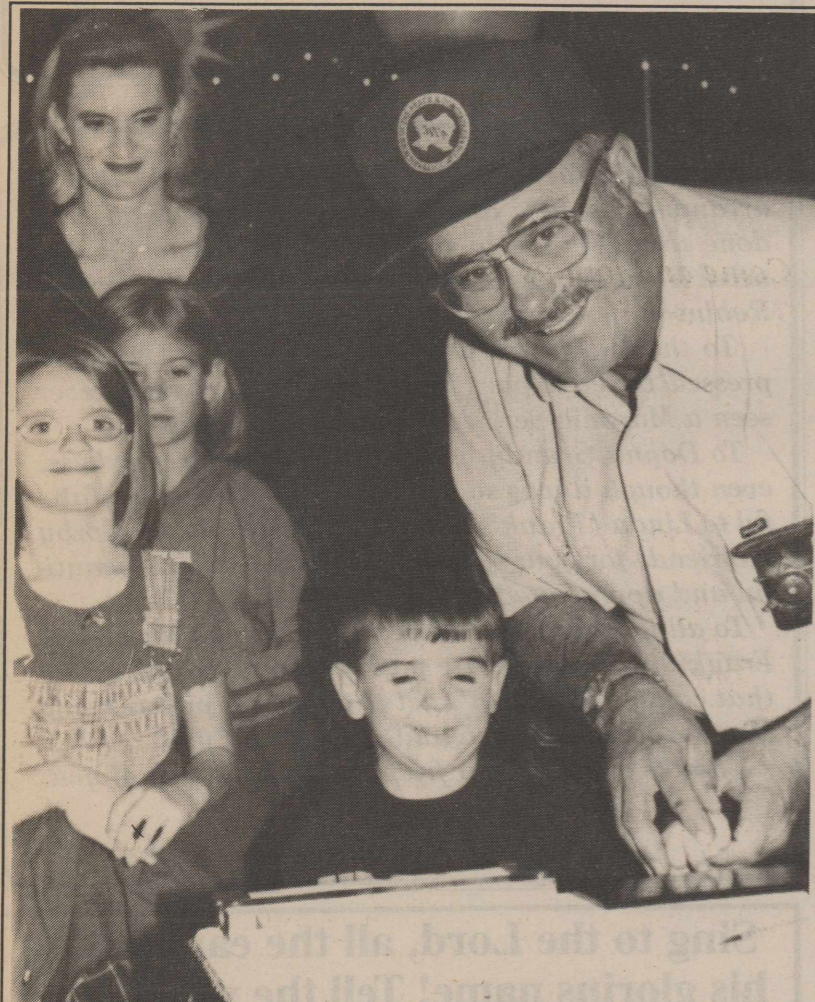

We have a 4 year history of rewarding our customers in cash for their business, and we are pleased to report that the rewards will continue in 2001." Oswalt explained that the board approved a stock retirement and an interest rate reduction for new loans and existing loans as they re-price. The stock retirement, paid in cash, is to take place in January.

Positive news has been limited this year due to drought conditions, low prices, and increased production costs. Interest rates have increased during the past year as well. Both Williams and Oswalt emphasized that Panhandle-Plains Federal Land Bank will remain a reliable source of low-cost, long-term credit.

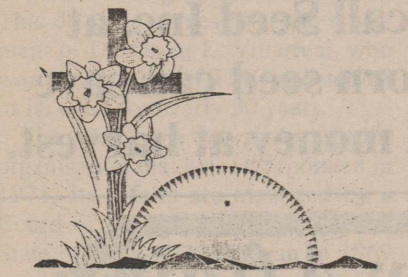

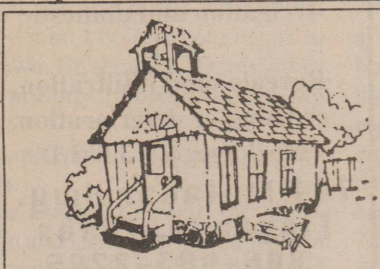

On another trip to Oaxaca and Chiapas, Mexico where I had been visiting the churches. I pulled onto the highway about noon after spending several days back in the mountain rough country. The power steering line broke and all the fluid spewed out.

I was about 600 miles from Puebla and home and about the same distance from a major city. I tried to keep the

pickup with camper on the road as I drove about 20 more miles to a town. Would you believe, as I approached the next town I saw a dealership for my pickup. I stopped and was immediately informed that none of their Mexican made parts would fit my American made pickup. And they were right as I looked at them.

A mechanic from the back of the shop happened to pass by as I was being told it would take over a week to get the part from the border. The mechanic mentioned that some old American parts from an American station wagon had been discarded in a pile some four years prior. He then dug out a long American made power steering hose.

I was then told it would not fit because it was too long. I knew if the fittings matched, the length wouldn't matter. Finally the mechanic went with me to look at the connections on the pickup. He put it on. It fit, but it did have to be coiled several times on top of the engine. No problem. Thank you Lord.
