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

County sued over death of man fleeing police

By Darwin Robinson The Floyd County Commissioners met in regular session, Monday, January 8, 2001. They were served with a hand-delivered letter from Attorney Eric Willard of Plainview, informing them of a lawsuit by the Raul Lucio, Jr. family against the County of Floyd, Sheriff Royce Gilmore, and his subordinate officers on duty December 1,

The letter stated, "Mr. Lucio, Jr. was killed at the conclusion of an unauthorized high-speed chase by Plainview police officers and others in the early morning hours of December 1, 2000. These officers chased Mr. Lucio out of the city limits, out of the Hale County limits, into Floyd County and over a 150 foot cliff near Flomot,

"Mr. Lucio died as a consequence, in part, of the County's failure to have adequate policies for such chases, and the Sheriff and his subordinates' failure to stop the chase of Mr. Lucio, Jr. by the Plainview police officers, among other reasons.

"Mr. Lucio, Jr.'s wrongful death has harmed his surviving widow and his two minor children in the loss of his wage-earning capacity, his love, and nurturing of the family.

"The family will seek the maximum monetary recovery permitted by law."

In other business, the commissioners passed the adoption of a resolution for Certified Assurances regarding a Grant Application for a Rural Court Delay Reduction Project. This involves State matching funds of \$4,330 to be applied to the salary of the Floyd County District Court Coordinator. This grant will expire in

September, 2001 Commissioner Jon Jones made the motion to adopt the resolution. It was

We found a home for her, and even though we never heard from her owners (and she looked panicked as she was carried off to a pickup), I think she'll be happy.

I've got to discuss some unpleasant business--a rate increase.

Beginning February 1st, our subscription prices will go up. In-county rates will be \$18.00 per year (senior citizens can deduct \$1.00). Out-ofcounty will be \$21.00 per year. There will only be 2 rates--in county and outof-county. It costs us the same to mail a paper to Plainview as it does to Alaska. That means each subcription will go up a little less than four pennies, (or a little more than three pennies) for each newspaper.

When I first started considering this move, I was very worried about breaking the news to our subscribers. In fact, I felt downright guilty about just thinking about it. Now, after studying the history of postal increases and other increased production costs we have incurred, I can't believe we have in 1988. waited so long. I even considered going up more than we will.

The last time we increased our rates was April 1, 1994. Since 1994 we have had 3 jumps in 2nd class postal rates (two of those jumps have been in the last 2 years). Other costs have gone

This most recent increase has raised the cost of our mailing from \$80.00-\$100.00 a month, or \$960 - \$1,200 a year, above what we have been pay-

Of course everyone knows that mailing a letter has just increased by one cent--but they don't see the even more substantial increase for 2nd class postage. This latest rate increase (to us) is approximately 10%, however our increase to you is less than that. Our per issue subscription rate will still be less than the cost of buying the paper at the newsstands, and less than buying a cup of coffee or a glass of tea at most places. Considering all the costs, and all the effort, that goes into bringing hometown news to our readers, it is still a very good deal. We appreciate our subscribers and know that it is depressing to get news of one more increase of one more item. We feel the same way. We face the same costs as everyone else. We wish we did not have to pay higher utilities and it would be nice to be able to live off the same salary we were being paid

We appreciate your understanding. Of course if you want to beat the increase you can always come in and subscribe (or renew) before Feb. 1.

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



"Our schedule is a little different from years past. We will have our lamb show on Thursday. Friday we will have our steers and heifers show. On Saturday, we will conduct our swine show, and on the same day we will have our Auction Sale.

"Both Lockney and Floydada schools will be turned out all day on Friday, January 26th. Then we will go to other stock shows in Fort Worth, San Antonio, and Houston," Ragland concluded.

Long told the commissioners, "We are getting back in full swing with our extension and education clubs that were postponed during December.

"Our Head Start program is scheduled this week at Duncan Elementary where they teach food nutrition and safety.

"The 4-H fund raiser this year will again be the concession stand at the Floyd County Stock Show. On Saturday we will have a plate lunch ready for everyone.
