FISD fails to renew contract for Gleghorn


After discussion in a closed executive session Thursday night, March 8, FISD trustees reconvened in an open meeting and voted unanimously not to renew the contract of women's basketball coach, Glen Gleghorn.

The board also voted to accept the resignations of teachers Sue Reeves, at R.C. Andrews, and Ann Carr, at Floydada High School. The two were then rehired as part-time employees.

Other resignations accepted during the regular meeting were: FHS Ag Teacher Kevin Kelley, FHS Biology Teacher Ed Singleterry, FHS Ag Teacher Billy Barron, A.B. Duncan Elementary Second Grade Teacher Becky Kunkel, and FJHS Teacher/ Coach Blake Eddleman.

Upon the recommendation of Superintendent Jimmie Collins the board also voted to employ the professional and paraprofessional staff of: Rex Holcombe, Charles Tyer, Lee Hurt, Clinton Smith, David Hutton, Bob Campbell, Brenda Parker, and Sheree Cannon.

Wednesday when we were talking about prepositions and places (specifically whether it was ON the South Plains or IN the South Plains), I got to wondering just where IN the world I really was.

Well, I'm pretty sure live ON planet Earth, IN North America (but ON the North American Continent), IN the United States, IN the Great State OF Texas, IN West Texas, ON the South Plains, IN the Panhandle (or are we really IN the Panhandle? or just nearly or sorta in the Panhandle?). Anyhow, the new figures are apt to pose problems for politicians. Ever since LBJ's time, legislators have had

as a determining factor in the ultimate shape of whatever district was involved. In an effort to satisfy federal judges, legislators have had to go to ridiculous lengths to make certain that "minority" interests, whatever that meant, were served. Some legislative districts wander hither and yon, suggesting they were either laid out by drunken sailors or paid members of state legislatures seeking to protect their own hide. Now that process is probably going to get more difficult as lawmakers try to fit in a lot more variables.

Most of this state's growth, as expected, was in the metropolitan areas, and most of the population loss was in rural areas, including, but not limited to, West Texas. The new "ideal" Texas legislative districts is 139,012. House Speaker Pete Laney's Legislative district is 21.49 percent less than "ideal," meaning his (our) district will have to absorb more surrounding counties. Or, in the alternative, be absorbed by other, surrounding districts, and that's not likely.

The Congressional Districts of both Thornberry (the 13th) and Combest (the 19th) lost population as well. The new "ideal" for Congress is 651,619, The population of those who call to draw legislative districts with race and both districts need new blood to

reach that goal. The same goes for our Senate District 30, now represented by Haywood of Wichita Falls. The new "ideal" State Senate district is 672,639, some 20,000 more than the new Congressional district.

So some vast changes will probably occur among the districts of those who make our laws. We have no advance knowledge on any of this, but we expect to see both Amarillo and Lubbock made whole, with all of Amarillo in Thornberry's district, and all of Lubbock in Combest's district. (Both cities were divided in the last redistricting, 10 years ago, in an effort to protect Democratic Congressman Sarpalius, who, in the process, got East Lubbock.)

We would expect to see Floyd County remain in Laney's Texas Legislative district, but not much is certain beyond that. Ten years ago the Democrats were in charge of redistricting, and this year Republicans will be in charge in the Senate and Democrats in the House. True, the House redistricting committee is chaired by a nominal Republican, but about the only thing that can be expected of him is that he will approach the entire matter from the standpoint of self-sur-

I have been involved in the coaching business for twenty-two years. I have coached in six different school districts and spent four of those years coaches and bad coaches during my twenty-two years. I think you should want to keep coaches who are honest and moral people that sincerely care about your children. Glen Gleghorn is that kind of person. He has Christian values that all of us can learn from. I believe that it is a black eye on the school system when the school administration and leadership of Floydada ISD are allowed to let a coach like Coach Gleghorn go.

I spent four years in Floydada, and I know that all of his problems stem from not playing the "right" girls. There is a group of people that do not care if you win or lose. They just want their daughters to play. If you don't play the "right" ones then the solution is to just get rid of the coach. The girls were in the playoffs for the first time in twenty-seven years. Nagar continued, "As incentives, we will buy two video cameras for the Sheriff's patrol cars, a digital camera for the Sheriff's office, and we will return 42 percent of all the pay phone gross revenues back to the county for a five year contract."

Commissioner Lennie Gilroy made the motion to accept the five year contract, plus incentives. It was seconded by Commissioner Jon Jones and unanimously passed.

The commissioners heard an Audit Report for the year ending September 30, 2000 by Becky Roberts of Davis, Kinard and Company., P.C. of Abilene.

Roberts told the commissioners, "You are doing a good job and we see no reason to recommend any changes this year. As long as you do not have another entity asking for a different type of report, then I recommend that you keep reporting the way you are doing it now.'

The report showed a Combined Balance Sheet of All Fund Types and Account Groups as: Total Assets in General Fund of \$485,238; in Special Revenue Fund of \$456,505; in Trust and Agency Fund of \$151,427; in General Fixed Assets of \$3,876,118; in General Long-Term Debt of \$52,001; Totaling all assets (memo only) of \$5,021,289.

The Total Liabilities and Fund Balance were the same numbers in each category, while the Fund Balance alone showed a Total Fund Balance in 2000 (memo only) of \$1,009,065, as compared to \$979,082 in 1999.

Commissioner Ray Nell Bearden made the motion to approve the appointment of nine citizens to the County Grievance Committee for Jones and unanimously approved.

to conserving our natural resources and improving landowner management techniques the Texas Parks & Wildlife Debarment is trying to help as many landowners as possible through two programs. The two programs are The Private Lands and Habitat Program and The Landowner Incentive Program.

The Private Lands and Habitat Program is a program is which free and confidential assistance is provided to landowners who want to incorporate wildlife management considerations to their current and future land management practices.

"The program is geared so that we can provide some advice to landowners and managers on the management and preservation of habitat and the wildlife that utilize their property," states Charlie Newberry, TPWD Wildlife Biologists.

The program works as follows; the landowner, or someone the landowner designates as an agent contacts the wildlife biologist in their area and upon receiving written request the biologist will set up a meeting with the land manager to come out and evaluate the property. The land manager will be asked to identify the needs and goals of the property and to establish goals for the wildlife populations.

"Productivity appraisal" may lower rhe property taxes on your farm, ranch or timber land!

Texas law allows farmers, ranchers, and timber growers to pay property taxes based upon the "production value" of their land rather than on its market value. This "productivity appraisal" means qualified land is taxed based on its ability to produce crops, livestock, or timber - not on its value on the real estate market. And it can mean a substantial property tax savings.

When is the application deadline?

If your land has never had a productivity appraisal or you are a new land owner, you must apply to your local appraisal district by April 30 to take advantage of this benefit on your 2001 property taxes. You may get up to 60 extra days if you have a good reason and ask for it by April 30. If you miss this deadline, you may still be able to apply, but you will pay a penalty. Check with your appraisal district office.

Do you need to reapply annually?

If your land already receives agricultural or timber productivity appraisal, you normally don't need to reapply unless the chief appraiser requires you to do so. If a new application is required, the appraisal district will notify you by mail.

!"La valoracion productiva" puede reducir los impuestos de su terrano agricola, ganadero o maderero!

La ley de Texas permite a los granjeros, rancheros, y madereros pagar sus impuestos de propiedad basandose en "la valoración productiva" del terreno calificado - o sea en su abilidad de producir cosecha, ganado, o madera - y no de su valor en el mercado actual. Y esto le puede ahorrar en sus impuestos de propiedad.

¿Cual es la hora del cierre?

Si su terreno nunca ha tenido una valoracion productiva, o si Ud. es nuevo dueno, debe solicitarla a su distrito de valoraciones para el dia 30 de abril, para recibir el beneficio en sus impuestos de propiedad de 2001. Puede recibir hasta 60 dias mas si tiene una buena razon y si solicita el tiempo adicional antes del 30 de abril. Si pasa de esta fecha, es posible que todavia la podra obtenar, pero pagara una multa. Pregunte en la oficina de su distrito de valoraciones.

¿Debo solicitarla cado ano?

Por lo general, si su propiedad ya recibe una valoracion productiva agricola o maderero, no hay necesidad de pedir una nueva cado ano - al menos que se lo pida su jefe de valoraciones. Si una solicitud nueva se requiere, el distrito de valoraciones le mandara un aviso por correo.

A variety of homestead exemptions could lower your property taxes!

A homestead exemption lowers the property taxes on your home by lowering its taxable value. If your home is valued at \$50,000 and you receive a \$15,000 homestead exemption, your home will be taxed as if it were worth \$35,000.

Who qualifies for an exemption?

Anyone who owned a home on January 1st (and used it as their primary residence on that date) is entitled to a \$15,000 homestead exemption to lower their school taxes this year . . . and it doesn't matter if your home is a house, condominium, or mobile home. (Counties, cities, and special taxing districts may also offer homestead exemptions.)

Are other exemptions available?

If you're disabled - or if you're 65 years old or older - you are entitled to an additional \$10,000 school tax exemption on your home. And if you qualify for the over-65 exemption, you're also entitled to a permanent, lockned-in "ceiling" on the school property taxes on your home. (The ceiling does not apply to county or city property taxes and those entities may offer other exemptions.) The over-65 homeowners exemptions and school tax ceiling transfers to the surviving spouse, if the spouse is 55 years of age or older at the time of death and lives in and owns the home. Over-65 homeowners may also transfer the percentage of school tax paid, based on their former home's over-65 school tax ceiling, to a new home.

Do I have to apply each year?

No. If you had a homestead exemption on your home in 2000, you won't need to reapply for 2001 unless your chief appraiser requires it. However, if you haven't received an exemption on your present home - or if uou've moved to a new home - you'll need to file for an exemption for 2001. If you are 65 this year, you may file for the over-65 exemption up to one year after the date you turned 65. And if you became disabled during 2000, you need to file for the disabled person's exemption.

! Varias exenciones de residencia pueden rebajar sus impuestos de propiedad!

Una exencion de residencia reduce sus impuestos se propiedad. Por ejemplo, si su residencia tiene un valor de \$50,000 y Ud. recibe una exencion de \$15,000, sus impuestos se calcularan como si el valor de su residencia fuera \$35,000.

¿Quien califica para una exencion?

Cualquier dueno de una residencia principal el dia 1 de enero tiene derecho a una exencion de residencia de \$15,000 este ano para rebajar sus impuestos escolares ... y no importa se la residencia es casa, condominio, o casa movil. (Los condados, municipios, y distritos especiales de impuestos tambien pueden ofrecer exenciones de residencia.)

¿Hay otras exenciones?

Si Ud. es incapacitado - o si tiene 65 anos o mas - tiene derecho a una excencion adicional de \$10,000 en sus impuestos escolares de propiedad. Y si Ud. califica para la exencion para los que ya cumplieron 65 anos, tambien tiene derecho a un "cielo maximo" permanente en sus impuestos escolares de residencia. (El cielo maximo no tiene que ver con impuestos de propiedad de los condados o municipios, y esas entidades pueden ofrecer otras exenciones.) La exencion para los que ya cumplieron 65 anos y el cielo maximo se pueden transferir al esposo/esposa sobreviviente si el o ella tiene 55 o mas anos de edad y es dueno/duena de la casa en donde vive. Tambien el dueno de una casa nueve que tiene mas de 65 anos puede transladar un porventaje de cielo maximo del los impuestos escolares que le tocaron en su domicilio vieja.

¿Debo solicitarla cado ano?

No. Si Ud. recibio una exencion de residencia en 2000, no hay necesidad de solicitarla de nuevo en 2001 - al menos que se lo pida su jefe de valoraciones. Sin embargo, si no ha recibido una exencion en su residencia actual - o si ha cambiado de domicilio tendra que solicitar una exencion para 2001. Si Ud. cumplira los 65 anos durante este ano, tiene hasta un ano de esa fecha para solicitar una nueva exencion. Y si cumplios los 65 anos o resulto incapacitado en 2000, tendra que solicitar las exenciones adicionales.

¿Donde y cuando debo solicitar mis exenciones?

Protect your rights! "Render" your taxable property by April 16th.

A "rendition" is a report to the appraisal district that lists all the taxable property you owned or controlled on January 1st of this year. The rendition form is available at your local appraisal district office... or you may draft a similar form.

Who must file a rendition?

You must file a rendition if you own tangible personal property that is used to produce income - such as the inventory and equipment used by a business. Are there any advantages to you?

The advantages of filing a rendition are:

You give your opinion of your propertys value. if the appraisal district believes the value is higher, it must notify in writing of the higher value and explain how you can protest that value to the appraisal review board.

You record your correct mailing address so your tax bills will go to the right address. If your bill is mailed to the wrong address, the law still holds you responsible for paying your taxes on time or paying extra charges for late payments.

You can also file a "report of decreased value" to notify the appraisal district of significant de preciation of the value of your property in 2000. The district will look at your property before assigning a value in 2001.

What's the deadline?

The last day for filing 2001 renditions is April 16. Call your appraisal district for the last date the rendition may be postmarked, if mailing. You can get an extra 15 days if you ask for it in writing by the April 16 deadline.



The Hell's Angels were a very notorious motorcycle gang back then. There were killings on a regular basis in and around the Houston bars and many were blamed on them.

Patsy and I received a phone call just after midnight one Saturday night. This church member lady was almost hysterical. She asked us to come the hospital because her husband had been shot by the Hells Angel gang outside a bar and he was possibly

We rushed to the hospital and prayed with her while her husband was being operated on to save his life. He survived the gun shot wound in the stomach. A day or two later he professed Christ as his savior as he recovered in the hospital.

He was released from the hospital after about a week. He asked to be baptized and I suggested we wait until his wound healed. He emphatically said he did not want to wait. So I baptized him on the second Sunday following his shooting while he held his side keeping his stitches from pull-

He later told me the gang had followed him outside the bar and was going to rob him. When he refused to give them his billfold, one of them shot him. He managed to get to his car and open the door where a shotgun was in the front seat.

He said he shot one of them with the shot gun and held off the others until he passed out from loss of blood. Someone called the police and he was taken to the hospital almost dead.

MORAL OF THE STORY: God works in mysterious ways to bring some hardened sinners to Christ.
