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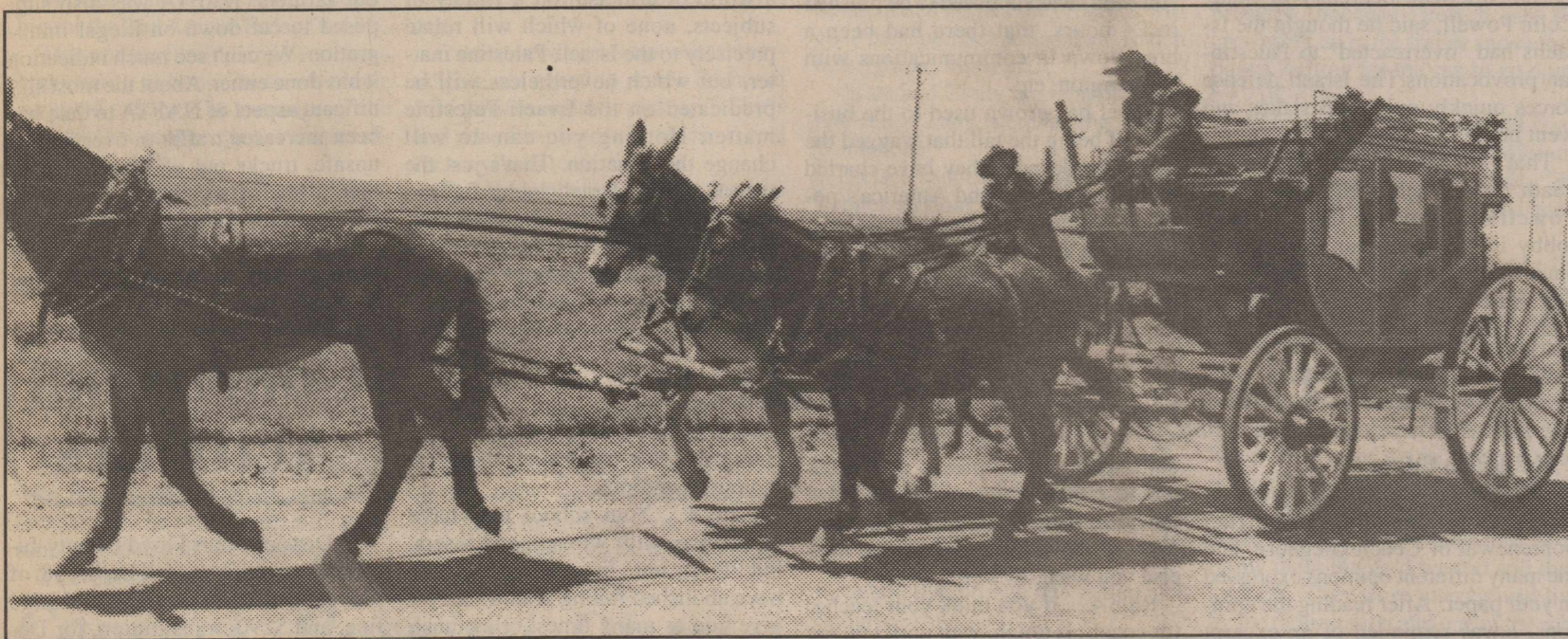

Stagecoach journey benefits charities

South Plains was the scene of old west excitement, on Sunday afternoon, as the old Concord Stagecoach pulled into the community with the help of three mules and the encouragement of driver Cole Brooks.

The historic stagecoach is on its way to Tombstone, Arizona with a planned arrival of May 26th, 11:00 a.m. The stage left Springfield, Missouri on March 24th.

The crew, consist of trail boss and coach owner, Rick Hamby; partner Pete Cline; historian and magician Lafitte; driver and muleskinner, Cole Brooks; 78 year old point man Lee Wass, and camp coordinator Bud Dietsch.

Dietsch's responsibility is to scout ahead and find campsites suitable for men and animals. Permission had been granted to the crew to house the stage in a large quonset barn across from South Plains Gin, and the mules and horses were put in pens across the road at the home of Nathan Johnson.

The stage arrived in South Plains at approximately 3:30 p.m. April 22 after making a stop and rest at Quitaque on April 20. The 27 mile trek from Quitaque included a 3-4 hour pull of the 2,300 lb. stage up the Caprock. "We normally just pull with 3 mules,"

said Dietsch, "but we used 4 to get up the Caprock."

The stage travels approximately 30 miles a day and has planned 63 days to get to Tombstone--arriving on Wyatt Earp Days. "Fifty-two of those 63 days are travel days," said Dietsch. "The others are rest days." At the end of the line, the stage will have traveled 1,398 miles.

The stagecoach journey is raising money for several children's charities: St. Jude's Children Hospital, Special Olympics, and Children's Miracle Network. It is also a good promotional for Wyatt Earp Days and Pete Cline who owns Wyatt Earp properties in Tombstone.

The Stagecoach was originally built in the 1800's and used by the Butterfield Overland Stage Company. "Mr. Butterfield contracted with the federal government to run the mail 2,500 miles from St. Louis Missouri to San Francisco," said Dietsch. "The trip could only take 25 days. Relay stations were set up every 15 miles. Mr. Butterfield was paid \$600,000 and he only had 9 months to get it all together.

"The stage would pull into the relay station and within 9 minutes the team was changed and the stage took

Council votes to reimburse fire department

During a special called meeting, April 23rd, the Lockney City Council, in a split vote, decided to pay back the Lockney Fire Department for \$23,000 worth of equipment the department had purchased a year ago.

During the city council meeting, which no fire department member attended, the council members agreed they had thought the question of who was going to pay the bill had been decided a year ago. The members also expressed agreement over dissatisfaction in the manner in which the bill was presented to the city council.

After much discussion, Councilman Bil Anderson made the motion to reimburse the Fire Department for the money the department paid last year for the equipment.

The motion died for a lack of a second.

Councilman Dee Copeland then made a motion to reimburse the Fire Department for 1/2 of the bill now and then write the balance of the bill into next year's budget.

Anderson seconded this motion. Councilman Roger Stapp and Councilman

The board also interviewed candidates for Athletic Director, but no decision was made.

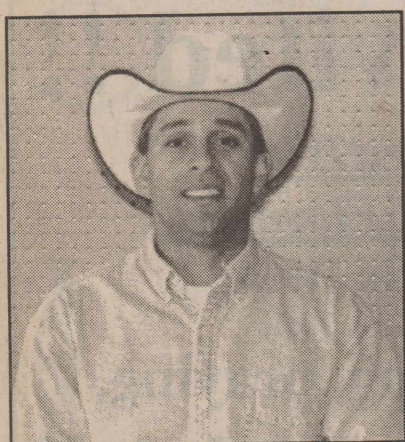
In an April 17th board meeting, the

It has been fun to read all the election jokes about Florida. It is nice to be able to poke fun at other people for awhile. Those dumb voters. That disorganized system. Voter fraud.

How in the world did Florida get in such a mess? Now the news media is telling us the State is taking steps to fix any areas where fraud and corruption may exist. Good luck.

Once Florida is fixed we shouldn't have any more problems. Well maybe there might be another State out there with voting problems--but we'll only worry about it during a National election when it comes down to everybody's vote "really" counting.

There is no need to fix problems in the voting laws until it is crucial--but of course then it is too late.

For some reason voting irregularities are only important when it is a national election.

I recently checked with the Secretary of State's office on voting questions I had. The answers from that office were very enlightening and I thought I would share them with you.

I heard about certain people coming to vote in a Floydada school board election who had only recently changed their address to show residences in Fisd District #4. The voter registrar understood the law to say that you must change your address 30 days in advance of an election to be able to vote in districts. If you had not changed your address then you could not vote in the new district.

The answer she received from the Secretary of State caused me to call the office myself. I was told by Melinda that you can change your address for voting purposes in a city or school board election on the very day of the election.

You must, however, sign a piece of paper that says you are telling the truth about your new residence. However you must not move outside your County precinct. If you stay within your county precinct you can jump from one school board district to another as many times as you want to vote for whoever. If you move outside the county precinct then you must notify the registrar 30 days prior to the election.

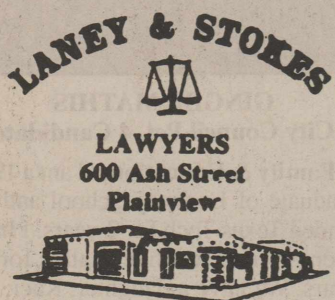

Our President, our former Governor, may as well get ready for the fall-out. It will come.

A few days ago, the Israeli armed forces invaded a small strip of land in what is called Gaza. Gaza is a strip of land lying between what is now called Israel and the Egyptian Sinai desert. They said the invasion was in retaliation for mortar attacks from some citrus groves in Gaza. So they moved in, destroyed citrus farms and everything else in the targeted area. The General in charge of Israeli forces said they would stay for "days, weeks, months, as long as it takes" to accomplish their goals, whatever those goals might be.

The American Secretary of State, Colin Powell, said he thought the Israelis had "overreacted" to Palestinian provocations. The Israeli defense forces quickly pulled up stakes and went home.

That's on the surface. What's beneath the surface is the reaction to Powell's comments from Israel's lobby in the American media. Not since the days of Mr. Bush's father has any American President spoken so

"harshly" to Israel, we are told.

In Israel, reaction to Gen. Powell's comments was one of stunned confusion. While the American Secretary of State's comments could only be judged as extremely mild, Israel is not accustomed to hearing words of displeasure from this side of the Atlantic, no matter how veiled, and no matter how well deserved. Mr. Shimon Perez, Israel's minister of foreign affairs, hastened to assure everyone that Powell's comments did not signal a change in American policy toward Israel (which is probably right) and that the Israeli general who made the comments about staying in Gaza as long as necessary was confused, that the "mission" was supposed to be finished in 24 hours, that there had been a breakdown in communications with Washington, etc.

Israel has grown used to the business of being the tail that wagged the dog. For decades they have charted their own course, and America's political establishment has tagged along, providing as many billions of American tax dollars as Israel wanted to further Israeli aims and policies. In the

background has been the fear that, some day, some American President might change things. That simple fear is what caused so many in the American Jewish community, in league with the Israeli citizenship, to give Al Gore overwhelming support during the recent election. They, remembering his father, did not want the son to become President. The fact that George W. Bush did indeed become President, and is now President is enough to cause jitters on both sides of the Atlantic. And that unease will be reflected very soon in the American media. So buckle up, George, and get ready for the storm. Your media will now become "sour". You will receive a world of criticism on a variety of subjects, none of which will relate precisely to the Israeli-Palestine matter, but which nevertheless will be predicated on the Israeli-Palestine matter. Nothing you can do will change the situation. That's just the way it is. The Israeli lobby figures, with good reason based on long experience, that the more fuss they kick up now, the more leverage they will have at the appropriate time. That ap-

propriate time comes when Congress gives consideration to the foreign aid budget, the lion's share of which goes to Israel.

On another subject, and just to get on the record, we note that the President was successful in pushing his proposal for a hemisphere "free trade" zone through the recent gathering in Ottawa. It was merely the first step of an agreement that will take years to complete.

We are not at all sure we like the idea. We went along with the NAFTA agreement with Mexico, having become persuaded it would be good for our farmers. NAFTA was also supposed to cut down on illegal immigration. We can't see much indication it has done either. About the most significant aspect of NAFTA to date has been increased traffic in overweight, unsafe, trucks out of Mexico, more than a few of which conceal illegal narcotics, and illegal immigrants. The hemisphere free trade zone may be the greatest thing since sliced bread, but we remain unconvinced.

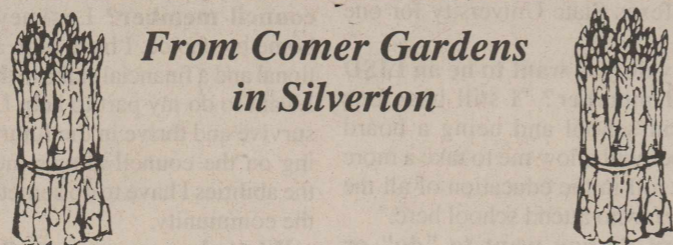

off. Passengers were treated like freight. They paid \$250 for a ticket to San Francisco which would equate to about \$6,000 now."

Butterfield was bought out by Wells & Fargo. The coach was retired after the Civil War, and was purchased by Silver Dollar City, in Branson, Missouri. It was restored and operated as

part of the Silver Dollar Line until 1980's, when it was retired again.

It was in September 1999 that Rick Hamby, of West Plains, Missouri, visited Wallace Stone's Old Blacksmith Shop in Clarksridge, Arkansas, to purchase some old wagon wheels and saw the stage. A deal was struck and Hamby purchased the stage. He set out to authentically restore it and plan for

one more run.

After 11 months of restoration, with the help of many experts, the renovation was complete in August 2000.

The stage left the old Butterfield Stagecoach Depot in Springfield, Missouri, March 24. The stage is carrying advance ticketed passengers, some personal mail, and a strong box.

It has been 140 years since the stage has carried mail. This special mail will be delivered to Wyatt Earp's Old Tombstone Trading Post. The postage is \$25.00 per letter.

The Good Samaritan Boys Ranch donated mules, Jesse and Frank, for the Journey. Other mules, Bonnie & Clyde, and Kate and Cindy, were also added.

At the end of the road the mules will be auctioned off and the proceeds will go to the Good Samaritan Boys Ranch in Brighton, Missouri.

"Kate and Cindy are famous," said Dietsch. "They were in the movie Tombstone."

Dietsch said the mules travel about 7 miles an hour on level ground and in good conditions. "They can run the horses to death."

Eight head of saddle horses are also on the "Journey". Only four men are riding so horses can be swapped out.

"We have been very fortunate on this trip," said Dietsch. "People have been very kind to us. Almost everywhere we go we get home cooked meals. We've had chickens and a turkey given to us. We have also been fortunate that no one has gotten sick or hurt."

Dietsch said that so far the crew has run into only one bad rain storm. The over 50 mile per hour wind they faced on the Plains on Sunday was the worst weather they have had to brave up to

this point.

"This wind is terrible," said Dietsch. "It really makes you appreciate what the pioneers braved."

Coming into South Plains a cowboy could be seen riding on the west side of the stage holding onto a rope attached to the top railing of the stage. The cowboy held the tugging rope to stabilize the stage against the powerful winds.

Ahead of the stage was Dietsch setting up camp and trailers with extra horses and mules. The crew also stayed in a large trailer at night, which could also house the stage when the bunks are raised up.

"We stayed at one place where we were warned about the rattlesnakes," said Dietsch. It must have made an impression, because Dietsch said the crew were up in the trailer and in their bunks waiting for the sun to go down by 7:30 p.m.

"We tried to stick to the old stage line as much as possible in Missouri and Oklahoma," said Dietsch. "We stayed off of paved roads and main highways."

East of Centralia, Oklahoma the Journey was treated to an unusual kind of welcome. "They had heard about us coming," said Dietsch, "and some cowboys arranged a 'hold-up'. They came running at us from two side with the masks over their faces. We had heard they were going to do that so we marked a big bag with the words Gold and filled it with 10 pound of horse manure. When they told us to throw them the gold we did and they took off. They were interviewed live by the radio station and one of the robbers said, "It looks like we were expected. All we got was manure."

After the stage gets to Tombstone it will be brought back to Missouri in the trailer.

month and is still showing a profit for the year."

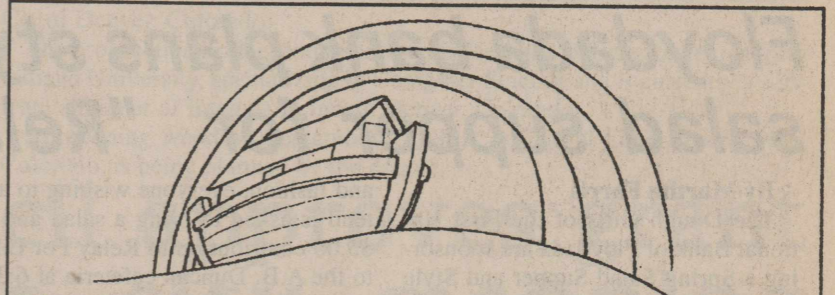
In other matters, the board accepted the bid of \$250 by Eliseo Guerra to purchase Lot 6, Block 53, Original Town, 406 E. Jackson.

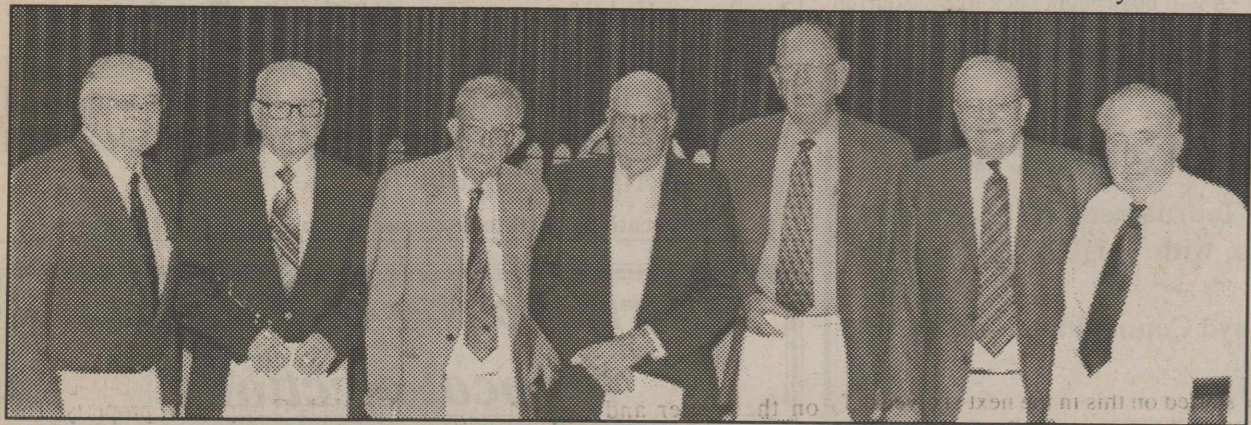

Steve Parker, with Cellular One Services, spoke to the council on the residential phone service being offered to residents by Cellular One. No action was taken by the council concerning this phone service.

The council opened up bids for a 1994 police car. Joe Castro bid \$765.00. Susie Sanchez bid \$1,005. Ricky Felan bid \$1,250 and was awarded the bid.

Council also appointed Robert McDonald to serve on the Mackenzie Municipal Water District.

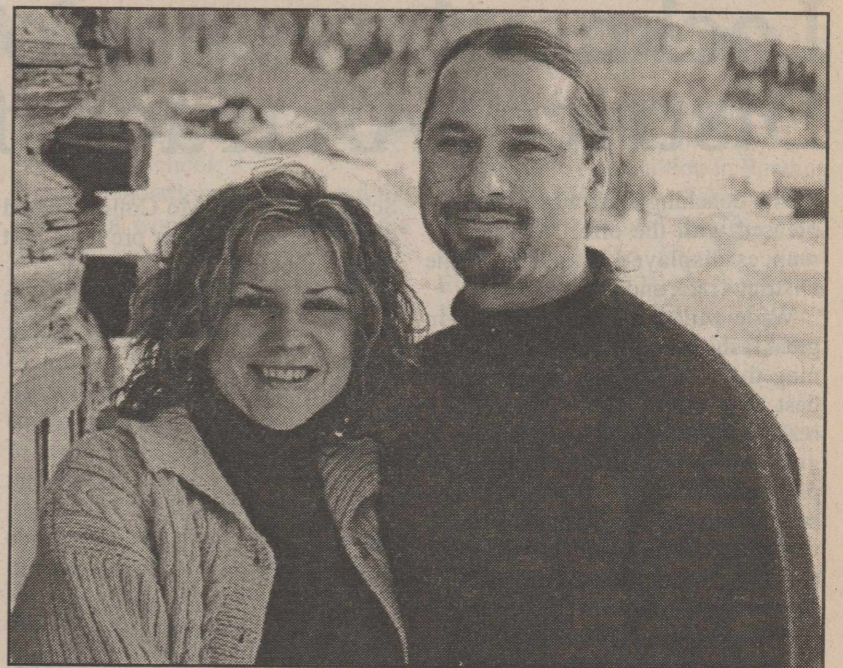
Plans for the Book Fair to take place

Floydada city council approves grant and contract for city mapping

The Floydada City Council met Tuesday, April 17, and unanimously approved a resolution and a contract for grant management services with A&J Howco Services, Inc. of Lubbock for the 2001 Texas Community Development Program.

Kay Howard of A&J Howco Services addressed the council explaining the need for a new city planning and capacity building grant. Howard said, "The last time a city wide plan was done, with grant money, was in 1982. We will be bringing it all up to date on everything that has occurred in the city since that time.

"This will include a base plan and mapping. You will be able to make any changes you need to, such as adding subdivisions, commercial or industrial areas. These plans will be available showing your streets and anticipated improvements on them, which includes a thoroughfare plan, since you have a highway going through your city," Howard added.

"There will also be a water plan that will show what you are producing and

what you might need in the future. A drainage plan (will be included), so that you will know what you might need, if you are doing any paving, or needing to build any drainage structures in the future.

"It will have a sewer plan and a Central Business District plan. There will be an Economic Development plan that you can utilize for future grants and Capital Improvements programs. A subdivision ordinance and a zoning ordinance will also be in these plans," Howard said.

Howard concluded, "The total package price will be \$57,500. The grant will pay for 85 percent of the cost and the city will pay for the other 15 percent, or \$7,500. We hope to get started on this in the next six weeks."

In other matters, Councilman Clark Schacht made the motion to permit City Manager Gary Brown to attend seven four day sessions of certified public manager classes over the next two years at a tuition cost of \$500 per session. It was seconded by Councilman Eric Cornelius and unanimously passed.

Brown explained, "There will be seven different subjects that will be taught, such as personnel, budgeting, etc. I would like to get involved in this. The sessions will involve homework and written reports."

Schacht made the motion to give the city manager authority to get estimates on the expense of surveying the city's districts in order to comply with the law of having approximately the same number of residents in each district. The motion was seconded by Councilman Sheldon Sue and passed unanimously.

The council discussed the amount to charge other entities who use the city's new van for hauling prisoners for work details. No action was taken on the matter and City Manager Brown said he would bring new figures to next month's meeting.

There was some discussion about whether to lower the water usage rates for the summer months. Schacht made the motion to leave the rates "as is." It was seconded by Sue and unanimously approved.

The council unanimously voted to change next month's meeting date from May 15 to May 8, because of the need to confirm the May 5 election returns.

Schacht made the motion to accept the recommendation by the Planning and Zoning Commission to close and deed over the two alley ways between Grover and Lee Streets in the West 100 Block and the West 200 block, but keep easements in case of future needs. Both alleys run through the Floydada Co-op Gin's property. The motion was seconded by Sue and unanimously passed.

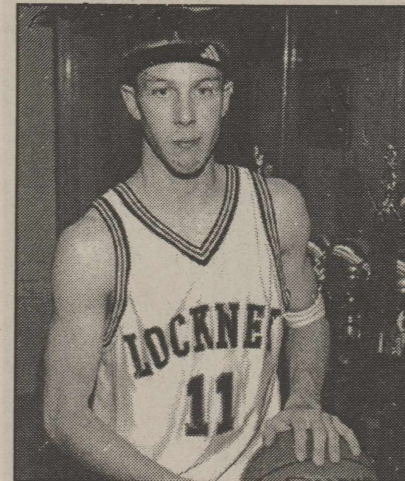

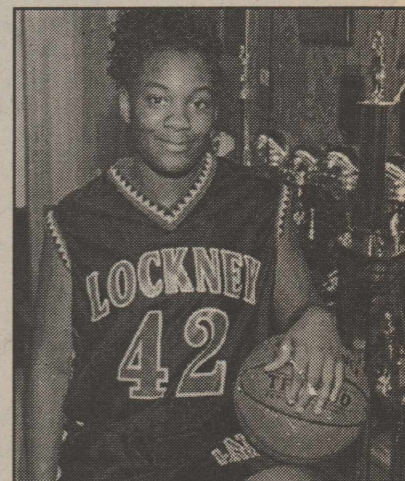

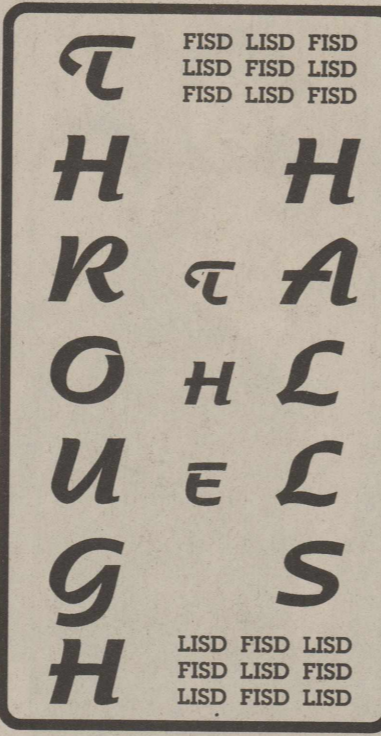

time to start thinking about what the policy would be for the school. "Are we going to supply vans and automobiles for the staff to use, or go to buses," said Lusk. "We need to think about what our policy will be."

After discussion the board voted to advertise for bids for a new pickup to see what kind of price the district could get. The board also agreed to consider policy when looking at bids.

Also on the agenda was the discussion of the purchase of property south of the community center. Mrs. George Taylor has offered to donate the property to the school if the school will pay closing and lawyer fees and a plaque in memory of her husband, Commissioner George Taylor.

The cost of closing and attorneys was estimated at \$1,047. The lot goes from 6th Street to 8th Street. In exchange for letting the city use the lot for the Texas Boll Weevil Office which may be located in the Community Center, the city will put gravel on the lot and put up a fence. If the plans stay on course the Boll Weevil office will lease the Community Center for 5 years.

After the office moves out of the community center the lot will then be used by the school.

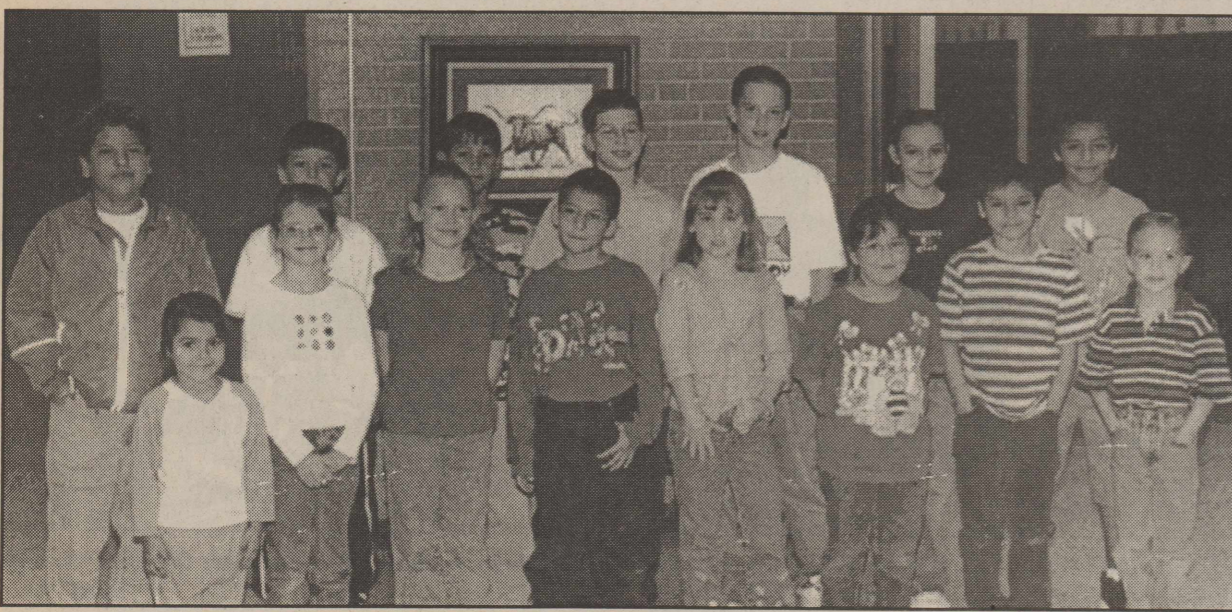
Mr. Poole said 9 students did not pass the TAAS writing test and 4 did not pass the reading test.

During the financial report the board reviewed the April financial statement showing a bank balance of \$455,135.19 and \$3,050,000.00 in CDs.

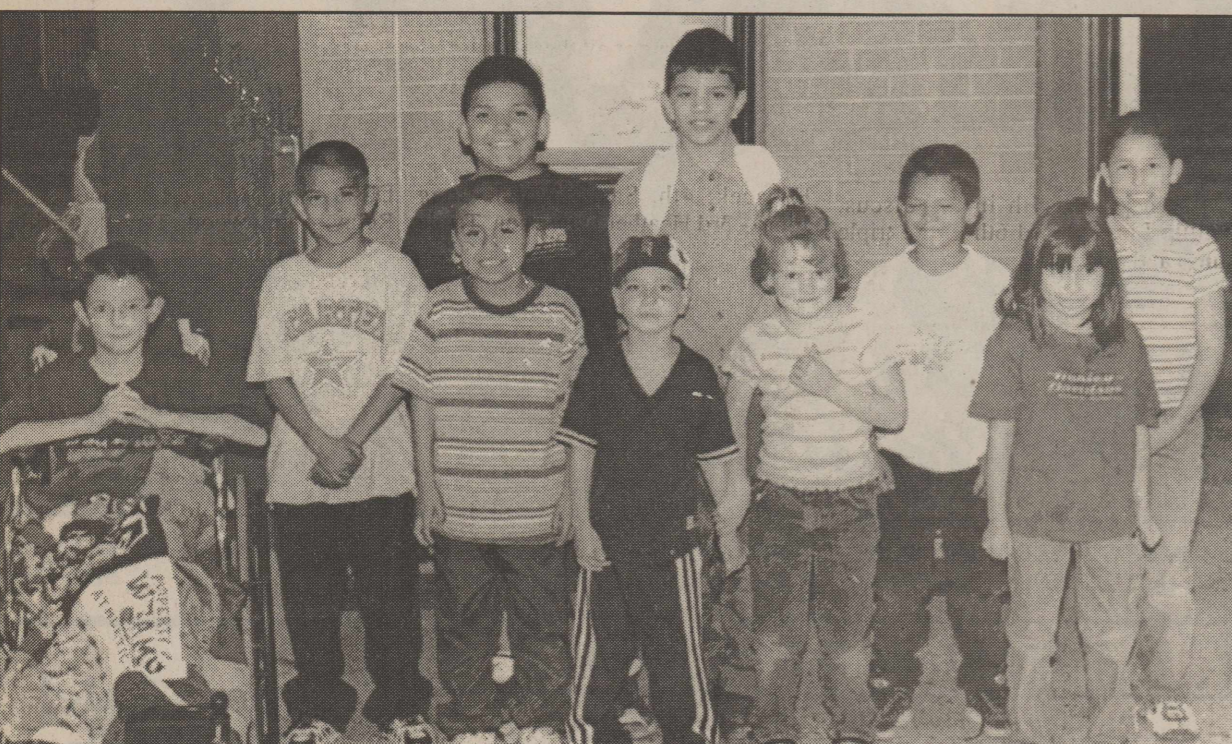
Mr. Lusk reminded the board that \$900,000 will be withheld from the State this year because of the loss in student enrollment.

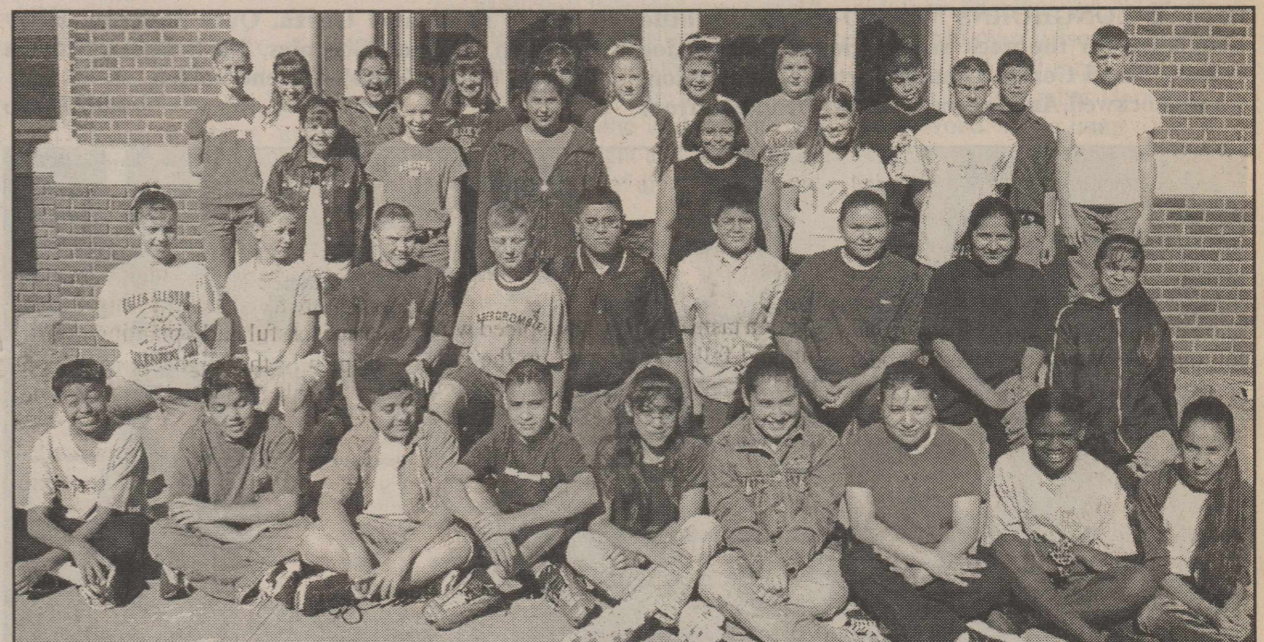

Cottonseed assistance applications coming

Cotton growers and cotton ginners interested in the latest on the 2000 Cottonseed Assistance Program can rest a little easier knowing that application forms are expected to be mailed as early as the week of April 23.

Information received from the United States Department of Agriculture indicates that all necessary information has been received and ginning across the Cotton Belt has essentially been completed.

Current projections still indicate around a \$15.50 per ton payment rate.

That amount is estimated to translate into payment rates somewhere between \$5.80 and \$5.95 per bale.

All applications will have to be returned by a date projected to be around May 18 before any payments will be issued. The May 18 date will allow approximately three weeks for eligible gins to complete and return their application forms.

Following this projected schedule cottonseed assistance payments are expected to be made by the first week or so of June.

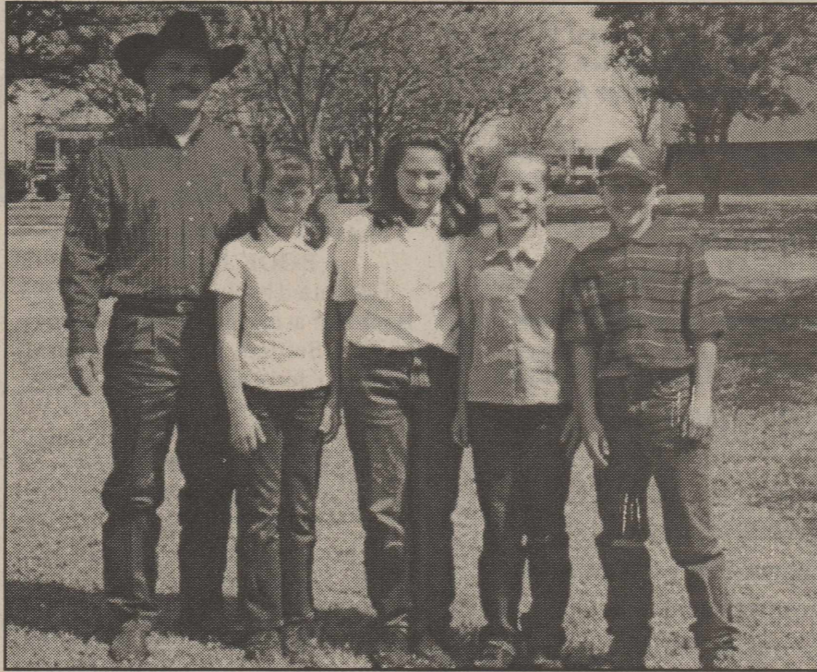
The line camp, which was awarded a Texas State Historical Marker in 1986, was the scene of two cowboy gunfights in its early history. The first involved two cowboys, Jim Harkey and Jim Barbee, who drew their pistols over the singing of Yankee Doodle in 1877. The second involved Harkey's younger brother, Mose, and Mr. and Mrs. Frank Drace in a tragic love triangle that left the cowhand dead and the family haunted in future wanderings.

Comanches, Apaches, and Kiowas likely danced a war dance or two and

made medicine while encamped at the springs during their raiding and buffalo hunting days. The hunters became the hunted when the U.S. Fourth Cavalry marched by the sheep springs in pursuit during the Red River Indian Wars of 1872-1874. It was taps, not gospel, that echoed off the canyon walls when the soldiers camped nearby.

The Cowboy Camp Meeting will reflect on those times when isolated ranch hands and pioneers couldn't get to church every Sunday. Once or twice a year, they would gather at places like Roaring Springs or Bloys Campground near Ft. Davis for a few days of singing and preaching, dinner on the ground, and lots of visiting. They renewed old friendships and made new alliances, some of which resulted in marriages between their young people.

For a taste of yesterday, spiced with fun and fellowship, load up the kids and the lawn chairs and come to Mott Creek Ranch, located 12 miles west of Matador on US 70/62 and three miles north on a gravel road. Cotton planting just around the corner

Growers across the High Plains are prepared to hit the ground running as soil temperatures have been hovering near acceptable levels for several days.

With soil temperatures reaching the 10-day average minimum of 60 degrees, Dr. Randy Boman, Extension Cotton Specialist for the High Plains region, warns growers to carefully weigh the pros and cons of early planting.

He notes that soil temperatures make up only one part of the equation with soil moisture conditions and seed quality are also being key ingredients to a successful early planting effort.

Typically the High Plains regions targets a planting window from late-April through late-May.

So far the High Plains region is expected to plant virtually the same number of acres as seen in 2000 although that figure could change slightly as growers weigh the attractiveness of corn contracts offered in some Northern counties. As expected the lack of economically attractive cropping alternatives will drive the overall cotton acreage figure.

Not yet calculated are the effect higher input costs and continued low prices will have on the yields targeted by growers in 2001.

Logic dictates that with low prices growers need to push for additional pounds to offset the income gap that is created. The 2001 crop year cold

change that way of thinking. With the two main elements of higher yields, fertilizer and water, expected to be considerably more expensive due to increased energy costs many growers are thinking twice about their 2001 yield expectations and what it will cost to achieve them.

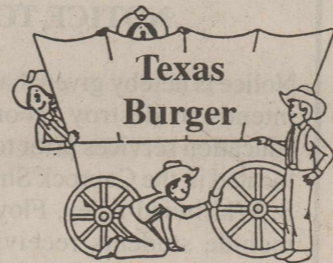

Denim section 18 approved by EPA

Texas Department of Agriculture Pesticide Registration Program Director Charlie Thomas announced that the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) has approved a FIFRA Section 18 Emergency Specific Exemption request for the use of Emamectin Benzoate (DENIM 0.16 EC Insecticide, EPA Reg. No. 100-903) to control heet armyworm on cotton in Texas.

Thomas says, according to the exemption, DENIM may be used as needed when thresholds meet economic importance through October 1, 2001.

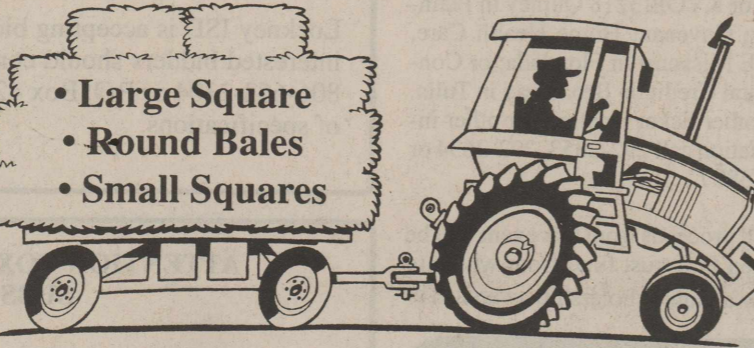
Certified applicators or licensed applicators or persons working under the direct supervision of a licensed applicator must make applications. The EPA approval notice must be in possession of the applicator at the time of application.

This is the third year TDA has requested and EPA has approved the use of DENIM Insecticide under an emer-

gency specific exemption.

Syngenta Crop Protection is making progress toward FIFRA Section 3 (federal) registration. TDA hopes use of this product after the 2001 use season shall be under federal label instead of an emergency specific exemption.

Brought to you by Floydada EMS Lights And Sirens Mean Pull To The Right

Driving down the street during rush hour, you turn down the car stereo because you think you hear a siren. Looking for the source of the siren, you see an ambulance coming up behind you in your rear-view mirror. What should you do?

As part of Texas EMS Week, Floydada EMS and the Texas Department of Health remind drivers that Texas law requires all vehicles to carefully pull over to the right side of the road and stop when an emergency vehicle with lights flashing and sirens sounding approaches, whether the emergency vehicle is a police car, a fire truck or an ambulance. This law applies on all roadways, including freeways. The only time state law does not require drivers to pull over for emergency vehicles is if a median separates you and the emergency vehicle.

The reason for this law is simple. While the emergency vehicle is responding to someone's call for emergency help, its speed may be above the legal speed limit and it may need to turn at any time, including in front of you. If you pull to the right and stop, this will give the emergency vehicle a clear driving path to proceed to the emergency. Consistently pulling to the right and stopping for emergency vehicles also will help other drivers see the emergency vehicle.

"We know that people in Floydada expect us to respond as quickly as possible when they need help," said Paul Moore. "When the other traffic on the road pulls to the right and stops, letting us know that the way is clear for our emergency vehicle to come on through, then we can respond that much quicker."

BBB warns of the traveling Gypsy Pavers

Just like the winds of spring, the "gypsy pavers" have blown into the South Plains. These traveling families usually drive new or nearly new pickup trucks from out of state and peddle their "leftover" materials outside the city limits. Over the years, they have gotten smart and started using "Texas" license plates and may even set up temporary offices with a business license to make themselves look legitimate, but the Bureau advises that you do your homework before giving them any money.

Here are a few tell-tale signs that they may be "conning" you: If it sounds too good to be true, it probably is; If you are being pressured into making a decision; If you are not being given straight answers OR not being given an answer to a direct question; Will not submit any information in writing or put promises in a contract; They want cash or make check out to an individual and to be paid in full, up front; They "name drop" (always check references);

- They refuse to give you a phone number or address where their "company" is located.

If you have been contacted recently by someone appearing to be a gypsy traveler, or have had recent dealings with someone purportedly selling leftover materials to pave your road or driveway, call the sheriff's office in your area or if they are selling within the city limits, call the police department immediately.

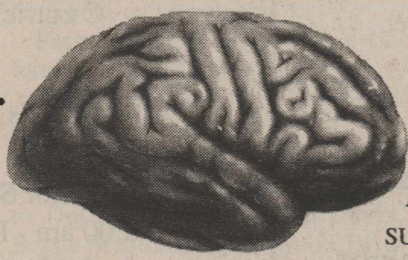

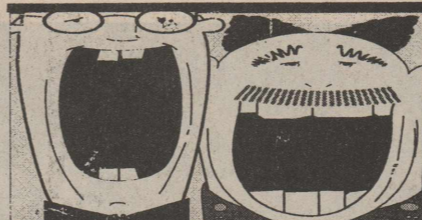

Lockney City Council votes to reimburse Fire Department

cilwoman Tina Graves voted against the motion. Because Councilman Junior Brotherton was not present, Mayor Gary Marr broke the tie and voted in favor of Copeland's motion.

The bill in question concerns equipment purchased by the fire department a year ago. According to council members, the firemen found out their equipment was not as good as it should be while attending a fire school and while fighting the church fire in Floydada last year.

"There were areas the firemen could not go into at the church fire because their equipment was not adequate for those areas," said Councilwoman Graves.

"One of the helmets also melted at a fire school."

According to the council the fire department then purchased \$23,000 worth of equipment without checking with the council first. A bill was then brought to the council with the expectation that the council would pay it.

Shortly thereafter, at the next meeting of councilmen, Volunteer Firemen Aaron Wilson and Craig Ellison came to the council and said they felt the department had handled that bill wrong and the department would pay for the equipment.

The subject was never brought up again by the council until now.

This council meeting was requested by Anderson and Marr after the two had met with firemen two weeks ago. Anderson said at that time he was asked why the council didn't pay for our equipment last year. "I told them because you said you were going to pay for it," said Anderson. "They said, you still should have brought it before the council and brought it up for a vote. So that is what we are doing now."

"I'm not comfortable being blind sided," said Stapp. "I've already made it clear that I want to work with them, but I'm not going to change my mind now. I believe the city's number one concern is to stay solvent. We should operate in the black every year. At the end of the year, if our budget is where we can pay for the equipment, then I'm in favor of reimbursing them."

But I won't vote for this until I know we can afford it," Graves agreed with Stapp and said, "I remember being told they would pay."

This has been handled so very badly. It is against every policy we have. We couldn't go off and spend \$23,000 without taking bids.

"I don't think we should furnish them with an open ended checkbook," said Copeland.

"We have an obligation to buy their equipment even if they didn't do it right," said Anderson. "It is important to have good relations and to work as a team, and I think this is our responsibility."

"The fire department leadership is not dropping this issue," said Marr. "They are using this as a wedge with the city. This has become something for them to rally around."

"It is a wedge," said Anderson. "They won't talk to Tina (Councilman Graves), who is their departmental contact. We could eliminate that wedge."

"That is true," said Graves. "They won't talk to me. Before the equipment issue came up I asked them and asked them if they needed anything and I was told 'No'. I told them the talks on the budget were coming up and asked if they needed anything. I was told 'No'."

"I don't believe reimbursing the department is going to make the relationship any better," said Stapp. "We need to properly plan spending this type of money. I think if we start to plan now on getting the city in a position to buy a fire truck, then that would improve relations with the department—if they knew we were moving in that direction."

"I want to make it clear that I'm not trying to heal wounds," said Anderson. "I really believe it is our responsibility to get the equipment."

"And I'm not interested in punishing anyone," said Stapp. "I just want to stay solvent and recognize our priorities."

it," said Anderson. "I would have voted then to pay for it."

Seeing the vote would probably go against the fire department Graves said, "I'm not ready to jump off and spend \$23,000 of CD money. What if there was an emergency? Maybe we could pay half now and half later."

"I don't like guessing—hoping it will work," said Stapp. "we need to stay in budget and not operate a little behind every year."

"I agree," said Marr. "We shouldn't operate on just a need basis. We need to plan."

Anderson also expressed concern that the current flap between the city and the department might jeopardize fund raising efforts.

The council was grateful for the donations that are given to the fire department for equipment, ambulance and fire trucks. "We could never take care of the department like it should be without those donations," said Stapp. "A fire truck will cost at least \$150,000."

The city's budget for the fire department this year was \$26,000. Last year the city spent \$30,000. According to Marr, the city gives \$250.00 a month to the fire department plus pays the bills. The county pays \$750.00 a month to the department plus \$200 for every fire the department fights for the county.

According to Stapp, the fire department now has approximately \$70,000 in CDs, which according to council would help pay for a new ambulance.

After Anderson's motion to pay the bill and the lack of a second, Copeland made his motion to pay half now and half next year.

"I'm against this," said Stapp. "I want to make sure the money is there at the end of the year."

"I agree," said Graves. "We should wait until September. Why right now? The bill has already been paid. We can wait another 6 months. I'm not opposed to paying it, but we should hold tight to what we decided in the budget. I will support it when I know the money is there."

Because of the tie vote, Mayor Marr was forced to vote. "I don't normally get to vote," said Marr. "I respect your opinion on holding the line on the budget, but I believe we should pay it."

In other issues before the council, the cost of repair of a city pickup was discussed.

"We need to start looking at either repair, or buying a used or new pickup," said Marr.

"That is more money we are going to have to spend," said Stapp. "We are also going to have to buy a new police car soon."

The council also discussed the future of the baby pool at the city swimming pool. Because of new mandates calling for a separate filtering system for the baby pool, at a cost of \$2,000 to \$3,500, the council had already decided not to open the baby pool. The discussion now centered on what to do with the hole.

Mayor Marr was concerned about liability issues of an open hole without water and a number of possibilities were discussed. Proposed were alternatives of filling in with sand, concrete, or covering with plywood.

"I've been asked not put in sand because kids go from the sand box to the pool," said Graves.

"The least expensive thing is concrete," said Marr. "If we are looking at a long term fix then concrete would be the best thing. If we are looking at short term and then see if someone else wants to pick up the expense—then sand and plywood might be the answer."

"It is immaterial to me whether we fill it or not," said Stapp.

"I don't think we should fill it permanently," said Anderson. "What if we were able to operate it one day? We shouldn't destroy an asset. If we filled it, then it would be a big deal to reinvent the baby pool."

"Why do anything to it," said Graves. "Whatever we filled it with would cost money. I don't want to spend anything. Let's just let it be for now."

The council was unanimous in their decision to take no action on filling in the pool at this time.
