Rainfall fills playas and floods roads

The northern areas of Floyd County were hit the hardest by heavy rainfall Thursday and Friday, May 3-4.

Ray Macha, who lives about two miles south of Providence, told the Hesperian-Beacon, "We received between 7.5 to 8.0 inches of rain on Thursday evening and Friday morning. Water was running high and swift between two playa lakes near our home."

Floyd County has not received this much rain in this short of time since October, 1986. Many county roads were turned into rivers after Thursday's downpour. Fields were completely under water in the Providence and Finney communities, and in several other areas of the county.

The city of Lockney reported 5.5 inches of rainfall. Aiken received 4 inches, while Muncy and South Plains both reported over 3 inches of rain. The rest of the county received moderate amounts.

Manager Tom Davey of the Mackenzie Municipal Water Author-

ity said, "The Mackenzie Lake has risen 5 feet this last weekend. This brings the lake's water total height to 82 feet. We are still below what we want, but we are glad to receive this amount."

"Mackenzie Lake can hold a total of 150 feet of water and we have only seen it at 115 feet. We would like to have seen even more water come into the lake, but not all the water shed from Floyd County enters the lake," Davey explained.

Davey said, "Fishing at the lake is great and record catches have been reported this past week of large mouth bass from 7 to 12 pounds."

In October, 1986, Lockney received 11 to 12 inches of rain in a 24 hour period. Entire communities were inundated with flood waters and fields of cotton and pumpkins were covered and ruined. Mrs. Harley Workman, who lived east of Lockney in 1986, said about the flood then, "This is the worst flood since the flood of 1941."

In the 1986 flood, hail stones were measured from 3 to 4 inches long and 1 1/2 inches of rain was reported in South Plains.

County will be recognized with Marker

The Texas Historical Commission (THC) has recognized "Coronado in Blanco Canyon" as a significant part of Texas history by awarding it an official Texas Historical Marker.

The designation honors "Coronado in Blanco Canyon" as an important and educational part of local history.

The Floyd County Historical Museum and The Floyd County Historical Commission will host an Open House and Reception at the Museum located North of the Courthouse on the square in Floydada on Friday, May 25, 2001, 1 p.m. until 4 p.m.

Following the Open House and reception, a dedication ceremony to commemorate "Coronado in Blanco Canyon" will be held at 5:30 p.m. at the Roadside Park, 5 1/2 miles south of Floydada on U.S. Highway 62 and Texas Highway 207.

"The official Texas Historical Marker program helps bring attention to community treasures and the importance of their preservation," said Larry Oaks, executive director of the THC. "Awareness and education are among the best ways to guarantee the preservation of our state's history. This designation is a tool that will increase public awareness of important cultural resources," Oaks said.

A subject qualifies for a marker if two basic criteria are met: historical significance and age. Historical significance is established by reviewing its role and importance in local history, and the age requirement depends on the topic. The THC's official Texas Marker policies are outlined in the Official Texas Historical Marker Guidelines and Application Form, which may be obtained by contacting the History Programs Division, Texas Historical Commission, at 512/463-5853 or visiting the web site at www.the.state.tx.us.

"It is vital that as we move forward, we do not forget our past. Not only will the Texas Historical Marker provide awareness in the community of our fascinating history, but it will become a building block for the promotion of local tourism," said Nancy Marble, Chair, Floyd County Historical Commission.



Blood drive to benefit Chad Harmon

A blood drive for Chad Harmon, of Floydada, is being held at the First Baptist Church, Friday, May 11, from 11:30 a.m. to 6:30 p.m., in the parlor. Chad, 22, is a 1997 graduate of Floydada High School and was a senior at Hardin Simmons University. He had to quit school with approxi-

mately one month before he graduated, after he was diagnosed with Wegener's Disease.

Wegener's is a very rare tissue disease. According to Chad's mother, Donna Harmon, only 1 in 50,000 to 100,000 people are diagnosed with Wegener's.

Chad is currently in Methodist Hospital undergoing chemotherapy and

Amado Morales wins in FISD Pct. 4 race

The only one contested race in Floydada was between FISD Pct 4 incumbent Amado Morales and challenger Charlene Brown.

Morales won the race with 120

votes and Brown garnered 66. Thirty-two percent of the 576 voters in Pct. 4 cast their ballots.

There are 2,850 registered voters in all of the Floydada School District.

Old Settler's luncheon to be catered this year

Visitors to the annual Old Settler's Reunion, May 26, will notice a big change in the traditional noon meal this year.

For the first time the noon meal will be catered by Danny's Hens and Fins, instead of prepared and served by Travis Jones and "friends". The changes have come about because of a shortage of workers.

"Without all the help necessary to gather wood, dig the pit, and prepare

the meat, etc., the home-cooked barbecue meal needs to be changed," said Jones.

"We appreciate the help that everyone has given through the past 11 years. I can't count the number of volunteers and the hours donated toward digging the pit, preparing the beef, and serving the meal to hundreds of people each year. We are so grateful to each one of them."

Lockney citizens approve sales tax in low turnout

Only 23% of Lockney's registered voters turned out Saturday to cast their vote for or against the 1/2 cent sales tax issue before the citizens. The majority of those voting were in favor of the sales tax. The issue was carried with 166 for and 92 against.

In District 4, the only contested race of the City Council, Ginger Mathis beat out incumbent Councilman Bill Anderson with 100 votes to Anderson's 29. There are 296 eligible voters in District 4.

Lockney Mayor Gary Marr was running at-large and unopposed and received 207 votes.

District 5 Councilman Rodger Stapp was also running unopposed and received 36 votes. There are 275 registered voters in Dist. 5.

Only 265 of the 1,166 voters regis-

tered in the City of Lockney showed up at City Hall to vote.

SCHOOL BOARD

Only 21% of those eligible to vote for Lockney School Board cast their ballots. Out of 1,608 registered voters, 333 cast their ballots in the School Board races.

In the At Large race between incumbent Mike Mathis and challenger Moses Blanco, Mathis won with 225 votes and Blanco received 94.

In Pct. 3, Raymon Cortez and Aaron Wilson were both vying for the position vacated by Louie Bybee. Wilson received 85 votes and Raymon Cortez received 18. Pct. 3 has 339 registered voters.

In Pct. 4, incumbent Trustee Bernie Ford was running unopposed. He received 106 votes. Pct. 4 has 400 registered voters.

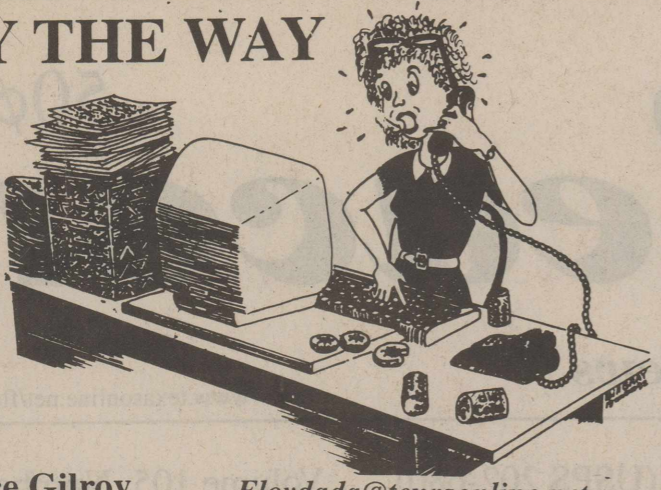
Correction

"Yeah! I only got \$1 too. It is unfair that he got seven times more than me." The seventh man cried, "Why should he get \$7 back when I only got \$2?"

The nine men formed an outraged mob, surrounding the 10th man. The first four men followed the lead of the others: "We didn't get any of the \$20. Where is our share?" The nine angry men carried the 10th man up to the top of a hill and lynched him.

The next night, the nine remaining men met at the restaurant for dinner. But when the bill came, there was no one to pay it.

The Texas Senate has now joined the House of Representatives in passing one of the stupidest pieces of legislation to ever come down the pike.

Five Republican Senators joined all 15 Democratic Senators in giving approval to a so-called "hate crimes" bill. About the only thing that now stands in the way of its ultimate approval by the Legislature is an agreement, by the House, to amendments placed on the bill in the Senate.

That, and the courage of Gov. Rick Perry. If he has the courage to stand tall, this dangerous piece of legislation may yet end up in the dust bin of history. If not, it will plague this state from now on.

Senate amendments made the bill even sillier than the version that came out of the House of Representatives.

Those amendments do such things as: require the Texas Education Agency to create "anti-hate courses" for schools and the general public, allow judges to send those convicted under the bill to anti-hate classes, requires the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals (the appeals court of last resort in criminal matters) to "train" prosecutors in "hate crime" law.

"Anti-hate" legislation is now all the rage. Its purpose has been clear from the beginning: an effort to consolidate and coordinate the passions of the left-wing of American politics. To that end the movement has energized various groups that might not otherwise have much in common.

Most of the political energy expended in support for "hate-crime" legislation has been indicated in the

so-called "gay and lesbian" community and in the political "leadership" of the black community. The bill now given approval in the Texas Senate grew out of an attempt by opponents of former Governor (and now President) George Bush to embarrass and damage the Governor on the eve of his Presidential bid.

Bush was successful in keeping the legislation from seeing the light of day during the time he was governor, and his opponents can now draw attention to the fact, or the claim, that upon Bush's departure they were able to pass the legislation. How any Republican member of the Senate can fail to recognize that fact is, quite frankly, beyond us. But five of them did, or do.

The legislation is simply another

example of cluttering up the law books with unneeded legislation. Laws already on the books address the crimes addressed in this "hate-crimes" atrocity. It is already against the law for one person to kill another, or assault another. People already go to the gas chamber for murder. People already serve jail time for assault. The legislation is nothing more than "feel-good" legislation, designed to satisfy hate mongers on the one hand and, on the other hand, provide cover for the less courageous members of the Legislature.

What is done is done, but all is not lost, yet. It is our hope that the House of Representatives will not agree to the silly amendment placed on the legislation in the Senate. Failing that, we hope Governor Rick Perry will do the right thing, and veto the bill.

Letter to the Editor

Dear Editor:

I was disappointed that Lockney citizens voted to create a new 1/2 percent sales tax in a thin turnout.

Fifty years from now, Lockney will have a population of 0, the same, or 100,000 and she will still be paying this "Economic Development Tax".

Along the way, someone will say, "it's not working, so a full 1 percent increase will work better". Or someone else will say, "it's working, so let's keep it going or increase it better yet." New taxes never go away- just ask Floydada or Matador, who still pay a "hospital tax" and yet no longer have a hospital.

The authors of this tax say Lockney is at a disadvantage because of its size, resources or infrastructure, and that she needs to be able to provide roads and buildings for prospective businesses. Lockney has a well-maintained 4-lane, divided highway leading from Plainview, which thus far hasn't precipitated growth. Also, providing businesses with roads, buildings or other materials amounts to Lockney capitalizing business. In other words, access to capital without bearing the risk.

To the contrary, Lockney's principal disadvantage is its location- it is not between major centers of com-

merce. Lockney is between Plainview and Floydada (or Matador). Tulia and Abernathy, on the other hand, are on Interstate 27 and between Amarillo, Lubbock and Plainview. They will eventually grow on this basis, if these larger cities continue to grow.

What will endow Lockney with growth, success or a more secure tax base is uncertain. In the past though, a business-friendly and LOW tax environment has helped other cities. Maybe Internet businesses, which don't depend so much on location, might be an option.

Admittedly, this tax increase will, at the least, have little negative effect (but mainly because Lockney consumers make most of their retail purchases in Plainview and Lubbock anyway). Still, it's the principal of the thing.

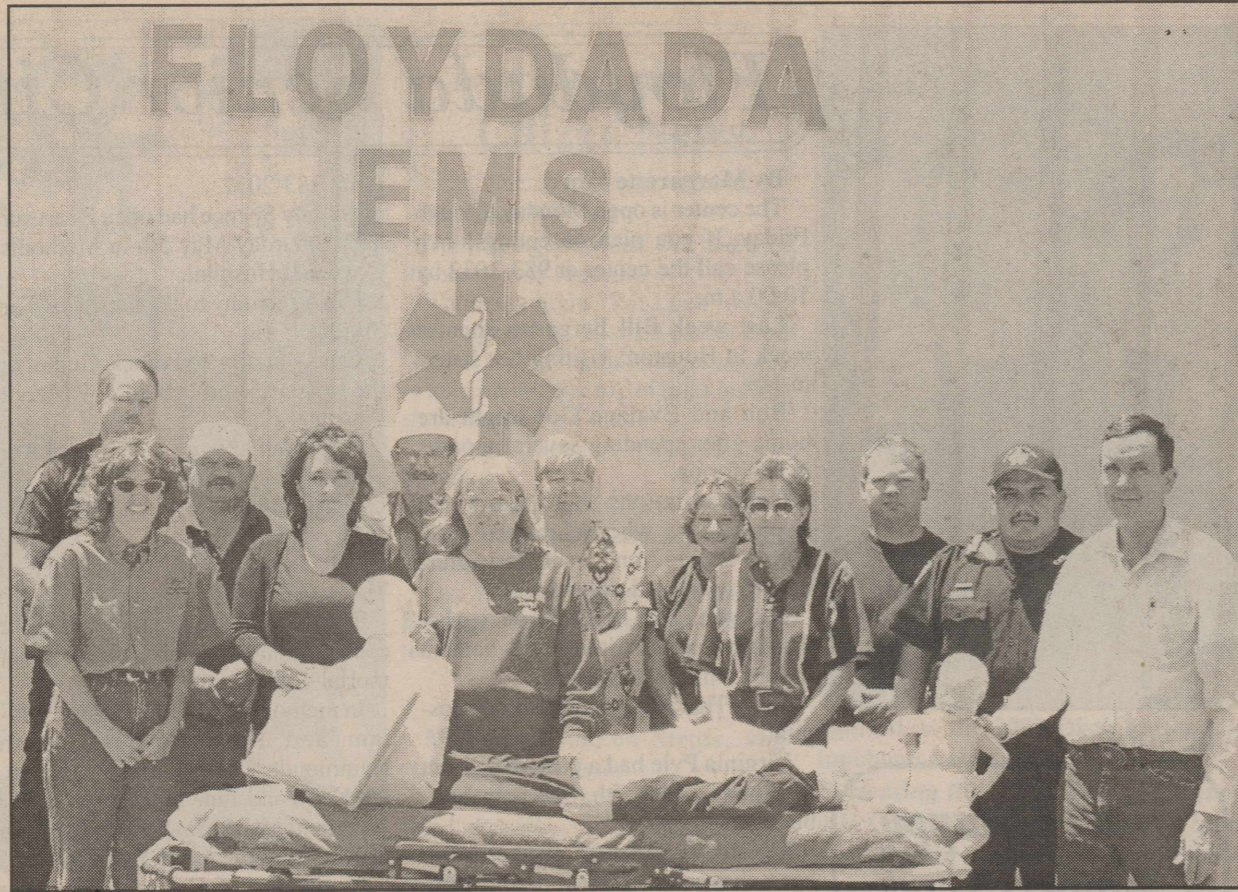

TRAINING UNITS DONATED TO FLOYDADA POLICE, FIREMEN, AND EMS-The Floydada EMS hopes to train at least 100 citizens in the surrounding counties on what to do when a person has a heart attack. The training program was greatly enhanced when the National Automobile Dealers Charitable Foundation and the Texas Automobile Dealers Association and as their representatives, City Auto and Floydada Ford-Mercury, presented a Resusci Anne training unit to the Floydada EMS, a Resusci Baby Anne training unit to the Floydada Fire Department, and a Little Anne Four Pack training unit to the Floydada Police Department in formal ceremonies Monday, May 7. In presenting the CPR units, which is essential for cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) training, Director of Floydada EMS Paul Moore said, "If the right kind of treatment can be given a heart attack victim within seconds after he or she is stricken, the chances are good that the life can be saved. CPR training teaches a person how to keep the heart beating while professional help is coming." Moore said that since the massive involvement of Americans training in CPR, there has been an increase in long term survivors from ventricular fibrillation. There are many cases where the training is given to citizens showing that many heart attack victims who otherwise would have died have been saved and returned to normal activities. The training takes from three to five hours of intensive practice and lectures. Fast growing Hispanic population look to Social Security benefits for retirement

The Hispanic population is living longer and becoming more diverse. The older Hispanic population is one of the fastest growing groups in the nation. In 1990, 5.1 percent of the Hispanic population was 65 or older. Demographers expect that this number will reach 14.1 percent by 2020.

Since the Hispanic elderly population will be the second most rapidly growing segment of the aged population between 1990 and 2020, Social Security is especially important. Without Social Security, the poverty rate for elderly Hispanic beneficiaries would increase from 18 percent to 59 percent. Social Security is

the only source of retirement income for 39 percent of Hispanic Americans.

Hispanics face different situations than the majority of the population when it comes to retirement.

• Hispanics tend to have lower earnings than the majority of the population resulting in lower benefits. They also have less pension coverage.

• Also, despite a generally lower socioeconomic situation, life expectancies for Hispanics at age 65 are greater than for the general population. (In 2000, the average 65-year-old Hispanic man could expect to live to about age 84, compared to age 81 for the majority of men. Hispanic women age 65 can expect to live to age 87, compared to 85 for white

women.)

Hispanics benefit from the Social Security retirement program in several ways.

• The Social Security system is a progressive system, returning a greater percentage of pre-retirement earnings to a lower wage worker than to a higher wage worker. Since Hispanics are disproportionately low wage workers, they receive back more benefits in relation to past earnings than do high-wage earners.

• Hispanics benefit from the guaranteed benefit that is adjusted for inflation. With longer life expectancies, Hispanics will live more years in retirement and benefit more from Social Security's cost-of-living protections.

Senator Madla introduces Bill to protect homeowners from incompetent contractors

In response to issues and concerns raised by homeowners, Texas State Senator Frank Madla, filed S.B. 1557, "The Residential Building Contractors Bill".

Texas is one of only a few states that currently do not license homebuilders or remodeling contractors.

"This Bill will provide an effective complaint process with the intent of protecting the public against incompetent and inexperienced contractors and the unlawful and fraudulent acts of residential contractors," said Madla.

The bill, will establish the following:

- State Regulatory Board
- Grounds for Removal
- Public Interest Information
- Complaint Process
- Equal Employment Opportunity
- Standards

- Conduct
- Public Access to the Board
- Licensing Requirements including an Examination
- Disciplinary Proceedings
- Both Civil & Criminal Penalties
- Continuing Education
- Restrictions on Advertising - to prohibit false, misleading, or deceptive practices.

Consumer rights have been eroded with the adoption of the Residential Construction Liability Act (RCLA) providing more protection for the builder than the homeowner. Recently, claiming that a standard of habitability is too great, one of the largest homebuilders, in the country has asked the Texas Supreme Court for relief from the State Law of Implied Warranty for good workmanship and habitability. Additionally, homebuyers are signing builder contracts that contain a binding arbitration clause, which de-

prives them of their 7th amendment Constitutional right to a trial by jury if the builder fails to honor his warranty obligations.

Senate Bill S.B. 1557, will help re-establish consumer confidence with the home building industry, provide a measure of accountability and has the potential of increasing the quality of homes.

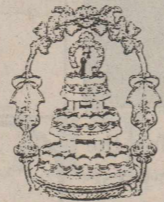
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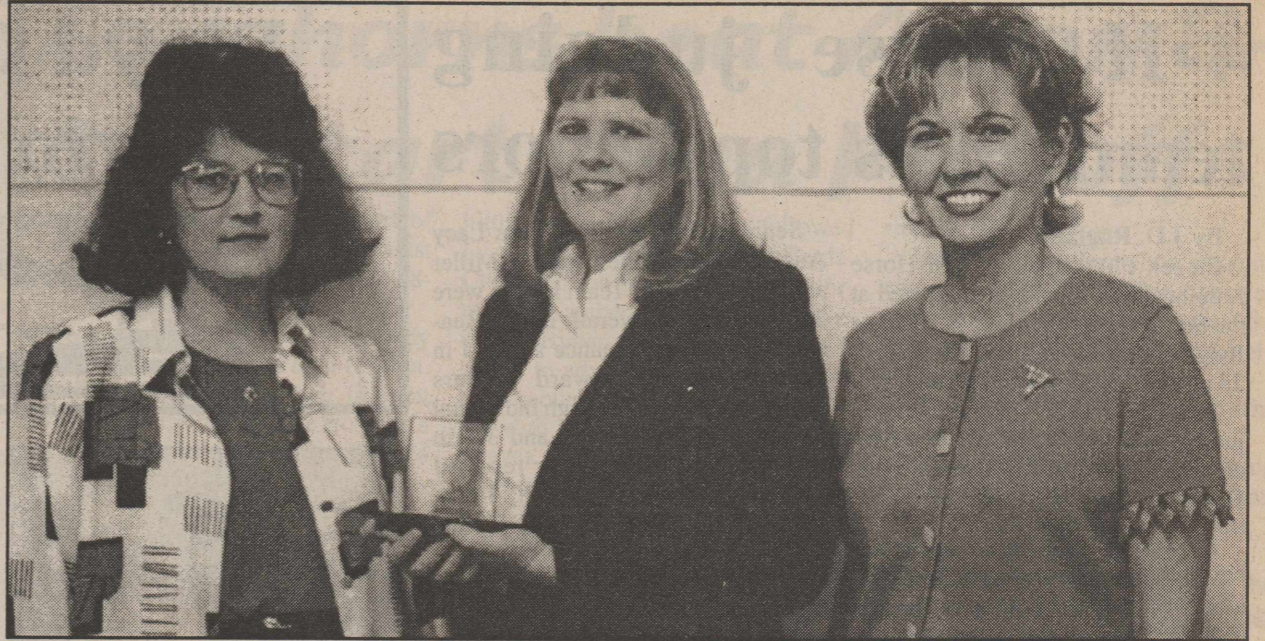

Junior I Division: Cheyann Powell judged as an individual where she received High Individual Overall, 1st in Halter and 1st in Performance.

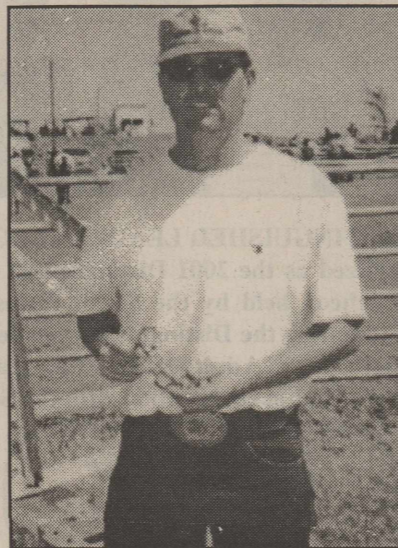

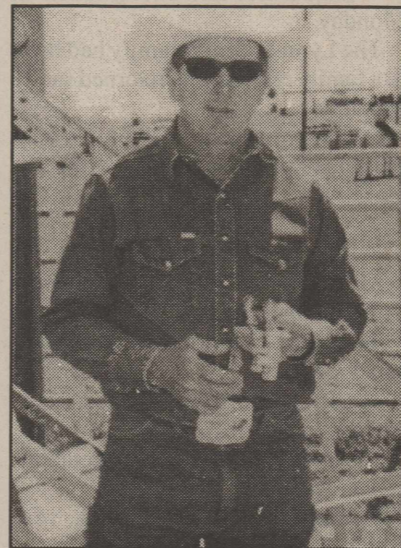

Texas Parks and Wildlife is looking to lease lands

Lockney-Landowners should be aware that there is another customer out there that is willing to lease their land. The Texas Parks & Wildlife Department (TPWD) is attempting to increase the amount of acreage available for public hunting by leasing private property through a program called the Short-Term hunting Lease Program.

Approximately 98% of the state's acreage is privately owned so that leaves a relatively small amount of land open for public hunting. This program benefits both landowners and hunters alike. It gives landowners another potential leasing customer and provides hunters who purchase a TPWD (\$40) Annual Public Hunting Permit (APH) access to hunting lands.

The program started in 1994 and it's initial purpose was to secure lands for dove hunting along the I-35 corridor in Central Texas but has since spread throughout the state and now includes other species such as quail, pheasants, and waterfowl. There are some requirements that go along with the program; hunters would be required to purchase an APH. These permits have been around for several years and give hunters access to several thousand acres throughout the state. Approximately 38,000 of these permits are sold across the state each year.

The short-term hunting lease is a contract between TPWD and a private landowner. The landowner agrees to allow APH Permit holders to hunt certain game animals on their property for a certain period of time. TPWD agrees to pay a set fee for access and agrees to post signs on the boundary, designated roads and parking areas, restricted areas or other areas identified in the lease agreement. The agreement does not mean that a biologist or a game warden will be on site during a hunt, but staff personnel will periodically monitor the site and be available if problems arise. Also, activities such as camping, building fires, and consumption of alcoholic beverages are not allowed.

Landowners concerned about liability risks should not be worried. Recently, the Texas legislature enacted statutes that offer additional liability

protection to landowners who lease recreational rights. Also if the total income from all recreational uses (including hunting rights) does not exceed the annual ad valorem taxes assessed on the property for the prior year, the landowner does not assume additional liability risks, and each purchaser of an APH is provided with a disclaimer of liability whose acceptance holds both the TPWD and the landowner harmless from injuries that may occur on the property as a result of public hunting activity.

How much does TPWD pay for leases? Well it depends. According to Charlie Newberry, TPWD Wildlife Biologist "In recent years lease prices have been between \$2 to \$5 per acre" said Newberry. "The price will depend on a number of things such as size of the property, game species, hunt dates, habitat quality, ease of public access and location." All properties will be considered but those within 60 miles of larger towns and are about 100-400 acres are preferred.

Potential dove leases should have a food source, such as grain, sunflower or other annual weeds, with some roosting cover and/or a reliable water source. Sites must have a public access point where vehicles can be parked and where hunters can access the property.

Sign up deadline is July 1st. Landowners interested in this program or any other wildlife or range management questions should contact Charlie Newberry at 806-652-2770.

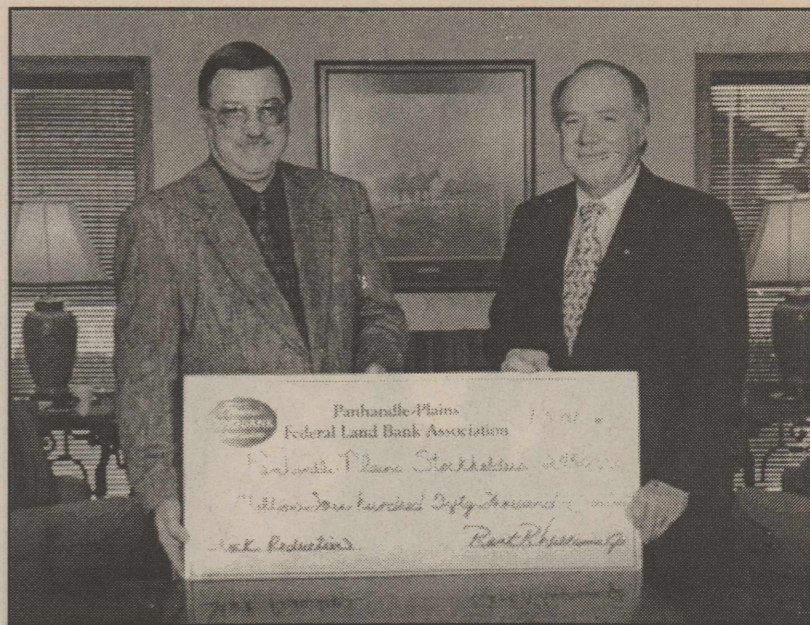

Rate reductions highlight at FLBA annual meeting

Panhandle-Plains Federal Land Bank Association held its annual stockholders meeting April 28th at the Ambassador Hotel in Amarillo. The facility was filled again this year with some 200 borrowers, family members, guests, and staff.

Chairman Jerry Oswalt presented the Board's report which highlighted accomplishments for the association in 2000. Stockholders re-elected Jerry Oswalt of Abernathy to Place 7, Wayne Garrett of Gruver to Place 2, and Walter "Rusty" Henson of Quitaque to Place 9. Entertainment was provide throughout the evening by the Country and Western group, "Blue Prairie," from Lubbock.

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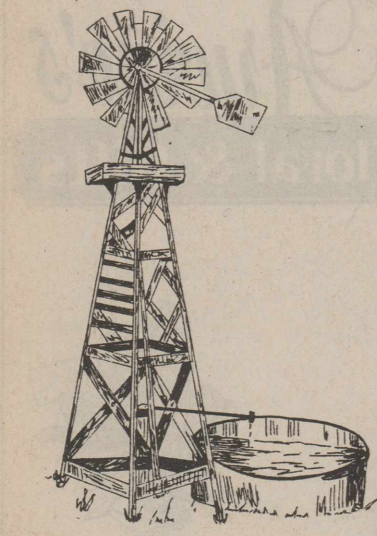

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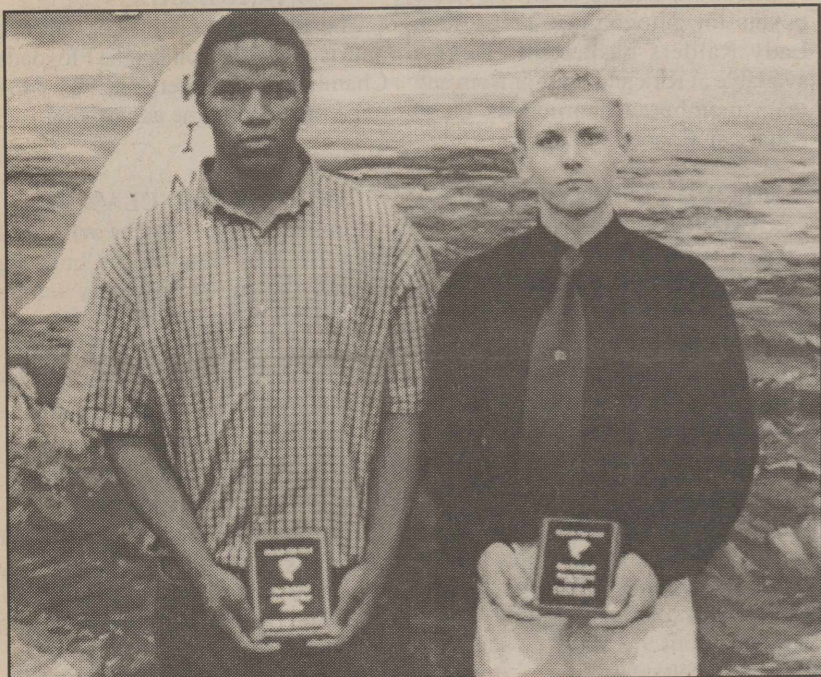

Nancy Marble and Carolyn Jackson traveled to Waco, Texas, Friday, April 27, to attend the Saturday, April 28 portion of a Symposium, "Museum Interpretation of The Spanish Conquest & Colonial Periods 1492 - 1820", hosted by Baylor University, The Strecker/Mayborn Museum Complex and The Museum Studies Department. Among the presenters were Richard and Shirley Flint, who are with the research faculty at New Mexico Highlands University. The Flints were Co-sponsors with the Museum of the Symposium held in

The Museum is celebrating 30 years dedication to the preservation of Floyd County History this year. The annual newsletter, which was mailed this week, contains highlights of events from the past 30 years. Newsletters are available at the Museum for those who did not receive one in the mail. Brochures are also available with information about the Museum's history, exhibits and research materials.

Visits, donations and memorial contributions help the Museum in its endeavor to preserve Floyd County History. Tour groups are welcome during the week and by appointment at night or on weekends. For an appointment call the Museum at 983-2415.

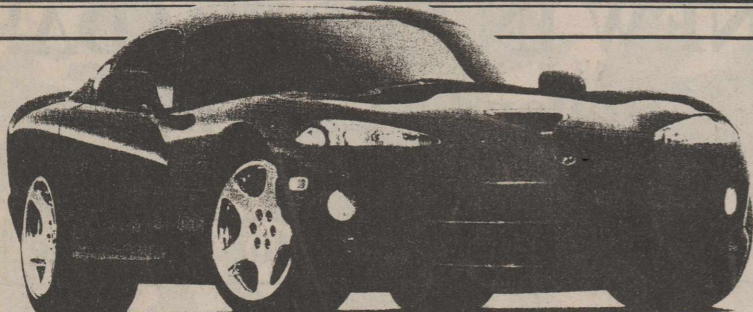
