County Museum celebrating 30th anniversary

Historical marker will commemorate Coronado's Travels Through Floyd County



MIKE MCNERNEY, an archeologist, from Carbondale, Illinois visited the Floyd County Museum this week to see the Coronado exhibits for the first time and to visit the archeological digs at the Coronado site in Blanco Canyon. The Museum volunteers have been very busy getting ready for their 30th Anniversary and Open House celebration this Friday.

The Floyd County Historical Museum will be celebrating their 30th Anniversary this weekend with their Friday Open House and marker dedication of "Coronado in Blanco Canyon."

The County Museum has already made quite a name for itself thanks to the tireless efforts of a dedicated Museum Board and volunteers who give of their time to the day to day operation of the museum.

For the past 30 years visitors have been greeted by friendly good will ambassadors who have worked in the museum, and each year visitors have seen the artifacts grow and the collections change inside the historic building.

The State Charter for the Museum was received in 1971 and in 1972 the Museum Building was donated by the Surginer Family.

In 1973 the John Ellison Burns Blacksmith Collection was given to the Museum and in 1975 the Museum sponsored the Texas Archeological Field School at the County Club site in Blanco Canyon.

The Museum was dedicated in 1976 and the east building was given by Leslie Surginer. Also in 1976 the first Floyd County coin was minted.

In 1979 a huge undertaking was finished with the publication of the Floyd County History Book and in 1986 the first historical marker was erected for Dolphin Ward Floyd on the courthouse lawn. The Museum hosted the Floyd Family reunion at that time.

A second Floyd County coin was also minted in 1986.

The impressive Mary Lou Bollman History and Genealogy Center was dedicated in 1989 and is the source of research for hundreds across the United States.

In 1990 the efforts of the Museum Board paid off again with a 2nd Historical Marker, the Organization of Floyd County.

In 1991 at 16th Century Chain Mail Gauntlet was acquired which set the ball rolling for archeological digs in 1995 and discoveries of other Coronado artifacts in Blanco Canyon. The finds have secured a place in history for Floyd County and the Museum, and kept the Board very busy taking care of archeologists and disseminating information about the discoveries and Floyd County.

A recent visitor to the Museum, Archeologist Mike McNERNEY, of Carbondale, Illinois, praised the work of the Museum staff and volunteers.

"This is my first time in Floydada,"

said McNERNEY and I am very impressed with your exhibits. This is a great tribute to the ladies who work here, and to Floyd County citizens, who have preserved our history."

From chain mail to computers, the Museum has grown with the times and now has a web site at fchmuseum@texasonline.net.

Working at the Museum is a full time Director, Carolyn Jackson. She is assisted by Lila Kendrick, a Green Thumb worker who has been at the Museum for 16 years. Volunteers who are always working include Board Members: Janet Milam, who is also in charge of the History and Genealogy Committee; Nancy Marble who is in charge of the Exhibit Committee; Monte Williams, who is in charge of the Coronado Committee; and Norma Welch, who is in charge of the Hospitality Committee.

The Board of Directors encourages everyone to come to the Museum's Open House and view the 16th century artifacts recovered from the Jimmy Owens Site in Blanco Canyon, and new exhibits which will debut on Friday. Then take a trip to the Hwy. 62 roadside park for the Coronado Historical Marker dedication at 5:30 p.m. on Friday.

Floydada to host Old Settler's

The special events for the annual Old Settler's Reunion will begin on Friday, May 25 and continue all day Saturday.

Friday will be a history making day for the Floyd County with the addition of another Historical Marker. This marker will commemorate the discovery of Coronado artifacts in Blanco Canyon and the proof of Coronado's travels through Floyd County. The marker dedication will be held at 5:30 p.m. on Hwy. 62, 6 miles south of Floydada at the roadside park in Blanco Canyon.

Saturday's Old Settler's activities will begin at 9:00 a.m. with registration of "old settlers" on the North End of the Ag. Building (behind the courthouse). Parade registration also begins at 9:00 a.m. and Flower Show entries will be checked in at the Museum from 9:00 a.m. - 11:00 a.m.

There will be 7 divisions in the Wildflower Show, including: miniature container, unusual container, antique container, men's division, youth division, miscellaneous division, and table center division. Awards will be given in 1st, 2nd and 3rd place. Children wanting to participate in the Texas Pedal Pullers contest should register between 9:00 a.m. - 11:00 a.m. The business meeting begins at 11:00 a.m. and awards will be presented to the Pioneer Woman, Pioneer Man, and Pioneer Couple. Also recognized will be the person traveling the greatest distance and the oldest man and woman.

Lunch will be catered by Danny's Fins and Hens and will be served at 12:00 noon on California Street, in front of Hale's Department Store. Food will also be available from the wide variety of vendors on the square

and bargains will be found from the many arts and crafts booths who will crowd the courthouse lawn.

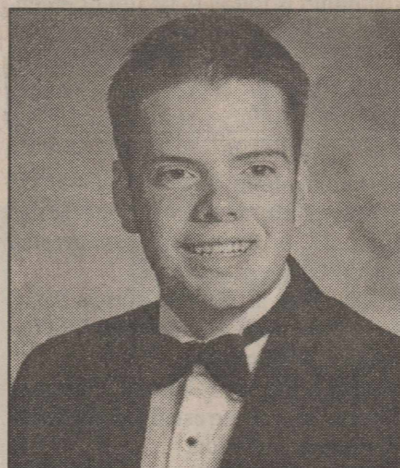
During lunch the Pioneer Association has lined up the singing talent of Jubilee and other entertainment under the pavilion.

Mad Stone on display at Floyd County Museum

The "Mad Stone", exhibit at the Floyd County Museum, will make its debut this week. Mad Stones are believed, by some, to have healing powers over hydrophobia or "mad animals".

The stone was given to the Museum by the Fanning Family.

A 1922 article in the Floyd County Museum told of the healing powers of the mad stone which belonged to A.J. Fanning.

According to the article, A. J. Fanning, who lived northeast of Floydada, "applied the stone to a bite on the leg of the eight year old son of Mr. and

Mrs. N.R. Austin, of Center." The stone "stuck to the wound 13 hours before it turned loose..."

"A vicious cat bit the boy a few days previous", the article said... and the head of the animal was sent to the Pasteur Institute at Austin." According to the article the head of the animal was too badly decomposed to determine whether the animal was rabid.

"The mad stone in the possession of Mr. Fanning has been used, he said, in this state and Oklahoma, probably

Loss of state funds causes budget woes for LISD

The Lockney School Board were briefed on grim budget realities by Superintendent Raymond Lusk, during the May 15 regular board meeting.

Because of declining enrollment (down by 30 students from last year's declining enrollment), the school is facing a "payback" to the State of Texas of ADA (average daily enrollment) funds.

"The State estimates our ADA based on the previous year's enrollment," said Lusk. "Because our enrollment was down we will have to pay back the State approximately \$310,000. "There will be automatic salary increases which are included in next year's budget which we can't change. If we keep the expenditures the same as this year and factor in the \$310,000 we will have to give back, we are looking at a budget deficit of \$523,000."

According to Lusk the school has limited options. "We have already cut to the bone. Where else do you cut?"

"Our choices we will have to look at will be a rise in the tax rate, finding more areas to cut, and using some of our fund balance. I imagine it will be a combination of all three."

Lusk said he didn't want people to

panic. "We have been in tough situations before. We have always worked it out."

In other business the board approved hiring Rob Lovett, of Shallowater, as the new band director.

A great deal of discussion was given to the topic of vehicle purchase and travel policies of personnel. No action was taken at the meeting.

Lusk informed the trustees of a recent conversation with a representative of TNRCC. "The Webster Service Station has reverted back to the taxing entities," said Lusk. "Because we are the largest taxing entity we have been informed that we will be responsible for siphoning gasoline from the four underground tanks at Websters. We will also have to cover the tanks and we may have to pay for digging out the tanks. We will also have to take over the yearly registration fee."

In the financial report the trustees reviewed the bank balance of \$336,469.91. There is \$3,150,000.00 in CDs for a total fund balance of \$3,486,469.

Board officers were elected by acclamation. They are: Bernie Ford, president; John Quebe, vice-president; and Mike Mathis, secretary.

Lutheran Church observes 90 years

Trinity Lutheran Church, in the Providence Community, will celebrate their 90th Anniversary on Sunday, June 3, with a special service honoring former pastors and members.

Bishop Kevin Kanouse, representing the Northern Texas/Northern Louisiana Synod of The Evangelical Lutheran Church will conduct the morning service at 11:00 a.m.

A noon meal is planned and an informal afternoon service will be held at 3:00 p.m. The afternoon service will include musical numbers and comments from former pastors and members.

Dr. Lee Roy Brandes will be honored at the afternoon service and reception will follow.

Dr. Brandes grew up in Trinity Lutheran Church and is the only member from this church to go into the ministry. He was ordained at the 40th Anniversary of the the Providence Church in 1951. His wife, Laura, is the daughter of charter members Mr. and Mrs. Henry Sammann.

In 1983 Pastor Brandes produced and filmed on location in East Germany, the film, "A Man Called Luther" commemorating the 500th anniversary of Martin Luther's birth.

Dr. Brandes is now retired and living in Banning, California.

There have been 22 pastors and four interim pastors for Trinity Lutheran.

The church was organized June 11, 1911, by Pastor F.A. Bracher. The first worship service was in the one room Providence School. The following men affixed their names to the church constitution: E. Rohloff, F. Lindemann, H.H. Sammann, J.H. Ratjen, Karl Sammann, Carl Koenig, F. Boedeker, L.H. Sammann, and Fritz Meyer.

On Oct. 15, 1911 plans were being made for the first church building. Mr. Henry Quebe, of McGregor, Texas, offered 5 acres for a new church and parsonage. In November a building committee collected \$46.50 and on June 12, 1912 the new church was

dedicated. The leftover lumber was returned after an adequate portion was kept back for a chicken house.

On August 12, 1912 a bell, which had been cast in 1872, was given to the church by a congregation in Prairie Hill, Texas. The bell still hangs in front of the church in a 18 foot high bell tower. The tower has a 13 foot arm span holding the bell which rings every Sunday calling people to worship.

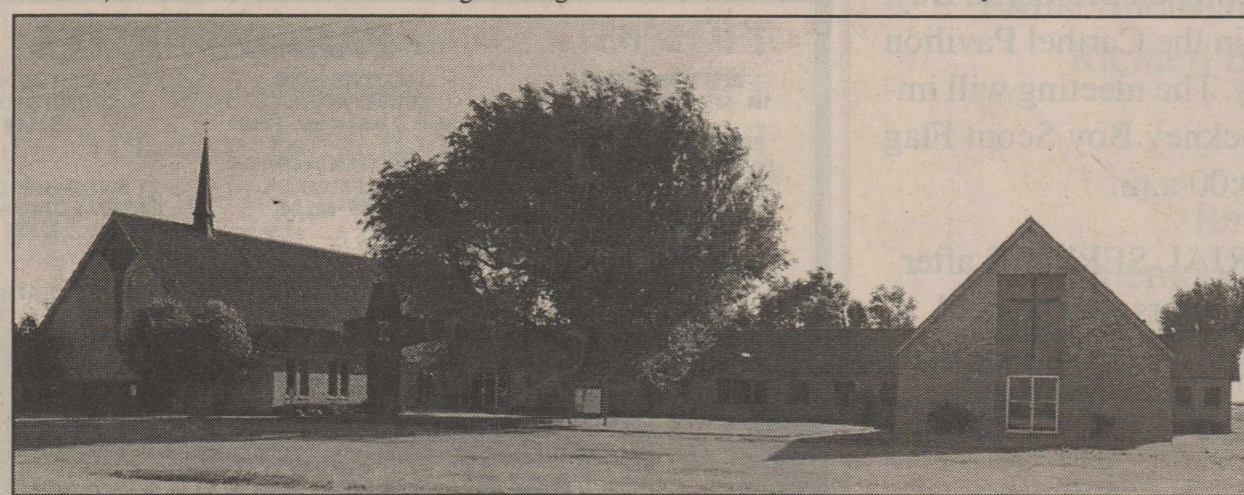
A larger building was dedicated on February 26, 1950 and a new parsonage was built in 1953. Within 20 years more room was needed and an adjoining building was added in 1963. The

old sanctuary was converted into the Parish Hall.

There are no living charter members, however Mr. and Mrs. Henry Sammann, and Mr. and Mrs. Fred Boedeker have descendants who are members. Adella Dietrich Word and L.B. Brandes are the longest serving members--having been with the church for 78 years.

The public is invited to celebrate this historical birthday with church members and the Providence Community, June 3rd.

The church is located on 7 miles north of Hwy. 70 on FM 2301.

Letter To The Editor

Dear Editor:

I am writing to you on the behalf of upset parents including myself, in lieu of the unfolding of recent events involving 3 baby sitters in Floydada.

After my husband and I gave birth to our son, we decided that once my maternity leave was over, we would take him to an "In-Home" baby sitter so I could go back to work. We wanted him to be in a "HOME" environment not a "Day Care" environment.

Let me share with you a few of the differences that we considered. Instead of spending the better part of the day in one room with only children in his "Age Bracket" we wanted him to be able to roam around our baby sitters child-proofed home and play with children of all ages. Where he currently goes, other than lunchtime and nap time, there is no set schedule of events that has to be followed every day. And speaking of naptime, I like the idea of my child lying down on a pallet of blankets with 2 or 3 other toddlers when he takes a nap. If I had wanted my son to have to sleep on a mat, a "State Regulated" distance from the other children I would have opted for day care. If I had wanted him to have mapped out activities (remember he is only 2 years old) for the entire day, I would have then opted for day care. If I wanted the "State of Texas" telling the person I had left my child in the care of how and how they couldn't go about disciplining my child, I would have then opted for day care too.

I respect Day Care facilities and the mothers that make the choice to take their children there. My first child was taken to Floyd County Day Care from 1992 thru 1995 and we loved the way it was managed. We as parents that chose to take our children to an "In-Home" environment of our choice want the same respect.

Now then, recently, my son's baby sitter, who also baby sits for several other parents in this community every day (and has done this for years) was recently turned into State Officials because she is not "Certified." Now, ask us what we consider the word "Certified" to mean when it comes to a baby-sitter and you will hear each of us say, "I consider certified to mean someone who loves my child just as much as I do. Someone who loves him enough to let him become a major part of her life by every day, letting him come into her home

and love her. Someone who focuses 5 entire days of her week to make sure that my child is comfortable in her home, is fed, is made to mind by MY STANDARDS, not the States standards. Someone that enforces my rules. Someone that has kept him so long she knows that when you hold a spoon full of food up to his mouth and he turns his head, it doesn't mean he is not hungry or doesn't like the food, he just wants to feed himself. Someone that knows my child just as well as I do and can take one look at him and know if he is happy or sad by the look in his eye. Who knows if he is well or soon to come down with an illness by the slight change in color of his skin. Someone who knows when he is tired before he even does. Someone who is keeping kids because she LOVES to do it."

Now, what does it mean to be certified by the State of Texas? Kids have to sleep on a mat placed so far away from the other children. Meals have to consist of specific dietary requirements (my baby sitter's meals more than supersede this requirement already), events must be planned out, oh and my baby sitter must now complete a course on "How To Care for Children."

That is the funniest part of the entire thing, what can the State teach her that she doesn't already know other than a list of meaningless paper requirements.

Someone very thoughtless has done a huge injustice to the 3 "In-Home" baby sitters in this community. Someone who has not thought about how blessed these children are by the 3 wonderful angels that dedicate their time for these precious gifts of ours.

To the 3 baby sitters, we as parents are sorry this has happened and we want everyone in this community to know how special and unique each of you are. We know that just because someone has chose to make your life difficult, that no matter what the state requires you to do in YOUR OWN HOME, that it will never be anything less than HOME. We thank God for blessing our family's with each of you everyday.

If press reports are right (and they always are) Ms. Janet Reno is contemplating a race for governor of Florida.

How lucky can we get? At first blush her comments indicating an interest in running for Governor were met with varying degrees of amusement. Not so fast, gentle reader. She just might win a Democratic nomination in Florida, and if she gets that, she just might win the Governor's race against Jeb Bush.

Reno was a sorry Attorney General, in our view, but she delighted any number of factions that make up the Florida Democratic Party. She would go into the contest with solid backing from Florida's wealthy Jewish community, solid backing from the state's black community, and, because of a significant factor affecting the state's Hispanic community, major backing from the non-Cuban Hispanic community as well. The Cubans, or rather the Cubans-in-exile, would probably vote heavily against her. So would any number of conservative Democrats.

We won't have a horse in that race, if it does develop, but at least she might be forced to explain her record as Attorney General, something she never did as Attorney General. For nearly eight years she got by with the

lame position of "I can't comment on that, because we have an on-going investigation looking into that", or words to that effect.

Another ploy was the "we would be happy to look into that, if someone will bring us credible evidence that a crime has been committed."

Accordingly, she sat on her hands while the country was treated with one scandal after another, neither commenting or acting. So let's hope she makes the race.

Our Mr. George W. Bush has finally opted to get a little more involved in the Mid-East situation. The Israeli have now brought up their heavy artillery, their American-furnished F-16s, their American-furnished helicopters, their American-furnished weaponry of all kinds, to put the Palestinians in their place. The Palestinians have responded with rocks and suicide bombers. More Palestinian lives have been lost since the latest flareup than were American lives lost in the entire Gulf War episode.

This past week, the Mitchell committee (named after former Senator Mitchell, one-time Democratic leader in the Senate, and named by former

President Bill Clinton to assess the situation) made its recommendations.

Their solution? Stop the violence and negotiate. Surprise, surprise.

We have said many times in these columns that there will be no peace in the Middle East until America stops financially underwriting Israeli behavior, no matter what it is. Israel has long been the tail that wags the dog, as far as America is concerned. Every American Administration comes to realize, quickly, that Israel has more clout in Congress than it does. That clout is the result of two things, primarily. One is the enormous campaign contributions that flow from the Jewish community, and the other is the ownership of American media. It is not just Hollywood and its influence on Americans. It is also media conglomerates with tentacles through out television and the press. The possibility of "fair and balanced" reporting on the middle east ranks right alongside the possibility of Bill Buckley being named chief editorial writer for the New York Times. It just ain't gonna happen.

At present a "catch twenty-two" situation prevails in the Israeli Palestinian conflict. There will be no peace as long as one side or the other profits from the absence of peace. One side

will continue to profit as long as the present situation prevails. That side will continue to profit as long as Congress listens to one side more attentively than it listens to the other side, or to the American Administration. Congress will continue to listen to one side as long as sufficient campaign funds continue to flow from that side. As long as sufficient campaign funds flow to Senatorial or Congressional candidates, sufficient "foreign aid" will continue to flow to Israel. As long as that "foreign aid" continues to flow, paying the tab for armaments, paying the tab for settlements, paying the tab for emigration, there will be no need for peace to look good. The government of Israel may be a lot of things, but one thing it is not. It's not stupid.

Finally, our readers may have noticed that we have had very few comments on the legislative hassle over redistricting. We've said little, not because the subject is unimportant, but because we determined that none of the legislative proposals would amount to much, that in the end the subject will be dealt with in other venues. It is now obvious that will be the case. Besides, there's not much those of us out here can do about it, except hope for the best.

as many as fifty. The wound from the cat's bite on the Austin lad is healed almost entirely and he is showing no ill effects at this time."

A 1956 Encyclopedia Americana said, "Madstone, a vegetable substance or stone which when applied to wound caused by the bite of a mad dog is said to prevent hydrophobia. The most famous one in the U.S. was brought to Scotland and has been religiously preserved as one of the most valuable relics of age. It is said to be the one spoken of by Sir Walter Scott in 'The Talisman'.

The Encyclopedia goes on to say, "It is about 2 inches long by one inch broad, and about half an inch thick, and is of chocolate color. When applied to the wound it adheres till all the poison is absorbed, when it drops off. It is then soaked in warm milk or water for a time, and when removed the liquid is found to be full of green-

ish-yellow scum. It is said that of the 130 cases in which it has been applied for the bite of a mad dog, none ever suffered from hydrophobia."

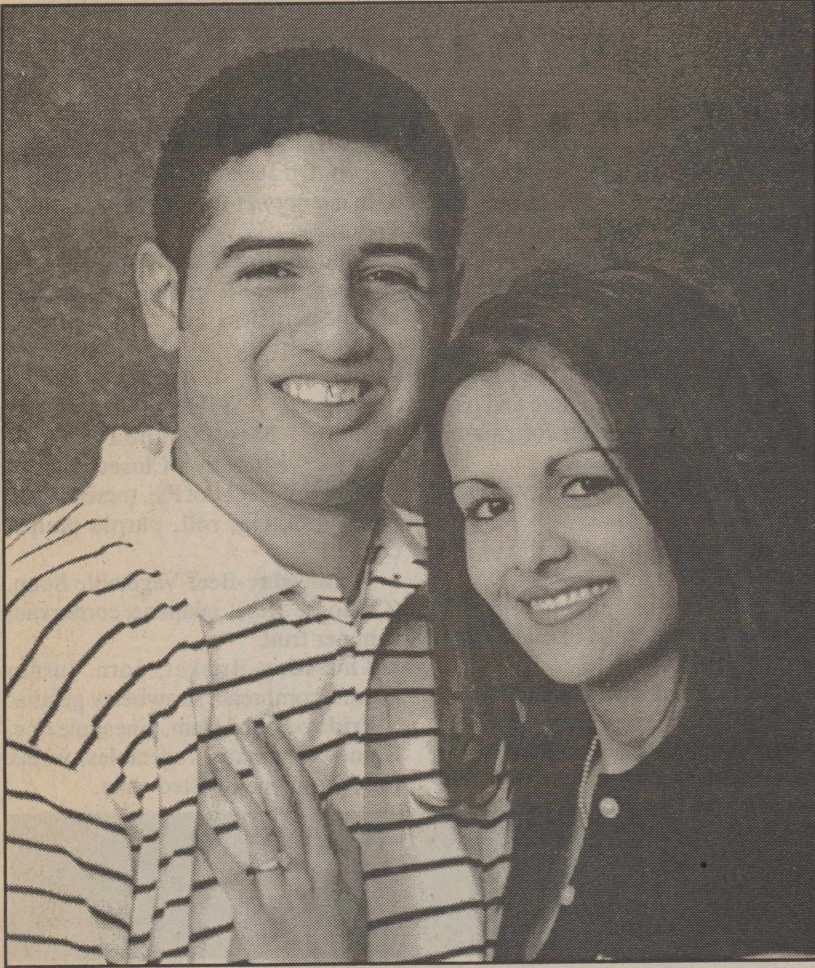

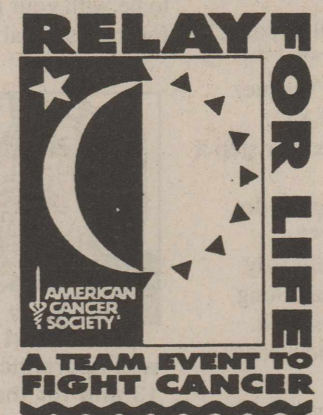

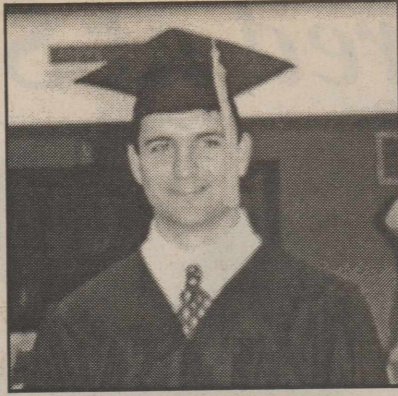

Floyd County 4-H's elected to District Office

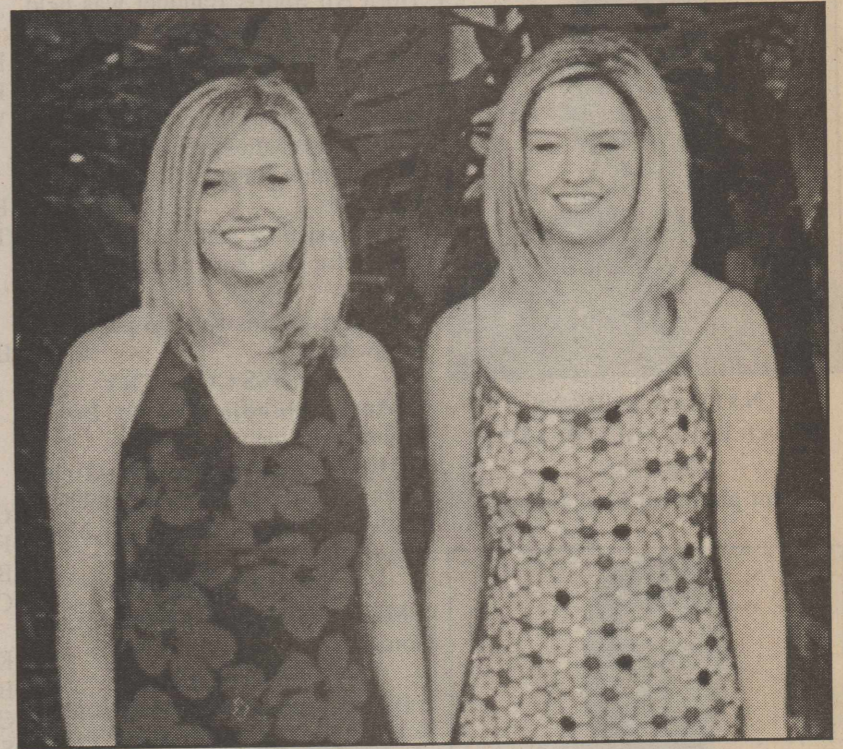

The Country Preacher

A "ROCKING" CHURCH SERVICE-It was 1975 when I finally found a correspondence student in the state of Veracruz near the Gulf of Mexico. He was a Popoluca Indian and had been asking us over two years to come to his village and start a church.

Each trip down south to Chiapas, I would stop in his town for a couple of hours and try to find him. No one ever knew where he lived and some would say they did not even know him. Yet all along, he was living right on the highway and everyone in town knew him very well. Everyone thought I was a CIA agent. In the '70's that was very common for "gringos" to be tagged as working for the US government.

On one trip, a man told me this correspondence student lived way out in the hills. So several preacher students and I walked a couple of hours over the hills and found a man with the same name, but not the correspondence student.

After two years, I did find Juan. He ran a little store on the highway and lived about 50 yards away. He was about 60 years of age and had a big family with kids and grandkids nearby. So when we started a church in his store front on the highway, we

immediately had a house full of people.

The first church service we held in the store was at night. We sang some songs and I started preaching using my gas lantern for light, since the town did not have electricity yet.

About half way through my sermon, it started hailing on the tin roof of the store. I soon realized it wasn't hail, but rocks being thrown on the roof. Ten, or more, drunk men began sticking their heads in the open door and the front window and yelling loudly.

I tried to ignore them, but that was impossible, but I did keep preaching. It didn't seem to bother anyone else but me. Juan got up slowly and walked over to the door and began talking to them in a calm voice. They all backed away and stopped yelling. To this day I do not know what Juan said to them.

When I gave the invitation, Juan, his wife, their three grown boys and the two married boy's wives, all made professions of faith in Christ. I baptized them in the river about a month later on another trip.

MORAL OF THE STORY: "God can bless you greatly, even in the midst of a storm."

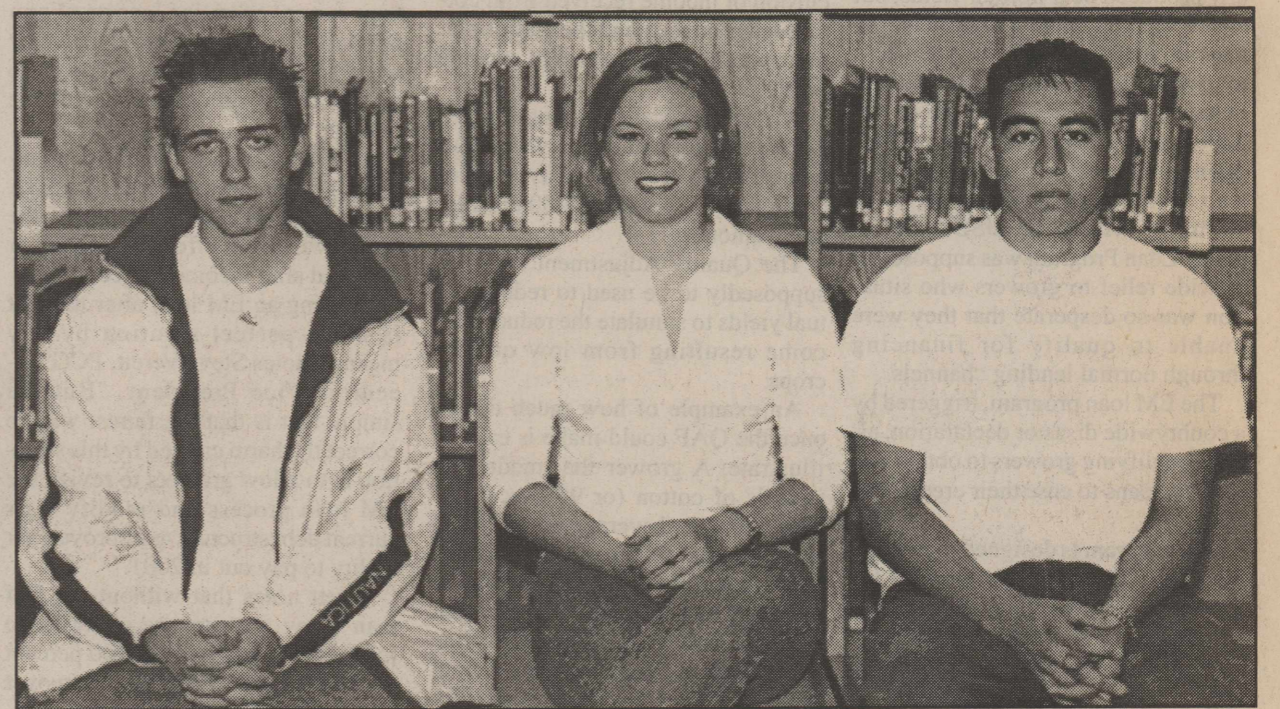

Texans favor support for agriculture

Loan program comes up short

Relieving the negative effects of persistent economic setbacks has been a struggle for High Plains cotton growers seeking financing for the 2001 growing season.

Many growers endured a number of setbacks that combined to seriously undermine the financial base of their operations. Significantly higher input costs, insect pressure, and persistently low cotton prices combined with serious quality reductions made a large number of High Plains producers unable to cover the expenses incurred during the 2000 growing season.

Producers were seriously impacted across the yield spectrum. One key group includes growers who eventually produced near normal yields, but ended the year with a significant financial shortfall. With no yield loss to trigger crop insurance indemnities or qualify for the first phase of the 2000 Crop Disaster Assistance Program, many growers were left to absorb the shortfall on their own.

That is where the USDA Emergency Loan Program was supposed to provide relief to growers who situation was so desperate that they were unable to qualify for financing through normal lending channels.

The EM loan program, triggered by a countywide disaster declaration, allows qualifying growers to obtain low interest loans to ease their credit situation.

The program is designed to provide producers the ability to qualify for loans based on less than projected financial performance brought about by yield and quality reductions on their crop.

As many growers found out qualifying for EM loans in an amount that could prove beneficial has been somewhat tricky and not without its share of pitfalls.

Through the Winter and early Spring growers trying to work EM loan applications have been frustrated by the very nature of the process and its built in checks and balances to ensure the help goes to the growers that

need it most help.

Their frustration appears to be well founded as ongoing efforts by several growers have brought to light key aspects of the program that are apparently being overlooked or simply not brought into the equation by FSA employees working grower applications.

Two cases in particular have caused growers to turn away from the EM loan program that could have helped them through this difficult period.

The first, and most troubling, is the failure of many FSA loan officers to gather quality data on the crop produced in 2000 to compute a Quality Adjustment Factor for the grower.

The second has to do with the inclusion of income received from cottonseed produced and the addition of that income to the average income level.

This increases the amount of assistance a grower could receive by widening the gap between the average income and the lowered 2000 crop income amount.

The Quality Adjustment factor is supposedly to be used to reduce actual yields to simulate the reduced income resulting from low quality crops.

An example of how much difference the QAF could make is easy to illustrate. A grower that made 450 pounds of cotton (or 90 percent of their 500 pound average yield) would not meet the 30 percent loss threshold to qualify for EM Loan assistance.

Taking into account the fact that they also suffered a 25 percent decline in quality and factoring the actual yield by 75 percent changes the picture dramatically as their financial picture shifts to reflect that the total effect of yield and quality is greater than the 30 percent loss threshold to qualify for an EM Loan.

What's next? All growers who have had to refinance carryover debt from the 2000 crop, or who had some combination of yield and quality losses in 2000 that were not addressed through other means, should reconsider their

potential eligibility and make an appointment with their county Farm Service Agency Office to investigate availability of an EM loan.

With the combined effect of slight yield losses and, in some cases, significant quality declines on the 2000 crop, growers can still secure EM loans that could be used to cover current expenses or carryover debt from the previous year.

Plains Cotton Growers officials note that the fairest policy that could be adopted by USDA would be to allow growers to rework EM loan applications and secure EM loans, if they qualify.

The grower could then use the loan proceeds to offset some portion of their current operating loan or a Farm Service Agency Guaranteed loan they were forced to initiate because no other lending options were available to them.

Across the area a significant number of growers were forced to the FSA credit rolls this year because of the doublewhammy effect of carryover debt and slim income projections.

"Getting an EM loan after the fact is not a perfect solution by any means," notes Steve Verett, PCG Executive Vice President. "But the simple fact is that the fairest way to correct the harm created by this situation is to allow growers to revisit the EM loan process and modify their current debt structure to improve their ability to pay out in 2001."

Verett notes that without the EM loan many growers are going to be forced to try and pay out 100 percent of 2001 expenses and any carryover they had from the precious year.

A recent public opinion survey of registered Texas voters shows overwhelming support for government payments to farmers in periods of low prices and for protecting America's ability to grow its own food.

The Texas Interested Citizens Survey, conducted between March 29 and April 4 of this year, concludes that 66 percent of Texans favor government assistance to farmers when crop prices are low.

Even more Texans, 85 percent, agreed that the U.S. should remain independent in the ability to grow its own food supply. Sixty-nine percent said the U.S. should protect the domestic food production system even if cheaper food could be purchased from foreign suppliers.

"The results of this survey are very important, because it shows clearly that the public understands just how important it is to preserve national food security," said Donald Patman, president of the Texas Farm Bureau. "American agriculture today is in deep trouble, and government assistance is vital to the survival of a great many farmers."

The Farm Bureau is Texas' largest farm organization. Patman is a grain, cotton and cattle producer from Waxahachie.

"Texans understand that preserving the viability of our farm and ranch families is an investment in a future that includes food independence. We don't need to be at the mercy of foreign suppliers, like we are for energy," Patman said.

Susan Combs, Texas Commissioner of Agriculture, says there is increasing public awareness of the impor-

tant of agriculture.

"It comes as no surprise to me that Texans are supportive of our farmers and ranchers," Combs said. "In agriculture, we've had an amazing track record of putting wholesome, safe, affordable and abundant food on our tables, all while doing our best to preserve natural resources and boost rural development."

Combs said government investment in agriculture pays off in jobs and economic stability because of the \$80 billion dollar economic impact on the Texas economy.

Larry Combest, representing the Lubbock area in Congress and Chairman of the U.S. House Agriculture Committee, agreed. "I am pleased to see that the majority of Texans understand and recognize the important contribution our farmers make," Combest said.

The ranking minority member of the House Agriculture Committee, Charlie Stenholm, of Stamford, Texas, also welcomed the survey results. "Congress has provided \$18.1 billion in emergency income assistance over the last three years recognizing that

net cash income, adjusted for inflation, is at the lowest point since the Great Depression," Stenholm said. "With no improvement in commodity prices expected, and now with sharply higher natural gas prices, this assistance is clearly needed."

The Texas Interested Citizens Survey was conducted by the Ft. Worth based Eppstein Group. More than 1,200 registered voters were interviewed, resulting in a margin of error of plus or minus 2.89 percent.

Crop pest workshop set for Plainview

Producers and ag consultants can hone their pest management and crop production skills at a June 2 High Plains Crop Pests Scouting Workshop sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The workshop at the Ollie Liner Center will begin at 8:20 a.m. and adjourn at about 4:30 p.m. There is no fee to attend.

"This is an excellent opportunity to learn more about corn, cotton, grain sorghum, soybean and sunflower production," said Greg Cronholm, Hale County Extension integrated pest management agent. "We will cover crop insect pests, weed identification and herbicide injury, plant diseases, and how to recognize and promote beneficial insects."

Morning presentations by Extension and Texas Department of Agriculture specialists and agents will focus on cotton growth and development; cotton insect pests; recognizing and promoting beneficial insects in field crops; and federal and state

worker protection standards.

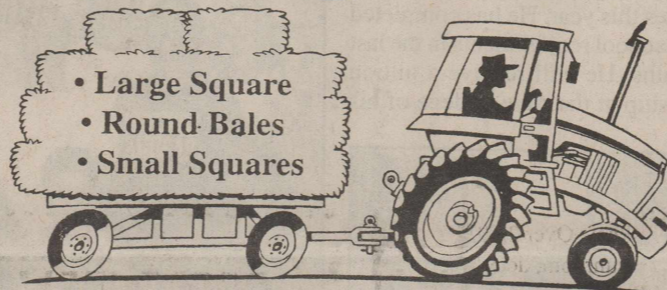
"We'll have a morning and an afternoon break, so participants can visit and view insect specimen displays," Cronholm said. "We'll also take a 1 hour 'on your own' lunch break."

Afternoon workshop sessions will cover weed identification and herbicide injury; cotton, corn and grain sorghum plant diseases; corn and grain sorghum growth and development; and how to recognize and detect corn, grain sorghum, soybean and sunflower insect pests.

Producers who attend the workshop can earn 4 continuing education units (CEUs) in integrated pest management and 1 CEU in laws and regulations. All CEUs are approved by the Texas Department of Agriculture, Cronholm noted.
