"From_ 1540 to 1542, Francisco Vazquez De Coronado led the first organized European Exploration of 'cities of gold.' With a company more than a thousand men and women and thousands of horses and mules, cattle and sheep, Coronado rekked north from Culiacan, Mexico, New Mexico, Texas, Oklahoma And Kew Me
"The exact route along which their Indian guides led the Spaniards between Pecos Pueblo in New Mexico and the Arkansas River in Kansas has long been a subject of debate among
Historians. Surviving documents are
brief, vague and occasionally contra-
dictory. Twice in the Spring of 1541, he company camped long enough to have created detectable archeological site of a Teya Indian camp. A hail storm struck, destroying most, if not all, of their pottery. They occupied a second camp for two weeks in a canyon that was described as being 'a
league wide.' league wide.'
"In the 1950s and 1960s, two pieces cal ranchers in and near Blanco Canyon. Since 1993, a series of other objects, both European and from other parts of the Southwest, have been
