Archeologists find possible battle site

Coronado artifacts aren't the only exciting discoveries being made by archeologists in Blanco Canyon.

Friday, May 25, archeologists from Wichita State University, led by Dr. Blakeslee, were thrilled to find evidence of what may have been a historic battle between Col. Ranald Mackenzie and a band of Comanches.

After a metal detector alerted to a metal target, archeologist began to dig and unearthed two Indian fireplaces, very close to an old spring. Next to the fire pit a metal arrowpoint was found and next to the arrowpoint (within a few inches) was a .45-90 slug. The slug and point dated the site to the 1870's. Small chunks of lead were also found in the fire pit providing evidence that the Indians were in the process of making bullets.

"The bullet was found embedded in the dirt facing the fire pit and the arrow," said Blakeslee. "It shows the direction in which the bullet was fired which is evidence of the direction where the soldiers came from."

"There is a story of Mackenzie's troops going on a Scouting expedition. They had left their base camp further down Blanco Canyon in Crosby County. They rode up on top of the Caprock for awhile and then came back down into the Canyon. When they rode back down they came upon a band of Comanches. A battle ensued and the Indians were chased back up on top of the Caprock.

"A snowstorm, with white out conditions, enabled the Indians to escape once they were on top of the Caprock. The soldiers had to stop because of

the weather. When the storm broke the Indians were gone."

According to a biography on Col. Mackenzie in "The Handbook of Texas", "On February 25, 1871, he assumed command of the Fourth United States Cavalry at Fort Concho and a month later moved its headquarters to Fort Richardson. That summer he began a series of expeditions into the unchartered Panhandle and Llano Estacado in an effort to drive renegade Indians back into their reservations. In October his troops skirmished with a band of Comanches in Blanco Canyon, where he was wounded."

More on the history of the cavalry and Indian battles in Blanco Canyon will be published in next week's paper.

Two young ladies emerged with the top scores. Melissa Schaeffer's grade point average of 99.2130 earned her the rank of Valedictorian.

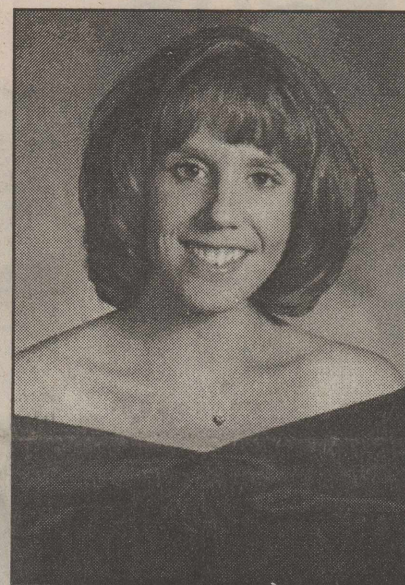
Holli Carthel was named Salutatorian with a grade point average of 99.0680.

The daughter of Milton and Vicky Schaeffer, Melissa plans on attending Hardin Simmons and majoring in Education.

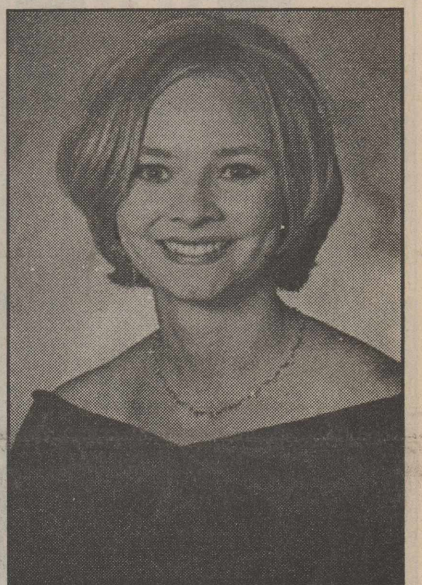

Coronado marker erected

The Floyd County Historical Commission recognized Floyd County and the Floyd County Historical Museum with an unveiling and presentation of an Historical Marker in Blanco Canyon Friday, May 25, 2001.

The Historical Marker located five miles south of Floydada on Highway 62 at the roadside park in Blanco Canyon is in recognition of explorer Francisco Vazquez De Coronado. Coronado and his company of over a thousand men camped out and traveled through Blanco Canyon from 1540 to 1542. Coronado was in search of the fabled "cities of gold."

Around 75 Floyd County residents and friends were present for the unveiling 5:30 p.m. last Friday. Floyd County Historical Museum Director of the Coronado Committee, Monte Williams, expressed appreciation to all participants and contributors to the archeological efforts in search of Coronado in Blanco Canyon.

Williams said, "The museum efforts began in June, 1991 with the return to Floyd County of the chain mail gauntlet found by Burl Daniel at the northern edge of Blanco Canyon in the late 1950s. The gauntlet drew the attention of the late Dr. Jack Hughes, retired Professor of Anthropology from

Floyd County pioneers recognized

The Pioneer Association honored distinguished citizens during the annual Old Settler's Reunion, Saturday, May 26th.

Pioneers recognized for their contributions to Floyd County were: Pioneer Couple Clementine and Lavirn Carthel, of Lockney; Pioneer Woman Clara Reecer, of Lockney; and Pioneer Man Bill Daniel, of Floydada.

The Carthels have been married for 59 years. They worked for the City of Lockney for 27 years.

The couple worked hard together taking a census of the cemetery--one calling out names and the other one writing it down.

They were one of the first presidents of the Senior Citizens and are still

faithful members--delivering meals to shut-ins.

The Carthels are members of the West Side Church of Christ. Clementine and his green thumb are responsible for taking care of the church plants.

They have four children, 10 grandchildren and 11 great grandchildren.

Pioneer Woman Clara Reecer has lived in Floyd County for 75 years. For 50 years, Clara and her husband, operated a cleaners in Lockney.

She has belonged to the Polly Anna Social Club and is a member of the Main Street Church of Christ.

She recently celebrated her 94th birthday with her 5 children, 21 grandchildren and 2 great grandchildren.

Pioneer Man Bill Daniel was born in Floyd County 80 years ago. He attended Floydada schools and graduated in 1939. He farmed until he was drafted into the U.S. Army during World War II.

He served overseas in Italy and North Africa from 1942 to June 1945. He returned to farm in Floyd County until he retired from farming in 1991 and started a farm equipment business, which he continues to operate today.

He has served and been active in several local organizations including Floyd County Pioneer Association.

He is married to Ardis Ratjen. They have 2 children and 4 grandchildren.

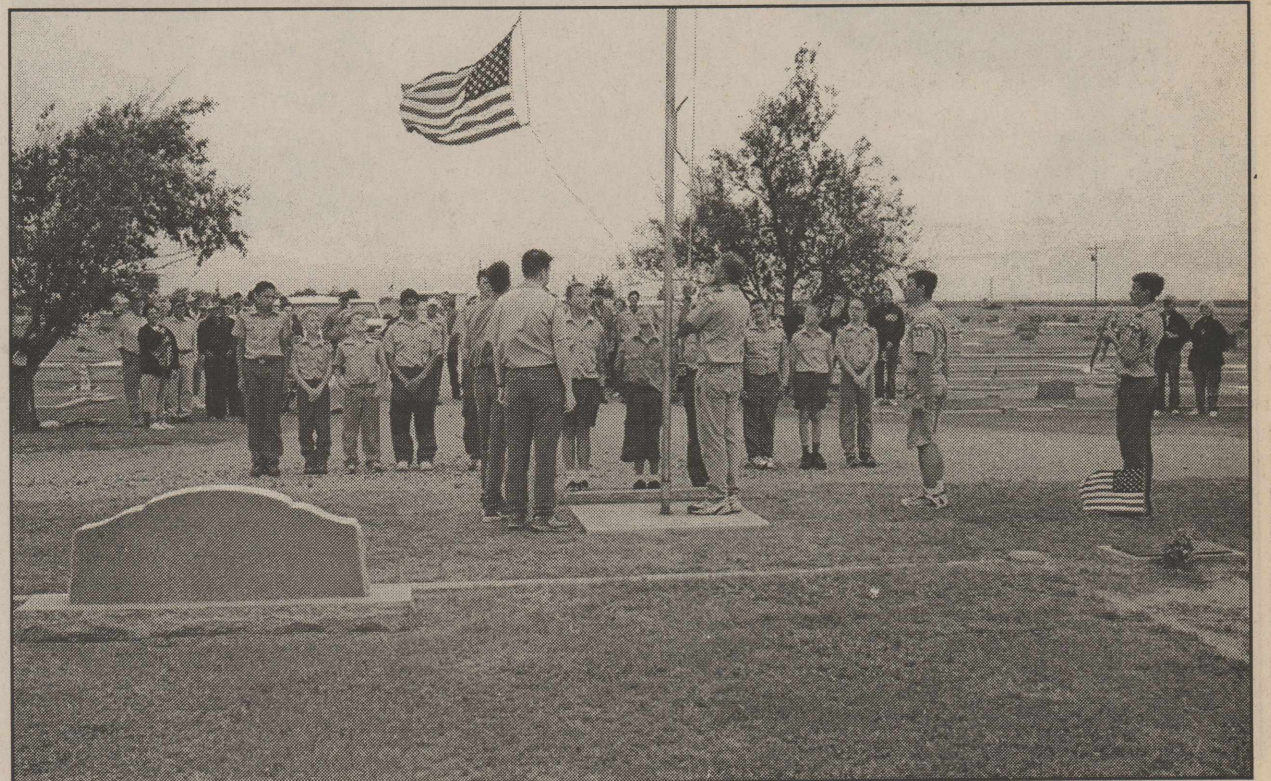
No, Freedom Isn't Free

West Texas State University and Dr. Donald Blakeslee, Associate Professor of Anthropology at Wichita State University.

"Historians and metal consultants, Richard and Shirley Flint, from New Mexico, Dr. Jack Hughes and Jay Blaine from Allen, Texas, also came to share their knowledge of material culture which would appear in 16th century campsites. The project soon took form with the discovery of the first copper crossbow point by Jimmy Owens," Williams added.

"Since 1995, hundreds of individuals, organizations, businesses, civic and religious groups have provided food, supplies and labor. We want to express our appreciation to everyone who came to assist the museum with this significant venture.

"We would like to dedicate this Historical Marker to the memory of those who took part in the work which has brought us to this time and have passed away since the first dig. The list includes: Jimmy Owens, Jim Word, J.S. Hale, Floyd Jackson, Billy Harrison, Mary Lou Bollman, David Walters, Kenneth Broseh, Chester

Harrison, Francis Stickney, and Jack Hughes," Williams concluded.

Floyd County Historical Museum Director Nancy Marble and Joyce Owens, widow of the late Jimmy Owens, unveiled the Historical Marker.

Dr. Blakeslee, his students, West Texas A&M University students, Floyd County residents, and others from Arizona, Texas, and New Mexico began conducting digs at the Blanco Canyon site in 1995 and have been digging at the site about three

times a year since.

Blakeslee was present for the unveiling and read the Historical Marker's inscription to those present. Blakeslee added, "Thanks for all the support from the various individuals and organizations in this area who have helped make this project a success."

The marker's inscription reads: "From 1540 to 1542, Francisco Vazquez De Coronado led the first organized European Exploration of the Southwest in search of the fabled 'cities of gold.' With a company of more than a thousand men and women and thousands of horses and mules, cattle and sheep, Coronado trekked north from Culiacan, Mexico, through land that became Arizona, New Mexico, Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas.

"The exact route along which their Indian guides led the Spaniards between Pecos Pueblo in New Mexico and the Arkansas River in Kansas has long been a subject of debate among Historians. Surviving documents are brief, vague and occasionally contra-

dictory. Twice in the Spring of 1541, the company camped long enough to have created detectable archeological evidence; the first time, they chose the site of a Teya Indian camp. A hail storm struck, destroying most, if not all, of their pottery. They occupied a second camp for two weeks in a canyon that was described as being 'a league wide.'

"In the 1950s and 1960s, two pieces of chain mail were discovered by local ranchers in and near Blanco Canyon. Since 1993, a series of other objects, both European and from other parts of the Southwest, have been found in the same area. They include projectile points similar to those used on crossbow arrows. Crossbows were obsolete after this expedition and are unlikely to have been used by any other group of significant size. In the late 1990s, archeologists began the task of confirming this area as the location of one of Coronado's camps. Evidence and artifacts recovered supported the theory that Coronado passed through Blanco Canyon."

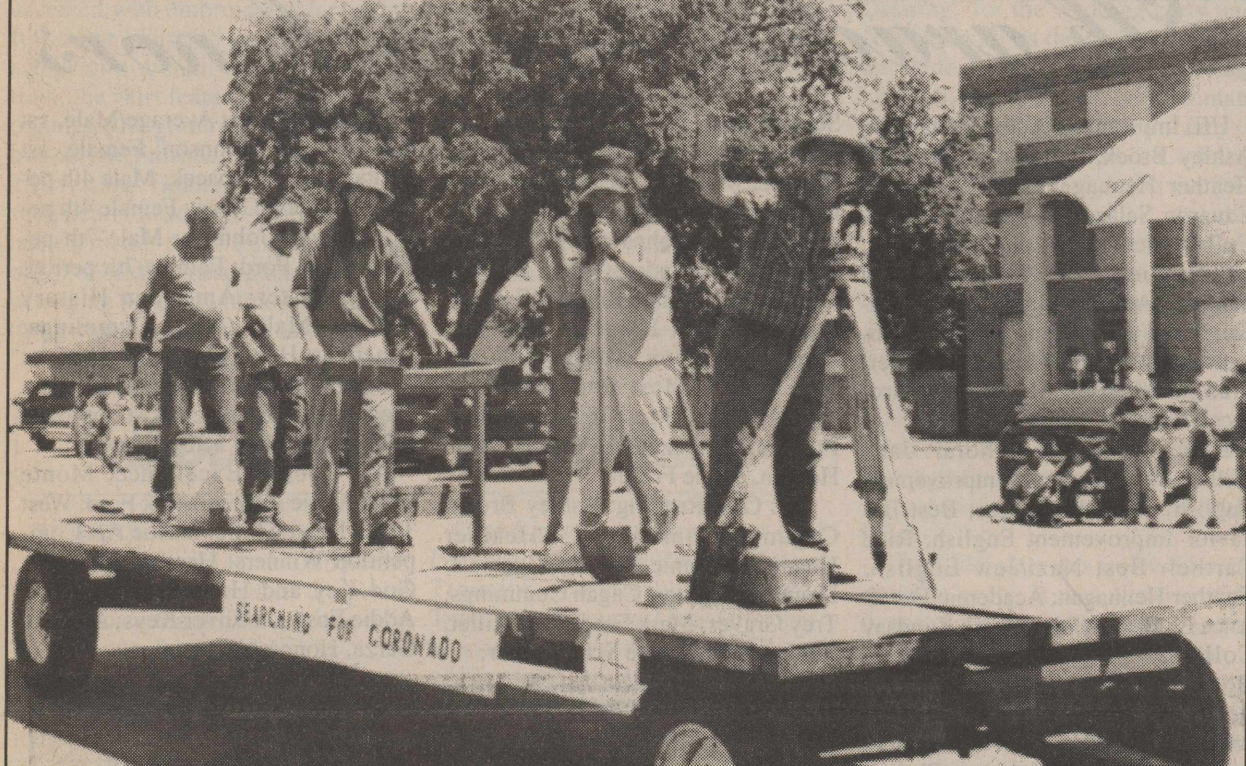
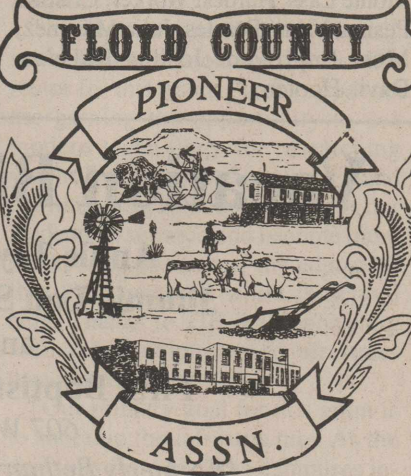

TDCJ to hire thirty officers

Officials from the Texas Department of Criminal Justice announced today plans to hire and train 30 new Correctional Officers in Plainview this summer. Dan Wallace, Regional Recruiter for TDCJ stated, "While we have kept a watchful eye on the staff levels at the Wheeler/Formby Complex, we have concentrated most of our recruiting efforts to the addition of the high security facility in Amarillo.

Now, with approximately 38 vacancies, in Plainview, it is necessary to shift our focus here." Wallace further stated "in cooperation with Amarillo College, we plan on having a training program in place by the end of June." Under this training program, the trainees will be trained by Amarillo College, and assigned to the Wheeler/Formby complex after graduation. "We have had tremendous success, working in conjunction with Amarillo College, throughout the panhandle. This type of training allows a level of flexibility for the applicant to continue working and attend classes in the evening," Wallace said.

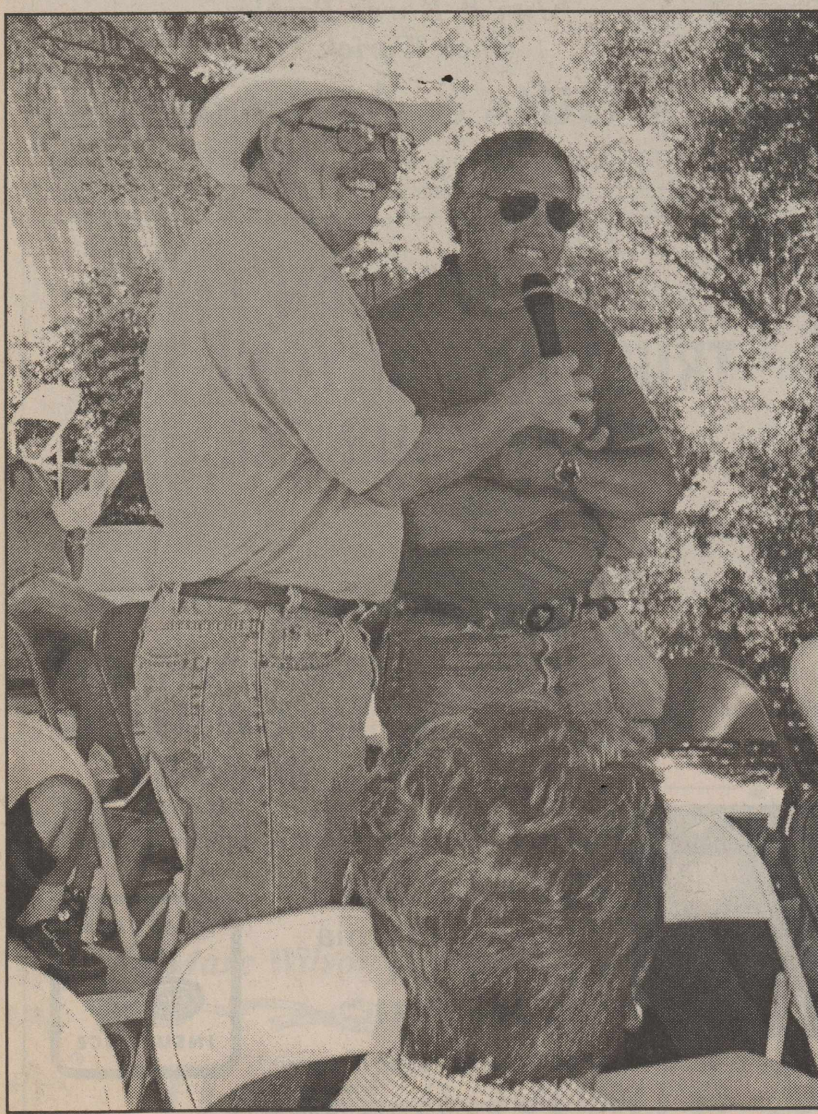

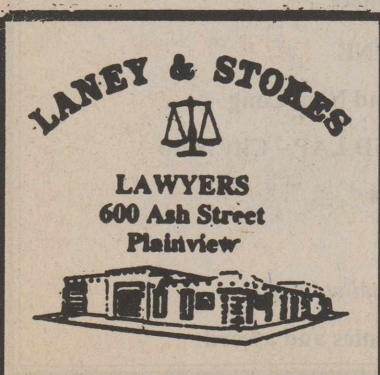
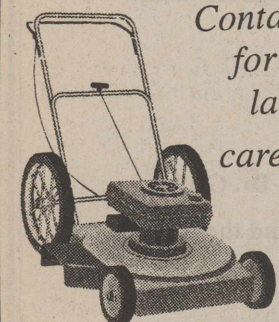

Names of Floyd County citizens who died in the year 2000 were printed on the back of the program and McNeill spoke briefly to those who gathered for the business meeting.

McNeill said she felt the "prayer of Jabez" was probably common among the early pioneers. "Oh, that you would bless me indeed, and enlarge my territory, that your hand would be with me, and that you would keep me from evil, that I may not cause pain," said McNeill when recalling the prayer of Jabez.

"This was probably the prayer of those Pioneers who had left their homes in Alabama, Tennessee, or such, to 'go west' in search of a better life," said McNeill.

McNeill recalled to mind those who carried all of their belongings in a covered wagon, facing childbirth, wild animals, and sometimes death during their travels.

McNeill herself remembered life in Floyd County during the 20's when the mail was delivered by horse and buggy and doctors traveled by horse to make overnight house calls for women giving birth or during the flu epidemic.

She recalled cars with only curtains to keep out rain and cold weather and Saturday night baths in number 3 washubs.

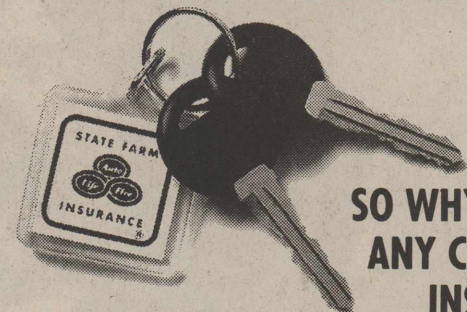

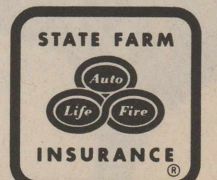

Lockney ISD receives TIF Grant

Lockney Independent School District recently received a TIF grant award of \$100,000 for the junior high and elementary campuses. This funding will be used to develop new and expand current technology infrastructure to provide students with the technology they need to prepare for the digital era.

High-tech, dot com, world wide web, and surfing the net are just a few phrases that can be associated with the technology revolution and have become staples in the daily lives of many Texans. With the assistance of the Telecommunications Infrastructure Fund (TIF) Board, a state agency that provides technology funding for Texas public schools, new opportunities to participate in the ever-progressing technology of today are now possible. Students across the state are able to reap the benefits of technology in education. Using TIF grants, schools are introducing students to modern technology, including high-speed Internet access and distance learning.

The TIF Non-Competitive Grant for Texas Public Schools was designed to fund up-to-date hardware and connectivity equipment, high-speed workstations, Internet access, and/or distance learning equipment so that students may take classes from another school district and/or an institution of higher education.

The grant projects officially began May 15, 2001 and will run through

August 14, 2002.

"Today, students are gaining the opportunity to use modern technology for researching via the Internet, word processing and learning. We, as educators, want our students to succeed and become more marketable because of the education that they received while in school here. Thanks to TIF, the opportunity to fund this equipment and infrastructure is a reality."

"Our primary goal for this grant is to shore up the infrastructure. As the demands from all three campuses increase, our network has to be reliable and offer high-speed access. This grant will give us the opportunity to change out some network equipment and increase the speed of the network," Keaton said. "We will also be able to replace some older computers and provide some additional equipment to each campus such as digital cameras and scanners."

Since its creation by the 74th Legislature in 1995, TIF has awarded approximately \$592 million in grants to its four constituent groups - public schools, libraries, institutions of higher education and public, not-for-profit healthcare facilities. The agency receives approximately \$150 million per year in revenues from telecommunications assessments to disburse over a ten year period.

TDA secures exemption for Denim

Agriculture Commissioner Susan Combs announced that the Texas Department of Agriculture has been granted approval by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency to issue a Section 18 specific exemption allowing the use of Denim 0.16EC (emamectin benzoate) to control beet armyworms on cotton. The specific exemption expires Oct. 1, 2001. Denim 0.16EC, manufactured by Novartis, may be applied following all directions, restrictions and precautions on the EPA registered product label, as well as restrictions within this notice.

• Applications should be made only by certified applicators, by licensed

applicators or by persons under the direct supervision of licensed applicators. All applicators must have a copy of the EPA approval notice in their possession prior to any applications.

• Denim 0.16EC may be applied using ground or aerial equipment at a rate of 0.0075 0.01 lb. a.i. (6-8 fl. oz. of product) per acre. No more than three applications may be made. Applications must be made in a minimum of five gallons of finished spray per acre for aerial application and 10 gallons for ground. Application is limited to a maximum of 24 oz. product per acre per season.

• A five-day application interval and

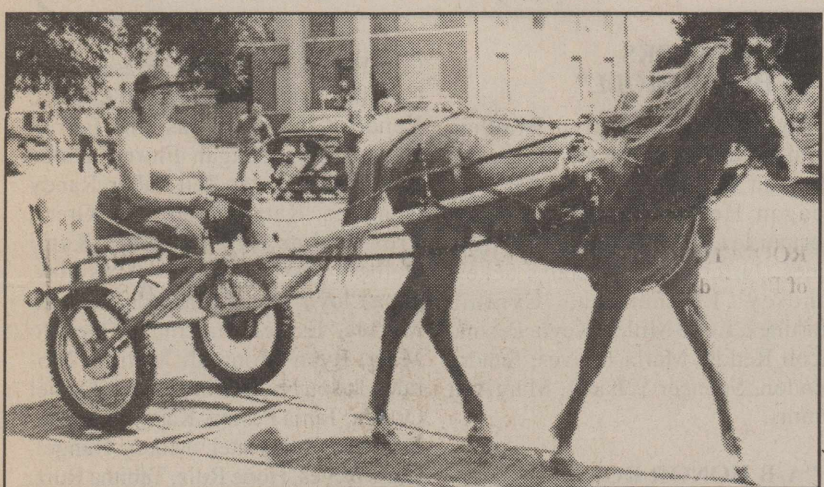
a 21-day pre-harvest interval must be observed.

• A restricted entry interval (REI) of 48 hours must be observed.

• Application may not be made to areas less than 100 feet from permanent natural bodies of surface water or reservoirs.

• A maximum of 1.8 million acres of cotton may be treated under this exemption. For more information, contact your county Texas Agricultural Extension Office or TDA at (512) 463-7407. A copy of the EPA Approval Notice is available on TDA's web page, [www.agr.state.tx.us/pesticide/denim2001.htm].

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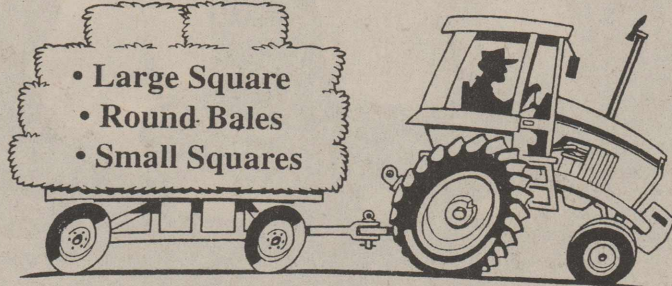

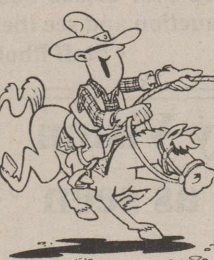

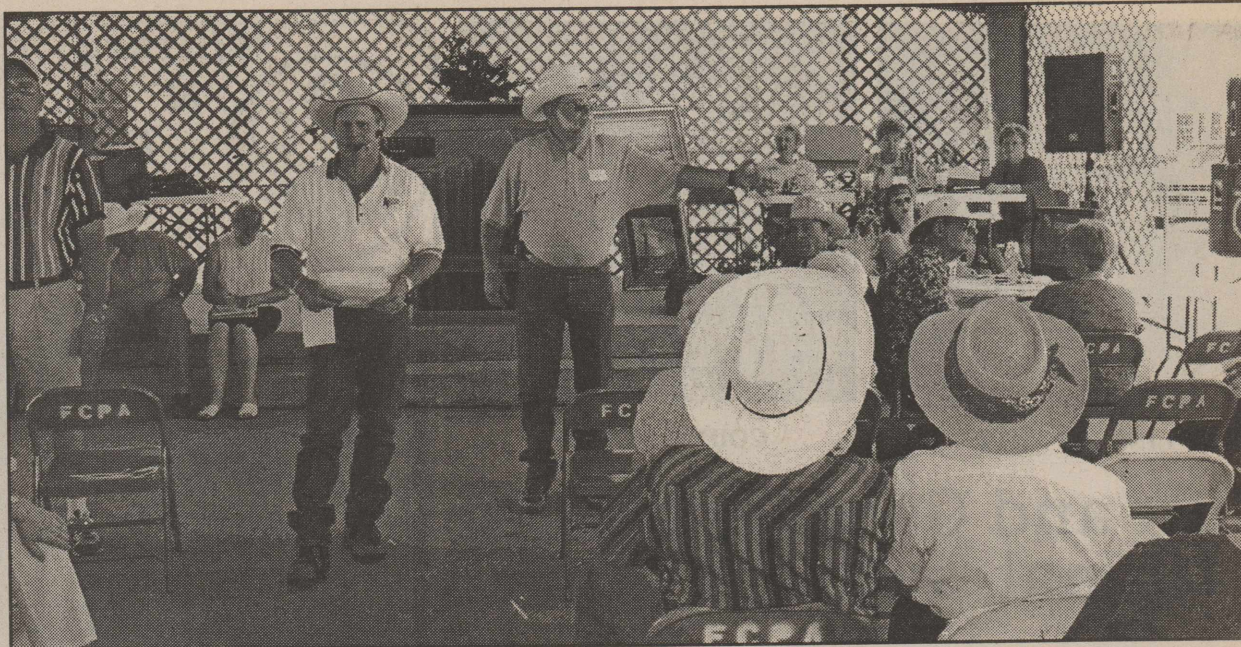

Ag students scholarships offered

The West Texas Agricultural Chemicals Institute (WTACI) is looking for a few good college students who may qualify for a scholarship.

Founded in 1953, WTACI is a consortium of educators, producers, consultants, chemical company dealers, and agribusiness representatives and leaders that promotes environmentally sound use of pesticides and other chemicals needed in sustainable, high-yield production agriculture.

The institute has presented more than \$50,000 in college scholarships (funded by its annual conferences and gifts) to more than 50 agriculture students at Abilene Christian University, Angelo State University, Lubbock Christian University, Sul Ross State University, Texas Tech University and West Texas A&M University since initiating these endowments in 1983.

Last year it expanded scholarship eligibility to include graduate and undergraduate students from West Texas who are attending colleges other than the original six universities. For the purpose of these scholarships, "West Texas" is defined as the geographical

area of Texas lying west of a line running from Wichita Falls to Del Rio.

WTACI funded six undergraduate and two graduate scholarships totaling \$6,500 last year at its annual educational conference in Lubbock. This year's conference is set in September.

The scholarships are open to students who meet these qualifications:

• Agriculture major Undergraduates (sophomores, juniors, seniors) must have more than 30 semester hours of course credits

• Graduates must have completed at least one semester of a graduate program

• Student plans to actively pursue a career in an ag-related field

• Candidates qualify for only scholarship only once

• Recipients must attend conference to personally receive their scholarship

• Scholarship funds will be used to advance the recipients formal education

• Application should be accompanied by three letters of recommendation

• Application deadline is June 15
• Scholarship winners will be notified by August 1

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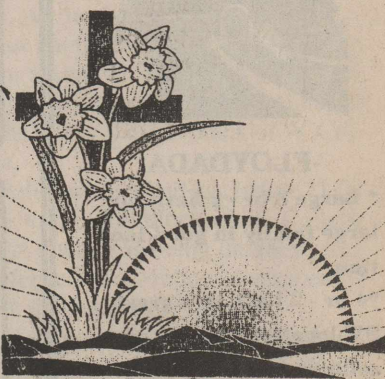
