## Old Fashioned 'Day full of entertainment

**LOCKNEY**--More than 200 youngsters are expected to compete for a spot in the national finals during the Texas Pedal Pull here August 18. The event has long been among the prime attractions to Lockney's annual Old Fashioned Saturday celebration.

Organized and conducted by Roy and Doris Ray, the Texas Pedal Pull features competitive divisions for youth ages 4-12. Winners in each category qualify for the national finals beginning Sept. 29 in Omaha, Neb. Registration for the Pedal Pull is scheduled for 10:30 a.m., with competition beginning at 1 p.m.

The first annual Fulfilled Dreams Custom Car and Truck Show and burnout will make its debut at Old Fashioned Saturday. More than \$500 in cash prizes will be awarded during the show, which will feature categories for hot rods, customs, originals, classics, lowriders, custom motorcycles, wild custom motorcycles, custom trucks, and classic trucks.

The entry fee is just \$20, and deadline for advance entries is August 13<sup>th</sup>. You may enter on the day of the show for \$22. Setup time and registration begins at 8 a.m. on the day of the show, followed by judging at 11:00 a.m. and a burnout at 3:00 p.m.

Prizes will be awarded for best interior, best motor, best paint, best of show, and motorcycle best of show.

Many additional events are scheduled for Old Fashioned Saturday, which begins with a three-on-three basketball tournament at 8 a.m. Entries for the three-on-three basketball tournament will also be accepted until August 16. Entry forms are available at City Bank, Consumers Fuel, Floyd County Farm and Ranch Supply, and at the Chamber website.

The internationally known Kwahadi Dancers of Amarillo will demonstrate their unique form of authentic Indian dress and dance later in the day. Also featured are street food and craft vendors, Texas Tech athletics booths, a gymnastics exhibition, a skit by Floyd County 4H, entertainment by local and area musicians and singers, and the traditional street dance from 8 until midnight.

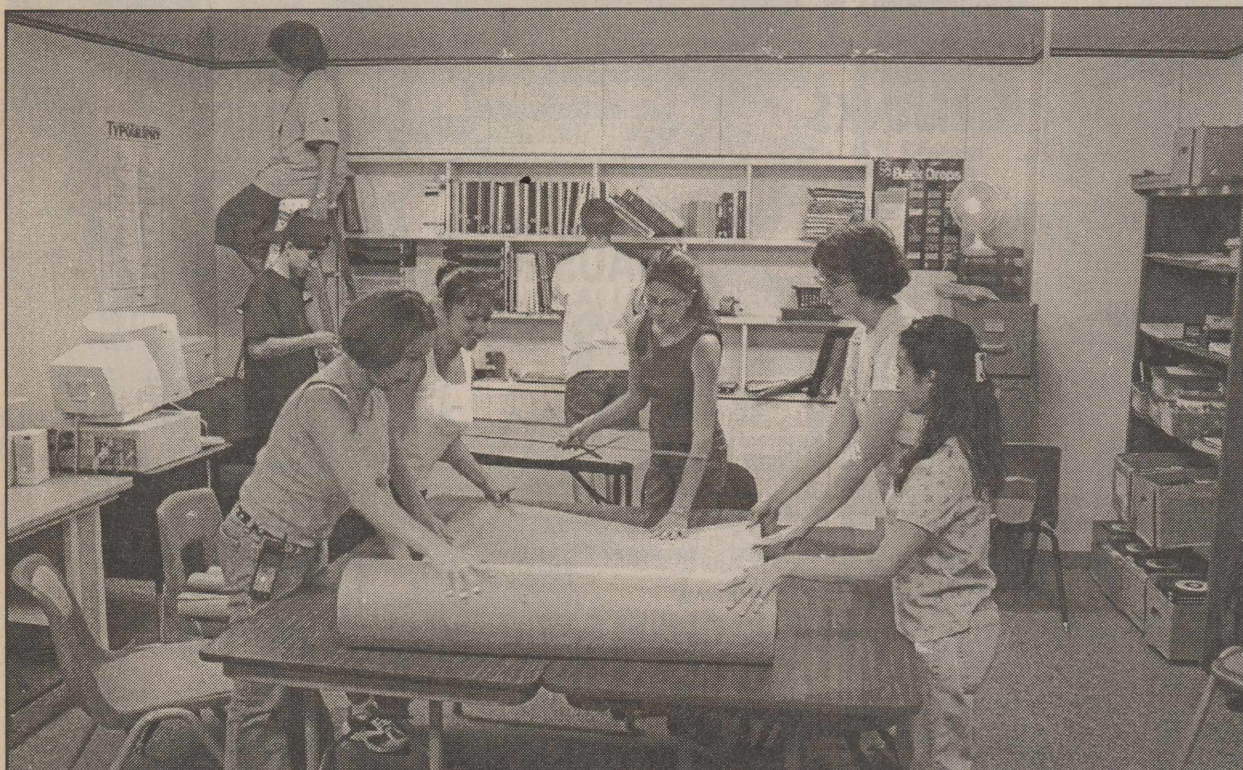

# Duncan to serve as County's Senator

With the death of Senator Tom Haywood, Floyd County constituents will now be represented by Senator Robert Duncan, District 28. However, this will change November 6, 2001 after voters choose a new State Senator in a special called election.

Floyd County voters won't get much of a chance to get to know their newly elected Senator. Because of the new redistricting plans, the County will be back in Sen. Duncan's district in November 2002.

As of August 6, this newspaper had received notice of only one man, Craig Estes, campaigning for Sen. Haywood's former position as District 30 Senator.

Estes is a Wichita Falls businessman. "The special election will be a political free-for-all with all candidates, regardless of party affiliation, running on the same ballot," said Estes. "There will be a thirty-day runoff in the event no candidate achieves 50 percent of the vote."

Estes, a Republican, is Chairman of the Board and CEO of Estes, Inc., a wholesale distributor of chemicals and fertilizer.

The election may not draw much

attention in Floyd County if voters know they won't be represented long by the man they elect--unless, of course, the battle over the redistricting changes the County's Senatorial district lines again.

At this time Floyd County's Senator, Robert Duncan, can be reached on a toll free line at 800-322-9538. His address is: The Honorable Robert Duncan, Box 12068, Capitol Station, Austin, TX 78711. He has a district office in Lubbock, at 1001 Main Street, Suite 608, Lubbock, TX 79401, 762-1122.

Sen. Duncan attended Texas Tech University and received his bachelor of science degree in Agriculture Economics in 1976. He was a House member from 1993-1996 and has been a Senate member since 1997.

Senator Duncan has previous experience in the Texas Senate serving as general counsel to the Texas Senate Affairs Committee in the 71st Legislature in 1989. His uncle, the late Marshall Formby, was a member of the Texas Senate District 30 in the late 1940's, and represented many of the same counties now served by Senator Duncan, in the 28th Senate District.

Friday, August 3rd, we also had Cobb Gilly and Wanda Williams to eat lunch with us. We hope they enjoyed it enough to come back again.

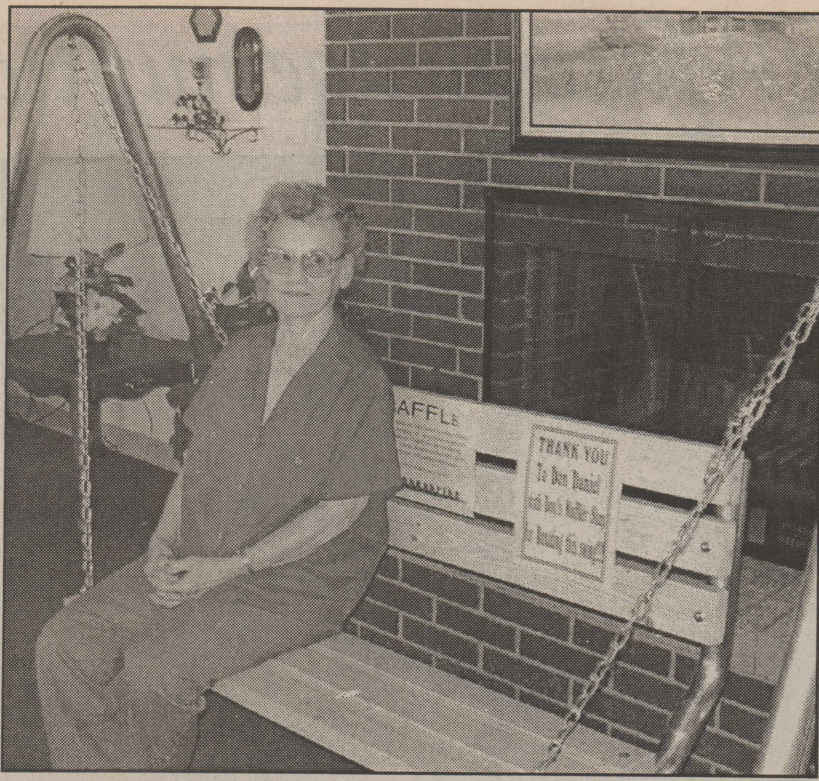

**KFLP moves frequency channel to 106.1 FM**

After recently celebrating fifty years of radio in Floyd County, radio station KFLP is announcing the move of its country music and farm programming from 95.3 FM to 106.1 FM. The move on Wednesday, August 8, 2001 effectively strengthened the station's presence in the counties of Briscoe, Crosby, Hale, Lubbock, and Motley - including the cities of Lockney, Plainview, Hale Center, Abernathy, Lubbock, Idalou, Lorenzo, Ralls, Crosbyton, Matador and Silverton.

"Keeping in touch with the rural communities on the South Plains is fairly easy," added St. James, "especially with the industry move to more satellite programming." KFLP originates all of programming from their downtown Floydada studios and features a mixture of current county music, the local morning show of *Tony and the Beaver*, two daily Agri-Business reports, commodity market updates hourly, and outstanding coverage of high school sports.

The frequency shift came following a decision by the Federal Communications Commission in Washington to grant the station an increase in power of eight times. According to Tony St. James, General Manager of KFLP, the power increase would have interfered with other stations had the Floyd County Station not moved up on the dial. "With other signals in close proximity of 95.3, we had been pigeon-holed with no hope of improving our coverage area. The decision by the FCC opened the door for us to expand our rural programming to others on the South Plains."

The thirty-minute Agri-Business Reports air weekdays at 6:30 a.m. and 12:30 p.m., and feature daily interviews with industry experts - including Larry Combest, Charles Stenholm, Susan Combs and Billy Dunavant. Hourly market updates air at half-past the hour form 9:30 a.m. through 3:30 p.m.

As opposed to many other stations in the area, KFLP (900 AM and 106.1 FM) remains locally owned and operated.

The station also features live coverage of high school football, basketball, baseball, tennis, golf and track. KFLP is the only radio station in the state to provide live coverage of the state UIL Track and Field Championships in Austin - two years running.

The move to 106.1 FM occurred Wednesday Morning at 7:00 AM. Soon KFLP will be heard worldwide too, as plans are underway to begin streaming via the internet.

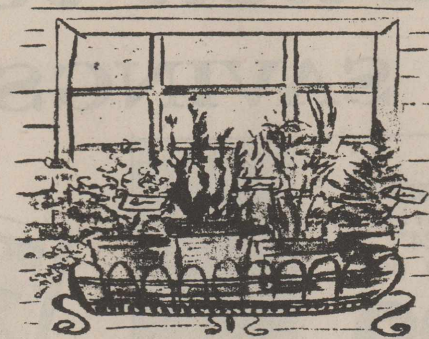

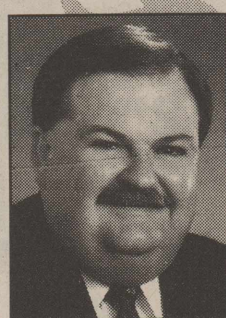

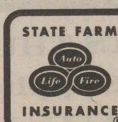

## Teacher Loan Forgiveness Program available for Floyd County teachers

The Department of Education established the Teacher Loan Forgiveness Program through the 1998 Reauthorization of the Higher Education Act. However, July 1, 2001, was the first date that regulations that govern the program went into effect. To qualify for the forgiveness program, a borrower must be able to certify that he or she has taught fulltime for at least five consecutive, complete academic years at a low-income school that qualifies for Title I funds. The borrower must also certify that he or she had no outstanding balance on a federal Stafford loan at the time he or she obtained a loan on or after October 1, 1998, in addition to other criteria.

Borrowers may qualify for up to \$5,000 in loan forgiveness through the program. Since the final rules for the program

were issued in November 2000, TG's customer assistance team has been developing systems and procedures to process Teacher Loan Forgiveness applications in a timely manner. Tracy Lindsay, customer assistance team leader, has been overseeing the preparations and was involved in processing the first application. She is confident that this is just the beginning of what TG hopes will be a successful and effective program to motivate people to enter and continue in the teaching profession.

"TG is ready to process applications

to help borrowers take advantage of the Teacher Loan Forgiveness Program," said Lindsay. "We are pleased to be able to offer teachers the option, under the federal program, to pay off some or all of their student loan balance."

S. Department of Agriculture. If a child has a disability, as determined by a doctor, and the disability prevents the child from eating the regular school meal, the school will make substitutions prescribed by the doctor. If a substitution is needed, there will be no extra charge for the meal. Please note, however, that the school is not required to make a substitution for a food allergy, unless it meets the definition of disability. Your child can get free school meals if you get food stamps or Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF). Depending on your income, your child may be eligible for either free or reduced-price meals.

**How do I get free or reduced-price school meals for my child?** You must complete the Application for Free and Reduced-Price Meals Form and return it to the school.

- **Households getting food stamps or TANF** You only have to include your child's name and case number, and an adult household member must sign the form.
- **Households that do not get food stamps or TANF** If you do not have a case number, you must include the names of all household members, the amount of income each person received last month and where the income came from. An adult household member must sign the form and include his or her social security number, or indicate that he or she has no social security number.

## Empty nest syndrome hits Floydada

It could be a match made in heaven. A Floydada resident has a son or daughter who will attend college in the fall. Their son or daughter will leave behind a bedroom, walls of pictures, companionship and memories. That child could also leave a parent with a feeling of loss and sadness known as Empty Nest Syndrome.

According to a recent U.S. Census Bureau report, "Projections of the Number of Households and Families in the United States: 1995 to 2010" currently, 52 percent of American families have no children under the age of 18 living at home. By the year 2010, however, this proportion could increase to 59 percent as the number of families with no children under age 18 grows to 46 million, up from 36 million.

Yet across the world, there is a teenager who is about to courageously embark on a trip to the United States in August that he or she has been dreaming about since childhood. That student's dream will not become a reality, however, without a Floydada family's love and support. Very simply, that student needs a bed and a place to study and two meals a day, but most importantly, that student needs a Floydada resident to welcome him or her into their home as if he or she were a son or daughter.

These international students come to the U.S. on the Academic Year in America (AYA) program. Each student arrives with full medical insurance, spending money, at least three years of English language study and the hope of seeing the U.S. through the eyes of a resident. Students are age

15 to 18 and come from more than 30 different countries such as Brazil, China, Germany, France, South Africa and Poland.

Who can host an AYA student? There is no "typical" host family. Just as there is no "typical" American family, there is no "typical" host family. Retirees, single parents and young couples are all able to give an international student a good home. Some host families may not even have children of their own.

If a child has a disability, as determined by a doctor, and the disability prevents the child from eating the regular school meal, the school will make substitutions prescribed by the doctor. If a substitution is needed, there will be no extra charge for the meal. Please note, however, that the school is not required to make a substitution for a food allergy, unless it meets the definition of disability. Please call the school for further information; telephone number 983-3498.

Your children can get free school meals if you get food stamps or Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF). Depending on your income, your children may be eligible for free or reduced-price meals.

How do I get free or reduced-price school meals for my children? You must complete the Application for Free and Reduced-Price Meals Form and return it to the school.

- Households getting food stamps or TANF. You only have to include your children's names and case numbers, and an adult household member must sign the form.
- Households that do not get food stamps or TANF. If you do not have a case number, you must include the names of all household members, the amount of income each person received last month and where the income came from. An adult household member must sign the form and include his or her social security number, or indicate that he or she has no social security number.
- Households with a foster children. You must include the children's names and the amount of "personal use" income the children received last month, and an adult must sign the form.

Will the form be verified? Your eligibility may be checked at any time during the school year. School officials may ask you to send written evidence that shows that your children should get free or reduced-price school meals.

Can I appeal the school's decision? You can talk to school officials if you do not agree with the school's decision on your form. You also may ask for a fair hearing by calling or writing to:

Must I report changes? If your children get free or reduced-price meals because of your income, you must tell us if your household size decreases, or if your income increases by more than \$50 per month or \$600 per year. If your children get free meals because your household gets food stamps or TANF, you must tell us when you no longer get these benefits.

Will information on my form be kept confidential? We will use the information on your form to decide if your children should get free or reduced-price meals. We may inform officials with other child nutrition, health and education programs of the information on your form to determine benefits for those programs or for funding and/or evaluation purposes.

Can I apply for free and reduced-price meals later? You may apply for free and reduced-price meals at any time during the school year. If you are not eligible now but have a change, like a decrease in household income, an increase in household size, become unemployed or get food stamps or TANF, complete another form then.

We will let you know if you are approved or denied.

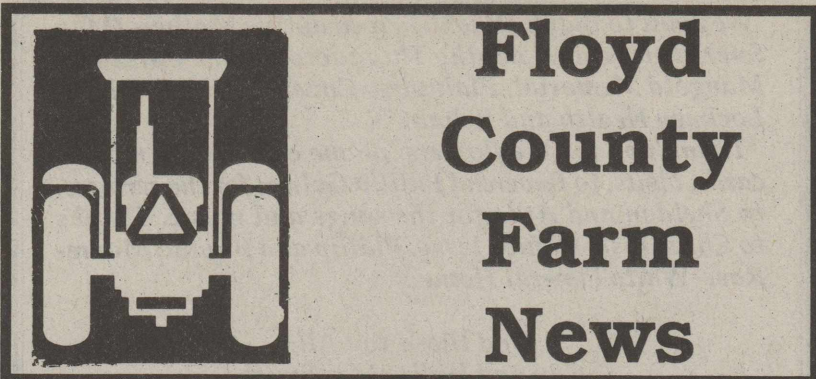

Duncan of Lubbock; and, Texas House of Representative member Gary Walker of Plains.

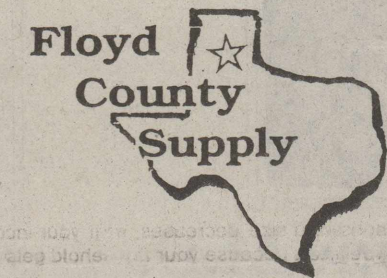

## Senate okays farm aid package

The affirmative voice vote in the Senate this morning on the agricultural aid package brings assurance to hard-pressed farmers that a little more assistance will be coming their way in September.

If the Senate had not passed the identical \$5.5 billion package to H.R. 2213, "The Crop Year 2001 Agricultural Economic Assistance Act," that passed out of the House June 26, most folks who truly understand the Washington process are of the considered opinion that hurting farmers would have been left in the lurch.

The Senate Ag Committee had six weeks for debate, discussion and compromise following the House of Representative's June 26 approval of

the \$5.5 Billion aid package. The SAC chose to delay until the eleventh hour as close of business loomed. Critics point the finger back at Harkin and the SAC saying they should have been working diligently on behalf of farmers weeks ago and following the strong leadership of their counterparts in the House.

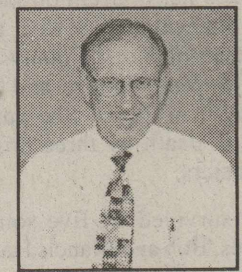

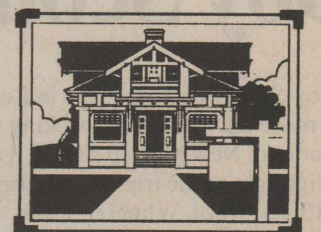

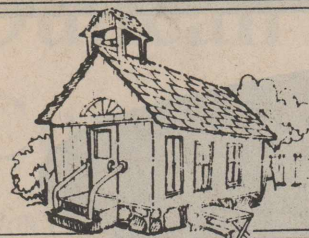

Mount Walter before hiking on to Wheeler.

They reached cold, windy Wheeler Peak about 8:30 a.m. after signing the summit register, taking pictures and admiring the view from the top of New Mexico, the Scouts started the 10-mile walk down to civilization via Lost Lake and Middle Fork Trail. That evening, they enjoyed a big dinner at Sundance Restaurant in Red River.

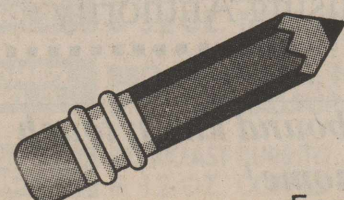
