



Jon Jones, of Dougherty, said it may be best to not tell this story--but I'm going to take my chances. After all, the animal rights activists won't be mad at me--they will go after Jon.

Jon was all dressed up for the Cattleman's Ball, July 28th, and left home in his father's diesel pickup truck.

He drove the 10 miles to Floydada in the drizzle and stopped at Friends Convenience Store before heading out to Plainview.

When he came out of the store he noticed people pointing to his back tire. He leaned down to look and found his father's pet cat, Sassy, hanging upside down by one leg inside the wheel well. The cat's leg was caught up somehow inside the truck. She was still alive, but very wet, dirty, and plenty mad.

Jon worked for a long time in the rain trying to untangle that very angry cat and he finally called for help from the police.

Officers arrived and also spent a great deal of time trying to get Sassy out.

Jon says the cat was wailing, hurt, and obviously scared. They really needed to shove the cat up and out but were unable to do so because she was fighting them so much.

Finally, because everyone felt Sassy was hurt and suffering, the decision was made to put her out of her misery.

The officers couldn't shoot the cat because of the location inside the truck. So one of the officers choked the cat for about 60 seconds until it went limp.

"I felt like I was in the twilight zone," said Jon.

Jon's dad, Travis Jones, took Sassy to a vet's office to have it checked over. The vet, who happens to be Jon's brother, kept her for a week. They did x-rays (cat scans), etc., and decided Sassy was perfectly fine.

This whole event reminded me of another story I heard years ago.

We don't want to upset our local elected officials, or our taxpayers either, for that matter, but we thought you might be interested in what some of the other folks, in other locales, get in the way of wages and benefits.

Bear in mind that here in Floyd County, where our commissioners have responsibility for miles and miles of county roads, which is no small task, and for setting the county budget, which again is no small task, and for whatever else comes up in the way of county business, the annual salary is something like \$14,000. The county judge gets a little more, but not much

In Austin, at the moment, The Commissioners Court is seized with the problem of what to do about raising salaries. Under the plan being considered, the County Judge's salary would increase a little over 10 percent, to ond. \$93,295 annually. Commissioners themselves would see their salary go up a little over 7 percent, to \$73,915. Even so, they would still rank behind

some of the other Texas counties. Up in Tarrant County (Fort Worth) commissioners make \$107,136, In Bexar County (San Antonio) the authorized salary for commissioners is \$63,590, but a couple of the commissioners have refused their increases, according to news stories out of there, and are still paid \$49,368. In Harris County (Houston) commissioners get \$123,061. And the County Judge gets a little more.

Back in Travis County (Austin) the lone Republican on the Commissioners Court has spoken out against the raises, and says he won't take the increase. He made a motion that the proposal to increase commissioners pay be stripped from the budget plan, and that those proposed salaries be discussed individually. Needless to say, his motion didn't even get a sec-

The Travis County proposed budget also, incidentally, calls for an increase in property taxes. The money's gotta come from somewhere.

Any comparison of salaries in the human condition. political world proves only two things. (1) You don't always get what you pay for. Sometimes more, sometimes less. And (2) salaries tend to equal the ability, or tolerance, of taxpayers.

President Bush has now made public his position on the use of federal dollars for what has come to be known as "stem cell research." He will approve, he says, the use of those dollars for further experimentation on currently existing "lines" of stem cells.

The eradication effort in the Northern High Plains Eradication Zone will begin a new phase about Sept. 1, Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation officials said.







