Jimmy Burson and "Texas in the Swing" will be performing Friday night, August 31, 2001 at the Floyd and Surrounding Counties Fair at the Unity Center in Muncy, Texas. Tickets for the concert are \$5.00 each and may be purchased at the door in advance at Kaleidoscope and D&J Gin in Lockney and DG Designs and Duke's Dodads in Floydada and City Bank in Silvertown.

Jimmy Burson was raised on his family's ranch near Silvertown, Texas in Briscoe County. His mother, Dean Burson, got him interested in music and started him in piano lessons at the age of 8 years old and later enrolled

him in voice lessons. He became interested in swing music in high school and started playing the fiddle in college. Several years ago, he formed the band, "Texas in the Swing," which focuses on preserving "country swing music". They also play a mix of old time fiddle music, jazz, blues, cowboy music, and gospel.

The group consists of all Christians and present concerts that are family-oriented. They have performed for four years at the Great American Music Festival at Silver Dollar City in Branson, Missouri, and three years at the Legends of Wester Swing in

Wichita Falls, Texas. Agriculture Commissioner to hold Town Hall Meeting at Unity Center

Agriculture Commissioner Susan Combs will hold a Town Hall meeting at the Unity Center in Muncy on September 6 at 12 noon. The meeting will be one in a series of town hall meetings in September and October throughout the state. Commissioner Combs will meet with farmers, ranchers, rural economic development and community leaders and local citizens

to discuss issues that are affecting the agricultural industry and rural Texas. "I want to hear firsthand what's on the minds of the farmers, ranchers, citizens and leaders of our communities," Combs said. "I want to know about issues affecting them, their families and their community and to hear their ideas and solutions for the future."

"Rural Texas and agriculture are vital to the entire state, and by working together we can address issues such as water, marketing, federal initiatives, rural economic development and drought," Combs said. "By letting us know what you need or want, we can tackle these issues and concerns together to ensure that rural Texas and agriculture thrive."

Old Fashioned fun and games celebrated in Lockney Saturday

LOCKNEY -- Events ranging from the Texas State Pedal Pull to the first annual Fulfilled Dreams Car and Truck Show, a three-on-three basketball tournament, the Kwahadi Dancers, and a street dance highlight Lockney's fun-filled Old Fashioned Saturday celebration here this weekend.

More than 200 youngsters are expected to compete for a spot in the national finals during the Texas State Pedal Pull. Organized and conducted by Roy and Doris Ray, the Texas Pedal Pull features competitive divisions for youth ages 4-12. Winners in each category qualify for the national finals beginning Sept. 29 in Omaha, Neb. Registration for the Pedal Pull is scheduled for 10:30 a.m., with competition beginning at 1 p.m.

A large turnout is expected for the first annual Fulfilled Dreams Custom Car and Truck Show. More than \$500 in cash prizes will be awarded during the show, which will feature categories for hot rods, customs, originals, classics, lowriders, custom motorcycles, wild custom motorcycles, custom trucks, and classic trucks.

Those who have not preregistered may do so on Saturday for \$22. Setup and registration begins at 8 a.m., followed by judging at 11:00 a.m.

Prizes will be awarded for best in-

terior, best motor, best paint, best of show, and motorcycle best of show. Entry forms are available via the Internet at the Lockney Area Chamber of Commerce website, www.lockneychamber.com. For additional information, call Mike at 652-2239, David at 652-1115, or J.J. at 652-2756.

The third annual three-on-three basketball tournament begins with the elementary age division at 8 a.m. The tournament will include separate divisions for boys and girls in elementary (grades 3-5), junior high (grades 6-8), and high school (grades 9-12), plus open adult divisions for men and women not currently attending high school. Teams must check in before division play begins. Estimated start times for each division are 8 a.m. for elementary, 10:30 for junior high, 1 p.m. for high school, and 2:30 for adult.

Entry fees are \$60 per team (\$15 per player). Teams may have a maximum of four players, and all entrants will receive a free T-shirt if they register by Aug. 16. The first place team in each division will receive \$60 in gift certificates redeemable at any Lockney Chamber member business, with the second place team receiving \$40.

Entry deadline for the tournament

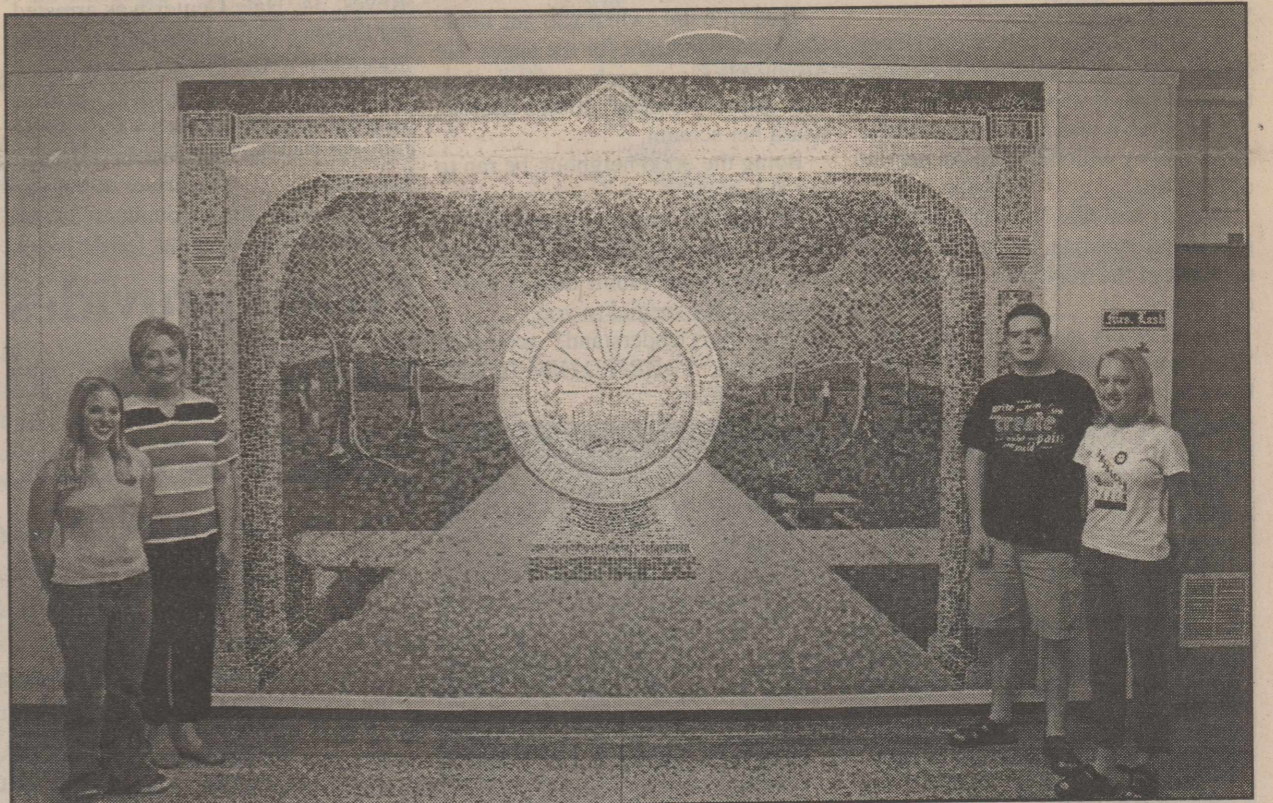

Local entertainment will begin at 11 a.m. and continue throughout much of the day on Main Street. The Kwahadi Dancers will perform at 5 p.m., followed by Sherry's Flying Angels at 7.

The traditional street dance will be expanded this year to include both live music from country band Denim & Lace and entertainment provided by D.J. Dimas Garcia. The dance will conclude at midnight.

Also featured are street food and craft vendors, Texas Tech athletics booths, a skit by Floyd County 4H, and water polo by the Lockney Volunteer Fire Department. A Model A John Deere Pedal Tractor will also be raffled at the end of the pedal pull. Raffle tickets are being sold for \$3 each and are available from any Chamber director.

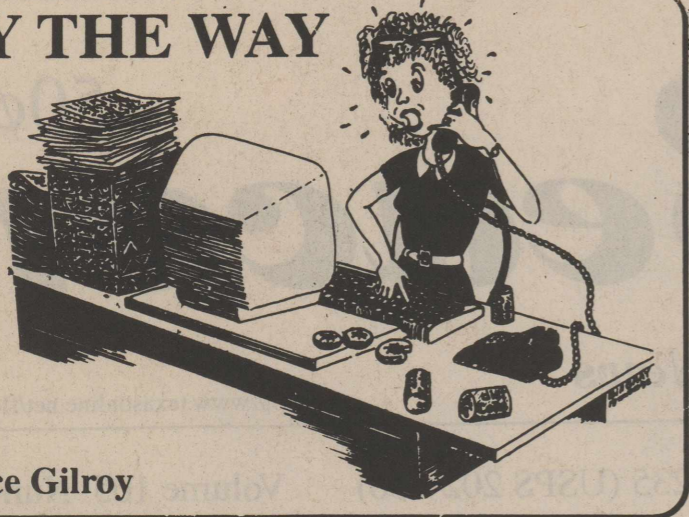

was a very unnerving experience."

It was late when Jon got home and he didn't talk to his Dad. Jon just went to bed.

In the morning Jon got up and found Sassy, very much alive, sitting at the back door.

"I felt like I was in the twilight zone," said Jon.

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A view from The Lamplighter

We don't want to upset our local elected officials, or our taxpayers either, for that matter, but we thought you might be interested in what some of the other folks, in other locales, get in the way of wages and benefits.

Bear in mind that here in Floyd County, where our commissioners have responsibility for miles and miles of county roads, which is no small task, and for setting the county budget, which again is no small task, and for whatever else comes up in the way of county business, the annual salary is something like \$14,000. The county judge gets a little more, but not much.

In Austin, at the moment, The Commissioners Court is seized with the problem of what to do about raising salaries. Under the plan being considered, the County Judge's salary would increase a little over 10 percent, to \$93,295 annually. Commissioners themselves would see their salary go up a little over 7 percent, to \$73,915. Even so, they would still rank behind

some of the other Texas counties. Up in Tarrant County (Fort Worth) commissioners make \$107,136. In Bexar County (San Antonio) the authorized salary for commissioners is \$63,590, but a couple of the commissioners have refused their increases, according to news stories out of there, and are still paid \$49,368. In Harris County (Houston) commissioners get \$123,061. And the County Judge gets a little more.

Back in Travis County (Austin) the lone Republican on the Commissioners Court has spoken out against the raises, and says he won't take the increase. He made a motion that the proposal to increase commissioners pay be stripped from the budget plan, and that those proposed salaries be discussed individually. Needless to say, his motion didn't even get a second.

The Travis County proposed budget also, incidentally, calls for an increase in property taxes. The money's gotta come from somewhere.

Any comparison of salaries in the political world proves only two things. (1) You don't always get what you pay for. Sometimes more, sometimes less. And (2) salaries tend to equal the ability, or tolerance, of taxpayers.

President Bush has now made public his position on the use of federal dollars for what has come to be known as "stem cell research." He will approve, he says, the use of those dollars for further experimentation on currently existing "lines" of stem cells.

We are not completely familiar with what a "line" is, in the area of stem cell research, (the President, relying on the National Institute of Health, says there are some 60 "lines" now in existence) but we do have thoughts on the general subject. Generally speaking, we approve the president's position, and his decision. There is no way, nor should there be any way, any government can preclude advancement in scientific knowledge that might relieve pain and suffering in the

human condition.

The only question, in our opinion, is whether our government should help pay for that advancement. Given the fact that the vast bulk of money going to "research" in America is funded by the federal government, that question looms large indeed. Many people who pay the taxes that provide federal funding, say no. Many other people, who also pay taxes that provide that federal funding, say yes. Given what exists now, we think Mr. Bush's stated position, condemned by some and applauded by others, is about as close to being the right decision as one could come up with.

The word being passed from the White House is that Mr. Bush spent many, many, hours worrying about the long term effect of his decision on stem cell research. Would that he had spent the same time worrying about the long term effect of his stance on immigration, or on the Middle East. Had he done so, we might have a more coherent policy in both cases.

The cameras also have audio capabilities.

The City purchased the cameras with a grant obtained by Chief Edwards. The Police Department received a grant for \$9,440 and the City added \$660 to the grant.

The Council discussed a proposal from Texas Municipal League (TML) on a new employee retirement vesting policy. At this time city employees are vested after 10 years. TML is proposing a 5 year vesting policy.

The Council has until Dec. 1st to

make a decision and took no action at this time. The new policy would automatically take effect on Dec. 1st if the Council takes no action.

Virginia Hernandez appeared before the Council and complained about the large tree limbs and other trash that had been dumped in the alley in the 300 block of S.E. 4th.

She told the Council the pile of limbs and trash had grown so large it is blocking the alley. She asked the City to clean up the debris.

The Council agreed to go look at the situation and make a decision later.

Floydada Boy Scouts attend National Jamboree in D.C.

When you think of things that occur every four years you might think of the Olympics, the presidential election, or maybe homecoming. To a scout, it means time for the National Boy Scout Jamboree.

On July 20, 2001, 34 scouts from the South Plains Council boarded American Airlines at 5:30 a.m. in Lubbock. Adult leaders and scouts from Lubbock, Ralls, Muleshoe, Plainview and Floydada made up troop 1915 and were on their way to Washington, D.C. and then on to Fort A.P. Hill, Virginia for the 15th National Boy Scout Jamboree.

The three days in Washington included trips to the Smithsonian, Museum of American History, National History Museum, Air and Space Museum, Ford's Theatre, National Cathedral and the Naval Museum. The Lincoln Memorial, Jefferson Memorial, Iowa Jima Memorial, Kennedy Center, Arlington National Cemetery, Memorial Amphitheater were also visited. Also included were the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier, Vietnam Memorial, Korean Memorial, FDR Memorial, Boy Scout Memorial, Holocaust Museum, Washington Monument, Bureau of Engraving and Printing, Library of Congress and a tour of the capitol.

Arriving at Fort A.P. Hill, Virginia on Monday, July 23, 2001 at about 2:00 p.m., scouts set about making camp and putting up tents. The goals of the National Jamboree are to give a clear understanding and deeper sense of commitment to the ideals of scouting, emphasize physical fitness and natural resources conservation and to demonstrate to America and the world the objectives of a great youth movement.

More than 40,000 scouts attended this year's jamboree. B.J. Chappell, Derrick Griggs, Brian Odom and Jay McGaugh attended from Troop 357 in Floydada. Scouts that have attended previous jamborees from Troop 357 are Dustin Jones, Shane Lloyd, Patrick Odom (twice), Austin Williams and Dane Sanders.

Three and a half years of planning and more than 7,300 staffers worked over a week to have everything in place for an enjoyable and safe eight days at the jamboree. All branches of the military are great supporters of scouting and served a huge part in planning and carrying out this event.

Scouts were assigned to subcamps of which there were 20. Floydada scouts were in Subcamp #19, the James E. West Camp, named after the

Chief Scout Executive from 1911 to 1943. Each subcamp was divided into patrols. Jay was in the Foxes, B.J. and Brian were in the Outlaws and Derrick was in the Hooters. Each subcamp had a gateway to guide people to campsite entrances. Some gateways take two to six months to plan. These gateways represented the scouts, countries, home states and regions. Each subcamp prepared their own breakfast and supper. Lunch was provided at the Kiosk. A total of 479,000 eggs, 76,000 hamburgers, 90,000 pancakes and 14 miles of submarine sandwiches were just a few of the items used in feeding the "troops".

Kosher food was available for those that required it. Denominations including Catholic, Protestant, Jewish, Muslim and more were represented. To the Boy Scouts, no matter what religion you practice, you have a home brotherhood in scouting.

Skills and badges offered, included railroading, tinsmithing, blacksmithing, silversmithing, pewter casting, scuba diving, repelling, kayaking, archery, air rifle, buckskin games, trap shooting, fishing, snorkeling, amateur radio, rafting, conservation, canoeing, motorcross, biking, religious awards, geology, chemistry, 5-K run, wood carving, basketry and the list goes on. Seventy-two badges could be earned or started on.

Activities offered were outdoor adventure, disabilities awareness, American Indian Village, Brownsea Island, Outback Center, Action Center, Scouting, 5-K run and Arts and Science Expo.

Entertainment included hot air balloons, Civil War and Revolutionary War reenactments, U.S. Army Golden Knights, 82nd Airborne Chorus, USN Cruisers Rock and Roll Band, Three of Hearts, Osmonds, The Next Generation, laser show, Native American dancers, Sprockids, Louise Mandrell and a video address from President George W. Bush.

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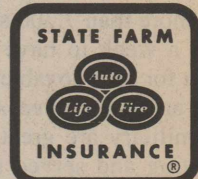

PCG seeks drought relief for cotton

Plains Cotton Growers has asked the USDA Risk Management Agency to consider issuing a deviation allowing "boll count"-based adjustments on dryland cotton severely impacted by drought conditions in 2001.

PCG's request includes dryland cotton planted in the Texas High Plains as well as cotton planted in the Rolling Plains region.

The deviation requested by PCG is identical to the one issued by the Risk Management Agency for dryland cotton in South Texas and the Lower Rio Grande Valley.

The deviation would allow growers to immediately receive appraisal on cotton counting only the harvestable bolls on the plant. The deviation also changes the factor applied to the bolls counted to 4.5, or 450 bolls per pound.

Continued hot, dry weather has significantly impacted the condition of the crop that eventually made it to a stand. Dryland cotton in the majority of the affected area has not received significant rainfall during the growing season and has reached cut-out earlier than normal.

The plants display typical drought-

induced characteristics, including stunted growth and the production of very few blooms and bolls.

According to Texas Cooperative Extension Service Cotton Specialist Dr. Randy Boman, even the return of beneficial rainfall would have little impact on the dryland crop except for the initiation of regrowth that has essentially no chance of producing harvestable bolls.

Overall the move to a boll count appraisal methodology is not a significant change, and would not significantly change the crops outcome on the affected acreage.

Cotton rapidly achieving cut-out

Evidence of the advanced condition of the 2001 August 27 Texas High Plains cotton crop is plain to see as irrigated and dryland fields have rapidly achieved physiological cut-out in many areas.

With plants putting on their last blooms, the crop is expected to mature at a fairly rapid pace unless rainfall returns to the area.

On irrigated cotton rains would probably be more beneficial than harmful as the plant would be more likely to take its full boll load to harvest. On the dryland side however, rains at this stage would most likely only produce regrowth and a fresh crop of squares and blooms that would not produce harvestable bolls.

Those squares and blooms could prove costly though, by sustaining

boll weevil populations with a fresh food source as they prepare to enter diapause.

Overall prospects for the area continue to look reasonably poor with dryland cotton not expected to contribute many bales and the irrigated crop only expected to average a bale per acre across the entire region.

Some excellent irrigated cotton is expected to be harvested, but the rest is average or below average in nature.

Spraying to begin in northern high plains

The eradication effort in the Northern High Plains Eradication Zone will begin a new phase about Sept. 1, Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation officials said.

Cotton fields will be sprayed on a weekly basis to reduce boll weevil numbers before the insects leave fields to overwinter, a process similar to hibernation.

When cotton bolls begin to open, weevils cease to feed and reproduce and begin moving out of the fields to find places to overwinter. These weevils are targeted so fewer weevils will emerge before the next growing season.

In preparation for this phase, foundation employees have been deploying pheromone traps around cotton fields in the zones. The traps, which are light green in color and cone shaped, provide foundation personnel with information on weevil populations and movement.

This year the information gathered will be used to establish a baseline subsequent years can be compared with. In these later years, treatment of fields will be based on the information gathered.

During the 2001 growing season, however, all cotton fields are sprayed weekly. Ultra low volume malathion

is applied to fields at the rate of 12 ounces per acre.

The malathion used by the foundation is a much purer form of the insecticide than found in garden centers and retail stores for use in home gardens. This formulation allows the foundation to effectively eliminate weevils using the least possible amount of insecticide. Most of the applications will be performed by aerial applicators, but near sensitive areas, such as homes, schools, hospitals, nursing homes or environmentally sensitive areas near lakes, rivers or ponds, ground equipment will be used to spray fields.

Commissioners approve technology fee

The Floyd County Commissioners met Monday, August 13, and voted unanimously to approve a \$4 Technology fee in the county Justice Courts and a \$1 Security filing fee in the county Civil Courts.

The \$4 Technology fee will be collected on all Class C misdemeanor cases in the Justice Courts. The \$1 filing fee will be charged on any extra documents being filed in connection with all civil cases.

According to Floyd County Judge

William D. Hardin, "The \$4 Technology fees will be used for office computers and electronic equipment, while the \$1 Security fees will help pay for bailiff's salaries in the civil courts."

In other matters, Commissioner Lennie Gilroy made a motion to employ SPAG (South Plains Association of Governments), in the amount of \$4,000, to prepare the Floyd County Redistricting Plan. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Jon Jones and unanimously passed.

The commissioners voted unanimously to transfer \$40,000 from the Road and Bridge Fund to be divided equally into each of the four precincts and several budget amendments were approved.

Floyd County Treasurer Mary Shurbet presented the July 1 through July 31, 2001 Financial Report to the commissioners. The Beginning Balance was \$212,297.48 with Receipts of \$253,666.47. Transfers In and Out were \$149,260.11 with \$187,576.31 Disbursed, leaving a Balance of \$278,387.64.
