Landowners asking to tap onto Aiken waterline

Eugene Tannahill and Lindan Morris met with the Lockney City Council, Thursday, July 10, to discuss landowners use of the proposed Aiken waterline.

The City of Lockney has secured a \$250,000 grant to dig a well in Aiken and pipe water to Lockney. The City

is currently in the process of securing easements from property owners along Hwy. 70.

Some of the landowners have made a request to tap onto the waterline and secure city water. Morris told the Council that a landowner meeting to

Commissioners consider future tax abatements

The Floyd County Commissioners met in regular session Monday, January 14, and unanimously adopted a resolution to consider the possibility of tax abatements for new businesses moving into the county.

Representatives of the Floydada Economic Development Board and the Lockney Economic Board were present for the meeting. They were Dora Ross, Phillip Glasson, Bobby Hall, and Russell Harris.

Glasson presented the resolution to the commissioners and said, "This resolution is identical to the ones that the City of Floydada and the City of Lockney have approved. These general guidelines of this resolution comes from the State statutes.

"This resolution states that nothing contained herein shall imply, suggest or be understood to mean the Affected Jurisdictions are under any obligation to provide tax abatement to any applicant and all applications for tax abatement will be considered on a case by case basis," Glasson said.

"What you are approving today is just a resolution to consider tax abatement to each individual project that might come before you. You are only

The deadline for nominations is February 15. For more information, you may contact committee member Phillip Glasson at 652-3355.

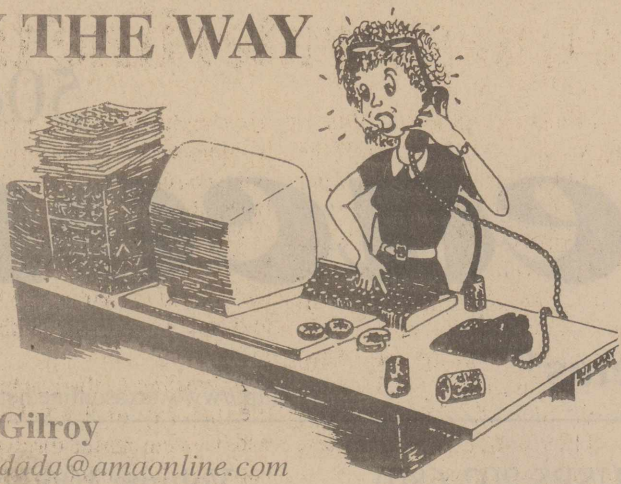
Valentine's Day will be here before you know it, and so will the deadline to have your pictures submitted for the Valentine Brag Pages.

Some days it may take awhile, say three or four hours, for the Jewish lobby to get its ducks in a row and begin its world wide offensive. When it does bestir itself, however, it is an awesome thing to behold.

Nobody, absolutely nobody, can fish in troubled waters as efficiently and effectively as they. When the elder George Bush tackled Iraq, Israel wanted desperately to get into the act on what they correctly perceived as likely to be the winning side. Bush didn't want them included, for many good reasons. So we gave them billions of dollars in hush money to save their ego. Then, Ben Laden's minions hit the World Trade Towers, kill nearly 3,000 people, and syndicated columnists George Will and Bill Safire, true

to form, act as if it were an attack on Jews everywhere.

Accordingly, all enemies of Israel must be considered as enemies of America. So, we'll guess. Our guess is that the tail will continue wagging the dog. American money, in the form of foreign aid, will continue flowing. The Israelites will continue to take whatever they want, the Palestinians will continue to resist. Blood, mostly from the Palestinians, will continue to flow. The American political establishment will continue to "deplore" the situation, but will do nothing about it. Our troops will continue to inhabit the Balkans, and will continue to be poised to go to any spot in the world where trouble might exist or arise...except to Palestine. And why not? Simply because the Israelites do not want them there, and have said so, loud and clear.

Our troops went to Panama. They went to Granada. They went to Somalia, they went to Kosovo, they went to Serbia (after we had dropped many, many bombs) to stop what we called "ethnic cleansing." Our planes and troops went to Afghanistan (thank goodness) and reduced ben Laden's forces to a shadow of their former selves. Our troops are still in Europe under the aegis of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization. But we will not interfere with the ethnic and religious cleansing going on in Palestine. And why not? Simply because the Israelites do not want us there. They want only American money and American arms. And unless something drastic happens, unless Bush can screw up the courage to tackle Israel's lobby in the United States, that is the way it will

Our President speaks of the present "war" as lasting years. If this is to be a war against "evil", then it will indeed last a long time, perhaps an eternity. In the meantime, a mighty blow could be struck for a modicum of peace simply by bringing order out of the chaos in the Middle East. That order may well have to be imposed, just as it was imposed in Afghanistan, and in Serbia, and in Panama and many other places. Otherwise, one thing is obviously clear. The Israelites, harking back to the days of Joshua, and David, and Moses, will lay claim to any piece of property that suits their fancy. The natives, wherever they are, will resist, and their will be no peace.

Still, somehow, by the time the Middle East situation gets translated in the American media, the natives are at fault. The Israeli propaganda machine is indeed a marvel to behold. Bill Safire and George Will, and a multitude of others in the media, can be counted on to mount the barricades and condemn the Palestinians for resisting the Israeli occupation, (and the religious "cleansing" necessary for the Jews to have their own space on land

that was home to the ancient Canaanites before the time of Abraham). Most American politicians, with an eye to possible campaign contributions, will either turn a blind eye or blame the Palestinians for the chaos.

The whole thing yearns for some leader, somewhere, who will simply say "enough is enough". Left to their own devices, there will be no true peace between the Jews and the Palestinians, whether the Palestinians be Christians or Jews. If America is going to impose peace anywhere in the world, the place to start probably is the last place that peace would occur on its own. And that is the place we call the "Holy Land."

Floydada EMS buys defibrillator with grant money

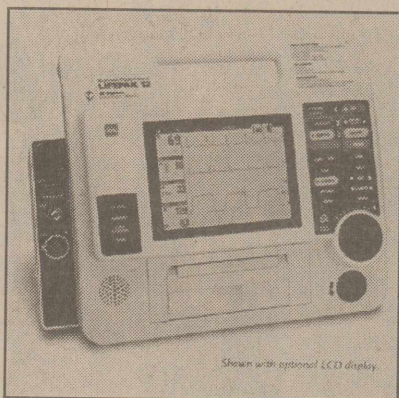
Floydada Emergency Medical Service recently received a grant of \$8,727 from the Texas Department of Health.

Matching funds from the Caprock Hospital District allowed EMS to use the money to purchase a state of the art heart monitor/defibrillator.

"The heart monitor/defibrillator is built with the newest technology available and will make emergency healthcare better than ever," said Paul Moore, director of Floydada EMS.

"With approximately twenty percent of calls for emergency medical service being cardiac related in the Floydada area it is very important to have the latest technology available," said Moore. "With the age of our average patient increasing, cardiac related cases are on the rise.

With the continued availability of twenty-four hour paramedic coverage in Floydada most patients will have the heart monitor/defibrillator placed



on them to help monitor their condition whether it is cardiac related or not.

"It is also important to mention that this grant would not have been successful without the help of the Caprock Hospital District," said Moore. "If it was not for the funds raised through hospital district taxes it would be impossible to provide this type of healthcare to the community."

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Landowners request waterline taps

discuss the waterline was being planned for next week. Morris requested representatives to attend from the Council in order to answer questions and secure easement signatures.

After discussion of the matter, Councilman Junior Brotherton made the motion to allow anyone who signs the easement agreement to tap onto the waterline and receive the water at regular city water rates. This was seconded by Ginger Mathis and all were in favor.

Also discussed was the option to have a fire hydrant where homes were located along the waterline. The council felt they would allow taps for a few

water hydrants along the waterline if the grant would cover the cost. If the cost was not covered the landowner would have to pay for the hydrant.

During department reports Police Chief Jerry Edwards told the council that during 2001 the department had worked 17 accidents (down 59%), had filed 57 incident reports (down 3.5%), taken 209 offense reports (up 9.6%), handled 93 juvenile detentions (up 28%), and filed 186 county court cases and 1 district court cases.

Justice of the Peace Michelle Araujo reported she had attended a 36 hour mandated school for City Municipal Judges.

Aaron Wilson and Donnie

McLaughlin, reported the Lockney Volunteer Fire Department had 8 ambulance runs for the month of December and no fire runs.

The men stated that several members of the Lockney Fire Department had toured the Tulia Fire Department and were impressed with the equipment.

According to the Lockney firemen the majority of the Tulia equipment had been purchased through grants secured by the Tulia City Manager. The Fire Department felt this was something the City Council could look into for the Lockney Fire Department.

Mayor Gary Marr reported on a flood plain management seminar he attended in December. Marr said this is an area the city will have to eventually get involved in. Ultimately, according to Marr, if the city does not have a flood plain mapping procedure in place it could affect government loans and grants from state and federal programs.

Many lenders, said Marr, are now requiring flood insurance on mortgages and borrowers can't get insurance without the flood plain maps. Mayor Marr felt the city needed to start budgeting for this as soon as possible.

Other city business included a meeting with Bobby Hall and Russell Harris with the Economic Development Board. Hall and Harris discussed the future check writing policy of the Board. As it stands now the mayor is required to sign checks written by the board along with the board president or treasurer. After discussion the council decided to allow checks to be written by the Economic Development Board up to \$15,000. Checks over that amount will need council approval.

Mergers help local churches

Financial hardships that may close some churches down has led to some positive changes for several Floydada churches.

Faced with declining memberships and financial crunches Floydada's First Assembly of God and Trinity Church have merged into one church. Calvary Baptist Church and Cornerstone Fellowship have also made the decision to join the forces of their two memberships.

Cornerstone Fellowship began with Hispanic families meeting in the home of Frank and Lily Maldonado for Bible study.

The study group, led by Rev. Ed Sena, of Templo Bautista in Lubbock, quickly outgrew their space and began praying in earnest for a building. "The group met every night for a week and prayed for a building," said Bill Gilbreath, a deacon at Calvary Baptist Church.

"They had asked a few places if they could meet on Thursday nights and share in the cost of utilities--but they were turned down."

However when the small congregation of Calvary Baptist was approached the idea was approved. Cornerstone moved in February, 2001.

"We were down to about 7-10 people on Sundays, and 4-5 on Wednesdays," said Gilbreath. "After Cornerstone Fellowship started meeting on Thursdays our congregation started going to their Thursday meetings and their congregation started coming to our Sundays and Wednesday meetings."

With the merger, Calvary Baptist Church, which dates its history back to 1948, brings stability and wisdom to the new and energetic Calvary Cornerstone. The new church merged their names also and are now known as Calvary's Cornerstone Fellowship.

Now Calvary Cornerstone Fellowship is knocking out walls to make room for their growth and youth.

The church has recently lost its pastor, Glenn Truett, but the faith in their future has been rejuvenated and the congregation is looking forward to what is in store for them.

Another merger that has affected several churches in Floydada is the recent decision by First Assembly of God and Trinity Church to come together.

In 1981 a group of people who had been members of the First Assembly started Trinity Church in Floydada.

Now, mostly because of financial reasons, the two churches are joining their memberships.

The First Assembly of God membership voted to sell their church building to Templo Gethsemani (Spanish Assembly of God), and have moved their fellowship inside Trinity Church.

Rev. Vance Mitchell, of the First Assembly of God, and Rev. Henry Russell, of Trinity Church, will share pastoral responsibilities.

"I'm putting all the problems in his portfolio," laughs Russell.

"This will be an Assembly of God Church," said Mitchell. "We will be affiliated with West Texas District of Assemblies of God."

"We have been working on it for quite some time. A constitution and bylaws was approved and adopted by both church memberships."

Prayers were also answered for Templo Gethsemani as they officially "closed the deal" on their new church building January 10th.

"Finances were a contributing factor in our moves," said Mitchell. "It is hard for small churches in small towns."

"We decided that the combined churches could have a stronger youth and adult program," said Russell.

"We (Mitchell and Russell) have been friends for quite some time. I also

have Assembly of God credentials. I pastored at Floydada's Assembly of God from 1958-1962."

A Floydada native, Russell has also pastored in Colorado, Utah, Arizona, and other parts of Texas before returning to Floydada's Trinity Church. He has been at Trinity for 5 years.

A Crosbyton native, Mitchell has pastored at Floydada's Assembly of God Church for 8 years. He was also the pastor of the Assembly of God Church in Cedar Hill from 1979-1983 and also pastored in Oklahoma and Iowa.

The new count of active members at what is now Trinity Assembly, is approximately 56.

"Each church had approximately half of those members," said Mitchell.

"We will be doing some upgrading of the present property (500 W. Houston)," said Russell. "We will have a new church sign and hopefully pave the parking lot."

Both pastors say the churches are not closing--only merging.

"This couldn't have come together

without a lot of factors being taken care of," said Russell. "Not only did we all have to approve the move but the Spanish Assembly of God membership had to approve the purchase of the Assembly of God Church building. We consider everything working out a miracle in itself."

saying today that you are willing to take a look at it.

"To an existing structure and to improvements on it, you will still maintain your existing taxes on it. You are not giving up anything, just maybe on the improvements. These tax abatements will not go over five years for the most part."

"Also you may recapture (full taxation) on certain businesses that might not comply with these guidelines. The abatement would cease and you would recapture full taxation on the improvements. There is a lot of flexibility in tax abatements, such as, staggering the amount each year," Glasson concluded.

In other matters, the commissioners reviewed, but took no action on the county's Investment Policy. The court did select a Salary Grievance Committee for 2002 to be chosen from all public members. Their names will be revealed after each has been notified and after their acceptance of the position.

A rental agreement with Xerox for two copy machines in the Court House at \$71 per month per machine was approved by the commissioners.

Another agreement was unanimously approved by the court with Allied Compliance for drug testing of three CDL County drivers at \$153 annually, plus \$40 per test.

The commissioners approved four farm contracts. One contract was 4 1/2 miles south and 1 mile west of Lockney in Precinct No. 2 by Eddie Teeter for cleaning out drainage ditches. Another contract was in Precinct No. 2 by Steve McPherson 3 miles north and 1 mile west of Lone Star for filling in low areas and putting up borders.

The other two contracts were by Mark McCormick southeast of Floydada to level ground for soil conservation and by Brett Marble 5 miles

"The Caprock Cotton Conference will be held next week, Tuesday, January 22nd, at the Plains Baptist Assembly camp."

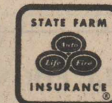

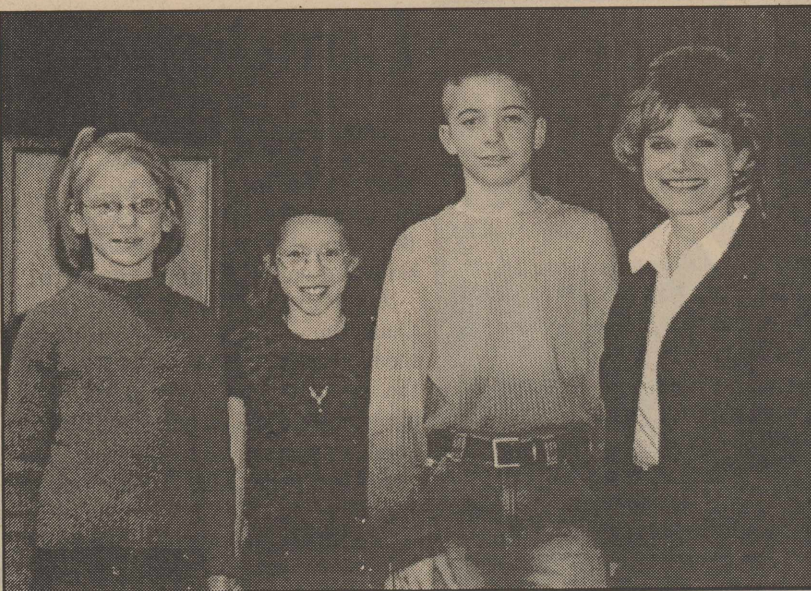

Beltwide Cotton Conference produced wealth of insight

The cotton industry's annual gathering to exchange information, catch up on the latest technology and predict the future is underway in Atlanta, Georgia this week.

The 2002 Beltwide Cotton Conferences have once again proven to be a focal point for the industry and the setting for memorable comments.

This year's "call to arms" was issued by Anderson D. Warlick, CEO of Parkdale Mills, Gastonia, North Carolina. Scheduled to discuss the 2002 U.S. Textile Outlook, Warlick announced at the start that he wasn't really going to talk about that particular topic.

Instead he announced the revised title of his talk as "Free Trade: What type of yarn are we spinning?"

As the title implied, Warlick emphasized the terrible price the U.S. textile industry has been paying over the past year. That price, in his view, has primarily been the result of the hand-tied trade concessions and U.S. policy positions that have hampered the industries ability to compete on the so-called level playing field that has been promised.

He noted that something needs to change and that a bleak future could be in the offing should the course not be altered.

Warlick noted that three years ago the domestic consumption was an impressive 11 million bales. He then contrasted that with the situation today where consumption has dropped to 7.5 million bales and voiced the possibility that the number could drop even further unless something changes.

Another high point was the annual speech by William B. Dunavant, Jr., Dunavant Enterprises, Memphis, Tennessee. Dunavant's comments provided an expectant crowd the very news they hoped he wouldn't provide - U.S. cotton prices are expected to stay near the current trading range and have little or no opportunity to eclipse the 40 cent level in 2002.

Dunavant noted that cotton produc-

ers and textiles have been the hardest hit as they have been on the front lines on the current economic malaise. He encouraged all of the allied industry representatives to support the producer during the ongoing Farm Bill debate and noted that the U.S. government must continue to provide that type of support.

He noted, however, that both the House and Senate proposals were doing exactly the opposite of what they needed to do despite the real needs that exist for that support. He explained that he felt the Bill's encourage over-production and provide the U.S. grower and the world the wrong signal.

On the technical side he noted that his forecasts indicate that the 45 million bales of cotton that comprise world carryover stocks will likely drop somewhat to 42.7 million by the end of the marketing year. He added that this drop is expected to occur despite the fact that U.S. stocks could climb to 9 million bales from the current 2001 U.S. carryover projection of 8.7 million bales.

He described a situation where enhanced U.S. export opportunities will be the key to offsetting the decline in domestic consumption expected in 2002.

In other Beltwide news High Plains cotton producer Jackie Burris and his brothers Terry and Rickie, of Wellman were presented the Southwest High Cotton Award by the Southwest Farm Press publication. The Burrises were selected for the award based on their operation's achievements in stewardship and conservation.

Jackie Burris is a former President of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc.

The 2002 BCC Technical Conferences continue in Atlanta through January 12. Attendees of the technical conferences get the opportunity to hear first-hand about the latest research into new technology and production techniques as well as stay abreast of the latest offerings from commercial sources.
