Mangold Hospital begins new Chaplaincy program

W.J. Mangold Memorial Hospital has added a new dimension to their "total health care". Not only will the physical needs of patients be met but now the spiritual needs will be addressed through a new "Chaplaincy Program."

Four pastors in Lockney have already set schedules and started to work. They will rotate responsibilities every week.

Steve McLean, the pastor of W. College and Third Street Church of Christ; Phillip Golden, pastor of First Baptist Church; Russ Byard, pastor of First United Methodist Church; and Russell Harris, pastor at Main Street Church of Christ, have joined together to kick off the program.

"We represent the hospital—not our own congregations," said Rev. Byard. "We are considered an auxiliary for the hospital—but it is an all volunteer auxiliary."

"We have rules we have to go by that are provided by the hospital," said McLean.

"Our role is to offer comfort and provide spiritual support for the patient and family. We can also notify the patient's own pastor if the patient would like us to. Very often the family pastor doesn't know a member of his congregation is even in the hospital."

"We can also help families understand what the patient is going

through, and we can report back to local congregations."

Rev. Byard started the program off on January 21 with the first rounds made through the hospital as the official "Chaplain."

"There were a few surprised faces," said Byard. "They said, 'I didn't know we had a Chaplain!'"

"We are looking for help from any clergy that would like to be a part of the team," said McLean.

"Obviously the clergy don't have to be just from Lockney. They can come from any area town, such as Floydada or Plainview. It is amazing how many Plainview people are here.

"The clergy just need to know there are rules we have to follow. Clergy interested in helping must have an endorsement of a local congregation."

Library offers trip to Vatican Exhibit

Lockney Library Associates; summer fund-raiser is a chartered-bus trip to Lubbock on June 18 to attend the Vatican art exhibit at the Museum of Texas Tech University.

Cost for the day-trip is \$35, which covers the bus trip and lunch at the Skyview Restaurant in Lubbock. If the schedule permits, another activity may be added, possibly with an additional charge.

Reservations for the trip should be made now at the Lockney Branch Library as only 47 tickets for the exhibit were obtained. The \$35 cost is due when the reservation is made, but checks will be held until May 1 when final arrangements for the trip are completed. Further information may be obtained by calling Neta Marble at the library at 652-3561.

Although there is no charge to attend the exhibit, tickets for a specific date and hour are necessary for admission to view the never-before-seen artworks from the Vatican Museums in Rome. The exhibit is titled "Traditions and Renewal: Medieval Frescoes from the Vatican Museums."

Centerpiece of the exclusive exhibit is a beautifully haunting fresco, St. Monica, a perfect example of the art used to decorate churches and public buildings in medieval times. That fresco, with 30 others, will be showcased in the June 2 to Sept. 15 exhibit at the Museum of Texas Tech.

The 12th and 13th century frescoes were removed from church walls in the mid-1800s. Experts at the Vatican attempted early restoration work on

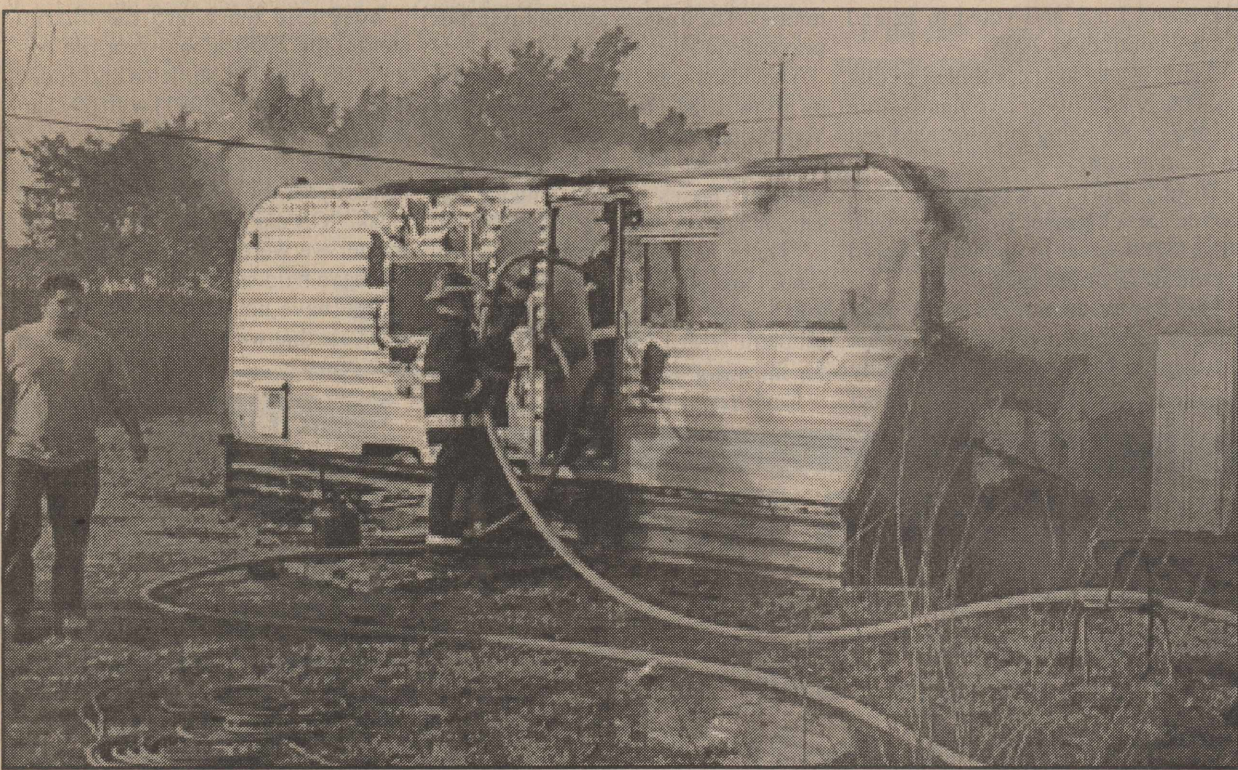
the pieces in 1930-31 before returning them to storage in the Vatican museums. Now the frescoes are being carefully packed for the trip to Texas. The exhibit will be seen only in Lubbock before returning directly to Rome.

Fresco painting is one in which the paint is applied to a particular kind of fresh (fresco) plaster while the plaster is still wet. The water-soluble pigments combine chemically with the plaster as it dries, with the pigments becoming part of the hardened plaster. This process gives them a particularly beautiful transparency that is unique to the fresco technique.

"It is not current practice to remove frescoes," says Gary Edson, director of the Museum of Texas Tech University, which will host the exhibit. "The damage to the work is too extensive and the context of the painting is completely lost. However, almost 150 years ago, a decision was made to remove these frescoes from the wall of the churches they adorned. The process used to detach them was not sophisticated." He added, "The pieces in this exhibition are less than one inch thick. They are attached to a solid backing and framed."

The story of the frescoes' journey to Texas is the culmination of a dream, backed by the dedication and persistence of West Texas Catholic priest, Father Malcom Neyland, who oversees congregations in Post and Wilson. He was visiting the Vatican about 13 years ago and was struck by the

Floydada man dies in fire

Carlos Hernandez, 69, of Floydada, died in a trailer fire Friday, January 18.

Firefighters were called to the scene of the fire, at 1120 S. Main, at 3:13 p.m., but were unable to save Mr. Hernandez who had been trapped inside the trailer.

According to Mark Hanna, a spokesman for the State Fire Marshals office, "Mr. Hernandez, a son, George Hernandez, and a friend from Plainview, were all inside the trailer. A portable propane heater was knocked over and broke apart. The propane spread out and caught fire."

The two younger men were able to get out. Mr. Hernandez Sr., at-

tempted to grab the tank and throw it out the front door. It didn't make it out the door. In fact, it stopped at the front door. Mr. Hernandez ran to the back of the trailer where he died."

George Hernandez and the friend broke out windows to try and get Carlos Hernandez out but were unsuccessful in their attempts.

According to officials one of the men who escaped ran to a neighbors house to call for help. There was no one home and he ran to another house which was also empty. A third attempt at another house was successful and 911 was called.

Officials said the 1969 21 foot

camper trailer belonged to Carlos Hernandez and was used by him to sleep in when he visited family.

The trailer was parked in the backyard of Carlos' son, Carlos Hernandez Jr.

Hernandez Jr., was not home at the time of the fire.

Carlos Hernandez Sr. was born February 22, 1932 in Olton.

Memorial services will be at 2:00 p.m., Thursday, January 24, 2002 at Calvary's Cornerstone Fellowship in Floydada.

He is survived by 7 sons, 3 daughters, 1 sister, 25 grandchildren, and 7 great-grandchildren.

Lorilla Bradley helps Care Center residents celebrate life

Lorilla Bradley has been giving birthday parties to Care Center residents for at least 30 years. Last week the Floydada Rehab and Care Center honored Mrs. Bradley for her dedication and her 91st birthday.

Mrs. Bradley began the birthday "ministry" after being asked by the elder's of her church, (the City Park Church of Christ), to do something for the nursing home.

"They asked me and the preacher's wife, Opal Andrews, to help," said Mrs. Bradley. "The Andrews left after maybe 3 years at the church. I kept on doing the birthday parties."

"The other ladies in the congregation helped. I couldn't have done it by myself. They would furnish gifts, food, and serve."

"Over the years as the congregation has gotten smaller, we don't have as much help. Now I just keep up with the birthdays and organize the help for the monthly party. The Care Center supplies the food and we just help serve."

Lorilla also adds a very personal touch to the birthday parties. Every party is accompanied by a "reading" of Lorilla's personal poem about the residents who are celebrating their birthday.

Each resident has a paragraph dedicated to them and written by Lorilla.

"I started pretty quickly after we started doing the parties," said Lorilla. "I was asked to bring a card and read it out loud. I said, 'Why don't I just write one instead?'"

Born in Girard (Dickens County) in 1917, Lorilla was raised on the fam-

ily farm and graduated from Girard High School.

She married Ned Bradley in June of 1947 and the couple moved to Floydada in 1950 to farm. Mr. Bradley died in 1975.

"Ned was in the service from 1941-1945," said Lorilla. "After the service he went to Texas Tech and played in a band called, 'The Ned Bradley Band'. We were introduced on a blind date on New Year's Eve and we hit it off right away."

At 91, Lorilla still lives at home and

doesn't seem too concerned about age slowing her down.

"I'm 2 weeks older than Ronald Reagan and 1 month older than George Washington," laughs Lorilla.

"Besides 'osteo' in my back limiting my activities I feel great," said Lorilla.

To thank Lorilla for her years of thinking of others at the Care Center, Lorilla was presented with a corsage and a purple elephant.

"They gave me the elephant because elephants have long memories," said Lorilla.

Thanks to everyone who brings me all kinds of tidbits to print.

I want everyone to know that sometimes you won't see the "e-mail" story in my column because I can't verify the story.

It is unbelievable what is sent over e-mail that is attributed to someone and that "someone" never said any such thing. It may sound very true and even though it is easily verified most people don't bother to verify the story.

The other day I got a "great" e-mail about a speech that Oliver North had supposedly made during his Iran-Contra hearings.

It sounded very authentic. I quoted a Senator who had supposedly interrogated Oliver North. The Senator questioned North about his \$60,000 security system he had put in his house to protect him from terrorists.

The Senator thought that was excessive. The Senator "sarcastically" asked North who the "terrorist" was that he was so afraid of.

North was quoted as saying, "Usama Bin Laden". North was also supposed to have said (15 years ago) that if it were up to him he would recommend an assassin team to eliminate Bin Laden." The e-mail implied the Senator held North in contempt and basically laughed at him.

The writer of the e-mail was making a point that the U.S. government knew about Bin Laden's potential threat years ago and did nothing.

It was pretty powerful reading. I looked up Oliver North's web page to see if I could reprint it and to make sure he said it.

He didn't say it--ever. His web page had an answer from him concerning this e-mail. He had already received several thousand of questions from every state in the U.S. and 13 foreign countries concerning it.

North said he was questioned by committee counsel John Nields--not a senator.

His security system cost \$16,000 not \$60,000.

The terrorist was a Libyan--Abu Nidal. Libyan terrorists (dispatched from the "People's Committee for Libyan students in McLean, Virginia) were intercepted by the FBI on their way to North's house to kill him, his wife, and children. The family was subsequently removed out of their home to a military base and more than 30 agents were sent to protect them. The agents remained at his home until he retired from the Marines. The federal government spent more than 2 million dollars protecting the North family.

North said the terrorists sent to kill his family were never apprehended.

The e-mail quoted him as saying he

was afraid of Usama Bin Laden. North said he never said he was afraid of anybody. He also said, "I did say that I would be glad to meet Abu Nidal on equal terms anywhere in the world but that I was unwilling to have him or his operatives meet my wife and children on his terms."

I thought all of that was interesting--especially the true stuff.

Someone spent a great deal of time putting together a hoax to serve some kind of purpose. I don't know why someone would make up the story about Oliver North. I don't know what purpose that served--but for someone it was great fun to see it passed around as fact.

I looked up a web site concerning e-mail hoaxes the other day and it was fun seeing them pick apart some of the more enduring email hoaxes that are still making the rounds--such as: the stolen kidneys and the Neiman Marcus cookie recipe.

According to the scam website on artists are making money off of "online petitions". You are presented with some legitimate sounding cause and told that when a million people sign the petition it will be presented to some organization or perhaps an elected official. Some of these petitions are real but some have a more sinister purpose..they are collecting e-mail addresses to sell to spammers, often porn sites.

While you think you are doing good to send a well meaning message along, you may be helping someone make a dollar while getting your unsuspecting friends signed-up for a ton of unwanted junk e-mail, much of it of an adult nature.

Once you get on those lists you can't get off. Responding with a "remove" message only informs them they have a warm body at that e-mail address reading the spam, which increases the value of the list.

The list of those opening the email is sold from spammer to spammer.

Remember, legitimate e-mails and web sites provide ways to contact the author or webmaster.

Be suspicious if there is no way to contact the author. If the e-mail says it represents the American Cancer Society, does its return address reflect that?

If the e-mail claims it is being tracked this is a sure sign of a hoax since e-mail cannot be reliably tracked.

Forwarding worthless e-mails wastes Internet bandwidth which costs everyone.

I like my cute internet stories but please don't expect me to ever "forward" to all my friends. Also, don't send me an e-mail that suggests I don't love Jesus if I don't forward it. I will delete the junk before I even read it.

It's beginning to look like all the fireworks in the upcoming Texas election cycle will be in the Democratic primary. In the Republican Primary, Gov. Rick Perry seems to have it all to himself, for all practical purposes, but among the Democrats there's a real battle shaping up.

The Democrats, under what appears to be the guidance of former Comptroller John Sharp, had hoped for what they (or he) thought would be a dream ticket, with multi-millionaire Tony Sanchez at the top of the ticket as the candidate for Governor, a black former Mayor of Dallas as their lead Senatorial candidate, with Sharp himself again seeking the Lieutenant Governor's spot. Various other spots on the ticket would be appropriately allocated to deserving candidates.

But it's not working out exactly as planned. One Dan Morales, who served for many years as the Democratic Attorney General for Texas, decided he wanted to run for Governor, rather than Senator. (Another really flaky character, named Victor Morales, has decided he wants to run again for the Senate, so maybe Dan didn't want the voters to get confused.) Dan has had all sorts of troubles since he left the AG's office, most of it revolving around the tobacco thing. His buddies collected many billions of dollars as the "plaintiff's attorneys"

during that miserable episode, and many people think, rightly or wrongly, that Dan claimed his share. Nevertheless, for good or ill, it's a matter he will probably have to explain in his race against Mr. Sanchez.

We would be sore pressed as to who we would vote for, were we going to vote in the Democratic Primary. If I was a hard core Democrat, I'd have problems. On the one hand, Mr. Morales is the Attorney General who carried the fight on the "affirmative action" thing while he was Attorney General. For that he deserves credit, from a Republican standpoint, or from the standpoint of any citizen who thinks affirmative action is an affront to the Constitution. Morales deserves a whole lot more credit, in my own humble opinion, than does George W. Bush, who has tried to take a somewhat lofty, hands off, albeit extremely political, approach to the entire matter.

On the other hand there's Tony Sanchez, the Laredo multi-millionaire who got invited to spend the night in the Lincoln bedroom while Bill Clinton was President (with the expectation he, like other overnight guests, would pony up \$100,000 for the privilege). According to news reports we saw, he didn't. He left without putting up the money. Instead, he contributed heavily to George W.

Bush, who appointed him to the University of Texas Board of Regents. So, he too must be a persona non grata to many hard core Democrats.

So what will they do? It is beyond me. They don't really have a choice between Sanchez and Morales. They can vote for Mr. Worldpeace, who has spent a goodly sum of money making unsolicited telephone calls, telling anyone who will listen how rotten the others in the race are. Mr. Worldpeace is for peace, and who can argue against that? Simply put, if we were to elect him as Governor, we could expect world peace, according to him. That's what happened when we elected Lyndon Baines Johnson as President. Lyndon told us that if we voted for Barry Goldwater we would get more deeply involved in Vietnam. But some of us voted for Goldwater anyway, not with the thought that we were going to get more deeply involved in Vietnam, but that we might slow the relentless march to centralized government. Sure enough, we got more deeply involved in Vietnam, just like Lyndon said. And sure enough, centralized government blossomed under Lyndon, and is still blooming.

If we were to vote in the Democratic Primary, we probably would end up voting for Morales, simply on the basis of his opposition to affirmative action. Sanchez is in the big league as

far as money and position goes, and he probably wouldn't be looking for a little extra, but who knows. He seems to have a knack for making bundles of money, wherever he is.

Morales is still learning. And, from the standpoint of real democrats, there's always the fact that Sanchez supported Bush. If Senator Yarborough was still with us, he would say that support of a Republican was an unpardonable political sin. Sanchez has received the endorsement of the Texas AFL-CIO, largely

on the basis that his candidacy is the result of careful planning by those who make the decisions in Party affairs. But it is still true, as the poet Robert Burns observed many years ago, that sometimes the best laid plans of mice and men "go awry."

That is the situation today. Dan Morales has thrown a monkey wrench in the best laid plans of the Democratic leadership. Now the faithful will have to make a choice. Who will be their leader? Morales or Sanchez?

We suspect there will be a awful lot of unhappy campers after the primaries are past. One candidate supported Bush, the other supported affirmative action. Either way, there will be a big pond out there in which the Republicans can fish. If they want to.

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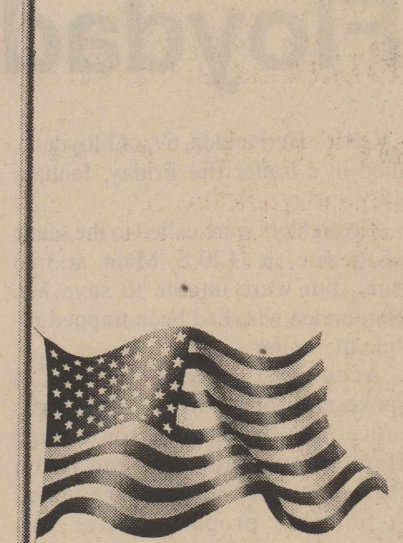

No-Call list has become law

There is good news for those who get a lot of phone calls from salespersons asking them to change their long distance service or open new credit card accounts. Soon, there will be a way to stop such calls. The 2001 Texas Legislature passed HB 472, which provides several important protections for consumers. The law takes effect January 1, 2002.

One of these protections is the Texas no-call list. This list, maintained by the Public Utilities Commission (PUC), will contain names, addresses, and phone numbers of people who do not want to be contacted by telemarketing firms. Beginning in January 2002, anyone can contact the PUC directly to add his or her name and phone number to the list, which will be updated every three months. The PUC may charge a fee of up to three dollars for each telephone number included. Listings will automatically expire after three years, but can be renewed at any time.

After a person's name has been on the no-call list for 60 days, telemarketing firms are generally prohibited from calling that person. However, there are some exceptions that allow certain telemarketing firms to call a person even if his or her name is on the no-call list. The no-call provisions do not apply to opinion polls, calls on behalf of nonprofit organizations, and calls requesting political

support, as long as no attempt is made to sell something to the person who answers the phone.

The no-call provisions also do not apply to the companies with which the person who has the phone number had a business relationship in the past 12 months. However, if the person receives a telephone solicitation from someone covered by one of the exceptions he or she can then ask that telemarketer to put his or her name on that company's no-call list.

For more information on the no-call list, after January 1, contact the PUC at (888)782-8477 (936-7150 in Austin) or visits its website at www.puc.state.tx.us. Many people also get unsolicited faxes. Several years ago "junk faxer" began calling one man's home in the middle of the night - even though he didn't have a fax machine. Over and over the phone would ring, with only the screech of a fax machine at the other end.

Unsolicited faxes are prohibited by a federal law called the Telephone Consumer Protection Act. In addition, Texas HB 472, which takes effect January 1, 2002, contains further protection against fax advertisements sent within the state.

Under HB 472, fax solicitations sent in Texas must include the complete name and street address of the person or business sending the fax. The fax

must also include a toll-free or local phone number where the recipient can call during business hours to be removed from the solicitation list.

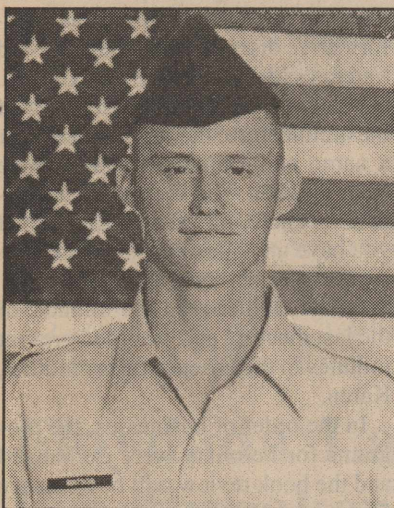
Once someone asks to have his or her fax number removed, the person who sent the solicitation has 24 hours to send him or her a letter or fax acknowledging that request. After that, that person may not send other messages to that fax machine.

If a telemarketer keeps calling or sending faxes after the person has signed up for the no-call list, then he or she may file a complaint against the telemarketer or the sender of the faxed solicitation. Call the Attorney General's consumer protection hotline toll-free inside Texas at (800)621-0508 to request a complaint form.

A consumer can also file a complaint online by visiting the consumer protection section of the Attorney General's website at www.oag.state.tx.us. If the complaint involves a provider of long distance phone services, the consumer may want to contact the PUC first.

In the case of unsolicited faxes, the recipient can also file a complaint with the Federal Communications Commission. Interested persons can get more information through that website at www.fcc.gov or call the Legal Hotline for Older Texans at (800)622-2520.

Watson is a 2001 graduate of Odessa High School.

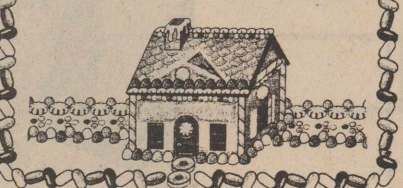
Buffalo Grass DAR Chapter accepts two new members

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FISD hears report on TAAS

The Floydada Independent School District Board met Thursday, January 17, and heard a report from FISD Superintendent Jerry Vaughn and FISD Technology Director Rex Holcombe concerning the recent TAAS Practice Tests and the Proposed School Calendar.

Superintendent Vaughn told the board, "We have visited together and we know where we are. We know what our targets are and what the mission is before us. Most of this work was done prior to Christmas and at the first of the school year.

"This has set the tone and the direction that we are headed on each perspective campus. Last week we split up and worked elementary wise and then came back and worked secondary wise.

"Rex (Holcombe) is working with us on the elementary level. We are going to tie in some of our Extended Year Services starting the first part of February. We are getting some State funds for this. We will start working with the kids on extended time on Saturdays before TAAS and continue some after TAAS. It will tie into our summer school program.

"Our TAAS Writing tests begin this year on February 25 through 27. January 31st is the deadline to apply for State funds for these Extended Year Services," Vaughn concluded.

In a related matter, Rex Holcombe presented to the board five 2002-2003 school calendar proposals to choose from. All the proposed calendars were looked at and discussed. Holcombe pointed out the differences in the calendars and their similarities. Bad weather days in January and Comp days around Thanksgiving were the

main topics of discussion. No action was taken by the board concerning the calendars.

Business Manager Sharon Rainwater gave the board a tax report concerning the school taxes collected and a Quarterly Investment Report.

Rainwater reported, "The FISD Tax Roll base is set at \$2,026,639.37. We have collected \$1,279,809.78 to date, which is 63.14 percent. This is slightly ahead of last year's collection.

"FISD's Quarterly Investment Report shows a Beginning Balance of \$3,000,299.65, with \$23,858.67 Earned Interest," Rainwater concluded.

The board unanimously approved Robison, Johnston and Patton, CPAs of Lubbock, as FISD auditors for 2002-2003.

The resignation of Third Grade Teacher, Donna Harmon, at R.C. Andrews Elementary was unanimously accepted by the board. In her place, the board hired Mary Kay Watson, a graduate of San Angelo State University.

In a related matter, the board recognized as Teacher of the Month, 4th Grade Teacher, Shereshe Covington, at R.C. Andrews Elementary. Covington was introduced to the board by Principal David Hutton. Hutton said, "Ms. Covington is a very quiet teacher. Sometimes I don't even know she is at school. But her results with the kids speak loud and clear. She is doing a great job."

Superintendent Vaughn gave a closing report to the board before they went into closed Executive Session. Vaughn said, "President George W. Bush just signed a new Federal Legislation Law of 'No Child Left Behind.' It is still pretty muddy waters

as to what that will mean to us. It appears one of the things that has been left out of this new legislation, of which the legal part of it has not been written yet, is Class Size Reduction.

"We will have to be aware of this and see if we still get federal money for reducing our class sizes. Right now we have two of these classes at A.B. Duncan Elementary and one at R.C. Andrews Elementary."

Vaughn continued, "Our total enrollment as of last Friday, January 11, was at 1,044 students. That is down five from Christmas and down 28 from last year.

"I have agreed for Floydada to participate in the West Texas Coalition. This is an Education Committee to explore, to lobby, and to present research already completed for finding a new and alternate school funding, other than school property taxes.

"This will start January 24 and it will cost each school \$500 who participates, with a total cost of \$40,000. We are in Region 17 and this will greatly benefit the rural schools. It will relieve some of the burden off the property taxes. Property taxes probably will not go away, but this will help. This has already been done in the Austin School District," Vaughn said.

Vaughn mentioned the nearing completion of the parking lot at A.B. Duncan Elementary, the drive way at

R.C. Andrews Elementary, and the possibility of South Plains College classes starting up in an old building near downtown. The building is being remodeled by a \$146,000 grant received by the Floydada Economic Development Committee.

Council fills positions on boards

The Floydada City Council met in regular session Tuesday, January 15, and unanimously appointed Bruce Ballou and Philip Smitherman as new board members to two different City boards.

Ballou was appointed to the Floydada Economic Development Board to fill the unexpired term of Shirley Jackson, which will expire in October, 2003.

Smitherman was appointed to the Housing Authority of Floydada Board to fill the unexpired term of Bill Hopper, which will expire in December, 2002.

City Manager Gary Brown discussed the outcome of the meeting with the Parks Committee on January 10 and the number of City parks that would be involved was uncertain.

Brown said he would get another meeting together to discuss the Annie Taylor Park and the softball fields. The council wanted to be sure that there were rules and regulations in place and that someone would take charge of the softball leagues at that park. No action was taken by the council on the matter.

The council unanimously approved the motion made by Council member Bettye King to change the rate of compensation for election workers to \$10 per hour for Election Judges, and \$7 per hour for Election Clerks in the City elections. The motion was seconded by Council member Clar Schacht.

City Manager Brown gave a brief report to the council concerning certain deregulations and bids that are now being taken on a new backhoe for the Water Department.

Brown said, "The weather earlier in the month has been a problem for our Water Department. The cold made the ground shift and therefore the pipes were cracking. For whatever reason, nearly every one of the breaks was

difficult. They were in a tee, a union, or a tap. This location made it impossible to just put a clamp on it.

"We had to cut out and rebuild on most of the breaks. I hope the rest of the winter does not have as many breaks per week. We fixed five breaks

in a three day period," Brown concluded.

The council entered into a closed Executive Session to consult with their attorney about pending litigation. Following the closed session, no action was taken by the council.

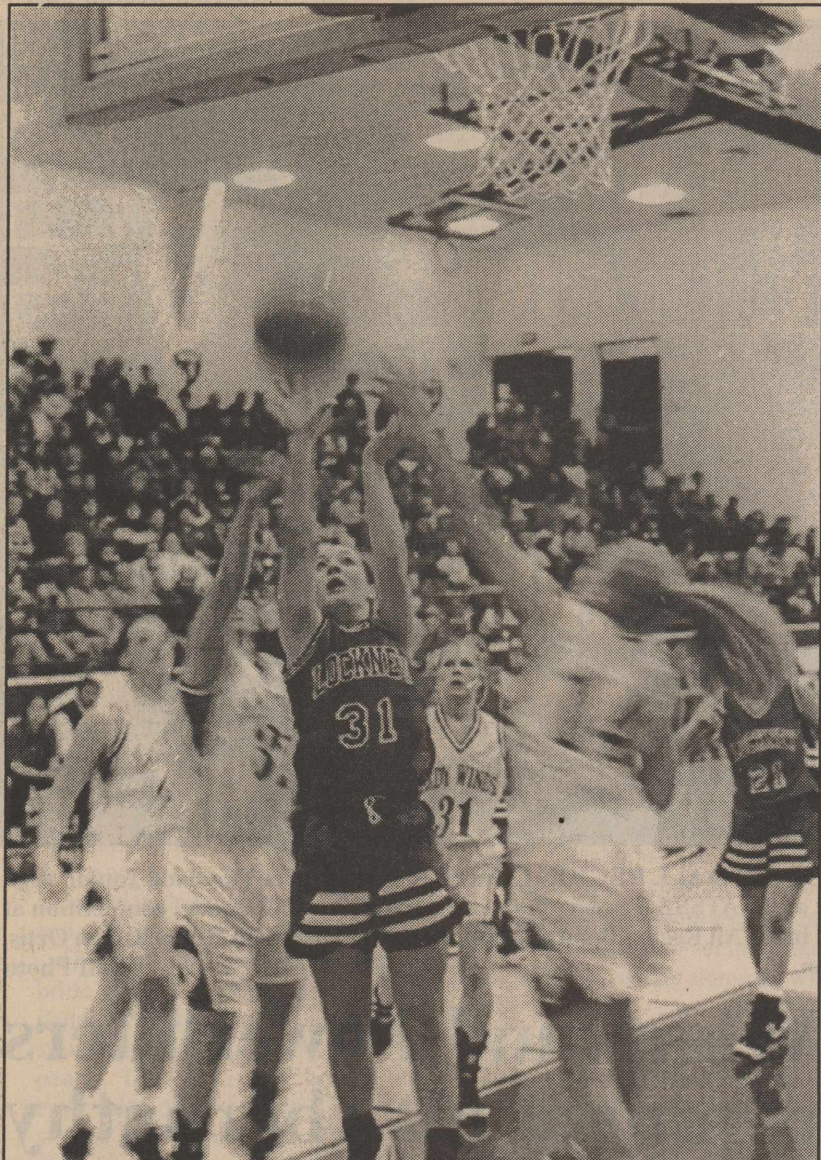

Lockney shot 28-66 from the field (42.4%) which was a nice change from the previous four games. Lockney had been shooting over 40% on the season before the 3 game losing streak. During the span, Lockney shot a dismal 30.1% from the field. Lockney held Olton to 37% shooting and outbounded the Mustangs 36-29. Brandon Alvis led all rebounders with 10 and Todd Cotham added 8 rebounds for the Longhorns. The win moved Lockney's overall record to 16-7 and 2-3 in District 5-AA.

Lockney traveled across Floyd County on Friday night to face arch-rival Floydada. Both teams came into the game with 2-3 district records. Lockney fell behind 10-2 early in the game before outscoring Floydada 10-5 to finish the first quarter. Alvis

scored 11 of game-high 40 points in the second period including one field goal, one three-point shot, and 6 of 8 free throws in the quarter. Lockney led 28-23 with 2:00 left in the half, but Floydada responded to outscore the Longhorns 5-0 the rest of the way. The score was 28-28 at intermission. The Longhorns outscored Floydada 18-13 in the third quarter behind 7 points from Alvis and 7 points from Wade Miller. Todd Cotham and Kirk Wilson also chipped in a pair and Lockney led 46-41 entering the final period. That is when Alvis took over the game. Alvis scored all 17 of Lockney's points in the fourth quarter, and the Longhorn defense held Floydada to 7 points as Lockney pulled away for a 63-48 win. Alvis made 6 field goals and 5 free throws during the final spurt. Lockney only shot 36% on the night (20-55), but made good on 19 of 30 free shots, and made 4 of 12 three point shots. Alvis finished the game with a career high 40 points on 13-24 shooting, including 3 of 4 three-pointers and 11-17 from the foul line. One of the key stars on the night was Lockney only committed 8 turnovers, while Floydada had 20. Also, Lockney's defense held Floydada to 34% shooting for the game. The win moves Lockney's record to 17-7 on the season and 3-3 in district play.

Coach Hise's comments: "We feel a lot better about ourselves after these two big wins. Anytime you can win on the road in this district, it is a big win. Brandon was unbelievable in two games. The rest of the team stepped up their play as well, and we had some big contributions from everybody. We haven't been shooting the ball like we would like, but we finally saw a few good shots go down for us. These wins put us in position to make some noise during the second half of district play. We feel like if we can keep getting better every game, we can beat anyone we play." Lockney begins the second half of district play with a home game Tuesday against Friona and a Friday game on the road at league-leading Abernathy.

Lockney High School and Junior High bands have something to smile about this week. Last week, ATSSB (Association of Texas Small School Bands) all-region tryouts were held.

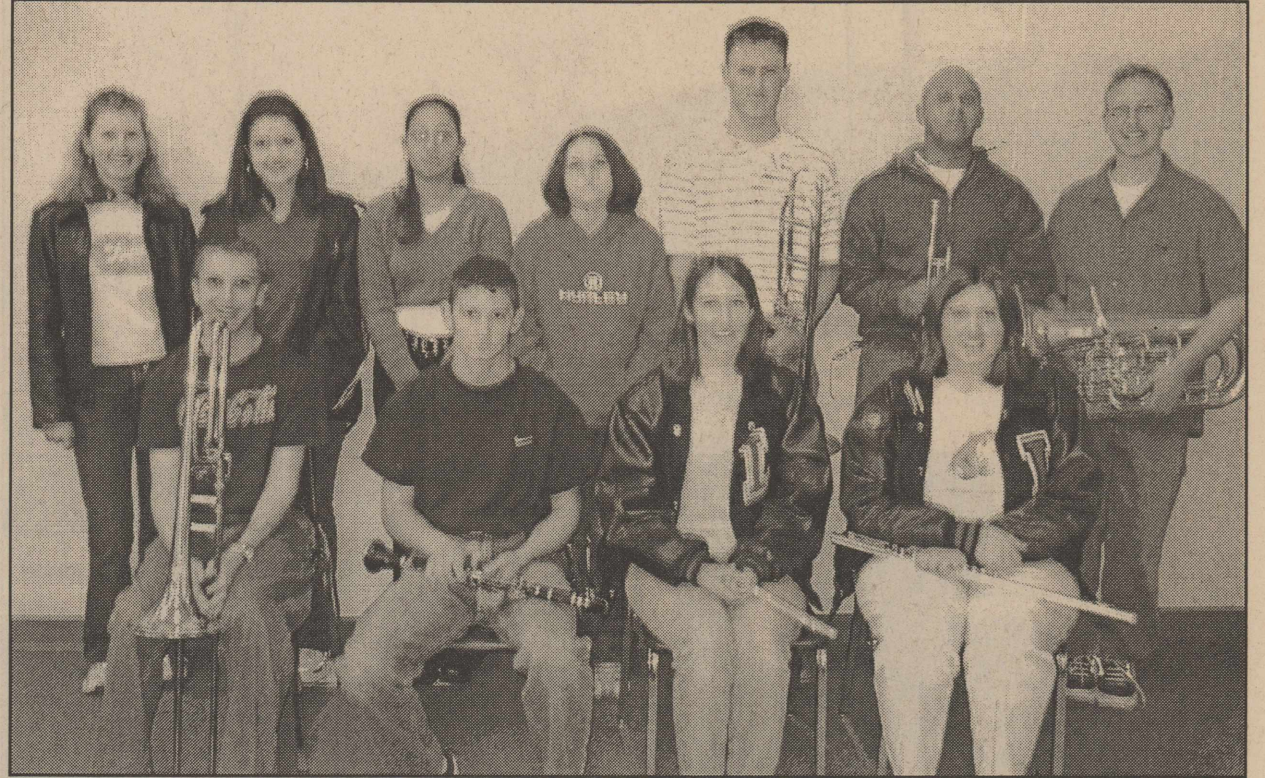

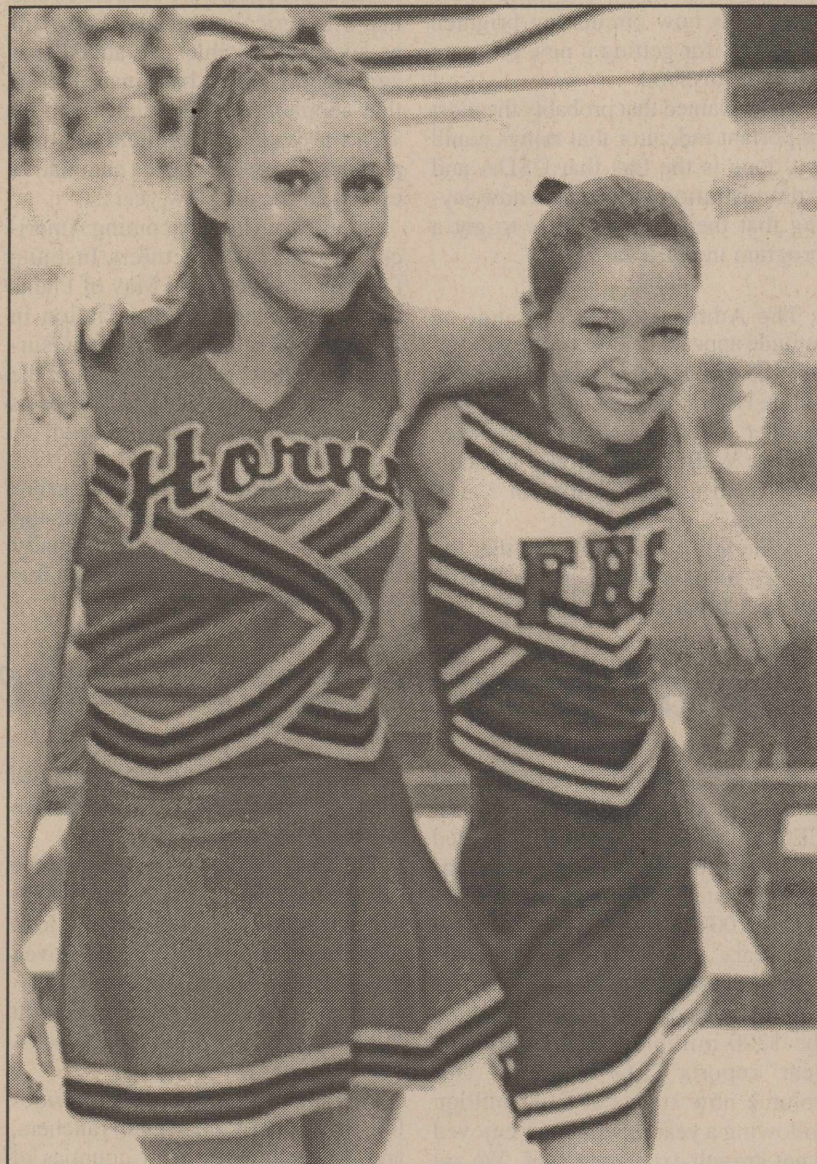

Local man writes turf management book

D. Brewer, a native of Crosby and Floyd County and a 1956 graduate of Crosbyton High School, has co-authored a handbook on soil and turf management which is meeting with a strong reception throughout this area. Brewer is a fertilizer and soil consultant for turf management. In authoring the book, he teamed with Charlene Anderson, a native of Old Mexico and currently a resident of Dexter, New Mexico, who is an associate in Brewer's firm. Brewer said his "Turf Management Handbook, For Professional and Homeowner Use" pertains to all aspects of turf management, as is evident with a review of the book's table of contents.

He says that currently 80% of the public schools and colleges within the western half of Texas and eastern half of New Mexico are using this turfbook as a guideline for maintaining athletic fields and campuses. Several libraries - including Crosbyton, Floydada, Quitaque, Plainview and Wayland Baptist University have the book on their shelves. The Hastings Book Store in Plainview also stocks the book, according to Brewer.

"This book is the only place I know of where all of this data on turf management is gathered together in one place. To get it elsewhere would re-

PCG board highlights legislation

The Plains Cotton Growers Board of Directors held its quarterly meeting Wednesday, January 16 and gathered the latest insights into development of new Farm Program legislation and a report on the status of the U.S. textile industry. PCG Executive Vice President Steve Verett updated the Board on the situation in Washington, DC in regard to prospects for completion of a new Farm Bill. He noted that some of the comments now circulating brighten prospects for getting a new program in place for 2002. He explained that probably the most important indicator that things could get done is the fact that USDA and Administration officials are now saying that their preference is to get a program in place for 2002.

gress returns January 23 and the Senate could begin to reconsider their version shortly after that time. Verett noted that while it will surely take more cooperation and less political gamesmanship from both sides to move the process forward, all sides appear to have the goal of 2002 implementation as a mark they work toward. The bottom line noted Verett is that past actions are water under the bridge as far as producers are concerned and that U.S. agriculture needs a Farm Bill as soon as possible. He added that agricultural lenders have made it clear that supplemental assistance simply won't provide enough help to allow producers to overcome the cumulative effects of the past few years. In other business incoming American Textile Manufacturers Institute (ATMI) president Van May of Plains Cotton Cooperative Association in Lubbock, discussed the issues surrounding the current downturn in the U.S. Textile industry and the prospects for seeing that trend reverse itself.

He noted that the U.S. textile industry has been and continues to be cost-competitive with its overseas counterparts but that post-production barriers eventually push the U.S. product out of the picture. The key point that he made remains a source of consternation for producers as well - U.S. trade policy has been one keyed around giving access to U.S. markets without getting the same access from other countries. He added that one of the most notable changes that could positively affect the future would be the formulation of trade that requires the same conduct from both parties and is viewed as fair trade and not protectionism. He noted that implementation of trade opportunities, such as the Caribbean Basin Initiative that provides U.S. companies access to lower-cost labor in nearby countries, can eventually make a big difference in how much U.S. cotton is actually purchased by U.S. consumers. He concluded that it appears the textile industry is bouncing along the bottom and that things could start improving from where they are now. That rebound, however, will be significantly influenced by both current and future trade policy decisions and the new farm bill.

The Administration's change in attitude appears to have begun following the hiring of Chuck Conner as White House liaison and an early December meeting between President George W. Bush and House Agriculture Committee Chairman Larry Combest. Although it is unfortunate that the chance to pass a Bill in the Senate before Christmas was missed, Con-
