

Secretary of State Colin Powell advises one thing, and the Secretary of Defense Donald Rumsfeld says another. The President, who first came down on the side of Rumsfeld, says he will consider the matter again.

We will confess to a certain amount of ambiguity on the matter, primarily because we have a certain amount of ambiguity about the whole mess. That's what generally happens when any operation is undertaken in a sort of "manufactured" way. One not only has to manufacture the first move, but all subsequent moves. In this case the first move was manufactured by Osama bin Laden, with all subsequent moves manufactured by the Administration. Along the way, a great many moves were the result of playing by ear. 
