

Hartsell is calendar girl at the age of 67

Fern Hartsell, of Floydada, never dreamed that her near death experience with liver failure and the miracle of her liver transplant would enable her to become a "Calendar Girl".

Although she is taking a lot of teasing from family members about her "April pin-up", she is very proud of the glossy photo in the 2002 Life Gift Calendar.

The road to calendar stardom did not come easy for Hartsell, and there were days the family was not sure she would be alive to tell her story. But, not only is Fern still alive, she is more than anxious to tell her story. In fact, telling her story is something Fern believes God wants her to do.

In 1998, at the age of 63, Fern began to suffer from what she described as "flu symptoms". For three weeks Fern was not feeling well, but tests showed "no problems".

But there was a problem. A really big problem. On the night of April 19, 1998 Fern laid down for her night's sleep. She woke up four days later in intensive care at Baylor Medical Center in Dallas with a new liver.

The fact that she woke up at all was nothing short of a miracle, as far as Fern and her family are concerned. However, since there are currently 15,989 people on the waiting list for a liver, the fact that she was able to get a liver donated is also considered a "God Thing" around Fern's house.

Within 12 hours of being placed on the donor list, Fern's family got word of a liver coming to her from a 43 year old Black woman.

"The timing had to be just right," said Fern. "The doctors gave my family no encouragement. They told my family that I had a good chance of

being brain dead when I woke up. "The doctors said I had a 50-50 to 70-30 chance of making it with a donated liver and that I wouldn't make it until the week-end without one.

"While I was unconscious there was a prayer vigil going on at the Methodist Church in Floydada and hundreds of prayers in the community being said on my behalf.

"The doctor told my family if they were a praying family they should get on their knees and pray that I would get off the ventilator. They did--and I did."

Fern says if she had been two years older she would have been considered too old for a transplant.

"The timing on everything was perfect," said Fern. "God gets all the credit. There was miracle after miracle occurring in my life while I was asleep."

"It was very special to me to know that I had doctors praying for me. Dr. Faust, the gastroenterologist on call when I came in, told me he went to the chapel and prayed for me right off the bat."

Fern says her family had to consider she might not make it through the surgery. She said she woke up to the sound of her daughter's voice saying, "Mom, I hope we've done everything you would have wanted us to do."

"It scared me," said Fern. "I thought something had happened to one of my daughters. I didn't know I was in the hospital."

When Fern woke up she stayed in ICU for 10-11 days and was then moved to a "regular" floor for 10-11 more days. From there Fern was moved to Twice Blessed Apartments in Dallas.

"The apartments have a wing dedicated to transplant patients," said Fern. "I would go to the hospital from there. I had to have a caregiver with me 24 hours a day. For three months my family and friends took turns taking care of me.

"Then I came home and I haven't had any problems."

Fern said at her first year checkup the doctor hooked her up to a sonogram for her to listen to her liver. "He said my liver sounded like the wind," said Fern. "I said, 'I know the Master of the wind.'"

"On my 2nd year visit I was asked to visit with a 34 year old Black woman who had come in just like me. She had already had her transplant but she was scared. I was able to minister to her and I called and checked on her after I came home."

Perhaps it was this visit that impressed on Fern exactly what she need to do with her "new life".

"I had been on high doses of steroids right after the transplant," said Fern. "They make you feel weird. You can't sleep and nothing makes sense. I kept asking God--'Why did you do this to me?'"

"I believe now that I should do something special because of all these miracles. I feel like I was meant to tell my story."

"Through word of mouth I heard about Life Gift, and I called to volunteer."

Life Gift works with doctors and the families of organ donors to make all the arrangements for organ donations.

"They handled the cases with reverence and empathy--as if they were their own family," said Fern. "Life Gift Continued On Page 4

Floydada man killed in Lubbock traffic accident

A Floydada man, Steven Gregory Smith, 49, was killed in a two-car crash in East Lubbock, Sunday morning, March 3. His wife, Mickey Lynn Smith, 49, was injured and is currently at University Medical Center in critical but stable condition.

The accident occurred at the intersection of East 19th and Martin Luther King Boulevard.

Steven Smith was pronounced dead at the scene. His wife, Mickey, was taken to UMC with internal injuries.

Smith worked in the landfill department for the City of Plainview and Mrs. Smith is a waitress at Leonard's Cafe in Floydada.

The unidentified driver of the other car, was also taken to UMC, and was listed in satisfactory condition with a compound fracture of the left leg and a cut on the forehead.

According to a news report in the Avalanche Journal, a witness told police the southbound vehicle ran a red light and struck the Smith's eastbound Ford Thunderbird about 3.25 a.m.

According to friend's Mrs. Smith is being kept heavily sedated and has not awakened.

The Floydada City Council met Tuesday, February 26, and approved the Order and the Notice for the May 4, 2002 Municipal Election.

There are four incumbent City Councilmembers running for re-election. They are: Bettye King, District No. 1; Jon Nielson, District No. 4; Clar Schacht, At Large; and Eric Cornelius, At Large. Sign up deadline for these City positions is 5:00 p.m. on March 25th.

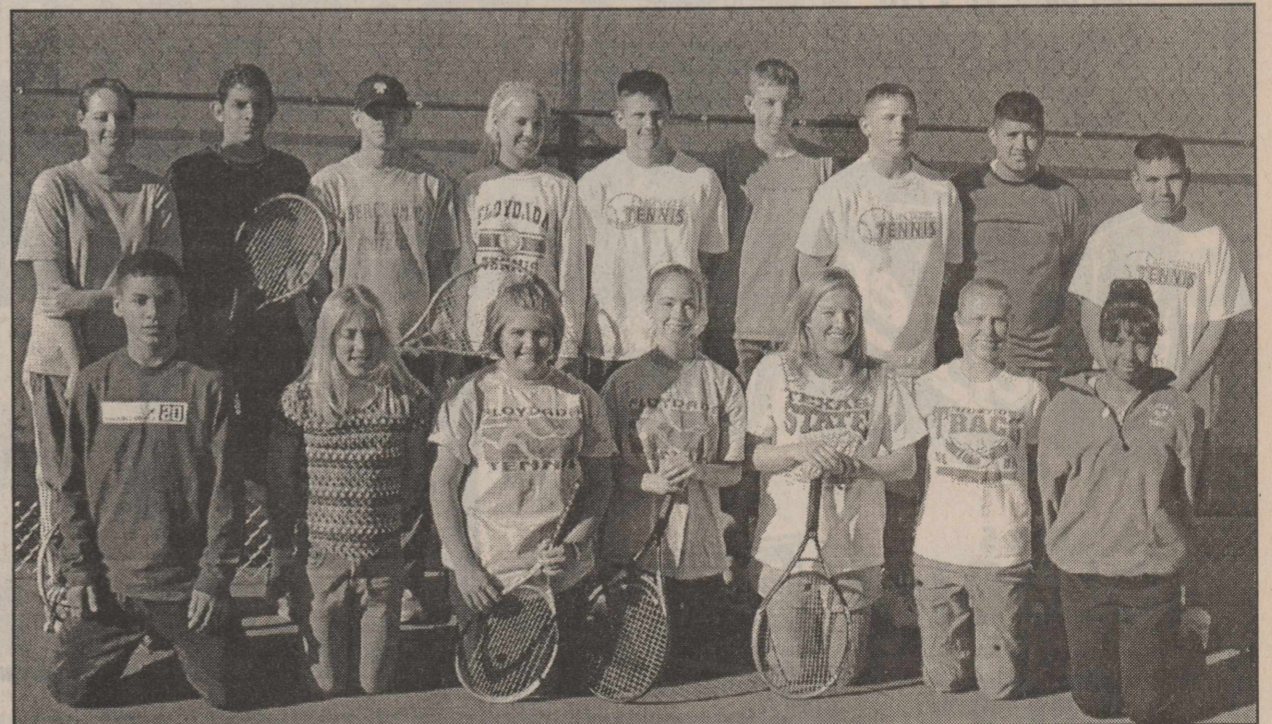
In other matters, the council unanimously approved the purchase of a new 2002 heavy duty Caterpillar 420 D backhoe for the City Utility Department. The \$55,875.00 price tag included an \$8,500 trade in for the City's old backhoe and a seven year full warranty.

City Water and Sewer Supervisor Jack Alaniz recommended the Caterpillar backhoe over the others because it met all specifications and the hydraulics' demonstration was the best,

he said.

"The main thing is the open (outside) center and the closed (inside) center hydraulics. When the machine is idling and is put in a bind, we noticed with the open hydraulics the r.p.m. drops a lot more than with the closed hydraulics (on the Caterpillar). This makes a lot of difference when we are working deep down on a water pipe or sewer pipe. We don't want to give it much throttle," Alaniz ex-

The national media is all a-twitter over one more attempt at peace in the Middle East. This time the impetus comes from Saudi Arabia, so maybe, just maybe, something will come of it.

We've not seen the plan, and we haven't even seen any definitive reports on the plan, but from the sketchy reports we have seen, it calls for the Israelis to give up their conquered territories in return for formal recognition by all the neighboring states. If that is indeed the gist of the plan, we would be in favor. In fact, we would shout halleluiah.

Our thoughts on the plan do not, however, extend to eager anticipation. We've seen too many ostensible attempts at peace go by the boards, with each side blaming the other. False starts have become part of the picture in the Middle East. Every Administration since Richard Nixon's has had its fling at the problem.

The Israelis, and their flacks in the United States, have been extremely successful in conditioning the American mind toward what ever happens in the Middle East. Nobody has ever been as successful at standing truth on its head as has the Israeli government. The Palestinians, descendants of people who inhabited the region even before the arrival of Abraham, have been painted as "terrorists" simply

because they try to protect their homes and orchards from Israeli bulldozers, tanks and airplanes. If the Palestinians also had tanks, planes, and missiles, they too might be accorded the status of legitimacy. But they have only rocks and suicide bombs, so they are designated terrorists.

One of the principal reasons we do not get too excited about prospects for peace in the region is simply that we see no reason for the Israelis to make peace. They now have the best of all worlds. They carry on their expansionist aims in the region while collecting billions of dollars from the American Congress, all the while professing to be our "only friend in the Middle East." (To date they have collected over \$130 Billion from American taxpayers in various forms of "foreign aid", courtesy our Congress.)

If peace came to the region there would be much less rationale for Israeli raids on the American taxpayers. They would probably continue to receive the money, but it would have to be under some other rationale. That rationale would probably be that Israel deserves a "reward" for all its past problems with its neighbors. One rationale you will not see surfaced, however, but which is assuredly a principal reason for the continuing American largess, is that tensions in the mid-

east works to the advantage of many American politicians, and Israeli politicians as well. Many American politicians, like the Israelis, benefit financially from the bloodshed. If anyone doubts that, all they have to do is check the campaign contributions, and the campaign support that flows to friends and benefactors of Israel in the Congress and the Administration. (For a few examples: Sen. Barbara Boxer, (D. Calif.) has raked in \$148,790 from pro-Israeli contributors; Senator Jeff Bingaman (D. New Mexico), \$261,425; Joe Lieberman (D. of Connecticut), \$228,508; Senator Patrick Leahy (D. Vt.), \$118,200; Senator Mitch McConnell, (R-Ky) \$285,425.)

So it goes, with few exceptions, throughout the Congress. Does anyone wonder why they are so eager to send American tax dollars to Israel? But while it might not be in the best financial interest for many American politicians to see peace in the Middle East, it would most certainly be in the best interest of American citizens. In addition to relieving us (theoretically) of the financial burden of supporting Israel's expansionist aims in the region, it would remove at least one rationale for dissident groups throughout the region. Terrorist groups throughout the Middle East have recruited followers with the argument that Israel would not exist except for American support. The argument makes sense to those who see their land taken with the help of American military might.

Quite frankly, we've never under-

stood Bush's turning a blind eye to the problems in Palestine. He seems to have taken the position of letting the protagonists fight it out, and when they are both exhausted from the bloodshed, perhaps they will make peace on their own. To our way of thinking, that is a short-sighted approach to the problem. It is also a one-sided approach to the problem. One side has the very latest in weaponry. The other side has rocks. The end, in that situation, is predictable. Perhaps that predictable end is what the President desires, but if so he should know the policy guarantees perpetual warfare. Even if the Palestinians are beaten into total submission, the resentment and hostility will remain, and from their ranks will come more "terrorists."

At any rate, what we have seen of the Saudi plan gives hope where none exists at the moment. Initial press reports indicate our President is interested. We hope so, and we hope the American media doesn't clobber it before it gets a hearing. Given the ownership, and makeup, of most American media, and given the pro-Israel mindset of Pat Robertson and Jerry Falwell, one would be justified in being less than enthusiastic about the eventual outcome.

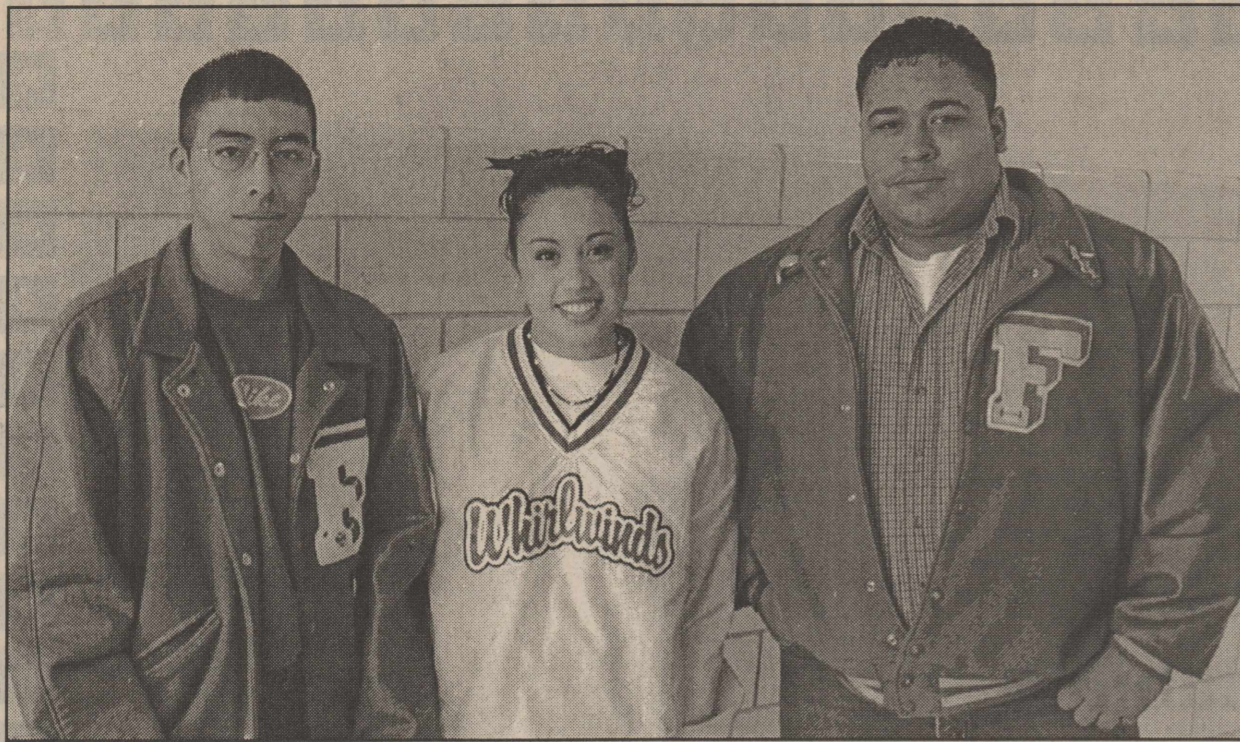

her sister Janie Dardis. Fern is retired now and donates to the Spirit of Sharing and is active in her church and the Living Waters Emmaus Community. She has joined the Red Hat Society, which is the reason for all the red in her calendar picture.

She has two daughters, Hope Warren, of Floydada, and Holly Glasscock, of Ada, Oklahoma.

Fern says she worked for 12 years at Lockney Cooperative and remembers a time when she doubted God's love for her. "I used to question God about why some people had more than me, etc. I found out I should never question God or ask Him to prove His love. He proved to me real quick just how much He loved me and how important I was to Him."

## City workers wrestle with junk left in alleys

The council discussed the need for the City office to send out letters to all residents concerning junk, appliances, and furniture being placed in the alleys around town for the City to pick up.

City Manager Gary Brown said, "When we talk to people about these things in the alley, everybody says it is not theirs. They say someone else dropped it there. It is always someone's else's junk. I don't know what the answer is. We can never catch up (on picking this type of junk up)."

City Street and Sanitation Supervisor Julian Alaniz told the council, "The day I drove the garbage truck there was everything in the alleys. I had to move some of the junk just to get to the dumpster."

"We don't mind the tree limbs, if they are broken up into smaller pieces and put inside the dumpster," Alaniz said.

After much discussion, the council in general decided, without voting on the matter, to send out letters stating the City's rules, regulations, free landfill coupons, trailers availability, and free pickup dates for such items, but warning the public that it is not the City's responsibility to pick these items up.

The council discussed and passed action on City employees' vacation time. Permission was granted for the Employee Handbook to be amended so the new vacation year will begin

on October 1st, instead of January 1st. This corresponds with the City's fiscal year and will make it easier in keeping vacation records.

The council unanimously voted to allow Councilmember Ruben Barrientos to operate the City's swimming pool again this summer and to allow Jessie Lela to be in charge of the Summer Softball Program at Annie Taylor Park.

City resident O.B. Smith was granted permission to purchase Lots 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, and 9, in Block Two, Stewart Subdivision of Block Four, Price First Addition in the town of Floydada in the amount of \$200 each for a total of \$1,200.00. The motion stipulated that the deeds of said lots must be cleared by the office of City Attorney Karen Houchin.

The council passed a two year resolution to continue to participate in the City's Tax Abatement Program on a "one on one" basis. The City maintains the right to give, or not to give, tax abatements in the future.

City Manager Brown concluded the meeting with a brief report. Brown told the council that he had received a \$3,500 prestigious scholarship to further his education in City Management.

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## South Plains Hobby Club Meets

The South Plains Hobby Club met at the home of Peggy Roberts, President, on Wednesday, February 13, 2002 at 2:00 p.m. Peggy Roberts called the meeting to order. Members present included Shirley Bell, Bessie Bradford, Dorothy Cummings, Gleyenn Earle Cummings, Dovie Davis, Betty Deavenport, Ann Hartman, Sandra Lass, Carolyn Marble, Peggy Roberts, Connie Sanders, Virginia Taylor, Juanita Teeple, Shirley Weldon and Mamie Wood. Ann Hartman, Secretary/Treasurer, read the minutes of the last meeting and gave the treasurer's report. Virginia Taylor reported on the status of the Hobby Club calendar.

Peggy Roberts blew a train whistle announcing the theme of the meeting: My Most Memorable Train Ride, and introduced Bessie Bradford, who showed a videotape of the Colorado Royal Gorge Train Route, illustrating her most memorable train ride. Bessie Bradford said that the original train route was built in 1878, follows the Arkansas River and was the shortest route from Denver through the gorge to connect with routes to the west coast. She said that the train had been taken by famous people such as Theodore Roosevelt and, in 1912, by the Boston Red Sox baseball team. The present Royal Gorge Train Route is 8 miles long. The train ride takes approximately two hours to complete and the train has an engine at either end to pull the open air passenger cars through the gorge and back as there is no turn around at the top. The train route has been open for tours since 1999 and is open every day during the summer months and weekends the rest of the year.

Other members described their most memorable train trips. Several reported that they had never been on a train. Some reported riding the "Doodlebug," a local passenger train that ran from Childress to Lubbock making stops at South Plains and Quitaque as well as at other places throughout west Texas as a part of the Ft. Worth/Denver Railway Alliance. The "Doodlebug" operated until the 1940s. Evidence of the locations of

train tracks remain to this day throughout Floyd County. One old train track location is the Caprock Canyon Trailway Park (a part of the Caprock Canyons State Park) which runs from South Plains to Quitaque. Joe and Virginia Taylor of South Plains conduct tours on the Trailway, using the "Doodlebug," the only motorized vehicle allowed on the trail.

## Telemarketing and "Do-Not-Call" lists

Telemarketing - the very name conjures up memories of dinners growing cold while a voice on the phone urges you to buy something, invest in something, or change your phone company. We've all had that experience. But the good news is that there is something you and the FCC can do to help ensure uninterrupted family dinners.

As an FCC Commissioner, I believe it's important that consumers know their rights, and that the FCC help you protect those rights. That is why we require telemarketers to establish "do-not-call" lists for home telephone numbers. A do-not-call list is simply a list of those consumers who no longer wish to receive telemarketing calls. Our rules require most telemarketers (charities and non-profits are exempt) to keep a record of those consumers who ask to be placed on the do-not-call list, and they must honor that request for 10 years.

There are also other steps you can take to help protect your privacy:

1. Get on the do-not-call list of the Direct Marketing Association. Members of DMA will honor the do-not-call requests on the list, and your name will be kept on the list for five years. This allows you to broaden the scope of your request. You can get your name included in the DMA list by sending your name, phone number (including area code), and address (including zip code) to: Telephone Preference Service, Direct Marketing Association, P.O. Box 9014, Farmingdale, NY 11735-9014. For a \$5 processing fee, you can also register online at <http://www.the-dma.org/cgi/offtelephonedave>.

2. Contact your state's consumer protection office or public utilities commission to find out if your state has its own do-not-call list. Many

states maintain a do-not-call database so that consumers in the state can register to stop receiving all telemarketing calls. Some states even have additional provisions that address unsolicited calls to business numbers. A listing of state Public Utility Commissions can be found at [http://www.fcc.gov/cecb/iad/state\\_puc.html](http://www.fcc.gov/cecb/iad/state_puc.html).

3. Keep your phone number to yourself. Don't list your phone number on your checks or forms, and don't give it to businesses unless necessary. If you do give your number to a business, request that they not share it with other companies.

4. Be aware that phone technology allows companies to see and "capture" a caller's number. When you call a company, some companies add your number to a marketing list. You can stop this practice by dialing \*67 and waiting for a dial tone before placing a call, thus blocking the caller identifying information. However, there may be a charge for this service, and individual call blocking does not work when phoning 800 or 900 numbers.

5. Screen your calls. Getting Caller ID (and/or Call Waiting ID) on your phone can tell you who's calling - and let you know if it's someone you want to hear from. Some phone companies also offer anonymous call rejection, which rejects calls from incoming sources that have blocked their numbers. While these options result in cost to consumers, another less costly method is to rely on your answering machine to screen your calls; many telemarketers will hang up if they get a machine.

In addition, another preventative strategy may be coming soon. The Federal Trade Commission has come out with a proposal to create a national

do-not-call registry, but it is unclear when it might be implemented. For now, you need to stick to tried and true methods for stopping unsolicited calls.

These strategies, combined with a request to be placed on telemarketers' do-not-call lists, should greatly reduce the number of unsolicited calls you receive. But what if all else fails - what can you do if a company keeps calling even after you ask to be placed on its do-not-call list?

One option is to contact the FCC. The FCC has the authority to issue warnings or to fine companies violating do-not-call rules. If you would like to send the FCC a complaint, you can file it online at: [www.fcc.gov/cib/complaints.html](http://www.fcc.gov/cib/complaints.html) or call us at 1-888-CALL-FCC (1-888-225-5322).

Another strategy, which is admittedly more difficult for consumers, is taking the company to court. Consumers have the right to sue a company in state courts in order to stop solicitation calls, and there is the possibility of receiving monetary damages. By statute, you can receive up to \$500 in damages per violation or, if the court finds that the company willfully or knowingly violated the do-not-call regulations, up to \$1,500 in damages per violation.

Finally, you can contact officials in your own state. Your local or state consumer protection office or your state Attorney General's office may bring court cases on behalf of its residents in order to stop unlawful conduct and/or collect damages.

If you follow these tips, you should be able to avoid a great many telemarketing calls and once again enjoy your dinner.

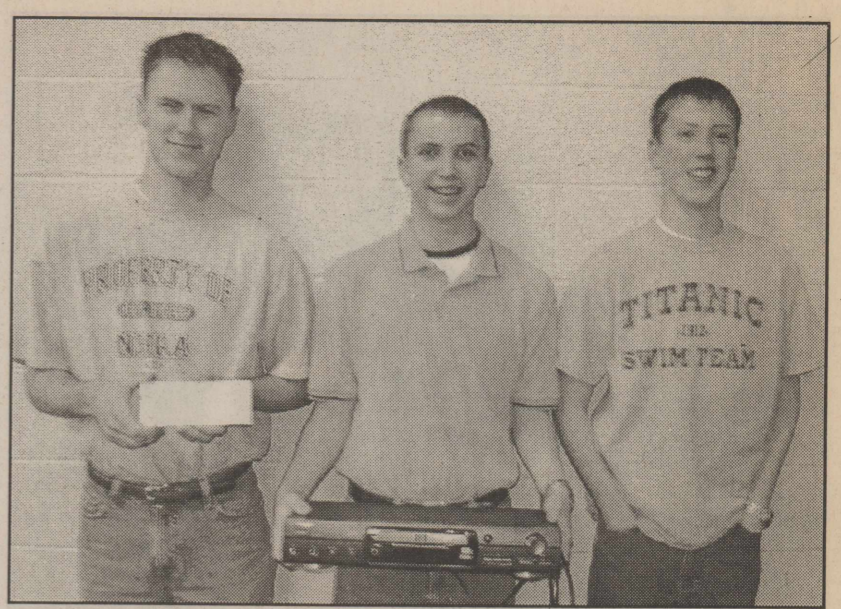

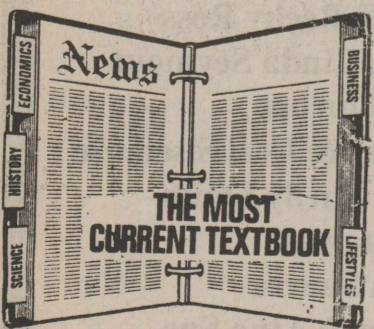

## FISD Board Member McCormick completes Basics Certificate

Mark McCormick of Floydada Independent School District has completed all requirements to earn a Boardmanship Basics Certificate from the Texas Association of Schools Boards' (TASB) Institute for School Trustee Development, known as TASB ISD.

Each participating trustee earned at least 15 hours of continuing education credit by attending required courses. Especially designed for new school board members, TASB ISD is boardmanship education created from trustees; requests for workshops that provide a comprehensive curriculum in the basics. It allows new trust-

ees to gain a strong foundation in their first year of board service.

In-depth session focused on the basics of school law, policy, and personnel; district planning and accountability; teamwork; district budget and finance; and board roles and responsibilities. Trustees also completed in-district follow-up activities assigned for each course.

"The sooner new board members learn their roles and responsibilities, the sooner they can contribute fully and productively to the leadership team," said Debbie Manns, TASB ISD program manager. "TASB ISD connects new trustees to other board

members, both new and experienced, who expand the learning opportunities in and out of the workshop session," she said.

TASB is a voluntary, nonprofit association established nearly 50 years ago to serve local Texas School districts. It includes 1,047 school districts and county school boards, 45 junior colleges, 51 tax appraisal districts, 157 cooperatives, and 20 education service centers. School board members are the largest group of publicly elected officials in the state. The districts they represent have a combined annual budget of \$20 billion and employ more than 475,000.

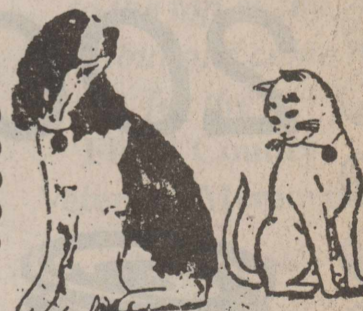

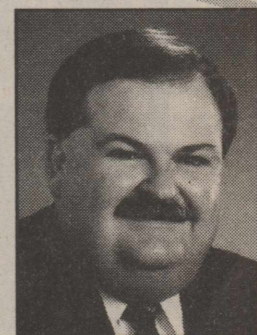

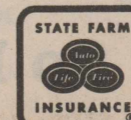

## House names conferees for new Farm Bill

Speaker of the House of Representatives Dennis Hastert announced the names of conferees that will be charged with reconciling the House and Senate versions of the Farm Bill and putting together a compromise Bill acceptable to both Houses of Congress and to the Administration.

Hastert's announcement, made February 28, included the following Republican members of the House: Agriculture Committee Chairman Larry Combest (Texas), Committee Vice Chairman John Boehner (Ohio), and Nutrition and Forestry Subcommittee Chairman Bob Goodlatte (Va.), Livestock Subcommittee Chairman Richard Pombo (Calif.), Special Crops Subcommittee Chairman Terry Everett (Ala.), Conservation, Credit and Rural Development Subcommittee Chairman Frank Lucas (Okla.), General Farm Commodities Subcommittee Chairman Saxby Chambliss (Ga.), and Kansas congressman Jerry Moran. Democrats named as conferees: Charlie Stenholm (Texas), Gary Condit (Calif.), Collin Peterson (Minn.), Cal Dooley (Calif.), Eva Clayton (N.C.) and Tim Holden (Pa.).

Senate conferees previously named include: Democrats Tom Daschle (D-SD), Kent Conrad (D-ND), Patrick Leahy (D-VT), and Tom Harkin (D-IA); Republicans Richard Lugar (R-IN), Jesse Helms (R-NC), and Thad Cochran (R-MS).

House and Senate Ag Committee staff members have just about completed an initial walkthrough of the individual titles in each Bill. The goal of that process is to gain a better understanding of the intent of each arm of Congress in each section and to identify differences between the two Bills. Once completed, the work of developing compromise positions on differing provisions will begin in earnest.

The goal of completing the Farm Bill conference by the start of Congress' Easter break remains for both House and Senate conferences. It is still felt that completion of the conference by that time will allow implementation for the 2002 crop year.





Mrs. Burleson died Friday, March 1, 2002 at Floydada Rehabilitation and Care Center.

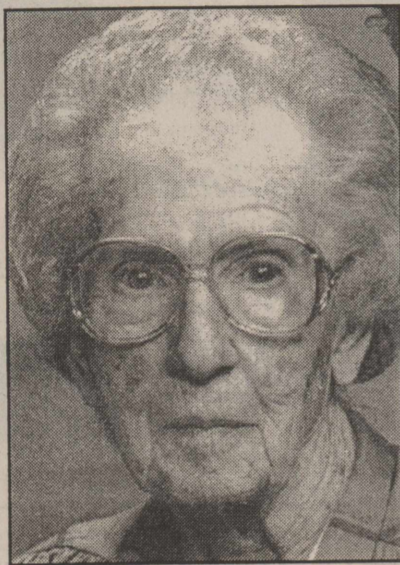

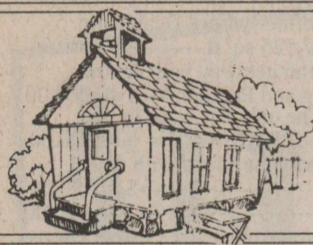
next has happened in small towns all along. You see, while Gil was in the hospital, his crop mysteriously got planted. And by the time he was able to work again, he had the best stand in the county.

## The Country Preacher

**COMMUNISTS IN MEXICO-** Communism is not dead! There are lots of communists in Mexico. IN THE CHIAPAS MOUNTAINS: The Zapatistas in the Chiapas mountains of southern Mexico are communist revolutionaries. They have killed, raped, and looted the poor Indians in the very villages where we started churches back in the '70's.

The mob that beat me and ran my family and me out of Los Chorros, Chiapas in 1975 were led by Mexican communist revolutionaries, not by the Indians. About two years ago, 45 Indians were killed by these Zapatistas in a nearby village. I believe many of the Christians, including their pastor, were slaughtered during this time.

IN THE HIDALGO MOUNTAINS: When climbing the mountains in Hidalgo, I encountered a large

group of young men being taught communism in a school house. Their young male teacher invited me in and I was interrogated for over an hour about America, the CIA, and my intentions in Mexico. I witnessed to them about the gospel of Christ.

IN THE VERACRUZ HILLS: One Sunday afternoon, about six men church members from Los Mangos, Veracruz, and I, were visiting a correspondence student in a village in the rolling hills. He was a family man and he seemed real nervous as we talked outside his thatched roof hut.

A Mexican interrupted our discussion. He told us that they were all communists in this village and we were not welcome. He began to get angry and started punching and shoving me in the chest with his hands. I asked the student to write me again

for another date to come back. I walked toward the pickup with the communist cursing my back. We never heard from the student again.

IN THE OAXACA HILLS: A couple of years ago, the U.S. News and World Report magazine showed a map of where the communist revolutionaries were headquartered in Mexico. One place was in the Chiapas mountains, and another place was just north of Puerto Escondido, Oaxaca on the Pacific Ocean, exactly where we organized a church in 1982. I wonder what has happened to the church, their pastor, and the members.

**MORAL OF THE STORY:** "Don't believe the media when they talk about communism being dead. It is alive and deadly!"

### ARE PARENTS ALWAYS TO BLAME?

Most parents have concerns about how they have raised their children. Parents may worry if they focused on something too much; said or did something that warped their child(ren) for life. Every parent makes mistakes but they are generally not things that adversely affect the child for life. Anyway, most children grow up with some burr-under-their-saddle regardless of how careful or good the parent. For example, as adults we might wind up thinking, "I will not keep telling my kids to pick up their room because that's all I heard from my parents." They repeat criminal activity. They continue to get into trouble in some way. They may not commit the same crime again but they are involved in other things that are wrong, breaking some rules, challenging various types of authority, etc.

They are always making excuses and blaming others. They do not take responsibility for their actions. They focus on someone else more than themselves. The finger always seems to point to others.

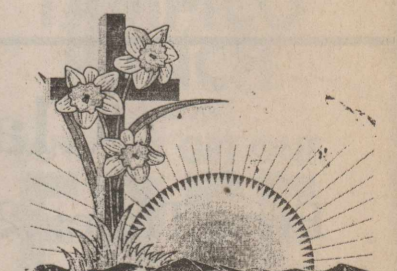
