Meetings were conducted with residents and local officials to determine how "match" or "in-kind" contributions might be invested, blended, and distributed to maximize services for the County.


The learning lab will serve students from a wide range of backgrounds, including: economically disadvantaged, welfare recipients, high school dropouts, dislocated workers and older workers.

Museum celebrates 31-year partnership with Green Thumb

On May 25 of this year, the Floyd County Museum will celebrate the thirty-first anniversary of the organizational meeting, which set up the museum operation. Officers were elected and plans put into place to get the museum started. The C. Surginer & Son Hardware building was given to the museum with the deed change being recorded in January of the next year. Once that happened work was begun on display cases and exhibits.

Green Thumb has been providing senior citizens with employment help for some 30 years since their inception following the "Green Thumb" demonstration project as a part of the "Lady Bird Johnson Highway Beautification Program" in 1965. Under the sponsorship of The National Farmers, retired and disadvantaged rural Americans--partially farmers put their "green thumbs" to work beautifying the nations highways. This led to the Senior Community Service Employment Act, and Green Thumb, Inc., which became the largest administrator of the provisions of that act. At the start of 2002, Green Thumb, Inc. changed its name to Experience



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
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Lockney Reading Lab is making a difference for First Graders

Before digging, the homeowner must decide which native plants will best fit his or her landscape needs. The planting area for the new plant should be well prepared prior to transplanting. Dig the planting hole both wider and deeper than the native plant's root system. Add woods loam, peat humus, or preferable, the type of soil from which the native is taken. Have leaf mold and loam on hand to fill in or work around the new plant's root sys-

In choosing a native plant to transplant, do not-attempt to transplant an overly large specimen. Small plants are usually more vigorous. They grow much faster and are easier to handle. It may be best to prune the root system of the selected native prior to digging. In the case of larger plants it






