The Pioneer Association honored distinguished citizens during the 2002 annual Old Settler's Reunion, Saturday, May 25th.

Pioneers recognized for their contributions to Floyd County were: Pioneer Couple Edell and Lovene Moore of Floydada; Pioneer Woman Jonelle (Burke) Fawver of Floydada; and Pioneer Man Francis L. Montandon of Lockney.

The Moores of Floydada have been married 27 years. Together they have four daughters: Janet Julian of Lubbock, Jenis Tucker of Cortez, Colorado, Charlotte Sutton of Auburn, Alabama, and Sharon Henson of Waco. They have nine grandchildren and five great grandchildren. Both Edell and Lovene said they enjoyed raising their children here and feel a great sense of love and pride for Floyd County.

Edell moved to Floyd County in 1952 and began working for Frank Harmon at the Harmon Funeral Home and ambulance service. During these past 50 years Edell has been involved with numerous organizations. He is a past member of the Floydada Lions Club and the Floydada Masonic

Lodge.

Edell had been an active member of the Floydada Band Boosters and Little League baseball. He is presently a member of the Floydada Rotary Club and board member of the Floydada Cemetery Association. He has been an active member of the First Baptist Church since 1952.

Edell bought the Floydada funeral home in 1965. Soon after that Alton Rose became a partner and the funeral home became the Moore Rose Funeral Home. They owned and operated the Moore Rose Funeral Home in Lockney for many years. They sold the funeral homes, but Edell still works there. He is still seen around town visiting and helping the people of this community that he loves.

Graham survives cancer again

Herman Graham will be celebrating another chance at life in the "Survivor's Lap" of Floyd County's Relay for Life. June 1st. Graham should probably have more than one "Survivor's Lap," because he has survived cancer 3 times.

Friends say Graham is not only a "true survivor" but the "Graham Grit" has seen him through many years of hardships.

Graham was first invaded by cancer in the form of prostate cancer in September 1995. "They removed my prostate," said Graham. "I didn't have to have any treatments then. I didn't need it."

Then four years later, in December 1999, Graham was diagnosed with colon cancer. "There was cancer in 3 sections of my colon," said Graham. "They removed a baseball size tumor at the top of my colon and the doctor also removed 2 feet of colon."

Graham kicked off the new year of

2000 with 11 months of chemotherapy. "I never got nauseated," said Graham, "although the treatments left me weak and dragged me down."

After the colon cancer Graham had to undergo a cat scan every three months and a chest x-ray every 6 months. "Nothing else showed up," said Graham.

While undergoing the chemotherapy for the colon cancer Graham noticed a bump on the shin of his left leg. "A doctor took a look at it and said it was probably a calcium deposit and to just watch it," said Graham. "It never got bigger or bothered me so I didn't worry about it."

Then one day in November 2001 Graham noticed his leg was swollen. X-rays were taken and his circulation was checked. Doctors found nothing. In January a doctor suspected the bump was possibly sarcoma.

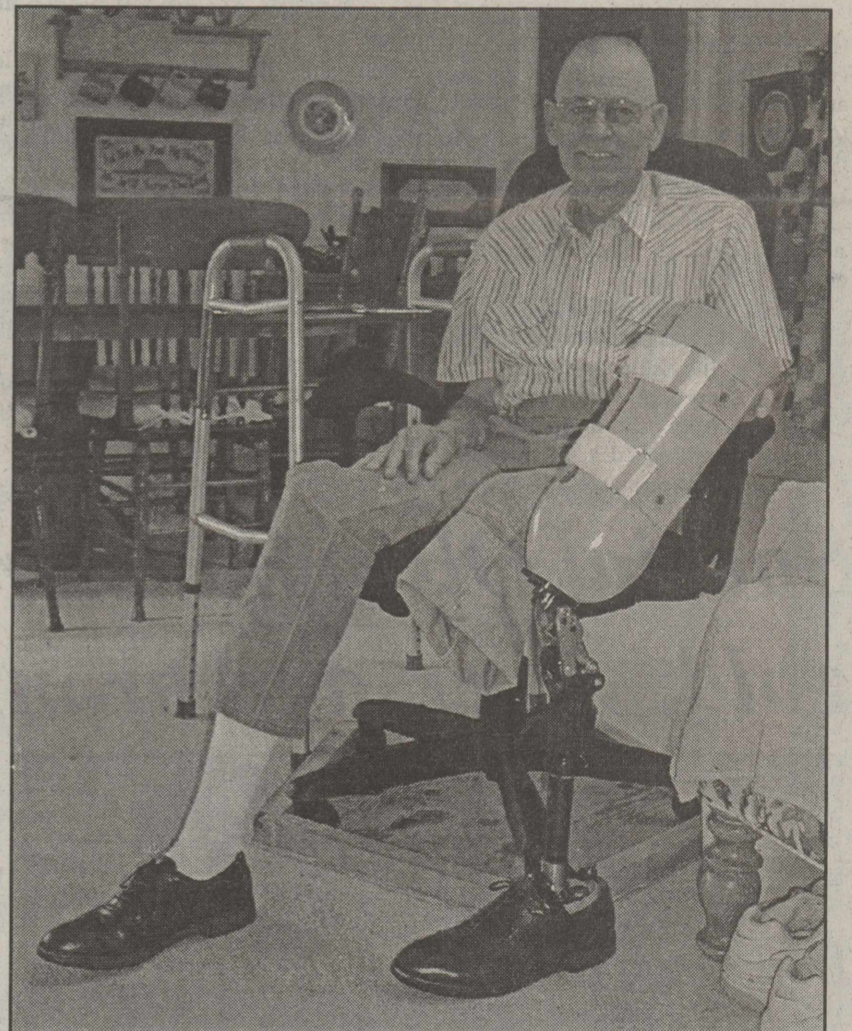
"There are only 7,000 cases a year in the U.S. of soft tissue sarcoma," said Graham. "It is very rare."

Graham was sent to a specialist and in January a biopsy confirmed the doctor's diagnosis.

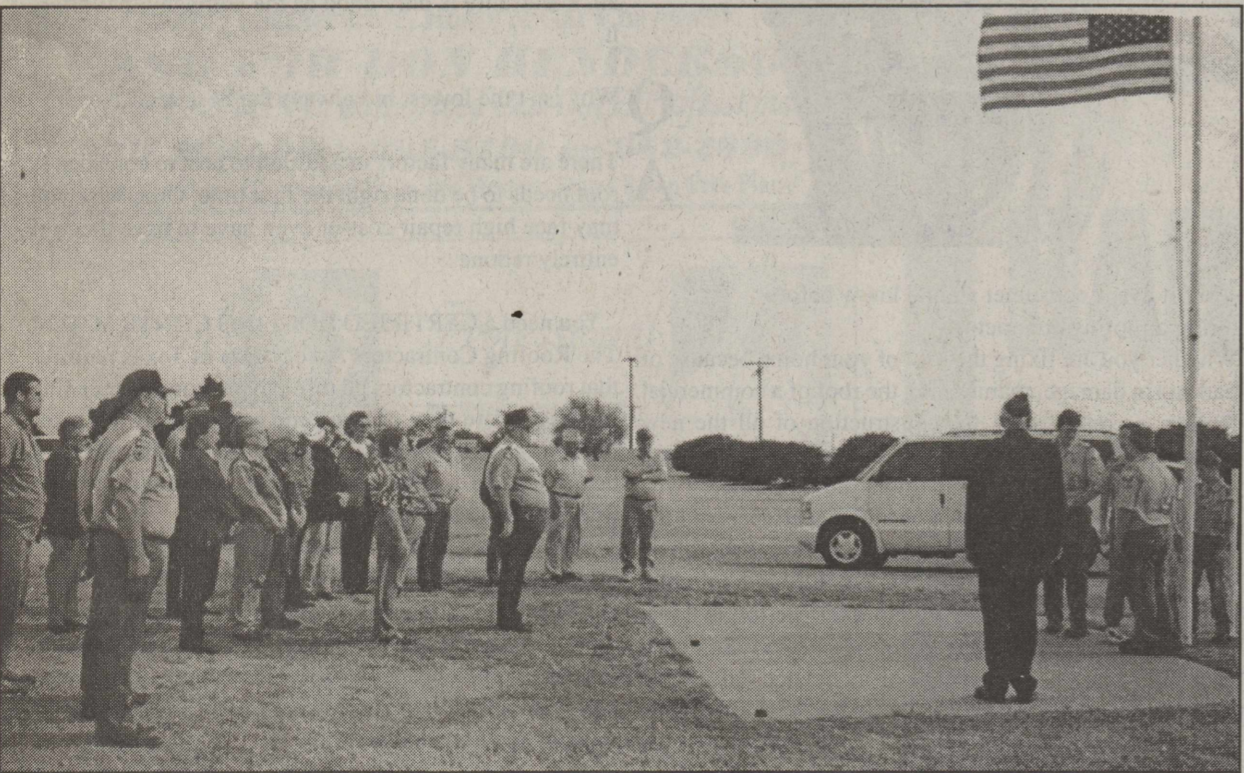
"The doctor told me I could have the leg operated on but they would have to do so much cutting that it could possibly weaken the muscles in the leg."

Graham had already had 3 chemo treatments and 2 weeks of radiation

Teen injured on mechanical bull

A mechanical bull, set up by a vendor in town for the Old Settler's celebration, turned into a dangerous game for local youth.

Seventeen year old Tyler Battey, of Floydada, was taken away by ambulance and airlifted to a Lubbock hospital after his face struck the head of the bull during a bucking simulation.

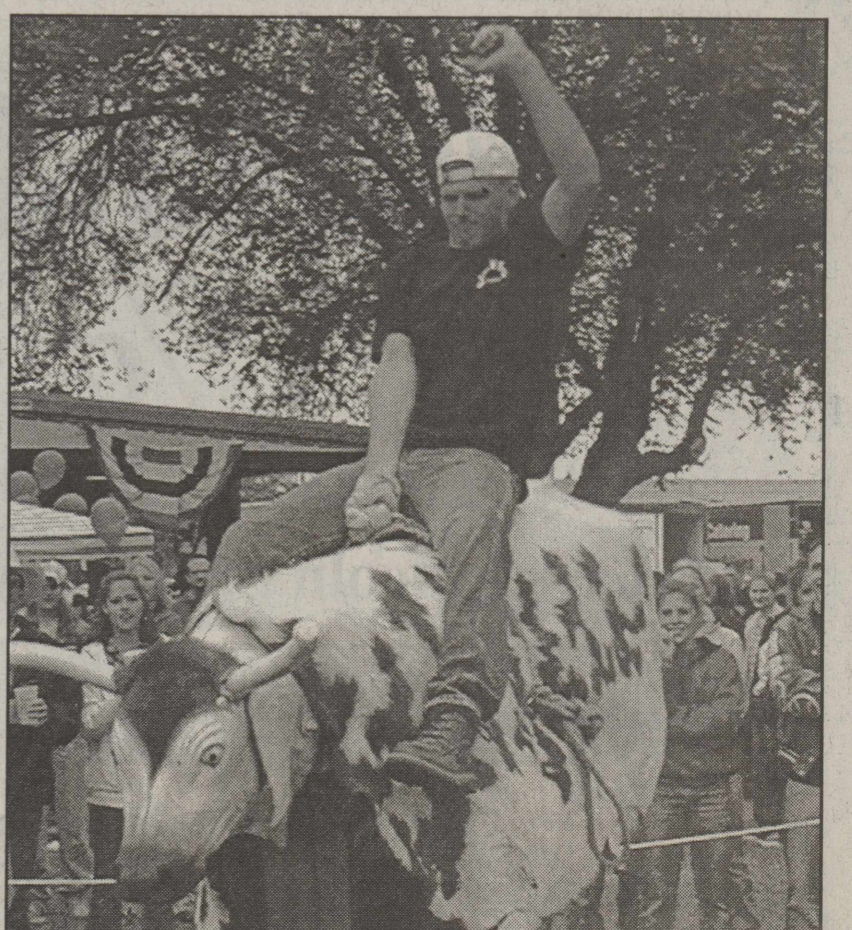
"The man running the machine had turned it up as fast and hard as it would go," said Tyler's mother, Abby Battey. "He had told the older kids that if they could ride the bull they would get two rides for the price of one."

"Tyler's face hit the head of the bull between the horns. Tyler fell to the ground and when he tried to get up he stumbled and fell back down. Friends knew he was hurt and they called an ambulance."

"His nose was bleeding and the side of his face looked bashed in. EMS thought he may have suffered a head injury so he was airlifted to Lubbock."

"His right cheek-bone and sinus cavity have been crushed in 1 1/2 centimeters. He will have surgery on Friday (May 31). Doctors will go inside his mouth, up through his sinus cavity and screw in plates and screws."

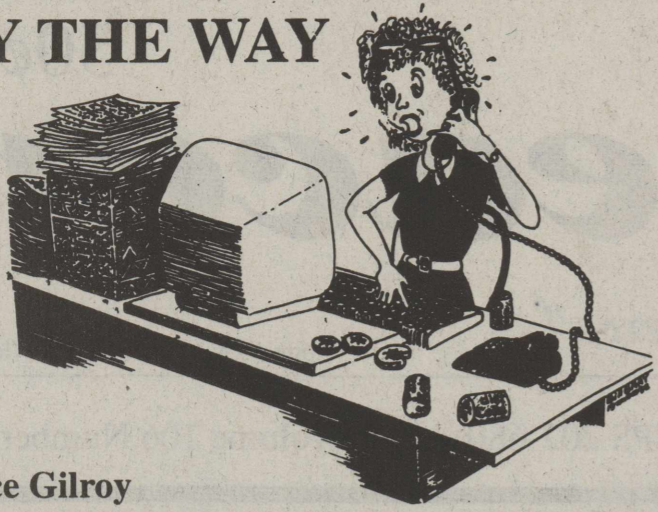
Witnesses to the accident have said several teenagers hit their head while riding the machine.

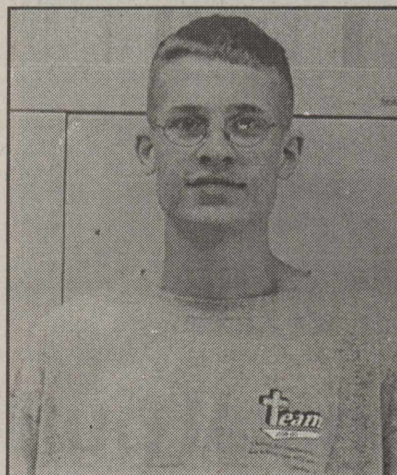


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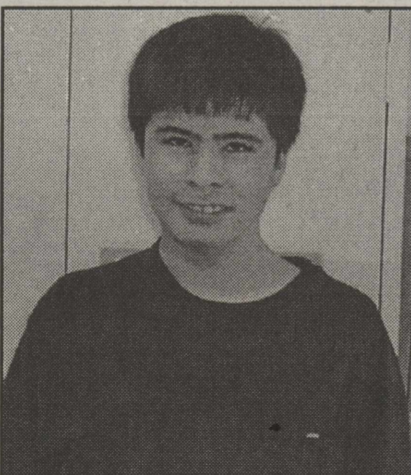
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Special Olympians bring home gold, silver, and bronze medals

Rebecca earned her honors with her 4.06 GPA. She is the daughter of Martin and Jill Warren.

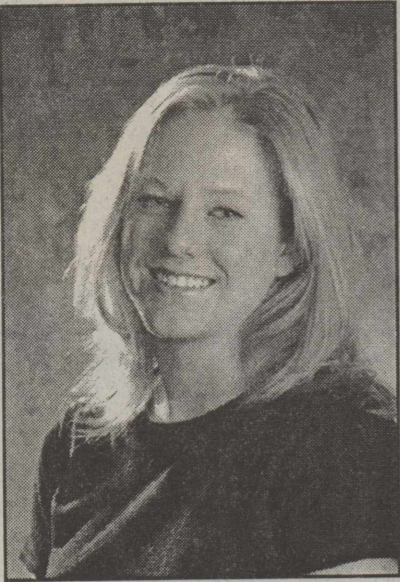
Abigail came in a close second with a GPA of 4.01. She is the daughter of Wendell and Jennifer Horn.

She was named NHS outstanding freshman and earned the Celebration of Educational Excellence award for three years.

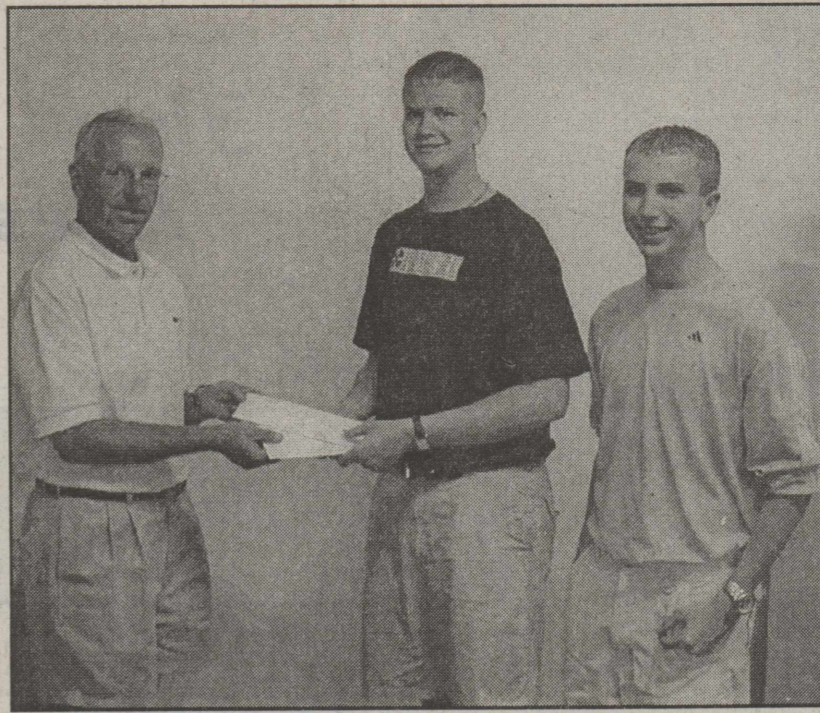
Abigail was named the Daughters of the American Revolution Good Citizen and earned the Whirlwind

LISD Board accepts resignations

Lockney ISD met for their regular board meeting, May 21, and approved resignations and certified new board members.

Taking the new "Oath of Office" was Mike Ford and John Quebe. Ford replaced Dan Smith. Smith did not seek re-election to District #5.

Quebe was the incumbent, at large, and had no challenger in the school board election.

Officers were elected to the board. Bernie Ford will serve as President, John Quebe will be Vice President, and Mike Mathis is serving as Secretary.

The Board approved the resignations of 3rd grade teacher, Wanda Rogers (who retired), Rebecca King (maternity), and Coach Cory Barnes (moving to Seagraves).

Rogers position will be filled by Melody Lane who was a special reading teacher at the elementary school. Lane's position will not be filled.

Barnes position will not be filled. "We are currently looking to hire a good Social Studies teacher," said Superintendent Raymond Lusk.

Twenty-eight student transfers were approved from Plainview, Floydada, and Silvertown. "We will have more before school starts," said Lusk.

Two old buses were sold to Bothwell Enterprises, of Plainview. Bids for \$1,251 (for a 1986 bus), and \$951 (for a 1984 bus), were approved.

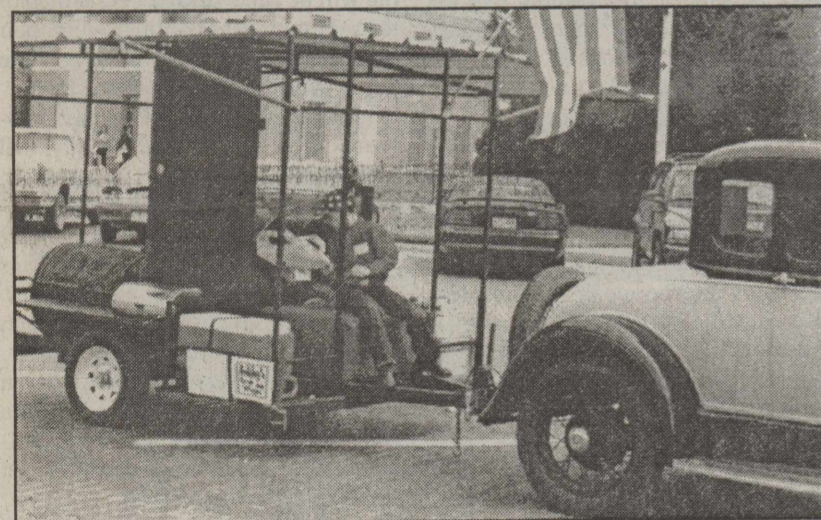
Concerning the budget, Lusk reported that LISD has a deficit of approximately \$80,000 in expenditures.

"This is good as far as I'm concerned," said Lusk, "considering where we've been, and where we thought we were going to be."

"Our payroll is now over 80% of our budget and anyone who knows anything about budgeting knows that is a sign of a lean budget. We have had a rapid loss of kids and a rapid loss of revenue from the state. We are facing a substantial decrease in the local tax evaluation--it will decrease by 6 million dollars. We will have to go into reserves, and even though this is an estimate at this time--if we can hold it to here I'll be delighted."



LOCKNEY BOY SCOUTS PLACE FLAGS ON VETERAN'S GRAVES ON MEMORIAL DAY.



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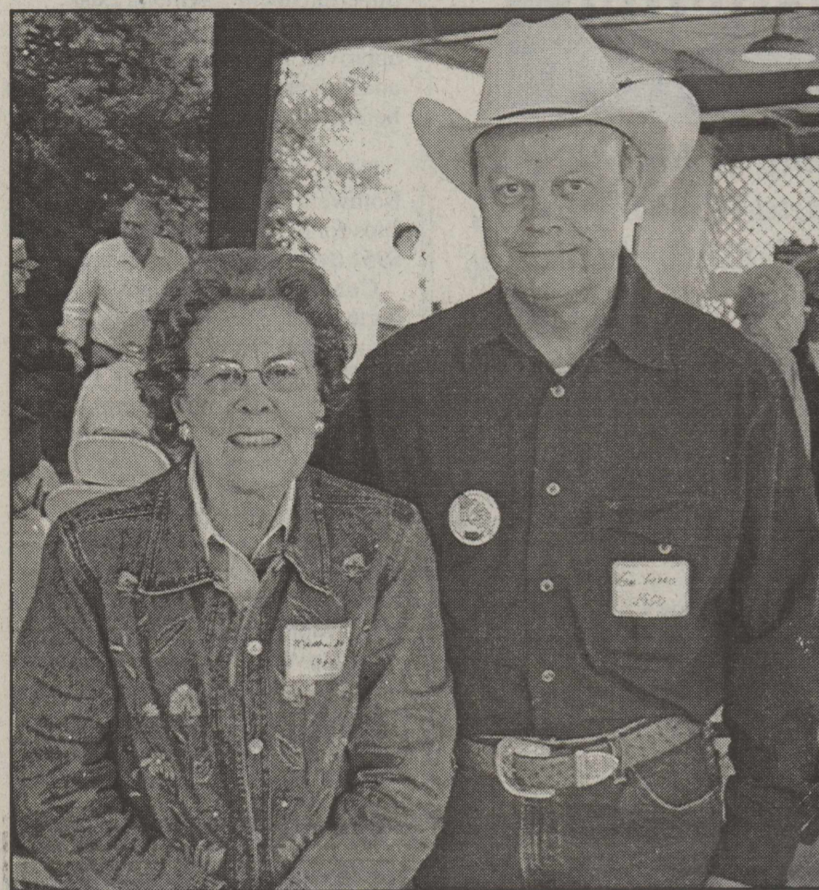

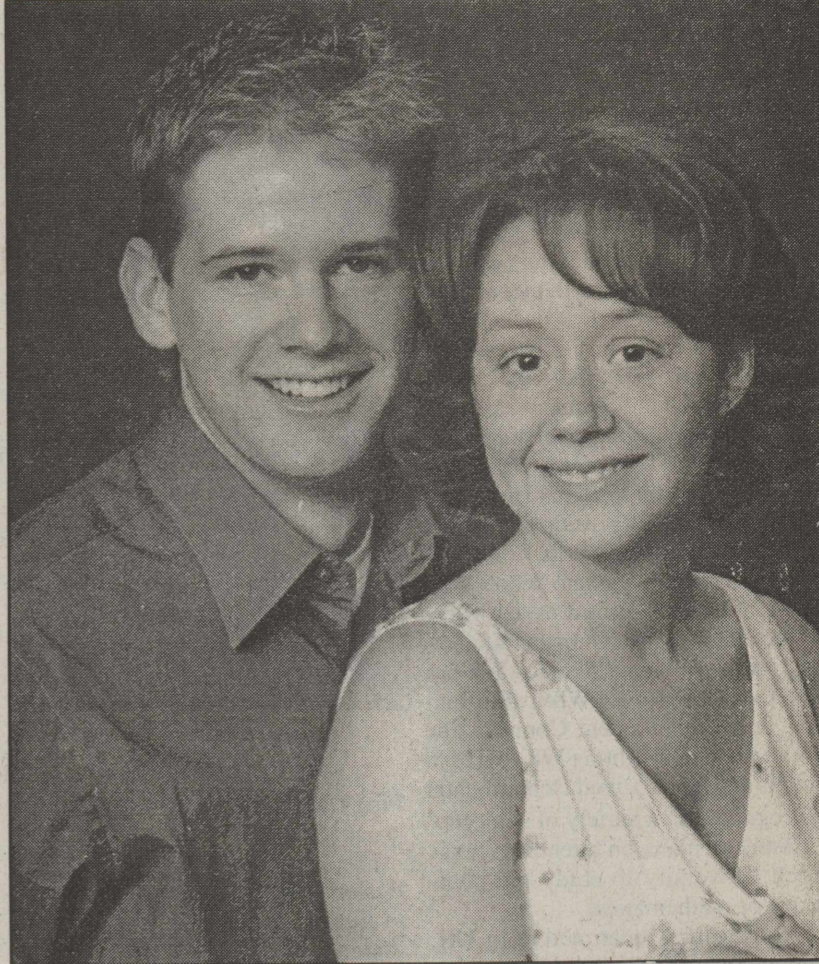

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Graham survives cancer again

to prepare for surgery and the results of those treatments were not what the doctor had hoped.

"Amputation was always an option and I prayed about my decision," said Graham. "I had already made up my mind to have the leg amputated before I asked the doctor, 'If this was happening to your dad, what would you recommend for him'. The doctor said he would tell his dad to have the leg amputated because it would be the safest thing to do. I agreed."

February 25, 2002 Graham's left leg was amputated from the bottom joint of the knee.

"We were told that it is best to leave as much of the limb as possible," said Graham's daughter Kathy Ross. "They told us that the more limb is left the less energy you body has to make up for. Your body expends a lot of energy to compensate for whatever is gone."

Graham has healed fast, under the expert care of family members. He has moved in with Kathy and her husband, Dennis, while he recuperates and his wife, Bonnie, gets their house in order and ready for his arrival.

Graham is very humble about his survival and is quickly corrected by his daughter when he says, "I don't think I'm as tough as other people think I am."

"Yes you are," reminds Kathy. "You not only survived cancer three times, but you were also hospitalized for four days, with pneumonia, before your surgery and you suffered a heart attack during chemotherapy for the sarcoma."

"I guess I did do that," smiles Graham

When asked about the heart attack Graham says, "It is hard to believe I had a heart attack but that is what the tests are telling me. While I was taking my 2nd treatment for the sarcoma I experienced pressure. I didn't tell the doctor but Kathy did. They did some tests and said I had some blockage. I had an angiogram but did not have to have surgery for the heart condition. They are treating that with medicine."

Although Graham received his new prosthesis Thursday, May 23rd, he says he won't be adjusted to it soon enough to wear it for his "survivor's lap". "I guess I'll get pushed around in a wheel chair or an electric cart."

Graham says the doctor told him that none of his 3 cancers were related. "Also, if the sarcoma had been in the bone it would have been a lot worse. The chemotherapy I was taking for the colon cancer probably kept the sarcoma in check and that was why it didn't grow."

Graham was born in Floyd County between Sandhill and Barwise, May 31, 1930.

The family moved to Amarillo in 1945 where Graham finished his last two years of High School. "I graduated Amarillo High in 1947," said Graham. He married Bonnie in 1949. "My daughter, Linda Carol Calahan, was two months old when the Korean War broke out," said Graham. "Because I had a young dependent I didn't have to go."

In 1959 Graham bought Muncy Elevator and the family moved to Muncy in 1960. Although the cancer and surgery has slowed him down a little, Graham has not retired. "I still go to work at the elevator. I'd be there more often if it wasn't for doctor's visits. "If I'm not at the doctor's office I'm working."

Graham is still on chemotherapy and has one more session to take.

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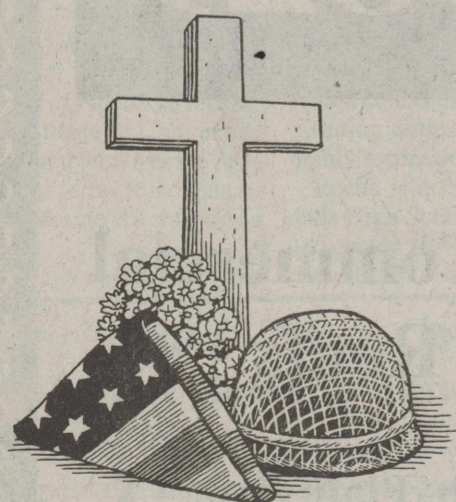
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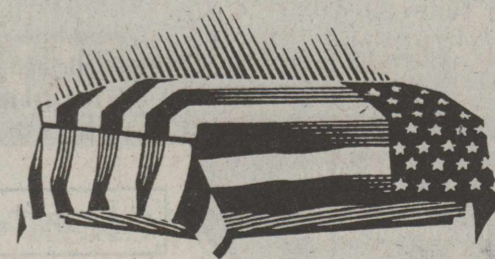
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MEANING OF THE FOLDS IN THE AMERICAN FLAG

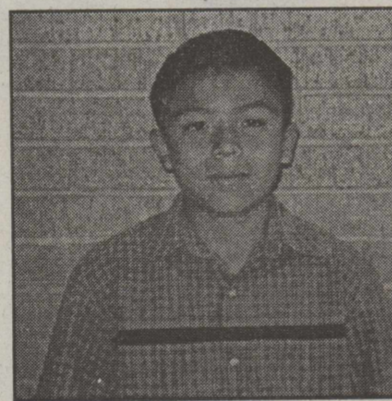
Fabian Falcon from Floydada was named Outstanding Student of the Year in Performing Arts Technology during South Plains College's recent Student Awards Assembly.

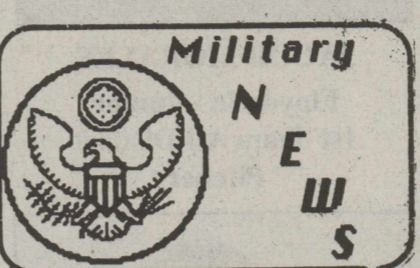

If only a few tomato plants are to be grown, a space at least 2 feet square should be prepared for each plant. The soil should be worked to a depth of at least 12 inches. Raised beds work well. Liberal amounts of organic matter and a small amount of fertilizer, such as 10-20-10 or 12-24-12, should be mixed into the soil where the plant is to be grown.

Variety selection is of utmost importance and is one of the keys to growing tomatoes successfully.

Select varieties that resist many of the common diseases. Look for VFN after a variety name, this indicates that it has resistance to verticillium wilt, fusarium wilt, and nematodes.

'President', 'Celebrity', 'Big Boy', 'Champion' (a good warm-weather producer), or the small-fruited 'Sweet 100' are top producers in my experience. The new varieties 'Donna', 'First Lady', and 'Viva Italia' (a paste type) also show promise. Other old-time favorites exist and may also perform well.

Plants can be started at home, although at this time in the season it is best to purchase transplants at local nurseries. When buying plants, the home gardener should look for healthy, vigorous transplants. When the transplants are set in the garden, use a starter solution to assure adequate fertility during the early stages of growth. Starter solutions can be purchased at local garden centers, or

they can be made by mixing one tablespoon of a complete garden fertilizer in a gallon of water. About one cup of the starter solution should be applied in the planting hole prior to planting.

For best results, the transplants should be set in the garden on cloudy days or late in the afternoon. The plants should be protected from adverse conditions such as high winds or cold temperatures for a week or so after transplanting. Cages, wrapped in row-cover fabric, can be used to control temperatures for a week or so after transplanting. Covering the plants with milk cartons also works well.

Almost all tomato varieties should be staked, trellised, or caged for best results. Any method is good if it keeps the fruit off the ground. Fruits allowed to contact the soil often develop fruit rot. People who would like to grow tomatoes but lack the space should try growing them in a five-gallon container. 'Better Bush' is a short, stocky variety well adapted to container growing.

As you can see, we are slightly behind last year with the cool mornings of late being the culprit. There has been a warmer tendency over the last couple of nights, however, which should help.

Cotton is in need of some warmer nights with less wind stress. Dryland acres need moisture to enable the planting process to continue. Replanting of Floyd County acres that were hailed-out two weeks ago is in full swing.

Field Research is officially underway as cotton variety trials are up and growing. Planting of pumpkin trials is underway at this time. Hopefully, we

will gain some valuable information regarding diseases in pumpkins this year.

Bollworm, budworm and beet armyworm traps have been placed in both counties. South Texas has been plagued with beet armyworms already and southern counties of the High Plains are reporting heavy bollworm trap catches.

General insect problems are not newsworthy at this time. Some thrips damage has been noted but at a mild level so far. These insects were believed to have helped our beneficial insects get a leg up last year, so maybe they can help again. Beneficial numbers are fairly high in field margins at this time.

The 2002 Scout School is scheduled

for Friday, May 31st at 8:00 a.m. at the Ollie Liner Center in Plainview. The agenda is impressive with the amount of information offered. Contact Greg Cronholm at (806) 291-5273 for more information.

Boll Weevil trapping by the Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation (TBWEF) remains low with only 0.003 weevils per trap in our High Plains zone. This is very encouraging in this early stage of eradication. This is a large undertaking by these trappers and requires a large amount of cooperation from all of us in this effort.

Trigger numbers for application on boll weevils in cotton has been lowered to one per field according to Jim Leser, area Entomologist in Lubbock.

To many Texans, gardening means growing tomatoes. Growing tomatoes in the backyard can be a fascinating and rewarding venture or it can be a very frustrating one. A sickly tomato plant which produces few, if any, fruit certainly doesn't boost anyone's gardening enthusiasm. For home owners growing tomatoes for the first time, some simple advice might help avoid common pitfalls.

First, home gardeners should not grow tomatoes unless the plants can be placed in an area that receives sunlight for at least six hours a day. Tomato plants placed between tall shrubs, under trees, or between buildings simply will not produce maximum yields.

Second, good soil is essential for good growth and high yields. Often, poor soil can be improved with liberal amounts of organic matter and by proper fertilization. A dark, heavy clay or even a fine sand can be improved by working 3 to 4 inches of decomposed organic matter into the soil where the tomatoes are to be planted.

Just don't do drugs!

Farm bill meetings draw large crowds

As expected producers across the High Plains took advantage of the chance to hear about the new Farm Bill and to ask questions about various aspects of the program during a recent round of National Cotton Council sponsored information meetings. The meetings were cosponsored by Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. and the Texas Cotton Ginners' Association.

The NCC meetings provided a comprehensive overview of Farm Bill information that has been reported by both the NCC and Plains Cotton Growers over the past few weeks.

Conservation Security Program (CSP) was also evident from producers who quickly recognized that many of the practices they have either been considering for their operations or have already implemented could qualify them for additional payments.

Considered a "working lands" program the CSP is designed to provide growers with incentive payments for implementing and maintaining conservation oriented activities and cropping practices that benefit the environment and wildlife.

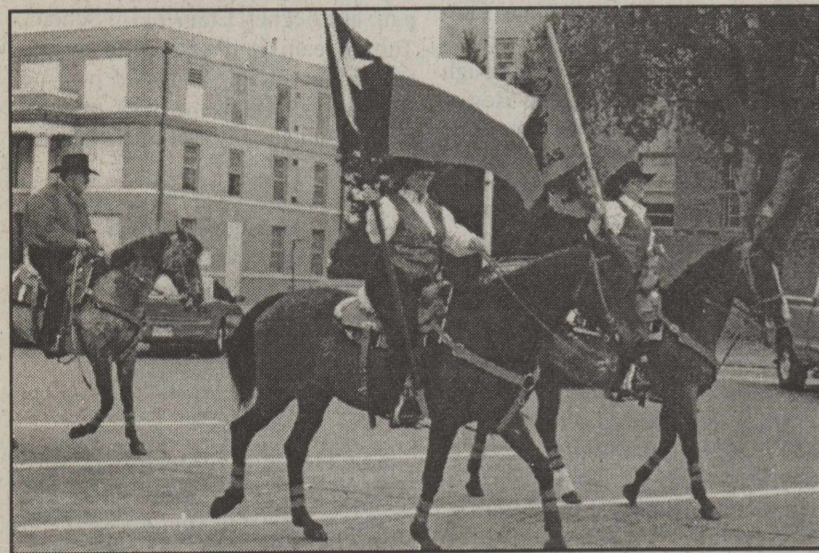
Also high on the interest scale were questions about the new Peanut program and its implementation; questions concerning the mechanics of the Base and Yield update provisions; and the method and timing of program payments.

Continuous monitoring of the implementation process is underway by PCG staff and the National Cotton Council in order to keep producers as up to date as possible. Additional information will be published as it becomes available from USDA.

It was obvious from the questions asked by producers at each meeting that they have been following the Farm Bill closely and have a good grasp on the programs and what they are designed to do.

Producer questions were mostly about specific components of the Bill, many of which are still unknown and subject to final Farm Service Agency interpretation.

Considerable interest about the Con-

Crop pest workshop set

Producers and ag consultants can hone their pest management skills and crop production skills at a May 31 High Plains Crop Pest Scouting Workshop sponsored by the Texas Cooperative Extension Service.

The workshop at the Ollie Liner Center will begin at 8:20 a.m. and adjourn at about 4:30 p.m. There is no fee to attend.

"This is an excellent opportunity to learn more about corn, cotton, grain, sorghum, soybean and sunflower production," said Greg Cronholm, Hale County Extension integrated pest management agent. "We will cover crop insect pests, weed identification and herbicide injury, plant diseases and how to recognize and promote beneficial insects."

Morning presentations by Extension and Texas Department of Agriculture specialists and agents will focus on cotton growth and development; cotton insect pests; recognizing and pro-

moting beneficial insects in field crops; and federal and state workers protection standards.

"We'll have a morning and an afternoon break, so participants can visit and view insect specimen displays," Cronholm said. "We'll also take a 1 hour 'on your own' lunch break."

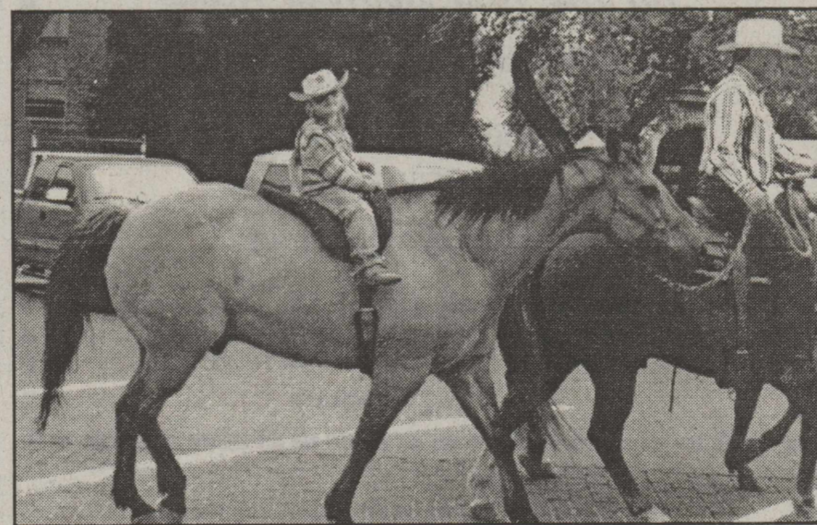
Afternoon workshop sessions will cover weed identification and herbicide injury; cotton, corn and sorghum plant diseases; corn and grain sorghum growth and development; and how to recognize and detect corn, sorghum, soybean and sunflower insect pests.

Five CEU's will be given by the Texas Department of Agriculture; one of which will be in laws and regulations. These CEU's will apply to those holding private, commercial and non-commercial pesticide applicator licenses.

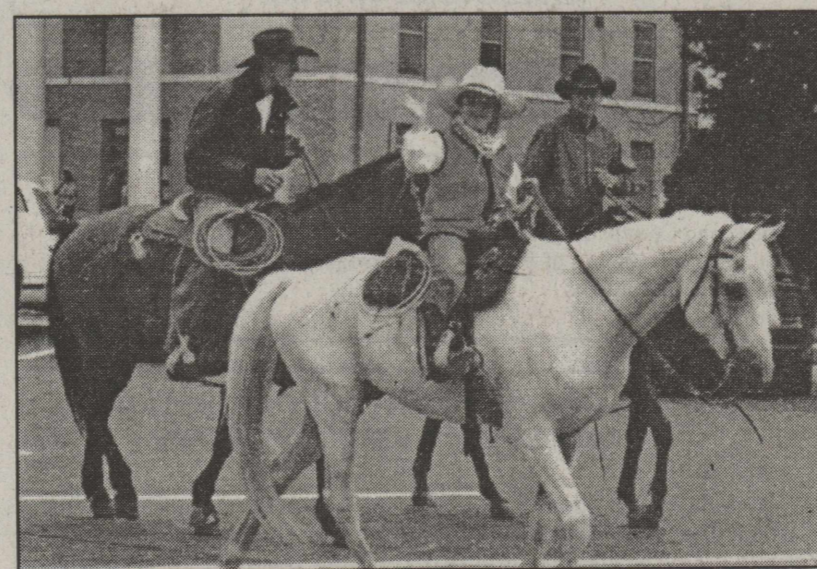
