8 a.m. - Heifer show, Ring A. Ring B begins after first breed completed in Ring A. The Progressive Steer Show (951 lbs. & up) will begin immediately following heifer show. Prospect Steer Show (950 lbs. & under) will immediately follow the progress show.

Entries are open to any youth exhibitor in Texas. Entry fees are \$40 per head Ring A and \$15 per head Ring B. You must enter Ring A to enter Ring B. Judges are: Ring A - Scott Myers - CEA Armstrong County; Ring B - Justin Gleghorn - Graduated Student, TTU.

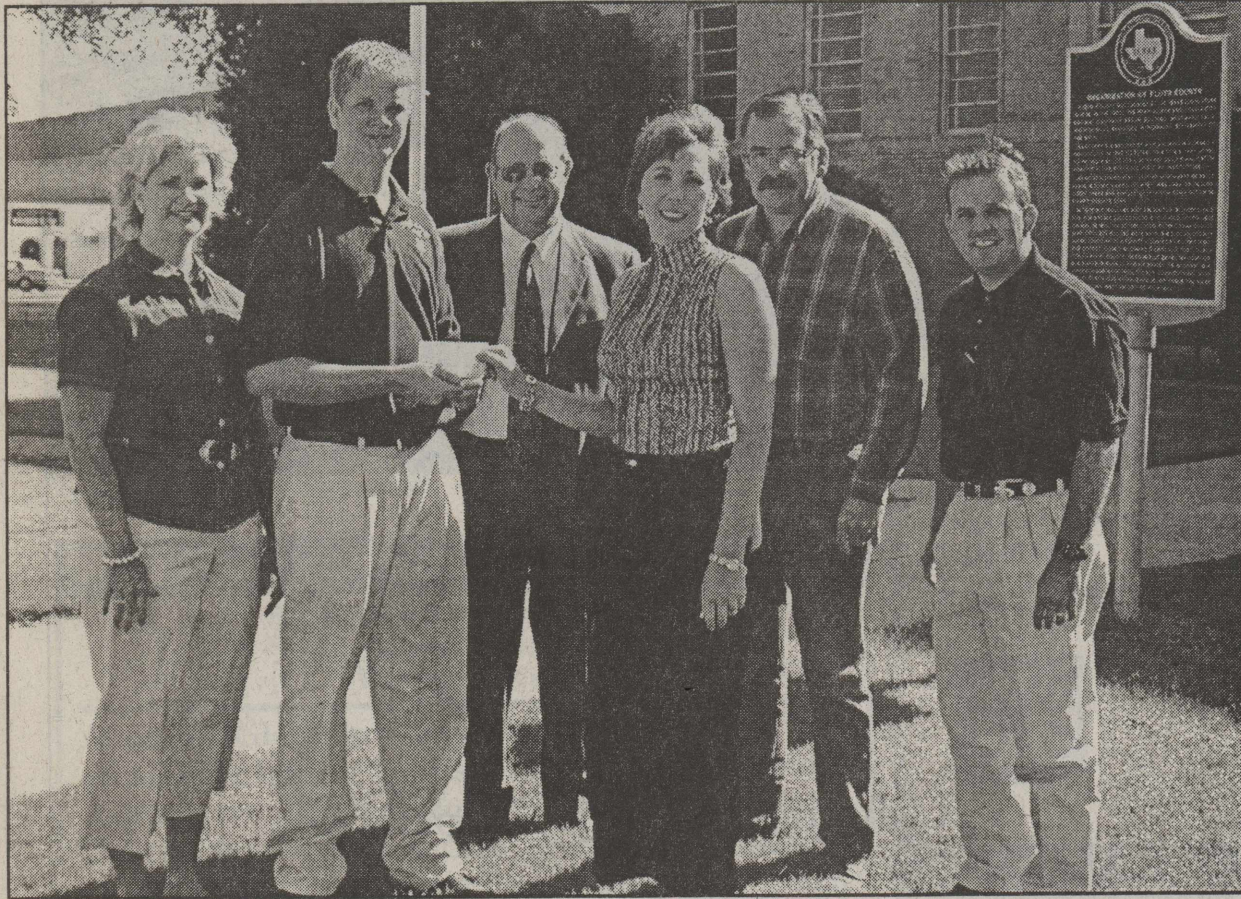

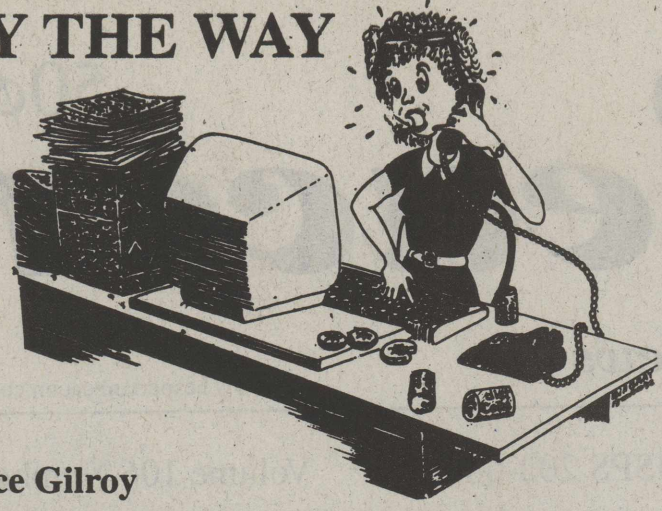
"We have had a lot of help putting this together. Ed Marks and his crew put the building up and the PAC kids have been very involved in exterior and interior construction of the building."

Re: The 7/25 article about concerns with the Ag/Vocation Program at FHS. Unlike the citizens quoted in the article, I am in support of the FHS administration's decision to replace an ag teacher with a teacher who will be able to focus on vocational training.

The vast majority of our students will never be farmers, nor will a large percentage of our students ever go to college. There are many traditional trades like plumbing, electrical, book-

keeping, data entry, diesel mechanics, and carpentry that provide a comfortable income. In addition, there are newer vocations like desktop publishing, graphic and web design, data network installation, landscaping, and telemarketing that are extremely lucrative if our students are trained properly.

So, if I have any criticism of the FHS administration regarding vocational programs, it is that they are not implementing change more quickly.

Floydada Police Report

"This is the last warning about junk vehicles," said Floydada Police Chief Darrell Gooch. "We will be writing citations for junk vehicles. There should be no motor parts, disassembled vehicles, transmissions in the yard, vehicles with flat tires, or vehicles with no inspection or registration stickers."

July 13, at 9:48 p.m., police stopped a vehicle for speeding on N. Hwy. 70. David Martinez, 20, of Lockney, was arrested for DWI and taken to the Floyd County Jail. While at the jail, it was discovered that Martinez had marijuana in his possession. Additional charges were filed.

Texas and Wyoming enter into concealed handgun agreement

Texas has signed a reciprocal agreement with Wyoming, allowing citizens with concealed handgun licenses issued by Wyoming to legally carry concealed handguns in Texas, and vice versa.

Col. Thomas A. Davis Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, signed the reciprocity agreement with the state of Wyoming, allowing licensees to visit Texas with their concealed handguns.

"This agreement will allow licensed Texans to travel freely in Wyoming, while enjoying the same or similar privileges their licenses give them at

home," Davis said.

This reciprocity agreement—the eighth Texas has reached with another state—was made possible by 1997 changes to the state's concealed handgun law. Texas also has reciprocity agreements with Arkansas, Louisiana, Arizona, Florida, Tennessee, Oklahoma and Kentucky.

"Texans should remember that laws vary from state to state, and before traveling, license holders should educate themselves about laws in other states that govern where and when they can legally carry their concealed handguns," Davis said.

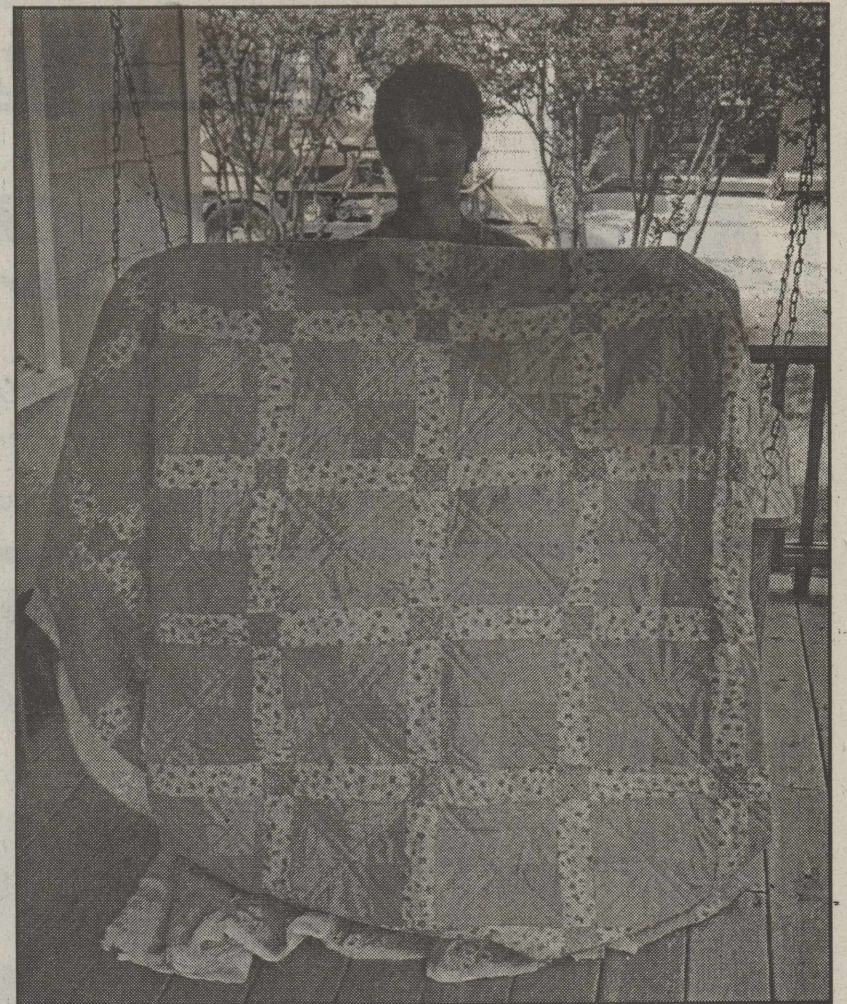

1:00 - 2:00 p.m. - twirlers and drum majors.

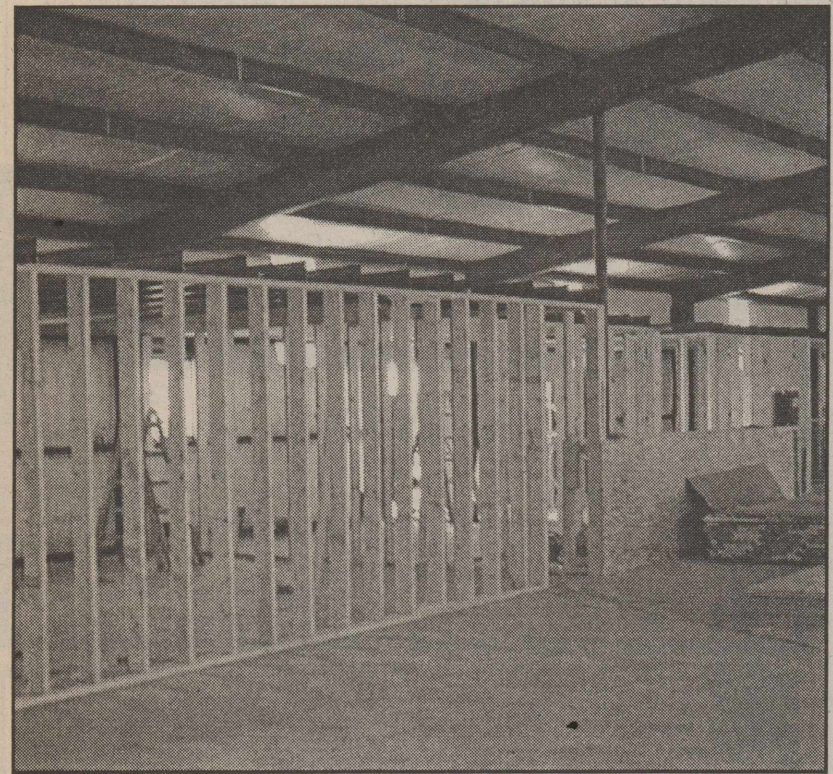
2:00 - 3:00 - all brass

Texas In a Box receives matching grant

TexasInaBox.com in Floydada has recently been awarded a matching fund grant through the Texas Department of Agriculture's GO TEXAN Partner Program (GOTEPP).

GOTEPP is a matching fund program open to producers, commodity groups, cooperatives and small businesses that are members of GO TEXAN, the Texas Department of Agriculture's unified campaign marketing Texas agricultural products. 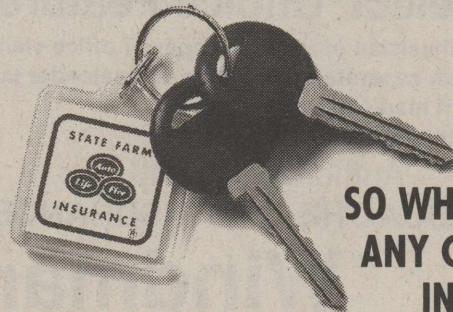

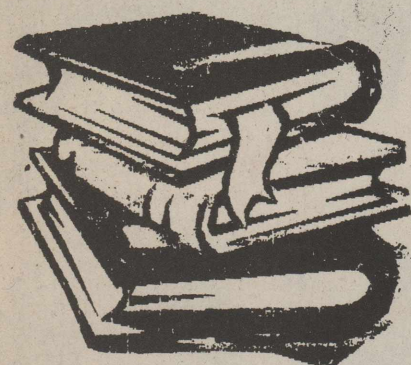

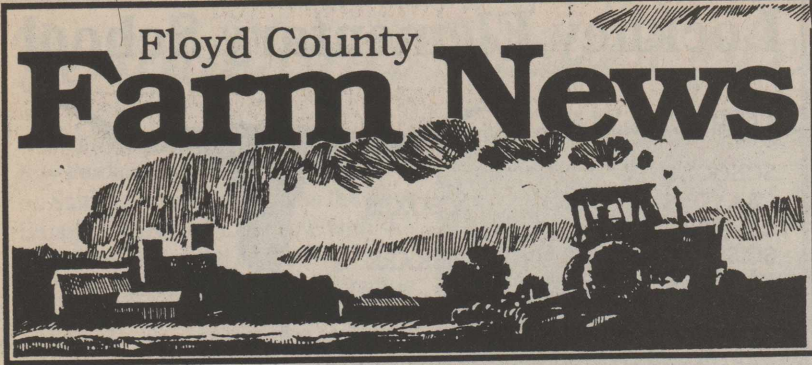

Chile peppers considered a promising South Plains crop

The Texas South Plains is fertile ground for cotton and grain production. But some farmers here are working with Texas A&M University researchers and Extension specialists to develop a hot new crop - chile peppers.

In 1998, with a United States Department of Agriculture Sustainable Agriculture Research and Education (SARE) grant, researchers began studying crops and non-traditional crop rotation systems that are productive and profitable for area growers. Chile peppers fit this scenario nicely. "Chile peppers are very well adapted to the High Plains of Texas," said Dr. Roland Roberts, Texas A&M Extension horticulturist. "We have a very fertile soil. We have high quality water, and the ability to irrigate frequently."

"We also have high levels of sunlight. This high light intensity is what is required to build quality into the chile pod."

So far, farmers like what they see and produce with this crop.

Lynn County producer Glen Brosch started raising jalapeno peppers in 1993. In recent years, he has added chile and other peppers to his regular rotation of cash crops such as cotton and grain sorghum. Brosch is just one of several South Plains farmers who work with Roberts and Dr. David Bender, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station vegetable researcher, in testing chiles as a viable rotation crop.

"I've been growing peppers here on the South Plains since about 1993," Brosch said. "It's proven a good rotational crop for us. Many of the herbicides and pesticides we use to grow cotton are also compatible with chile pepper production."

"We plant chiles in the spring...using either small transplants that are raised right here on the farm, or in a greenhouse; or through direct seeding. We plant peppers in wide plots, on irrigated ground, and separate the plots with windbreaks. We use tall, headless forage sorghums as our windbreak crop."

Brosch manages his chile crop much like his other grain or fiber crops. Regular field scouting tells him when to irrigate, fertilize or apply a spray to combat insects or plant disease.

He uses a combination of methods to harvest his pepper crop. Farm workers provide seasonal labor for hand-picking, and they also operate a mechanical picker. Brosch is able to harvest some peppers, such as jalapenos, using a slightly modified cotton stripper.

Brosch markets most of his pepper crop through direct contracts with buyers. This year, however, he and other area growers are trying a new method.

"We built our own chile roaster, so we can sell direct to the public," Brosch said. "We take the roaster to area festivals, and we roast the chiles and sell them direct to consumers. They can buy as much, or as little, as they want and take the peppers home in plastic bags. Then they can cook with the peppers right away or put

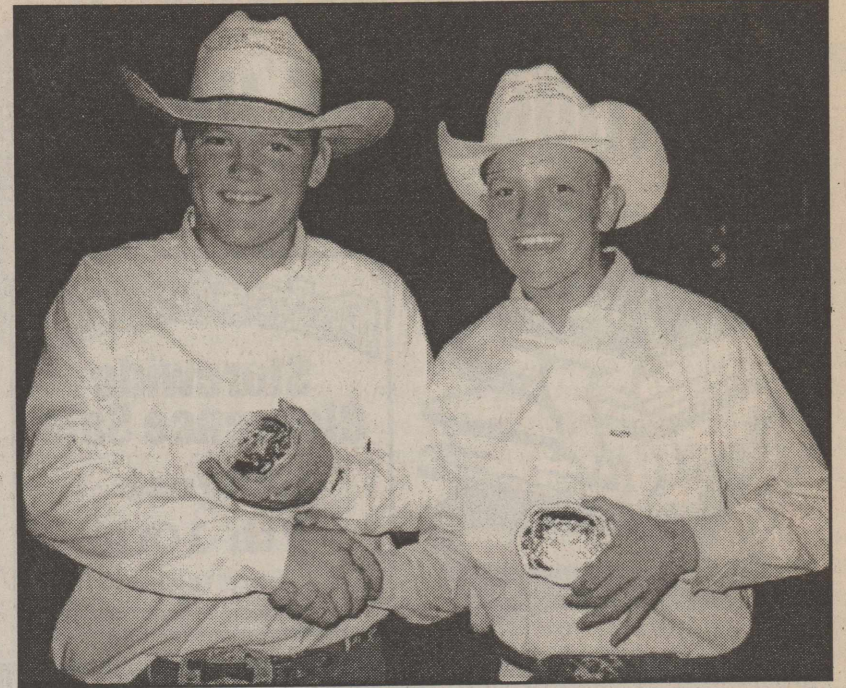

ORDINANCE NO. 846

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FLOYDADA, TEXAS, AMENDING CHAPTER 11, ARTICLE 1 SECTION 11-4 OF THE CODE OF ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF FLOYDADA; REGULATING THE DISPOSAL OF GARBAGE UPON ANY PUBLIC RIGHT-OF-WAY, INCLUDING STREETS, ALLEYS AND SIDEWALKS; PROVIDING A PENALTY; PROVIDING A SEVERABILITY CLAUSE; PROVIDING FOR PUBLICATION; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, the City Council desires to provide for the health, safety and welfare of the citizens of the City of Floydada, Texas, by requiring that all public right-of-ways be kept free of garbage, trash, rubbish and any other unsanitary or unsightly condition:

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FLOYDADA, TEXAS, AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1:

THAT, Chapter 11, Article 1, Section 11-4 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Floydada is hereby amended and as amended shall read as follows:

Sec. 11-4, Presumption

The owner or occupant of any premise adjacent to the public property upon which a violation of this article is apparent shall be deemed prima facie responsible for the violation so evidenced and subject to the penalty provided herein.

SECTION 2. Penalty

Any person, firm or individual who shall violate any of the provisions of the article subject to this amendment shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined as provided in Section 1-5 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Floydada. Each and every day the violation continues shall constitute a separate and distinct offense.

SECTION 3: Repeal. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed and declared of no further force and effect.

SECTION 4: Severability. If any section, subsection, clause, phrase or portion of this ordinance shall be held unconstitutional or invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, such section, sub-section, sentence, clause, phrase or portion shall be deemed to be a separate, distinct and independent provision and such invalidity shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions.

SECTION 5: The City of Secretary is hereby authorized and directed to cause the publication of this ordinance in the official paper of the City of Floydada in the manner required by law. This ordinance shall take effect, as provided by law, upon completion of publication.

Please note, however, that the school is not required to make a substitution for a food allergy, unless it meets the definition of disability. Your children can get free school meals if you get food stamps or Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF). Depending on your income, your children may be eligible for free or reduced-price meals.

How do I get free or reduced-price school meals for my children? You must complete the Application for Free and Reduced-Price Meals Form and return it to the school.

Households getting food stamps or TANF. You only have to include your children's names and case numbers, and an adult household member must sign the form.

Households that do not get food stamps or TANF. If you do not have a case number, you must include the names of all household members, the amount of income each person received last month and where the income came from. An adult household member must sign the form and include his or her social security number, or indicate that he or she has no social security number.

Households with a foster children. You must include the children's names and the amount of "personal use" income the children received last month, and an adult must sign the form.

Will information on my form be kept confidential? We will use the information on your form to decide if your children should get free or reduced-price meals. We may inform officials with other child nutrition, health and education programs of the information on your form to determine benefits for those programs or for funding and/or evaluation purposes.

Can I apply for free and reduced-price meals later? You may apply for free and reduced-price meals at any time during the school year. If you are not eligible now but have a change, like a decrease in household income, an increase in household size, become unemployed or get food stamps or TANF, complete another form then.

Social Security News

A young man who's getting both workers' compensation and Social Security disability benefits called our office to ask why his Social Security benefits are being reduced. We told him that ordinarily disability payments from other sources don't affect Social Security disability benefits.

But, if the disability payment is workers' compensation or another public disability payment, his and his family's Social Security benefits may be reduced.

A workers' compensation payment is one that is made to a worker because of a job-related injury or illness. It may be paid by federal or state workers' compensation agencies, employers or insurance companies on behalf of employers.

Public disability payments that may affect your Social Security benefit are those paid under a federal, state or local government law or plan that pays for conditions that are not job-related. Examples are civil service disability benefits, military disability benefits, state temporary disability benefits and state or local government retirement benefits that are based on disability.

However, Social Security benefits are not reduced when the person is receiving federal, state or local government benefits and state or local government retirement benefits that are based on disability.

However, Social Security benefits are not reduced when the person is receiving federal, state or local government benefits for work that was covered by Social Security, private pensions or insurance benefits, or Veterans or Supplemental Security Income payments.

We told the caller that his Social Security benefits were reduced so the combined amount of the benefit he and his family receive, plus his workers' compensation payment and any other government disability payment, won't exceed 80 percent of his average current pre-disability earnings. If this sum exceeds 80 percent of those earnings, the excess amount is deducted from his Social Security benefit. The combined benefits will never be less than the amount of his and his family's total Social Security benefits before they were reduced.

- Do not be afraid to ask questions or voice concerns - you have a right to know about all procedures being performed. Ask why a certain procedure is recommended, and learn about other options. Write all questions down in advance.

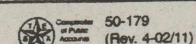

Asthma

Asthma is the leading serious chronic illness among children and can be a life-threatening disease if not properly managed.

In this country, there are over 14 million asthmatics, nearly 5 million of whom are children under the age of 18. Every parent should be aware of the warning signs a child may exhibit if he or she suffers from asthma.

A child may experience one or more of the common symptoms of asthma, and these symptoms can be mild or severe. The symptoms include:

- Coughing
- Wheezing (a whistling noise when breathing)
- Chest tightness
- Shortness of breath

Factors that can trigger an asthma attack are tobacco smoke, dust mites, animal dander, cockroaches, dust stirred up by vacuuming, mold, pollen and exercise. Staying away from these things can help prevent asthma attacks.

Asthma cannot be cured, so keeping it under control is a necessary part of an asthmatic's life. If a child experiences any of the aforementioned symptoms, a doctor's visit should be scheduled to evaluate for asthma. This might include testing for specific allergies.

For those in financial need, the American Academy of Allergy, Asthma and Immunology has compiled information on obtaining medications free of charge. These programs require the prescribing physician to initiate the process.

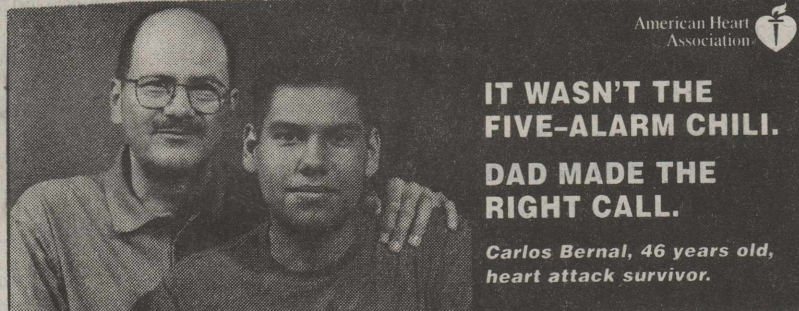

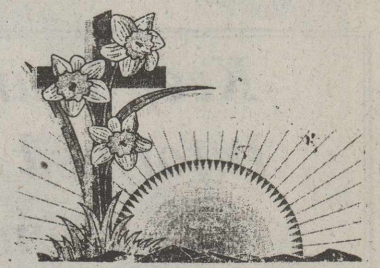
