

Several businesses will serve refreshments and door prizes will also be given away.


Santa Claus will arrive on the square, via a city fire truck, at 5:00 p.m. Santa pictures will be taken inside Hale's Insurance, on Main Street,

"The hospital is in great shape at this time. Seeking this designation does not mean that our hospital is in a desperate situation.

> It merely changes the way we are reimbursed by Medicare, which should be a benefit to all."

> "With healthcare costs continuing to rise, this should continue to be advantageous in the future. Changes in operations should be minimal, with no changes in services being anticipated at all. The hospital will have to de-

license two beds due to the fact that critical access hospitals are limited to 25 beds total, only 15 of which can be acute care beds. The other 10 can be used as swing beds. The 15 acute care patient limit is also a factor that will have to be closely monitored during busy times.'

Overall, Ms. Hunt, the board, and medical staff felt like this was a good option for the hospital and something that should be pursued. The next step, after official approval by the board, is to complete an application to be submitted to the Texas Department of Health, who will then conduct a survey of the hospital. If approved, the hospital will begin receiving costbased reimbursement, which should improve payments significantly.



It never fails. The air becomes crisp, football season is in full swing, the leaves begin to turn and, then, suddenly the frenetic pace of a quickly approaching holiday season sets in. And we all panic.


Somewhere among the many lists of to-dos for the season is picking out, putting up and decking out a Christmas tree. To make this holiday chore fun for the whole family, many Texans will head out to choose-and-cut Christmas tree farms across Texas to pick from the 150,000 to 200,000 trees that are ready to be harvested and taken home for the holidays.

While the very first Christmas tree farms in Texas began in 1972 - one in Orange County and one in Smith County - today there are some 200 farms. The industry has a \$14 million economic impact to the state's economy, and more than 125,000 Texas-grown Christmas trees were sold in 2000.

Choose-and-cut farms are the freshes way to go; there's no chance the trees were transported miles from another state, drooped in cold storage or ran short on water. Many farms offer hayrides some by starlight - and marshmallow roasts, crafts and petting zoos are among the activities available. Gift shops sell pine-scented wreaths and garlands of evergreens. There are nature trails to wander and ducks, geese and catfish to feed.

Natural Christmas trees also can take on a new life after the holidays because they are biodegradable and can be recycled for other uses.
