# Robin Nixon named Tennis Coach of the Year

Robin Nixon of Floydada was recognized Friday, December 6 as the Class 2A Tennis Coach of the Year during the Texas Tennis Coaches Association's Annual Conference at the John Newcombe Tennis Ranch.

Approximately 400 people were in attendance at the banquet, that honored the distinguished coach of each of the high school classifications, the collegiate level and inductees into the association's Hall of Fame.

Floydada Assistant Tennis Coach Regina Smith made the presentation to Coach Nixon. Coach Smith explained that Coach Nixon was hired 9 years ago by Superintendent Jerry Cannon to rebuild the Floydada Tennis program. Coach Smith said, "Coach Nixon is highly thought of by her players - past and present. She has a sincere love and passion for the game of tennis, and it has spread." Coach Smith also noted that Coach Nixon is highly regarded by her coaching peers.

Coach Smith went on to say, "When Coach Nixon took the program there were 10 kids playing tennis. This past year Floydada had 30 out in high school and in excess of 40 in junior high. She leads summer tennis camps

for 1st graders to adults that included 110 participants this past summer."

The increasing number of players continues to bring more success. Floydada has now won four consecutive District titles, and three straight Region I Team Tennis Championships. The Whirlwind tennis program reached a significant milestone this past spring when the Girls Doubles Team of Jenna Payne and Jessica Castaneda finished as the State Runnerups.

"I remember the years when we were being shut out and the kids who were taking the lumps. This group took the game and showed others how fun it could be," said Coach Nixon. "We were elated when we won anything at the tournaments, then we were 3rd at District and qualified one for Regional. That was followed by two Regional qualifiers and it started snowballing. The kids kept working and the success stories followed. It makes me feel good when the tennis court lights are on at night."

In 2001 Rebecca Warren was the first Floydada player to survive the first two rounds of Regional and she placed 3rd. She repeated the feat in 2002. This is the same year when

Payne-Castaneda broke through by winning the Region I Doubles title and then won a Silver Medal at State.

"This award is for the Whirlwind program," said a very humble Coach Nixon. "This would not be possible without Regina Smith, Rosemary Finley, Sammy Bradley and the overwhelming support from Athletic Director Lee Hurt, the Booster Club and the parents."

"Robin works extremely hard. She is dedicated to the tennis program and getting results," said Lee Hurt. "She has built one of the stronger 2A programs around this area and has done a super job in getting there."

"I love the sport, I love to play it, and I love to coach it," said a smiling Coach Nixon. "I have enjoyed seeing the kids succeed and build confidence in themselves. I have enjoyed the relationship with the kids and getting to see them when they come home and hear the successes they are enjoying now. Tennis is something they can enjoy the rest of their lives."

A reception in honor of Robin Nixon will be held on Monday, December 16th from 6:30 - 8:00 p.m. in the home of Dana Crossland. All former and present players, parents and supporters are invited to attend.

Monetary donations can be made to the "Spirit of Sharing" at the City Bank of Floydada.

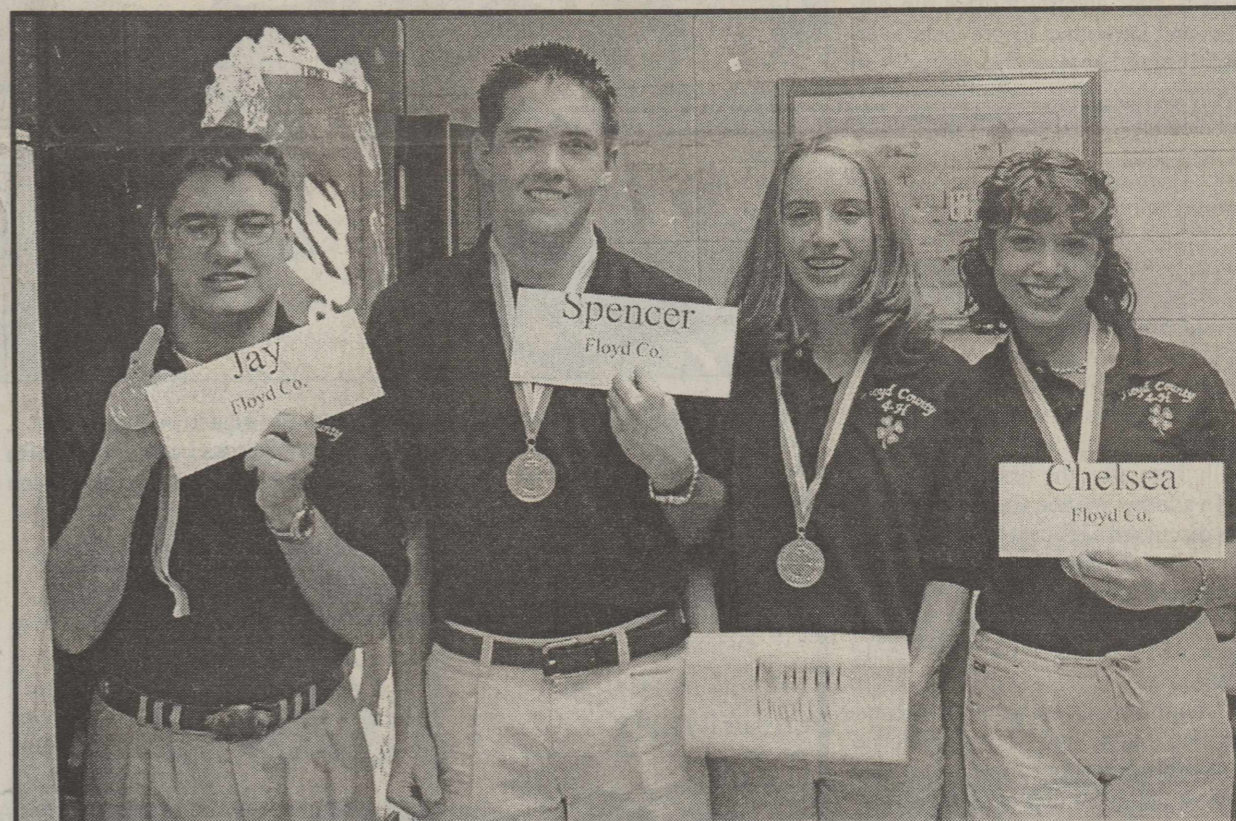

**Commissioners hear proposal to make jail "energy efficient"**

The Floyd County Commissioners met Monday, December 9th, and heard a presentation from Winfrey Shipp of Plainview on how to make the courthouse and the county jail more energy efficient.

Shipp, of Shipp's Sales and Service, demonstrated to the commissioners a heavy duty surge protector that can be mounted on the main electrical boxes at the courthouse and the jail.

Shipp guaranteed the commissioners a minimum of 10 percent savings on the county's electrical bills.

"This device has a twofold purpose. It is a surge protector and an energy saver," Shipp said.

"It cleans up the electricity and makes your electric motors run quieter and smoother. It prevents overheating and makes the motors last longer.

"We have a money back guarantee. If you don't see a 10 percent savings after 18 months, we will give you your money back.

"I have a \$4 million dollar insurance policy to cover any machine damaged while our device is being used," Shipp concluded.

Upon the recommendation of County Judge William D. Hardin, the commissioners took no action on the matter and asked Shipp to check back with them after the first of the year.

In another matter, the commissioners discussed a request from the Texas Department of Public Safety for a concrete pad to be poured next to Hwy 70 in the Lockney area for the purpose of installing a truck weighing station.

Commissioner Lennie Gilroy commented that he had been approached concerning the pouring of a concrete slab of about 30 feet by 80 feet, and maybe at the Fair Grounds in Lockney.

Gilroy estimated the expense to the county would be about \$10,000 to \$15,000 and the weigh station would only be operated once or twice a month during fair weather.

Commissioner Jon Jones asked, "Do we have the right to put in a concrete pad?"

Commissioner Craig Gilly commented, "It would have to be a 6 inch pad with metal in order to support 100,000 pounds. We need to know the goals and the exact location."

The court took no action on the request until further investigation.

Two farm contracts were approved by the commissioners. One was by Delton Jack, south of Lockney, to open a ditch and level the ground. The other was by Mary Shurbet, northeast of Floydada, to set a culvert.

The commissioners approved two Public Official bonds for Delia G. Suarez of the Tax Assessor's office and Peggy L. Hill, deputy county clerk.

A \$2,939.42 budget amendment was approved by the court as presented by Judge Hardin.

Hardin said, the transfer was needed to cover election costs and it would be taken from the Appraisal District funds.

Floyd County Treasurer Mary Shurbet presented a financial report to the commissioners for November.

The Beginning Balance was \$466,827.62 and Receipts for the

The press release for the ministry says, "Find out how the power of God reached down and brought Light to a world of darkness and transformed murder to mercy, and guilty to grace."

The rally begins at 7:00 p.m., is open to everyone, and admission is free.

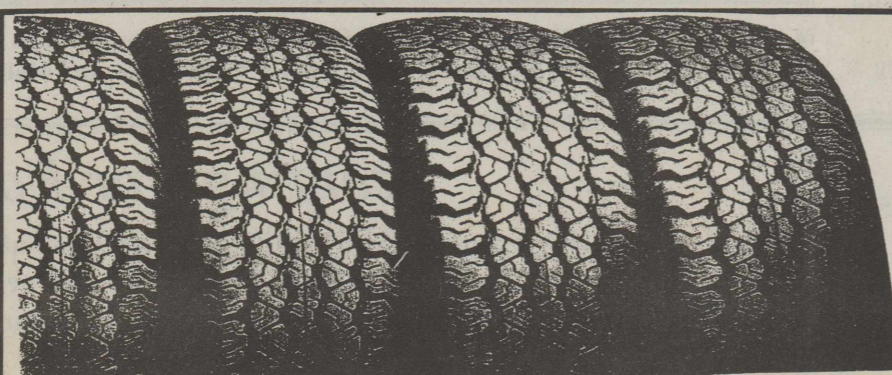

## Deeota Odam Celebrates her 90th Birthday with family and friends



Friends and family of Deeota Odam will gather Saturday, December 28, 2002 to honor her for her 90th Birthday at Calvary Cornerstone Baptist Church.

Mrs. Odam, born December 24, 1912, has lived most of her life in Floyd County.

She says that she has seen major changes in the community since her parents, J.H. and Ella Poore, brought her at the age of seven to a little farm near Lakeview, 13 1/2 miles southeast of Floydada.

She remembers the move vividly. Her father had come earlier, and the young Deeota road the train with her

mother, older brother Orville, and younger sister Jimmie.

The train stopped at Roaring Springs, where the family was transferred to one of Mrs. Poore's sister's home east of Floydada. They were transferred by a "line car", a Model T used to shuttle train passengers to nearby communities.

It was during this January drive that Deeota saw her first snow, having moved from the warmer climate of Crafton, in Wise County.

Her father came for the family a few days later and drove them to the farm in a wagon, where she would live until her marriage, and her parents re-

mained on the farm until 1948.

Deeota noted that life on the farm was hard work, "but we had a good life," she said. She recalled hoeing in the field, working in the field, plowing with a team of horses, heading maize and picking cotton. She remembers tending the family garden, canning fruits and vegetables, and butchering beef, hogs and chickens. She also helped gather eggs, milk cows twice a day, separate milk and churn butter. In addition to these chores, Deeota learned cooking, sewing and quilting.

Deeota left the farm and Floyd county for three years after her marriage to J.C. Odam. The couple moved to Milam county, near Cameron, but they returned in 1937 and made their home in Floydada.

J.C. served in the Army from April, 1944 to January, 1946.

Besides her work as a housewife and mother, Deeota became a Girl Scout Leader and joined the Friendship Home Demonstration Club.

J.C. and Deeota became faithful members of Calvary Baptist Church, which they helped build and organize in 1948. J.C. Served as a deacon for 30 years, until his death.

Deeota served as church clerk, held several Women's Missionary Union offices, and attended associational meetings as an elected messenger. She began teaching Sunday School in 1948, where she remained until 2000, when reclining health forced her to retire.

Calvary has gone through many changes, according to Deeota, including the merger with Cornerstone Outreach Fellowship Church, which led to the current Calvary Cornerstone Fellowship Baptist Church. Mrs. Odam was a charter member of both Calvary Baptist Church and the new one, Calvary Cornerstone Fellowship Baptist Church.

Deeota and J.C. Raised two daughters and a grandson in Floydada. Virginia Waits, who now lives in Hale Center, Shelly Viramonte, formerly known as Mary Ann, of Yarnell, Arizona, and Gary Hill of Schofield, Wisconsin.

Although J.C. passed away in July, 1979, her family continues to grow, spanning five generations. She currently has seven grandchildren, fifteen great-grandchildren, and five great-great-grandchildren.

Two sister, Odessa Cage and Jimmie Hollomon, live in Lubbock. Maurette Poore, a sister-in-law, resides in Springfield, Missouri.

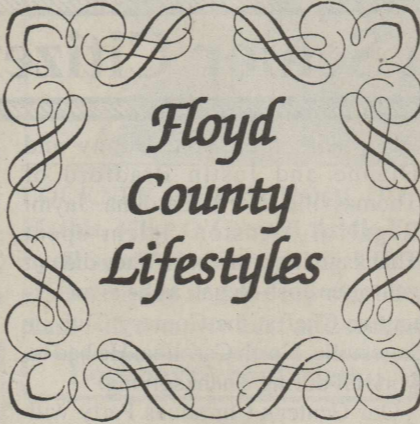

### Harmony Extension Club News

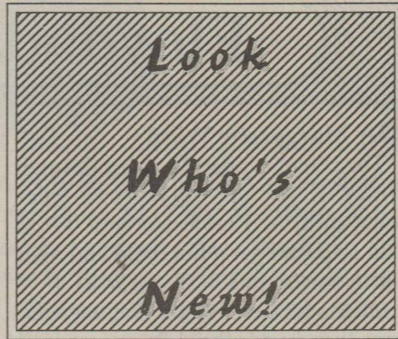

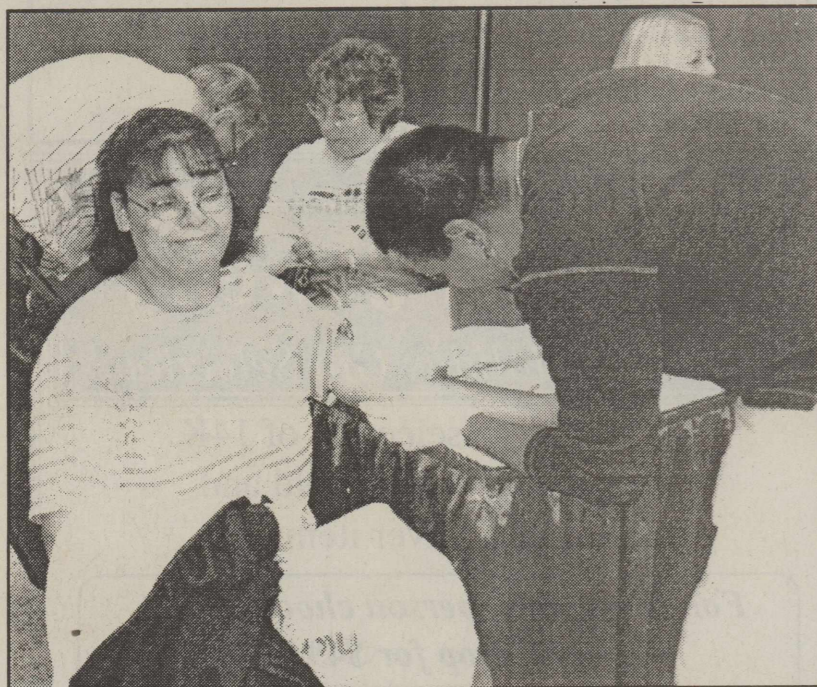

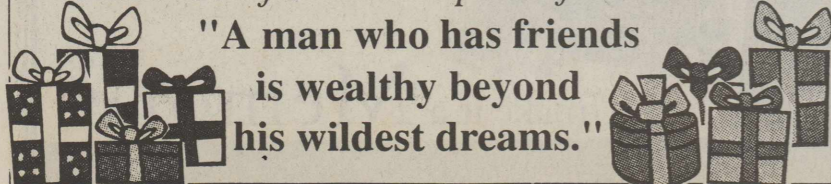

# Lockney Longhorns to host tournament December 12-14

The Lockney Longhorns have jumped into this basketball season on the run having played more games than practices. The Longhorns have had three practices and six games in its first two weeks of the season.

After beating Post in their season opener, the Longhorns traveled to Meadow on Tuesday to face the Broncos.

The Broncos are rated #16 in the state in the Class 1A Division II TABC state rankings.

The Longhorns jumped out early on the Broncos, out scoring them 15-5 in the first quarter. Both the second and third periods were close, but the Longhorns finished the game with a 15-8 in the final quarter. Lockney picked up their second victory on the season beating Meadow 57-39.

Lockney was lead by Todd Cotham with 18 points. Kirk Wilson added 14 and Rance Schumacher with 13 points.

Lockney headed west to participate in the Northwest Texas Sports Medicine Invitational Basketball Tournament in Nazareth where they played four games in three days. Powerhouses such as Nazareth, Abernathy, Martin Mills and Lipan were included.

The Longhorns met up with the Claude Mustangs in the first round. The Mustangs handed the Longhorns

their first loss of the season 51-37. Lockney shot only 26 percent from the floor and 35 percent from the free throw line.

Leading scorers for the Longhorns were Todd Cotham with nine points followed by Kirk Wilson, Rance Schumacher, Jeran Butler and Mark Ford all with six points.

The Longhorns came back Friday hoping to find the hot hand and getting a chance to put themselves in position to win the consolation championship.

Lockney faced the Dalhart Golden Wolves in the early game and came out on top with a 51-29 victory. Lockney's defense was outstanding, not allowing Dalhart to score more than nine points a quarter and only 12 points total in the second half.

Kirk Wilson found his stroke leading the team with 19 points. Rance Schumacher chipped in 10 points and also pulled down 15 rebounds. Todd Cotham finished the night with eight points and 14 rebounds.

The Longhorns next opponent in the Consolation Semi-final was the White Deer Bucks. Once again the Longhorns put together an impressive defensive effort and beat the Bucks 57-38. The Bucks were only capable of shooting 32 percent from the floor while Lockney was making 49 percent of their shots. The Longhorns also

made nine out of ten free throws in the final period outscoring them 22-12.

Kirk Wilson again lead his team in scoring with 16 points. Mark Ford poured in 13 points and Todd Cotham scored 11 points and collected a team high nine rebounds.

On Saturday, Lockney found themselves in a tough battle in the Consolation Championship game against the Farwell Steers. Late in the third quarter, the Longhorns trailed as much as seven points. But the 'Horns remained composed and regained the lead in the fourth quarter holding on for the victory 54-51.

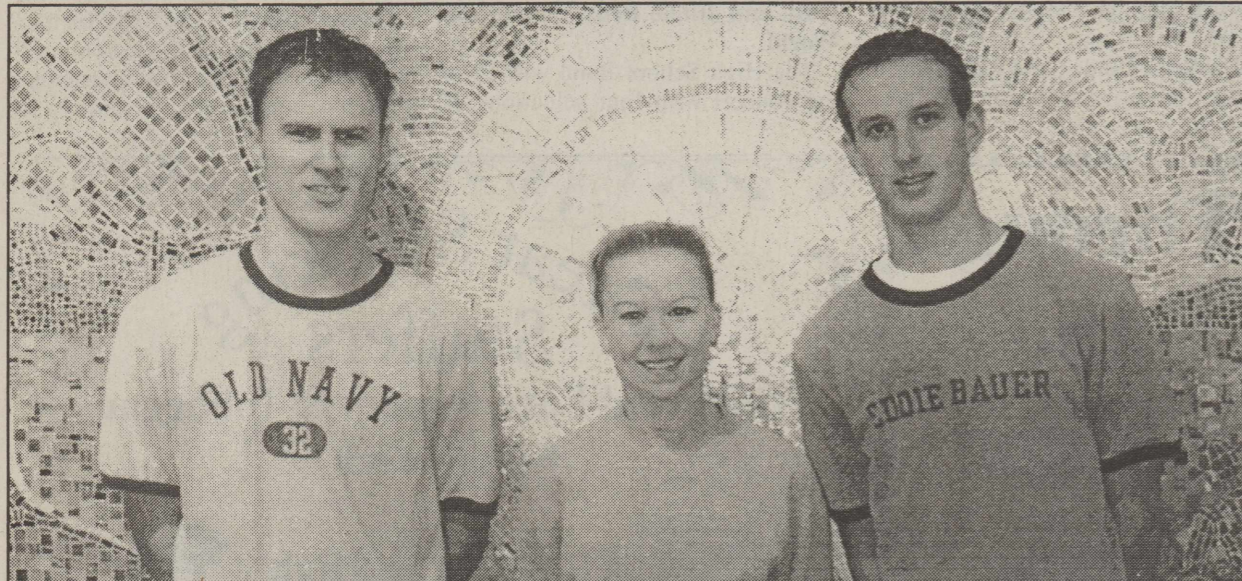
Todd Cotham lead the Longhorns with 14 points and 10 rebounds. Rance Schumacher chipped in 13 points with eight boards and Jeran Butler scored nine points.

"I am very pleased on how our team regrouped after the opening loss and won three in a row to win the Consolation side of the bracket," first year head Coach Bubba Edwards said. "The level of competition was good for us especially this early in the season. It is still going to take some practice time to get some little things ironed out."

The Longhorns (5-1) will host their tournament December 12-14 at the High School Gym. Lockney will play Clarendon in the first round game on Thursday night.

### Beltwide Cotton Conference set

Beltwide Cotton Conference Jan 6-10, 2003

U.S. cotton producers can tune in to practices that can turn over profits during the 2003 Beltwide Cotton Conferences, Jan. 6-10, in Nashville at the Gaylord Opryland Resort & Convention Center.

The National Cotton Council is the primary coordinator of the forum, which is recognized as the global champion for cotton technology transfer. The theme of the 2003 forum is "In Harmony - Research, Resources, Results."

The 48th annual Beltwide Cotton Production Conference, set for Tuesday, Jan. 7, and Wednesday, Jan. 8, will lead off with NCC Chairman Kenneth Hood discussing the U.S. cotton industry's health.

The program also will focus on new farm law implementation, conserva-

tion title benefits, pest management trends/strategies, fiber quality updates, innovative farming practices and marketplace insights.

Memphis cotton merchant W.D. "Billy" Dunavant, Jr., will share his marketplace insights.

The production conference's afternoon sessions will offer producers an opportunity to get in-depth information on conference topics. Seminars will be conducted on: new products and developments, pest management, efficient nitrogen management, Quicken on the farm and options/hedging. Workshops will focus on the conservation program and seedling diseases.

The Cotton Foundation Technical Exhibit will open a day earlier and run longer than in the past: Jan. 6, 1 p.m.-5 p.m.; and Jan. 7 and 8, noon-5 p.m. The cotton technical conferences will convene Jan. 9-10.

### Cotton Market Weekly

Despite the holiday-shortened reporting period and slightly higher cotton futures prices, current-crop export registrations rose considerably during the week ended Nov. 28, reaching the second highest level of the marketing year.

According to USDA, net export sales of 2002-03 crop U.S. cotton totaled 249,800 bales for the week, 43 percent more than the previous week and a 67 percent increase from the four-week average. Featured buyers were Mexico at 77,800 bales, Canada at 50,200 bales and China at 45,400 bales.

Year-to-date sales to China now total 596,900 bales, compared to 233,400 bales sold during the entire 2001-02 marketing year. The week's export shipment figure, at 115,700 bales, dropped 20 percent from the previous week. Mexico, China and Hong Kong were primary destinations.

The data surprised many traders who expected the Thanksgiving holiday to limit export sales activity. Most traders, however, were not overly ecstatic about the week's higher sales since a considerable amount of cotton must be sold before USDA's target of 10.5 million bales can be met.

"Although the week's numbers were good on the surface, they still maintain the deficit in sales and exports from last year's levels, and the shipment totals are pretty low," an analyst commented. "Commitments are down 2.5 million bales, and 710,000 less bales have been shipped compared to last year at this time," she added.

On the spot cotton scene, activity slowed as Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas producers sold 14,525 bales in the week ending Dec. 5, down from the previous week's sales of 17,133 bales. The average price received by producers selling their cotton online ranged

from 36.14 to 40.20 cents per pound compared to the previous week's range of 39.10 to 40.27 cents per pound.

In other news, the International Cotton Advisory Committee (ICAC) cut 800,000 bales from its worldwide 2002-03 cotton consumption estimate, pegging it at 94.3 million bales. The committee also estimated world cotton production at 88.5 million bales, unchanged from its previous estimate.

ICAC placed U.S. consumption at 7.3 million bales, down from 8.2 million bales only two months ago. Additionally, estimated U.S. mill consumption for 2003-04 was reduced to 7.1 million bales, down from 8.0 million in the previous report. As a result, ending stocks for the 2002-03 season were raised by 1.3 million bales and increased 2.7 million bales for next season. The report clearly indicated U.S. domestic mill consumption continued to decline while the textile industry in China is growing rapidly.

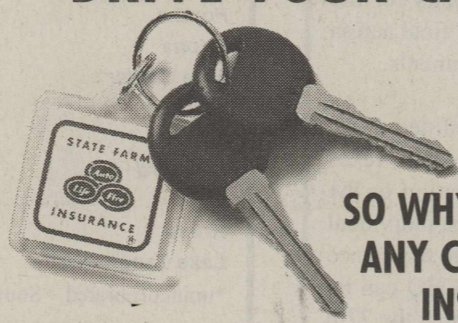
The new scenario in China could result in more export opportunities for U.S. cotton growers. China apparently

has utilized most of its ample supply of carryover stocks, and the country's increasingly large share of the world apparel market has sparked the need to import raw cotton.

China's appearance as a significant importer of cotton this season has provided a fair amount of strength to the market. Approximately 600,000 bales of U.S. cotton had been sold to China as of Nov. 26, and many industry observers expect the country's total exports from all of its suppliers to reach 2.0 million bales by the end of the marketing year.

"Unfortunately, we are again in a no-win situation," says David Stanford, vice-president of sales at Plains Cotton Cooperative Association. "China's re-entrance into the marketplace has introduced a liquidity to the market that we haven't experienced in recent years and cotton prices have pushed higher. Yet, the country's rising share of the apparel industry takes money out of the pockets of U.S. textile mills and textile facilities in other Asian countries that typically buy raw cotton from the United States," he explains.
