The kids kept working and the success stories followed. It makes me feel good when the tennis court lights are on at night.'

In 2001 Rebecca Warren was the first Floydada player to survive the

first two rounds of Regional and she placed 3rd. She repeated the feat in 2002. This is the same year when

winning the Region I Doubles title and then won a Silver Medal at State.

"This award is for the Whirlwind program," said a very humble Coach Nixon. "This would not be possible without Regina Smith, Rosemary Finley, Sammy Bradley and the overwhelming support from Athletic Dithe parents.'

"Robin works extremely hard. She is dedicated to the tennis program and getting results," said Lee Hurt. "She has built one of the stronger 2A programs around this area and has done a super job in getting there.'

"I love the sport, I love to play it, and I love to coach it," said a smiling Coach Nixon. "I have enjoyed seeing the kids succeed and build confidence in themselves. I have enjoyed the relationship with the kids and getting to see them when they come home and hear the successes they are enjoying now. Tennis is something they can enjoy the rest of their lives.'

Commissioners hear proposal to make jail "energy efficient"

The Floyd County Commissioners month were \$409,668.70. Transfers In met Monday, December 9th, and heard a presentation from Winfrey Shipp of Plainview on how to make the courthouse and the county jail more energy efficient.

Shipp, of Shipp's Sales and Service, demonstrated to the commissioners a heavy duty surge protector that can be mounted on the main electrical boxes at the courthouse and the jail.

Shipp guaranteed the commissioners a minimum of 10 percent savings on the county's electrical bills.

"This device has a twofold purpose. It is a surge protector and an energy saver," Shipp said.

"It cleans up the electricity and makes your electric motors run quieter and smoother. It prevents overheating and makes the motors last

'We have a money back guarantee. If you don't see a 10 percent savings after 18 months, we will give you your money back.

"I have a \$4 million dollar insurance policy to cover any machine damaged while our device is being used " Shipp concluded

Upon the recommendation of County Judge William D. Hardin, the commissioners took no action on the matter and asked Shipp to check back with them after the first of the year.

In another matter, the commissioners discussed a request from the Texas Department of Public Safety for a concrete pad to be poured next to Hwy 70 in the Lockney area for the purpose of installing a truck weighing station.

Commissioner Lennie Gilroy commented that he had been approached concerning the pouring of a concrete slab of about 30 feet by 80 feet, and maybe at the Fair Grounds in Lock-

Gilroy estimated the expense to the county would be about \$10,000 to \$15,000 and the weigh station would only be operated once or twice a month during fair weather.

Commissioner Jon Jones asked, "Do we have the right to put in a concrete pad?"

Commissioner Craig Gilly commented, "It would have to be a 6 inch pad with metal in order to support 100,000 pounds. We need to know the goals and the exact location."

The court took no action on the request until further investigation.

Two farm contracts were approved by the commissioners. One was by Delton Jack, south of Lockney, to open a ditch and level the ground. The other was by Mary Shurbet, northeast of Floydada, to set a culvert.

The commissioners approved two Public Official bonds for Delia G. Suarez of the Tax Assessor's office and Peggy L. Hill, deputy county clerk.

A \$2,939.42 budget amendment was approved by the court as presented by Judge Hardin.

Hardin said, the transfer was needed to cover election costs and it would be taken from the Appraisal District funds.

Floyd County Treasurer Mary Shurbet presented a financial report to the commissioners for November.



Deeota noted that life on the farm was hard work, "but we had a good life," she said. She recalled hoeing in the field, working in the field, plowing with a team of horses, heading maize and picking cotton. She remembers tending the family garden, canning fruits and vegetables, and butchering beef, hogs and chickens. She also helped gather eggs, milk cows twice a day, separate milk and churn butter. In addition to these chores, Deeota learned cooking, sewing and quilting.

Deeota left the farm and Floyd county for three years after her marriage to J.C. Odam. The couple moved to Milam county, near Cameron, but they returned in 1937 and made their home in Floydada.

According to USDA, net export sales of 2002-03 crop U.S. cotton totaled 249,800 bales for the week, 43 percent more than the previous week and a 67 percent increase from the four-week average. Featured buyers were Mexico at 77,800 bales, Canada at 50,200 bales and China at 45,400

Year-to-date sales to China now total 596,900 bales, compared to 233,400 bales sold during the entire 2001-02 marketing year. The week's export shipment figure, at 115,700 bales, dropped 20 percent from the previous week. Mexico, China and Hong Kong were primary destina-

The data surprised many traders who expected the Thanksgiving holiday to limit export sales activity. Most traders, however, were not overly ecstatic about the week's higher sales since a considerable amount of cotton must be sold before USDA's target of 10.5 million bales can be met.

"Although the week's numbers were good on the surface, they still maintain the deficit in sales and exports from last year's levels, and the shipment totals are pretty low," an analyst commented. "Commitments are down 2.5 million bales, and 710,000 less bales have been shipped compared to last year at this time," she
