### Breakfast will benefit charities

The Floyd County Farm Bureau is celebrating February 6th as Food Check-Out Day by sponsoring a "Hearty Farm-Fresh Breakfast", on the 6th from 7:00 a.m. to 8:30 a.m. at the Floyd County Friends Unity Center. A donation will be taken at the door with all monies going to Ronald McDonald House Charities.

According to Farm Bureau, on average, American families spend approximately 10% of their income for food. Applying the 10% statistic to the calendar year shows the average household will have earned enough income for its annual food supply in just 37 days.

'The positive message is glaringly visible when you consider Tax Freedom Day is not celebrated until April 27--nearly three months later, to commemorate when the average household will earn enough money to pay for local, federal, and state taxes,' said Boyd Jackson, Floyd County Farm Bureau president.

"I find it amazing the American people can pay for their yearly food supply nearly three months earlier than it would take them to satisfy their tax burden," said Jackson. "Not only is America's food supply the world's safest, but it's also the most affordable.

Thanks to modern farming techniques such as biotechnology, global positioning satellites and conservation tillage, America's farmers and ranchers

# Volunteers needed for County Fair





# Disaster amendment passes Senate

Senate action January 22 saw the approval of a revised Republican disaster assistance plan developed by Senate Agriculture Committee Chairman Thad Cochran (R-MS). The Senate approved the Amendment by a vote of 59-36. The Senate defeated a subsequent attempt to replace the Republican plan with a Democratic alternative that was projected to cost significantly

Final approval of the FY03 Omnibus Appropriations Bill occurred late January 23 and puts the fate of the disaster program in the hands of a House-Senate Conference Committee. How the disaster language will fair in the Conference is unknown, although Administration support should work in its favor. The key will be whether or not House leaders accept the proposed cuts included in the Senate Budget

So the big question remains, which plan would have been more beneficial to producers. The Pros and Cons are not all that easy to identify but each approach had its good and bad points

Playing a big role in the debate was the fact that only \$2.5 Billion was truly available to pay for crop losses covered by a disaster assistance plan

Plains Cotton Growers members made it very clear that they preferred implementation of a traditional disaster assistance program and that is the message taken to Washington by PCG Officers and Staff earlier this week.

Several things worked against the approval of a traditional disaster assistance program as offered by Democrats. Among the bigger issues were the higher cost (approximately twice the amount of available funds), a lack of appropriate budget offsets, and the inability of the Farm Service Agency to conduct the sign-up in

a timely manner. The upside of a traditional di-

saster program to producers \$40,000 per entity maximum. Disaster Amendment ap- would have been better targeting qualifying losses.

> The Republican plan has warts of its own, specifically the broader scope of producers that are eligible to receive funds due to no specific requirement that an actual loss be identified. Residence of an operation in a county designated as a Primary Disaster county is all that is necessary to receive a payment. Producers in all 25 PCG counties are eligible for payments under the program.

Another knock on the Republican plan is that the level of assistance is perceived to be far less than producers need to offset the affects of poor crops in 2001 and/ or 2002.

On the plus side for the Republican plan is the fact that assistance can be delivered quickly, payments received will be based on TOTAL direct payments an operation is eligible for under the Farm Security and Rural Investment Act in 2002, and that budget offsets paying for the program were included and appear to satisfy the previous objections of the Bush Administration for fiscal responsibility without opening up provisions of the FSRI Act to revision.

So how does the plan approved compare to a traditional disaster program? The answer could surprise people.

The catch for the traditional approach is that the higher payment amount would have first been reduced to conform to a specific payment limitation (as has been standard procedure in past programs) and then further reduced by an estimated 50 percent pro-rata factor to keep costs in line with available funds. It can be assumed that language requiring a pro-ration of payments would have been insisted on to keep costs within the savings made available through budget

This means that assuming an \$80,000 payment limitation a producer with a loss that exceeded \$80,000 would have first been cut back to that level and then further reduced by one-half of that amount (assuming a 50 percent pro-rata), down to

Under the Republican plan a producer who qualifies will be eligible to receive a lump-sum payment equal to approximately 42 percent of the TOTAL direct payments received on all crops for 2002 including ALL enrolled farms, not just farms that had individual losses

This broadens the pot of payments significantly if other crops or farms did not have losses that would have increased program eligibility under a traditional approach.

All that remains is the completion of the Conference Committee before the program could go into effect.

PCG will continue to work to improve the final plan wherever possible. Key areas to be emphasized include finding ways to further target funds to those that need it the most and working to get higher payment levels to those that had greater than 35 percent losses.



Steady trade buying during most of the three-day period helped limit market declines, and overnight export sales business on the cash market brought buyers back into the futures market. The market closed higher on Jan. 23 thanks to bullish action in the options ring and more overnight business in the cash market.

Meanwhile, the spot market in Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas remains active. In the five trading days ending Jan. 23, a healthy 31,950 bales were sold online.

Net export sales of U.S. cotton for the week ended Jan. 16 came in a little below most traders' expectations at 188,100 bales, according to USDA. Turkey was by far the largest buyer of U.S. cotton at 63,500 bales. Mexico and Indonesia rounded out the list of the top three buyers with acquisitions totaling 16,400 and 15,800 bales, respectively.

Export shipments for the week came in at 166,500 bales. The primary destination was Mexico which took delivery on 44,900 bales of U.S. cotton. Tur- 31,2003

key and Taiwan also were major destinations with shipments of 16,900 and 15,900 bales each.

Providing additional support to the market was the latest supply and demand report from U.K.- based Cotlook Ltd . In its January report released Thursday, the organization lowered its 200203 world cotton production estimate by 118,300 bales to 86.88 million. However, its forecast of the season's consumption has fallen by 182,000 bales to 95.34 million with the largest adjustments involving Turkey and Brazil.

Cotlook said, though, that the revisions have made little impact on the very substantial shortfall of production relative to consumption in 2002-03. It estimates that world stocks will be reduced by 8.45 million bales during the 12-month period ending July

Area farmers and ranchers need to make an appointment to sign-up for the Direct and available Counter-Cyclical Program (DCP). The deadline to apply for DCP is April 1, 2003. This date is outlined in legislation and no extensions or exceptions will be

The new farm legislation is complex in nature. Maximizing benefits received from these programs will require producers to organize and plan ahead before visiting our offices.

Sign-up for DCP is averaging at least one hour per farm. Producers are encouraged to avoid procrastinating. When preparing for a visit to FSA; if a producer

is planning to update bases and yields, he should use the Base and Yield Analyzer Internet tool 11ttp:// www.fsa.usda.gov/pas/farmbill/ tools.asp. The analyzer assists producers in evaluating a farm's historic data and enables them to make educated decisions about their specific operations.

If electing to update yields, producers will be required to provide all production records for 19982000. For cash leased land, FSA requires a copy of the lease agreement if available and proof of lease payment. If no written lease agreement is provided, the landowner must sign for zero

Additionally, producers who

have dropped, added, purchased, sold or otherwise changed their farming operation need to be prepared to report these changes to the FSA office. Also, producers must certify any 2002 crop plantings or land use changes not



### Public Notice

#### **ORDINANCE NO. 853**

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING GARBAGE AND OTHER REFUSE, CHAPTER 11, OF THE CODE OF ORDI-NANCES OF THE CITY OF FLOYDADA, TEXAS BY AMENDING SECTION 11-21 PERTAINING TO DIS-POSAL OF BUILDING MATERIALS RESULTING FROM STORM DAMAGE AND SECTION 11-23 ESTAB-LISHING LANDFILL TIPPING FEES AND GUIDELINES AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

BE IT ORDAINED by the City Council of the City of Floydada,

SECTION 1: Disposal. That Chapter 11, Article I, Section 11-21 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Floydada, Texas is amended as follows:

SECTION 11-21. Disposal of building materials resulting from damage.

Shingles, roofing materials, concrete, brick, wood materials, and other building-type waste resulting from storms or other acts of nature that are cleared from property in preparation of restoration and/or rehabilitation of property may be delivered to the City of Floydada landfill. Identification of the material and removal site must be registered with the landfill attendant prior to disposal with a payment of any fees required by the City as provided in Section 11-23.

Removal service will not be provided by the City, and the City retains the right to refuse any or all of the above materials. Acceptance of these materials is subject to the rules and regulations of the Texas Commission of Environmental Quality or its successor agency or agencies.

All fees are payable at the gate to the landfill attendant before the customer leaves the site. These fees are subject to change by action of the City Council.

SECTION 2. Landfill Tipping. That Chapter 11, Article 1, Section 11-23 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Floydada, Texas is amended as follows:

#### SECTION 11-23. Landfill tipping fees and guidelines.

In compliance with the laws of the State of Texas regarding the operations of a sanitary landfill, the City of Floydada, Texas hereby establishes the following fees and guidelines for its landfill. Acceptance of any material is subject to the rules and regulations governing landfills in the State of Texas.

(a) Landfill tipping fees apply to all persons, firms and organizations.

(b) Landfill tipping fees will be assessed by weight, except as herein specified in item.

(1) \$27.50 per ton (Effective October 1, 2001) (2) \$5.00 minimum fee (Effective April, 1993)

(c) Landfill fees for disposal of used tires:

(1) Passenger Tires-being those tires under 17.5" diameter - \$2.00 each (Effective January 1, 1998)

With rim - \$4.00 each (Effective January 1, 2003)

(2) Truck Tires - being those tires being over 17.5" diameter. \$6.00 each (Effective January 1, 2003)

(3) All other Tires - being those tires larger than 1300 series \$0.17 per pound (Effective January 1, 2003)

These fees and guidelines are subject to change by action of the City Council.

(d) The City of Floydada will accept solid waste from any where but reserves the right to refuse any loads.

(e) Persons or haulers bringing solid waste to the landfill will be required to separate recyclable items as re-

quired by landfill rules and regulations.

(f) Utility customers of the City of Floydada will be provided with five \$5.00 (minimum landfill tipping) coupons per year.

(g) Landfill tipping fees are to be paid to the landfill attendant prior to customer leaving the landfill site. Payment will be made in cash, check, money order or submission of landfill tipping fee coupons. Landfill tipping fee coupons or contracts will be available at City Hall and must be obtained prior to disposal of unloading of solid waste.

(h) All persons, firms and organizations will be required to give the proper information as set out in Section 11-18 to the landfill attendance prior ro the disposal or unloading of solid waste.

SECTION 3. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

SECTION 4. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after January 1, 2003.

#### J. HOWARD COOPER
