Breakfast will benefit charities

The Floyd County Farm Bureau is celebrating February 6th as Food Check-Out Day by sponsoring a "Hearty Farm-Fresh Breakfast", on the 6th from 7:00 a.m. to 8:30 a.m. at the Floyd County Friends Unity Center. A donation will be taken at the door with all monies going to Ronald McDonald House Charities.

According to Farm Bureau, on average, American families spend approximately 10% of their income for food. Applying the 10% statistic to the calendar year shows the average household will have earned enough income for its annual food supply in just 37 days.

"The positive message is glaringly visible when you consider Tax Freedom Day is not celebrated until April 27--nearly three months later, to commemorate when the average household will earn enough money to pay for local, federal, and state taxes," said Boyd Jackson, Floyd County Farm Bureau president.

"I find it amazing the American people can pay for their yearly food supply nearly three months earlier than it would take them to satisfy their tax burden," said Jackson. "Not only is America's food supply the world's safest, but it's also the most affordable."

Thanks to modern farming techniques such as biotechnology, global positioning satellites and conservation tillage, America's farmers and ranchers

Lack of help may force cancellation of Fair Volunteers needed for County Fair

The dwindling amount of volunteers could call an end the Floyd County Fair this year.

A meeting will be held February 3, at the Unity Center, to discuss the problem of volunteer help, and if enough people do not show up to volunteer their time the Fair will be cancelled.

"We need volunteers desperately," said Fair President Charlene Brown, of Floydada. "We need help before the Fair, during the Fair, and after the Fair. Volunteers need to be around to answer questions throughout the four days of the Fair."

"There is not a lot of physical labor but there is some set-up that needs to be done and light clean-up afterwards."

"We need help showing vendors where to set up and we need help with judging the different divisions."

According to Brown the ideal

amount of people needed to make the job "easy" would be 30-40 people. "Last year we put the Fair on with 9 volunteers--and we had to take time off from work be out there all the time."

Brown said the date has not been set for this year's Fair because the Fair Board is waiting to hear back from a carnival. "Once they tell us if and when they can come, then we will set the date," said Brown.

"People need to start getting ready for the Fair and make sure their items are getting prepared for the competitions."

Brown said if anyone is interested in being a volunteer but can't come to the meeting, they should call Charlene Brown at 983-2618; Elaine LaBaume, at 983-3524 or 983-3334; or Gail DuBois, at 983-2991.

The meeting will start at 7:00 p.m. at the Unity Center, February 3.


The deadline for getting your photos of loved ones into the February 13 "Valentine Brag Pages" is Thursday, February 6th, by 5:00 p.m.

Old structure demolition proposed by City Council

The Floydada City council met Tuesday, January 21, and held a public hearing concerning the removal and demolition of several old structures on seven different properties in the City limits.

The locations of the old structures proposed to be torn down following notification of the owners are: 211 N. 10th, Owner of Record, John Hearon; 505 E. Jackson, Owner of Record, Ella W. Davis; 403 E. Grover, Owner of Record, Lourie D. Buchanan; 629 W. Grover, Owner of Record, Mrs. Woodrow Hill; 429

W. Tennessee, Owner of Record, D.V. Whitfill; Ross & Massie Streets, Owner of Record, Mrs. Richard O. McCown; and 500 Blk E. Jackson, Owner of Record, Dora Davis.

In Public Hearing Mrs. Richard O. McCown of Amarillo addressed the council, "I don't want you to tear down the house (located at Ross & Massie Streets).

"The farm is not making any money. I don't have the money to fix up the house and try to sell it now. You can tear down the old storage buildings at the back of the property," said McCown.

Mayor Bobby Gilliland and

several council members informed McCown, in their opinion, it would cost too much money to fix the house up and to sell it just to break even.

Mayor Gilliland said, "No decisions would be made for tearing down any of the buildings until after another meeting on Monday, January 27th."

In a separate action, the council voted unanimously to tear down a house located at 509 E. Missouri Street.

The City's yearly financial audit ending September 30, 2002 showed General Fund Total As-

"Not only will reality shows continue to flood network schedules next fall, but TV executives are also predicting an end to the traditional TV season."

Repeats will be banished. The introduction of new shows will be staggered.

"There also could be fewer orders for dramas and comedies, with the resulting shrinking of jobs for writers and actors."

The executives are also looking for ways for people to quit skipping the commercials after they tape a show on TV. The networks can now integrate the selling of the products into the shows themselves.

"Ford Motor Co., and Coca-Cola, for example, are two of the advertisers that have paid millions of dollars to have their logos prominently displayed in episodes of 'American Idol'."

County buys news computer programs

The Floyd County Commissioners met in Special Session Wednesday, January 22, and approved a new computer program for the County Clerk's office. The program was bought from CourTech Systems, Inc. for

\$24,925. The program was paid for from the existing money in the Records and Management Fund designated for that purpose, according to the commissioners approved a proposal from AMA (Amarillo On Line) for high speed internet

services. Two farm contracts were approved. They were by W.R. Ware, 7 miles NE of Cedar Hill to grade a ranch road, and by Max Yeary, 5 miles NW of Cedar Hill to repair wash outs for soil conservation.

sets & Debts at \$268,155, Special Revenue at \$48,472, Capital Projects at \$5,134, Proprietary Fund Types at \$4,208,275, Trust Fund Types at \$18,496, and General Fixed Assets at \$3,544,781.

Following more discussion concerning paving Sunset Avenue, the council took no action.

City Manager Gary Brown said, "The major problem (with Sunset Street) still is who is going to pay for what."

No action was taken on the City's old generator plant. Brown said, "It is not very positive, but we are looking into trying to sell the old equipment."

The council unanimously approved a 2003 solid waste contract between South Plains Association of Governments and the City of Floydada.

Concerning an inquiry about the City's policy on utility bill cutoff procedures, the council unanimously agreed not to take any action on any changes.

Council Member Clar Schacht said, "We already have a good policy in place."

Council Member Bettye King said, "If you put your payment in the post office box, it may not get here in time. It would be better to drop it off at City Hall."

Council Member Eric Cornelius said, "The good old boy policy is not a good idea."

A City ordinance was approved by the council setting the City's landfill fees at \$27.50 per ton with a \$5.00 minimum, passenger tire fees \$2.00 each and with rim at \$4.00 each, truck tires at \$6.00 and large truck tires over 17.5" at .17 cents per pound effective January 1, 2003.

Mary Poole's \$200 bid for two leaded glass framed windows was accepted by the council.

In Public Forum Council Member King asked, "When are we going to make people be responsible for their junk cars and junk around their houses and property?"

City Manager Brown responded, "The City has a code in place for junk cars and such, but our previous enforcer quit."

Mayor Gilliland said, "Maybe Darrell (Police Chief Gooch) will do it (enforce the code)."

Gilliland added, "My pet peeve is people parking in their yards."

Council Members King and Schacht both agreed that the Floydada Housing Authority should be responsible for hauling off the junk placed in the alley by their tenants.

Brown told the council there were no solid reports at this time from the Mackenzie Municipal Water Authority, nor the West Texas Municipal Power Agency.

In the City Manager's report, Brown said, "I opposed the Animal Shelter regulations being discussed in the state legislature in Austin recently."

"We would have 24 months to bring our shelter into compliance

with a building with ventilation and the floor temperature between 60 degrees to 85 degrees," said Brown.

Concerning the tearing down

of the old Dyson building, Brown said, "I know a business man interested in the property and perhaps building a new structure there."

The board approved \$651.78 of indigent health care claims and a contract with the Floyd County Appraisal District regarding assessment and collection services for this year.

Board President Tom Farris said, "We are getting bids now

for the purchase of a new ambulance for EMS.

"EMS made 42 runs in December, 2002. A total of 596 runs was made by EMS in 2002, compared to 403 runs in 2001," concluded Farris.

Those present at the meeting were: Board President, Tom Farris; Board Members, Kyle Smith, Rex Lawson, Jeffery Johnson; Cogdell Clinic Office Manager Maybelle Monreal; EMS Director Paul Moore; and Paul Acreman of PNS.







Public Notice

ORDINANCE NO. 853

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING GARBAGE AND OTHER REFUSE, CHAPTER 11, OF THE CODE OF ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF FLOYDADA, TEXAS BY AMENDING SECTION 11-21 PERTAINING TO DISPOSAL OF BUILDING MATERIALS RESULTING FROM STORM DAMAGE AND SECTION 11-23 ESTABLISHING LANDFILL TIPPING FEES AND GUIDELINES AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

BE IT ORDAINED by the City Council of the City of Floydada, Texas:

SECTION 1: Disposal. That Chapter 11, Article I, Section 11-21 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Floydada, Texas is amended as follows:

SECTION 11-21. Disposal of building materials resulting from damage.

Shingles, roofing materials, concrete, brick, wood materials, and other building-type waste resulting from storms or other acts of nature that are cleared from property in preparation of restoration and/or rehabilitation of property may be delivered to the City of Floydada landfill. Identification of the material and removal site must be registered with the landfill attendant prior to disposal with a payment of any fees required by the City as provided in Section 11-23.

Removal service will not be provided by the City, and the City retains the right to refuse any or all of the above materials. Acceptance of these materials is subject to the rules and regulations of the Texas Commission of Environmental Quality or its successor agency or agencies.

All fees are payable at the gate to the landfill attendant before the customer leaves the site. These fees are subject to change by action of the City Council.

SECTION 2. Landfill Tipping. That Chapter 11, Article I, Section 11-23 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Floydada, Texas is amended as follows:

SECTION 11-23. Landfill tipping fees and guidelines.

In compliance with the laws of the State of Texas regarding the operations of a sanitary landfill, the City of Floydada, Texas hereby establishes the following fees and guidelines for its landfill. Acceptance of any material is subject to the rules and regulations governing landfills in the State of Texas.

- (a) Landfill tipping fees apply to all persons, firms and organizations.
- (b) Landfill tipping fees will be assessed by weight, except as herein specified in item.
 - (1) \$27.50 per ton (Effective October 1, 2001)
 - (2) \$5.00 minimum fee (Effective April, 1993)
- (c) Landfill fees for disposal of used tires:
 - (1) Passenger Tires-being those tires under 17.5" diameter - \$2.00 each (Effective January 1, 1998)
 - With rim - \$4.00 each (Effective January 1, 2003)
 - (2) Truck Tires - being those tires being over 17.5" diameter. \$6.00 each (Effective January 1, 2003)
 - (3) All other Tires - being those tires larger than 1300 series \$ 0.17 per pound (Effective January 1, 2003)

These fees and guidelines are subject to change by action of the City Council.

- (d) The City of Floydada will accept solid waste from any where but reserves the right to refuse any loads.
- (e) Persons or haulers bringing solid waste to the landfill will be required to separate recyclable items as required by landfill rules and regulations.
- (f) Utility customers of the City of Floydada will be provided with five \$5.00 (minimum landfill tipping) coupons per year.
- (g) Landfill tipping fees are to be paid to the landfill attendant prior to customer leaving the landfill site. Payment will be made in cash, check, money order or submission of landfill tipping fee coupons. Landfill tipping fee coupons or contracts will be available at City Hall and must be obtained prior to disposal of unloading of solid waste.
- (h) All persons, firms and organizations will be required to give the proper information as set out in Section 11-18 to the landfill attendance prior to the disposal or unloading of solid waste.

SECTION 3. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

SECTION 4. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after January 1, 2003.
