# **Plains Bell opens local Credit Union**

People will recognize a familiar face when they step into the Floydada office of Plains Bell Federal Credit Union. Laura Turner, who was an office assistant at Production Credit Association, will now be managing the newly opened Plains Bell Federal Credit Union.

"I never left home, of course," said Turner. "It's just that when the PCA office closed down in Floydada I was moved to the office in Plainview. Working in Plainview left me no time to see my friends in Floydada."

Plains Bell will offering a new type of credit union loan service to Floyd County. "Services are no longer being offered to only select groups, such as teachers," said Plains Bell President Terry McCormick. "We now offer the service to everyone in a competitive environment.

We serve a diverse base of people. Plains Bell is reaching out to communities that have never had a cooperative financial institution available to them."

Plains Bell has a long history of service to its members and the Texas Panhandle--dating back to 1940.

Plains Bell has grown from serving just the employees of Southwestern Bell Telephone to serving all walks of life--including the communications industry, three rural counties of the High Plains, and phone and electric Co-Ops in Texas, New Mexico and Arizona.

The institution has grown from beginning assets of over \$600 to today's assets of 20 million plus.

Services include debit cards, shares account, share draft account, low interest rate credit cards, low and flexible terms on loans, audio response, direct deposit, certificate of deposit accounts and IRA accounts.

"We offer all types of loans," said McCormick, "such as homes, vehicles, boats, recreational vehicles, and planes. We have even given a loan for a hot air balloon.

"The only requirement to get a loan here," said Turner, "is to live or work in Floyd County."



Serving as Maid of Honor was Lea Tompkins of Andrews, a friend of the bride.


The groom wore a white dress shirt with a Texas flag tie and Khaki slacks. The tie was a gift from his sister.




The Longhorns lost a heartbreaker to the 12th ranked Abernathy Antelopes earlier in the week 36-34.

# **DCP** Sign-up progress

#### **By Shawn Wade**

Texas is staying slightly ahead of the national average as producers continue to complete the Direct and Counter cyclical Program (DCP) sign-up process.

One of the most significant factors creating headaches for Farm Service Agency offices and producers alike is the shear amount of information that must be gathered in order to make all the necessary decisions.

USDA continues to make administrative changes that should help smooth the process for producers that are having significant

difficulty in obtaining production records on farms.

The latest effort to make it easier for the producer is the announcement of the option to let the County FSA committee assign an appropriate Counter Cyclical payment yield to a farm if actual production records are unavailable.

Producers who had previously opted to use 75% of the County average yield in lieu of actual production records should be able to change to an assigned yield if they want to do so.

## Second counter cyclical advance payment underway

#### **By Shawn Wade**

USDA also announced today the 2nd Advance Counter cyclical payment rate for cotton, rice and peanuts. Payments are scheduled to be made starting February 3, 2003.

Producers who received the first CC Advance payment will be eligible for the second payment

The announced payment rates are \$0.096 cents for cotton; \$1.16 per hundredweight for rice and \$72.80 per short ton for peanuts.

The announced payment rate will be reduced by any counter-cyclical payments already received in the first advance payment.

Producers who already received the first advance CC payment can expect a net payment rate of \$0.048 per pound for cotton; \$0.58 per hundredweight for rice and \$36.40 per short tome for peanuts in the second CC payment.

Wheat conditions across the High Plain is extremely varied at this time. Several fields are showing signs of various problems. Listed below are a few signs currently being seen.

The following information was provided by Dr. Calvin Trostle, Extension Agronomist from Lubbock and Dr. Brent Bean, Extension Agronomist from Amarillo.

Purple and dark reddish color in the wheat crop - Reports of leaves having these colors have been numerous, and Brent Bean has noted this in the Panhandle as well. What I have seen has mostly been on the leaf tips, and then mostly on leaves that are sticking up thus more exposed to any environmental factor. These same leaves tend to be older as well. P deficiency is often associated with the dark reddish purplish color I have observed, abut red, brown, purplish discoloration of leaves, indicative of P deficiency in corn and other plants is less common in wheat. P is relatively mobile within the plant. Often with many stems the purplish color is more likely on the stems rather than the leaves in P deficiency. What we really think is occur-

ring to create the reddish, purplish color is frost conditions or some combination of weather factors. For leaves that appear discolored, I find that if you look at the back of the leaf, the color there is near normal, green like it probably should be. This helps reduce, even rule out, the possibility of a virus or some other plant disease. With the warm days we are having and frost nights, it seems that perhaps this situation has set itself up more to notice the dark reddish, purplish color. Often it disappears within a few days to a week.

Stands looking very thin. This can be deceiving especially if plants are small. I look for the number of plants. As background, if a farmer on dryland wheat planted 40 lbs./A X 16,000 seeds/lb. divided by 43,560 sq. feet/acre, then he would have about 15 seeds per sq. foot. If 2/ 3 of the wheat established, then he would have about 10 plants per square foot. A field may look thin, but some wheats that might be finer leafed will appear thin. This crop can still produce well, though it might have some limi-



seed being planted shallow, which means the crown is near the surface and more of the roots are not penetrating deeper.

Lower leaves are dead. We normally see some of this every year, it may depend on variety, weather, disease, etc. When you look at a lot of fields you get used to it, but to a farmer who doesn't see it that often it can be a concern. I look to ensure that the newer growth looks healthy, and if so I just keep an eye on the field. Drought or cold weather stress can cause come leaves to



Soil moisture conditions are for the most part very good, but some wheat fields are rooted mainly in the top 3-5" right now, and it is dryer there in some

Greenbugs Reports from San Angelo have indicated that greenbugs have been heavy, but I haven't heard reports of high numbers (yet) in the South Plains. As an aside, most growers have never heard that TAM 110 is a greenbug resistant (not immune!) wheat variety. It is one of our best wheats, probably average on forage production, but for grain in the Panhandle and South Plains it is one of our recommended grain varieties for both irrigated and dryland (see attached file for more on TAM 110)






