Cornelius in "Top 10" for volunteer community service work

Skyler Cornelius, a 17 year old high school student in Floydada, has been recognized as a top 10 finalist by The Prudential Spirit of Community Awards.

Skyler is well known in Floyd County as the young man who spearheaded the Veteran's Memorial Project. It was this volunteer work that led his high school principal, Wayne Morren, to submit Skyler's name for consideration of this award.

The award, in its 8th year, honors outstanding acts of volunteerism, and is conducted by Prudential Financial Inc, in partnership with the National Association of Secondary School Principals. More than 24,000 high school and middle level student submitted applications.

As a top 10 finalists, a representative of Prudential will present Skyler with an engraved bronze medallion in a special ceremony at the high school. Skyler has also received a certificate from Governor Rick Perry.

From the top 10 finalists, two are then chosen to represent the State in a ceremony in Washington D.C. From these state representatives two National honorees are chosen.

The two top Texas volunteers chosen were: Laura Fisher, 17, of Houston, and Clayton Lillard, 14, of San Antonio.

Fisher, a senior at Memorial High School, created and teaches a Saturday afternoon art class for young cancer patients at Texas Children's Hospital.

Lillard, an eighth grader at Hobby Middle School, has collected and refurbished hundreds of used bicycles and donated them as Christmas gifts to children who have a parent in prison.

All public and private middle level and high schools in the country were eligible to select a student for a local Prudential Spirit of Community Award. All local honorees were then reviewed by state-level judges, who then selected State Honorees and Distinguished Finalists tions. Not one veteran had to pay based on criteria such as personal initiative, creativity, effort, impact and personal growth.

"The recipients of these awards vividly demonstrate that young people across America are making amazing contributions to the health and vitality of their communities," said Art Ryan, chairman and CEO of Prudential Financial. "They truly deserve all the praise and encouragement we can give them."

The Floyd County Veteran's Memorial project began as Skyler's 4-H Citizenship Project.

Skyler enlisted the help of a newly created 25 member junior board of 4-Her's and 23 member adult board. Within the year the project accumulated 150 volunteers and 860 contributors that made the Memorial a reality. Through it all Skyler, and his mother Julianne Cornelius, organized and kept the project rolling. \$95,000 was raised through individual and business contributo have his name included on the monument

The project was completed in a year and a memorial, with 4,011 Veteran's names, was unveiled in beautiful pageantry on Veteran's Day, November 11, 2002. Over 3,000 people attended the ceremony in Floydada, which included Honor Guards, Taps, and an Air Force flyover.

Young Skyler was the main speaker and handled the podium with poise and confidence, along with Texas Speaker of the House Pete Laney, and Retired Air Force General Robert Dempsey.

"I think this memorial will be a teaching tool for school children and a tribute to veterans for generations to come and a tribute to our country," said Skyler in his application submitted to Prudential.

"This is a living memorial," said Skyler, "therefore the project

Relatives have stated that Rodriguez has suffered a broken back, two broken legs, head injuries, and internal bleeding.

No charges have been filed at this time.

Community storm shelters could be part of disaster planning

As a first step in receiving certain federal disaster funds for projects to mitigate future disasters in Floyd County, local government officials and emergency management personnel recently held a meeting to develop a local hazard analysis to document which types of disasters are most likely to occur in this area.

Floyd County's hazard analysis will be combined with those from 14 other South Plains counties to develop a regional hazard mitigation action plan.

After the plan has been completed, counties in the region will be eligible for federal disaster mitigation funds for projects designed to reduce local vulnerability in future hazards.

"On the South Plains, examples of future mitigation projects might include building community storm shelters," said **Continued On Page 2**

FISD approves \$9,000 for "analysis" study of campuses



Continued From Page 1 Preston Belt, Floyd County's Emergency Management Coordinator. "Other projects could include moving houses out of flood plains, rerouting streets, cutting trees near electric lines, or burying utility cables and electric lines to minimize storm dam-

"Here in Floyd County the main things we would try to get would be the community storm shelters and a secondary communication system. The system would enable all emergency responders to be able to communicate in the event the primary dispatch system goes down.'

The South Plains Association of Governments (SPAG) will provide technical assistance to help local governments with the hazard analysis process and will coordinate development of a regional plan. After the plan is developed, SPAG will help the local governments with preparing grant applications for future projects

Commissioners support Lubbock area trade zone

The Floyd County Commissioners met Monday, February 10, and unanimously approved a letter of support for a multi-county trade zone being sponsored and promoted by Lubbock Market, Inc. and the City of Lubbock.

The letter read to the commissioners by Floyd County Judge William D. Hardin stated, "In the forming of a trade zone (by Lubbock Market, Inc.), we support the inclusion of Floyd County in the FTZ (Foreign Trade Zone) zone service area.

"We applaud the efforts of the regional Lubbock International Airport, the City of Lubbock, and Lubbock Market, Inc. to work with the surrounding counties and cities to support their economic development efforts.

"The FTZ will become an important economical development to all of us in the region when recruiting businesses and industrial developments. We are pleased to be a part of this effort and encourage the establishment of an FTZ zone service area around Lubbock with Floyd County being included in the zone.'

Concerning any money being involved, Judge Hardin stated, "If they ask for any money, then we can sit down and discuss it at that time.'

In other business, the commissioners approved an amendment to the Cooperative Agreement between the Office of Attorney General of the State of Texas and Floyd County.

Judge Hardin said, "This has to do with child support being collected through Barbara's (Edward) office by way of the internet. The amendment to the contract does not require us to have a fund audit by independent auditors and it will be retroactive to the co-op agreement."

The commissioners appointed Carolyn Marble to the Floyd County Memorial Library representing Precinct No. 3.

The commissioners approved the transfer of \$30,000 from the Road and Bridge Fund to be divided equally and placed into the four precincts at \$7,500 each.

Three contracts were approved by the commissioners. They were:

drainage ditches; Precinct No. 1, James Hale, 1/2 north of Highway 37, 1/4 mile east, to fill in washes for soil conservation; and Precinct No. 2, Gayle Jackson, Lockney, at the intersection of 2301 and 2266, 1/4 miles north, to maintain a waterway.

County agents J.D. Ragland and Melissa Long reported to the commissioners. Long told the court that all business in Floyd County that handles any kind of food products, including ice, must the "certified" by the Texas Department of Health every five vears.

Long said, "We are conducting a two day Food Protection Training program at Plainview next week."

Ragland told the commissioners, "There were 119 producers that attended the Caprock Cotton Conference last month at the Plains Baptist Assembly camp. We usually have over 200 producers attend. We did have a good conference though.

"We are thinking about and planning possibly to have the conference every other year or possibly combine the Floyd County conference with Hale County conference. We are not sure just yet what we are going do," said Ragland.

Ragland continued, "The stock shows are keeping us real busy. We are leaving for the San Antonio Stock Show this week. We did real good at the Fort Worth Stock Show. We will be going to the show in Brenhan and then on to the Houston stock show

"We are starting a new 4-H competition with the "Trap and Skeet" shooting program. We have very good interest in this with 17 kids already signed up. Our first practice shoot will be February 22," Ragland concluded.

The commissioners approved a financial report given by Floyd County Treasurer Elva Martinez. The January Report showed a Beginning Balance of \$340,716.81, with Receipts of \$224,426.11. There were Transfers In of \$157,519.73 and Transfers Out of \$152,453.53,






In the order of new business, Vivian Curtis and Maye Williams





Cotton futures on the New York Cotton Exchange closed Friday, Jan. 31, at their highest settlement in 22 months as a bullish technical picture triggered fund and speculative buying. However, futures prices declined this week as consolidation, producer selling and the upcoming expiration of March options weighed on the market.

Meanwhile, the International **Cotton Advisory Committee** (ICAC) this week said 2003 plantings in the Northern Hemisphere will start with world cotton prices at their highest level since March 2001. The news came as no surprise to analysts.

Also, as most analysts anticipated, the ICAC plugged in new numbers for China's 2002 production . The country 's crop estimate was raised from 21.6 million bales to 22.3 million, and tive number. the increase was in line with other 27.1 million, ICAC said.

pegged at 95.8 million bales, the largest number ever estimated by ICAC. However, the figure continues to lag behind USDA's estimate which now is at 96.45 million.

ICAC's world production figures for 2003 were boosted by 2.4 million bales thanks to a I.9 million-bale increase in the projected Chinese crop and another 200,000 bales expected in the U.S. World consumption was increased by I .4 million with 900,000 bales added to China's column. The U.S. consumption estimate of 7.1 million bales in its previous report was raised to 7.5 million by ICAC. For the new crop, projected world consumption exceeds production by 1.9 million bales, the smallest difference since the ICAC has published its numbers for the 2003-04 season, but it remains a posi-

Mixed messages on disaster aid

From cautious optimism to genuine concern is a good description of the swing in attitudes regarding disaster assistance gaining final approval as part of the FY03 Omnibus Appropriations bill currently under consideration.

Whether or not such an extreme change in attitude is warranted is still unclear. What is becoming clear, however, is that the perception of backpedaling and political posturing by the Bush Administration is gaining many new believers in farm country

Fueling the change in attitudes was the release of the Statement of Administration Policy (SAP) earlier this week. The SAP outlines the Bush Administration's stance on issues included in the FY03 Omnibus spending measure.

Of primary concern was the apparent reversal in the Bush Administration's willingness to accept an across the board cut in discretionary spending levels to pay for the addition of drought

spending offsets.

Prior to this latest curveball, the drought assistance package was already gaining additional scrutiny from members of the House of Representatives who didn't go far enough in targeting to the Senate version, but talks assistance to individuals that had losses

The proposed rule for the En-Program (EQIP) has been released for public comment. The 2002 Farm Bill reauthorized and amended the program, which is administered by the USDA-Service (NRCS).

"The Farm Bill represents an unprecedented investment in conservation on America's working lands, providing a \$17.1 billion increase in conservation over ten years, which is an 80 percent increase," according to Dr. Larry D. Butler, NRCS state conservationist for Texas. "In addition, the Farm Bill offers voluntary solutions for complying with the Endangered Species Act, Clean Water Act, Clean Air Act, and other regulations. EQIP--one of the largest programs in the Farm Bill--is designed to help producers meet the significant environmental regulation they face," Butler said.

EQIP is a voluntary conserva-

tion program that promotes environmental quality and assists producers to meet local, state and federal regulations. Funds will help farmers and ranchers install conservation practices that protect natural resources by reducing soil erosion, improving water use efficiencies, and protecting grazing land.

Through the rule making process, NRCS has streamlined program administration and addressed several primary statutory changes in the proposed rule, in-

cluding: Up to 90 percent cost vironmental Quality Incentives share for limited resource and beginning farmers and ranchers; A total payment limitation of \$450,000 per qualified individual or entity for all fiscal year 2002-2007 EQIP contracts; Providing Natural Resources Conservation • livestock producers with cost share assistance for waste storage facilities regardless of size, but must develop and implement a comprehensive nutrient management plan; Allocating 60 percent of EQIP funds towards livestock related practices.

The proposed fiscal year 2003 agriculture budget includes \$850 million for EQIP to install conservation measures such as erosion control and water quality enhancement, \$51 million for Ground and Surface Water Conservation and \$8 million for water conservation and water quality enhancements in the Klamath Basin of California and Oregon.

"In Texas, farmers and ranchers are proud of their environmental stewardship and conservation on working lands," Butler said, "Since 1997 more than 6.5 million acres have been enrolled in the EQIP program in Texas. There is a strong commitment for conservation among private landowners to improve the environment and protect our natural resources."
