City of Lockney receives computer gifts

Chief of Police Jerry Edwards addressed the Lockney City Council at their March 13 meeting, informing them the computers from TEQC had arrived.

Texas Environmental Quality Control, in their new budget from the state, received funding for new computers. By law, their old ones could be transferred to another governmental agency. Chief Edwards applied for them, and the city of Lockney was awarded the computers.

Among items on the agenda the council considered, and unanimously passed, were placing Jeff Terrell, Nell Glasscock, and Jack Covington on the Lockney Economic Development Board, and voting in Preston Belt as the Emergency Management Coordinator. Preston will now be serving the whole county in this capacity.

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

He sends emails occasionally to update us on where he is traveling and what he is learning. His thoughts on being an American oversees at this time were interesting and we thought we would share them with our readers.)

Greetings from Greece:

I just added pictures and commentary of recent travels on my website (www.duststorm.net/ hug). Included is an entry on Northern Greece, and the longawaited Egypt pictures. Sorry that it took so long, thanks for the patience. Because of recent website problems, however, the Egypt entrys are not yet completed.

The semester is quickly coming to a close, and we are treasuring the days that we have left. Greece continues to be wonderful, but living in Europe during appreciate my home.

From personal experience, I -there is a part of the anti-Ameritelling you. It is true that Eurothe US, but in many cases it is only because the average citizens (and remind others to do so, too!) are uninformed and have become victims of their morally corrupt governments. From the vantage point we have, it seems that much of the European political fight against the U.S. is fueled by

France, Russia, Germany, and many other countries with ties to Iraq have much to lose from a war, and their safety is not immediately threatened as the U.S., s.

We attend church with an Iraqi

refugee family, and it has been interesting to hear their thoughts about the situation. The man holds a masters degree in Geology, and the wife was an elementary school teacher. They left 5 months ago, sneaking across the border and fleeing through Turkey to Greece in an effort to escape the oppression in Iraq. Although you rarely see it on your televisions in the U.S.A., there are many families just like this living in Greece and throughout all of Europe that illegally leave to seek refuge from the politically directed famine and killing. He admits that war would be painful for his country; but he sees it as a very good thing and optimistically awaits the day that his home country is without its current leadership. As he said, "Iraq it crying. People with good governments don't cry.'

My point is that you might see the anti-war protesters marching the streets in Washington, London, and Paris, but you don't see the pro-war Iraqi's living on the streets of foreign cities because they had to flee their homeland

I hope that everything is going well for all of you. Enjoy your



Budget battle looms; PCG working on disaster assistance, Pay limits and CSP

Less than a year has passed since the Farm Security and Rural Investment Act of 2002 became law. In that time, budget forecasts have continued to go downhill and Congress is looking to tighten the budget belt.

For agriculture, it appears that the predictable and repetitious assault on Farm Bill provisions that usually comes from those with little or no real concern for the well being of the U.S. farmer

has already begun. First to step up to plate and make good on his pledge to renew a seemingly constant assault on farm Bill provisions is Iowa Republican Senator Charles Grassley. Senator Grassley successfully added an amendment to the Senate's FY2004 Budget Bill during deliberations by the Senate Budget Committee.

The new Grassley amendment would target changes in the area of farm program payment limits and do away with several key provisions.

Topping the changes included in the latest Grassley payment limit proposal is the idea to completely gut the current three-entity rule. The amendment would aggregate the payments from all entities back to the individual and place a hard cap on the amount

the individual could receive. Grassley's amendment would also leave the \$40,000 limit on direct payments as is, but drop the payment limit on the countercyclical program to \$60,000. Finally the Grassley amendment would put a \$200,000 cap on

The offering of the amendment was not unexpected, since Senator Grassley has taken every opportunity to renew his pledge to submit a payment limit bill.

Grassley proposes to shift the estimated \$ 1.398 Billion in savings to the Conservation Security Program.
