Rolling "Meth lab" closed High speed chase ends in arrests

lab was stopped at 10:20 p.m., Sunday, April 6, just outside the city limits of Lockney, by Floyd County Deputy Paul Raissez. A high speed chase ended with the apprehension and arrest of two men, Joe Brandon Hardison, 24, of Anadarko, Oklahoma; and Nicholas Chad Fowler, 23, of Childress.

According to Raissez the headlights of the suspect's car were seen off the road. Raissez proceeded to the area to investigate and observed the vehicle, a Mitsubishi Outlander, leave the area and head south on County Road 109. "The vehicle turned west on 97 and disregarded the stop sign," said Raissez. "I decided to follow it for awhile. You could tell they had no idea where they were going. I continued to follow them. They turned north on 378 and when I got behind them they threw a white con-

A "rolling" methamphetamine open and white powder went everywhere. I could smell the chemicals through the car vent as I drove past it.'

Raissez turned on his emergency overhead lights and the suspects car stopped outside the city limits. Raissez said he got out of his vehicle and approached the Mitsubishi. "I ordered the driver out of the car," said Raissez, "but after I was away from my car the driver stepped on the gas and took off."

Raissez said the suspects fled and drove up and down county roads. "He would turn north, then west, then east. He was lost. Eventually he came to Hwy. 70 and turned north. When he got to

Hwy. 97 he turned toward Lockney and drove off into a large pit that is near the intersection of 70 and 97. He hit a dirt ledge and tried to come out of the pit. His vehicle 'high centered' and stuck.'

According to Raissez the men "baled out" of the car and started running down into the dark pit. "One tripped and fell and I caught him and cuffed him," said Raissez.

"I took him up and out of the pit and back to my car."

Deputy Toby Brazee arrived and went into the pit to look for the other suspect. Brazee found the suspect hiding, arrested the man and brought him back up and out of the pit.

Inside the car, deputies found: rock salt, lithium batteries, starter fluid, acid, plastic hose and air hose. "They had their front windows open," said Raissez, "but even with the windows open I was nearly knocked over by the anhydrous fumes when I opened the back doors.

"The car was a mess. They have probably been living in it and drive place to place to sell the

people. "We anticipate adding a Distance Learning Lab in the near future," said Ross. > "Out of 131 'leavers' in 2001-2002 (for FISD), we audited 78. Out of these 78 only three were not documented properly. This is not a serious situation," concluded Robison.

> FISD Superintendent Jerry Vaughn explained, "Some students leave during the summer, or on weekends, and they do not report why or where they moved. It makes it hard to document these students."

Mobile drug lab arrests made

Dear Editor,

We have a hometown hero. Last Saturday at Ralls, April 5, 2003, Floydada Junior Basketball 5th and 6th grade boys Allstars were in tournament play with Olton at 9:15 a.m.

Just after the halftime interlude, Mr. Bill Smith, an Olton player's grandfather, collapsed at the bottom of their stands.

Cell phones were not working well within the building, so son Kenny raced outside to talk to 911. This led to added confusion because some Floydada parents including Mr. Randy Lerma first thought the emergency was outside of the gym. But cries for help ensuing from Olton's crowd prompted Mr. Lerma to rush to Mr. Smith's aid.

Finding no pulse or breathing, and getting permission from the downed man's son, Mr. Lerma used CPR training he had received as an employee of Azteca Milling Plainview. Mr. Lerma was glad for Floydada School Resource Officer Ruben DeLeon to join the effort taking over the heart compression procedure. Randy backed up mouth to mouth by keeping the patient's airway open.

Cotton Market Weekly A service provided by Plains Cotton Cooperative Association

Despite a strong export report from USDA, cotton futures on the New York Cotton Exchange trended lower Thursday as buying interest failed to materialize, and locals pressed the market.

"Also working against the bulls was a slower tone in the cash markets, China's auction prices continued to ease, and Cotlook's quotes were all unchanged for the third consecutive day," a cotton market analyst explained.

A surge in export shipments in the week ended March 27 drove exports to their highest levels in more than four years as merchants took advantage of a temporary rise in the Step 2 payment rate. Shipments of 350,100 bales were the greatest since 382,800 bales were exported in the week ended Dec. 10, 1998. Primary destinations included China, Turkey and Mexico.

Total export sales for the latest reporting period easily remained above the level needed to surpass USDA's current 2002-03 marketing year forecast of 10.8 million statistical bales. Net export sales for the week totaled 353,300 bales, a 28 percent increase from the previous report and 7 percent more than the fourweek average.

China, India and Pakistan, generally the largest U.S. export competitors, were three of the top

five buyers of U.S. cotton for the week. Due to the critical supply shortages in these countries and once the uncertainty of war clears up, a strong buying pattern could emerge, generating import interest from Pakistan and India, according to analysts.

In other news, USDA's 2003 prospective cotton plantings report released Mar. 31 was considered to be "on the low side' of analysts' expectations, providing some support for the market. The department estimated U.S. cotton plantings for the 2003 season at 14.25 million acres, up 2.0 percent from the 13.96 million acres planted in 2002.

Texas had been expected to see the largest increase in prospective plantings, and market participants were surprised that the anticipated rise is only 200,000 acres, bringing the state's total expected acreage to 5.8 million.

"That's a small increase for Texas considering good yields, a great quality crop and good moisture last year," one market observer said. "I would question that the number would be up only that much.

As expected, the Mid-South states of Arkansas, Louisiana, Mississippi, Missouri and Tennessee are estimated to see a 220,000 acre rise in plantings. In

California and New Mexico, cotton acreage is expected to expand while Arizona will see a decrease in acres planted to the crop.

Additional fundamental news came from the International Cotton Advisory Committee (ICAC) as it forecast world ending stocks to shrink to 40.9 million bales by July 31,2003, the lowest level since the 1994-95 season.

The committee estimated 2002-03 world cotton production to reach 87.7 million bales, down 11 percent from the record set the previous season, while global cotton consumption was pegged at 95.8 million bales. Additionally, the committee expects world production for 2003-04 to rise 9 percent to 95.8 million bales, and mill use was projected at 96.6 million bales.

Meanwhile, on the spot cotton scene, trading activity remained light due to producer reluctance to sell at current prices. Online sales by Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas cotton producers for the week ended April 3 totaled 1,823 bales, an increase from the previous week when 786 bales changed hands. The average price received by producers selling their cotton online ranged from 46.05 to 50.21 cents per pound compared to the previous week' s range of 40.00 to 48.50 cents per pound.

Greenhaw said, "Our bid is simple. We will absorb all service charges and fees due to changing deposits. We will give you a \$500 credit toward your future check orders. We pledge sufficient collateral, on-line banking, wiring, stop payments and Direct Deposits. We will come and train employees. Our staff will be available to help anyone concerning Direct Deposits."

Farris told the board, "All three banks have the same services available to you (FISD). FISD has about 4 to 5 million dollars on deposit and you borrow very little money. So I believe interest rates on deposits is the most important thing.

"I agree that the interest rates are probably about as low as they will be going. This is good for changing home mortgages, but not for changing to fixed rates,"

Farris concluded.

Following a recommendation by Superintendent Vaughn to stay with FNB of Floydada as FISD's depository, the board voted unanimously to continue using FNB of Floydada as its depository for 2003-2005.


