Rainwater strikes gold at State Meet Brady running for "Nana"

On his left wrist Brady Rainwater wrote in ink "run for Nana". Winning the race in Austin was Brady's motivation with grandmother Faulkenberry glued to the radio back home listening to Nick Long and Tony St. James describe the race on KFLP. The old cliche' of saving the best until the last describes Rainwater of Floydada when he won the Class 2A Boys 800-meter run at the 92nd Annual Texas U.I.L. Track and Field Championships on Saturday, May 10.

The versatile FHS Senior athlete in his last competition of wearing the green and white for the Whirlwinds raced to a new school record time of 1:57.59 in front of approximately 18,000 at Mike Meyer Stadium on the campus of the University of Texas. It was the first time Rainwater had qualified for the prestigious State Track Meet and he took advantage of the only opportunity he would ever have. His performance broke the Whirlwind record for the 800 meters of 1:58.70 that has been held by Daniel Medrano since 1988 at the

Region I-3A meet. Rainwater drew lane number six to start the race and had the 3rd fastest qualifying time. The pre-race favorite Chris Chandler of Yorktown jumped out the lead with Rainwater right on his heals the entire first lap. Then between

curves one and two on the final lap Rainwater made his move and passed Chandler on his right side as they raced down the backstretch with 300-meters to go.

When Brady made his move I was initially thinking he had moved too soon," said Floydada track coach Gilbert Trevino. "Our plan was for him to stay with the pace-setter until the 200-meter mark and then make his kick. I was hoping that Brady would be able to hold on down the back stretch, and he did!"

Coach Trevino was very humble when trying to take any credit for working with Rainwater on strategy and pre-training, "Brady is the type of kid that makes a coach look good."

Rainwater was able to hold his pace and built up a ten meter lead that he held to the finish line. Chandler eventually faded to a sixth place finish and the nearest challenger was Gil Perez of Odem with a time of 1:58.31 to take the Silver medal.

"After I took the lead I felt like a locomotive going downhill. The more I went the more I got motivated," said Rainwater. "I always pray with my dad when I stretch and I knew Nana was praying for me. I guess it was

I have known Rainwater since coaching him in T-ball at age 5. Brady has built a reputation of having a competitive heart, and I Continued On Page 9

Laney among the "missing"

Floyd County's State Representative Pete Laney was one of 58 Democrats who refused to report to work in the Texas House, bringing the legislative chamber to a standstill. The legislators who did show up for work have been confined to the chamber by Speaker Craddick.

According to an AP wire story in the Lubbock Avalanche, "after hours of waiting for word, not knowing where the 58 Democrats were or how long they would be gone, the whereabouts of most of the lawmakers' were discovered late Monday in Ardmore, Oklahoma"--staying in a Holiday Inn.

A quorum of 100, out of the 150 members, is needed to conduct business in the House. Fiftyeight of the 62 Democrats were absent. There are 88 Republi-

Democrats oppose a new redistricting plan proposed by Republicans and are using the "walk-out" as a boycott to advance legislation.

However, the redistricting plan is not the only piece of legislation that will die as a result of the absent Democrats.

According to Governor Rick Perry more than 200 pieces of legislation will die.

"If 53 people can decide to leave on any given issue, we might as will shut this building down and let it become a museum because the work of the people is through," said Perry in an AP

House rules allows for the arrest of members who intentionally thwart a quorum, which explains why the democrats fled to Oklahoma to take their stand.

Representative Laney was not available for comment. A spokeswoman in his office stated she had "not heard from Laney" and "did not know when he would be

Floyd County's Republican Party Chairman Kerry Pratt said, "For 150 years the Republicans have been the minority in the Texas legislature, until now--and they have never walked out to prevent a quorum so legislation they didn't like could be stopped. They (the Republicans) stood up there and took their 'beating' like men and women."



the taxpayers of this state will have to foot the bill of at least one, and probably several, special sessions to do the work that

could have been done, and should have been done, in this regular session. But, why worry? It's only money, and taxpayers' money at that.

Floyd County Commissioners spent most of their meeting, Monday, May 12, discussing the 'over budget" problems of the Sheriff's Department.

Commissioners transferred approximately \$7,000 from the county's general fund to cover deputy overtime and supplies at the Sheriff's Department.

"If spending is not controlled at the Sheriff's Department we are looking at them spending \$400,000 this year," said Commissioner Gilroy.

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

City Manager Brown said, "We have fighting roosters being raised in the city limits."

City Manager Brown reported to the council concerning the West Texas Municipal Power Authority and the City of Lubbock. Brown said, "It appears to me we are beginning to get things in line with what our auditor and agreements say we need to do. We were told when the audit was finalized, they would meet with us before giving it to the media.


"For the last four years things have not been going according to our contract with them (the City of Lubbock). I'll know more after this Wednesday's meeting in Lubbock," Brown concluded.

"The structure involved was an older storage building which contained minor equipment, and fortunately there were no injuries" Hannabas said. "However, a lot of very critical buildings sur-



Roll call was answered by "A craft I have made lately", and minutes of the meeting in April were read and approved.


It was announced the next meeting will be May 27 at 12:00 noon. It will be a luncheon by some of the 4-H members who will be going to state with their demonstrations.



Museum to host open house and book signing

Dr. Richard Flint and wife. Shirley Cushing Flint will be at the Floyd County Historical Museum Friday, May 23 from 1:00 until 5:00 p.m. They will be autographing their latest books, which are available for puchase at the museum. The museum will also be hosting its annual Open House that afternoon. Refreshments will be served.

Dr. Flint's book, "Great Cruelties Have Been Reported", provides documentation into the testimony taken in Mexico in 1544 regarding treatment of Native Americans by the Coronado expedition. King Carlos I orderd the investigation under the influence of powerful advocates for Indian rights. Despite the general brutality of the sixteenth-century conquest of the Americas, there was an energetic activism in a group of contemporary Spaniards who led Europe in the first modern national debates on human rights. In addition to transcribing and translating the testimony of various witnesses, Dr. Flint analyzes and annotates it, providing an invaluable resource for researchers in generations to come.

"The Coronado Expedition From The Distance of 460 Years", edited by Dr. Flint and wife Shirley Cushing Flint, contain the papers that were presented at the Coronado Conference held in 2000 at Highlands University in Las Vegas, New Mexico, and at the Plains Baptist Assembly in Blanco Canyon South of Floydada. The book is

dedicated to the memory of Dr. Jack T. Hughes, whose knowledge of and enthusiasm for Texas Panhandle archeology has powerfully influenced research about the Coronado expedition.

Also available for purchase is a limited number of the book 'The Coronado Expedition to Tierra Nueva"", edited by the Flints and published in 1997. It covers the 1540-1542 route across the Southwest by the Coronado Expedition. The book is dedicated to Nancy Marble, genealogist, historian and charter member of the Museum Board of Directors and to the late Jimmy Owens, metal detector virtuoso. Nancy and Jimmy were instrumental in getting archeological work at the Jimmy Owens Site in Floyd County started. A Texas Historical Marker was placed in Blanco Canyon, South of Floydada,, in May of 2001 acknowledging the Jimmy Owens Site as a campsite of the Spanish Explorer Coronado in 1541. Artifacts found in Blanco Canyon from the Coronado Expedition are on display at the museum.

Richard Flint, born in South Dakota, has lived most of his life in Northern New Mexico. He received a Ph.D. in colonial Latin American history and history of the U.S. West from the University of New Mexico. Richard and his wife Shirley Cushing Flint, also a historian, are among the foremost authorities on the Coronado expedition.

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





The local Hesperian-Beacon newspaper and KFLP radio station were both recognized by the board with a Media Honor Roll Resolution for their FISD news coverage.



The board hired one new teacher for the 2003-2004 school year. Michelle Cox was hired to teach Art at FHS.









The College of Human Sciences will award approximately 300 scholarships for the 2003-2004 academic year, totaling a little more than \$300,000.



USDA announce 2003 state EQIP funding

USDA has announced State allocation levels for the 2003 Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP). The EQIP application process is currently underway. NRCS will accept EQIP applications from producers through June 13, 2003.

Some \$1.9 Billion in EQIP funds are available nationwide for 2003, the funds will provide cost-share and technical assistance to farmers and ranchers to initiate conservation practices that will provide environmental benefits.

Texas is slated to receive slightly more than \$130 Million in EQIP funds. According to USDA fact sheets, the Texas allocation will provide approximately \$69 million in technical tion is available on the agency assistance and \$61 million in financial assistance.

EQIP funds are being made available to provide both costshare assistance and to provide technical assistance to farmers and ranchers wanting to initiate table below.

In addition to the regular EQIP finding, additional funds will be available to Texas counties under special allocations targeted at the Ogalalla Aquifer and through the EQIP program's animal feeding operations/confined animal feeding operation (AFO/ CAFO) provisions.

In Texas NRCS works with 216 local Soil and Water Conservation Districts to address local natural resource issues and to identify conservation practices that are most beneficial to the producer and the community. 26th CRP sign-up underway

The Conservation Reserve Program's 26th sign-up began May 5 and runs through May 30, 2003. This is the first general CRP sign-up to be held since the 2002 Farm Bill was signed into law May 13, 2002.

To be eligible a producer or landowner must have owned or operated the land for at least 12 months prior to the close of the CRP sign-up period.

Exceptions to this criteria include a new owner acquiring the land due to the previous owner's death, the ownership change occurred due to foreclosure where the owner exercised a timely right or redemption in accordance with State law, or the circumstance of the acquisition resent adequate assurance to FSA that the new owner did not acquire the land solely for the purpose of placing it in CRP.

Also, current CRP participants with contracts that expire on September 30, 2003 or September 30, 2004 may submit offers during this sign-up period. Producers must visit their local Farm Service Agency office to submit CRP offers.

Offers submitted during the 26th CRP sign-up will be ranked according to the Environmental Benefits Index (EBI). The EBI score cut-off will be determined after the sign-up ends. Offers that have previously met the EBI threshold are not guaranteed a contract under this sign-up.


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


