


Floydada to celebrate Punkin Day

Hail and high winds wipe out more Floyd County crops

Floyd County received some bad weather Sunday night, October 5, with golf ball size hail, high winds, heavy rains and a tornado warning.

A tornado was reported in Swisher County to the north, according to the Lubbock TV stations. The large cloud cluster entered Floyd County just east of Providence around 6 p.m. Tornado sirens were sounded in both


Brothers Farms near South Plains reported to the Hesperian-Beacon, "We lost 500 acres of dryland cotton Sunday night to hail the size of quarters and fifty cent pieces. It was two inches deep on the ground. Our grain sorghum was stripped clean and only about 10 percent of the stalks still have heads on them. A 30 acre field of pumpkins was beat up by the hail.'

Mitch Probasco of Probasco

Preston Belt of DeBruce Ag told the Hesperian-Beacon, "The damage was widespread. It looks like it started southeast of Providence. Bill Sherman at Lone Star lost some pecans and Dan Smith of Sterley had some skylights broken out at his house. We received about 1 inch of rainfall from the storm."


Lockney and Floydada around 7:00 p.m. and 7:30 p.m.



A women's ministry group at Floydada's First United Methodist Church hopes to bring healing to hurting parents who have suffered though pregnancy and infant loss in a special candlelight Remembrance Service, October 14

The ministry group, called "Wings", was first started by v had six miscarriages with little to Nikki Oakes, Robin Hambright, and Shannon Cage. The idea behind "Wings" was to encourage women who "love the Lord" to come together for a common goal"

"Our mission is to equip women through God's word to become Godly women, wives, mothers, and mentors," said Hambright. "Wings ministers to women's needs and when we found out about the Pregnancy has signed a proclamation declar-

Day we knew it would be a wonderful ministry for local women, their husbands, and their friends and family."

The Pregnancy and Infant Loss Remembrance Day was first thought of by a woman named Robyn Bear. After having no support, she felt a day was needed for parents, grandparents, siblings, and friends to unite and remember. Other women joined her in her dream and now the Remembrance Day is supported all over the United States, on October 15.

The month of October has been declared Pregnancy and Infant Loss Remembrance Month. Floydada Mayor Bobby Gilliland

> "The official day is October 15, but we will have our Remembrance Day at FUMC, this year, on October 14." said Hambright. "Everyone has experienced grief," said Cage (who has suffered through a miscarriage). "This can be a healing experience for them."

Nikki Oakes has also experienced a miscarriage. Along with Cage she is eager to minister to others who have been affected by the tragedy of infant loss.

Although Hambright has not been through a miscarriage she also sees an opportunity to minister.

"We want this service to be open to everyone," said Hambright. "Friends and family are also affected by this type of loss and we hope we can all learn how to be more help to those who are going through this grieving."

Cage also emphasizes that fathers very often get left behind. "People forget that the dads are also hurting. We hope to also address that with this type of service.'

Cage said the privacy of individuals will be protected. "We are sensitive to the privacy issue," said Cage. "You're privacy concerning the pregnancy will be protected--but we don't want people to have to suffer in silence.

"The loss of an infant is very often referred to as the 'silent sorrow'. Perhaps your loss came early in the pregnancy and you and your partner did not tell any-

one that you were expecting and so you had no one with whom to share your grief. Maybe you felt like you never had a chance to say goodbye.'

Not only will the service be geared toward sharing grief but resource bags will also be available containing information on local support groups and counseling.

"Families need to know they are not alone, and the miscarriage, stillbirth, and neonatal death are no longer a taboo subject," said Cage.

Although the service will be held at FUMC the ceremony is meant for all denominations, and for both parents and friends.

The October 14 ceremony will begin at 6:30 p.m. with prayer and will include lighting rified in all we do," said Oakes.





Angelo. They will take their wedding trip to Las Vegas at a later date.


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



Floydada and Lockney Volunteer **Fire Departments to receive grants**

U.S. Senator John Cornyn announced recently that the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) has awarded a \$74,899 grant to the Floydada Fire Department and a \$42,210 grant to the Lockney Volunteer Fire Department as part of the Assistance to Firefighters Grant program.

"This funding will help ensure that our brave Texas firefighters will continue to be the best trained and equipped as they stand ready to protect our homes and families," Cornyn said. "I am pleased that some of the tax dollars sent by Texans to Washington are being returned to help save lives among firefighters and the people they serve here in Texas. The safety of our cities and towns is among my highest priorities, and the men and women who protect our hometowns need more support than ever."

"The Assistance" to Firefighters Grant program is a great example of how Homeland Security is putting key resources directly into neighborhoods and communities to better secure the homeland," Department of Homeland Security Secretary Tom Ridge said.

The U.S. Fire Administration (USFA), a branch of FEMA, will administer the grants. Michael D. Brown, Under Secretary of Homeland Security for Emergency Preparedness and Response said, "Providing these funds to the local fire departments is key to President Bush's commitment to support the men and women who protect our communities."

More than \$750 million is on the way from FEMA to supplement the needs of firefighters nationwide. This round of grants will also assist with emergency medical services, safety and firefighting vehicles.

The grants will be made directly to fire departments from FEMA. More than 7,000 grants were received by fire departments across the country. FEMA and the USFA expect to award the remainder of the grants by the end of the year. On March 1, FEMA became part of the Emergency Preparedness and Response Directorate (EPR) of the Dept. of Homeland Security.

Secretary of Agriculture Ann Veneman announced that enrollment for the 2004 Direct and Counter-cyclical Program (DCP) began Oct. 1.

Under the Farm Security and Rural Investment Act of 2002 (FSRIA) producers must sign contracts annually to participate in the DCP, unlike the one-time sign-up process that was installed under the previous farm program.

Producers have until June 1, 2()04, to enroll for the 2004 DCP. Late-filed applications will be accepted through Sept. 30, 2004, if accompanied by a \$100 late fee. Producers can opt out of par-

ticipating in the program any year if they choose. For both the 2002 and 2003 programs, more than 98 percent of the eligible base acres were enrolled.

The 2002 Farm Bill authorizes direct and counter-cyclical payments to enrolled producers. Both payments are computed using the base acres and payment yields established for each farm.



USDA reports that producers will have received some \$8 billion in DCP payments for the 2002 crops, the 2003 crop direct payment, and the first advance counter-cyclical payments (if any) for 2003 crops.

For all years, refunds to USDA's Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC) will be due if there is a violation of eligibility requirements or, in the case of counter-cyclical payments, if the advance payments exceed the final payment rate.


The display can be customized to contain information about the commodities produced in the local area. It includes information on the production of the commodities and the by-products derived from individual commodi-






