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MILO HARVEST IN FLOYD COUNTY-Harvesters are seen Tuesday morning reaping the milo crop on the Whittle & Moss Farms southwest of Floydada in Floyd County. Floyd County Extension Agent J.D. Ragland said, "We have tripled our milo crop this year in Floyd County due to the hailed out cotton earlier. Normally we plant about 40,000 acres of milo, but this year we planted over 120,000 acres. The yields are from 7,500 bushels per acre to 1,500 bushels per acre. It varies from irrigated to dryland."

Gross gets 35 years for assault

Jacob Gross, 24, of Lockney, was sentenced, Wednesday, October 15, to 35 years in prison for aggravated assault with a deadly weapon. The offense occurred June 24, 2003 in Lockney.

After one and half days of testimony, Floyd County jurors found Gross guilty of the offense. Gross chose to be sentenced by Judge Randy Hollums instead of

"He could have gotten anywhere from 5-99 years, and up to a \$10,00 fine" said District Attorney Becky McPherson.

"But because Gross used a 17 inch knife in the commission of the offense he must serve a minimum of 17 1/2 years before he is eligible for parole."

Gross also had a previous record for burglary. "He was sentenced to 7 years for that crime and served 5 years," said McPherson.

"He also stole a car after he committed the offense and he tore up wiring in the Floyd County jail while he awaited the trial. He did approximately \$900 worth of criminal mischief while in the jail.

"All of these factors were considered in the sentencing."

Jurors heard testimony from an 18 year old female victim and Gross himself.

The assault occurred at approximately 3:00 a.m. the morning of October 15. The victim had returned from Plainview and dropped off her parents car at a sleep with her parents. sister's house to be used by the sister the next day.

The victim was walking the one and one-half blocks from her sister's home to her parent's house when the assault took

Crossing Main Street the victim was approached by her former boyfriend, Jacob Gross.

According to the victim, Jacob asked her, "What are you

She answered, "Nothing" The victim stated that Gross then hit her on her head and stomach and knocked her down. She said he pulled a knife and forced her into an alley and threatened to kill her.

The victim related that Gross threatened her on and off for 2 hours and told her he would kill her if she tried to get away.

The victim stated she had sexual intercourse with Gross in order to get away from him.

Gross chose to testify and admitted he had a knife and that he hit and knocked the victim down. However, Gross stated he only intended to scare the woman.

Gross also admitted going into the alley so no one would see the knife, but he contended the sex was consensual.

After the attack the victim went home and told her parents. Police were called and Gross was arrested within 3 hours after the offense.

During the punishment stage Gross testified that he had worked 6 days -- 3 days at one job and 3 days at another. No family members or employers testified on his behalf.

The victim chose not to make a victim impact statement, however her father testified during the trial that she was still so frightened that she would wake up and be too scared to sleep by herself. The father stated the victim would sometimes feel the need to

"Gross asked for a speedy trial and he got one," said McPherson. "I appreciate the citizens in this county. They are very willing to serve as jurors. This makes it easier to have a speedy jury trial."

Gross' lawyer has given notice he plans to appeal.

"It may take up to a year for the Court of Criminal Appeals to decide," said McPherson. "However, Gross will be waiting in prison."

Third man to be charged in burglaries of businesses

According to District Attorney Becky McPherson after two men were arrested for the burglaries, Haggard approached some of the business owners who had been victimized. "He offered to make restitution," said McPherson. "When he went to Payne's Pharmacy, the police were called and a statement was taken."

A burglar alarm sounding off at Kirk and Sons, in Floydada, Sunday, October 12, led to the arrest of 2 men and put a stop to a string of week-end burglaries of downtown businesses.

"The first night, October 10, Rocky Terry, 25, and Gary Haggard, burglarized (entered and stole items) Payne's storage, Bibi's Dream Cuts, and Azteca,' said McPherson. "The Coop Elevator was also broken into but nothing was stolen."

"Sunday night, October 12, Terry and Jimmy Holland, 18, knocked out a window at Caprock Motor Parts but did not go "Most of the stolen items have in. Then a window was broken out at Don Hardy's and property was taken. A window was also broken out at H&R Block--but

nothing was taken." According to police reports after Don Hardy's property was taken to the home of Terry, both Terry and Holland then broke into Kirk and Sons. This burglary activated the alarm. The two were arrested inside Kirk and



Whirlwinds romp to 27-7 victory over the Abernathy Antelopes

Floydada was virtually unstoppable last Friday at Abernathy as the Whirlwinds glided past the Antelopes 27-7 for their second District 5-2A vic-

The 'Winds are now tied with Olton for the top spot in the district standings. The Mustangs blanked Friona 20-0 a week ago. The Whirlwinds improved to 5-1 overall and will host the Lockney Longhorns tomorrow night in the annual battle for football bragging rights in Floyd County.

The Longhorns rebounded from their district-opening, triple overtime loss to Abernathy by knocking off Hale Center 28-12 last week. Abernathy, which dropped to 4-3 for the year and 1-1 in district action, travels this week to district co-leader Olton.

Playing their best all-around game so far this season, The Whirlwinds produced 433 total yards of offense - while limiting Abernathy to only 54 yards rushing and 98 yards passing. Floydada's defense displayed a lot of different looks and successfully shut down Abernathy's spread offense throughout the game. Most of the Antelopes' yardage came in their only scoring drive late in the fourth quar-

Coach Lee Hurt commented, "Our kids came out and played great. They executed the game plan the way we wanted them to ... and we played with great intensity. We knew Abernathy had a good ball club coming in, but we did some great things down in the trenches in controlling the ball on both sides of the line of scrimmage. Our backs blocked well and we made some good decisions on the option.'

The Whirlwind ground attack left Abernathy defenders looking at the back of green helmets as Luke Miller, Gerald Henderson and Chris Wickware each topped the 100-yard rushing mark. It marked the first time since the 2001 Lockney game in which three Whirlwinds reached the 100-yard barrier. Miller led the charge with 127 yards on 15 attempts and two rushing touchdowns. Henderson wasn't far behind with 121 yards on 15 carries and one score. Chris Wickware added 104 yards on 17 attempts

An early Floydada turnover gave Abernathy possession at the Whirlwind 20-yard line.

The Antelopes advanced to the Floydada 16, but two Derrick Brown passes tumbled to the ground and the ball went over on downs to the Whirlwinds. This was the deepest Abernathy would penetrate into Floydada territory until the final two minutes of the

A 9-play, 84 yard drive by the Whirlwinds ended with Miller hitting Ross Bennett with a 33yard scoring strike late in the first quarter. Floydada added another touchdown with a 12-play, 72 yard drive in the second period. Luke Miller crashed over from a yard out to put the Whirlwinds up 12-0. The Whirlwinds tallied again just before the half-time intermission with Miller ending an 8-play, 83-yard drive with a 7-yard touchdown.

Gerald Henderson added the 2-point conversion run to put Floydada in command at 20-0. Floydada's defense held the quick-striking Abernathy offense to three first downs, 32 yards rushing and 24 yards passing in the first 24 minutes.

Holding penalties did more to delay Floydada's momentum than the Antelope defense throughout the contest. The fourth such penalty was called against the Whirlwinds, stalling a drive that opened the second half. Six rather-questionable, 10-yard holding calls were tagged on the Whirlwinds during the game. The Antelopes' big defensive end, Hugo Martinez, intercepted a Luke Miller pass to put an end to Floydada's next threat.

Following Miller's own interception of a half-back pass by Abernathy's Chris Shorter the Whirlwinds overcame their fifth and sixth holding calls to put goether a time-consuming, 62yard scoring march midway through the final stanza. Gerald Henderson carried the final 3 yards of the 11-play drive and added the conversion kick to extend the Whirtlwind lead to 27-0 with only four and one-half minutes remaining on the clock.

The Antelopes excaped a shutout by mounting a 9-play, 58-yard scoring drive following the ensuing kickoff. Derrick Brown connected with Roman Ramirez for a 21-yard touchdown, and Steven Lara added the extra-point, for Abernathy's only score at the 2:14 mark of the fourth quarter.

One of the key statistics of the game was Floydada's ability to maintain possession of the ball. The Whirlwinds controlled the clock 33:15 to Abernathy's 14:45 - an important factor in limiting the Antelopes' quick-strike offense. Coach Hurt commented, "We're just glad to get out of here (Abernathy) with a win. Our kids did a good job of shutting down their running game, especially (Jared) Brock...he is a great running back.

The Whirlwinds held Brock to only 47 yards on 10 carries. The coach added, "We are looking forward to Lockney coming in for the annual Floyd County Championship game. It doesn't matter what the records are...we know it's going to be a great game and a real shoot-out. We've just got to play the best we can and see what happens...you can bet they'll come in with their best

In a series that spans more than seven decades, the Floydada-Lockney matchups have always been one of the highlights of small-town, high school football on the South Plains.

In recent years, the game has had playoff and district title implications as well. In the past twenty years, Floydada has won 11, Lockney has won 8 (including last year's 30-16 victory, which decided the number one seed in the playoffs), and there has been one tie (6-all in 1986). Tomorrow night's game at Wester Field, has a lot more at stake than just the Floyd County Championship. The victor will be one step closer to the post-season playoffs and will have the inside track to the district throne

As always, it will be a



"It was a huge defensive stop for us," Coach Rodgers said. "Not only did it keep them from scoring, but it took some life out of them and we gained some momentum.'


Lockney eventually ran the clock out to secure the 28-12 vic-



Slow start to harvest season

indicative of late crop With weather patterns continuing to fluctuate from warm and mild to cool and wet every few days, High Plains cotton producers appear to be taking more of a wait and see approach to the 2003 harvest season.

Part of that attitude is fueled by an overall reluctance to sink even more money into a late crop that is having a tough time reaching the finish line.

That being said, most observ-

steadily through the end of the month and that November should see the remainder of the area into full harvest mode.

A key to changing producer sentiments is that the cotton that sits in the field today is worth significantly more than it was just a few weeks ago.

With the December 2003 New York futures contract above 70 cents, and opportunities to contract new crop cotton for 70 cents, producers are no doubt rethinking whether the investment in harvest aid treatments will improve their chances of capturing the market prices currently available.

As it currently stands, the majority of the cotton defoliated resides in the areas south of Lubbock. Additional treatments are being made each and every day and ginning activity appears to be on the upswing.

Activity at USDA Cotton Classing offices is one of the better barometers of harvest progress early on. To date, neither the Lubbock nor Lamesa Classing offices have classed more than 20,000 bales of the 2003 crop.

dramatic. To date the Lubbock office has classed just under 13,000 bales of 2003 crop cotton. Through the same time period in 2002 the Lubbock office had already eclipsed the 200,000-bale mark.

Early quality measurements recorded at the Lubbock Classing office have also been good with a majority of the bales having 21 or better color readings and premium range readings in other HVI categories.

As more cotton is received a clearer picture of the crops overall quality will emerge.


