## Gross gets 35 years for assault

Jacob Gross, 24, of Lockney,
was sentenced, Wednesday, October 15 , to 35 years in prison for aggravated assault with a deadly weapon. The offense occurred After one and half days of t timony, Floyd County jurors found Gross guilty of the offense. Gross chose to be sentenced by Judge Randy Hollums instead of
the jury. .
"He could have gotten anywhere from 5-99 years, and up
to a $\$ 10,00$ fine" said District Attorney Becky McPherson. "But because Gross used a 17
inch knife in the commission of inch knife in the commission of
the offense he must serve a minimum of $171 / 2$ years before he is eligible for parole."
Gross also had a previous
record for burglary "He was senrecord for burglary. "He was sen-
tenced to 7 years for that crime tenced to 7 years for that crime
and served 5 years," said McPherson.
McPherson.
"He also stole a car after he
committed the offense and he committed the offense and he tore up wiring in the Floyd
County jail while he awaited the County jail while he awaited the
trial. He did approximately $\$ 900$ trial. He did approximately $\$ 900$
worth of criminal mischief while in the jail.
"All of these factors were con-
sidered in the sentencing," sidered in the sentencing." Jurors heard testimony from

The victim stated that Gr hen hit her on her head and stomach and knocked her down. She said he pulled a knife and forced
her into an alley and threatened to kill her.
The victim related that Gross threatened her on and off for 2 hours and told her he would kill her if she tried to get away.
The victim stated she sexual intercourse with Gross in order to get away from him. Gross chose to testify and admitted he had a knife and that he
hit and knocked the victim down. hit and knocked the victim down.
However, Gross stated he only inHowever, Gross stated he only
tended to scare the woman. Gross also admitted going into the alley so no one would see the knife, but he contended the sex was consensual.
After the att went home and told her parents. Police were called and Gross was arrested within 3 hours after the offense.
