Study shows FISD buildings in need of rehabilitation

puses has revealed major rehabilitation is needed in several areas at Junior High and R.C. Andrews Elementary. Minor improvements are needed at other campuses. Plans are now in progress to address these issues and construction of a new building may be one of the answers.

The study was conducted by the Texas Association of School Administrators (TASA) at the request of the FISD Board.

After the study, TASA recommended that FISD develop a "Master Facilities Plan" which would address the District's needs for the next 10-20 years.

"This is a plan for our future," said FISD Superintendent Jerry Vaughn, "It is not necessarily something that has to be done tomorrow, but there are several areas that have to be addressed quickly.

TASA analyzed the District's facilities and compared them to state and other established standards based on: educational adequacy, health and safety, accessibility, efficiency, flexibility, and

General Conclusions and Recommendations of TASA Study (Which will be addressed by Facility Planning Teams)

1. Establish long-range policies/goals regarding school organization.

2. Develop a facility master plan, addressing the needs for 20 or more years into the future, and the next 10 years.

3. Relocate the junior high school to a new facility on a new and suitably large site, as the district's highest priority. 4. Relocate the intermediate school program to new facilities, possibly moved partly to a new middle school and partly to additions at Duncan Elementary school

5. Regarding replacement of elementary and intermediate school the district's alternatives should be consistent with planning and will likely result in reduced administrative units.

6. Evaluate RCA for reuse for the district's central administrative services, AEP programs, or other public agency use. 7. Evaluate FJHS and associated permanent buildings for use as storage and warehousing facilities or for razing to provide

8. Evaluate the AEP programs future and eventual relocation to a more suitable long-term facility.

9. Evaluate the high school site for expansion; based on options available, determine the facility's better use, as a high school, a middle school, or a 7-12 secondary school.

10. Evaluate the expansion of Duncan Elementary to include grades EE-4, EE-5, EE-6 11. Improve all sites for vehicular access and parking

12. Refurbish both ABD and FHS, as both are of an age where full updating and refurbishing should be done.

13. Provide adequate housing for special needs programs at the appropriate locations. 14. Provide a phased plan for making all schools handicapped accessible.

15. Make all buildings and improvements technology ready, according to the technology plan.

cost to live in a home is \$1,500-\$2,400 per month," said Ross.

The cost to live in an ALC depends on the level of care needed by the resident, and size Approximate rent would be

between \$1,400 and \$2,800.

"We visited facilities in Friona, Olton, Crosbyton, Seminole, Idalou, and Hereford," said

"We are recommending that Floydada look at a Small Type B facility. This would be for residents who require staff assistance to evacuate, are not capable of following directions in an emergency, and require nighttime attendance."

A proposal to be presented by the EDC will be a 16 bed facility which would include 8 studio suites (approx. 350 sq. ft), 6 onebedroom suites (approx. 365 sq. ft), and 2 one-bedroom deluxe suites (approx 550 sq. ft). Estimated cost to build would be \$1.3

'There are several ways we could go about getting an ASL," said Ross.

"We could ask a taxing entity to form a non-profit corporation to operate under that entity and build the center.

'Or, we could ask a taxing entity to form a committee to look into building a Center and find investors to own and operate the

"We need investment seed money which would provide 25% down for financing and operating expenses for one year until the ALC began operating at a profit.

"Whoever owns and operates it would reap the profit benefits,"

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China safeguards decision a victory for U.S. industries

seeking "fair" trade By Shawn Wade

Even though the recent decision by the U.S. Commerce Department's Committee for the Implementation of Textile Agreements (CITA) affects only three relatively small categories of textile imports, it sends a hopeful message to other manufacturing industries that the U.S. is willing to enforce the provisions of the trade agreements we make.

The petitions granted by CITA last Monday involve Chinese imports in only three textile categories: knit fabrics; dressing gowns and brassieres. These categories account for no more than 5 percent of the \$10 billion-plus in Chinese textile and apparel sales that currently flow into the U.S.

For the cotton industry and its textile trade partners the ruling was a small victory in a much larger war to protect not only what remains of the U.S. textile industry, but also the critical new textile industries in the Caribbean Basin and Latin America that utilize mostly U.S. grown cotton.

The decision should send a clear message to current and future U.S. trading partners that we expect them to abide by the trade agreements they sign to gain further access to the U.S. market-

The Bush Administration's decision to invoke the safeguard rule is intended to get China to fully comply with its WTO obligations and puts the ball in China's court by first opening a consultation process between the countries to develop a plan to limit Chinese imports in these categories.

If no agreement is reached, the U.S. then has the option to arbitrarily cap any further rise in Chinese imports in these categories to 7.5 percent above the amount of product that entered the U.S. during the first 12 months of the 14 months preceding the request for consultation.

"The reality of trading with China has always been that, regardless of the agreements they enter into, they will trade when it is to their advantage to do so," says PCG Executive Vice President Steve Verett. "Past history shows that the U.S. has maintained a very liberal trade policy overall. How else could we post a total 2002 trade deficit of \$418 billion with the rest of the world, of which \$103 billion is with China alone.

"For me the most important part of this decision is that the Administration is finally saying we expect our trading partners to deal with us fairly and that the only acceptable way to do that is to abide by the rules.'

The most feared impact by U.S. cotton growers would be that China will quit buying U.S. cotton to make up their current fiber shortage.

Market analysts believe that implementation of the China safeguard provision will ultimately amount to little more than a bump in the road to future Chinese sales.

Chinese demand has already spurred them to purchase over 2.5 million bales of U.S. cotton to date and another one million is forecast to be needed down the

Any slowdown that analysts foresee will be caused more from the fact that China has already booked enough cotton to meet their immediate needs.

In public, China can now vociferously object to the U.S. action, threaten to buy the cotton they need elsewhere and then take a wait and see approach to purchasing the additional supplies they need from the U.S. when prices move in their favor.

There is little disagreement that significant damage has been done to the U.S. textile industry and that much of it is directly and indirectly the result of Chinese

The real danger for cotton producers trying to sell their cotton is the fact that most of the U.S. market share that China has gained has been at the expense of the textile exporting countries of Latin America, countries of the Caribbean Basin and to a certain extent Asia, all of whom have been good customers for U.S.

In the case of the Caribbean Basin and Latin America, many U.S. textile companies have strong ties with the textile industries in these countries and provide a competitive alternative to Chinese textile goods with the added bonus of buying mostly U.S. cotton.

Cotton Market Weekly A service provided by Plains Cotton Cooperative Association

Prices on the New York Cotton Exchange (NYCE) continued their retreat this week with the approach of first notice day for the December futures contract. Selling pressure came from rollover of December positions into March.

In other news, temporary import quotas were imposed on Chinese bras, knit fabric and dressing gowns. The sanctions were imposed on China in response to the U.S. textile industry's petition to invoke safeguard relief in accordance with China's WTO agreement. Under the terms of the agreement, WTO members may request consultations with China if it is thought the pace of imports threaten orderly market development. Following a review, the Committee for the Implementation of Textile Agreements, chaired by the United States Commerce Department, voted to invoke the safeguard on behalf of the U.S. textile industry.

Analysts said the trade dispute could put a snag in U.S. cotton sales to the country but probably only in the short term.

"The Chinese still are facing a woeful shortage of fiber due to a disastrous crop," one market observer said. "Equally important, the only major source of cotton going into 2004 is the United States, and I don't think there's any other country that has the quantity and quality of cotton that we could provide," he concluded.

USDA, in its closely followed November supply/demand report, estimated Chinese cotton production at 22.0 million bales, down sharply from the 25.5 million bales forecast in the department's previous report. Additionally, the country's consumption of cotton now is expected to hit the 30.20 millionbale mark with imports pegged at 7.0 million bales, according to

Because China is simultaneously the world's largest cotton producer and consumer, cot-

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ton futures on the NYCE shot to an 8-year high of 86 cents per pound at the height of the buying frenzy last month. Therefore, the possibility of year-long sanctions on several Chinese manufactured textile and apparel products and the country's potential retaliation was big news for the market this week.

Cotton futures on the NYCE closed at weaker levels Thursday despite a round of bullish export sales figures released by USDA. In the week ended Nov. 13, the department reported net export sales of U.S. cotton totaled 527,000 bales, a 17 percent boost from the previous week, but 24 percent lower than the four-week

Once again, China was the primary buyer of U.S. cotton for the week with purchases totaling 196,500 bales. Mexico and Turkey purchased smaller quantities of cotton totaling 132,000 and 104,200 bales, respectively. For the same week, export shipments to China totaled 40,900 bales which brings the season's total commitments to 2.7 million bales for the country.

Meanwhile, online sales by Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas producers in the five trading days ended Nov. 20 totaled 12,521 bales compared to 14,837 bales the previous week. Prices received by producers selling their cotton online ranged from 62.86 to 69.63 cents per pound versus the previous week's 69.12 to 70.61 cents per pound range.

The National Agricultural Statistics Service reported 71 percent of the U.S. cotton crop had been harvested across the Cotton

seven percentage points higher than the same time one year ago but seven percentage points less than the five year average. Harvesting was complete in Louisiana and virtually finished in Mississippi. Good progress was reported in other cotton producing states although Texas remains well behind normal. Only 49 percent of the Texas crop had been harvested compared with the 60 percent five-year average.

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


FIRST LOAD OF SESAME SEEDS IN FLOYD COUNTY-

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
