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Commissioners vote to vacate jail Prisoners transferred to Dickens County

Responding to a letter from the Texas Commission on Jail Standards which cancelled variances for the Floyd County Jail, and a lack of liability insurance, Floyd County Commissioners voted on Monday, December 8, to close the Floyd County Jail.

Within a few hours, 7 prisoners were loaded onto a van and transported to Dickens County Jail. Floyd County Jailers were terminated and given 4 weeks pay by the Commissioners, and in an emergency meeting the Floydada City Council moved to take legal action against the county if necessary.

During the Commissioners Court meeting Judge Hardin read the letter from the Texas Jail Standard, which stated: "In response to the report issued by the Fire Marshall Darrell Gooch, we recommend that until a structural engineer can inspect the facility, you vacate the Floyd County Jail immediately. Due to the fact that continuation of the variances for the Floyd County Jail has been dependent upon maintaining a safe and secure facility, these variances have been cancelled."

The road to closure began for the jail with a jail standards inspection around February 21st, according to Judge Hardin.

The jail failed inspection and inspectors said that electrical work would have to be inspected by the fire marshall

According to Hardin, between \$4,000 and \$5,000 was spent to fix the electrical problems and then the fire marshall was called in to inspect.


After inspection Fire Marshall (and Floydada Police Chief) Darrell Gooch issued a report which said "the front of the building has deteriorated to the point that it is unsafe. Large cracks exist between the bricks in which the mortar has weathered away. The two columns attached to the front of the building are on the verge of collapse. Concrete, mortar, and bricks have cracked with support the weight of the two pil-

Gooch also cited many electrical code violations, fire wall concerns, electrical conduit problems, and the lack of fire escapes.

"One of our variances included the fire escape on the 2nd and 3rd floor," said Hardin. "Our liability insurance was cancelled because it did not pass inspection. Our variances are now gone. The Jail Standards says to vacate. I don't think we have a choice except to close the jail."

A motion by Commissioner Craig Gilly and seconded by Ray Nell Bearden was made to contract with Dickens County Jail for \$38.00 per day to house Floyd County prisoners.

The Commissioners then unanimously voted to vacate the jail, and to give Judge Hardin the

County Jailers out of work

With the vote to close the jail this week, Floyd County Commissioners were then faced with the decision to terminate the 4-6 jailers employed by the County.

"These are hard times for people and a terrible time to lose your job," said Commissioner Ray Nell Bearden.

Commissioners said the county was paying approximately \$8,000 per month in jailer's salary, and the money will now be used to house inmates at the Dicken's County Jail.

Commissioner Lennie Gilroy made a motion to pay the terminated jailer 4 weeks pay beginning with the day the prisoners were picked up by the Dickens County jailers. This was approved unanimously.

During open forum a citizen attending the meeting asked commissioners why they did not raise taxes to build a new jail.

Bearden responded, "My constituents consist of a lot of single women and they don't have the money to pay more taxes. They are barely making it now."

According to County Judge Bill Hardin the jail costs the county up to \$150,000 per year, which includes jailer's salaries,

inmates food, insurance, and inmate medical costs.

"We average about 10 inmates and Dickens County will be charging \$38 per day, per inmate," said Hardin. "This will cost the county \$380 per day, or \$138,700 per year."

Hardin said it is impossible to know what the bottom line will be until after the engineer's report on the structure safety of the jail. "We don't know how much it will cost to fix up the jail to meet standards, and whether we will be able to open up any floors again."

County ponders future use of jail building

Confusion over the future of the jail has law enforcement and city and county officials scrambling to make immediate, and future, plans for the housing of prisoners.

Police and governing officials are trying to find the best way to transfer prisoners to Dickens County, and not leave their patrol areas unprotected.

The County is faced with no place to "hold" prisoners until an engineer declares the building "safe". If that ruling comes, the County will have an option to open the first floor to "hold" prisoners awaiting transfer to Dicken's County.

According to Jail Standards inspector Terry Julian, the Texas Jail Standards Commission will work with the County to "resolve issues" "If the building is declared

safe then the possibility of quickly turning the first floor into a holding area is very possible,"

"The detox cell could easily be turned into a holding cell, and appropriate accommodations could be made to hold female prisoners separately.'

According to Julian jailers would not have to stay at the jail

The decision by the Commissioners led to quick action by the Floyd County Jailers and Sheriff Gilmore. Prisoners were prepared and then transported by Dickens County to the Dickens County Jail.

Dickens County Jail contracts with other counties, including Lubbock, and in New Mexico, to house prisoners.

The immediate problem now facing the municipalities and the county is what to do with the short term "holding" of prisoners after their arrest and arraignment by the magistrate.

The transport of prisoners for cities and the county who are already operating on limited manpower is of major concern to all law enforcement officers.

The trip to and from Dickens County to deliver a prisoner could tie up an officer for 3-5 hours, during which time the cities would be left without a pa-

How many of you take the time to go to our city council meetings to see the process in our cities? I don't know about Floydada, but in Lockney there's not many citizens that do. But we're always ready to go gripe or state our dissatisfaction with things when it is too late or after the situation has gotten to the point of making a decision as Mondays.

Have you looked around in our county to see what is going on? What is going on in rural America? We are losing tax base daily.

How many of our seniors in Lockney and Floydada are going to come back to Floyd county to work and raise there families? Have you thought about that. I'm sure you have.



TPWD says pheasant numbers improving

ber 13th bird hunters will comb the Panhandle landscape, searching for the explosion and adrenaline-rushing cackle of long-tailed roosters. According to Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD) Biologists, pheasant hunters will find a more favorable season than last, but still a far cry from the old "hay days"

of the early '80s. Pheasant roadside surveys conducted annually by TPWD personnel indicate that pheasant numbers are up slightly compared to last year. However, Jeff Bonner, TPWD Wildlife Biologist, points out that "last year's surveys were the lowest in 25 years, and while this year's surveys show some improvement they still represent the 3rd lowest counts during that same time period"

Counties that yielded the most birds per route were Bailey, Deaf Smith, Floyd, Ochiltree, Roberts, and Sherman. Success will still depend on the type of area hunted. "Those hunting areas that have tall, weedy playa lakes and CRP fields, adjacent to fields of corn and milo, should have no problem filling their 2-bird bag

limit," Bonner predicts. The long-term pheasant population trend is declining. Most biologists agree that a change in farming practices is one of the primary causes. During the 1980s, the popular row-irrigation practice, with resulting weedy ditches and tail-water pits, gave way to the efficiency of centerpivot irrigation systems and cleaner farming methods. The decline of irrigated grain acreages and wheat-fallow crop rotation that typically included a 14-month fallow period has been supplanted by more intensive cropping systems. In 1985, the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) was designed to conserve and improve soil and water resources by converting highly erodible farmland to permanent vegetation. The permanent vegetative cover afforded by CRP has probably been beneficial to pheasants, but not enough to

As dawn breaks on Decem- compensate for the 20-year decline in the quality of large and small grain agriculture habitats.

Although the long-term trend is not encouraging, localized areas that provide proper habitat components in the right arrangement and receive adequate moisture harbor a tremendous number of birds. What is good habitat? "These are areas having the proper type and condition of vegetation to provide food items and cover for nesting, brood-rearing and loafing," according to Bonner. Panhandle pheasant habitat consists of playa lake basins, grain fields with adequate cover, Conservation Reserve Program fields, playa lake edges, field borders, and road rights-ofways. "Landowners and operators that guard against overgrazing in the playa lake basins, maintain a 15-inch cutting height during grain harvest, and leave a few standing rows of milo or corn during harvest will be on the right track to having pheasants," says Bonner.

Hunting opportunities can be found by contacting the local Chamber of Commerce or other community organization offices in towns of the county where you wish to hunt. TPWD also provides pheasant hunting opportunity on several properties enrolled through the Short Term Public Hunting Lease Program. For 2003 those purchasing the Annual Hunting Permit and having a hunting license can access approximately 1,900 acres in Hansford County. The 30-day hunting season runs from Saturday, December 13, 2003 through Sunday, January 11, 2004 in the Texas Panhandle. Legal shooting hours are from one half hour before sunrise to one half hour after sunset. The daily bag limit is 2 roosters per hunter (4 in possession). Hen harvest is not allowed. TPW requires that one leg, including the spur or all feathers remain attached to the pheasant until it reaches its final destination. All hunters must possess a Texas hunting license; there are no special tag require-

"Long range decisions need to be made by the Commissioners," said Julian. "They can't continue to patch, patch, patch. This is an old building with old wiring, old plumbing, etc. It is an old and used up building:'

When asked if the variances

would be reinstated to the county if the building was declared safe, Julian said those determinations would have to be made after the inspections.

According to Judge Hardin the engineer will not be available to inspect the structure safety of the jail until January. No plans can be made about the future of holding cells on the first floor until that time.



Emergency farm loan applications being accepted

By Becky Rainer

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by excessive rain, hail, high winds, and static electricity that occurred on June 22,2003; drought, high winds, static electricity, and heat that occurred on June 1, 2003, and continuing: excessive rain, flash flooding, hail, high winds, and lightning that occurred on June 4,2003, through June 20,2003; excessive rain, hail, and high winds that occurred from June 1, 2003, through June 30,2003; flooding, hail, and high winds that occurred from May 20,2003 through June 25,2003, are being accepted at the Farm Service Agency (FSA) located in Floydada, Farm Loan Manager, Becky Rainer, said today.

Floyd and Crosby Counties have been named as primary and/

or contiguous counties recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Ann Veneman eligible for loans to cover production.

Rainer said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest is 3.75 percent.

As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FSA emergency loan," Rainer said. Farmers participating in the Federal Crop Insurance program will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss

Applications for loans under

this emergency designation will be accepted until July 6,2004, but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming season," Rainer said.

FSA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U.S. citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S. citizens hold a majority interest.

The FSA office in Floydada is open from 8:00 a.m.to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday.

The first week of December provided High Plains agriculture a chance to showcase itself by playing host to two different, but equally important and informative events.

The week started with the arrival of members of the House Agriculture Committee General Farm Commodities and Risk Management Subcommittee in Lubbock for a field hearing on federal crop insurance. The hearing was held in Lubbock at the request of Rep. Randy Neugebauer.

Chaired by Rep. Jerry Moran of Kansas, the hearing was attended by three other members of the subcommittee: Neugebauer, Rep. Collin Peterson of Minnesota, and Rep. Mike Ross of Arkansas. HAC Ranking Minority Member Charlie Stenholm of Stamford was also present.

The hearing provided the Subcommittee with producer feedback on the effectiveness of the federal crop insurance program and many new ideas that could enhance the risk management products available to producers.

Plains Cotton Growers President Mark Williams presented testimony at the hearing. PCG's comments included a number of ideas for program improvements and referenced issues that PCG is working with the USDA Risk Management Agency to resolve.

PCG's testimony provided suggestions for new combination products based on the Group Risk Plan (GRP) of insurance such as a GRP/Hail or a GRP/CAT (Catastrophic Risk Policy). PCG's goal is to add an element of individual protection to the GRP policy to provide effective alternatives to producers who cannot obtain adequate coverage through a traditional MPCI policy.

In the same vein, PCG also suggested producers be allowed to purchase different levels of coverage on units based on production practice instead of being locked into one coverage level across both irrigated and non-ir-

rigated units.

Williams concluded by high-lighting issues that PCG is working on such as deferred appraisal periods for non-emerged seed, quality loss adjustment procedures, boll count appraisal procedures, and written agreement

The meeting also provided organizations representing Texas farmers and ranchers an opportunity to work face-to-face with federal and state officials that create and implement key agricultural programs. Add the insight gained on national and state issues and the event was a re-

sounding success.

Speakers at the 2003 Symposium were: Juan Garcia, Texas State Farm Service Agency; Dr. Ed Smith, Texas A&M University; Ross Davidson, Jr., USDA Risk Management Agency Administrator; Texas House Members Rick Hardcastle and David Swinford; and Floyd Gaibler, Deputy Under Secretary USDA Farm and Foreign Agricultural Services.

Topics discussed included payment limitations, farm programs, international trade, crop insurance and risk management, as well as key statewide issues that affect agriculture like school finance reform.

For Plains Cotton Growers it provide~ an opportunity to make progress on unresolved Crop Disaster Program (CDP) implementation issues, the Conservation Reserve Program and Federal Crop Insurance.

At the top of PCG's insurance issue list was finding ways to offer cotton insurance in northern panhandle counties where producers are diversifying operations to include cotton. Also addressed were the issues of deferred appraisal periods for nonemerged seed and secondary crop coverage.

FSA announces closing date for DCP sign-up

Agriculture Secretary Ann M. Veneman announced that January 30, 2004 would mark the close of the current Crop Disaster Program (CDP), which provides payments for producers who suffered 2001 or 2002 crop-year losses due to natural disaster. The CDP was authorized by the Agricultural Assistance Act of 2003.

Since the start of the program, which opened on June 6, 2003, USDA has issued \$2.2 billion in benefits to about 325,000 farmers across the country.

USDA is encouraging anyone who suffered a qualifying loss to make an appointment with his or her county Farm Service Agency office and take advantage of this assistance.

Under the program, eligible producers are reimbursed for qualifying crop production and quality losses for either the 2001 or 2002 crop years. Payments are issued for losses exceeding 35 percent of expected production. Producers with quality losses of at least 20 percent could also seek reimbursement on certain grops.

Eligible producers who did not have crop insurance or Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program coverage during the year of the disaster must agree to purchase coverage for each of the

next two crop years,

Producers required to sign contracts annually

Producers wanting to receive advance direct payments in December under the Direct and Counter-cyclical Program (DCP) must sign their 2004 DCP contracts before the end of the year, according to the head of the Floyd County Farm Service Agency

The Farm Security and Rural Investment Act of 2002 introduced the Direct and Countercyclical Program, which requires producers to sign a new contract every year. This is a change from the old Production Flexibility Contracts, which were good for seven years.

The Direct and Counter-cyclical Program offers eligible farmers and ranchers direct cash payments based on acres and yields established for each farm. Producers can elect to receive their direct payments as a lump sum

in October or as two partial payments—an advance payment of up to 50 percent of the total and a final payment for the remainder.

When electing to receive two partial payments the producer also selects the month in which to receive the advance payment - that's where timing is critical.

Producers who, for tax or other purposes, want to receive an advance payment this month, have to sign their 2004 DCP contracts in the next few weeks so the advance direct payments can be issued by December 31.

Regardless of which month a producer selects for the advance direct payment, final payments are made in October, following the end of the fiscal year.


