Eddie Lee Fortenberry, of Lockney, had the grand champion and reserve grand champion lamb.

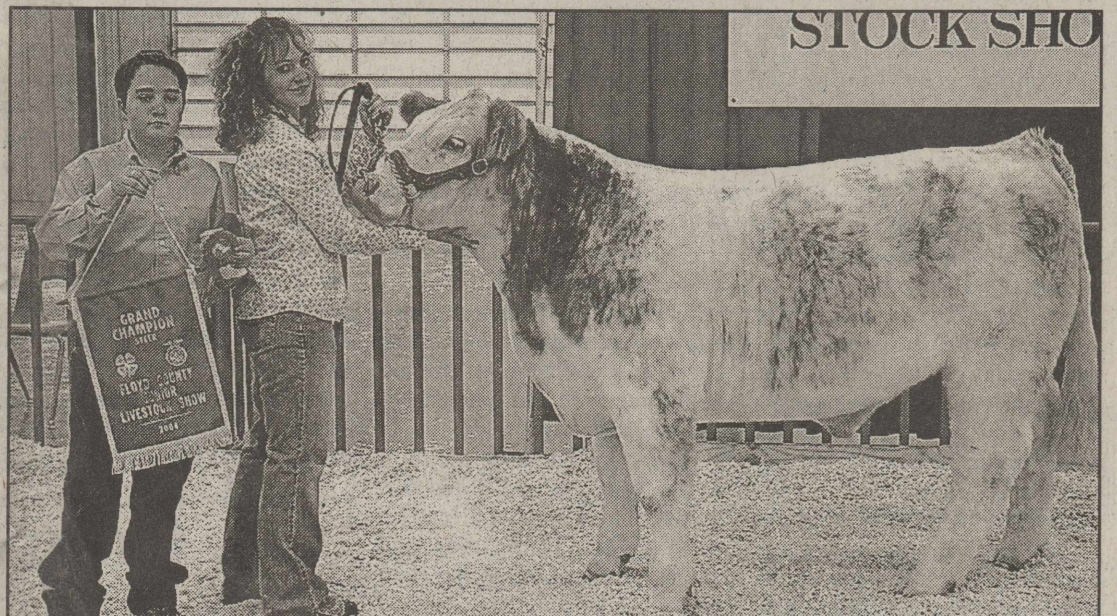
In the Heifer Show, the Supreme Champion Heifer was won by Tylee Jo Williams' Angus. Tylee Jo lives in the Providence Community.

The grand champion steer was a Cross Breed, shown by Karah Hrbacek, of Lockney.

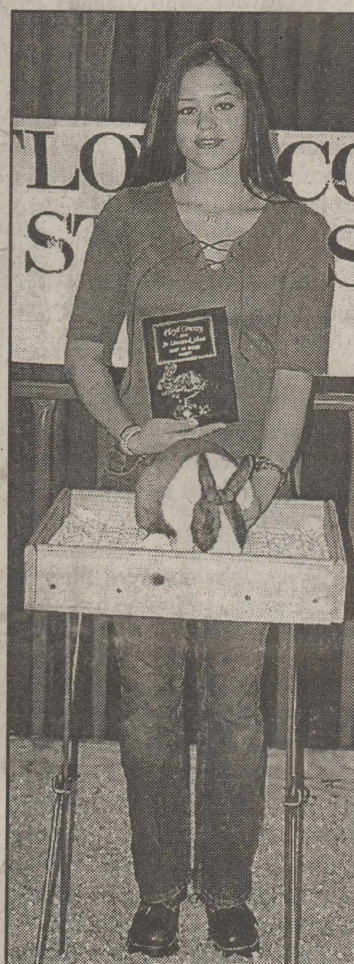
Syann Foster, of Lockney, showed the reserve champion heifer, and Brady Ragland, of Floydada, had the reserve grand



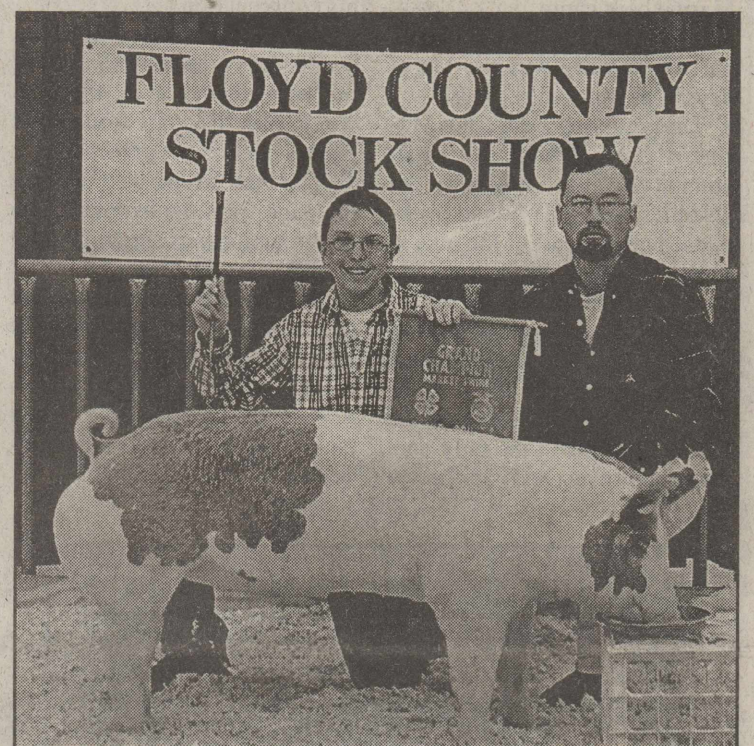

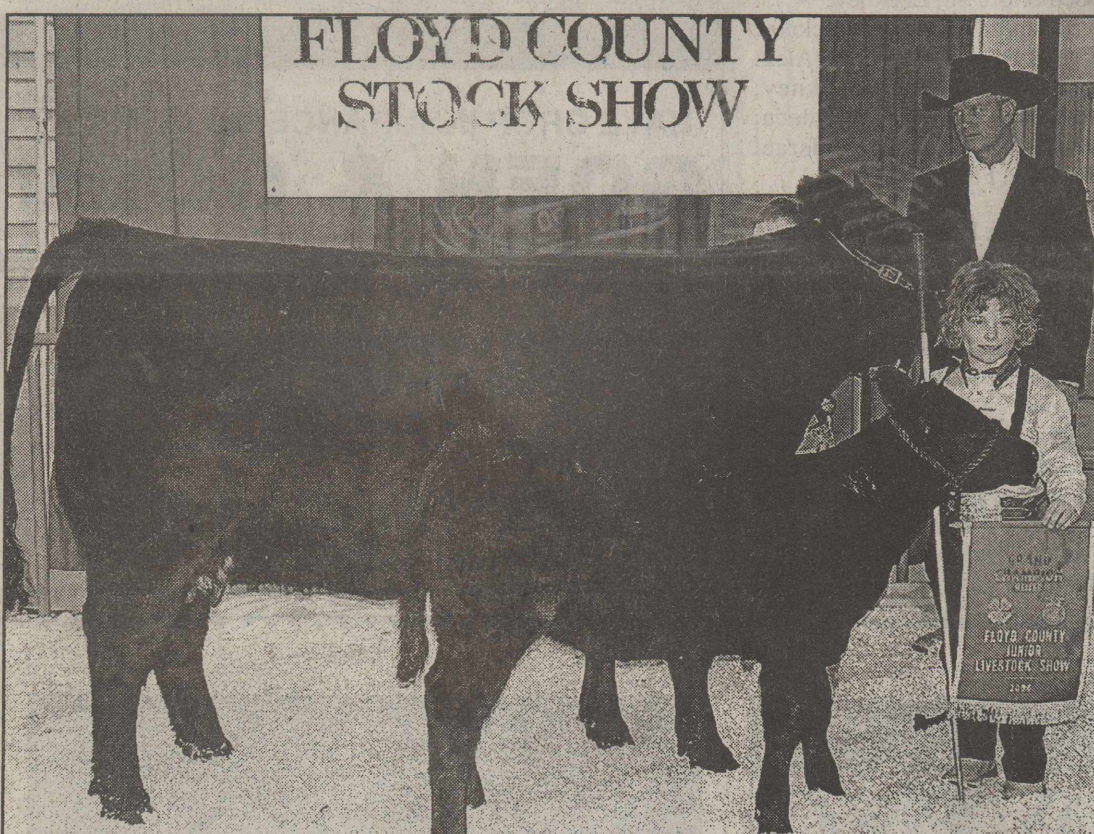

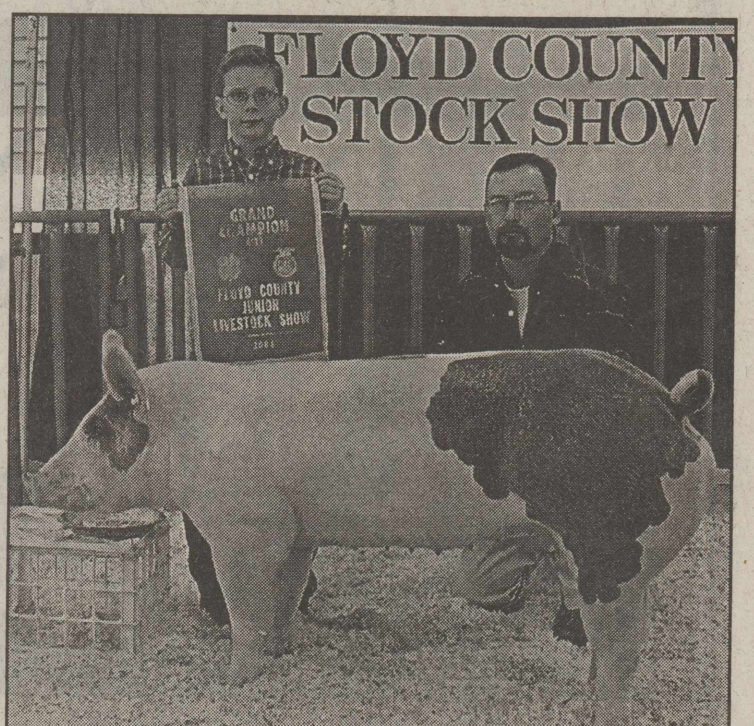

Glover celebrates 102 years

Bessie Glover, of Floydada, will celebrate her 102 birthday, January 29, at Floydada Rehab and Care Center.

The daughter of John Abner Hartley and Nora Lee Gray, Bessie was born in Jones County, Texas in January of 1902.

Raised on a farm in Anson, Bessie and her two sisters and two brothers were taught to work hard. The family moved to Floyd County in 1917 when Bessie was 15.

In an interview in the "South Plains Centenarians", Bessie

said, "We came to pull cotton and we lived in a tent. It was supposed to be temporary, but we decided to stay. The land was sandy and there were lots of grass burs.

Bessie recalls liking school and remembers her spelling and arithmetic matches every Friday.

Most of the time Bessie walked to school, but there were occasions she would travel by horseback and leave the horse tied to a tree.

Some of Bessie's most memorable events were "run-aways" in wagons and when a horse ran away with her as she was returning from school.

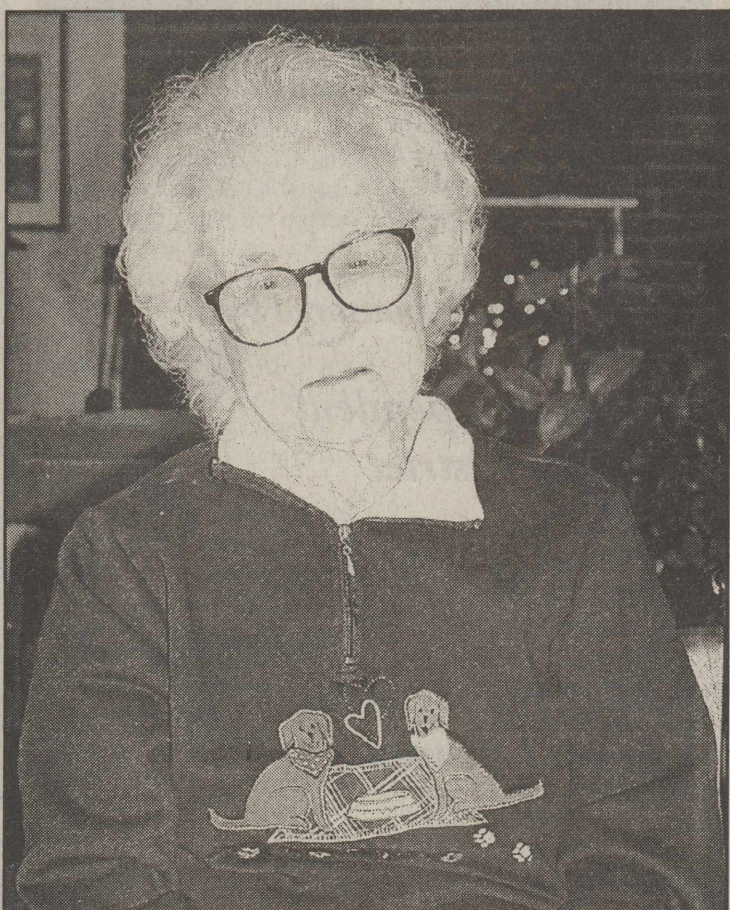
"I could not move," said Bessie. "I was just still and did not realize I could just pull the reins to make the horse stop."

Bessie worked in the fields after school and says she loved the work. She picked and hoed

cotton with family and friends and loved to race down the rows with her mother. She remembers many family members picking a bale of cotton, individually, and ginning it in one day.

When the day's work was done, the Hartley family gathered around to enjoy the guitar playing of their mother, and their father on the violin.

The family played baseball and other games, such as roof-

Valentine Deadline

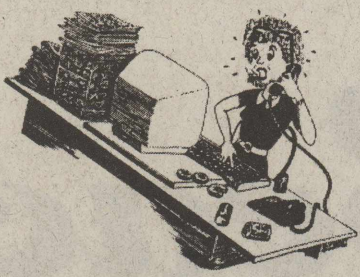
The deadline to submit a photograph of your child, grandchild, or another favorite person, is February 5. The special edition will be printed February 12.

We see by the papers where George Bush has finally said something about immigration. It's still a little early, in political terms, so we don't have all the details yet. Consequently we can't say for sure whether we like, or don't like, what the President is proposing.

About all we know for sure is that Mr. Bush has no credibility with us when speaking about immigration. His principal purpose, when dealing with this particular immigration issue, is to increase his share of that voting bloc now called "Hispanic." To the extent that that particular voting bloc includes other derivatives among voting blocs, well and good. If the society at large suffers, tough. Pandering to various voting blocs didn't seem to hurt Lyndon Johnson a bit (or any other previous President), no matter the effect on the society at large, and George's political

handlers have obviously taken note. The fact that a majority of Hispanics take a dim view of the move to bring in more citizens of Mexico, Guatemala, Nicaragua, or wherever, to compete in the labor market is discounted by an Administration that panders to the Wal-Marts of this world.

The number of illegal immigrants now in the United States is astronomical, and growing. Until now, the President has only hinted at tackling the problem. Guesses, so-called "educated" guesses, place the number of illegal immigrants somewhere between 8 and 12 million. Our schools, our hospital emergency rooms, our "free" clinics are swamped by patients that must be treated, but who cannot pay. So taxpayers pick up the tab. A few Congressmen have tried to do their bit to stem the flow and make some sense out of the mess, but they have had no help from the President. Well-heeled corpo-

rations, along with a few well-heeled bishops and preachers, have made a mockery of our laws, insisting that they answer to a higher law and that other Americans must do the same. In their efforts to change, or ignore, our laws, they have been aided by too many editorial writers in the pay of giant media conglomerates.

The President says, in agreeing to tackle the immigration mess, that our laws are "broken" and that something must be done. Well said. But the reason the laws are broken is in plain sight. Any number of politicians have refused to touch the problem, and those few who did have had no help from the President. Laws are on the books, and have been for many years, that would curtail the flow of illegal immigrants across our borders, but those laws have not been enforced. In fact, impediments have been placed in the path of enforcement at just about every turn. (Until recently, for instance, a local law enforcement officer, upon apprehending an illegal immigrant, would have to contact the "proper" immigration authorities for disposition of the case, regardless of the fact that the illegal immigrant was violating American laws simply by being here. By the time "proper" authorities had been found, notified, and had gotten around to the task at hand, the "illegal" was long gone, having melted into the millions upon millions of others illegally in this country.)

We do not object to the President's stated goal of helping match willing workers with willing employers. How he goes about reaching that goal is an-

other matter. For entirely too long the whole process has been left to whims of chance, a chance that the illegal immigrant might get safely past immigration officers, a chance that some cousin might, or might not, notify the police, a chance that some employer might ignore the law, a chance that those powers that be might, or might not, take a dim view of lawbreakers. So we welcome a debate on the matter. We hope that in the process the simple element of truth not take a back seat to political maneuvers.

We have never been favorably disposed toward the idea of allowing law breakers to get in line ahead of those who obey the law. To us it goes against the grain of everything we were taught as youngsters, and in fact, is abhorrent to the glue that holds the fabric of our society together. Perhaps some who grew up in the lap of luxury are not concerned about such things, but those of us who worked cotton fields under the broiling sun of South Texas are concerned. And we don't think we are alone.

The President of Mexico takes the position that the President of the United States' proposals are good as the go, but that they don't go far enough. He says publicly that Mexico "wants more". Talk about looking a gift horse in the mouth.

Still, he probably will get "more." A few well chosen words at the proper time might work wonders for Mr. Bush, just as a few well chosen words from Ariel Sharon just before election time might work wonders too. About all we can do is pray that their happiness is translated to America's benefit.

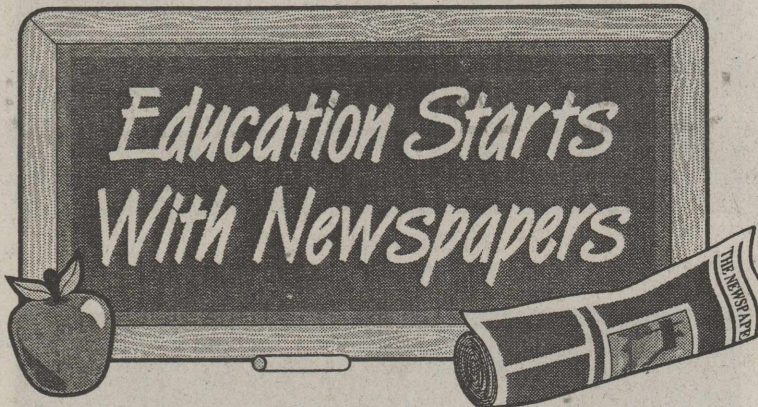

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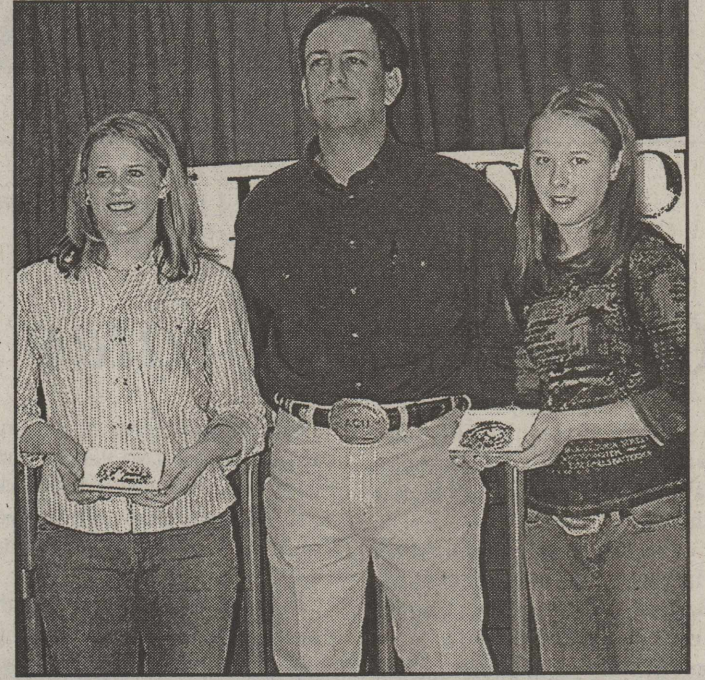
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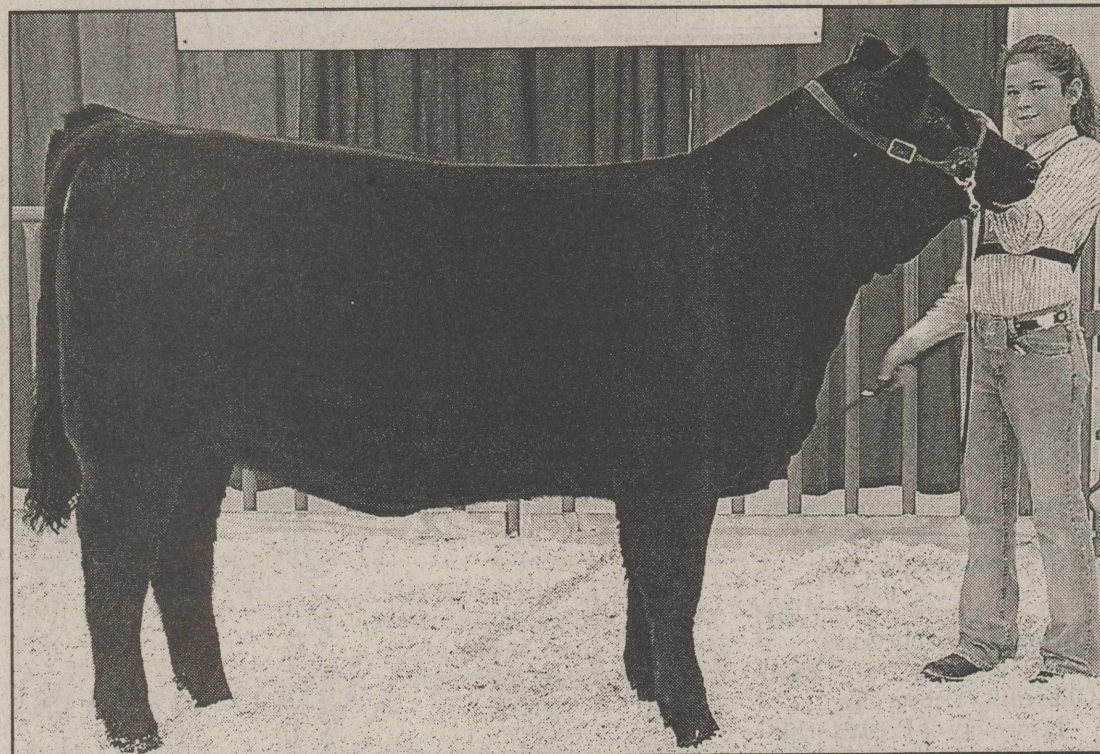

over-the-river, and "snap". Parties and summertime fishing were favorites.

The family were members of the local Baptist Church located several miles away. "We especially enjoyed the revivals held at the different area churches," said Bessie.

Bessie recalls lots of candy at Christmas and "I always got a new doll and the boys got pop guns and tricycles."

Bessie married Jessie Glover (another violin player) in 1920. They lived in the Baker Commu-

nity until 1924 and then moved to Mayview where their son, Tresmon (also known as Jess), was born in 1924. In 1929 they moved to Dougherty and a daughter, Juanell, was born. From 1932 to 1935 the family lived in the Fairview Community and in the mid 30's and early 40's they lived in the Campbell Commu-

nity. In 1946 the family moved back to Dougherty where Jessie farmed with mules instead of farm machinery. Bessie became the babysitter for the children in the community and helped plant

wheat, maze, and cotton.

The Glovers were named Pioneer Couple at the 1986 Old Settler's Reunion in Floydada.

Jessie Glover died October

27, 1991. Bessie's daughter, Juanell Krambeck, lives in Denison, Texas. Tresmon lives in Madill, Oklahoma.

Bessie still enjoys good music and loves family visits. She has 5 grandchildren, 11 great grandchildren, and 6 great-great grandchildren.

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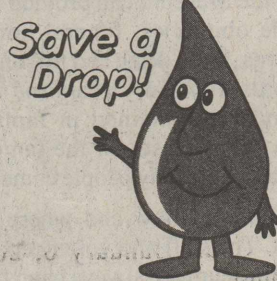
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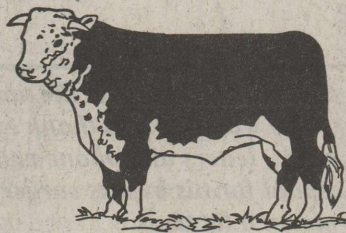
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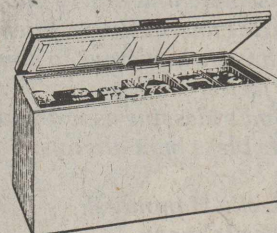

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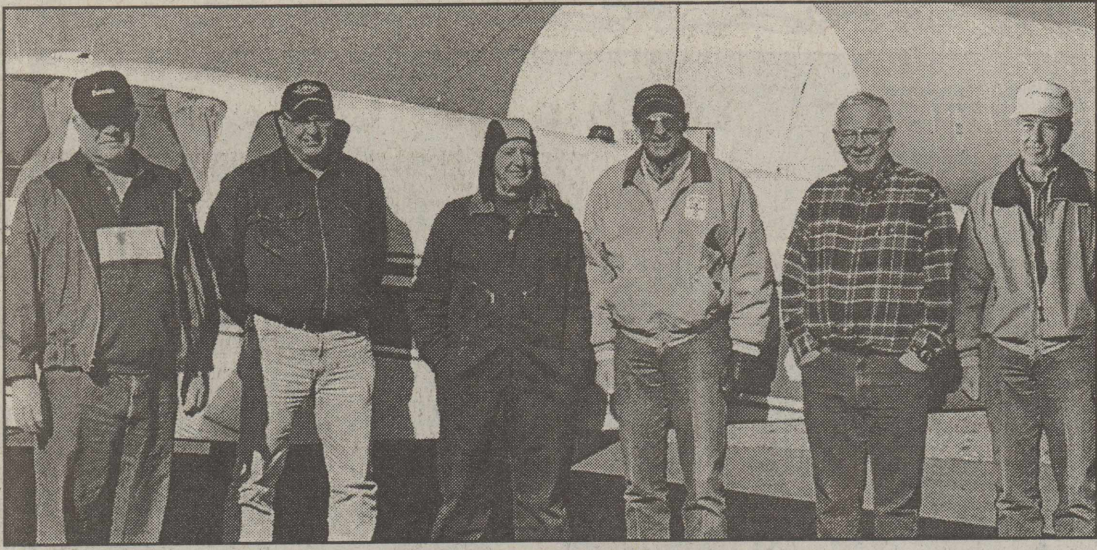

Emergency farm loan applications now being accepted by U.S.D.A.

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by excessive rain, hail, and high winds that occurred from May 31 through June 11, 2003, are being accepted at the Farm Service Agency (FSA) located in Floydada.

Floyd and Crosby Counties have been named as primary and/or contiguous counties recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Ann Veneman eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the above disasters.

Farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 100% of their actual losses or the operating loan

needed to continue in the agricultural business, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest is 3.75 percent.

As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FSA emergency loan. Farmers participating in the Federal Crop Insurance program will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until August 19, 2004, but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays

in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming season.

FSA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U.S. citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S. citizens hold a majority interest.

The FSA office in Floydada is open from 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday.

As the U.S. cotton harvest nears completion, the industry's focus turns to the 2004 crop. Analysts say the expected gap between world cotton production and consumption should make the upcoming year "interesting." The U.S. still is expected to fill the major portion of the discrepancy between the world's cotton production and its needs in 2004, but China, a major importer of U.S. cotton, hopes to produce more of its own cotton to decrease the need for imports.

"As usual, we will keep an eye on China," said David Stanford, vice president of marketing for Plains Cotton Cooperative Association. "Due to a tremendous shortfall between its use and production, China will depend heavily on an increase in domestic cotton production. It will be interesting to see if producers there will plant more acres to cotton with grain prices as attractive as they are, and if they can maintain or improve their cotton yields on any of the new acreage that is planted," he explained.

Brazil also is a country to keep an eye on in the upcoming year. According to analysts, the size of the country's cotton crop could have an impact on the world market if producers there substantially increase production and

Brazil becomes a serious exporter of cotton. Closer to home, although it still is too early to forecast cotton plantings for the 2004 season, some producers in the Delta have indicated they intend to increase their acreage. A 10 to 15 percent rise in plantings is expected in Louisiana, up from the 550,000 acres planted to cotton in 2003. Increases in production also are expected in other southern states.

"Cotton production in Kansas will continue to increase, but at this point in the year it's difficult to estimate the amount of additional acres that will be planted to cotton in the state," Stanford said. "We expect cotton acreage will increase approximately five percent in South Texas, and a rise is seen in Central Texas as well. However, cotton acreage probably will remain roughly the same on the High and Rolling Plains," he added.

Moisture remains a critical issue on the High Plains where 2003 ended as the second-driest year on record, and the 2004 crop will get off to a rough start if the region does not receive adequate rainfall before planting. Fieldwork is at a standstill in many areas because soils are too dry to plow. Thus, rain is needed soon in order for land preparation to

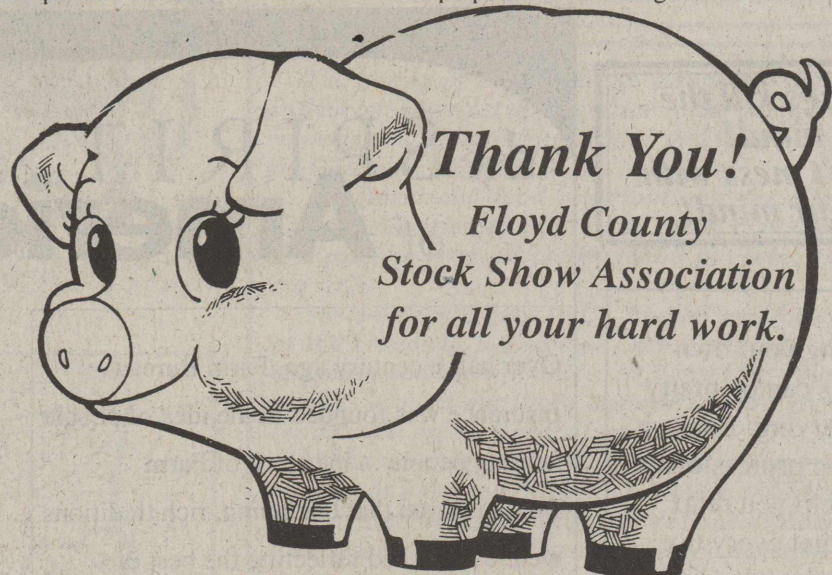
proceed, and a prolonged period of wet weather will be required before subsoil moisture levels are recharged.

"Despite the usual uncertainties - the face at the beginning of every new crop year, I'm more optimistic than I have been in quite a while as we enter 2004," Stanford concluded.

USDA reported net export sales of U.S. cotton totaled 103,500 bales in the week ended Jan. 1, a 16 percent increase from the previous week, but 37 percent lower than the four-week average. Featured buyers included Turkey, China and Japan.

Exports of 147,300 bales for the week were 16 percent lower than one week earlier and a 28 percent decline from the four-week average. Primary destinations were China, Turkey and South Korea.

Meanwhile, online sales by Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas producers in the five trading days ended Jan. 8 totaled 57,443 bales, significantly lower than the previous week's sales of 135,386 bales. Prices received by producers selling their cotton online ranged from 65.35 to 66.71 cents per pound versus the prior week's 62.29 to 66.05 cents per pound range.

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With U.S. cotton policy under almost constant attack and a rapidly heating election year political climate, producers at the 2004 Beltwide Cotton Conference in San Antonio were able to gain important insight on many of the issues that will take center stage in 2004.

Sponsored by the National Cotton Council, the 2004 Beltwide Conference was well attended and included reports from National Cotton Council staff, producer leaders and key industry figures. Reports were provided on legislative affairs, trade, and market outlooks for the 2004 crop year.

NCC Vice President of Washington Operations John Maguire discussed the Washington political climate and what challenges could be expected in 2004.

According to Maguire the industry faces another challenging year in Washington and around the world as new regional trade pacts are developed, WTO agreements are renegotiated and U.S. budget issues are addressed amid election year influences.

He also warned that producers should expect future budget consideration and the effort to correct the current budget deficit to once again provide opponents of the current farm program a stage from which to try and chip away at the current program.

Opening day presentations also included a report from incoming NCC Chairman Woody Anderson of Colorado City, Texas. Anderson discussed the findings of a recent NCC Leadership Tour of Brazil. His report reiterated what many have already reported concerning Brazil's cotton industry.

The crux of Anderson's message was that although Brazil has many obstacles to overcome, the potential the country has for expansion in the area of cotton production is real and should not be overlooked.

On a brighter note, market prospects were buoyed somewhat even though a significant increase in world production is expected in 2004. Seasoned market commentator William B. Dunavant, Jr., provided his thoughts on the issue and left those in attendance with a cautiously optimistic outlook for

prices and demand in 2004.

One of the key components of almost every report and discussion at this year's Beltwide, including Dunavant's, was China's position within the world cotton complex and how their decisions will be the driving force for both prices and demand in 2004.

Dunavant noted that despite varying government and industry estimates of Chinese production and carryover stocks, the end results still leave China with an uncomfortably tight cotton carryover situation.

Given the size and voracity of the Chinese textile complex Dunavant said, "I must keep reminding myself that China's year end carryover is going to be drastically low and they cannot afford not to replenish."

He added, "Yes we will produce more cotton in the U.S. and the World next year, but it will not be in the market place until November 2004. We have got to get from here to there and it will be a stretch."

Opening day also included afternoon sessions on farm program mechanisms, precision agriculture, farm management and the International Cotton Genome Initiative.

Second day activities at the conferences focused attention on traditional production issues.

The schedule included presentations and panel discussions on crop rotation, irrigation and water resource issues, variety improvement and biotechnology. These presentations paved the way for afternoon breakout sessions allowing participants to focus on specific issues and gain additional information on new technology and management concepts.

The 2004 Beltwide concluded Thursday and Friday with a two-day Technical Conference where industry partners presented re-

ports on cotton research projects being carried out across the Belt.

Breakout sessions during the technical conference provided participants in depth presentations on production and management systems, crop protection, economics and marketing, engineering, variety improvement, soil management, crop physiology, cotton utilization and variety improvement.

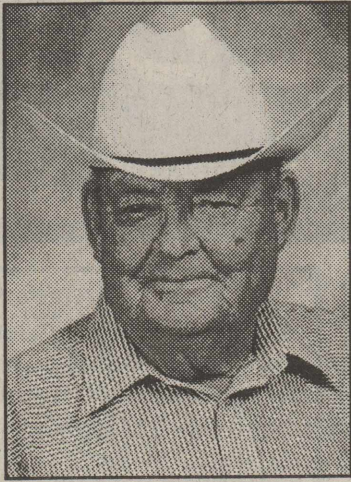
