45 YEARS OF PREACH-ING THE GOSPEL

By Darwin Robinson

Really, I do not fell that old, but the calendar doesn't lie.

I have been asked to write about and summarize my 45 years pastoring small churches and carrying the gospel of Christ to the foreign fields of Mexico and El Salvador.

It all started back in 1958 following my high school graduation from Monterey High School in Lubbock. I was raised near Ropesville on a farm and attended school there for 10 1/2 years. When my family moved to south Lubbock, I eventually transferred to Monterey High.

I met Patsy, from Roosevelt, during my senior year. Following her graduation from Roosevelt High and mine from Monterey High, we were married that same year on October 10,

I heard the gospel message for the first time in a small church at Ropesville where my parents took me, my older brother and my sister. We went to every service. We were not given a choice to do otherwise. I even led the congregational singing when the song leader was away.

At the age of eleven I was saved and baptized. I can take you to that spot today where I put my faith in Christ's death on Calvary for my sins. I was hoeing cotton with my mother on the farm when I trusted Christ for my eternal salvation.

I was a typical farm boy teenager. I was not perfect, but God disciplined and spared me through a serious car accident, knowing that He had something greater planned for my life.

Following our marriage by our pastor, Ben D. Johnson, Patsy and I became very active in our church, Tabernacle Baptist, in Lubbock. We didn't miss a service, like our folks had trained us. We sang in the choir. I got under deep conviction from God's Spirit whether to surrender to preach the gospel, or farm with my dad, or seek another career. I struggled with this for two or

three months. Patsy would tell me, "Whatever God wants you to do will be fine with me."

Rock and Roll singer Buddy Holly was a member of this same church, along with all his family. He became world famous. On a quick trip to Lubbock around January, 1959, he attended a men's meeting at the church. I was present and just an observer. He told the pastor his plans were to make this one last singing tour up north. He said, he was coming back to Lubbock and set up a recording studio, and get back in church and serve the Lord.

On February 3, 1959, I heard on the radio that Buddy Holly was killed in a small plane crash Iowa. I thought, "Serving God is serious business." Three days later on Wednesday night at the close of the prayer service, I ran forward and told the pastor that I was surrendering to preach the gospel. The pastor had forgotten to give an invitation,

but God had not forgotten. A day or two later, I was an usher at Buddy Holly's funeral in our church. The preacher preached hard on "Do what you are going to do for Christ NOW, not later!" The next Sunday I was formally presented to the church as a "new preacher boy."

I have not looked back, nor God, and to this day I still "fear Continued On Page 2

County to benefit from Homeland Security funds

The Floyd County Commissioners met Monday, February 9, and heard a report from Emergency Management Coordinator Preston Belt concerning how to spend about \$28,000 in Homeland Security money coming to Floyd County by way of a grant.

Belt said, "I guess I am looking for some direction to spend it. I talked to the sheriff's office and they have requested three bullet proof vests. They are about \$900 each."

Commissioners Lennie Gilroy, Jon Jones and Ray Nell Bearden all mentioned that they remembered buying bullet proof vests for the sheriff's office before and they were wondering where those vest are now.

Belt suggested, "I think we need to use this money on a big ticket item and if we have money left over, then we could use it to buy bullet proof vests."

The commissioners discussed ever doubted my calling from other ways to spend the money, maybe for the EM coordinator's needs, or for the two local fire

Floyd County Judge William D. Hardin said, "We need a list of the things that we can buy with this money and how we should handle it."

In other matters, the commissioners questioned Floyd County Sheriff Royce Gilmore concerning excessive overtime by the sheriff's deputies during the past two months. Judge Hardin told the commissioners that in December, 2003 over \$900 in overtime was paid to one deputy and over \$400 to another deputy. "Over \$1,700 in overtime was paid out in December, 2003," said Hardin.

Commissioner Gilroy asked Sheriff Gilmore, "Were the deputies called out after regular hours on the days when they reported their overtime?"

Sheriff Gilmore responded,

'Yes.' -Judge Hardin pointed out in the time record book where one deputy had reported a total of 65 hours in one week in November,

Kids are excellent students. They learn what they see and they do what is allowed. Let's not make excuses like the ones we are hearing today. Justin Timberlake's excuse: "I am sorry if anyone was offended by the 'wardrobe malfunction."

I actually missed the boob on the tube because I was reading the close captioned lyrics, "I'm gonna have you naked by the end of this song," as the stunt took place. Dad, can you imagine a

boy undressing your daughter and calling it a "wardrobe malfunction"?

MTV and CBS both apologized to "anyone who was offended by it." The fact these companies are using the word "anyone" instead of "everyone" is an indication of our nation's declining moral conscience.

As a parent and as youth pastor, I am genuinely concerned. Young people today deal with issues involving sexually-transmitted diseases, teen pregnancy, violence, abuse of various kinds, divorce, suicide and drugs, just to name a few.

The good news is that, believe it or not, the parent is the primary influence in the life of a teen. Our children deserve better from this industry but they deserve our

I would never suggest censorship in America. I don't believe all entertainment is bad. I do believe parents should take a more active role in the entertainment choices of their kids.

I struggled with those first sermons. I was so afraid and nervous, I could barely get through them. Within a month, I had preached my first ten minute gospel message at Coleman, where Patsy's uncle, Porter McDougal,

About my fourth sermon at Fritch, I was so nervous and hot (no air-conditioning), I literally passed out and fell to the floor by the pulpit. I was revived by my good preacher friend, Ken Johnson, with a glass of water. I told him to finish my sermon. He said, "You started it, you finish it!" I did, and I am still trying to

In 1960, after a year of night classes "for preachers" (15 of us), in our church, Patsy and I, along with our 9 month old son, Dean, packed up everything we owned and headed for Bible College.

Following about 26 hours of driving in our 1956 Ford and pulling a small U-Haul trailer, we arrived at Chattanooga, Tennessee. 1mo

After enrolling in Bible College, I became the assistant pastor of a small country church sixty miles away meeting in the Appalachian Mountains. Just Wildmon indicated that about everyone in those mountains were involved in making moonshine whiskey. They would run this home made whiskey to Chattanooga each Sunday night around 10 p.m. to midnight. On our way back home, these whiskey runners, in their souped up cars, would come by us going about 100 mph. The pastor. Reuben Capps, baptized many converts by those moonshine stills that had been dynamited by

Sunday. God saved a lot of coal miners, loggers, moonshiners, their wives and their children.

(Picture on page 2) Following my ordination in 1963 at our home church in Lubbock, while on vacation, I baptized around 90 converts at Battle Creek in the river nearby, until I graduated in 1966. Patsy and I crammed four years of college into 6 years. I pastored and worked full-time on the 2nd shift, while Patsy worked full-time on the day shift. Patsy gave birth to our second son, Tim, in 1964.

where I was called as the Assistant Pastor to E.L. Bynum, pastor of our home church now.

Patsy worked as the secretary of the church. After about 2 1/2 years, I accepted the pastorate of Southmont Baptist Church in Houston. I pastored there two years and then moved back to our previous position as assistant pastor of our home church.

I had been under conviction since my graduation to do more for Christ and possibly on a foreign field. I surrendered to go as a missionary to Mexico in the Bethel Baptist Church in Lawton, Oklahoma (where my son Dean now pastors) in 1970 at their annual Missions Conference.

After resigning my position in our home church in Lubbock, I went on deputation by myself to raise money to live in Mexico and preach the gospel of Christ there. Patsy kept the boys in school in Lubbock until I could return. I preached in about 120 churches throughout the south and northeast USA for the next nine months. We left for Puebla, Puebla, Mexico in August of 1970, after selling most everything we had in this earthly world. We were driving a Datsun station wagon and pulling a small camper trailer with printing equipment inside.

In Mexico, we set up print shops, printed and distributed around 500,000 to 750,000 pieces of gospel literature each of the eleven years we served the Lord there. We had a Preacher's Bible Institute where I trained about 6 to 10 preachers each year. The Lord allowed us to start new churches throughout central and southern Mexico. We ordained the graduated preachers, organized the established churches and drove some 1,000 miles per week visiting the churches.

home and helped in the print shop and the correspondence school which had around 2,000 students. Patsy graded the lessons and sent back the next lesson. From these contacts and their invitations, I was able to start new churches and bring back new preacher students to train at the Bible Institute.

On these eight to twelve day trips about twice each month, I would climb by foot, mountains as high as 10,000 feet to preach the gospel to the Indian villages there. When school was out, my family would go with me. We would sleep in their thatched roof huts, eat their tortillas and beans, preach in the open air or under brush arbors.

We organized churches among the Chontal Indians in the high mountains of southern Oaxaca near the Pacific Ocean. Other churches were organized among the Tzotzil and Tzeltal Indians (using translators) in southern accusations

Veracruz near the Gulf of Mexico, Oaxaca among the Spanish near the Pacific Ocean, and started, but not organized, throughout central and eastern Mexico. I baptized several hundred converts in the rivers near these churches over a 1982 with hardly anything to set period of eleven years.

The Texas Historical Commission bestowed the Award of Merit today on the Texas General Land Office's Archives and Records Division for putting historical documents online. Larry Oaks, executive director of the Texas Historical Commission, presented the award to staff members who scan the documents and post them to the Land Office Web site.


'Many of the documents in central Chiapas mountains, where several families of the military, our safekeeping are too fragile to be handled, but they belong to all Texans," said Jerry Patterson, Commissioner of the Texas General Land Office. "Now, anyone with Internet access can view these pieces of history from the comfort of home."

The Digital Preservation

Project is a Land Office initiative to make its entire archival collection available via the Internet. More than 45,000 maps and documents have already been posted online in a carefully organized, searchable catalog. By the time the project is completed in 2007 or 2008, some 35 million items will have been scanned and permanently retired to safe The scanning of documents

first started in spring 2000 and

the agency's first online map catalog was launched in 2001. Each map and document in the collection must be carefully prepared for scanning by Land Office staff. Many of these materials are extremely fragile and require preparation before scanning. Once a





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

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

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


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Longhorns lose and win to stay in playoff run



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

Cotton analysts anxiously awaited USDA's export sales report this week, hoping it would indicate a clear direction for the market to follow. However, most of the trade gave only a muted reaction to the brisk cotton sales contained in the department's report, and cotton futures on the New York Cotton Exchange (NYCE) settled sharply lower Thursday on speculative and options related sales.

Net U.S. upland cotton sales for the week ended Jan. 29 reached 283,900 bales, more than four times the previous week's sales of 59,300 bales, according to USDA. Primary buyers included Turkey, China and Indo-

"The fact that good sales were made to many countries shows that world demand for cotton is healthy, and prices below 70 cents are considered bargains," one analyst said.

Shipments of 320,400 bales of U.S. cotton were 63 percent higher than the previous week and a 29 percent increase from the four-week average. The major destination for the week was China with 134,300 bales while smaller quantities were shipped to Mexico and Turkey with 38,400 and 23,800 bales, respec-

Price action during the fiveday calculation period ended Feb. 5 implies that Step 2 payments to exporters and domestic cotton consumers under the U.S. cotton program will be suspended for at least four weeks starting Feb. 6. The earliest payments could resume would be March 5. Of course, the market impact of the lost Step 2 payment is unclear, and much will depend on NYCE's reaction to future events. However, U.S. cotton currently is one of the most competitive in the global market-

Many observers believe the loss of Step 2 payments for one month is unlikely to materially impact the level of actual shipments since many exporters already have schedules in place for the coming month. A small slowdown in exports might be foreseen in the final week or two if it appears Step 2 payments will resume after the minimum interruption. In other news, a National Cotton Council (NCC) economist said this week that U.S. cotton will continue to see shifting demand as exports increase while the domestic textile industry experiences further contraction.

The economist reported NCC expects exports of raw cotton to reach 13.20 bales for the 2003-04 marketing year, a figure which will account for 72 percent of the overall 2003 U.S. cotton crop.

"U.S. cotton continues to meet price competition and will maintain its current trade share, despite extremely competitive conditions in the world market," the NCC economist said. "Customers for U.S. exports have changed slightly in the past few years as China became a significant buyer of U.S. raw cotton during the 2002 and 2003 marketing years," he added.

In response to stronger prices and increased competition from the man-made fibers, world mill use is expected to decline to 97.1 million bales with U.S. mill use estimated at 6.2 million bales for 2003, according to NCC. The council noted that the U.S. textile industry continues to struggle against surging imports of cotton textile products into the United States, and the import flood will escalate once all quotas are eliminated on Jan. 1, 2005.

The Board of Directors of the Texas Cotton Association voted to indefinitely suspend the implementation of a proposed modification organization's FOB Trading Rules that would have changed the way the seller invoices the

The proposed rule would have all warehouse charges deducted from invoice and eliminated the five free days of storage allowed to the buyer.

In suspending implementation of the proposed rule the TCA Board determined, after input from several cotton industry groups, including Plains Cotton Growers, that the underlying concerns prompting the proposed change were not currently pertinent to the majority of the Texas cotton trade.

TCA will continue to recognize the organization's current FOB TERMS and leave their current trading terms under Rule 9 FOB TERMS Clause 1 FOB COMPRESS and Clause 2 FOB the feedback it received from the CARS/TRICKS unchanged for the 2004 marketing year.

While Clause 1 and Clause 2 were left unchanged, the TCA Board did eliminate several outdated clauses that are no longer pertinent to the way cotton is traded. The elimination of theses clauses will have no effect on the way cotton is currently traded.

Text of the updated TCA Rule 9 FOB TERMS will be available on the organization's website (www.tca-cotton.org) after February 9, 2004.

TCA President Mike Canale, of Lubbock, said, "The reason for proposing the change was that the TCA Board felt having a -single, standard way of trading cotton would be beneficial to bother the buyer and seller. Our attempt in this regard was to create a rule that provides the buyer and seller with a price quote that is comparable in terms to currently published USDA spot quotes and is similar to the terms under which a majority of cotton is traded in the Mid-South and Southeast.

"The TCA Board listened to different segments and decided it was best to keep our current trading terms in place at this time. We understand the importance of working with each segment as we continue to try to improve the industry as a whole.

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PCG Executive Vice President Steve Verett said the decision to delay implementation of the proposed rule was good news for both producers and cotton gin-

"PCG appreciates the willingness of the TCA Board to listen to the concerns other segments voiced regarding the proposed rule and their willingness to suspend its implementation," said Verett, "We look forward to working with TCA and with the other segments to determine how the industry as a whole can best achieve the goals envisioned by the TCA Board.'

The TCA Board continues to support a future change and believes there are significant benefits to standardizing the manner in which cotton is traded. They have pledged to continue working with other industry segments to achieve their goal of standardizing trading rules in the future.

Landowners urged to install chemigation safety valves on their irrigation systems

To protect the ground water resources of the Texas High Plains from chemical contamination, the High Plains underground Water Conservation District No. 1 is inspecting chemigation systems to make sure check valves are installed.

Chemigation is a technique that allows agricultural producers to apply chemicals or fertilizers directly to the soil or plant surface through an irrigation system. However, there is risk of accidental back flow of these materials into a ground water source if the system does not have a working chemigation check valve and back flow check valve

In-line, automatic quick-closing chemigation valves are mandated by state law and are strongly encouraged by the Water District. "Required equipment shall be installed on all systems whenever a pump is installed or repaired or at the time of a chemical injection," according to Texas Water Well Drillers and Water Well Pump Installers' rules.

"If during daily work activi-

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
nician finds a chemigation system operating without a check valve, we will send the land owner a reminder that state law requires these safety devices," said Arnold Husky, water use division director for the High Plains Water District.

By state law, these check valves must contain an automatic, quick-closing, tight-sealing mechanism designed to close when water stops flowing in the output direction. This prevents flow back into the well and po-

ties, a Water District field tech- tentially contaminating ground water. In addition, check valves must be installed between the pump discharge and the point of chemical injection.

Chemigation and back flow check valves are available through any irrigation dealer.
