## LISD hires new principal

LISD board members voted February 19, during their regular board meeting, to hire Jerry Dean Thompson, 59, as the new Lockney High School principal.

Thompson will replace James Poole who will retire at the end of this school year.

Thompson is currently the vice principal at Tulia High School where he has served since 1998.

Born in Cement, Oklahoma in 1944 Thompson spent most of his "growing up" years at Fort Bliss in El Paso. "My dad was a career army man," said Thompson, and we traveled a lot.

In his sophomore year Thompson moved to Germany and graduated from an American

high school in Germany.

He returned to the United States and graduated from Texas A&I in Kingsville. An ROTC student, Thompson joined the Army in 1967 after graduation.

He was on active duty for 13 years, which included a one year tour in Vietnam.

"I finished out my 20 years in the Reserves in Lubbock," said Thompson.

After military life Thompson went into business for himself and substituted at schools.

"I decided I liked teaching and thought I had a knack for education," said Thompson.

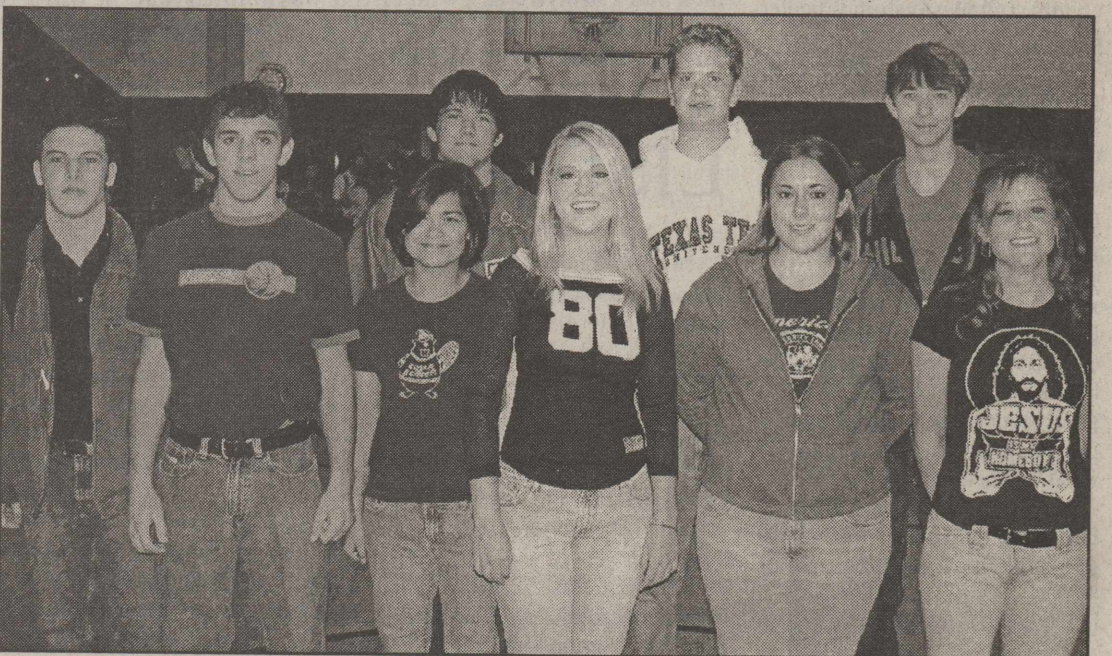
Returning to school Thompson received his teacher's certificate from Texas Tech in 1991 and

his principal's certificate in 1996. He finished up his Master's at Wayland Baptist University in 2001.

From 1991-93 Thompson taught English at Plainview High School. From 1993-1998 Thompson worked as the Dean (assistant principal) at Plainview High School, and then in 1998 he moved to Tulia as the vice principal.

"Tulia is a good school and I've learned a lot," said Thompson, "but I'm to the point where I want to be a principal. I'm nervous about moving, but at the same time I'm looking forward to going."

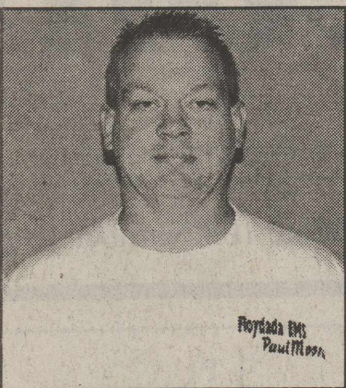

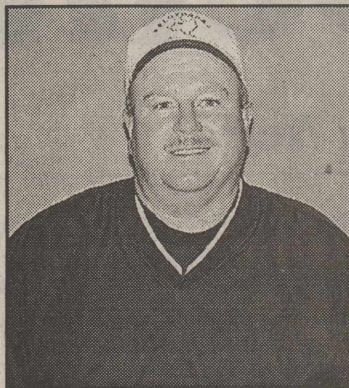
**PAUL MOORE**

**Family and Education:** "My name is Paul Moore and I am married to my wife, Julie. We have three children. Amber is 19 years old and a student at South Plains College. Nicholas is 14 years old and attends FJHS. Jordan is 5 years old and attends A.B. Duncan Elementary School. "I am a certified Paramedic and Director of the Emergency Medical Service in Floydada. I have been involved in the EMS for 15 years. I owned and managed a successful home construction business for 19 years before going full time as a paramedic. "I graduated from high school at Spearman in 1984 and attended several years of college. I was a board member for the Panhandle EMS in Amarillo that managed emergency policies for 25 counties. I am now a board member for the South Plains EMS and the Regional Advisory Council on trauma (all of these are volunteer positions)."

**Why do you want this office?** "I am seeking the Commissioner position because of the need to serve the community and it's citizens of Floyd County. I was taught as a child that you should help wherever you feel you are needed. I believe I have the will power and the knowledge to help wherever the need is."

**What do you want to "do" or "change" if you are elected?** "I would like to make sure Floyd County is going into the future with the funds and the knowledge to obtain these funds and the ability to make good sound judgments when needed. We cannot afford to lose industry and citizens to other communities."

**What are your qualifications for this job?** "I grew up around road construction where my father was a supervisor for the Texas Department of Transportation. After he retired from the state, he was elected as a county commissioner in Wheeler County. "My brother has been employed for 20 years by one of the largest construction companies in the world. It would be hard not to learn something about road maintenance when you grew up in a family as involved in road construction as mine. "I have the skills to make sure the roads are maintained properly. But it is not just about the roads, it takes someone with good management skills that will get out there and take care of what needs attention. "The county owns a lot of buildings that are in need of repairs. We have already lost our jail because the building was not maintained properly. Do we want to lose more? It takes someone with the experience to manage people and property, and I think I am that person."

### Three board positions coming up for re-election LISD sets election date

In their regular board meeting February 19th, the LISD board hired a new principal, set the school board election and extended contracts.

The board voted to hire Jerry Dean Thompson, 59, as the Principal of Lockney High School. He is currently the vice principal at Tulia High School (see related story).

The board also set May 15 as the date for the school board election. Positions up for election are: Precinct 4, currently held by Bernie Ford; Precinct 3, currently held by Aaron Wilson; and At-

Large, currently held by Mike Mathis.

Ford, Wilson, and Mathis have all signed up to run again. As on March 2 the only challenger to sign up was Robbie Long for the At-Large seat.

The deadline to sign up to run is March 12.

The board voted to retain the services of the new law firm, Underwood Attorneys and Counselors at Law, of Amarillo.

The board also extended the contracts of Mr. Ellison, Mr. Cotham, and Coach Joe Robertson.

# The Lamplighter

Bits and pieces from here and there:

In case you missed it in an AP story, or on TV, we see by the Israeli papers where that state has begun accepting the first of more than 100 Jets of the highly advanced F16I series, which will, according to the papers, increase Israel's sway over "its Arab foes" mightily.

The new planes will have a range of more than 1,000 miles, "with the option" of refueling in flight. This will give them the ability, the story noted, of striking Iran. The story also noted that this particular Jet, in an earlier configuration, was used in the highly successful "sneak attack" on Iraq back in the 60's.

The story also noted that the entire fleet will cost more than \$4 Billion. The story did not note that the \$4 Billion is almost exactly what Israel receives from United States taxpayers each year, courtesy the Congress and the Administration, in interest free grants, loans, and "development" funds. The inadvertent failure to note that fact was no doubt an editorial oversight. The same oversight was apparent in subsequent U.S. stories on the event.

The same newspaper carried a story indicating three members of the Bush Administration had arrived in Israel to be briefed by Prime Minister Ariel Sharon concerning what he (Sharon) plans to do about building a fence separating more Palestinians from their lands and homes, and perhaps withdrawing some Jewish

settlements from Gaza and the West Bank. Mr. Bush had previously indicated his displeasure with Sharon's fence proposals, but he did not indicate that displeasure in terms strongly enough to get Sharon's attention, or cause him to back off. Now a few of Bush's emissaries have traveled to Israel to receive a first hand report on what might happen, some day after the U.S. Presidential elections. If Sharon moved before the elections, the Israeli press noted in obviously leaked stories, Mr. Bush might face problems with the American Jewish community. The stories did not mention the problems Mr. Bush would have with the Rev. Pat Robertson, should Bush do anything to displease Sharon. The implication was that nothing will be done about withdrawing Jewish settlements in Gaza or the West Bank until after the American elections, if then. The fence will evidently proceed.

And just for the record, a subsequent Israeli newspaper noted that weapon's exports last year totaled nearly \$3 Billion, and that in 2004 that total was likely to exceed \$4 Billion. The arms exports amounted to some 10 percent of all Israeli exports.

Meanwhile, former Gov. Howard Dean has thrown in the towel. Now there are only four left, with the probable winner being John Kerry of Massachusetts. If Bush can't beat Kerry, he deserves to lose, but, in our opinion, he's going to have to improve in certain quarters or his Presidential tenure will rival his

father's for longevity.

Anybody but a real political junkie would have to wonder what's going on. The former Vice President, Al Gore, who got more popular votes than Bush, comes out and endorses Dean for President in Iowa when it looked like Dean was a sure winner. So did Senator Harkin of Iowa, one of the biggest frauds in the Senate but generally regarded as one of the political powerhouses in Iowa. Senator Ted Kennedy endorses Kerry. Kerry wins, Dean loses. But what about the people who put their reputations on the line? Where stand Harkin and Gore with the party faithful in Iowa, now that Dean lost so handily. What about Willie Nelson, who endorsed Mr. Kucinich and dedicated a song to him, now that Kucinich is mired in last place. What will happen now that Ralph Nader has jumped in? Will people who supported losers in the Democratic primary now switch to Nader?

And the Kennedy angle. Teddy's brother John F. Kennedy, got us involved in the Vietnam war, even before Lyndon took

over. JFK championed the war as long as he lived. Teddy kept his mouth shut and didn't become an opponent (Bobby did, but we don't remember Teddy criticizing the Vietnam effort in the early days) until Nixon took over from Lyndon. Kerry, a child of great wealth and breeding, went off to Vietnam when he probably could have gotten out of the war, but then came back and became heavily engaged in opposition, along with Jane Fonda, when he started scrounging around Massachusetts looking for a political angle that might get him some publicity. He found that angle in opposition to the Vietnam effort, and since then he's been on both sides of nearly every issue.

By the way, whatever happened to General Wesley Clark, of whom former President Bill Clinton spoke so highly? He too is gone...somewhere. But if Kerry wins the nomination, and picks Hillary for his running mate (stranger things have happened) where does that leave Bill, other than getting even richer off of speaking(?) engagements.

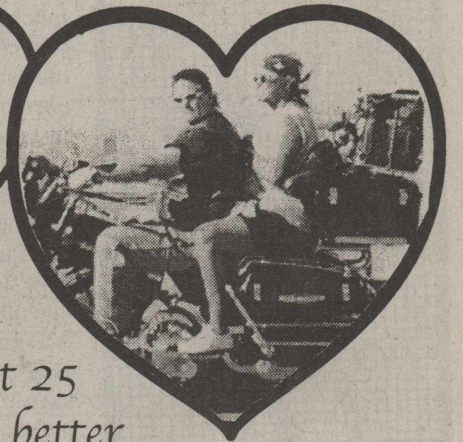

Theta Brotherton is in the Mangold Memorial Hospital this week. Theta, my sister Oddie and I both wish you a speedy recovery.

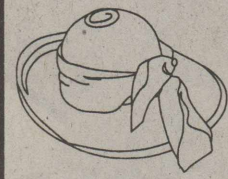

Last Friday afternoon, February 27, Representative Pete Laney and Mark Thompson came to talk to several seniors from the Center to help explain to us about the cuts and how they are affecting all Centers and other programs.

Mr. Laney asked that we encourage people in our community who are 60 years and older to please start coming to the Center for lunch. The more we have the better our finances will be because SPAG will pay more. Also Mr. Laney suggested we encourage businesses to contribute to the Center. After all this whole community is getting older and one of these days you will be glad the Center is there for you.

We suggest that those eating with us who are 60 years or older donate \$3.00 for lunch. We also are very happy to take donations and memorials. We do suggest that once a year our people donate \$10.00 for dues to help on the expenses that we have such as salaries, food, utilities, and repairs.

We also have several home deliveries to people who are unable to come to the Center.

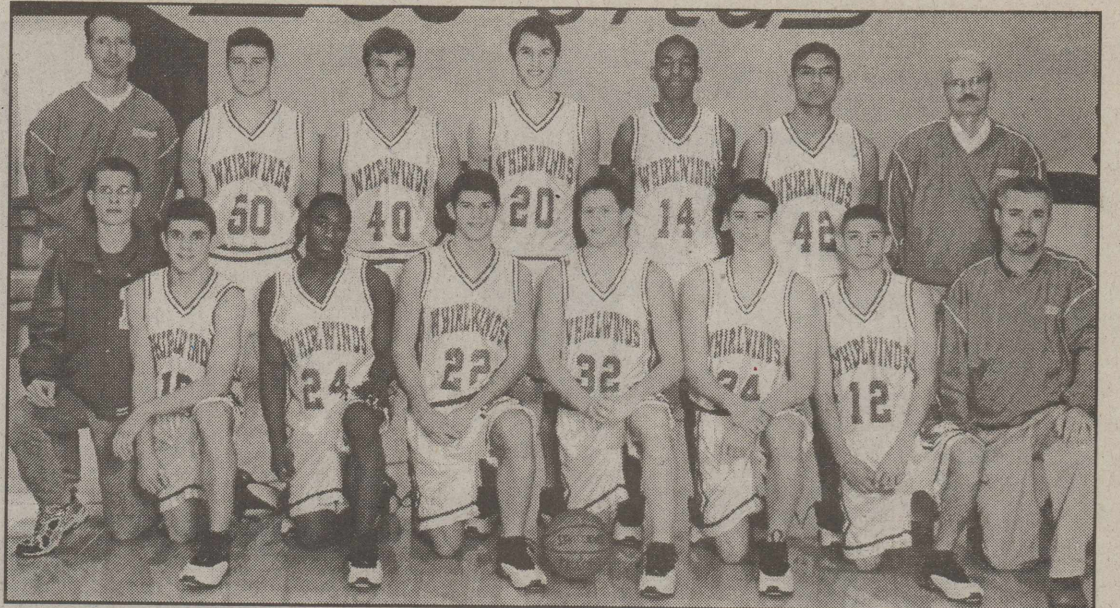
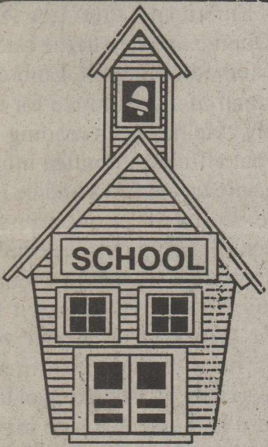
Kayte Vega ended the game with 3 points. She hit 1 three-point field goal and was credited with 1 steal, 1 offensive and 1 defensive rebound.

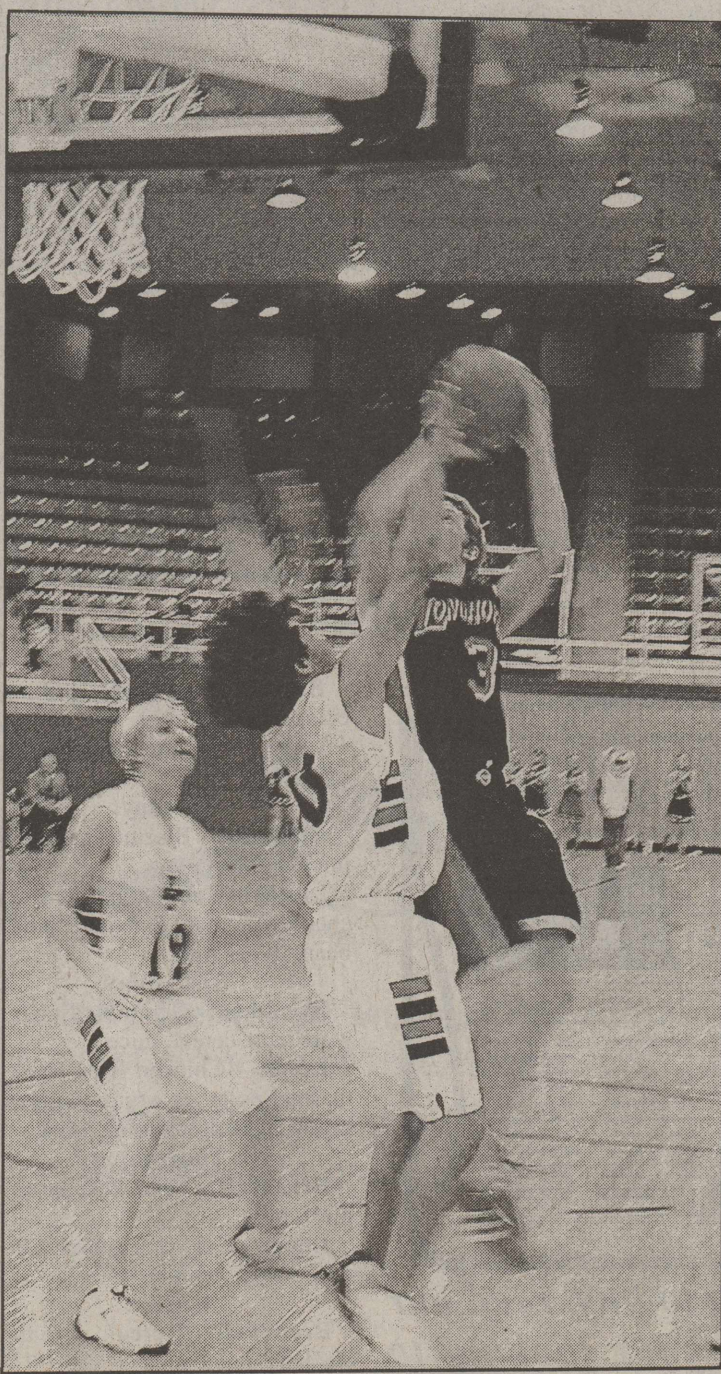

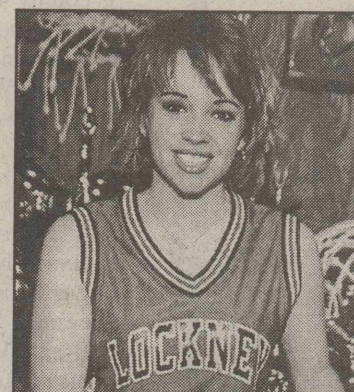

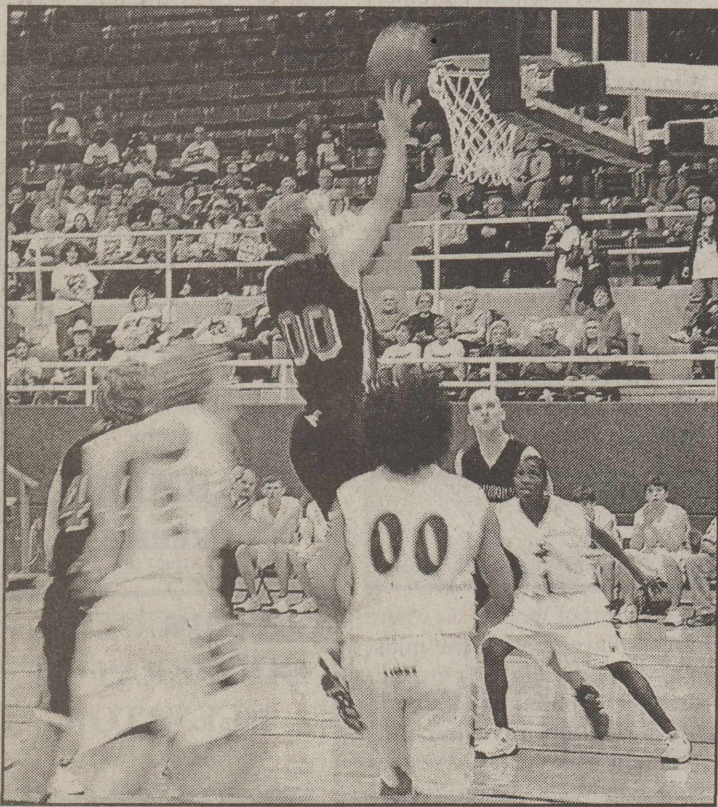

## Longhorns continue in playoff games

The Lockney Longhorns are making a big run through the State basketball playoffs after beating a tough Canadian team 54-31 and a talented Anson team 52-48.

Earlier in the week, Lockney managed to knock down 16 of 18 free throws to pace their way ahead of the Canadian Wildcats and win a BI-district championship. The Longhorns had a four point lead at the half, but extended it in the second half by outscoring the Wildcats 31-12. Lockney connected nine of nine from the charity stripe and held Canadian to only five points in the final stanza to secure the victory.

## Pioneer remembrances

Continued From Page 1

Dad said, "I'll call R.B.," which was Mr. R.B. (Bob) Smith, son of Uncle Hank Smith at the old Rock House. They were no relation of ours. They had just built a house joining our place up on top, as we called it.

Mr. Smith had a buggy and two Indian ponies that was used only with the buggy. One was named Comanche (as he got him from a Comanche Indian).

Mr. Bob came right on and we left for Floydada, not long after sundown. After we reached town the next thing was finding where Dr. Andrews lived.

He came and opened up for us and got my arm where he thought it was straight and into metal half rounded splints, with some cloth packing. One splint was a little smaller than the other one so it tightened when the cords were drawn to hold it together.

The next thing was settling up with Dr. Andrews. He charged me one dollar each for the splints, but said he would refund the two dollars if I would return them in good condition when I was through with them, which would be in about 6 weeks. He charged me 75¢ for setting my arm. We got back home at sun up.

GOING TO SCHOOL

The next year or so, Foy, my twin brother, and I started our first school at Lakeview. But before another school year, Mr. Bob Smith had the Mt. Blanco school house moved from down in the canyon up on top just about one and half miles east of his house, as Henry (Pete) and Reuben were old enough to go to school.

Mr. Bob had hired a teacher, Miss Mary Dale who had just gotten her teacher's certificate to teach. She was only 18 years old.

Dad had told Mr. Bob that Foy and I could go to Mt. Blanco school and we would double the attendance, as Pete, Reuben, Foy and I were the whole school. And that was all for two years, after which Viola, Pete, and Reuben's sister, and Mary Wakefield, Albert Harmon also started. Then the attendance, at seven, was almost doubled.

Dad had planted 15 acres of cotton and he told us we had to pick all the crop before we could start to school.

Mr. Bob was in Crosbyton on Saturday before school was to start on Monday and told the school officials that Foy and I could not attend until we got the cotton crop gathered. Well that generated trouble as the law was that it took three to make it official, so the teacher could draw pay.

Mr. Bob contacted dad and dad told him one of us could attend on Monday to make it official. I don't recall how Foy and I settled on who was to go to school on Monday, but it fell my lot to attend. We got our cotton picked and started school a few days before Christmas.

PEDDLERS

Along about this time we began having peddlers calling on us every two or three months. Watkins and Raleighs mostly. They had factory enclosed vehicles, pulled by two horses. We really looked forward to when they would get to our house late and spend the night with us. They would almost always give us kids chewing gum, which was a great delicacy in those days.

Watkins and Raleighs were very similar companies. Watkins extracts seemed to be the most popular, however Raleighs salves and stock remedies were real good. Both companies extracts, lineaments, and all liquids, had a trial mark on the bottles.

The agent would leave everything, you would let them, with you and charge it, saying buy now and pay me the next time I am around. That's where the trial mark comes in. If you decided you didn't like the product before you used it below the trial mark they would pick it up and you owned nothing. That was a good thing for honest people, but it was abused to the extent that they soon discontinued that service.

I recall one Watkins peddler spending a night with us and telling us how many people took advantage of their liberal offers. He told us about one of his good customers who was looking through his wares and noticed a can of foot powder. He asked several questions about the powder, but would not buy it, so the peddler offered to leave it on trial, which the customer accepted.

On the next trip back, the customer brought it out, handed it to him and said, here take this foot powder I can't use it. The salesman asked him if he had tried it and he said, "No, because it smells worse than my feet."

FENCE CUTTERS

From the time we moved to this place we noticed the fence on the south side had been spliced several times between each post. This fence was on the Floyd-Crosby County line and separated our place from Mr. Bob's place, as we lived in Floyd County and he in Crosby County.

A few years later, as Foy and I studied Texas History, we learned about the fence cutters.

The large cattlemen resented the small cattlemen and farmers presence in the country and would cut the fences quite often, trying to discourage them to the extent that they would move out and leave them the land to graze.

GRASS FIRES

From the time we moved to Floyd Count until about 1910 we

had several of the dreaded grass fires. Some maybe would start in our general area and would not be contained until it reached the Caprock. If the wind was out of the wet or southwest, there was no stopping it. All that could be done was fight it from both sides with wet tow sacks or anything to drag over it. This would keep it from spreading.

I recall two or three that started in New Mexico and burned all the way to the Caprock east of us. Sometimes if it was still and slower burning, it would burn a strip four or five miles wide destroying all the fences in its path.

The fence posts were mostly cedar, brought from below the Caprock. The posts were used without stripping them of the bark, which was very flammable, causing them to burn very quickly. If there happened to be one that was stripped of its bark, it would probably survive the fire.

I recall dad being gone for as long as three days at a time with the worst of them. Upon seeing a grass fire at night it was hard to tell how far off it was, one seemingly two or three miles away may turn out to be ten. One could see the fire at night, but not the smoke. You could see the smoke of a daytime fire, but not the blaze.

A grass fire was everyone's fire so to speak. Anyone spotting a fire would get there as soon as possible, day or night, as the sooner they could get to fighting it the better chance they had of putting it out or containing it.

They never thought of what or when they would eat or drink, as the ladies whose grass had burned or was in danger of burning, would supply those things. People would go miles to fight a grass fire even if they didn't know who was being burned out, they just wanted to help the unfortunate one. Everyone knew they could be the next victim and they would want all the help they might get.

Mr. Fawver passed away Friday, February 27, 2004 at Covenant Medical Center in Lubbock.

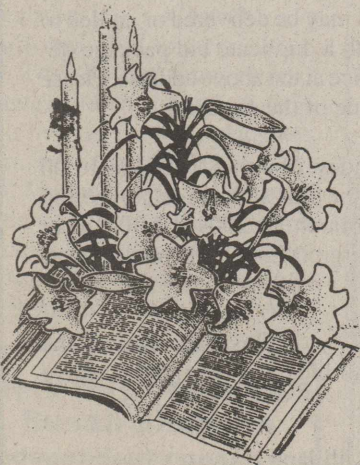
