Carr's Chapel to celebrate 100th

The Carr's Chapel Church will celebrate their 100th anniversary, Saturday, April 24, at the church grounds, beginning with a fish fry at 12:00 noon, and a unique sermon by Chip Sugar, of Abilene.

Sugar, of the Cowboy Heritage Church will share the gospel while he trains an unbroken horse in the style of a "horse whisperer". He will be assisted by Clay Jacobs, of Abilene, (the grandson of Imelda Ramsey).

Carr's Chapel was first organized in western Floyd County by Rev. W.H. Carr (a local Methodist minister) on April 25, 1904, in a recently built school house. There were seven charter members recorded that day.

According to Floyd County Museum documents the church became known as "The Harmony Society", so called after the recently named Harmony Community.

Rev. Carr, a member of the community, served as the pastor for the next four years. He was also responsible for organizing churches at Allmon, Lockney, Petersburg, Dickens City, Espuela, and at the Swinson Ranch Headquarters where the town of Spur now stands.

Rev. Carr was a circuit rider

and traveled below the Caprock by horse and buggy and held camp meetings with the cowboys. His pay was meager but his supply of chicken and eggs was plentiful.

By 1914 the "Harmony Society" had outgrown it's building, and members decided to join with the community of Allmon and build a new church. A centrally located tract of five acres was selected and a church was built. A cemetery was also located on the land.

The church was named Carr's Chapel, in honor of it's founder. Much of the labor was donated and the entire cost of the building was \$1,300. Dedication services were held Nov. 29, 1914. A historical marker was presented to the church June 23, 1963.

The wooden frame building contains a wooden altar rail and pews, frosted glass windows, two classrooms, a mother's room and a sanctuary.

There have been regular services held each Sunday. At one point, approximately 85 members from various denominations attended Carr's Chapel.

"As far as we know it is the only rural church in Floyd County with 100 years of continuous service," said Mae Williams church member and granddaughter of Rev. Carr.

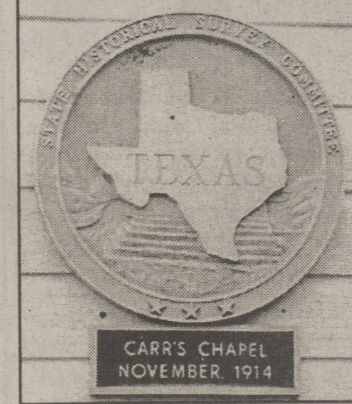
"We share our pastor, Rev. Ted Wilson and his wife Jody, with Petersburg," said Williams. "They come to Carr's Chapel at 9:00 a.m. and then return to Petersburg for services. We have Sunday School following worship services."

Carr's Chapel now has 9 members. Only 3 of the members are under 80 years old and the oldest member is 93.

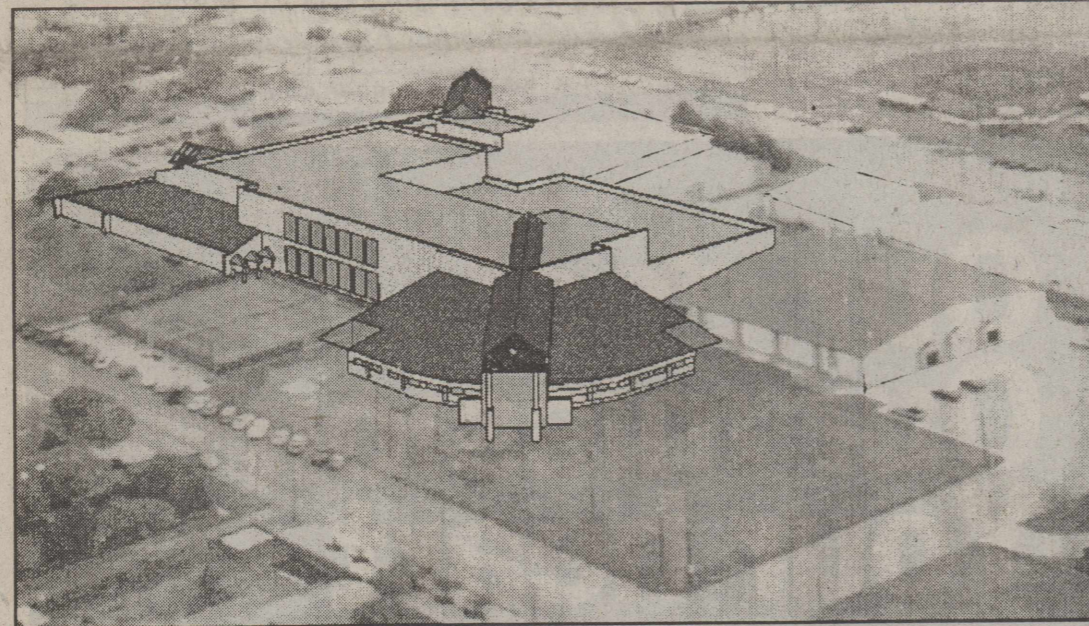
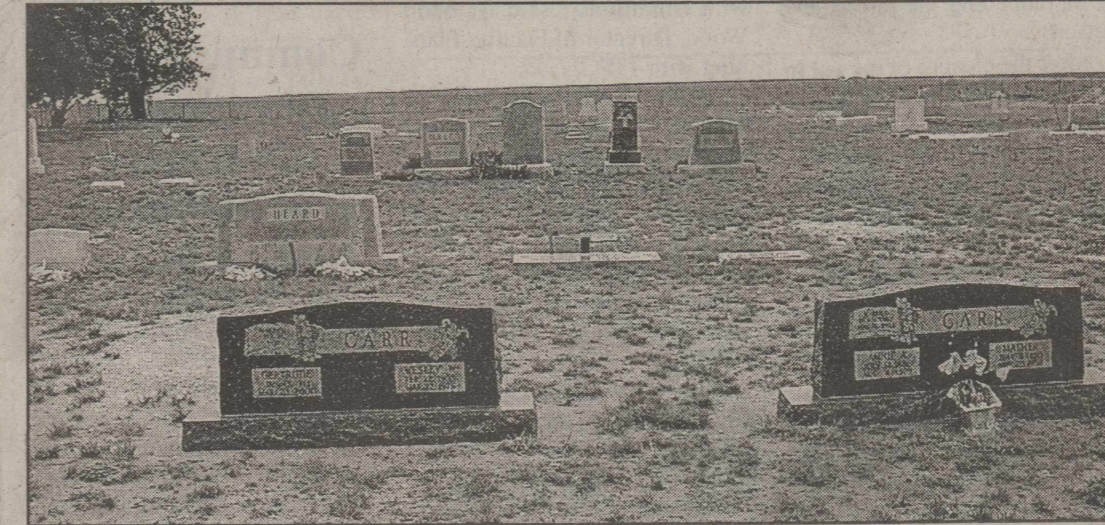
The special services this Saturday will also include pianist Doug Smith and gospel singers.

"We invite everyone to come join us for food and fellowship this Saturday," said Williams. "We will be thanking the good Lord above for allowing us to keep our church open for a century of worship."

The church is located on FM 378, one mile south of FM 37.

FISD studies "Master Plans"

The FISD Board met Tuesday, April 13, and saw a slide presentation of the FISD Facility Master Plan presented by Joe Grimes of Grimes & Associates of Wolforth.

In the presentation, Grimes reminded the board of the TASA Feasibility Study Overview of all the FISD campuses last year. The report showed the 81 year old Junior High School building received an evaluation score of 41.8 percent (Abandon or Replacement). The 78 year old R.C. Andrews Elementary School building had an evaluation score of 43.7 percent (Abandon or Replacement). The 47 year old High School building's evaluation score was 67.9 percent (Major Renovation) and the A.B.

Duncan Elementary building had an evaluation score of 71.3 percent (Minor Improvements Needed).

Grimes said, "Your aging buildings have an average age of 60 years. Our evaluation shows that A.B. Duncan has 25 adequate classrooms, while R.C. Andrews has 16 classrooms, but needs 18. Junior High School's 15 classrooms and science labs are too small and it needs 18. The High School 19 classrooms are also too small and you need 25. However, there are a lot of valuable assets at the High School."

Grimes told the board that TASA recommended rebuilding two of FISD buildings. TASA's report stated, "All of the district's facilities predate contemporary program needs, and are generally

not capable of adapting to those needs...making replacement the only appropriate alternative."

Grimes gave the board two recommended options from their firm. Option One is to renovate all the FISD campuses, including replacing the plumbing, electrical, and mechanical systems, installing an elevator, exit requirements, asbestos abatement, repairing the cracked walls, renovating the cafeteria and kitchen, and enlarging the sizes of classrooms at R.C. Andrews Elementary.

A.B. Duncan Elementary's concrete slab is cracked and sinking and needs repairing, classrooms are generally too small, along with plumbing and electrical needs, and the renovating of

Report says jail structure is sound

Engineer recommends jail's porch be removed

A long awaited engineer's report to the Floyd County Commissioners Monday morning, April 19, put a seal of approval on the structural integrity of the Floyd County Jail.

The jail was closed by commissioners on December 8, 2003 after the Texas Jail Standards Commission cancelled variances for the jail. TJSC cancelled the variances after a fire marshal's report stated, "the front of the building (of the Floyd County Jail) has deteriorated to the point that it is unsafe"...and "the two columns attached to the front of the building are on the verge of collapse."

The TJSC recommended that commissioners close the jail until an engineer could inspect the facility. All prisoners were removed from the jail December 8 and transported to Dickens County Jail. Since that day all county prisoners have been

housed in the Dickens County Jail.

Engineers, Joel Robinett, and Ed Stiles, visited the jail on March 19, 2004, and issued their report which stated, "It is my opinion that the main building does not presently contain structural problems that would be detrimental to it's service as a Jail."

The main area of concern for the fire marshal had been the front porch of the jail. The fire marshal's report stated, "concrete, mortar, and bricks have cracked from supporting the weight of the two pillars."

The engineers however felt the cracks were due to extensive settlement of the porch foundation. "The actual vertical loads on the columns and the foundation are relatively light," said Robinett, "and it is my opinion they are playing a very small role in the settlement of the foundation."

Robinett stated he felt it was the weakness of the "supporting soil" under the footings that was playing the "key role in the settlement of the porch foundation."

Robinett also believed if settlement continues, "as it obviously has in the past, that at some point, the porch structure could collapse."

Robinett recommended the porch structure be removed or repaired as soon as possible.

After reviewing the engineers report, and after a request by the City of Floydada, Commissioners Gilroy and Gilly agreed to meet with Floydada City Council officials to discuss the feasibility of using a room on the bottom floor of the building as a holding cell only.

The jail variances that had been extended to the County before the closure will not be reissued by TJSC (see story page 2).

MHMR asks to open treatment facility at Caprock Hospital

The Caprock Hospital District Board met Tuesday, April 20, and discussed the offer by Central Plains MHMR to occupy the southwest wing of the Caprock Hospital building. The wing would be used as a substance abuse residential treatment facility for 10-12 nonviolent adolescent females. The program is voluntary and residents voluntarily admit themselves for treatment.

Around 30 citizens were present for the board meeting and several expressed their individual opinions.

Floydada Economic Development Corporation Executive Director Dora Ross addressed the subject of an unsigned letter being circulated in the community. Ross told the board, "That is false information. This project (Central Plains MHMR) is not a detention center. It is not an incarcerated prison. It will not create

extra traffic. There will not be family and friends hanging out all over our community on visiting days. We are not here to discuss getting grants to turn the old hospital building to be into a female detention center for incarcerated prisoners."

According to Ross, "There will not be a prison right beside your family, your school, your gym, your little league park, or your track field. I have called and/or sent letters to every board member of Caprock Hospital District Board, the FEDC board and the City of Floydada board. I have said up front that this was a voluntary program."

Ross said, the majority of her contacts about the project were favorable with only a few against it. She apologized if she had offended anyone with this project. "In no way have I intended to hurt one person or step on any toes."

According to Ross, only the

southeast wing of the hospital building would be used for the substance abuse residential treatment facility. This is a voluntary program. According to Ross it should create 13 jobs at above minimum wage.

"This is a wonderful opportunity to bring in a business and possibly teach them a trade."

Stacy Corbet, of the MHMR unit in Plainview, brought pictures and letters of testimony from residential neighbors in Plainview. The letters stated that there were no problems from this project there. Corbet said, "Most of our 15 girls are between the ages of 15 and 17. They were troubled teens who smoked pot or abused alcohol."

Ron Trussler, Superintendent of the MHMR school in Plainview, addressed the board. "We have offered this project to your community. This is a very cooperative school in your com-

Putting jail in shape for new codes costly

With a report from Engineers declaring the Floyd County Jail structurally sound, Floyd County Commissioners are now faced with the decision over feasibility of reopening the jail in any capacity.

After the closure of the jail in December 2003 the County was forced to layoff jailers and send all prisoners to the Dickens County Jail. The County now pays \$38 a day per inmate to Dickens County.

The closure has placed hardships on Floydada City Police because of overtime pay for officers who have to wait for jailers from Dickens County to come pick up city prisoners.

The Lockney Police Chief Jerry Edwards says the wait has not been too much of an inconvenience for Lockney Police. "By the time we get our paperwork done and get the prisoner to Floydada the jailer is usually there to pick them up."

Reopening the old jail to house prisoners on the 2nd floor appears to be out of the question for the County, however discussion is taking place over the feasibility of opening a "holding cell" on the first floor. A holding cell would "hold" a prisoner until the Dickens County jailer arrived. Questions remain on what kind of staffing would be necessary to keep a holding cell available.

"We were operating the jail under variances given to us over the year by the Texas Jail Standards Commission," said County Judge Bill Hardin. "When the jail closed the variances were taken away. If we reopened the jail we would have to come into compliance with current jail regulations. That is not affordable for the county."

The Floyd County Jail was built in 1925 and renovated in 1980 and 1987.

The Texas Jail Standards Commission was organized in 1976 and implemented rules to

Commissioners consider tax abatement guidelines

The Floyd County Commissioners met in Special Session Monday, April 19, and approved the engineer's structural survey regarding the Floyd County jail (see related story) and the court appointed Commissioners Lennie Gilroy and Craig Gilly to meet with the City of Floydada to discuss a holding cell.

The commissioners also approved several amendments to the Floydada Economic Development Corporation Tax Abatement Guidelines and Criteria for new business coming into Floyd County. FEDC Executive Director Dora Ross told the commissioners, "I want to revise the guidelines because according to our guidelines now, the FEDC would not qualify for several things we are working on."

"I want to take out the \$250,000 minimum tax base, and extend commercial development to 10 years (the maximum allowed by law). We need to keep our tax abatement broad and then we can narrow it down. The only business that fit the guidelines in the beginning was basically the dairy industry and one had to put \$250,000 on the tax base. Realistically Floydada did not get a dairy as planned. When you look at where the water is, it is all up at Lockney," said Ross.

"I want our tax abatement to be broad and include industrial and commercial. So any business in Floyd County, Lockney or Floydada, could expand by (1) creating jobs and (2) putting

taxpayers. The practice has been followed in every "peace settlement" that has followed Israeli land grabs all the way back to the '60's, when the Sinai was taken from Egypt, the Sinai oil fields exploited by the Israelis for years in complete violation to any and all international agreements, and finally abandoned back to the Egyptians after America agreed to cough up \$Billions to pay the Israelis for their "loss," and then supply Israel with petroleum needed to replace the Sinai oil they had to give up in the Egypt-Israel peace deal.

Ariel Sharon will be, and is, deliriously delighted. Many of their followers in this country, those who allow Sharon to do their thinking, will be delighted. And believe me, gentle reader, all will take the position that President Bush should be reelected because of this "courageous" act, notwithstanding all the pandering for the Jewish vote now being undertaken by John Forbes Kerry. Bush will get few of those votes, but it will not be for lack of trying.

This whole episode was presented to the American people as something of a surprise. Not so. Not so. We have followed the Israeli press on this issue rather closely, as is our want, and there has been no shortage of coverage in that country, if it can be called a country. It is only here in America that things of this nature are presented as surprises. Indeed, in Israel, it has been assumed, in the press, that Sharon would get his way. Indeed, speculation in the Israeli press has never been about whether Bush would cave to Sharon, the speculation has been over how much money Israel would end up with. And they are not bashful

about saying "why." The "why" is very simple: there's an election coming up in America rather soon, and both Republicans and Democrats salivate over the potential Jewish vote, particularly in Florida, New York and California. Traditionally, more than 80 percent of that community's vote, and the vast majority of its money, goes to Democrats. But George Bush and Karl Rove, or Karl Rove and George Bush, have decided to altar that equation. With proper policies (according to Israeli interests) adopted by the current Administration, the vote might be changed by as much as one or two percent. That would put Florida in the "safe" column, and put New York in the "for play" column. The California column will depend heavily upon the influence of Arnold Schwarznwhateverhisnameis (he's the husband of one of the Kennedy's), but it could easily put the Golden State up for grabs. If so, and if those states go for Bush, the election will be decided by what goes on in the middle east. The Jewish vote in America, and the direction of many media voices in America, will be determined by what takes place in the middle east. And everyone must understand that developments in Iraq depend heavily upon decisions in Tel Aviv. The attitude of Tel Aviv helps determine, to a large degree, the attitude in Washington,

D.C.

The elder Bush, the one who fought bravely in World War 11, was shot down by the Japanese, was rescued by American forces, survived to become President of the United States, was of an entirely different persuasion toward matters in the middle east. He served one term and was defeated. He was beaten by the rake Bill Clinton, who enjoyed hinting at his own womanizing. But the elder Bush was generally regarded as a man of his word. So much so that he was able to amass a tremendous coalition of Arab states to oppose the adventures of Saddam Hussein in Kuwait. The younger Bush has had to rely almost entirely upon American forces to bring down a tyrant generally regarded as such by his neighbors, but who would not join in the effort to bring him down. A big part of the problem, in our opinion, has to do with the arrogant attitude of Mr. Bush, the "you are either with us or you are against us" comment that can do nothing but leave the outcome of his adventures almost entirely on the shoulders of America's fighting men and women. That, and the attitude exhibited by Mr. Bush when he told Sharon, in effect, "anything you want to do is okay with us."

Mr. Sharon, never one to pass up an opportunity to expand his own power, may be blood thirsty, but he is not stupid.

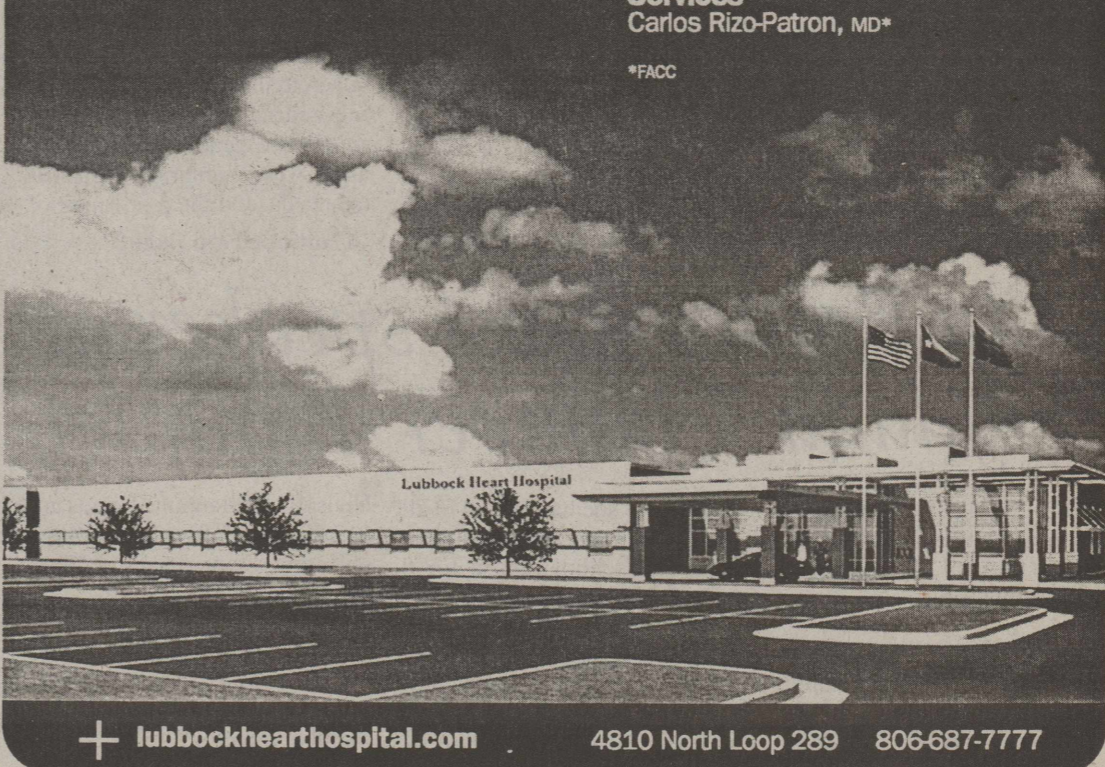

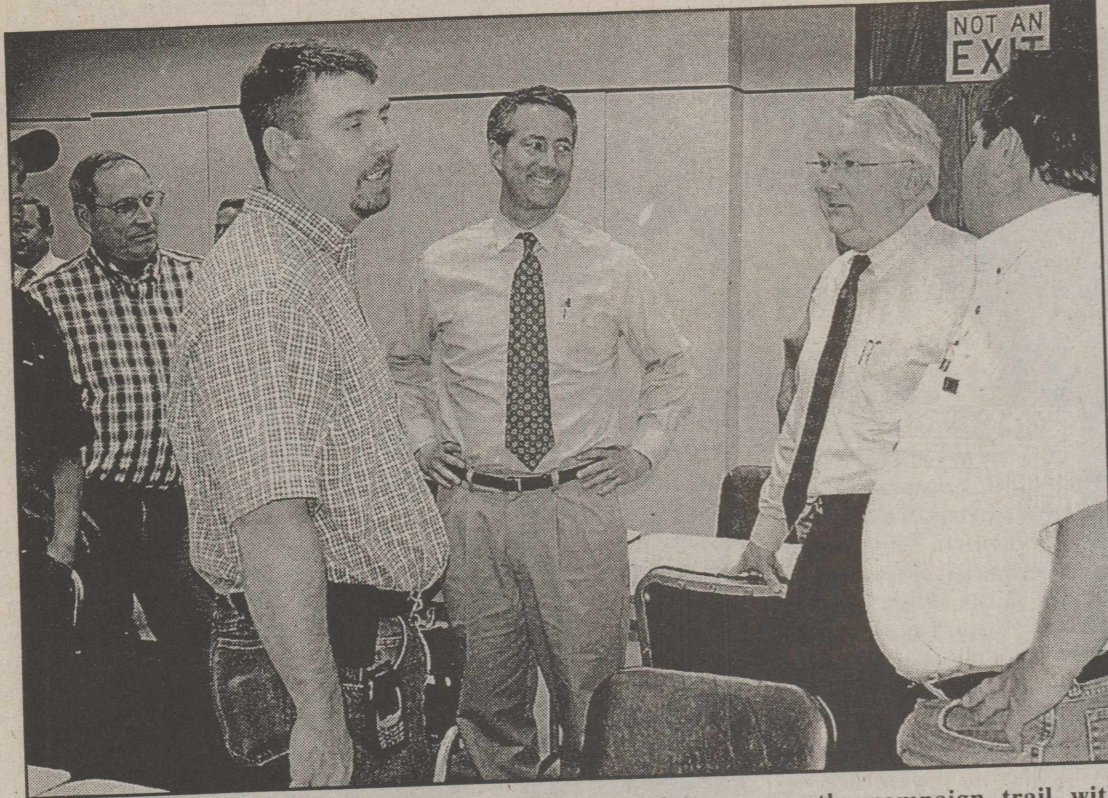

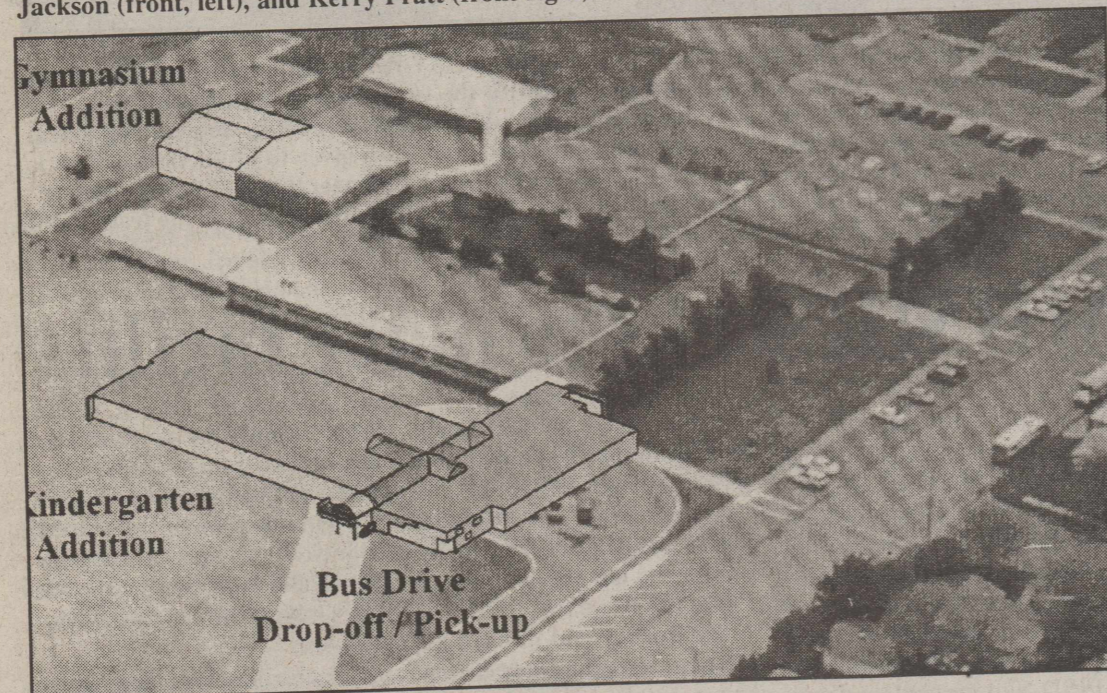

the cafeteria and kitchen. Repeat the same at the Junior High School, plus several renovations at the High School. Major renovations would also include fire alarms, water proofing and repairing all structural damages.

According to Grimes, both the Junior High building and the R.C. Andrews Elementary building need fire-rated egress corridors, additional classrooms to meet State of Texas minimum standards, provide fire alarm systems, replace damaged plaster, stucco, ceilings, etc., water proof basement walls, repair damaged floor structures, provide accessible door and route areas, provide HVAC equipment to comply with Life Safety Code, replace plumbing fixtures, etc., and upgrade all electrical systems.

"The advantage of Option One is it would extend the life of the existing buildings and avoid concern over change. The disadvantage is it would cost more to fix the buildings and it would be a challenge in reconstruction, more faculty would be needed, and add the cost of portable buildings for classes and offices while the building are being renovated," Grimes said.

Grimes said Option Two is to reduce the campuses down from four to two campuses. "We recommend you combine R.C. Andrews Elementary and A.B. Duncan Elementary by expanding the A.B. Duncan campus with a new wing for Pre-K and Kindergarten, remodel existing classrooms for new grade levels and use the R.C. Andrews building for community services. Combine the High School and the Junior High School by rebuilding more footage space at

the High School. Leave and use the existing auditorium, gym, ag shop, band hall, field house, track, stadium, tennis courts and the baseball field and use the Junior High building for community services and stadium parking," Grimes added.

Some advantages to Option Two, according to Grimes, is it would lower construction cost, lower salary costs, lower operating costs with only two kitchens instead of four, phasing in the construction throughout the year not disrupting classes, and it would add more parking space for stadium parking at the Junior High.

Option One: construction cost of 46,600 square feet at A.B. Duncan would be \$1,724,090; cost of 53,644 sq. ft. at R.C. Andrews would be \$4,638,615; cost of 49,200 sq. ft. at Junior High would be \$4,286,852; and cost of 87,200 sq. ft. at High

School would be \$5,386,390, for a total cost of \$16,035,947, according to Grimes.

Option Two: construction cost of 55,670 sq. ft. at A.B. Duncan Elementary, including demolition, abatement, restoration, renovations and new construction would be \$3,255,790. Construction cost of 138,700 sq. ft. at the High School, including new construction, demolition, abatement, and restoration would be \$10,028,342, for a total cost of \$13,284,132, according to Grimes.

Grimes told the board, "The state will pay 61 percent of this cost and FISD will have to pay the other 39 percent."

Superintendent Jerry Vaughn said, "We will vote to accept or reject this Master Plan at our next regular scheduled board meeting, May 11. This will give us a goal to follow in the months ahead."

wealth on the tax base, and they could be considered for tax abatement.

"A tax abatement sometimes can make or break a business. The tax base for the land (property) is already there and cannot be abated, but the expansion of a business can be abated. It is very important for our entire county that we work together as a team, both Lockney and Floydada," Ross said.

Ross told the court about FEDC's prospects and goal of gaining an Assisted Living Center in Floydada that may create seven to thirteen jobs. Ross suggested a revolving loan fund, at

zero or one percent interest, to loan money to businesses for expansion.

In a related matter and upon the recommendation of Ross, the court approved a Public Hearing at the court's next regular meeting, May 10, at 10:00 a.m. to designate a Reinvestment Zone of three acres just south of the City Limits on the west side of Hwy. 62 going toward Ralls.



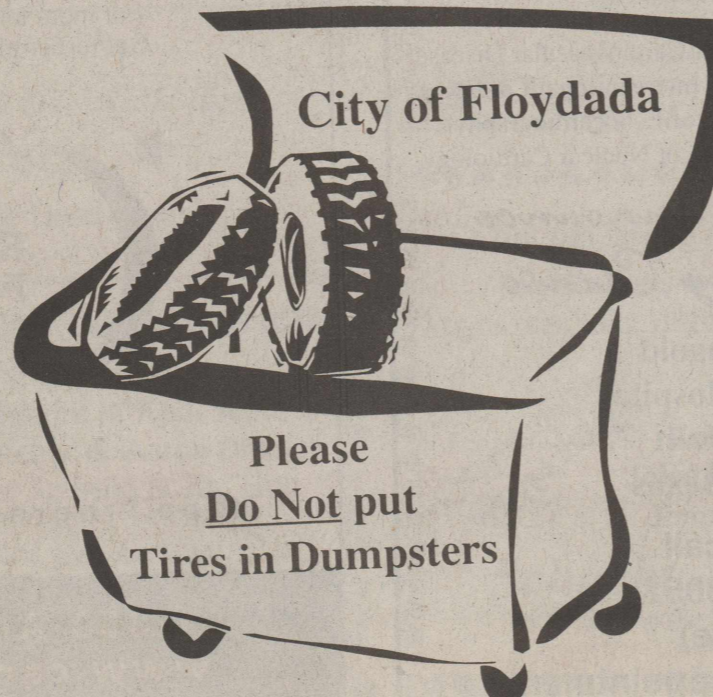

Congressman Randy Neugebauer was on the campaign trail through Floydada, April 15. He was joined by Floyd County's current Congressman Mac Thornberry.

Thornberry praised Neugebauer for the work he has already done in Congress and told the audience gathered in the Lighthouse Electric Community Room, "I believe ya'll will come to appreciate him as much as I have."

Redistricting will move Congressman Thornberry out of Floyd County and has put the area in a battle between two incumbent Congressmen--Republican Randy Neugebauer and Democrat Charlie Stenholm.

"It has been an honor to represent this county," said Thornberry, "and I have an interest in who will be representing you. I've been pleased to work with Randy. He hit the ground running. He is not afraid to stand up for what is important and I've been impressed by his effectiveness."

Neugebauer said, "Once the election is over, Mac and I won't draw lines. We will work together as a team to represent the area. We meet with the two U.S. Senators every Thursday to discuss issues of this area."

Neugebauer reminded the audience that he was "on the team that has the chairman of every committee." "When we need to

talk to the President and other chairmen they take our call," said Neugebauer.

He said he was committed to staying on the Ag Committee and on the Resources and Science Committee.

Neugebauer addressed several issues for the crowd.

"Congress does not have an income problem," said Neugebauer. "They have a spending problem. You don't address deficits by putting more taxes on families."

Concerning the future of the farm program, Neugebauer said, "We made a 6 year pack with producers. We can't change rules now and have an effective farm policy. We will stay firm."

"The farm bill is working. It is operating at 5 million less than what we budgeted. I would like to extend the program if it continues to work."

Neugebauer said there were two philosophies of government. "One philosophy is one of larger government that says larger taxation is better for government."

"The other philosophy says less government with less taxation is a better road for the prosperity of the country. This is what I believe."

On the issue of oil and gas exploration in the country, Neugebauer said, "We can't quit trying to open our natural reserves and we can't let environmentalists run our policy. We

need to expand our team. We are a few votes short now--after the election we need to count heads again."

Neugebauer also emphasized the importance of the election in the area of judicial appointments.

"It is important to get judicial judges and not legislative judges," said Neugebauer.

"Families are our foundation and quite honestly there are people out there trying to shake our foundations."

"That is why you see the fighting in Congress over judicial appointment," said Thornberry, "because it is so important. We can't keep passing constitutional amendments to fix every silly decision that comes from federal judges. It is hard to get a constitutional amendment."

Addressing the Iraq issue, Neugebauer said, "Our exit strategy is to make the Iraq government sustainable. The Iraq people are learning how to be free. They have the heart and passion to keep Iraq secure and they don't want to go back. They have resolve to fight conflicts."

"The President does not owe families of 911 an apology. Osama Bin Laden owes the apology. I'll be glad when the commission quits finger pointing and gets back to finding weaknesses to correct."

"It has been rough in Iraq the past 6 months. Different factions are jockeying for position in country and to influence the U.S. policy."

munity. We serve 9 counties and provide our services all over the area. We believe Floydada has a good opportunity to place this project here. It is for women who are crying out for someone to reach out to them. They need help."

FISD Superintendent Jerry Vaughn spoke to the board. "Any business has its negatives and positives. We can't look into the future. One positive for FISD is it will be beneficial to our school. It would be a new campus for FISD. We will gain with the attendance. We average receiving around \$3,500 per student from the state. Ten students would generate \$35,000."

On the negative side, according to Vaughn, FISD would be responsible for the education of these students. They would be kept isolated, similar to CCLC. "With only ten students, that would not be enough to cover the cost of their education," said Vaughn.

"If the students stay at the facility more than 85 days in one semester, then the TAKS tests and other standardized test must be administered and we are accountable for them. We would have to add another teacher and possibly an aide," concluded Vaughn.

One of the citizens that expressed his opinion was Monte Williams. Williams said, "I sup-

port this project. Jobs are few in the community. The positives offset the negatives."

Eric Cornelius said, "Creating jobs is good for our community. I don't see the negative aspect. I'm in favor of it."

Pat Bradley said, "This is job creation. Since I have been here I have seen only a couple of new businesses open and I have seen several closed. I am thankful we have a good opportunity for job creation."

Board Member Denise Payne said, "We apologize about the letter. I had nothing to do with it. This is not a prison. Somebody is irresponsible. I hate to mix something in the planning phase. I don't like it costing our school though. I have not decided yet."

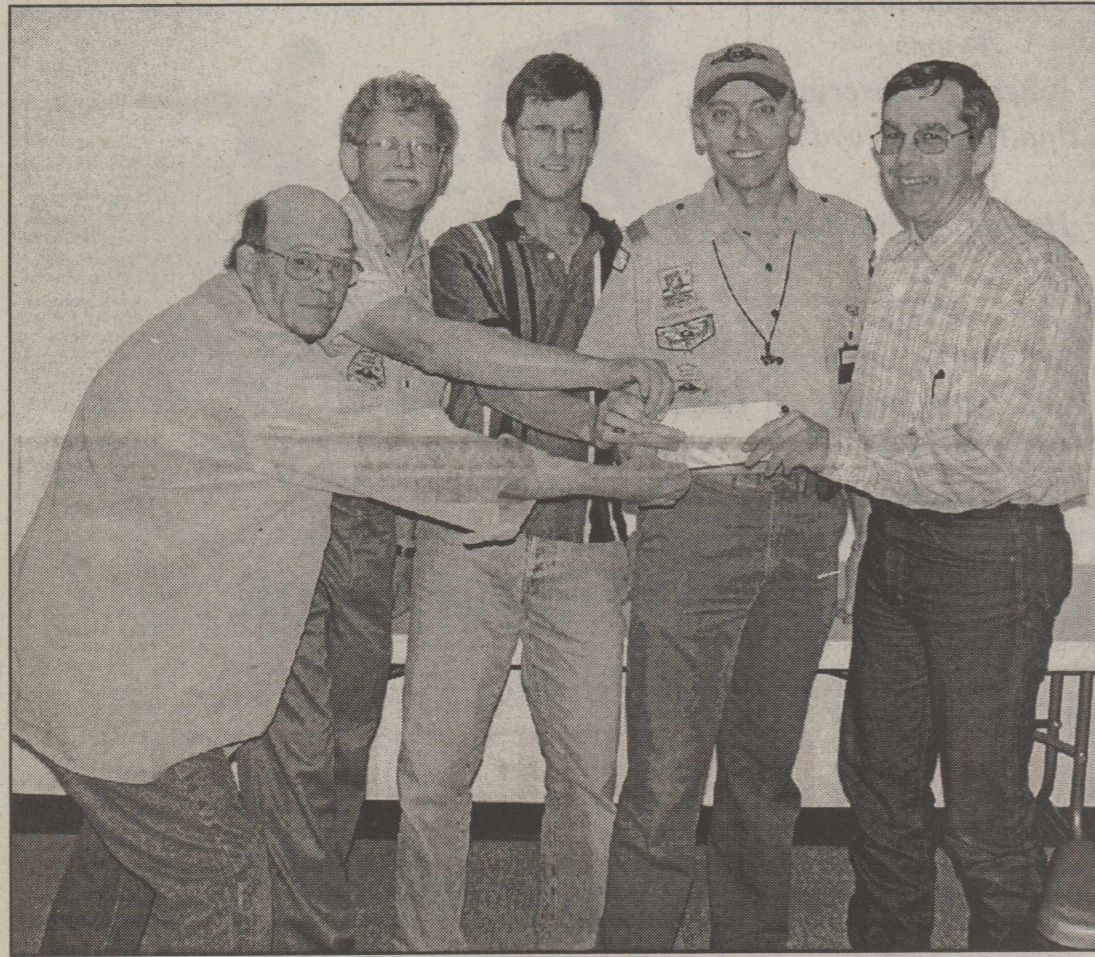
Board Member Kyle Smith said, "It has been portrayed as worse than it is. It won't evolve into something we don't want

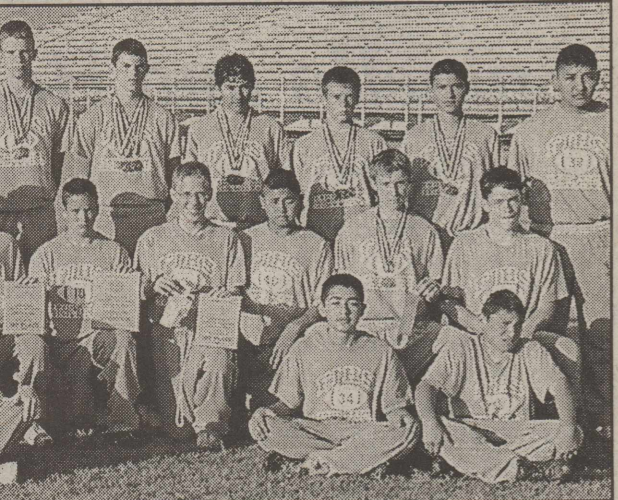

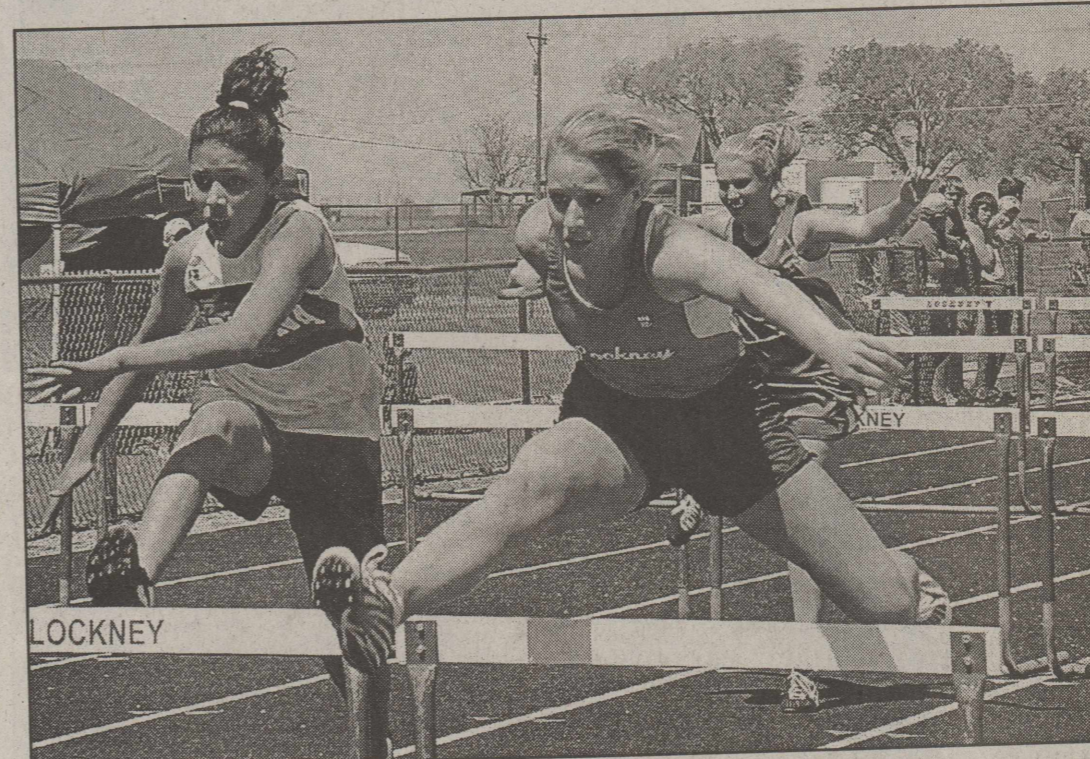
