





a book we would like to recommend . It's titled "Stolen Valor", and deals with frauds who claim to have been heroes in the Vietnam conflict.

We say "finally finished" because we've been on the book for some time. We have only one good eye left, and the good one is not quite as good as we'd like it to be. Still, with patience and perseverance we've been rewarded with what we would call a "good read." It was written by B.G. Burkett and Glenna Whitley, and published, according to the cover, by Verity Press, Inc., of Dallas;. I don't know what it costs, but I imagine the local library has a copy, or can get one.

Perhaps one of the reasons, or even the principal reason, that I appreciate the book is that it ex-

years. That is the proclivity for some men to claim heroics for which their records do not reflect, what the men who served with them do not remember, and for commendations to which they are not entitled. Everyone who has ever served in the military will recognize the story that Burkett is trying to tell. The difference between Burkett and most of us is that he spent many years researching the subject after having served honorably in Vietnam, returning to the states to an atmosphere of hostility toward all who had served there. His research led to some strange, though predictable, revelations. In many, many, cases, the loudest, most vociferous, critics of American involvement in that war were frauds from beginning sweated out a war in the presence

We've finally finished reading and dear to me for many, many in Vietnam. Many had not even served in the military. Many had served, but claimed service their records did not reflect. Camp cooks became, in the retelling, machine gunners, or CIA agents on secret assignment (which of course was blamed for the lack of official records.)

In effect, it is these men who have "stolen" the valor due others. The Vietnam conflict was not unique in this regard, (we even had a fraudulent coward in our artillery battery on Corregidor, and he got to wear the Presidential Unit Citation just like everyone else in the battery) but it did seem that the situation surrounding Vietnam had more than its share of frauds, if Burkett's book is any indication of what really went on. Anyone who has plores a subject that has been near to end. Many had never served of death and destruction can be

forgiven for looking with disdain upon the rows and rows of ribbons adorning the chests of officers who served in those same situations. And anyone familiar with the Vietnam war, replete as it was with a Commander in Chief and a Secretary of Defense who both thought of themselves as five-star Generals, and a military and Foreign Service establishment that looked upon Vietnam as a place to get their service records "punched" before promotion time, will know that our involvement there left much to be desired. But the men who served there cannot be faulted for their service, in our view, even though some returned to this country with political stars in their eyes and made outrageous claims that cannot be substantiated, merely in an effort to gain public attention.

up an anticipated showdown with the tourney's #1 seed and two time defending State Champion Rhett Heartsill of Wall.

Bennett gave his best shot at the best and was no pushover despite losing 6-2, 6-3. What happened in this match under the lights Friday night probably was significant to what would unfold the following day.

Saturday morning Bennett took on the #3 seed Cole Easterling of Post for 3rd Place. Bennett had lost to Easterling in a close match earlier in the season at the Slaton Invitational. The first set was extremely close before Bennett squeezed out a 7-6 win that required a tiebreaker. In the 2nd set Bennett took control and blew to a 6-2 win over the tall and lanky Post Junior. At the same time Heartsill was beating Carillo 6-3, 6-1 in the Championship match. The stage was now set for the "playback" since Carillo was from the other side of the bracket and they had not played each other.

Before the match that would decide the fate of who would represent Region I as the runner-up in Austin, Coach Nixon told Ross, "Go make a memory and live your dream." This would be Ross's last shot at State after making it to Regional the three previous years with teammate David Rodriquez in doubles. Rodriguez was in attendance and pulling hard for his best friend.

Bennett came out strong and jumped out to a 4-0 lead in the first set. Carillo showed why he was the highly touted opponent

by winning the next 5 games to take a 5-4 lead. The Reagan County Junior was one point from winning the initial set when Bennett changed the momentum and battled back like a heavyweight boxer fighting out of the corner. The hardhitting Whirlwind won the game to even the count at 5-5 and then cruised for two more game wins to claim the first set 7-5.

Carillo was not through. He rebounded by taking the first two games of the 2nd set. Both players requested a banana to help revive their weary legs. Both players down the stretch reversed line calls on themselves and gave "raquet claps" to each other for phenomenal shots. They were playing the gentlemen's game the way it was intended. Pet and Andre would have been proud.

The match much resembled Center Court at Wimbledon when the Floydada and Reagan County fans would chant words of encouragement after each great play. Afterwards Assistant Coach Regina Smith said, "He was totally focused and very confident. He will do fine in Austin." Reggie was just one of many who had tears in their eyes.

On the other side of the court was a worn out Leonel standing at the net and still maintaining the smile that is his trademark. Ross graciously acknowledged his worthy foe and friend. Ironically Bennett had spent the night in the Carillo home just two weeks earlier when Floydada played in a **Regional Qualifiers Tournament** in Big Lake.

Bennett will now advance to U.I.L. State Championships on May 10 and 11 at the University of Texas. The last representatives at State were Jenna Payne and Jessica Castaneda when they won a Silver Medal in girls doubles in 2002.

The reason Bennett had such a large following was because six of his teammates had also qualified for Regional and they all performed very well.

Seniors Melissa Dunlap and Molly Long closed out their career of playing doubles since the 8th grade by advancing to the quarterfinals for the second straight year. Dunlap/Long won their first round match against Andrews/Saldana of Tahoka 6-2, 6-2. They then faced the tourney's #3 seed Ridgeway/Cortinas of Reagan County and fell by scores of 6-3, 6-2 that included a one hour rain delay. The Reagan County duo went on to claim 2nd place to teammates Ridgeway/ Aguilar and both will be going to Austin.
