## Young girl bitten by rattlesnake

Ramirez, of South Plains, is still in intensive care at Covenant Hospital recovering from rattlesnake bites on Wednesday, July
27 .
Anisa's mother, Lisa Ramirez says Anisa is doing better and the family hopes the worst is over. It has been a difficult and painful ordeal for Anisa, but as of Monday. August 2 Anisa was sitting
up in her hospital bed playing video games.
According to Mrs. Ramirez, she and her children were gathering mesquite wod wnisa was bitten.

a field for wood," said Lisa "We were just off the Caprock and were just off te

very hard to watch. The doctors changed her pain medicine and she slept befer the next day." After this scare the Ramirez family was relieved to see Anisa improving. "She started feeling

people." said Lisa. "But, then on Saturday night she started having trouble breathing, and she was running a fever. The poison had traveled to her lungs and that was worried that the poison was traveling to her other organs. A heart specialist was called in and after some tests he said her heart and other organs were good. After lungs were better

## What do I do for initial first aid after a rattlesnake bite?


#### Abstract

If you are less than one hour from the nearest emergency room, initial treatment is relatively simple: Try to calm the victim. Gently wash the area with soap and water: Apply a cold. wet cloth over the bite. Transport to th nearest emergency facility for further treatment

\section*{What should NOT be done after a bite?}

DON'T apply a tourniquet. DON'T pack the bite area in ice. DON'T cut the wound with a knife or razor. DON'T use your mouth to suck out the venom. DON'T let the victim drink alcohol. DON'T apply electric shock The preceding treatments will not help the victim and are dangerous. Applying ice or a tourniquet can block circula bleeding can result in gangrene and eventual loss of the limb due to amputation. Cutting the wound can cause excessive treatment more difficult.

What is the Master Facility Plan
Floydada ISD contracted with Grimes \& Associates, an archi-
ectural and engineering firm, to create a Master Facility Plan. This tectural and engineering firm, to create a Master Facility Plan. This
Plan can be seen at Floydada ISD's Central Administrative offices. This Plan includes two options for the District's facilities. One option is to renovate all of the exiting facilities. The other is to consolidate the elementary and the secondary schools into two existing facilities and build a new high school. The latter is the most
cost effective option. The Floydada ISD Board of Trustees accepted cost effective option. The Fle.
this option in April of 2004.

## What will happen to the old buildings?

The least expensive option, according to the Master Facility Plan is to demolish the vacant buildings. The cost of insurance and main tenance needed to keep the buildings open exceeds the costs saved
after demolition. There are other usable areas at both the JH and RCA that can be saved and used for youth center, senior citizen center, community center, etc.

What is the average life expectancy of a new school building and how long will the renovated facilities last? According to the TASA Facility Study, the average life span of $30-35$ years of service. The renovated facilities should have the same life expectancy as the new construction according to the Master Facility Plan.
