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

Councilman Cornelius resigns

Council approves new tax rate

The Floydada City Council met Tuesday, August 17, accepted the resignation of City Councilman Eric Cornelius and unanimously approved the City's 2004-2005 Operating Budget, the City's 2004 tax rate and the 2004-2005 Mackenzie Municipal Water Authority's Operating Budget.

In a letter, Cornelius told the council, "Due to many other obligations, work and family, I find it hard to meet my responsibilities as a city councilman. I have enjoyed getting to know other council members and the City staff. I have learned something from each of you and I value your friendship. I have learned a lot from all my experiences on the council these past 14 years. I feel I should resign as a councilman effective August 1, 2004."

Mayor Bob Gilliland said of Cornelius, "He has done a good job for the City and served well these past 14 years. He was a dedicated and a responsible member. He gave us some good

It was the general consensus of the council to suggest names to the mayor and appoint someone temporarily until the next election.

The City's 2004-2005 Operating Budget was approved at \$1,318,424.00. Some of the major budget expenditures are: Administration Salaries & Benefits - \$228,798.00; Municipal Court

Streets Salaries & Benefits -\$124,238.00; Parks Salaries & Benefits - \$12,934.00; Police Salaries & Benefits -\$279,089.00; Fire Department Salary & Benefit/Contract Labor - \$37,514.00; and Civil Defense Contract Labor - \$2,400.00.

The approved increased tax rate was set at \$.40 cents per \$100 property valuation. This is up 10.4 percent over the old rate of \$.36 cents.

The MMWA Water Supply 2004-2005 Operating Budget with a Contingency Fund was approved at \$182,962.00. The Contingency Fund asked for by MMWA, to balance their budget, added \$631.44 per month to Floydada's monthly contract payment to MMWA. Some of the major budget expenditures are: Payroll Expenses - \$45,187.00; Supplies/Chemicals/Equipment -\$45,900.00; Electricity - Floydada, Lockney, Silverton, & Tulia - \$75,000.00; and Insurance - \$8,200.00.

In other matters, the council approved City Manager Gary Brown as the designated Community Development Citizen Coordinator. Brown is to receive and respond to written complaints by local citizens about the City's grant usage, and work done by and through, Texas Community Development Programs (TCDP)

In a related matter, the council approved a motion to seek permission by the state to designate some unused sewer bond money to be used to buy a new sewer machine.

Also, the council approved a state required Affirmative Action Plan Resolution for the purpose of participating in HUD and Community Development Pro-

A two year interlocal agreement with the Texas Municipal League Intergovernmental Employee Benefits Program was approved by the council.

City Manager Brown reported to the council, "The City's electrical improvements are coming along slowly. Some parts are coming from Great Britain. We will have to lease a portable substation to make up all the connections. This work should be done in a couple of weeks."

"Our Home Grant request for 2005 did not get approved. However, this year's new home selections have been done and five families have been notified. We are now testing the old houses for asbestos and lead before tearing

them down," said Brown. Concerning the Farm Labor Camp, Brown concluded, "I have been told the Housing Authority Board has agreed to accept the grant and loan to redo the units. It will be a 90 percent grant and a 10 percent loan. There will be 30 rentable units, plus an office and meeting room. The units can be rented out year around to any farm related worker. This should work. The board is considering putting a manager on site."

MMWA asks council for more money


Mackenzie Municipal Water Authority's Business Manager Van Breedlove and Bookkeeper Rick Beesinger addressed the Lockney City Council at their August 19th regular meeting.

The representatives presented

the 2004-2005 MMWA budget and answered questions. "We have cut our budget to the bone," Breedlove said. "As a result, we

are asking all cities on the waterline to pay into a MMWA contingency fund, and pass a resolution to that effect." They advised the other cities had agreed.

Discussion ensued and on a motion by Junior Brotherton and second by Ginger Mathis, the Council unanimously passed the resolution to pay into the fund also. This will change Lockney's monthly payment from Continued On Page 2

President Bush has announced the withdrawal of tens of thousands of troops from various stations in Europe and Korea, and the re-disposition of those troops in other places, primarily in the United States.

Predictably, that announcement is being met with mixed howls of outrage from certain political quarters, and from no small group of professional military officers...people whose resume is considerably enhanced, and promotion possibilities thereby considerably enhanced, by records that show service

We are not inclined, at this point, to pull Mr. Bush's chestnuts out of the fire, or help pull them out of the fire. He has embarked on policy directions we do not agree with. But the President's decision to proceed on a Pentagon plan that has been studied for some time is commendable, even laudable. For many, many, years it has made no sense, to us, to keep hundreds of thousands of troops garrisoned in Europe. The reason for their presence there, the Cold War and its vestiges, passed from the scene long ago. For awhile, we had a President (Reagan) who understood what was going on in the world and who had the courage to use what power he had, or the country had, to further the country's interests. He, too, was pillared by those who preferred the status quo. He too was sometimes read the riot act in unsigned editorials simply because he told our so-called allies how the cow ate the cabbage. But there is no need to perpetuate a situation that has outlived its usefulness sim-

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County Commissioners approve new tax rate

The Floyd County Commissioners met in Special Session Monday, August 24, and approved unanimously the 2004-2005 budget and the new tax rate for this fiscal year.

The budget approved for this coming fiscal year amounted to \$2,076,963.63. The tax rate was set at \$.45300 per \$100 property valuation, which is a 7.98 percent increase over last year's \$.41300.

The commissioners approved a three percent raise for all the county's elected officials, with the exception of the County Sheriff. This amounts to an average of \$680 to \$701 increase per year for each official.

Dear Editor,

Why am I voting for the bond election?

I could say it is because I have been a part of the Floydada community for the past 49 years. I was educated in Floydada as were my children. My mother and I dedicated ourselves to teaching the children of Floydada for a combined total of 50 years.

My commitment to providing the very best education I can for Floydada children has not wavered even though my own children are no longer students of F.I.S.D. My concern, however, is how we can continue to provide the same standard of excellence in education that Floydada has known in the past with facilities that are so outdated as to no longer be serviceable not to mention safe for our children and faculty. What was "good enough" for me forty years ago is not "good enough" for the challenges of the future. We have all updated, repaired, or replaced almost everything we purchased in the past ten years. Repairing the problems at this time would cost more than replacing the buildings. The technological advances in re-

cent years have far surpassed our ability to keep up in our current facilities. The State Board of Education has just changed high school graduation requirements to include four years of science instead of only three years. Have you seen the science labs in our schools?

There are multiple problems and safety hazards in our schools that many of you may be unaware of or choose not to acknowledge. These conditions will not simply go away if we don't vote for this bond election. The problems will only grow more severe and more expen-

In the 1920's Floydada citizens voted to build two schools now known as R.C. Andrews and Floydada Junior High. That took a monetary sacrifice. Forty years later another generation voted to sacrifice once again and build Floydada High School and A.B. Duncan. It is now 2004 and it is our turn to sacrifice for our town and its children.

Why am I voting for the bond election? I was taught that nothing worth having ever comes without sacrifice.

He then said that to his knowledge only the fire inspector could condemn a school building. He was asked if the fire inspector had condemned the buildings at Jr. High and R.C. Andrews. He said the inspector had only suggested "more egress", another fire es-

Could more fire escapes be added at a lower cost than tearing down the buildings and building new ones? With population declining, school enrollment dropping and a large percentage of those who enter high school dropping out before graduation, two new school buildings will not solve our school problems. The debt will create new problems for tax

Buying Online prescription drugs can be dangerous



Lawson stated, "Overtime and staffing would be an issue. It could become unmanageable. We will need to ask our lawyer about the overtime."



Point of sale sticker printing introduced in Floyd County

(POSSP) and a new vehicle registration sticker design are being introduced in Floyd County. The new registration stickers feature several improvements to deter sticker misuse and eliminate the need for state inventory control.

The new process was piloted in Caldwell and Bastrop Counties and will be implemented ented in 185 counties across the state beginning August 25. This initial phase involves counties that do not process transactions through subcontractor stations (e.g. grocery stores) or automobile dealerships. These latter types of transactions will be piloted in McLennan, Williamson, Angelina and Harris Counties over the next few months, with full statewide with full statewide implementation expected to be completed by early 2005.

Registration stickers will now be printed at the point of sale. Information specific to the registered, vehicle will be printed directly on the sticker, which will help deter theft. TxDOT switched from license plate stickers to windshield stickers for most passenger vehicles about a decade ago to cut down on theft, and the

Point of sale sticker printing new method will enhance these the manufacturing and storage of efforts. (Plate stickers are still used for motorcycles, trailers and some other types of vehicles.) Each sticker will show the last eight digits of the vehicle identification number, the license plate number, county of registration, and registration month and year.

Because each windshield and plate sticker is vehicle-specific, it is important for customers who own more than one vehicle to be sure they apply the sticker to the correct one. Also, customers should carefully follow instructions for peeling and applying the sticker. The new windshield sticker must be peeled from the back of the form; otherwise, it could be damaged and a replacement sticker would be necessary. Plate stickers should be peeled from the front of the form.

When the POSSP method is completely implemented, the new type of sticker will be issued for all registration renewals, including in-person, mail-in and Internet transactions. POSSP prints the sticker on the customer's receipt, so stapling stickers and maintaining manual sticker books will no longer be necessary. This also eliminates

400,000 pre-printed sticker books annually for the current

In the past, yearly windshield stickers were printed in mass quantities based on projections of annual vehicle registrations. POSSP will eliminate the waste of excess stickers resulting from this process each year. As each sticker is printed "on demand" for a specific vehicle rather than pre-printed and later assigned to a vehicle, any internal accounting of the blank forms used for the POSSP is now optional rather than required. Registration transactions will be tracked through the state's automated Registration and Title System in much the same way as the previous

"This new method should be a significant improvement in our processes," said Penny Golightly, Tax Assessor Collector. "It offers greater protection for vehicle owners by making the stickers worthless if they're sto-

where you fill out a questionnaire without seeing a doctor, A questionnaire does not provide adequate information for a doctor to determine if that drug is for you or safe to use-this type of practice is considered substandard medical care according to the American Medical Association (AMA) and the FDA.

*Be wary of internet sites that do not identify with whom you are dealing and do not provide a U.S. address and phone number to contact if there's a problem.

*Be wary of internet sites that do not require a prescription, offer 'new cures' for serious disorders, or a quick cure-

*Look for internet sites with easy-to-understand privacy and security policies. Do they protect your identity and not give out your personal information without your permission?

*Look for internet sites with which you are familiar; does it display the Verified Internet Pharmacy Practice (VIPPS) seal of approval from the National Association of Boards of Pharmacy (www.nabp.net) The VIPPS seal requires that online pharmacies be licensed in every state to which they ship drugs. and in addition, must meet standards for patient privacy, quality assurance, authentication, and security of prescriptions and communication between patients and pharmacies.

*Many of the drugs you receive through internet pharmacies are generic and non-FDA (www.fda.gov) approved or lack any similarity to the drug

*If you are considering ordering medications via a 'store front', have you checked the credentials of the company taking the orders? Are they licensed to sell prescription

*Have you checked the company out through the Better Business Bureau?







Longhorns and Whirlwinds prepare for season openers

Perhaps the best news coming out of last February's U.I.L. biennial realignment (at least as far as Floydada and Lockney are concerned) was that they will be members of a six-member district for the next two years. Seven and eight-team groupings are fairly common throughout Region 1-2A, and the two Floyd County schools are fortunate to be placed in a six-member district, even if it includes two former Class 3A schools (Tulia and Dimmitt).

Other members of the newlycreated District 6-2A are Friona and Olton (holdovers from the previous District 5-2A).

Former district rival Abernathy has been moved to District 5-2A, which includes Idalou, Post, Shallowater, Denver City, Lubbock Roosevelt, Slaton and Tahoka. This 8-team lineup could possibly be one of the strongest Class 2A districts in the state, and will furnish the bidistrict playoff opponents for Floydada's and Lockney's district. Hale Center, the other former district member, has been re-classified and will compete in District 5-1A with New Deal, Anton, Petersburg. Crosbyton, Smyer, Ralls and Lorenzo.

Lockney and Floydada has each had success in recent years, with both having reached postseason play the last two years. Because of the recent playoff appearances, coupled with the return of key players, both squads are highly regarded in most preseason predictions.

According to Joe Robertson, entering his fourth year as the Longhorn mentor, "The preseason predictions are nice as far as our fans are concerned...plus it's nice for our kids to be shown that type of respect. All it does, though, is make us the bull's-eye of the dart board every week...we certainly won't be able to sneak up on anyone.

Robertson added, "We're kind of green in the offensive line...to make our offense click, our kids are going to have to got an awful lot of work to do 'squad. before we can live up to the expectations.

With the tough pre-district schedule (which includes Post, Childress and Muleshoe). we should be mature enough by the time district opens.'

Unless someone has been in outer space for the past couple of years, or in some other way out of touch (like living in Rush

heard of Lockney's Mark Ford. The highly-touted running back is the catalyst of the Longhorn Wing T attack, and has been named the top offensive player of the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal's 2004 preseason Super Team. The likeable Lockney senior's statistics certainly back up any preseason hype - 3675 rushing yards and 50 TDs in his career, which dates back to his starting season as a freshman.

In writing about Idalou football a number of years ago when the Wildcats came to play in Floydada, mention was made about Idalou's all-everything Tracy Saul and the probability of his playing "on Saturdays" (which he did at Texas Tech). The same certainly holds true with Mark Ford...it would be very surprising to not see him play "on Saturdays.

This writer would even go as far to say...it would not be surprising someday to see Mark playing "on Sundays!"

The Longhorns have other veterans who are expected to answer the bell. Cagan Cummings, with a year under his belt of directing Coach Robertson's Wing T, returns for his senior campaign. The offensive line will average about 240 pounds between the tackles. Although youth is pretty evident here, Rance Schumacher and Graden Long (6-0, 260) bring experience as well as all-district credentials.

Ford will anchor the defensive side from his linebacking spot and will get lots of stopper power assistance from Schumacher (6-4, 250), Lance Terrell, Jeremy Pyle ((6-5, 240), and Victory Martinez (5-11. 220). Cummings and Lee Fortenberry bring experience to the defensive secondary - one of the areas where depth is a concern. With four starters returning one each side of the line of scrimmage, younger players such as Landon Cotham, Trevor Morris, Jon Sherman and Taylor Brock will step up to fill some of the vacancies created by graduation of some of the stalcome around in a hurry. What Mark Ford brings to Lockney's table can equally be said about Floydada's Luke Miller - as evidenced by his selection as last season's District 5-2A most valuable offensive

A multi-sport, all-district athlete (again, like Ford), Luke is primed to once again call the signals to ignite Floydada's explosive option attack. The Whirlwinds have the luxury of nine offensive starters returning from a team that averaged over 370 yards a game a year ago.

Add to that seven defensive regulars from last year's 8-2 squad and it is easy to understand the optimism around the FHS

The Whirlwinds are talented at the skill positions, but as with most other Class 2A programs, much of that talent is "one deep." Year in and year out, Class 2A footballers have to stay healthy; their rosters just don't have the numbers to absorb injury losses to key personnel.

Miller will have solid backfield help with seniors Ty Heflin, Justin Martinez and Lionel Williams. Experience abounds in the offensive line with Taylor Sue, Paul Irlas (5-11, 210), Arturo Diaz and Ruben Ortiz (6-1, 210). Jacob Reddy (6-1, 190) and Cody Ware (6-2,200) are sure-handed receivers and give Miller big targets when the 'Winds go to the air. Last year's defense limited opponents to less than 270 yards-per-game. Justin Martinez led the way with 103 tackles. He and Irlas are joined by a linebacking corps which includes Heflin, Williams, Sue and Andrew Cavazos. Reddy and Miller roam the defensive secondary, and its a good one...most are back from the protection unit that surrendered less than 77 passing yards-per-outing a year ago.

Lionel Williams and junior Trey Helms will be pulling double duty by helping out in the defensive secondary as well as handling the place kicking duties. Helms, as well as Payte Beedy are allotted in as back-ups to Luke Miller at quarterback.



Weather Pattern Key To **2004 Prospects**

Looking at historical weather records and near-term weather forecasts shows just how precarious the situation is on the High Plains. The past few years growers have experienced mostly dry, sunny days from August through October that ramped up heat unit accumulations and kept the crop moving at maximum velocity toward

This year is completely different. Some would say more like the norms the area saw a decade or more ago. The return of welcome and beneficial rains during the latter part of July and early August provided much needed relief for dryland and irrigated producers alike.

The downside has been that the weather systems also brought lower than normal temperatures and, possibly of more significance, reduced or eliminated solar radiation in some instances for several days at a

The best situation for the 2004 crop from today forward, and likely the only way the crop will be able to match its final production level to the potential in the field today, will be warm, sunny days through October.

Unfortunately forecasts for the next few days continue to predict slightly below normal temperatures. They also predict an increased chance for the development of severe storms that could include damaging hail and high winds.

PCG Heat Unit Calculator A Useful Grower Tool

Growers have become increasingly interested in keeping track of how many heat units, or DD60's, they are accumulating on their crop in 2004. The DD60 measurement is often used as an indicator of crop status since different crop stages usually correspond to the accumulation of a narrow range of heat units.

For the 2004 crop, growers can use the heat units accumulated to date and the growth stage of their crop to estimate how many heat units they need to finish out the crop.

In an effort to help them keep track. Plains Cotton Growers has put together a web-based Heat Unit Calculator that allows growers to track how many heat units they have accumulated from the date they planted the crop. It also shows how many heat units were accumulated during the same time frame in

The Heat Unit Calculator can be found by following the links provided on the PCG Page www.plainscotton.org

To use the calculator, growers simply select a weather station near their location and choose an appropriate planting date. Growers can choose from 25 weather stations located between Amarillo and Big Spring to estimate heat units accumulations on their farm.

Assessment Notices to Arrive

Boll weevil eradication assessment notices were recently

mailed to cotton producers in the all the eradication zones in Plains Cotton growers, Inc.'s 41-county area.

The assessments are based on information cotton producers provide the Farm Service Agency when they certify their

If growers find an error in the information on their billing, they will need to correct the information at their local FSA office and forward the corrected information to the Foundation. Payment is due September 25, but a 2 percent discount is available to growers who pay the full assess-

ment by September 10. Growers with failed acres are eligible to receive a credit on those acres completely destroyed prior to the final certification date. Qualifying acres must remain free of all hostable cotton until a killing freeze to receive the credit.

To aid growers who have been affected by adverse weather conditions, the TBWEF is offering payment extension agreements for producers whose unts are current.

"For those having difficulty paying their assessment, help is available by contacting the assessments department and arranging an extension agreement," said Chief Financial Officer Tina Ballard.

Producers entering into an extension agreement must make a 10 percent down payment, and they will be charged a late fee of 1 percent per month until their accounts are paid. This late fee begins on the date the signed agreement and down payment are received by the Assessments Department. Producers who are delinquent in payment and who do not have an extension agreement are subject to a late fee of 1.5 percent per month.

Producers with extension agreements have 150 days to pay their accounts.




