step towards regaining Texas' TB-free status.
Texas' TB plan, developed in 2002 by a joint industry and regulatory working group, origi-
nally called for testing nally called for testing at least
2,400 purebred beef and seed 2,400 purebred beef and seed
stock herds by the end of August, 2004. The U.S. Department of Agriculture recently announced that it was extending the testing deadline until December 31, 2004, to allow for
more tests to be completed. If the 2,400 herds are not tested by the end of December, the USDA could revoke a temporary waiver that allows shipments of
feeder cattle to go out of the state
> "Testing these herds is a vital step towards our long term goal of regaining TB-free status,
for the Texas cattle industry," said Combs. "Since the deadline does not fall until the end of December, not only can cattle owners test their herds for fre
