
Brandon Gilroy earns Eagle Scout rank

As we write this we have listened all the way from Floyd County to a host of broadcast commentators, we hesitate to call them "reporters", who are all obsessed over the obvious biases of Dan Rather and CBS News.



Lockney Council discusses ways to obtain grants for City

Lockney City Council discussed the need to budget for grant monetary requirements at their 9-16-04 regular meeting.

All agreed grants are a money saving way for small towns to improve their infrastructure and facilities. Even at that, "matching grants" require a city to provide a specific percentage of money either in cash, in kind work or both.

"If we had applied this year for every grant that was available to us, (and that we had a good chance of getting), the City would have spent over \$50,000 in matched funding," said City Secretary Ron Hall.

Discussion ensued on possible ways to help fund any upcoming grants. Hall said, "For example, a \$2 increase in garbage fees would be one way to help give Lockney the funding necessary to apply for more of these grants without having to dip into the City's reserves."

Mike Neill of J. & L. Equipment gave a video presentation on Flygt Pumps for lift stations. The City is now looking at different suppliers of this equipment to complete the waste water lagoon project.

The Council next heard department reports. Police Chief Jerry Edwards mentioned a disturbing trend, "We are seeing younger, sometimes 2nd and 3rd grade, offenders.'

City Judge Michelle Araujo mentioned receiving an offer from a collection agency to collect outstanding warrants. "They add a fee to the warrant. It would not cost the City anything. The company tries for a year to collect, then returns them. "The county now uses this system," she said. "They seem to be pleased with it." The Council requested she bring the information she has received for them to study, and they would take it under advisement.

All routine agenda items were passed unanimously with little discussion.

A required resolution authorizing the filing of a grant application with SPAG on a solid waste grant, naming Ron Hall as authorized agent to request grant funding and act on behalf of Lockney passed unanimously on a motion by Tina Graves and second by Michael DeLeon.

In other business, the changes to City Ordinance #43 and the addition of ordinance on weed control passed unanimously on a motion by Junior Brotherton and second by Ginger Mathis.

Whilwinds lose hard game to Cooper

The Lubbock Cooper Pirates pulled a rarity at Floydada's Wester Field last week by blanking the Whirlwinds 30-0. In recent years, few teams have managed to hold Floydada scoreless on its home turf. The Pirates, of District 2-3A, improve to 3-1 for the year, while the 'Winds drop to 1-2 in their non-dirstrict sched-

Lubbock Cooper, which let a win get away from them a week ago against Snyder, capitalized on field position to totally dominate the first half by posting a 24-0 lead at the intermission. George Watson, sportswriter for the Lubbock AvalancheJournal, had installed Cooper as a 32point favorite going into the contest - and his prediction was almost on the money. A couple of aspects of the game that his prognostication failed to fortell were the several no-calls by game officials, which helped allow Cooper to sustain scoring drives in the first two quarters of play.

After holding the Whirlwinds 3-and-out to open the contest, the Pirates wasted little time in a 5play scoring drive. Trace Gurss' 16-yard TD romp was set up by a 21-yard aerial from Howell Finch to Josh Barnett. Jakob Cunningham kicked the pointafter and added a 31-yard field goal early in the second period. Lionel Williams and Tate Jones made several good stops for the 'Winds in the early stages, includ-

ing a 7-yard sack by Jones of Pi- against Seminole (a 25-6 loser to rate quarterback Howell Finch.

The Pirates scored again midway through the second quarter when Finch hit Cory Cleveland with a 20-yard touchdown toss. Another Floydada turnover led to a 3-play drive by Cooper, with Finch scoring from a yard out.

The Pirates opted for a twopoint conversion by Bradley Madison to take a commanding 24-0 lead at halftime.

Floydada's defense made several adjustments at intermission, but the Whirlwind offense still was unable to get untracked against the Pirates. Going into the contest, the 'Winds were averaging over 350 yards-per-game of total offense, but Lubbock Cooper's defenders held Floydada to only 145 total yards (95 yards on the ground and 50 passing yards). Floydada senior quarterback Luke Miller had several passes bounce or glance off intended receivers and ended the game with 5 completions in 15 attempts and an interception. Miller was also limited to only 38 yards in 13 rushing attempts. Jacob Reddy led the Floydada defenders with 10 tackles, with Justin Martinez and Ty Heflin each being credited with 8 stops.

Cooper's Bradley Madison added a meaningless 8-yard touchdown run, with a little over two minutes remaining in the final stanza, for the final margin of victory. Tomorrow night the Pirates hit the road once again

Muleshoe last week). The Whirlwinds hope to win one for their exes this week in the Homecoming tilt against Farwell. The Steers, one of the better Class 1-A clubs on the South Plains, are coming off a 34-7 loss to stateranked and undefeated Morton. The loss to the Indians is somewhat misleading as Farwell returns a number of players from last year's fine playoff club. Once again, the Whirlwinds came out on the short end of the judgements. Floydada coach Lee Hurt commented, "We just made too many mistakes, early in the game, and we can't do that against a good team like (Lubbock) Cooper. They took advantage of the field position we all but gave to them, and a good team is going to do just that...all their scores in the first half came from having a short field to work with. They kept us penned in our own territory just about the whole half. I do want to add, though, that I was very proud of how we came out in the second half and held them to only a single score late in the game...our kids showed a lot of character to play with the intensity they did after being down by 24 at the half. 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
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Longhorns run over the Cyclones 33-0

Cotton Market Weekly A service provided by Plains Cotton Cooperative Association

With a record U.S. crop looming on the horizon, cotton futures on the New York Board of Trade settled sharply lower Thursday as bearish supply and demand fundamentals took control of the market after traders shrugged off concerns over potential crop damage from Hurricane Ivan and possibly Hurricane Jeanne.

Hurricane Ivan made landfall in southern Alabama Wednesday night and pounded the Gulf Coast with torrential rain and gusty winds of approximately 130 miles per hour. Key cotton growing areas of Alabama, Georgia and Florida felt the brunt of the storm. Soils there already were saturated from remnants of Hurricane Frances which moved through two weeks ago, and the combination of gusty winds and driving rain could severely damage the Southeastern crop.

Most of the crop in the region was ready to be harvested. High winds and drenching rain could force lint from open bolls, knock bolls off stalks, and twist plants, making picking difficult. However, potential cotton losses due to recent storms may be relatively minor in view of the record 20.9 million bale U.S. crop currently forecast by USDA.

"Statisticians can play games identifying how much cotton has been lost in Alabama, Georgia, North and South Carolina, but the market has its own answer: not enough to matter," one ana-



lyst commented. "Worse-case scenario, 300,000 bales have been lost. But, we still have a boatload of cotton sitting out

In the meantime, market observers have switched their attention to Hurricane Jeanne which hit eastern parts of the Dominican Republic on Thursday and is forecast to pass through the Bahamas this weekend. Early next week, the storm is expected to approach the U.S. Southeastern Atlantic Coast.

The National Agricultural Statistics Service (NASS) reported harvesting was underway in six of the 14 main U.S. cotton producing states during the week ended September 12, and although equal to one year earlier at 7 percent, progress was behind the 9 percent fiveyear average. Harvesting typically has started in 11 of the main states by mid-September. Forty-six percent of the crop was showing open bolls compared to 43 percent last year and the 57 percent average.

The condition of the crop suffered another slight deterioration. Cotton considered good to excellent accounted for 68 percent of the crop, down two percentage points. Seven of the key cotton states deteriorated while three improved, and the remaining four were unchanged.

Another bearish factor in Thursday's trade was a weakerthan-expected USDA export sales figure. In the week ended September 9, net export sales totaled 37,800 bales versus prereport expectations of sales between 50,000 and 100,000 bales. The figure was 58 percent lower than one week earlier and a 77 percent decrease from the four-week average. Major buyers included Thailand, Indonesia, Turkey and Mexico. At 60,700 bales, the export shipments were 24 percent lower than the previous week and 63 percent less than the four-week

"The week's export sales and shipments were quite disappointing," said a market observer. "We were expecting lower numbers, and we got really poor numbers. This just shows that current U.S. cotton prices are keeping a large amount of mill business away,"

On the spot cotton scene, Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas producers sold 310 bales online compared to the previous week when only 100 bales were sold. Prices received by producers selling their cotton online ranged from 43.06 to 46.87 cents per pound versus the previous week's range of 48.00 to 48.73 cents per pound.

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Combs reminds cattle owners to test herds for TB

Texas Agriculture Commissioner Susan Combs today reminded cattle producers to have their hers tested for cattle tuberculosis by December 31, the first step towards regaining Texas' TB-free status.

Texas' TB plan, developed in 2002 by a joint industry and regulatory working group, originally called for testing at least 2,400 purebred beef and seed stock herds by the end of August, 2004. The U.S. Department of Agriculture recently announced that it was extending the testing deadline until December 31, 2004, to allow for more tests to be completed. If the 2,400 herds are not tested by the end of December, the USDA could revoke a temporary waiver that allows shipments of feeder cattle to go out of the state

without restrictions.

"Testing these herds is a vital step towards our long term goal of regaining TB-free status for the Texas cattle industry," said Combs. "Since the deadline does not fall until the end of December, not only can cattle owners test their herds for free, they can take advantage of cooler fall months to work their cattle."

"We need the support of dairy and purebred beef producers to find any possible remaining TB infection, to prevent further spread of disease and to regain our ability to move breeding cattle across state lines without a TB test," said Dr. Bob Hillman, head of the Texas Animal Health Commission (TAHC), the state's regulatory

agency for livestock and poultry health. "Allowing cattle TB to gain a 'hoof-hold' would be extremely costly, in terms of credibility with consumers, and in our ability to trade freely with our interstate and international trading partners."

Since 1983, cattle TB has been detected in 19 Texas dairies and eight purebred beef herds. In 2000, Texas attained the TB-free status under the National Tuberculosis Eradication Program, but lost it in 2002, after two newly-infected herds were detected.

A joint industry and regulatory working group developed the Texas TB plan in 2002, agreeing to agreeing to test 2,400 herds in return for a USDA temporary waiver allow-

ing feeder cattle to move interstate without a test or official identifications.

Some beef producers are concerned that restrictions on their herd would be enforced due to false positive results. But new follow-up blood tests have shown to be effective in eliminating needless culling or loss of genetics.

To test a herd, producers should contact an accredited, private veterinary practitioner and make an appointment. Testing is free. The texas Animal Health Commission maintains lists of veterinarians who can conduct the test, and can be contacted at (800) 550-8242 or www.tahc.state.tx.us for more information.

Senate includes 03/04 Crop Disaster Package in Homeland **Security Spending Bill**

With the quick addition of an emergency agricultural disaster assistance package to the 2005 Homeland Security appropriations bill, producers who lost crops in 2003 or 2004 have been offered a glimmer of hope that help is on the way.

Offered as an amendment by Senator Max Baucus (D-Montana), and cosponsored by 15 other Senators from both sides of the aisle, the "Emergency Agricultural Disaster Assistance" provision would provide disaster assistance for crop, quality and livestock losses incurred in 2003 or 2004.

The "emergency" designation allows the provision to move forward without the need for offsetting budget cuts. Estimates for the proposal indicate it would provide almost \$3 billion in emergency assistance to crop and livestock producers.

The proposal is based on the 2001 disaster program that provided relief to growers who suffered losses during the 2000 crop year.

The amendment authorizes the Secretary to make assistance available in the same manner as provided under sections 806 and 815 of the Agriculture, Rural Development, Food and Drug Administration and Related Agencies Appropriations Act of

The House passed its version of the Homeland Security appropriations bill before the August recess without a crop disaster component. Attaching the agricultural disaster assistance amendment to the Senate version means a final decision on the measure will be hammered out during the House/Senate Conference on the Homeland Security spending bill.

The following Senators have been named to the Homeland Security Conference Committee: Thad Cochran (R-MS); Ted Stevens (R-AK); Arlen Specter (R-PA); Pete Domenici (R-NM); Mitch McConnell (R-KY); Richard Shelby (R-AL); Judd Gregg (R-NH); Ben Campbell (R-CO); Larry Craig (R-ID); Robert Byrd (D-WV); Daniel Inouye (D-HI); Earnest Hollings (D-SC); Patrick Leahy (D-VT); Tom Harkin (D-IA); Barbara Mikulski (D-MD); Herb Kohl (D-WI); and Patty Murray (D-WA). The House of Representatives had not named conferees at the time of this ar-

To get a better idea about what the amendment proposes, a look back at the 2000 disaster program provides the most

Topping the list of good things about the proposal is that it authorizes the Secretary of Agriculture to spend "such sums as are necessary" to carry out the program. This means payments would not have to be prorated. In fact, the only benefit limit that would be enforced is the usual \$80,000 per person payment limitation.

Eligibility for crop loss benefits will be based on whether or not a qualifying loss occurred on an eligible crop. Eligible losses will be those in excess of

35 percent of the higher of: the producer's Actual Production History (APH) yield; the 5-year NASS County average yield; or, the Non-insured Assistance Program (NAP) approved yield.

Eligibility for livestock assistance will be initially determined by whether or not the producer's operation is in a county that received an emergency designation as a primary or contiguous disaster county after January 1, 2003.

Crop loss benefits would be determined by first calculating an amount of eligible loss. Once calculated, the eligible production amount would be multiplied by the established payment rate.

Payment rates for insured commodities would be calculated as 65 percent of the crop insurance price election. Uninsured crops would be paid at a lesser rate equaling 60 percent of the crop insurance price election. Payment rates for non-insurable crops would equal 65 percent of the 5-year NASS average price.

So far, no specific language has indicated if cottonseed assistance will be part of the final

In addition to physical losses, producers will also be able to apply for Quality Loss Assistance in the manner offered during the 2000 Crop Loss Assistance program.

In that program producers were able to apply for quality losses that exceeded 20 percent of the normal value of the commodity. Benefits under this program were available to cotton

producers on a bale-by bale basis and were extremely beneficial to many growers who suffered marginal physical losses in




