come and gone. Folks hereabouts come and gone. Folks hereabouts,
have expressed their opinions on who should occupy various offices for the next four years. For the most part, we can not quarrel with the voters' decisions.
We would have voted differently We would have voted differently
in certain races, but in the main in certain races, but in the main
we think the people of Floyd County voted about the way they were expected to vote. George Bush was returned to office in
Texas, and in Floyd Cond Texas, and in Floyd County, with
overwhelming margins. We tend to think the reason for Floyd to think the reason for Floyd
County going the way it did was simply because they agreed with our own assessment of the situation: that George may not be per-
fect, but he came closer to the fect, but he came closer to the
Texas ideal than the Boston libTexas ideal than the Boston lib-
eral John Forbes Kerry, who promised all things to all people. Bush was a man whom more voters felt comfortable with, as opposed to Kerry, with whom they
felt a degree of apprehension. felt a degree of apprehension.
As far as we were concerned, and as we have said repeatedly, the policy of George Bush in the Middle East was, and is, a com
plete disaster. It was designed to
woo the Jewish vote throughout woo the Jewish vote throughout America, but particularly Florida.
It varies 180 degrees from that of his father, no matter what his father (with pardonable fatherly pride) now says. It has cost the
lives of many American younglives of many American young-
sters, and will cost the lives of sters, and will cost the lives of
many more. Nevertheless, Bush's opposition in the recent campaign promised only that they would do the same thing, only do it better, whatever that is.

entered the booth. ntered the booth. and various spokesmen for various political groups, will claim credit. We will say only that this election, close as it was, was not
as close as we thought it would be. For that, we are glad. Perhaps now those with responsibility can, and will, buckle down and can, and will, buckle do
